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

EDWARD BEST, born November 27th, 1825. Entered Ministry of our Church in Ireland in 1848. In 1879 he came to New Zealand and laboured with acceptance in Dunedin, Christchurch, Thames, Auckland, and Napier circuits. After a year's visit to Europe and America he returned to New Zealand in 1892, and resided as a Supernumerary in in the city of Auckland, where he was in labours more abundant until his death, which took place suddenly in the Union Free Baptist Church, Auckland, when about to commence service on the evening of Sunday, November 18th, 1900. Mr. Best was a devout student of nature, with a firm belief in the inspiration of Scripture. He was pre-eminently a soul winner, and in his case an ideal Christian life was closed by an ideal death.

## Question XX.-Who are the Members of the Board of Examiners for 1901?

#### ANSWER-

### PROBATIONERS', STUDENTS', AND CANDIDATES' FXAMINATION.

Resolved-1. That the following be the Board of Examiners for 1901, with the subjects in which they shall examine, and that the Rev. G. T. Marshall be the Secretary and Convener :-

Rev. H. Bull: Theological Paper for Candidates, and Pope's Compendium. Rev. J. H. Simmonds: General Knowledge Paper for Candidates, and Latin.

Rev. W. Gittos: Maori Language.

Rev. H. R. Dewsbury: Hebrew and Greek.

Rev. T. E. Thomas, M.A.: English Bible-Old Testament. Rev. G. W. J. Spence: English Bible-New Testament.

Rev. J. T. Pinfold, Ph.B.: Wesley's Sermons. Rev. D. McNicoll: Beet's "Through thrist to God."

Rev. W. B. Marten: Gregory's History and Polity of Methodism and Laws of Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Rev. J. Wrigley: Fisher's History of the Christian Church.

Rev. C. H. Laws, B.A.: Salmon's Introduction to the New Testament.

Rev. W. A. Sinclair: Smyth's Christian Ethics.

Rev. S. Lawry: Robertson's Early Religion of Israel.

Rev. J. A. Luxford : Lightfoot's Essay on the Christian Ministry.

Rev. C. E. Beecroft: Liddon's Divinity of Our Lord.

Rev. J. Dukes: Orr's Christian View of God and the World.

2. That in addition to the subjects required by the General Conference for Probationers' Examination, a course of study in Latin be also prepared, and that the Conference will attach "Special Honour" marks to those who take this examination. That the following be the course of study in this subject:—1st Year: Cæsar, De Bello Gallico, Book V. 2nd Year: Virgil, Æneid, Book II. 3rd Year: Cicero, De Amicitia. 4th Year: Horace,

Odes, Book I., and Cicero, De Senectute.

3. That the laws of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church be taken by Probationers in conjunction with Gregory's History and Polity of

Methodism.

4. That each examiner prepare a written report on the several papers committed to his care, and transmit such report to the Secretary, the Rev. G. T. Marshall, not later than 15th January.

5. That the Secretary of the Board of Examiners prepare a general

report for the ensuing Conference.

6. That the Probationers be required to communicate with their respective Examiners not later than the first week in May, stating what

subjects they propose to take for examination.

7. That the Probationers meet for examination immediately prior to the sitting of the District Synod, and at the place where the District Synod is held; and that the examination be conducted under a supervisor appointed by the Chairman.

8. That the persons appointed to hear Probationers', Students', and Candidates' trial sermons affix marks to the reports before submitting them to the District Synod. The numerals 1 to 6 are used: 6 to represent

the maximum.

9. That the Secretary of the Board of Examiners assess and mark the Probationers' book lists, using the numerals 1 to 6: 6 to represent the maximum.

10. That the Chairman of each District Synod be required to forward to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners a signed official report of the trial sermon of each Probationer, Candidate, or Student examined in his district, together with the book list of each Probationer and the finding of the District Synod thereon.

11. That the questions for Probationers be so arranged as to require a general acquaintance with all the work prescribed in the Syllabus in any given subject, together with a particular knowledge of such portions as

the examiners may deem of greatest importance.

12. That each Probationer, immediately upon the completion of the examination send to the Secretary of the Board a list of the subjects he has taken.

taken.

13. That Probationers be reminded that the Greek Testament is a compulsory subject through the whole of the course for all those who have passed through the College. With regard to any others, special provision

shall be made for their examination up to their third year.

14. That each Probationer shall be examined orally in the District Synod in some book selected by the Chairman from his book list. Such book lists to be sent to the Chairman a fortnight before such Synod.

15. That three hours be allowed for each examination paper.

16. That the written examination of candidates for the Ministry be taken during the third week in November, so that the results of the examination may be known at the District Synods, the Chairman to arrange for supervision.

17. That Probationers' and Students' papers be sent to Chairmen of Districts not later than 1st November, and the Candidates' papers not later

than 20th October.

18. That the marks obtained by Probationers, Students, and Candi-

dates be printed on a separate slip for the use of the Conference.

19. That the list of marks gained by Probationers in the various subjects of the Conference curriculum be inserted in the Conference Journal from year to year.

20. That it be a standing order that arrangements be made that Candidates for ordination preach either during the session of Conference

or prior thereto.

21. That a certificate of matriculation, together with a list of subjects in which the Candidate has passed, exempt a Candidate from passing the General Knowledge Examination.

22. That the curriculum and list of books recommended by the

General Conference be printed in the Minutes of Conference each year.

23. In order to promote uniformity of date in the Probationers' and Candidates' examinations, and bring them into line with examinations of like importance elsewhere, Conference directs that these examinations be held in every District during the third week of November.

### PROBATIONERS' COURSE OF STUDY.

(As Decided by the General Conference.)

#### First Year of Probation.

- 1. Bible, Old Testament.—Hebrew-1 Samuel xvi., xvii., with Davidson's Hebrew Grammar: or English, the whole book of 1 Samuel. Cambridge Bible Series.

#### EXPLANATORY REMARKS.

1. The Conference requires every Probationer who is acquainted with Greek or Hebrew to take the Greek or Hebrew subjects specified in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer who has been a student in the Theological Institution shall be examined in these Greek or Hebrew subjects, unless the tutors under whom he studied, having taken into consideration his attainments on leaving the Institution, are of opinion that these examinations cannot reasonably be required in his case. Any Annual Conference may direct that Greek be a compulsory subject.

2. Annual Conferences shall have power to make exceptions in the above course of study in favour of Probationers who have matriculated, and

are pursuing a University course.

## PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN NEW ZEALAND.

DEAR BRETHREN,

The dawn of the 20th century is upon us, and while we are thereby reminded of the swift passing of the years with all their opportunities for service, we recognise a special call to look at the future which presses on us with all its urgent claims. Everywhere the need is clamant, and on every hand there is heard a loud call for consecrated service. God is saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Our response to this appeal will influence the history of the century. We desire that our Church shall do its share in the great work for God and humanity which lies immediately before us, and we urge you to prepare yourselves to act a worthy part. Joshua said to the children of Israel, "Sanctify yourselves, for to-morrow the Lord will do wonders among you." So everyone of us should prepare for the manifestation of God's wonder-working power.

The report of the Century Commemoration Fund showed that upwards of £17,000 had been promised, and more than £11,000 paid in. The application of this Fund to the relief of burdened Churches, and to the starting of new enterprises in the way of Church extension and philanthropy, should give a decided impetus to the work of our Church throughout the Colony. It has been decided to keep this Fund open for further contributions for another year, and we hope that many more will thus be able to help a movement which is of great importance to the welfare of the Church.

#### THE WORK OF HOME MISSIONS

has also received the careful attention of the Conference. The conditions under which much of the new settlement is going on make it necessary that we should help freely in the establishment of Church agencies in the outlying districts. To many of the settlers we are bound by the strongest ties of natural and spiritual relationship, and we dare not accept the responsibility of neglecting them. At the same time many of the circuits already established are making heroic struggles to maintain and improve their position. Help in this critical period of their existence is of great importance, and may be expected to yield a good return in time to come. We urge our people to look upon our Home Mission work with large sympathies

All will not be equally interested in every phase of the work undertaken; but where all is so worthy and so needy, let there be no carping criticism and refusal to help, just because the object in which we are specially interested cannot be more largely helped at the expense of the other objects. Let us remember the broad basis on which from the very beginning this Fund has been built up, and that its general object is "the support and

extension of the Church throughout the Colony."

The statistics of Church membership and of our general work have been passed under careful review. In some respects they are decidedly disappointing. For the first time for many years we report a

#### DECREASE OF CHURCH MEMBERS.

While the Maori membership shows an increase of 104, the European membership shows a decrease of 172, or a net decrease of 68. There is also a serious falling off in the number returned as "junior" members, 260 less being reported this year than last year. We have reason for saying that to a large extent these decreases represent different methods of computation, rather than actual loss. In spite of all our desires, resolutions, and efforts we can no longer regard attendance at the class-meeting as the working test of membership. At the same time we have so far failed to adopt any other method which is at once effective and capable of general application. This necessarily leads to some laxity in the compilation of our returns. But when we have made all possible allowance for these things we feel sure that even a nominal decrease cannot be looked upon with satisfaction.

We are glad, however, to have had reports from circuits which have been favoured with gracious visitations of converting power, and many have

been turned to the Lord.

#### OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

is being carried on with unabated vigor, and gives valuable opportunity for censecrated energy in the service of the children's Lord. We venture to suggest to the teachers the desirability of making greater efforts to secure the regular attendance of their scholars at the public services of the Church. If we are to be saved from the evils consequent on the general neglect of the house of God, we must not only secure the children for the school, but also urge upon them the duty of joining with the adult congregation in the public worship of God.

Let us above all regard the Sunday School as an ever-ripening field from which it is both our privilege and our duty to continually reap a rich harvest for our Master The greatest and most urgent need of our time is the intelligent and decisive dedication of our young people to Christ and

His service.

In this connection we desire to remind the parents of their great responsibility. You, and not the Sunday School teacher, stand in closest relation to your children, and you can never discharge your responsibilities by simply sending your children to Church and Sunday School.

#### YOU OWE TO YOUR CHILDREN

the best religious training it is in your power to give them. We know that many difficulties stand in the way of doing all that some of you would like to do; but no success in your worldly affairs, and no gratification of earthly ambitions, can compensate for failure to train up your children in the fear of the Lord. Therefore, let your family life be constantly "sarctified by the word of God and prayer," and make the consecration of your children to Christ the supreme purpose of your life, devoting to it your most prayerful effort and sanctified intelligence.

#### TO THE YOUNG PEOPLE THEMSELVES

we send a word of exhortation. Many of us had the unspeakable privilege of being early led into the path of piety, and Christ has been our life-long friend. By all the joy which this has brought to us, and by all the love which Jesus has for you, we entreat you to give yourselves at once to Him. Those who love you best pray for this, and the answer of their prayer would make them very happy, while to you it would bring the richest of all blessings. Jesus Christ looks for this, and your whole-hearted consent to be His disciples would bring gladness to His loving heart. He is waiting for your answer. Do not refuse. Say to Him, "I will," and at once act on your resolve, and keep your promise to Christ. Then will He give Himself to you to be yours for evermore.

Those of you who are already devoted to Christ we exhort to "stand fast in the Lord," and "let your manner of life be worthy of the Gospel of Christ." We look to you to fulfil our best hopes and to give us our richest joy. "For what is our hope, or joy, or crown of glorying? Are not even ye

before our Lord Jesus Christ at His coming?"

Looking on the needs of the world around us we are impressed with the importance of everywhere proclaiming

#### "THE GOSPEL OF THE KINGDOM."

A revival of faith in "the Kingdom of God" as a working force in the world cannot come too soon. Our efforts to proclaim this Gospel should be stimulated by the modern growth of social ideas. Extreme views of individualism are giving place to doctrines which recognise the organic unity of society, and the solidarity of the human race. This is but an approximation to the teachings of the New Testament. We must everywhere insist that in all the organisation of social and public life the Kingship of Jesus shall be recognised, and that the brotherhood of men shall become a reality through the unifying influence of Him who is at once "Son of God" and "Son of Man." Then public positions will not be sought for selfish or party ends, but for the advancement of the common good, always recognising that it is righteousness which exalteth a nation. Believing this we must, with greater determination and wiser adjustment of our forces, labour so that every social reform shall also be a moral reform. Why should not this first year of the century be the beginning of a new era of social progress on distinctively Christian lines?

One practical suggestion we should like to see taken up heartily, and worked systematically and vigorously, is that an effort be made to secure

#### 20,000 New Pledges

during this year to the sacred cause of total abstinence from the use of intoxicants. This is not too much for the Churches of New Zealand to attempt. Can we not as a Church accept the responsibility of making a united and determined effort to obtain 5000 new pledges? If this were taken up by every Sunday School and Band of Hope, and by every congregation, it could be done, and who will dare to say what blessing would be the result?

But while we seek to develop the humanitarian side of our religion, let us not forget that the most central and essential feature of our religion is

#### INDIVIDUAL LOYALTY TO JESUS CHRIST,

and that our supreme efforts must be given to the great work of persuading men to be reconciled to God. With this in view let us seek by all means to save some. But in view of the history of our Church does it not appear desirable that we seek to promote everywhere an old-fashioned revival? For this there must be tender compassion for them that are out of the way, and an intense sympathy with the saving purposes of Jesus Christ. We must not in this matter be afraid of being too optimistic. Our fathers used to sing—

"Faith, mighty faith, the promise sees,
And looks to that alone,
Laughs at impossibilities,
And cries, It shall be done."

Let us sing it till we enter deeply into its spirit of sublime contempt of all opposing forces. So shall we work and pray in constant expectation of saving results. Let us fulfil all reasonable conditions of success, and then trust in Him who has said, "They that wait for me shall not be ashamed."

While we thus remind ourselves of the necessity of expecting success in our work, we wish to speak a word to and in behalf of our Local Preachers. We gladly recognise the faithful work of these "our fellow-helpers in the Gospel," and heartily commend them and their work to the practical sympathy of all our people. Their work is often done in circumstances of great difficulty and discouragement, and should be the more appreciated on

this account. We trust our brethren will continue to hold their office and their work in very high regard. Let them never come to regard themselves as so many "stop-gaps," and their work of no importance. Let them understand that they are called to deliver God's message to the people, and not of spiritual power which is essential to successful preaching of the word. If they are diligent students of the Bible, men of faith and prayer, living holy lives, and preaching the Gospel with the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven, they will vindicate their position before the world, approve themselves to the Church, and bring glory to God by turning many to righteousness. But while we urge the workers and members of our Church to look for a revival, we must not forget that an essential condition of this is

#### PERSONAL HOLINESS.

We cannot shut our eyes to the fact that there is great danger of being satisfied with a Christian experience far below that which is the birthright of every child of God. Instead of asking how little spiritual life is compatible with a profession of religion, let everyone rather ask how much is possible. Our Lord declared that He came that we might have life, and have it more abundantly. If by the possession of this abundant life we "adorn the doctrine of God our Saviour," we shall possess an influence which must result in the truest prosperity of the Church. In this matter let us be "imitators of them who through faith and patience inherit the promises," and endeavour to reproduce the holy lives of those who did so much to make Methodism a power in the land.

## SECTION II. REPRESENTATIVE SESSION.

#### Question I.-Do we Sanction the Division or Alteration of the Districts or Circuits in this Conference?

ANSWER:

WANGANUI DISTRICT.

1. That in the Stratford Circuit a Home Missionary reside at Eltham, and work Eltham, Mangatoki, Mahoi, Rawhitoroa, Mangawhero, etc.

CANTERBURY DISTRICT.

1. That St. Albans Circuit be divided. Papanui to be the head of New Circuit, which shall include Papanui, Upper Riccarton, Riccarton Village, and Frieston. The New Circuit to be called "Papanui Circuit."

2. That St. Alban's Circuit pay to the New Circuit £20 per annum for two years, and £10 for the third year. Conference is recommended to direct the Home Mission Fund to pay the

New Circuit £30 per annum for one year, and recommend that £30 be granted for another year. The Minister for the New Circuit to give to St. A!ban's Circuit two services per quarter.

OTAGO DISTRICT.

1. That no division of Riverton Circuit take place this year, but that a Home Missionary be sent to reside at Riverton, the Minister to reside at Otantau.

## Question II.—What New Stations is it Proposed to Occupy?

ANSWER:

AUCKLAND DISTRICT.

1. That Home Missionaries be appointed to Waitekauri and Hikurangi.

WANGANUI DISTRICT.

1. The cases of Whangamomona and Mokau, also Pongaroa and East Coast District were referred to the Home Mission Executive.

NELSON DISTRICT.

1. Murchison.-A Probationer to be sent.

OTAGO DISTRICT.

1. Alexandra.—The Conference recommends the Ministers of the adjacent Circuits to visit it.

#### Question III .-- What Circuits are Due to take a Married instead of a Single Minister?

ANSWER:

- 1. St. Albans (second) fulfils its obligation on the creation of Papanui Circuit.
- 2. Springston, Malvern, Westport, and Upper Thames are due, but are relieved in the above order.

### Question IV.—What Circuits ask for Additional Preachers?

WANGANUI DISTRICT.

1. Hawera. - A Probationer to reside at Patea.

#### WELLINGTON DISTRICT.

Wellington (Taranaki Street).—A Probationer.

#### CANTERBURY DISTRICT.

 Christchurch (Durham Street).—A Probationer as fifth Minister to reside at Richmond.

#### OTAGO DISTRICT.

 Riverton.—A Probationer for this year to be appointed instead of a married Minister, to reside at Otautau.

## Question V.—Who are the Members of the following Connexional Committees?

#### COMMITTEES FOR 1901.

#### I .- FINANCIAL DISTRICT COMMITTEE.

The Ministers of the respective Districts and the Circuit Stewards of the various Circuits of those Districts, with the Lay Treasurers of the Connexional Funds, Conference Funds, District Lay Treasurers of Connexional Trust Funds, and District Secretaries of Church Properties, are members of the Financial District Synods, as are also those Probationers who are in charge of Circuits under the direction of the Chairman.

#### II .- COMMITTEE OF PRIVILEGES.

 The President, Ex-President, Secretary, the Ministers of the Wellington and Hutt Circuits, Rev. Dr. Morley, with Messrs. T. Buddle, F. L. Prime, G. Tiller, H. Brittain, W. Harris, G. H. Blackwell, J. C. Stephens, and W. Wardrop; Secretary of Conference, Convener and Secretary.

 The above-named Ministers and Laymen of the Wellington and Hutt Circuits are a Committee of Exigency, the second Minister of the Wellington (Taranaki Street) Circuit to be Convener and

Secretary.

3. The Committee of Exigency is specially directed to take steps to secure the rights of the Church and its official representatives at all public functions, and in regard to the Chaplaincies of all public institutions, and that by correspondence and otherwise they obtain the co-operation and hearty support of the Committee of Privileges.

 That a Special Committee be appointed to secure the rights of the men and officers in connection with the Permanent Force and

Volunteers of the colony in regard to religious services

 That the following be the Special Committee:—Revs. Dr. Morley and W. Baumber, with Captains G. J. Smith and Drayton.

6. That the names of the Superintendent Ministers in the ports of the colony visited by His Majesty's ships of war be annually reported to the Rev. R. W. Allen, Senior Chaplain of the Army and Navy Committee in England, in order that the Naval authorities may be notified of the chaplaincies in these places.

#### III .- PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE.

That a Public Morals Committee be appointed, to consist of the members of the Committee of Privileges resident in Wellington and Hutt Circuits, with power to add to their number. That this Committee shall confer with the representatives of other Church's, with a view to combined and vigorous action in the cause of moral reform; and that the second Minister of the Wellington (Taranaki Street) Circuit be the Convener.

## GENERAL REPORT OF CHURCH PROPERTY FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30th, 1900.

I am glad to state that the whole of the Reports of the District Secretaries came into my hands by January 2nd. This shows that the Superintendents must have been much more prompt in their returns. For the care and thoroughness with which the District Secretaries do their work, the whole Connexion is their debtor. The returns, however, from Connexional Properties have not yet been received, and are therefore not included in the figures referred to in this report.

A gratifying improvement is to be recorded in the accuracy of the Schedules. Only in one case this year has a Superintendent achieved the feat of bringing forward a credit and debit balance at the same time, and the mistakes in carrying out the totals are comparatively

few.

The usual Summaries of the A. and B. Schedules are appended. With respect to the former, the most gratifying fact is that out of 512 properties 163, on which Churches or Parsonages have been built, enter the new century entirely free from debt. A comparison between the returns of September, 1885, and September, 1900, is also most gratifying. At the former date there were 325 freehold properties held; there were 173 Churches, providing for 32,604 persons, 45 Schoolrooms with accommodation for 8,990 scholars, and 58 Parsonages. The total cost for land and buildings was reported as £180,228. The debt to Loan and Building Fund was £3,920, and on other securities £40,539, or a total of £44,259. There are now 512 freeholds held. Two hundred and ninety-three Churches have been erected, with 51,045 sittings; 78 Sunday Schools provide for 15,340 children of the congregations; and there are 94 Parsonages. The first cost or value of the buildings is £289,835; debt to Loan and Building Fund, £9,679; on other securities, £34,269; or a total of £43,948.

In connection with the Union of 1896, 36 Churches, 7 Schoolrooms, and 16 Parsonages of the former United Free Methodist and Bible Christian Churches were placed on the Register. Including these additions, there has been during the fifteen years an increase of 63 per cent in the number of Trust properties, 58 per cent in the number of Churches, 57 per cent in the Schools, and 62 per cent in the Parsonages. The Churches provide sitting accommodation for 18,441 personadditional, and in the Schools there is room for 6,350 more children. The increase in first cost or value of land and buildings is 62 per cent, but the debt has decreased by £511. At that time it averaged 25 per cent of the first cost; now 15 per cent. If the debt on Connexional properties be added, it would still amount to less than 20 per cent, a result for which the Church may be devoutly thankful. It should not, however, be forgotten that 90 per cent of our properties are built of wood, and will need to be renewed. It seems desirable that, wherever practicable, brick or stone should now be used in new erections. The rapid advance of our towns and cities, and the improvement in public taste, will also demand better architectural designs than in the past, and attention may well be called to this.

It will be noted that only one property is reported as sold. Possibly one or two others were disposed of before September, but they have not been returned.

In connection with the B. Schedules, Auckland District reports a reduction of debt on 21 properties, amounting to £934; Wanganui on 20, of £444; Wellington on 16, of £211; Nelson on 6, of £68; Canterbury on 17, of £957; Otago on 15, of £364; a total of £2,981. Additions to the debt stand at £6,107, most of this amount being expenditure on new erections. There are, however, a few cases which need explanation. Coromandel, with only £80 spent on additions, reports an increase in its debit balance of nearly £300; Taranaki Street, Wellington, in purchasing property, value £2,800, has increased its debt by £3,240; Temuka, while discharging its obligations to the Loan Fund, has borrowed, without sanction, £200 more, of which only about £50 is represented by repairs; and Trinity Church, Dunedin, has a heavy debit balance, the whole of which is not represented by additions to the property.

Comparing the totals of B Schedules of 1885 and 1900, the amount for seat rents in the former year was £3,298; Trust collections, £1,333; Anniversaries or Opening Services, £1,511. For 1900 the figures are—Seat rents, £2,684; Trust Collections, £1,334; Anniversary and Opening Services, £1,702. The payments

in 1885 were for lighting and cleaning, £2,110; interest, £2,759; insurance, £514; payments to Circuit Boards, £139. In 1900 there was paid for lighting and cleaning, £2,450; interest, £1,928; insurance, £755; to Circuit Boards, £186. In the former year the debts had been reduced by £1,912, and increased by £2,267; in the latter the reductions were £2,981; the increase, £6,107. The insurances in the former year were £98,090; in the latter, £142,697. A considerable reduction in seat rents will be noticed. In some cases these have been abandoned, with the result that an improper burden has been placed on the Circuit Fund. The Trust collections and Anniversary Services do not show an increase proportionate to the additional Churches, and it is obvious that in many places no attempt is made to keep up a Trust income. On the expenditure side there is a satisfactory decrease in the amount paid for interest, while the insurance premiums are necessarily increased. The amount paid to Circuit Boards ought to be much larger.

In the case of no less than 78 Church Trusts no Anniversaries have been held, and by the operation of Rule 9 the following places are excluded from receiving help from the Home Mission Fund, namely:—Freeman's Bay, Franklin, Hamilton, Northern Wairoa, Whangarei, Coromandel, Helensville, Waitara, Stratford, Hawera, Wanganui, Rangitikei, Sanson, Kiwitea, Greytown, Eketahuna, Otaki, Ormondville, Richmond, Hokitika, Motueka, Kumara, Little River, Methven, Oamaru, Riverton, Wakatipu, and Palmerston.

The history of the Otago District Property during the past fifteen years may be cited as an instance of the beneficent operations of the Loan Fund. In 1885 its debts to the Loan Fund were £417; on other securities, £6,055; or a total of £6,472; on which interest was paid to the amount of £490. Though 30 further properties have been acquired and additions made to the total value of £9,121 meanwhile, the debts now owing are only £2,028, viz., Loan Fund £1,881, and other securities £147. The improvement is due to a steady and persistent effort, and, by making use of the Loan Fund, lessening the payments for interest, and so reducing the indebtedness. Had some other Districts pursued the same policy, a better record on the whole would have been shown.

#### CHURCH PROPERTY REGULATIONS.

1. Superintendents are directed that in case of properties held under the Land Transfer Act, Trustees must sign a Declaration of Trust, which is to be forwarded to the Custodian of Deeds; and that in the case of properties not held under the Land Transfer Act, Trustees must sign the Deed of Conveyance. In the case of appointment of new Trustees, no further declaration of Trust is required, but they must sign the form of Appointment of New Trustees. Such form to be forwarded to the Authorised Representative.

N.B.—Forms for Declaration of Trust, and also for appointing new Trustees, and printed copies of the New Model Deed, may be obtained from the Authorised Representative.

2. Copies for the Model Deed have been deposited in the various Land Registry Offices for the Colony, in order that reference may be made thereto, as provided in the form. The numbers given to the Deeds so deposited are as under:—

That in order to secure accuracy in the returns the District Secretary be empowered to compare the figures supplied to him on the A and B annual returns, with the entries in the Circuit Schedule Books, Superintendents being directed to produce their Schedule Books at the Financial District Synod for this purpose.
- That the question of completing Titles where necessary be referred to the General Secretary of Church Properties in conjunction with the Superintendent of the Circuit concerned.
- 6. The sanction of the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee shall be obtained for all purchases, sales, and for leases of Church property over seven years, and for all erections, enlargements, or structural alterations of buildings, and that Committee is empowered and directed to require that plans and specifications of all buildings and alterations be furnished before the work is begun, and that no building be erected until a proper Title to the land has been secured.

The Church Building and Loan Fund Committee shall supply to the Financial District Synods the replies to Questions 2, 3 and 4, respecting Church property, and also report any cases where the Regulations have not been observed. The same Committee shall supply to the Conference the replies to Question 7, as to (a) sales sanctioned, (b) proposed erections sanctioned, (c) new erections and purchases, also reporting any cases where the Regulations have not been observed. In the case of sales the written consent of the Committee shall be supplied to the President of the Conference.

7. That the General Secretary or District Secretaries of Church Properties be directed by the Conference to communicate with the respective Superintendents of Circuits where discrepancies occur, with a view to explanation and adjustment.

#### REPORT OF CUSTODIAN OF DEEDS.

In accordance with the Regulations, I sent to each Financial District Synod full Report for the year ending 31st October, 1900. Copies of these, as directed, are now placed on the Secretary's desk. From them it will be seen that Deeds of twelve properties have been received by the Custodian, viz.: Waipuku, Papakura, Waikuku, Belleknowes, Oamaru, Western Spit, Nukuroa, Sumner, and Springfield Churches; Coromandel and Oxford Parsonages, and Gouldsbank Church site. The Deeds of ten properties were also received from Treasurers of the Loan Fund on payment of Loans being completed. Ten declarations of Trust were sent in, and forty-six Certificates of appointment of new and additional Trustees. The following Deeds have been removed from my custody:—For Mortgage: Cuba Street Church and Parsonage, and Coromandel Parsonage. For Sale: Warkworth Church; Normanby, Mawhitiwhiti Road; Takapuna Church site; Ferry Road Parsonage; Upper Wakefield. For Lease: Normanby and Papakura; and to Loan Fund Treasurers: Gouldsbank Deed.

To the Loan Fund Treasurers I have handed eleven Deeds in connection with Loans granted. Four Declarations of Trust and five appointments of additional Trustees have been received in connection with Deeds they hold; while the Deeds of eleven properties have been returned to the Custodian.

Deeds are still incomplete in more than a score of cases. I have again to call attention to cases where the number of Trustees is below the legal limit.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the Report be adopted.
- That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. Wm. Morley, D.D., for his services during the past year, and that he be reappointed

#### REGULATION.

That the Custodian be directed to keep a Register of Deeds, and to report annually to the Financial District Synod and the Conference.

#### REPORT OF THE AUTHORISED REPRESENTATIVE.

During the year ending the 31st December, 1900, twenty Trusts have been placed upon the Church Register. Some of these were cases where the Registration had been neglected for years past. Forty-three appointments of new and additional Trustees were registered. As some of these were not sent for six or eight months after the appointments, it is feared that the persons named acted as Trustees in the meantime. It cannot be too strongly represented that no Trustee can legally act until his appointment has been entered on the Church Register and the fact certified to the Superintendent. Some properties are known to have been acquired many months since, but they have not been entered on the Church Register.

The Fees received during the year amounted to £27 10s, which, with a Credit Balance of £1 10s 4d brought forward, make a total of £29 0s 4d. The payments have been:—Per expenditure for assistance to Secretary (three quarters), £11; new Deed Registers, £2 16s; Stamps and Telegrams, including expense of General Secretary of Church Property, £2 9s 11d; Stationery, £1 10s 9d; Advertising, 3s 6d; Carriage of Documents from Napier, 11s 6d. Total, £18 11s 8d;

leaving Credit Balance of £10 8s 8d.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

- That the Report and Cash Statement be adopted, with thanks to the Authorised Repsesentative.
- That, in accordance with the provisions of "The Wesleyan Methodist Church Property Trust Act, 1887," the Rev. Wm. Morley, D.D., be appointed Authorised Representative for the coming year.

#### REGULATIONS.

- 1. That the Authorised Representative enter on the Church Register all new Trusts and such alterations in Trusts as are certified by Circuit Superintendents, and that he report thereon to the Conference.
- 2 That the Authorised Representative be appointed to correspond with the Government on all questions of Church property or titles.

# CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND REPORT. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

As the Connexion grows, and more properties are acquired, the business devolving upon this Committee necessarily becomes heavier each year. During the past year the duty of dealing with the new enterprises under the Century Commemoration Fund has also brought additional work and responsibility. Eleven meetings have been held, at each of which close attention has been given to the consideration of the various cases brought forward.

The usual Cash Accounts of General Fund and Special Branch, together with notes appended, Summary of Balance-sheets, and list of Loans give detailed information respecting the Finance. In connection with the General Fund twelve Loans have been closed by payment of the final instalment. In one case the Committee regretfully assented to a Mortgage being taken up in lieu of the Loan. Twenty-three additional Loans have been granted from the General Fund, and five from the Special Branch, and there are now 107 Loans current in the former, and 28 in the latter. It will be noted that £500 more has been paid away in Loans from the General Fund than was received by the Committee from the repayment of instalments. The sum of £214 has been added to the Capital of the Special Branch from the Jubilee Fund. The demands during the past year have been more numerous than usual through the new enterprises sanctioned under the Century Fund. In the coming twelve months they will probably be heavier still. Already Loans have been promised to an amount exceeding the entire balances in hand.

The Committee is glad to report that the Aparima, Hope, Woodhaugh, Belleknowes, Waikuku, Woolston, Levin Parsonage, Tinwald, Tames, and Ponsonby Trusts have during the year paid instalments in advance. The Committee has thus been able to help needy cases with Loans much earlier than could have been done otherwise.

It is with great regret that the Committee again calls attention to the fact that so many of the Trusts are in arrears, the total now overdue being over £1,000. In England, with a very much larger number of Loans, the arrears are nominal. The Committee recognises that there are differences between Great Britain and the Colony, and that in a

few cases the fluctuation of population has interfered with the Income of Trusts. But in all cases there ought to be earnest effort to meet the obligations to the Fund, and in some instances this is not put forth. A column has been added this year to the list of Loans, showing the amount of arrears overdue on January 16th.

The following undertakings have been approved:—Acquisition of Parsonage sites at Inglewood, Oxford, Parnell, Pahiatua, Darfield, and additions to the sites at Sanson and Waihi; erection of Churches at Te Aroha, Sumner, Aratapu, Takapuna, Northcote, Pihama, Awatuna, Woodside, and Warkworth; building of Parsonage at Oxford, and purchase of one at Parnell; enlargement of Parsonages at Pukekohe and Sanson; erection or enlargement of Sunday Schools at Ashburton, Addington, Dannevirke, and Levin; enlargement of Churches at Thorndon, Rongotea, Linwood; purchase of site and Sunday School at Normanby; erection of Vestries at Petone, Patea, Heathcote Valley; enlargement of Willowby Church, and purchase of strip of land at Upper Riccarton.

Loans have been granted or promised towards the erection of the Huntly, Mount Eden, Dannevirke, Arrowton, Havelock, Awatuna, Te Aroha, Sumner, Oamaru, Upper Wakefield, Thorndon, Aratapu, Takapuna, Northcote, and Warkworth Churches; building of Parsonages at Oxford and Cargill Road; Sunday Schools at Normanby, Dannevirke, and Levin; enlargement of School at Ashburton; enlargement of Thorndon, Linwood, and Willowby Churches, and reduction or liquidation of debt at Halswell, Marshlands, Sydenham, Woodville, Devonport, and East Belt Churches.

The following sales of property have been sanctioned:—St. Asaph Street Church Site, Christchurch; Mawhitiwhiti Road Site, Normanby; Albert Town Sections (conditionally); Kaipara Flats Church Site; Dome Valley do.; Warkworth Church and Site; South East Belt Parsonage Property, Christchurch; Paparoa, half-acre of land; Templeton Parsonage and Site; and part of the present site at Upper Riccarton. An extended Lease has also been granted of Hunter Street Section, Normanby.

In accordance with the resolution of last Conference, the following have been sanctioned as "New Enterprises" in connection with the Century Commemoration Fund:—Thorndon Church, renovation and additions; Lyttelton, do.; Woodend Church, re-roofing; erection of Churches at Awatuna, Te Aroha, Sumner, Mornington, Belleknowes, Aratapu, Takapuna, Northcote, Golden Cross, Waitekauri, Midhirst, Waitara, Warkworth, Pihama, Woodside, and Normanby; enlargement or improvement of Churches at Willowby, Reefton, Ohoka, Swannanoa, Waikouaiti, Johnsonville, Karori, Heathcote Valley, Patea, Rongotea, Kaiapoi, Eyreton, Tapanui; building or enlargement of Parsonages at Parnell, Cargill Road (Dunedin), Oxford, Waihi, Pukehohe, Lawrence; Sunday Schools erection or enlargement, Ashburton, Birkenhead, Dannevirke, Hawera, Normanby, and Levin; Church Debts at Paeroa, Cuba Street (Palmerston North); acquisition of sites or purchase of additional land at Rangiora, Darfield, Hinds, Inglewood, Sanson, Otautau, Russell, Mitchelltown, and Normanby. In some of these cases of erection the plans have yet to be approved. No direction having been given by the Conference, the Committee resolved that all the New Enterprises must be begun during 1901.

Some proposals were necessarily declined during the year, and thought and consideration have been given to others which are not yet matured.

Receipts on account of the Levy for Working Expenses are about the same as last year, but the Committee regrets to find that a good number have not yet been sent on. A list of Trusts in arrears is submitted.

The Committee has been unable to do anything during the year in the direction of securing Freeholds in mining areas.

The Report of the General Secretary of Church Property has been

submitted and approved.

The Conference adopted this report.

#### REGULATIONS.

- 1. That the Conference directs the Superintendents of Circuits to see that whenever application is made to the Church Building and Loan Fund the financial position and prospects of the Trust be stated with perfect accuracy, and to see to it that communications from the Loan Fund Committee receive prompt and proper attention.
- 2. That a list of delinquent Trusts be posted up during the Conference, and that the Corresponding Secretary communicate with those Superintendents that are absent from the Conference.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND.

# I .- Sources of the Fund.

- 1. The amount obtained in connection with the special effort for this purpose authorised by the Conference of 1882, and the amount received in connection with the Jubilee Fund of 1891.
- 2. Donations, bequests, grants from Trustees, etc.

 That the Superintendent Minister be instructed to urge Trustees to contribute to the Fund in proportion to the number of the congregation—

If the congregation numbers less than 100, Five shillings

100 200, . ,, " Twenty " 400, 200 ,, ,, " 400 500, Forty ,, ,, 22 500 and over Fifty

 Such contributions to be made to the Treasurer of the Church Building and Loan Fund not later than 31st October in each year.

# II. OBJECTS OF THE FUND.

 To render assistance in the purchase of sites, and in the erection of substantial churches in places where they are needed.

2. To aid in providing parsonages in all the Circuits in the colony.

3. To assist in the removal of debts on Church property.

#### III.—COMMITTEE.

The Committee of the Fund shall consist of four ministers, and four laymen, to be appointed annually by the Conference; the District Synod where the previous year's Committee was located to nominate a Committee.

#### IV .- DUTIES OF THE COMMITTEE.

1. To meet at least once a quarter.

2. To receive applications for, and determine upon the amounts of loans,

and the times of repayment.

 To approve of the plans and specifications of all proposed erections, enlargements, and purchases; to sanction sales of Wesleyan Trust properties, and afford advice to Trustees in difficult cases.

4. To receive the Annual Report from General Secretary of Church

Property and to report to District Synods.

To see that proper Deeds be obtained from all Trusts as soon as possible, and to provide for their safe custody.

6. To take such steps as may be necessary to secure the Connexion

against permanent debt.

7. To transact generally all the business entrusted to it by the Conference, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations relating to the Church property, and to present an Annual Report to the Conference.

### V .- CONDITIONS OF LOANS.

 No application will be entertained by the Committee until it has been approved by the Quarterly Meeting.

2. In making applications for a loan, the questions contained in the

printed form must be answered.

The Connexional collections, as appointed by the Conference, shall be duly made.
 A reasonable system of seat-rents shall be maintained in the

Churches.

- 5. All applicants shall agree to devote a portion of the income from their Trust property (so far as circumstances will justify) to the funds of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting, or the funds of our general institutions.
- Satisfactory security shall be given by Trustees and other responsible persons for the repayment of the loans, and on the terms and at the times agreed upon with the Committee.
- Satisfactory assurance shall be given that the land on which it is
  proposed to build has been legally secured for the intended object.
   All Trusts shall provide a suitable set of Cash and Minute Books.

 Each Trust shall, in accordance with the Model Deed, hold a special meeting for the audit of accounts; Minutes of such meeting to be

taken and preserved.

10. Each Trust receiving a loan for liquidation of debt shall raise a sum at least equal to such loan before they shall be entitled to claim it from the Committee. In case of erection, the Connexional rule that two thirds shall be raised by the local Trust shall be complied with before a loan for the remainder, or any part thereof, shall be granted.

11. All loans to be repaid in quarterly or half-yearly instalments, as may

be agreed upon.

12. Every Trust receiving aid from this fund shall make and carry out arrangements for the extinction of its debt within a period not exceeding ten years.

13. When loans are granted, Deeds of the property shall be lodged with

the Treasurers of the Fund.

# Form of a Bequest to the Building and Loan Fund.

I give unto the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the New Zealand Wesleyan Methodist Church Building and Loan Fund the sum of pounds sterling, to be paid out of my personal estate, in aid of the said Fund, now administered under the direction of the New Zealand Conference, and for which the receipt of such Treasurer or Treasurers shall be a sufficient discharge.

# Question IX. — What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Various Connexional Funds?

That the payments on account of the Children's Fund be £8 10s for each child per year, as per General Conference Regulations.

4. That the Three Kings Institution and the Connexional Secretary's Committee be assessed in the interests of the Children's and Contingent Funds on the basis of Circuits.

5. That the Assessment for the ensuing year be 13 per cent.

6. Conference is recommended to authorise the withholding of £4 14s 10d from this year's amount to refund the Chairman for moneys paid on behalf of the Hamilton Circuit for last year.

# II.—SUPERNUMERARY FUND. For Balance-sheet see Appendix B.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

1. That the Balance Sheet now read be adopted.

 That the thanks of the Conference be given to the Rev. H. R. Dewsbury and Mr. T. Buddle for their services as Treasurers during the past year, and that the Rev. H. Bull and Mr. T. Buddle were appointed Treasurers for 1901.

- That the Conference expresses its regret that the Report and Balance Sheet of the General Treasurer was not received in time for the copies to be placed in the hands of members of the Conference.
- That the Reports be cabled for, and be bound up with the copies of the Conference Minutes.
- That receipts be sent by the General Treasurers to all Ministers paying into the Fund.
- That the attention of the General Treasurers be directed to their neglect in forwarding accounts in time for the District Synods, much to the inconvenience of the same.
- 7. That the attention of the Treasurers of the Fund be called to the omission to forward the Annual Report of the Fund to be bound with the Conference Minutes; and, further, that the Report has not yet been received.
- That attention be directed to the omission of the Board of Treasurers of the Supernumerary Fund to forward copies of agreement for signature by some of the Ministers joining the Fund under the plan of Methodist Union.

# TARARUA FUND.

The reports of the Committee and Trustees were presented and adopted. The Committee reported that during the year opinion of counsel had been obtained as directed by the previous Conference. A Special Committee was then set up to considor counsel's opinion on the disposition of the capital sum of the Australian portion of the Fund. After two sittings, the Committee reported that the legal opinion was very distinct that a Trust was created by the resolution of the Conference of 1882, which provided that the amount received in subscriptions from Australia must be kept "intact," and the interest only applied to the families concerned. The report was received, and the Conference resolved as follows:—

- That provision be made for the continuance of the Trust, and for carrying out its provisions so far as relief is concerned should the necessity for this arise.
- 2. That the Trustees be directed to use the interest already in hand and accrning for the purpose of raising the principal sum to the amount originally received from Australia, and to invest the same in such securities as are required by the Trustee Act of 1891. Also, to invest any further sum received for interest, and not required for relief, in the same way.
- That legal expenses already incurred, and any other expenditure necessary in carrying out the resolutions of the Conference in connection with the Fund, be paid by this Trust.
- That Messrs. R. W. England and J. C. Prudhoe be thanked for their services as Trustees during the past year, and re-appointed for the ensuing year.
- That a copy of counsel's opinion and of the special committees report be entered in the journal of the Conference.
- That in the event of a vacancy occurring in the Trusteeship during the intervals of the Conference, the President for the time being be authorised to appoint a successor.
- That the following be the Committee for the ensuing year, which shall report to the next Conference, viz.—Revs. Dr. Morley, W. Lee, W. Baumber; Messrs. R. W. England, J. C. Prudhoe, and J. T. Smith.

- 8. That the Committee take into consideration, and if deemed necessary obtain legal advice during the year re the question of entrusting to the Public Trustee the management of the Australian portion of the Fund, and if the Committee deem it expedient to do so that it be authorised to hand over the Fund accordingly.

(12) To furnish half the cost of supplies for deceased and dis-

abled Ministers.

(13) Travelling expenses to Conference, Editor of The Advocate.

# IV.—CENTURY COMMEMORATION FUND.

For Balance-sheet see Appendix K.

#### REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee has held regular meetings during the year, and by carrying out the directions of the last Conference has sought to promote the success of the Fund throughout the colony. Shortly after Conference, copies of the Historic Roll were sent to the circuits through the District Secretaries, and a supply of cards provided for purposes of allocation. Whit Sunday was generally observed as Century Fund Sunday, and special sermons were preached in most of the Churches on behalf of the Fund.

The General Secretary has visited a large number of circuits, and by his advocacy has sought to enlist the sympathy of the congregations. In some cases he has good reason to complain, not only of the want of preparation for his visits, but also of the lack of co-operation.

An attempt was made through the District Committees to secure the visit of a minister to canvass in each district, and so assist the General Secretary, but with only partial success.

The Committee regrets that in some cases there has been great delay in furnishing lists of promises, and in forwarding monies in hand to the General Treasurers. This has caused a large amount of correspondence, which ought to have been unnecessary.

The total amount reported as having been promised up to January 28th is £16,568 14s 6d, of which sum £10,064 14s 6d has been received by the General Treasurers. In too many circuits there has been an almost complete lack of organisation and scarcely any attempt at personal canvass, and the Committee is confident that the comparative failure of the effort is largely due to this.

The Conference, by its resolution of last year, altered the original basis of the Fund by permitting distinct allocation to Church Trusts and other objects. The result of this will probably be that more than two-thirds of the subscriptions will be allocated to trust objects, and by far the larger moiety to trusts that are in comparatively easy circumstances. The Committee being aware that there are trusts, the condition of which is serious and which must have help in some form from the Connexion, and also that there are other cases where help from this Fund will greatly aid Connexional working in the future, recommends—that while keeping in view the other objects set forth in Resolution 5, page 60, Minutes 1899, the Conference give assistance from the unallocated portion of the Fund as follows:—

(a) A sum of £250 (less amount allocated) to the Home Mission Fund to repay a similar amount borrowed by the Committee on account of a promise from this Fund. This to be a first charge.

(b) Napier, £240, and Pitt and Vincent Street, Auckland, £168 15s (less allocation in each case) to pay debts left after sale of U.M.F. Churches.

(c) Gisborne, £200 (including amounts allocated) with recommendation to Loan Fund Committee to re-arrange balance of loan.

(d) Lower High Street, Christchurch S., £260 (including amounts allocated), amount now owing on notes of hand.

(e) Woodville, £50, towards the further reduction of debt.

(f) Arrowtown, £50, towards reduction of debt.

(g) Little River, £70, on condition that they raise an additional £30.

(h) Tauranga, Pahiatua, and Riverton, £100 each; Eketahuna and Malvern, £75 each; Hastings, Oxford, and Inglewood, £50 each towards purchase or erection of parsonage.

The Committee, after careful consideration of District Synod resolutions, further recommends:—

 That the Fund be not closed till the Conference of 1902, and that the personal canvass in each circuit be completed.

2. That no agent be specially set apart, but that Conference be recommended seriously to consider the necessity of making arrangements with suitable ministers and laymen for the further prosecution of the work during the year, and the completion of the canvass in each circuit.

3. Thata General Committee be appointed, and also District Committees, and that the General Committee arrange with the District Com-

mittees the necessary details of the year's work.

- 4. That subscribers desiring to allocate promises already made must do so before June 30th next, after which time promises unallocated will be treated as belonging to the General Fund; and that subsequent contributors who intend allocating their subscriptions be requested to do so at the time of making their promises.
- 5. That as early as practicable in this first year of the new century arrangements be made for holding Evangelistic services in all our circuits for the purpose of quickening the spiritual life of our members and securing decision for Christ on the part of the unconverted.

adults may solicit subscriptions to the Fund.

17. That with a view to overtake the needs of new districts constantly being opened up, in making the ordinary grants to Circuits, the precedent of the English Conference be followed and that they be made on a sliding scale, diminishing from year to year, such intimation being printed with the grant.

18. That the General Treasurers shall publish in The Advocate, at least once a quarter, the amounts received by them from the several Circuit Treasurers up to date, in order that it may be seen whether the remittances have been promptly made; also that extracts from the reports of the agents be occasionally made through the paper.

19. That in our Home Mission operations in the principal cities, particular attention be given to the various philanthropic agencies, especially to the establishment of a Connexional Orphanage, when practicable.

20. That in our large town and city congregations the employment of

A Statement of Income for 1900, and an Abstract of Minutes of the Board of Missions were presented.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

1. That the Rev. J. A. Crump act as deputation in the Wellington District, as also in the Blenheim Circuit; Rev. T. J. Wallis, for the Auckland and Wanganui Districts; also, the Rev. S. B. Fellows or the Rev. Wm. Slade (with the concurrence of Board of Missions) be the deputation for Otago, Canterbury, Westland and Nelson; and that the Rev. C. Griffin draw up the plan of work for the colony.

2. The Conference directs that in each Circuit and Home Mission Station sermons be preached on one Sunday in each year in all our Churches, and collections made at such services in aid of Foreign Missions; also, that public meetings for the advocacy of Foreign Missions be held in each Church, at which collections shall be made for the Fund; also, that wherever practicable, subscriptions be solicited.

That the question of the New Zealand Church supporting a Missionary Sister be commended to the Ladies' Auxiliary in Auckland.

 That the Foreign Mission Sunday be the first Sunday in August, and that meetings held during that week shall bear relation to Foreign Mission work.

5. That at each District Synod the question be asked: "Have the amounts collected for the Foreign Missions been duly remitted to

the General Treasurers?

6. That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. C. Griffin and Mr. C. Hicks for their efficient work as Secretaries during the past year, and that they be re-appointed Secretaries to watch over the interests of Foreign Missions in New Zealand.

7. This Conference has heard with great concern of the heavy debt now owing by the Foreign Mission Society, and which so seriously hampers its operations. The Conference strongly urges upon the Members and Adherents of the Church the necessity of providing an enlarged income, so that the present openings for extension may be taken advantage of, and the existing Stations may be more efficiently manned.

8. That with a view to promote the systematic support of Foreign Missions, our people be requested more generally to adopt the collection cards and mercy boxes already provided by the Mission

House.

9. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the anonymous

donor of £100 in Cargill Road Circuit.

 That the thanks of the Conference be accorded to the Rev. C. E. Williams and Josepha (Native teacher) for the deputation work during the past year.

11. That the attention of the officials in Sunday Schools where nothing has been done in the interests of the Fund, with a view to institute

efforts in aid of the same.

12. That the attention of Superintendents of Circuits be directed to the law that all Foreign Mission income must be sent through the

Chairmen of Districts.

13. That the Conference heartily reciprocates the catholic expression of opinion on the part of the General Synod of the Anglican Church recently held in Napier, in relation to the Foreign Mission work of other Churches, and agrees with that Synod that it will be for the best interests of Christ's Kingdom, that where heathen territory is being adequately ministered to by a Christian Church, no other Church should enter into rivalry with it.

14. That the Conference expresses the gratification with which it has heard of the continued prosperity of our Missions in the South Seas, and the blessing which has followed the labour of the agents employed. The Conference also recognises the urgent need for further efforts for the evangelization of the Indian Coolies in Fiji, and the appointment of additional Missionaries to New Britain. The Conference records its thankfulness to God for the increased contributions received from the members and adherents of our Church in this Colony for this important branch of our Church work, and in view of the openings which present themselves, again heartily commends the Foreign Mission enterprise to the sympathy and liberality of our members and adherents.

3. That the theological training of the students be provided for by the appointment of Ministers as Lecturers, each Lecturer to receive an honorarium of not more than £15 per annum.

4. That three Lecturers be appointed as follows :-

Systematic Theology—Rev. C. H. Garland.
 Ecclesiastical History and Methodist Polity—Rev. H. Bull.

(3) Homiletics and Bible Exegesis-Rev. J. H. Simmonds.

5. That the Principal of Wesley College, Three Kings, be appointed to the Governorship of the Theological Institution, and be empowered to arrange the students' preaching services.

6. That the Ministers of the Auckland and Manukau Circuits be a Committee of Discipline for the Theological Institution, the

Governor, Convener.

7. That all students be expected to contribute towards their cost of College training, provided each case be considered and dealt with upon its own merits, and provided further that in cases where students are unable to contribute during their College course, they

be not expected to do so during their probation.

8. That all agreements with students and candidates for repaying the cost of their training in the event of their retiring from the Ministry of the Church within a period of ten years from the time of their being received into the Ministry be drawn up in legal form and kept in the custody of the Governor, who shall be responsible for the signing of the same by each candidate received.

9. That the Treasurer be authorised to pay the fees for Theological students attending University College Lectures.

10. That the students be allowed to remain for a period of not less than three years at the College, unless called out in case of necessity by

the President.

11. That each of the Theological students at Prince Albert College preach a trial sermon before one of the Ministers of the Auckland (Pitt Street, North Shore, and Grafton Road) and Manukau Circuits, prior to the holding of the Auckland District Synod, and that a written report of each sermon be presented to the said District Synod. The Chairman of the District to notify the students respecting the time and place.

12. That arrangements be made so that the students, in addition to trial sermons provided for, shall preach at least once a year, before each of the Superintendent Ministers of the Auckland City and

Suburban Circuits.

13. That the students be permitted, subject to the approval of the Committee of Discipline, to substitute Maori for one of the other

subjects of study.

14. That the Chairman of the District furnish the Secretary of the Probationers' Examining Committee with the complete results of the Students' Examinations, including examiners' reports and marks gained, as soon as possible after the holding of such examinations.

15. That a copy of the Annual Report of the Theological Institution for the year ending October 31st be furnished by the Governor to each

Chairman of District in time to lay before his Synod.

16. That the Students' Examination take place during the second week in December.

17. That quarterage be allowed to each student at the rate of £2 per quarter.

7. That the following be the Central Committee for 1901:—The Rev. Dr. Morley, the Superintendents of the Christchurch Circuits, Mrs. Lockwood, Miss Kitchingman, and Messrs. Prudhoe, Howard, Flesher, Bowen, A'Court, Hulbert, and the President and Secretary of the North Canterbury Branch, together with the General Secretary of the S.S. Union.

8. That the curriculum for Teachers' Examination, 1901, be :-

Grade I.—The Book of Exodus (Facts and History), The Gospel of St. Mark (Cambridge Smaller Bible), Dr. Beet's "Firm Foundation of the Christian Faith."

Grade II.—Dr. Morrison's "The Sunday School Teacher's Handbook," The Gospel of St. John, (Cambridge Bible for Schools), Rev. C. A. Row's "A Manual of Christian Evidences."

 Teachers shall be allowed to take up one or more books at a time, and two examinations shall be held during the year in May and October.

10. That the Scholars' Examination be the International Lessons (afternoon) for the months of July, August, and September, and and the Catechism Questions on the Tablets for the same period, and that the dates of the examination be the second Friday in October.

11. The Conference regrets to observe that in a large number of our schools neither the Conference Catechisms nor the Tablets are used. It calls the attention of our Ministers and of the Teachers' Meetings to this matter, and recommends the adoption of the

International Lessons and Tablets.

- 12. Recognising the importance of the work that is being carried on by our Sunday School Union, the Conference urges upon the attention of all our Sunday Schools the importance of being connected with it, and of securing thereby the valuable aid in Bible instruction that is rendered by the system of Teachers' and Scholars' Examinations. The Conference asks our Ministers to bring the matter forward from time to time in the Teachers' Meetings of their several Circuits.
- 13. The Conference fixes the third Sunday in October, to be called "The Young People's Sunday," upon which, throughout our Circuits, special services shall be held for the young, with a view of leading them to decision for Christ.
- 14. Profoundly impressed with the desirability of gaining our Sunday Scholars for Christ and His Church, the Conference affectionately directs the attention of the Teachers' and Leaders' Meetings to the provision whereby the boys and girls of our Church, who have intelligently accepted Christ, may be reckoned as Junior Members, and advises the formation, wherever practicable, of Junior Society Classes.
- 15. That the Sunday School accounts be audited annually.
- 16. The Rev. H. R. Dewsbury was instructed to pay over the whole of the amount in hand belonging to the Auckland branch of our Sunday School Union to the Connexional Union.

# Question XVII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the "Advocate?"

### ANSWER:

The Report of the Committee was presented to the Conference by Mr. E. Rosevear.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

- That the Conference amalgamate with the Presbyterians and Congregationalists in making the "Outlook" the official weekly organ of the three Churches in terms of Dr. Rutherford Waddell's offer.
- 2. That a Committee be set up in Dunedin to arrange all details.
- 3. That the Committee consist of Revs. P. W. Fairclough, J. J. Lewis, T. G. Brooke, and W. A. Sinclair, Messrs. E. Rosevear, J. C. Stephens, J. B. Shacklock, and T. E. Corkill.

  The Committee to report each year to the Conference.
- 4. That the Editor for this year be the Rev. T. G. Brooke.
- 5. That the Committee and Editor be elected at each Annual Conference.
- 6. That the Dunedin Committee be empowered to release Messrs. McKee and Co. from their engagement to publish the "Advocate" at a date to be fixed by them, and in such a manner as to protect our Church and subscribers who may have paid their subscriptions in advance.
- 7. That the thanks of the Conference be accorded to the Editor (Rev. W. C. Oliver) for his services during the past year, and that an honorarium of £25 be voted to him from the Contingent Fund.
- That the thanks of the Conference be given to the Rev. A. C. Lawry for his services curing the past year.
- That the thanks of the Conference be given to the Wellington Committee for their services during the past year.
- 10. That Superintendents be directed to arge the claims of the "Outlook" in their pastoral visitations and in other ways.
- That the questions regarding our Connexional paper asked in Quarterly Meetings and Synods be retained, with the required alteration from Advocate to Outlook.

## RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the Report be adopted.
- That the Conference urge upon all Superintendents the necessity of organising societies as opportunity is afforded, so that our young people may have the advantage of instruction in Temperance principles in connection with our own Church.
- That all Superintendents of Circuits be required to furnish returns to
  District Secretaries under the following heads:—Number of Connexional Bands of Hope and members of same, and number of
  Sunday School scholars who are members of non-Connexional Bands
  of Hope.
- That Conference directs that on the last Sunday in November sermons be preached in all our Churches on the subject of Temperance.
- 5. That the very best thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. T. G. Brooke for his services as Secretary of the Temperance Committee, and that he be reappointed.
- 6. That in the opinion of this Conference it is desirable to form a Wesleyan Methodist Temperance Society for the Colony, with branches in all Circuit and Home Mission Stations, and that a Committee be appointed to consider the details of such a scheme, and to report to next Conference.
- That the Committee be the Revs. Lewis and Brooke (convener), with Messrs. Rosevear and Dowland
- 8. This Conference respectfully protes a against any attempt to legalise the sale of alcoholic drink in the King Country, believing that such a step would be seriously detrimental to the welfare of the Native Race.
- 9. It further protests against any attempt to deprive the people of this colony of any of the power they now possess for dealing with the liquor traffic, and it hereby expresses its protest in the form of a petition to Parliament.
- Wanganui, Wellington, Nelson, Canterbury, and Otago Syncds protested against any alteration in the Licensing Laws, and signed petitions against introducing Liquor Licenses into the King Country.
- 11. This Conference urges the Government to take the proper steps to stop the scandalous "sly-grog" selling in the King Country, which illicit sale was proved by the evidence given before a Committee of Representatives last session.

# Question XIX. - What is there to Report on Early Church Records?

ANSWER:

The Rev. H. Bull presented a statement, and it was resolved :-

- 1. The Conference has learned with great pleasure of the completion by Dr. Morley of the "History of Methodism in New Zealand," the Conference thanks Dr. Morley for his painstaking and able editorship of this most excellent work. It commends the volume to the favour of Methodist readers, and trust it will have a wide circulation in the homes of the people.
- That the Revs. Dr. Morley and H. Bull be the Committee on Early Church Records.

# Question XX.—What are the Recommendations of District Synods on Matters Remitted by the Conference?

#### ANSWER:

1 St. Asaph Street.—(1). The Conference approves of the arrangement whereby the St. Asaph Street and Lower High Street congregations worship in the Lower High Street, Christchurch. The St. Asaph Street Trustees to pay £45 as rent from interest on money held; (2). The Finance Committee to aid in meeting the interest on the Church debt, and to be responsible for lighting, cleaning, insurance, and repairs; (3). This arrangement to continue until the way is open for further extention.

2. General Church Extention.—(1). The Report of the Committee was read and adopted; (2). That a Special Sub-committee be appointed by the Home Mission Executive to watch the advance of settlement in New Districts, and to take the best means of providing them with religious ordinances; (3). The Home Mission Committee

to report on the subject next year.

3. Church Extention in Wellington.—(1). The Report of this Committee was read and adopted; (2). It was resolved to further remit the matter to a Committee to sit during the year to consider the whole subject, and report to the Conference of 1902; (3.) The following to be the Committee:—The Ministers of the Wellington Circuits, with Messrs. Moxham, Benbow, Tiller, McIntosh, Field, Brittain, Salkeld, Norbury, the President of the Conference, and Rev. Dr. Morley.

# Question XXI. — What is the Resolution of the Conference on the State of the Work of God?

# For General Returns see Appendix H.

The Conference having carefully reviewed the work of God during the past year, feels that the decrease of 172 Church Members, of 596 Sunday School Scholars, and of 676 attendants on public worship, calls for heart searching self examination. At the same time the increase of 355 Church Members among our Sunday School Scholars is an encouraging evidence of the vitality of the work being done in that sphere of Christian effort. The gracious revivals of religion in some of our circuits proves that the God of our fathers is still with us, and the fruitfulness of the Maori Mission as shown by the increase of 104 members, and the fact that the last seven years show an increase of 100 per cent. of Church Members in that Mission calls for devout gratitude to God. In going forward to the duties of another connexional year, the Conference, while depending on the power of the Holy Spirit, recognises among the conditions of success the need of clearly enforcing those essential truths that have been the strength of Methodism, an expansion of city Mission effort and out door preaching, a diligent improvement of the class meeting and other social means of grace, close dealing with individual cases, greater attention to the children, and above all, unreserved personal consecration to God.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE.

### COUNTING QUARTERLY MEETING VOTES.

That in the counting of those present in Quarterly Meetings for the purpose of determining whether there be an absolute or a two-thirds majority, as the case may be, on an invitation, the minister concerned, if he desire it, be not counted.

#### SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

That the General Conference be recommended to consider what steps should be taken to increase the capital of the Supernumerary Fund, so as to make more adequate provision for our supernumerary preachers and preachers' widows.

#### ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

That the constitution of the annual Conference be so amended by the General Conference as to allow laymen equal rights and privileges with ministers on all questions except those of a ministerial character.

#### CHURCH MEMBERSHIP.

- 1. That paragraph 2, Book of Laws, be amended by the substitution of the words "earnestly recommended" for the word "required," and that reference be also made to the observance of the Lord's Supper, the entire paragraph to read as follows:—"The members of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church have their names inserted on the Church roll. They are expected to participate in the celebration of the Lord's Supper, in obedience to Christ's command. They are also earnestly recommended to meet in class."
- That the several paragraphs in the Book of Laws relating to Church membership be amended in harmony with the above recommendation.
- 3. That Class Leaders be elected or re-elected annually.

#### MIXED DISTRICT SYNOD.

That the General Conference revise the regulations relating to the Mixed District Synod, so that the words "has broken any of the rules above mentioned" (twice) shall be deleted, and the following be put in their place: "has failed to observe or administer the discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church."

### NOMINATION OF PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY.

That the present law be revised so as to allow of the President and Secretary of an Annual Conference being elected by the Conference preceding.

### RIGHTS OF LAYMEN.

- That in order to allow Lay Representatives a seat at the first Meeting of the Stationing Committee, they, as at present, be elected at the opening session of the Conference and the first Meeting of the Committee to be held on the morning of the second day.
- 2. That the 1st Reading of the Stations be given on the evening of the second day.
- 3. That the Lay Representatives to Conference be permitted to exercise their vote on each draft of the Stations.

# ADJOURNMENT OF QUARTERLY MEETING.

That the Connexional law preventing the adjournment of Quarterly Meetings be rescinded.

#### DIRECT REPRESENTATION IN THE QUARTERLY MEETING.

That the constitution of the Quarterly Meeting be so amended as to provide for an equitable proportion of its members being annually elected by the members of the Church.

#### INVITATION TO MINISTERS.

That the invitation to Ministers be given at the December Quarterly Meeting, instead of September.

#### CONNEXIONAL PRIMER.

That the General Conference cause to be prepared a Shorter Catechism or Primer, which can be placed in the hands of our young people on the History, Doctrines, and Polity of the Methodist Church.

#### LOCAL PREACHERS' MEETING.

That when several adjoining Circuits are comprised within a convenient area, it shall be legal for all, or any, of them to hold a United Local Preachers' Meeting. The option of meeting unitedly or seperately to be left to the Local Preachers' Meeting concerned. The Superintendent of the Circuit in which such meeting is held to be its Chairman.

#### SACRAMENTS ADMINISTERED BY HOME MISSIONARIES.

That Chairmen of Districts shall have discretionary power to allow Home Missionaries under their charge to administer the Sacraments of the Lord's Supper and Baptism.

#### DEACONESSES.

That Conference be recommended to recognise an order of Deaconesses, that their names appear on the Conference Minutes, and that they have a seat on the Quarterly Meeting of the Circuit in which they are employed. Also, that there be some uniform method of admission, and that they be publicly ordained to their work.

#### ALTERATION OF RULE.

That the General Conference be recommended to alter Rule 258, Book of Laws p 62, so as to add after the words "President's List of Reserve"—
(a) To be appointed to a Circuit; (b) to be admitted to the Theological Institution.

#### NEW HYMN BOOK.

That the General Conference be recommended to take steps for the publication of a Hymn Book better suited to the needs of our Churches than the one at present in use, by arrangement with the Wesleyan Book Room in London, or by the compilation of a new collection as may be most expedient.

### VACANCIES BETWEEN GENERAL CONFERENCE.

That the provision already made for filling a vacancy in the Secretaryship of Foreign Missions (see Books of Laws as amended by General Conference of 1897, and p. 7 of Pamphlet) shall also apply to any vacancy in the Managing Treasurership of the Supernumerary and Ministers' Widow's Fund which may occur in the interval between the meetings of the General Conference.

### VISIT OF THE REV. H. P. HUGHES, M.A.

- That a cordial invitation be given to the Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, M.A., to visit the colonies comprised in the Conferences of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church, for the purpose of preaching and conducting evangelistic services.
- That the General Conference be recommended to arrange an itinerary for Mr. Hughes's visit, and to arrange that such visit extend over a period of at least six months.

# Question XXIV.—When and Where shall our next Conference be held?

Answer:—In Trinity Church, Dunedin, as near as possible to the 1st of March, 1902, the President to fix the exact date.

The Rev. W. J. Williams is also appointed representative to the British and Irish Conferences, and accredited representative to the Free Methodist Assembly and the Bible Christian Conference.

W. S. Allen, Esq., M.A. is appointed Lay representative to the British Conference.

# REV. W. B. MARTEN.

The Rev. W. B. Marten requested permission to rest and visit England during 1902, and the Conference cordially recommended the request to the favourable consideration of the Conference of 1902.

#### MINISTERS' STIPENDS.

That the office-bearers and members of our Churches be affectionately and earnestly urged to do their utmost to so organise the finance of the Circuits that the ministers in the poorer Circuits may be more adequately supported, and that they may thus be enabled to do their work more efficiently.

#### METHODIST UNION.

- 1. That in view of the arrangements made for effecting Methodist union in all the other colonies of the Australasian group in 1902, and the desirability of it in New Zealand, communications be opened up with the President and executive of the Primitive Methodist Conference of New Zealand for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Primitive Methodist Church in this colony is now prepared to accept the basis of union adopted by the General Conference and accepted by the Primitive Methodists in the colonies of Australia, and so bring about complete union in the colony, and the establishment of one Methodist Church throughout Australasia.
- 2. The Rev. J. J. Lewis prepared the communication of the above to the Primitive Methodist Church, and the following committee is appointed to conduct any further negotiations during the year, and report to the Conference of 1902:—Committee—The President and Secretary of Conference, the Superintendents of the Grafton Road, North Shore, and Freeman's Bay Circuits, the Revs. J. H. Simmonds and W. Ready, with Messrs. Caughey, G. A. Buttle, T. Allen, S. Parker, and J. Edson. Rev. W. Ready, Convener.

#### LORD'S DAY OBSERVANCE.

- That a strong protest against the prevailing public desecration of the Lord's Day on our railways and against recent glaring instances in connection with the visit of Imperial and Indian troops be sent from this Conference to the Minister of Railways and the Defence Minister, and that the Revs. Lewis and Dewsbury be asked to draft the protest.
- 2. The Conference having learned that the Imperial troops were conducted by certain Cabinet Ministers by a Sunday excursion train from Auckland to Rotorua, that the Indian troops were brought overland by a special train on the Sunday, and that goods trains are frequently run on Sundays, passes the following resolution:—The Conference protests against such desecration of the Lord's Day as being a breach of the Divine law, and an affront to the most sacred convictions of the community, while even on humanitarian grounds it is unjust as depriving hard worked labourers of their day of rest, and directs that a copy of this protest be sent to the Honourable the Minister of Railways and the Defence Minister.

### ORDER OF SESSIONS.

That in order to prevent the waste of time and money to which laymen attending Conference are subjected, a committee be appointed to consider whether the ministers could not meet three days prior to the opening of Conference, and so far despatch the business of the Pastoral Sessions, in a committee of the whole, that the greater part of that business could be formally ratified, without further discussion, in the Pastoral Sessions of the Conference. The committee to consist of the Chairman of Districts, with the Secretary of the Conference, who shall be the convener.

#### NEXT CONFERENCE PLAN.

That the Superintendent of the Circuit in which the Conference of 1902 is appointed to be held be directed to make arrangements on the Conference Plan for holding public meetings on behalf of both the Home and Foreign Missions of the Church, and that the President of the Conference be requested to ensure that three evenings be left free for the transaction of Conference business.

#### METHODIST COUNCILS.

Conference recommends that Methodist Councils be established in the principal cities and suburbs thereof, with a view to taking up new causes, and otherwise for the extension of Methodism.

#### AUDIT OF CIRCUIT ACCOUNTS.

That the Conference insist on the accounts of the Circuit being audited annually. The Quarterly Meetings to appoint their own auditors.

#### LOCAL PREACHERS' EXAMINATIONS.

That the matter of Local Preachers' Examinations be remitted to the Annual Synods of 1901, and that Local Preachers' Meetings be invited to send recommendations from the September Meetings to their respective Synods. And the Synods send their findings to a Committee consisting of the Superintendents of the Dunedin Circuits, together with an equal number of local preachers chosen by the united Local Preachers' Meeting of Dunedin in September.

That such Committee prepare from the findings of the Synods a report with recommendations to the Conference of 1902.

That the Conference expresses its pleasure at hearing of the formation of the Methodist Local Preachers' Association of New Zealand, and that in accordance with the practice of British and Victorian Wesleyan Conferences, we recommend that in the neighbourhoods where the Annual Councils are held, the pulpits of our churches be opened to the visiting delegates on the Lord's Day, and collections be taken up in aid of the Association Funds; also that an Annual Public Meeting be held in the principal church of the neighbourhood, and a collection made in aid of the funds.

#### BIBLE IN SCHOOLS.

The Churches of New Zealand having by a remarkable consensus of opinion supported the movement in favour of daily Bible reading with the Lord's Prayer, and a conscience clause in the Government schools, the Conference believes that the time has come to afford the general public such an opportunity of giving expression to their wish on the subject, as shall ensure the Legislature giving effect to what is sought. The members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church are therefore recommended to support the introduction into Parliament of a Bill to decide by the Referendum whether it is the will of the people of this Colony to give the Word of God its right place in the Government day schools.

# REV. H. P. HUGHES, M.A.

 That a cordial invitation be given to Rev. H. P. Hughes, "M.A. to visit the Colonies, comprised in the Conferences of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church, for the purpose of preaching and conducting Evangelistic Services.

That the General Conference be recommended to arrange an itenerary for Mr. Hughes' visit, and also that such visit extend over a period

of at least six months.

That the following Committee be appointed to co-operate with those
in other Colonies, and to take any steps necessary to carry it out.
The President and Secretary of the Conference, Rev. W. Morley,
D.D., Messrs. G. H. Blackwell, and S. Coverdale.

#### SPECIAL EVANGELISTS.

- A letter from Rev. G. E. Rowe, Westralia, was read, recommending Sister Eleanor and Miss Leyton for employment in New Zealand as Special Evangelists.
- The following Committee was appointed to conduct any further negotiations, and if necessary arrange an itinerary for these ladies:—
  The Superintendents of the four Dunedin Circuits, with Messrs.
  Rosevear, Corkill, Shacklock and Bagshaw. E. Rosevear, Convener.

# ADDITIONAL MAORI AGENTS.

- The Conference having heard the £200 for the additional Missionary to the Maoris is guaranteed, recommended the Pastoral Session to appoint Rev. D. Weatherall this year to the Maori work, and send a suitable Supply to Waihi.
- That the Chairmen of the Wanganui, Wellington, Nelson, Canterbury and Otago Districts co-operate with the Revs. W. Gittos and W. Ready in securing the balance required for the support of the assistant to Mr. Gittos, and that donors be urged to make their donations annual.

#### CHURCH SITES.

That the Conference respectfully requests the Government in connection with the land held on perpetual lease under village settlement conditions to legislate and make provision for the sale of sites for churches as may be required.

#### CHURCH SITES IN MINING DISTRICTS.

That the C.B. and L. Fund Committee be requested to take into special consideration the possibility of securing provision under the Mining Act whereby Church sites in the Mining Districts may be secured to the Connexion rent free, and request Messrs. T. Buddle and J. A. Miller to co-operate with the C.B. and L. Fund Committee on this matter.

#### GAMBLING.

That in view of the great and growing evil of Gambling all our people be urged to discountenance the practice by every means in their power, and that the Government be requested to introduce a Bill making the Totalisator illegal, and that all our Ministers be directed to preach on the subject of Gambling on one Sunday of each year.

#### MEDICAL BOARD.

Drs. Parkes and McDowell, of Auckland, are appointed a Medical Board, in accordance with General Conference Regulations.

#### CONNEXIONAL LEGACIES AND ENDOWMENTS.

That the Treasurers or Trustees of all Legacies and Endowments, held for or on behalf of the Church, lay upon the Table of the Conference on the first day of the Session of 1901 a Statement of the Investments or Properties then held on behalf of the said Trusts, and that this be reported to the Conference, and that, in future Conferences, on the first day of each Session, a Statement be furnished, showing any change in such investments, and that an entry of such properties or investments, or the changes, be made yearly in the journal.

#### AGENDA BOOK.

- 1. That with a view to placing necessary information before members of future Conferences, and saving time when in Session, it is desirable that an Agenda Book be prepared, to contain Balance Sheets of Connexional Properties, of Connexional Conference Funds, and Reports of the same; also Tables of Statistics, Reports of Special Committees, and such other items as may be necessary to facilitate the business of the Conference.
- 2. That the following Committee be appointed to prepare and issue the Agenda Book, and supply the same to the Members of the Conference at 2s. each:—The Secretary of the Conference with Rev. T. G. Brooke and Mr. E. Rosevear (convener).

### ELECTION OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEES.

That the President and Secretary of the Conference, with two Ministers and two Laymen, to be appointed by the President, such Ministers and Laymen being members of the next Conference, be a Committee to nominate the several members of the Conference Committees, and to make the necessary arrangements for holding meetings of the same prior to the assembling of the Conference.

#### LAY REPRESENTATION ON COMMITTEES.

That in connection with all standing Connexional Committees, it be a regulation of Conference making it obligatory that not less than one of the lay members retire annually from leach Committee having less than eight lay members and not less than two from each Committee having eight or more lay members, the retiring member or members to be ineligible for re-election for at least one year.

#### APPOINTMENT OF HOME MISSIONARIES.

- That in the interim of Conferences the calling into the work and appointment of Home Missionaries be subject to the approval of the President.
- 2. To clear the way for a consistent Rule with regard to the employment of Home Missionaries, it is recommended that Rule 16, sub-section 1, Resolution 15 of Conference, 1898. (Minutes, p. 47), and Resolution of Conference, 1899 (Minntes, p. 77), be rescinded. It is further recommended that the following be adopted as a Rule:—"When Local Preachers are paid by this Fund, or by Circuits or Home Mission Stations, they shall be known as Home Missionaries. No Circuit or Home Mission Station shall employ any additional paid agent during the interval of Conferences without the approval of the Chairman of the District within which such Circuit or Home Mission Station is situated, and the Executive Committee; and no new Home Mission Station shall be constituted during the interval of Conferences without their approval. This Committee shall also consider the credentials of all applicants for Home Mission Work, and decide as to their employment."

REPORT OF THE GENERAL TREASURERS

#### REPORT OF THE GENERAL TREASURERS OF THE SUPERNUMERARY MINISTERS' AND MINISTERS' WIDOWS' FUND

For the Year ending 31st December, 1900.

In accordance with Rule 9 of this Fund, the General Conference Treasurers present to the Victoria and Tasmania Conference the following as their Report for the year ending 31st December, 1900:—

- 1. The books and accounts have been duly audited. The Deeds have been inspected and compared with the Mortgages. The Abstract of Receipts and Expenditure, Revenue Account, and Balance-sheet, signed by the Auditors, are appended hereto.
- 2. The number of Supernumeraries on the 31st December, 1900, was 68; Widows, 84.
- 3. The sum of £3631 15s. 10d. was received during the year for the purchase of benefits in the Fund from those who

were Bible Christian Ministers, but are now members of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church, connected with the South Australia Conference in consequence of Methodist Union.

- 4. Owing to the great difficulty in obtaining suitable freehold properties on which to effect loans on mortgage, the Treasurers have during the year invested £7573 6s. 10d. in Victorian Government Stocks, and £2057 19s. 8d. in Metropolitan Board of Works Debentures.
- The properties in possession would have returned more net income, but for heavy expenditure which has had to be incurred in sewerage and general repairs.
- 6. After carefully considering the properties in possession, the Board of Treasurers have decided to write back to capital the sum of £4000 from the Reserve Fund, which provided for losses. The properties sold during the year were up to their values, as written down by the Treasurers.
- 7. Mr. Graham, F.I.A., F.F.A., has not yet completed his valuation report, &c. As soon as it is received it will be printed, and with any resolutions of the Board of Treasurers, will be forwarded to all members of the Annual Conferences.
- 8. In view of the importance of the Special Report which the Treasurers must send to the next General Conference, they suggest that each Annual Conference of 1901 appoint a Committee, by which the Special Report of the Treasurers shall be considered prior to the meeting of the next General Conference,
- The rules of the Conference require that two of the Board of Treasurers shall retire at each General Conference.

The Rev. W. Williams, F.L.S., and Mr. James Callaghan have to retire. The Treasurers nominate the Rev. James A. Marsland and Mr. Thomas Lockwood to succeed those gentlemen on the Board of Treasurers.

10. The Treasurers nominate Mr. W. A. Mewton, F.I.A.V., and Mr. H. G. M'Cutcheon, A.I.V.A., as Auditors.
