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

William Lee David McNicoll John Dawson James G. Chapman

- William Lee .- Full of years and honours, the Rev. William Lee passed peacefully away on November 12th, 1925, in his 85th year. Born at Stokesley, Yorkshire, in 1840, he early gave his heart to God, and in 1864 was sent to New Zealand as a Probationer, and next year commenced what proved to be a singularly acceptable ministry of 43 years, exercised in many of our best Circuits. A typical Yorkshireman, shrewd, outspoken and of an attractive personality, and with great power of friendship, Mr. Lee also displayed great administrative gifts, in many important Connexional positions. As soon as he was eligible, viz., in 1880, he was elected President of the Conference, and the following year he was called to act for a second term owing to the lamented death of his successor, Rev. J. B. Richardson, in the Tararua disaster of May, 1881. As Chairman of District for many years, Secretary of Conference and other offices, he rendered conspicuous service. As Supernumerary he continued to serve as preacher and pastor as opportunity was given, and the robust health which he always enjoyed was maintained until three years before his death.
- David McNicoll.-After a faithful and fruitful ministry of 41 years, followed by 16 years as a Supernumerary, Rev. David McNicoll, an Ex-President of the Conference, and greatly beloved of all who knew him, fell on sleep on Sunday, June 7th, 1925, in his 82nd year. Born in Southport, England, in 1843, he bore an honoured name, his grandfather being a prominent minister of the Wesleyan Methodist Conference. He came to New Zealand as a youth of 18, and together with his friend and fellow student, Henry Bull, commenced his probation in 1868, and was ordained in 1872. During more than four decades he exercised a bright and acceptable ministry in representative Circuits, seeing much fruit of his labours and endearing himself to his people. He became President of the Conference in 1894. Of independent mind and strong convictions, he was a fearless enemy of the liquor traffic and gambling. Yet in him a vivacious and fun loving disposition was beautifully blended with deep spirituality and evangelical fervour. For many years he lived and preached the higher life, and amid many trials and infirmities found the "Joy of the Lord" his strength. He lived and died a saintly man, and now rests from his labours and his works do follow him.
- John Dawson.—John Dawson was born at Keighley, Yorkshire, on June 4th, 1859 Being early left fatherless, he soon went forth to work. His character was moulded by his connection with the Primitive Methodist Church and Sunday School of his native town. At 17 years of age he became a local preacher, and at 21 years an evangelist. God used him in leading numbers of men to the Saviour. He afterwards became a married student in Gratton Guinness' Missionary Institute, now known as Cliff College, Calver, Derbyshire. In 1888, under the direction of the

Primitive Methodist Conference, he came as a married Probationer to New Zealand. He was stationed in the following Circuits: Thames, Christchurch (Cambridge Terrace), and Wellington (Webb Street). In 1909 he succeeded Rev. F. W. Isitt as General Secretary for the N.Z. Alliance, a position he occupied until his death. As a preacher, John Dawson was evangelical; his sermons were practical and devotional. As a pastor, he was greatly loved and trusted as one of God's good men He was a watchful shepherd, and had a deep sense of the great responsibility of being a minister of Jesus Christ. His unique work as Organiser for the N.Z. Alliance for more than sixteen years was most valuable, and did much to advance the cause of Prohibition in the Dominion. He was kindly, tactful, genial, sanguine and spiritual. He followed in his Master's footsteps, and "went about doing good."

James Gates Chapman .- In the dying hours of 1925, with little premonition, the call to higher service came to the Rev. James Gates Chapman, thereby removing from our ranks a brother highly respected and deeply beloved by the whole Church. He was born in the City of London, 62 years ago. As a young man New Zealand presented claims as a sphere of usefulness, which were not to be denied, and in 1889 he began a richly fruitful ministry in the land of his adoption. It soon became evident that Mr. Chapman possessed rare gifts and outstanding ability as a preacher, and consequently he was appointed to represent the Church in some of our most important Circuits. Mr. Chapman was a keen student, a voracious reader, an original thinker, a prince of preachers and a capable administrator of our Church. He was the soul of honour, every inch a gentleman, and in him courtesy and brotherly kindness were developed to a degree. It was generally recognised that he was specially endowed to grace the highest office of the Church, but place and position held no attraction for him, and he gracefully discouraged all such honours. Owing to ill-health, he became a Supernumerary in 1920, but though released from the responsibility of Circuit work, he continued to preach with great acceptance in all the evangelical churches of Wellington City and suburbs. At his request, and in harmony with his life, the last rites were of a most simple and unostentatious character. He leaves behind a fragrant memory.

William Ready.—This Conference, having heard the request of the Rev. William Ready to be made a Supernumerary, agrees regretfully to grant it. It places on record its grateful recognition of the valuable services he has rendered to the Church during a conspicuous ministry of 41 years. His popular gifts have won for him an enthusiastic reception in most of our chief Circuits. He has been singularly faithful and fearless, always a champion of the highest interests of mankind, he has devoted himself with rare zeal to religious, social and philanthropic movements, and his delight has ever been to enrich character and to contribute to the betterment of the community at large. In 1912, the Conference conferred upon him its chief distinction in electing him to the Presidency. We recall with pride that he founded the Dunedin Central Mission, and made it one of the most effective spiritual agencies in the Dominion.

James R. Clark.—James Richard Clark was several years employed as a Home Missionary, and in the year 1900 was accepted as a candidate for the ministry. In several Circuits he rendered valuable service as a minister of the Church. In 1922 he suffered a serious breakdown of health, and in the following year was made a Supernumerary for one year. Unfortunately, there has not been an improvement in health, and he carries with him in his retirement the love and the sympathy of the Church, with the prayer that he may have a quiet and blessed eventide.

II.—EXAMINATION COMMITTEE.

- The Examination Committee shall consist of the President, Presidentelect, and the Secretary of the Conference, the Chairmen of Districts, such Members of the Board of Examiners as may be attending Conference, and ten other Ministers, who shall be chosen by the President from those attending Conference.
- 2. The Committee shall sit on the day prior to the meeting of the Conference.
- 3. The Committee shall receive all reports, including all individual reports from Examiners, concerning Probationers, Students, and Candidates, conduct the oral examinations, and make recommendations to the Conference in each case.
- 4. The Ministers of the City Circuits where Conference is to be held shall be the Committee to make arrangements for the hearing of Candidates' trial sermons. Each Committee appointed to hear a trial sermon shall include at least one member of the Examination Committee, who shall present the report to the Examination Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Secretary of the Board of Examiners shall be as follow:—(a) To collate the reports on the Probationers', Students', Candidates', and Home Missionaries' examinations; to assess the Probationers' book lists and the Candidates' written sermons; to receive all communications from Probationers and Home Missionaries with regard to their examinations; to receive all papers from examiners, arrange for their typing and forwarding to the Chairmen of Districts, and to prepare a general report on the examinations for the Examination Committee. To supply Probationers, Students, Candidates and Home Missionary Probationers with a code word to be used instead of their names in their answers to questions; to receive from Supervisors' papers taken by the Examinees, with the Examinees' answers thereon, and transmit them to the individual Examiners' (b) To act as Convener of the Examination Committee, keep a record of its proceedings, and present its findings to the Conference; (c) To act generally as executive officer of the Board of Examiners during the year, in consultation with the President of the Conference.

6. The Committee shall keep a careful record of its proceedings, which shall be confirmed at the close thereof, and signed by the President. The Committee shall have power to advise and admonish Probationers as to their studies and Circuit work, but should any serious case arise they shall report it to the Committee of Complaints and Appeals, which Committee shall have the right to call for the records of the Examination Committee, should they be needed in any inquiry upon which they may be engaged.

III.-EXAMINATIONS.

- The time allowed for each examination paper shall be three hours in all cases, except that in the Examination of Candidates for the Ministry, the time for papers in Geography, History and Science shall be two hours each.
 - The questions for Probationers shall be so arranged as to require a knowledge of all the work prescribed in the syllabus in any given subject, and in no case shall any special parts be notified.
 - All Examination Papers, with the exception of Hebrew, shall be type--written.
 - 4. The Examination of Probationers shall be taken in two sections, the first section in the last week in July, and the second section in the first week in December (see Regulation 3, Course of Study, as to order of subjects).
- 5. Probationers must themselves communicate with the Secretary of the Board of Examiners not later than April 30th, for the first section, and September 30th for the second section, stating the subjects allocated to each section in which they are preparing to be examined. The Secretary shall report to the Board the names of all Probationers who fail to comply with this regulation. The regulation does not apply to Students who are called out after May 31st, so far as the first section examination is concerned.
- 6. Where a Probationer fails from any cause to take a subject which he has notified the Secretary of the Board it was his intention to take, he shall, as soon as possible, notify the Secretary of the fact.
- 7. The Examination of Candidates for the Ministry shall be held in the third week in September, and the results, together with the report of the Medical Examination, reported to the Synods concerned, and the Examination of Students on the President's List of Reserve and of Home Missionaries shall be held in the first week in December. In the case of candidates recommended by the Synods, the reports of the Medical Examination are to be sent by Chairmen of Districts to the Connexional Secretary.
- 8. The subjects for examination in the case of Probationers shall be taken in the order of each section as prescribed by the regulations, and in all other cases in the order in which they appear in the Minutes of Conference. Examinees are in no case to put their names on their answers to questions, but to use the code word supplied by the Secretary of the Board of Examiners.
- 29. Examiners shall send to the Secretary of the Board, in closed envelopes, copies of all Examination Papers, except those set for Students and Students on the President's List of Reserve, which shall be sent to the Principal of the College.

- 10. Each Chairman is required to make arrangements for securing the strict supervision, according to instructions supplied by the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, of all examinations to be held in the District, the Supervisors to be, if possible, Ministers of our own Church, who shall certify that the papers have been duly supervised, and transmit the answers to questions to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, who shall forward them to the individual Examiners. The Secretary of the Board of Examiners shall provide a list of instructions and forward them through the Chairman, to Supervisors for their guidance.
- 11. Each Examiner shall, without delay, after receipt of the papers to be examined by him, notify the Secretary of the Board the marks awarded for such papers, and shall, not later than October 21st, in the case of the Probationers' first section examination and the Candidates' examination, and January 10th in all other cases, send to the Secretary of the Board a written report of such papers; such written report, in the case of Candidates only, to be sent to the Conference for reference.
- 12. The Chairman of the Foreign Mission District shall report to the Examination Committee, through the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, on the progress made in the acquisition of the native language, and on their general studies, by the Probationers who are in their first year on the Mission Field.

13. The first two years of probation in the case of men designated for Foreign Mission work, except in special cases, shall be spent in

the Home work.

- 14. The Secretary shall communicate to the Synods concerned the Report for the ensuing Conference, which shall prepare a General case of the Fourth Year Probationers, a summary of the results obtained in the four yearly examinations.
- 15. That part of the Secretary's Report which consists of a tabular statement of the marks gained in the several subjects by Probationers, Students, and Candidates, shall be printed on a separate paper for the use of the Conference, and shall afterwards be entered in the Conference Journal.
- N.B.—The first section of the Probationers' Examination shall, this year, commence on Tuesday, July 27th, and the second section on Tuesday, December 7th. The Examination of Candidates for the Ministry shall commence on Tuesday, September 14th, and of Home Missionary Probationers on December 7th.

REGULATIONS.

 The minimum number of marks required for a pass in any subject shall be 50 per cent.

- 2. Any Probationer who gains an average of 80 per cent. of marks in six, or an average of 75 per cent. in seven or more subjects, will be mentioned in the Minutes of the Conference as having passed with Honours, provided he pass in Greek.
- 3. Except as hereinafter provided, Probationers shall be examined in at least six subjects, and pass in not less than five. Probationers least six subjects, and pass in not less than five. Probationers who sit for English subjects only must take 3, 4, 5, 6, 9, and one other, for the first year, and 3, 4, 5, 6, and two others, for each subsequent year. Probationers sitting for Hebrew and Greek must take and pass in Nos. 5 and 6 in addition. Probationers sitting for Greek, and not Hebrew, must take and pass in Old Testament English and Nos. 5 and 6. Probationers sitting for neither Greek nor Hebrew must take and pass in Old Testament English and New Testament English. In the case of Probationers who have been designated for Missions the Board of Examiners may substitute two specific Missionary subjects for two non-compulsory subjects in each year of probation,

provided that the substituted subjects shall be mutually agreed upon by the Mission Board and the Board of Examiners.

- 4 Probationers accepted for Foreign Mission work shall not marry without the permission of the Board of Missions.
- 5. The subjects for the July examination shall be Nos. 1, 3, 5 and 6, and for the December examination Nos. 2, 4, 7, 8 and 9. Of these subjects three only shall be taken in the July examination, and the remainder required to comply with regulation 3 in the December examination; providing that a Probationer failing in one subject, in the July examination, may present, in the December examination, that subject in which he has failed.
- 6. The Conference requires every Probationer who is acquainted with Greek or Hebrew to take the Greek or Hebrew papers specified in the list of subjects for his year.
- 7. Probationers are reminded that the Greek Testament is a compulsory subject through the whole course for those who have passed through College, and that they must secure a pass therein. The examination papers in Greek shall be divided into two parts: Section A to deal with Greek Text, Grammar, and Composition (maximum marks 50; Section B to deal with Exegesis and General Knowledge of the book (maximum marks 50). Those who have not passed through the College shall take, in their first year Num's Elements of New Testament Greek, pp. 1 to 64, in their second year, p. 64 to the end; in their third year, a review of the whole book; and in their fourth year the Greek Testament as prescribed. This elementary Greek does not exempt from taking the New Testament in English, but it will count as one of the subjects required to be taken.
- 8. Probationers who have not been in the College, are urged to study Hebrew, for which purpose a special curriculum has been provided as follows:—First year, Green's Handbook, pp. 1 to 91; second year, Green's Handbook, pp. 91 to 146.
- 9. When a Probationer desires to secure exemption from some of his subjects of examination in order to take University work, such exemption shall not be granted in the 4th year, nor for more than two years altogether. Exemptions shall be made by the Board of Examiners, through its Secretary.

- 10. In all cases where "University work" is being done in lieu of regular subjects, Probationers are required to sit for the University and College examinations involved, and a statement of subjects taken, work done, and success gained shall be obtained by them from their tutors or some University authority, and sent on by them to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners
- 11. In the case of a Probationer who may desire to sit for the B.D. Examination, and who can satisfy the Board of Examiners that he has a reasonable prospect of gaining the B.D. degree, it shall be sufficient for him to be examined and to pass in No. 5 only.

LATIN.

In addition to the subjects required as above, there shall be a course in Latin, special credit to be given to those Probationers who gain above 70 per cent. of marks in this subject. This subject, it is to be noted, is an additional one, and must not be taken in place of one of the subjects set in the Course of Study. The books set for 1926 are as follows:—

In the Third year, a brief Course of Lectures will be given in Circuit and Sunday School Organisation, Pastoral Efficiency, and Methodist Law as related thereto.

2. REGULATIONS.

- 1. The College terms shall coincide with the terms of the Auckland University College, except that the first term shall commence on the third Monday in March. Students are expected to enter during the week previous.
- Students shall go out of residence at the College during the vacations.
- 3. The Curriculum shall be arranged on a basis of a Three Years' Course of training, and only in the case of the most extreme necessity shall a Student be called out for Circuit work before the expiration of this term.
- 4. During Conference no Student who has not completed his three years' course shall be removed from the College for employment in Circuit work except by a two-thirds vote of the Stationing Committee and Conference, and no President shall remove a Student during the year, without the recommendation of the Principal of the College. In every case where a Student is called out during the year, the President shall present, in writing, to the following Conference, a full statement of reasons for his action.
- 5. There shall be an examination in each subject at the end of each term, conducted by the Lecturers or Tutors and, in addition, an examination in the last week of November on the whole year's work, conducted by Examiners appointed by Conference, other than the Lecturers or Tutors. The marks from both series of examination shall be reported to Conference, and shall count for all prizes, etc.
- 6. There shall be a Board of Studies, consisting of the Chairman of the District, the Principal and Tutor of the College, the Ministerial Lecturers, and three other persons appointed by such Board. This Board shall decide all adjustments in the Course of Study in accordance with the Regulations of Conference.

- 7. No Student shall enter upon a University Course without the consent of the Board of Studies, nor shall any Student prepare for Matriculation without such consent and without satisfying the Board that he has a reasonable prospect of success within at least two years.
- 8. In the case of a Student pursuing a Pass or Honours Course at the University College, the Board of Studies may make modifications in the College Curriculum, but no Student shall be relieved from taking the full Course in Theology, Bible Exegesis, Homiletics and Greek, unless he is taking the last-named subject at the University Pass or Honours standard.
- 9. All Students who attend University lectures shall sit for the University or University College Examinations in such subjects, and the result shall be reported to Conference. Economics and Mental and Moral Philosophy are compulsory subjects for Students taking a University course, unless for special reasons the Board of Studies permit otherwise.
- 10. The Board of Studies shall determine what Students are to take Hebrew.
- 11. Any Student proposing to offer himself for the Maori work may substitute Maori for one of the subjects set out in the Curriculum. The Board of Studies must first approve of the arrangement, and decide what subject shall be omitted.
- 12. Students on the List of Reserve for admission to the College shall pursue their studies under the direction of the Board of Studies, who shall arrange for suitable examination papers and report thereupon to Conference. They shall also be subject to the regulations governing the preaching of Trial Sermons, and the presenting of Book Lists in the cases of Probationers and Candidates.
- 13. The Principal shall, after laying the results before the Board of Studies, furnish the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, at the earliest possible date, with the complete results of the Student's Examination conducted by the Conference Examiners and the College Lecturers and Tutors.
- 14. Each Student shall preach a trial sermon before one or more of the Ministers of the Auckland City or Suburban Circuits, a written report of which, marked according to the scale appointed by Conference, shall be presented to the Auckland District Ministerial Committee and forwarded to Conference. The Board of Studies shall arrange for these trial sermons.

- 3 Algebra—Easy Examples and Problems, to Simple Equations. (Hall and Knight, chapters i. to xxii.)

REGULATIONS.

- There shall be four Examiners, one for each section of the subjects of A, C, and two for B.
- 2. Examination Papers shall be set as follows:-
 - (a) General Bible Knowledge and Church History
 - (b) Systematic Theology.
 - (c) English Grammar and Composition.
 - (d) Latin.
 - (e) Greek.
 - (f) Hebrew.
 - (g) (1) Geography, (2) History, and (3) Science.
 - (h) Arithmetic.
 - (i) Geometry.
 - (j) Algebra.

Examiners are directed to confer each year, through the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, on the examination papers to be set, with a view to maintaining a suitable and uniform standard.

3. The results for each subject shall be classed in the following manner:—

85 to 100 per cent. of marks: First Class. 70 to 84 per cent. of marks: Second Class. 50 to 69 per cent. of marks: Third Class. Below 50 per cent. of marks: Failure.

- 4. Section A must be taken in all cases. All Candidates who have not passed the Matriculation Examination, except Senior Home Missionaries, must also take English, Geography, History, Science, and Arithmetic. Others including undergraduates and graduates of a Chartered University will be excused from taking any part of Sections B and C.
- 5. Candidates for the Ministry are required to prepare for the Matriculation Examination of the New Zealand University in the literary and mathematical subjects (Greek excepted), and in the event of their sitting, the report of their marks shall be obtained by the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, and reported to the Examination Committee, and they shall be exempted from sitting for the Conference Examination, except in the subjects of Section A.
- Tre Hebrew text-book shall be Sibag's Hebrew Primer and Reading Book, pp. 1-42.
- 7. Each Superintendent Minister is required to notify the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, not later than June 1st, of any Candidate he intends to nominate for the ministry at the June Quarterly Meeting, and in the event of the Candidate being recommended such Superintendent shall report to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners the scholastic status of the Candidate, in order that arrangements may be made for the written examination of such Candidate.

It is the duty of each Superintendent Minister to draw the attention of all intending Candidates in his Circuit to the fact that they are required to apply to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners at the earliest possible moment for information and guidance respecting the Course of Study for Candidates. In the case of Candidates who have not passed the Matriculation Examination, or are not graduates or undergraduates of a University, the preparation should commence at least two years before the date of intending presentation at the Synod. Copies of previous years' papers for Candidates may be had on application to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners.

 The Syllabus and Regulations for Candidates, as above, shall be printed from year to year in the Minutes of Conference.

Senior Home Missionaries and Their Reception as Candidates for the Ministry.

- That save in exceptional circumstances the age limit for Home Missionaries who desire to present themselves as candidates for the Ministry shall be forty years.
- 2. That no Home Missionary shall be received into the Ministry of the Church on the ground of seniority only.
- That sympathetic consideration be given to the application of a Senior Home Missionary to enter the Ministry, but satisfactory proof shall be required of—

- (a) Educational fitness and capacity to study;
- (b) Ability to preach;
- (c) Aptitude in the conduct of Church affairs.
- 4. That the present examinations for candidates for the Ministry provide such an educational test, but in the case of a Home Missionary who has completed 12 years of service as a Home Missionary of our Church, or whose case on other grounds is considered worthy of exceptional treatment, the following subjects now compulsory for non-matriculated candidates, be made optional:—Geography, history, science, and arithmetic. This leaves Bible knowledge, Theology, Church history, and English as compulsory subjects. In all other respects such a Home Missionary coming forward as a candidate must comply with the present regulations.
- 5. That Senior Home Missionaries thus accepted on probation for the Ministry shall be required to pass the usual probationary tests of the Church, except that for the first year of probation they take in the annual examination only Old Testament (English), New Testament (English), Theology, and the set portions of the Methodist Law Book; and for the three following years these three first mentioned subjects, together with one other to be chosen by them from the Course of Study; and also that Greek be made an optional subject throughout the four years.

(N.B.—The Conference has power in exceptional cases to grant exemption, in whole or in part, from these examinations.)

REGULATIONS.

- That all persons accepted for employment in the Home Mission work shall, unless the Conference or the Home Mission Executive at the time of their employment otherwise determine, be regarded as Probationers for the position of Home Missionary, and shall be called Home Missionary Probationers.
- 2. That such Probationers shall continue for three years, during which time they shall annually preach a trial sermon, present a Book List, and take either the examination prescribed by the Conference, or the Correspondence Course for intending Candidates for the ministry, instituted under the direction of the Principal of the Theological College, for which papers shall be set and taken under examination conditions. A report of their work on the station shall also be presented.
- That a list of those passing in each year be recorded in the Minutes, honours being awarded to those gaining an average of 75 per cent.
- 4. Home Missionary Probationers shall not administer the Sacraments, nor perform the Marriage Ceremony without the special permission of the President of the Conference given on the recommendation of the Chairman of the District.
- 5. That, except by a special vote of the Home Mission Board, only those Home Missionary Probationers who have satisfactorily passed the required tests for the three years shall be received into full status, and they shall be formally set apart as Home Missionaries at a service to be arranged and conducted by the Chairman of the District or his Deputy, and shall receive at such service a Certificate of Reception as a Home Missionary of our Church, duly signed by the President of the Conference A suitably inscribed Bible shall also be presented. They shall then have power to administer the Sacraments, and to perform the Marriage Ceremony.
- 6. That each duly admitted Home Missionary shall be a member of the District Synod of the District to which he belongs, but Home Missionary Probationers shall not be eligible for membership in the Synod, but may attend, if invited by the Chairman of the District.

N.B.—For Regulations regarding Trial Sermons and Book Lists see under respective headings.

X .- TRIAL SERMONS.

1. The persons appointed to hear Probationers', Students', Home Missionary Probationers' and Candidates' Trial Sermons shall affix marks to their reports before submitting them to the Synod, using the numerals 1 to 10, 10 to represent the maximum. Reports are to be according to the following directions:—(a) The text and main divisions of the sermon; (b) the judgment of its appointed hearers as to its character in respect of grammar and literary style, soundness of composition, correctness of exegesis, skill in

illustration, logical arrangement, evangelical and spiritual purpose, force and earnestness, effect on the congregation, and as to the gifts of the Candidate in respect of voice, manner, and general appearance; (c) the marks to be awarded for the sermon and service conjointly.

- 2. The Chairman of each District shall forward to the Secretary of the Board a signed official report of the Trial Sermon of each Probationer, Student, Home Missionary Probationer or Candidate examined in his District.
- 3. The Students on the President's List of Reserve shall preach Trial Sermons before sub-committees of the Ministerial Committees of the Districts with which they are connected, for report to the Conference as in the cases of Probationers, Students and Candidates.
- 4. The District Ministerial Committees shall appoint sub-Committees to report on written Sermons, but the Secretary of the Board of Examiners shall assess all such written Sermons, using the numerals 1 to 10, 10 to represent the maximum.
- Maori Candidates and Probationers shall be subject to all the ordinary rules as to Synod and Conference trial sermons. In exceptional cases, the sermons may be in the Maori language.

XI.-BOOK LISTS.

- Each Probationer shall, at least a fortnight before the meeting of Synod, forward to the Chairman a list of the books he has read during the year. The Chairman or a Minister of the District whom he shall appoint shall conduct a general oral examination thereon in the District Ministerial Committee, together with an oral examination in Theology.
- 2. The following text books when not taken for examination are required to be read by Probationers in their respective years:—Radford's "Ancient Heresies in Modern Dress," Mellone and Drummond's "Elements of Psychology," Alexander's "Christian Ethics," Garvie's "The Christian Preacher," and Menzies' "History of Religions." Probationers are also required to read during their probation Macdougall's "Social Psychology," Garvie's "Apologetics" (Duckworth), Peake's "Critical Introduction to the new Testament."
- 3. It shall be compulsory for each Probationer to include in his Book List for each year at least two books from each sub-section of "Theology," at least one book from "Church History and Polity," and at least two books from "Science and Philosophy."
- 4. The Students on the President's List of Reserve shall present book lists to the Ministerial Committees with which they are connected, the Committees reporting to the Conference as in the cases of Probationers. Students and Candidates.
- Candidates for the ministry are required to submit through the District Ministerial Committee a Book List covering their reading during the two years preceding the Synod.
- 6. Home Missionary Probationers are required to present Book Lists to their District Ministerial Committee, and to be examined thereon.
- The Chairman of the District shall forward to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners all Book Lists submitted to the District Ministerial Committee.

- 8. The Secretary of the Board shall assess and mark all Book Lists, using the numerals 1 to 10, 10 to represent the maximum. The Book List must not include books taken for examination, and must be classified as follows:—1. Theology; 2. Science and Philosophy; 3. History and Biography; 4. Poetry; 5. Miscellaneous.
- 9. The District Ministerial Committee shall appoint a sub-committee to report on all Book Lists.
- 10. The Secretary to the Board of Examiners shall, at the beginning of the year confer with each Probationer as to the course of reading he proposes to pursue during the year, and shall tender him suitable counsel concerning the same.

That the Board of Studies, with the Secretary of the Board of Examiners as a corresponding member, be directed to review during the year the Probationers' Curriculum, (including the List of Books for Reading), more particularly in relation to men of exceptional attainments, with a view to meeting better the altered conditions of to-day. The Board is directed also to consider the Course for Home Missionaries, and other relevant matters, and to report its recommendations to the District Ministerial Committees.

QUESTION XXIII.—Do we Sanction the Alteration or Division of any District or Circuit of the Conference?

The Treasurers presented to Conference the Commemorative Roll of Subscribers to the Centenary Thanksgiving Fund.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1.—That Conference accepts with warm appreciation the Commemorative Roll of Subscribers to the Centenary Thanksgiving Fund, and expresses its gratification at the large number of our people who participated in this historic Thanksgiving of over £41,000. Conference urges that all unpaid subscriptions be paid at the earliest possible moment in order that the Fund and the Roll of Subscribers may be completed. When completed, the Roll shall be entrusted to the Board of the Theological College, to be deposited in the Museum of the College.
- 2.—That Conference rejoices to learn that a Memorial Tablet in reverent memory of early Native Ministers, is to be placed in the Kaeo Memorial Church, and that arrangements are in progress for appropriate celebrations in connection with the unveiling of the Tablet.
- 3.—That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Treasurers, Rev. S. Griffith and Mr. H. Field, also to the Auditors, Messrs. J. Smith and W. S. Mackay, and that they be reappointed.

QUESTION XXXI.—What is the Report of the General Statistical Secretary?

REPORT FOR 1925.

In the General Summary of last year an unfortunate error has occurred which inflates the total of senior members by 200. This makes it appear that we have lost ground in membership during this year by 17, whereas there is actually an increase of 183. Junior members show an increase of 514, and communicants are 564 more than last year. Other gratifying increases are 5 churches, and 30 preaching places. Speaking generally, the increase in membership is in the North Island, the figures being North Island increase 347, South Island decrease 164. Much the same position is revealed in the totals of attendants on public worship, where the North Island shows an increase of 830, and the South Island a decrease of 731. North Canterbury is conspicuous in a decrease of 374 under this heading. Both Islands, and practically all districts show an increase of communicants. This is a result of the year of preparation for Spiritual Advance—as is also the increase of 30 members on probation.

The disquieting feature of the General Returns is the decreasing number of Local Preachers. It is evident that a greater effort must be made to bring the claims and privileges of preaching before our young men. On the whole the General Statistics show that we are maintaining the status quo—which is not a reason for complacency. But it can be confidently anticipated that the figures of 1926 will be more satisfactory, as by then the real results of the special efforts of this year will be more evident.

In the Sunday School and Bible Class Returns it was only to be expected that the epidemic of infantile paralysis and the consequent

restrictions would affect our schools. As far as can at present be seen, there is a decrease of over 600 scholars. On the other hand, we have 8 more schools. Both the Young Men's and Young Women's Bible Classes show vigorous life, but the junior classes have lost members. Taking all things into consideration, the work amongst the youth shows signs of steady progress, and with a normal year, this would be more evident. A fuller report on these figures will doubtless be given by the Department itself.

QUESTION XXXII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the Welfare of the Church?

REPORT OF THE WELFARE OF THE CHURCH COMMITTEE.

The Committee has had under review and consideration many aspects of the work of the Church in the current year, and places on record its gratitude to God for the measure of success attained in various spheres, particularly for the evidences of revived spiritual vitality as shown by the record of Missions and Special Occasions in the programme of Spiritual Advance.

The Committee desires to draw the attention of Conference and our people to the following matters, which it is felt are of vital moment to the welfare of the Church.

(1) Claims of Non-Churchgoers to Special Care.

It is felt that more diligent use of the openings presented by the "Cradle Roll" system would forge links of interest and attachment between the Church and Non-Churchgoers: and that in many cases closer co-operation is desirable between the minister and the Cradle Roll Superintendent.

Further, that systematic house to house visitation to demonstrate the Church's interest in and concern for non-Churchgoers would in many cases not only provide a real sphere of Christian service for laymen and women, but prove more fruitful than the visita-

tion customarily confined to church members.

(2) Overlapping of Church Activities.

It is recommended that, in view of the present struggling position of churches in the smaller centres and country districts of this Dominion—and of the conviction that the small church just maintaining its membership and financial existence cannot serve the spiritual interests of its members and the community—a committee of Conference be constituted to confer with similar committees which other evangelical churches may set up, in an endeavour to find some solution for the wasteful and un-Christian overlapping and rivalry still in evidence in such districts. That this committee consider the advisability of approaching the authorities of other churches with a proposal that such committees be set up by their church courts, and that a report be presented to the Conference of 1927.

(3) Fellowship of the Kingdom Movement.

In view of the beneficial effects resulting from the activities of the Fellowship of the Kingdom Movement in the Old Country, and the stimulus gained where its methods have been adopted in the Dominion, we recommend to our ministers and laymen a close study of the movement, particularly its literature, persuaded as we are that the results will be of the highest advantage to our Church in New Zealand.

(4) International and Inter-racial Relationships.

The attention of the Church is directed to the urgent and vital problems of International Relationships and Racial Antagonism. We believe that it is only by the application of the principles of Christ that these problems can be solved, and a new world created. The world is faced as never before with a choice between strife and co-operation among the nations. Such being the case, the Church must more and more emphasise that national hostility is in direct conflict with the Will of God. If the noble ideal of the brotherhood of nations is to become a realised fact it is essential that it receive its inspiration from Jesus Christ. We rejoice in the growing influence of the League of Nations, the measure of success attending its endeavours to engender a spirit of brotherhood and goodwill among the nations. We urge that all our members and churches should join the League of Nations Union, and that from time to time the work of the League be brought prominently before cur congregations.

We feel that the even greater problem of Racial Antagonism presents a challenge to the Church to press forward her missionary enterprise and thus extend the Kingdom which knows no colour

and no frontiers.

- 2.—That Par. 2 be not adopted.
- 3.—That Par 3 be adopted with the following addition:—The Home Mission Board is recommended to issue quarterly publications similar to the leaflets issued last year.
- 4.—That Par. 4 be adopted.
- That the Committee and its Convener be thanked for their services, and that the Committee be reappointed, with the addition of the name of Mr. Davidson.
- 6.—That immediately prior to the introduction of the Report of the Welfare of the Church Committee at the Annual Conference, the retiring Vice-President shall deliver an official address dealing with the life and work of the Church. Ample notice shall be given of the time of this address.

7.—That the former part of Par. 113, on page 28 of the Book of Laws, be amended so as to read:—"The Chairman of a District shall have the right to visit any Circuit within the boundaries of his own District, at his discretion, to inquire into the affairs of the Circuit, and to confer with the Superintendent and other Ministers stationed therein, and also with the Circuit officials with a view to securing greater efficiency in the working of the Circuit—after due notice to the Superintendent.

8.—Book of Offices.—That a committee consisting of Revs. Principal Laws, B.A., D.D., and Professor Ranston, M.A., Litt.D., E. Drake, L. B. Dalby, W. A. Sinclair, A. Ashcroft and C. H. Olds, B.A. (Convener), with corresponding members Revs. S. Lawry, H. E. Bellhouse, A. N. Scotter, B.A., H. L. Richards, W. Wills, J. H. Haslam, G. Frost and P. R. Paris, shall consider a revision of the Book of Offices, and ascertain the approximate cost of the same and report to the Examination Committee of next Conference.

RESOLUTION ON THE WORK OF GOD.

Believing that we are now approaching a most important stage in the progress of the Spiritual Advance Campaign of our Church, this Conference sounds the clarion of advance to all Circuits and Home Mission Stations throughout the Connexion, so that the campaign may be prosecuted with redoubled vigour during the coming year. It urges upon all Ministers and preachers to give unremitting emphasis to the glories of the Gospel, and upon all members and adherents a faithful acknowledgment of the challenge of the Cross as a soul-saving power. While expectant of an overwhelming Baptism of the Holy Spirit upon the missions to be conducted by Gipsy Smith, it would clearly remind every individual Methodist that the establishment of Christ's Kingdom depends ultimately not upon any one evangelist, however distinguished, but upon the continued fidelity and self-sacrifice of all. It therefores urges even greater devotion in the study of the Scriptures and attendance upon the means of Grace, in the practice of prayer-both private and corporate-in the cultivation of Christian fellowship, in the maintenance of family religion, and in definite evangelistic work.

QUESTION XXXIII.—What are the Resolutions respecting our Sunday Schools and the Youth of the Church?

YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT—REPORT, 1925.

Introductory.

The star to which we have hitched our waggon is a New Zealand in which every boy and girl receives Christian training daily from persons religiously and educationally qualified. A remote aim this, but by no means impracticable, and everything we do is with this ideal steadily in view. We are always propagating an idea, trying to impress it upon the whole church, that the most natural and direct way to the Kingdom of God is by the training of young life. The Protestant Churches through the centuries have never stressed this sufficiently. The Jesuit order discovered it to the Roman Church. The Roman Catholics in New Zealand put down £100,000 annually for their schools because they believe

in the educational method. The elements of strength in that Church are no mystery—they make sure of the one golden opportunity. If the universal Christian Church makes this discovery in this 20th century, it may see a transformed world before the century is through.

Finance.

This is straightening out. For the first time we have a credit on the year's working. The action of last Conference has enlightened Quarterly Meetings, and Circuits generally recognise now that it is a point of honour. Our partnership in the Australasian Graded Literature has also been profitable.

The Epidemic.

The year began under the shadow of "the Epidemic." Our schools were closed till after Easter. It was a severe test. The schools that kept contact with their scholars in their homes and made careful arrangements for re-opening, generally mustered full strength again. We can scarcely be surprised, however, that the increases of the past four years have not been maintained. We report decreases of 4 teachers and 665 scholars. Yet the average attendances show increases of 160 teachers and 197 scholars.

Teacher-Training.

We are concerned for improving the quality of work in the Sunday Schools. In some of the larger cities there are schools of Religious Education, in which our Methodist teachers share. But our Department has continued its scheme, and the General Secretary held classes during the year in Onehunga, Cambridge, Te Awamutu, Gisborne, Wellington, Hutt, Masterton, Nelson, Blenheim and Invercargill. During two years some 750 teachers have participated in these Training Classes, and many Sunday School Superintendents have spoken of the new interest of the teachers and the enhanced value of their work. These classes have stimulated the demand of teachers for good literature.

Parents' Meetings.

Convinced that many problems of young life can only be dealt with effectively by parents, and that parents themselves need guidance, a beginning has been made this year with parents' meetings, which have been held in five districts. The experience encourages us to proceed further.

The Bible Class Movement.

It was a keen disappointment that Easter Camps could not be held owing to the epidemic restrictions. A very worthy successor to the Travelling Secretaryship among young women has been found in the person of Miss Lorna Hodder, and Mr. Cyril Burton continues his very valuable work among the young men. The work of Leadership Training has begun this year, Mr. Blamires and Mr. Burton having conducted classes, and the Young Women's Conference has inaugurated an excellent 3-years' course. Technical qualifications are not being placed before the primary elements of spiritual personality. The problem of the Junior Bible Class Syllabus has been met by the use of the excellent Text Book provided for this grade by the Australasian Graded Lessons.

The Movement aims to lead out to Christian service, and Bible Class members are strongly represented among the candidates offering for the Ministry, the Mission Field and Deaconess work. A considerable sum of money is raised for Missions.

Miscellaneous.

We have co-operated with the New Zealand Alliance in its Young People's Department. The Alliance reports 6000 Pledge Cards signed. Our Secretary gave a fortnight's full time service to the Alliance prior to Polling Day.

We have also worked with the Church's programme of Spiritual Advance, with results that cannot easily be tabulated. There were "repeat" orders for the Young People's Day Leaflet until the large supply was exhausted.

The Correspondence Sunday School continues to expand its work with children in lonely places, and 27 teachers are now engaged in this effective work. More are needed.

The N.Z. Council of Religious Education,

has at last been formed, and we are associated with the Youth Boards of other churches in national aims for New Zealand's childhood. Under its auspices "Union" Sunday Schools (rather than "undenominational") may now be registered. Visitors to the Exhibition at Dunedin will do well to observe the Religious Education Court.

The General Secretary.

The Committee of the Y.P. Department desires to recognise the excellent service rendered by the General Secretary during the past year. The monthly reports reveal an amazing list of activities. We feel that the success of the Department in no small measure is due to the untiring and effective services rendered by Mr. Blamires throughout the Dominion.

- That the following proposal be referred to next Synod and Conference:—Leaders of Senior Bible Classes, providing that they are otherwise eligible, shall be given a seat on the Leaders' and Quarterly Meetings.
- That Chairmen of Districts communicate with Circuits that have not paid their allocation to the Y.P. Department, asking for an explanation of the non-fulfilment of obligation.
- That the action of last Conference in sending a message to the March Quarterly Meetings be repeated this year.
- That no Sunday Schools be closed entirely during the mid-summer holidays. Schools that have a "recess" are advised to arrange for some form of chidren's service.
- 5.—That, being convinced that the call to join the Church of Jesus Christ is one of the most effective forms of religious appeal, we urge that in all our Circuits Preparation Classes and Public Recognition Services be held at least annually. We also urge that there be close co-operation of Ministers and B.C. Leaders in this matter.
- 6.—That we commend the B.C. Movement in our Circuits, and urge that steps be taken to put into operation the law of the Church in regard to B.C. government and finance.

- 7.—That the congratulations of Conference be sent to the 21st Birthday Camp of the Y.M.B.C. Movement at the forthcomng Easter.
- 8.—That the majority year programme be commended to the interest and progress of the whole Church; the three fold objective being:

 (1) The cultivation of the inner life; (2) The wider outlook on the life of the world; (3) The training of youth for service.
- 9.—That the Y.P. Department arrange for a Dominion Sunday School examination this year.
- 10.—That we reaffirm our conviction that the Australasian Graded Lesson System is the system best suited to our conditions in New Zealand.
- 11.—That Young People's Sunday be observed on the third Sunday in May, and that Circuits be recommended to make the annual collection at that date.
- 12.—That while the Conference has heard with interest the proposal to employ Ministers specially trained and designated for youth work, yet without affirming the principle, it refers the matter to a committee to consider and report upon the whole question to the next Conference through the Synods; the committee to be the Executive of the Y.P. Department, with Principal Laws, Rev. S. Lawry, Messrs. W. H. Seed and H. W. Heslop.
- 13.—That Conference refers the following matter to the Y.P. Department:—That in the teaching of our younger people both in Church and Sunday School, more definite effort be made to give instruction in the history of Methodism and the principles of Protestantism.
- 14.—That the Methodist Church of New Zealand extends a most sincere welcome to Dr. John R. Mott, and hails his approaching visit to this Dominion as a unique opportunity to promote the co-operation of Christian forces for the progress of the Kingdom of Christ. The Conference urges ministers, missionary leaders and leaders of religious education so to prepare for Dr. Mott's Conference that they may be productive under the hand of God of rich and permanent good.

TEMPERANCE AND MORALS COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

Owing, probably, to the change in the head of the Government, the legislation promised the liquor interests last year has not materialised. The Report of the 1924 Parliamentary Licensing Committee is likely to receive attention very early in the life of the new Parliament, unless the forces of Temperance in the House and at the Poll show that they are in a healthy and vigorous condition.

In May the N.Z. Alliance had its Annual Convention, which was well attended by representatives from the whole Dominion, our own Church being in strong evidence amongst the delegates. It was emphasised again that the Alliance depended solely on the Christian Churches of the community to support its work, and carry the issue to victory. The Alliance now recognises that some of the bodies and interests on which it was disposed to lean had neither the enthusiasm nor the sustained moral driving power to secure the continuous efforts which are essential to success.

Late in September the Temperance and Morals Committee sent out an appeal to our Ministers and Home Missionaries to put all the effort possible into the work of the campaign during the few weeks prior to the Poll.

We deeply regret to report that wine-drinking at wedding festivals, dances and parties is increasingly in evidence. One of the saddest phases is that members of our own and other Churches are by no means guiltless, and not a few go so far as to defend the practice, and resent condemnation by the pulpit. This is but one more manifestation of that subtle weakening of the moral fibre of the people which has become so characteristic of our time.

A strong resolution from this Committee, dealing with the Licensing Reform Association was got through the Press and the Press Association, and appeared in many of the papers in the Dominion. The close alliance of this body with the trade has become increasingly apparent, and it is amazinig how any honest clergyman can be hoodwinked into believing that it is an independent organisation working in the interests of Temperance reform.

We sent an emphatic protest to the Minister of Internal Affairs (Hon R. F. Bollard) on the number of Art Union permits being issued, pointing out that he had got behind the clear intention of the Legislature when it reposed certain powers in the Minister. He has indicated that the money value of the prizes will, in future, be greatly reduced. Prizes up to £5000 are at the moment being offered. The Art Union craze has become the most fruitful school of gambling that could be conceived. As a consequence the morals of both old and young are being undermined to an extent hitherto scarcely dreamed of. Rumours have reached the Committee that this craze for "cheap money" has affected some School Committees and other similar bodies having to do with the control of the schools. We have asked the Minister of Education (Hon Sir C. J. Parr) to enquire into the matter, and urged that, if necessary, he should act promptly. He neither affirms nor denies the rumour, but states that he is in accord with our views on the matter.

We also brought under the notice of the Minister of Education the resolution of last Conference, urging that a syllabus of instruction should be prepared for Primary and Secondary Schools, setting forth the moral and economic evils of gambling. He replies that this can be done under the heading of "Civics." We, however, learn that what is given under this heading depends, to a great extent, on the sympathies of masters, and also that very few scholars get instruction in the Temperance syllabus.

The Minister of Internal Affairs was written to regarding the Picture Poster menace, and the continued laxity of the film censorship. We are of the opinion that continued agitation is necessary to cleanse

the picture entertainments of the Dominion of the objectionable features which still persist.

The defeat of Mr Isitt's "Religious Exercises in Schools Bill" by a small majority is much to be deplored. While some members in all the political parties voted against the Bill, the only party giving a block vote against it was the Labour Party. The thanks of the whole Church are due to Mr Isitt for the splendid fight he has put up for this and other moral issues during his Parliamentary career. He has never once shrunk from the ordeal when a moral issue has been concerned.

We deeply regret the passing of the Rev. J. Dawson, Secretary of the N.Z. Alliance. His loss to the Temperance cause at this juncture is almost irreparable. As fitting reference will be made to him in other circumstances, we do not think it necessary to dwell here upon the magnitude of his services and the depth of his devotion to the cause of Religion and Social Reform in this country.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT.

While naturally there is disappointment that the campaign did not result in carrying Dominion Prohibition, there is in well-informed circles a very profound spirit of thankfulness that our vote did not actually decline. The fact that over 319,450 votes were cast for this issue should deeply impress all the forces of righteousness. We well know that the other side are deeply impressed with this vote, notwithstanding all their public effrontery, and attempts at minimising its significance. This vote points the way to more insistent political action, by which we shall demand a fair ballot paper, whether it contains more than two issues or not. State Purchase and Control must not be allowed to stand, in order to merely confuse and confound and defeat, when there is not the remotest likelihood of its becoming a really live issue. With a more favourable House of Representatives, not only will the "Trade" be prevented from getting the notorious report of the Parliamentary Licensing Committee translated into an Act of Parliament, but if the Temperance forces are insistent enough, and are prepared to put the Prohibition issue before party politics, they can induce the Government to give us a fair ballot paper. After that we can fight with the sure confidence of coming victory.

It is gratifying to learn that the recent election resulted in the return of a definite majority of Members in the House of Representatives in favour of the Religious Exercises in Schools Bill, and that there is a reasonable hope of the measure being carried in the new Parliament.

RESOLUTIONS.

BIBLE-IN-SCHOOLS.

That Conference advises our people, that, while it does seem that the "Religious Exercises in Schools Bill" will have a good opportunity of being carried into Law by the new Parliament, they should not slacken in their interest or propaganda, as strong efforts will be made to prevent the passage of such a measure, and to stultify its operation after it is carried.

SUNDAY OBSERVANCE.

- That, as the encroachment on the Lord's Day grows apace, and as this is a serious menace to the moral and spiritual well-being of the community and as we recognise that Protestant Christianity cannot flourish in the midst of a Continental Sunday, Conference invites the other Protestant Churches in the Dominion to confer as to the best means of combating the present tendency and of bringing about a better observance of the Lord's Day.
- That this Conference expresses its emphatic protest against the action of the Minister of Railways in instituting Sunday Excursion Trains throughout the Dominion. We view with alarm such an encroachment on the Lord's Day, and consider it a menace to the social, moral and spiritual welfare of the Dominion.

TEMPERANCE.

- That a Pastoral Letter be drawn up dealing with certain questions affecting Public Morals and Welfare. This is referred to the Welfare of the Church Committee to act.
- That in view of the present unfair and undemocratic system of voting, we demand that the Government either eliminate the middle issue or that it make provision for preferential voting. That a strong deputation be arranged to wait upon the Prime Minister with the purpose of bringing about the necessary change, and that our Church shall be represented upon the deputation, the Temperance and Morals Committee to act in conjunction with the New Zealand Alliance.
- That Conference again urge upon our Ministers and people the wisdom of forming Bands of Hope or other Temperance Societies in all our Circuits.
- That a District Temperance Secretary be appointed in each District, who shall keep in close touch with the Temperance organisations of the District, and who also shall be in touch with the Convener of the Temperance and Morals Committee, and shall be the medium whereby emergency matters shall be dealt with in his District. Such Secretaries shall be nominated by the Temperance and Morals Committee.

RACING.

That Conference views with concern the action of the authorities in granting racing permits, which, if not definitely illegal, are absolutely contrary to the spirit of the Act. Although leading racing men hold that there are already too many city permits, and we are constantly told that the country races are picnics and family gatherings, rather than incentives to gambling, yet on one excuse or another permission is granted for these country meetings to be held in adjacent cities, we therefore emphatically protest against such an abuse of existing legislation.

GAMBLING.

That Conference take steps to get into touch with the other Churches and bodies opposed to gambling, and arranged a representative and strong deputation to wait upon the Prime Minister and the Minister of Internal Affairs, early in the next session of Parliament, in an attempt to end the iniquitous and hypocritical Art Union form of gambling, numerous permits for which have been granted by the present Minister of Internal Affairs (The Hon. R. F. Bollard), against the intention and spirit of the legislature.

PICTURES AND THE CENSOR.

That as there are many evidences of the looseness of the censorship of films and other pictures, Conference be asked to make provision for this matter to be dealt with when the deputation on gambling waits on the Government.

DRINKING AT DANCES.

- That the Temperance and Public Morals Committee be empowered to act in reference to the growing practice of drinking alcoholic liquor at dances, and the reported use of sweets containing drugs.
- That the proposal to issue to our people a Pastoral Letter dealing with Public Morals and Church Welfare be referred to the Welfare of the Church Committee.

REPORT ON IMMIGRATION FOR YEAR 1925.

An important development demanding the careful attention of the Conference, is the proposed organisation to promote group nomination. There has been much activity during the year in this direction. A Dominion Conference on Immigration, convened by the Wellington Chamber of Commerce, has decided to form a Dominion Settlement Association actively to promote collective nomination. The Association proposes to accept the responsibility of nomination, and by means of District Committees (on which the Churches are to have representatives) to find accommodation and employment for the Association's nominees on arrival in the Dominion.

We have also particulars of a scheme organised by the Immigration Department of the National Council of the Y.M.C.A.'s in London, in which nomination by collective bodies is a prominent feature. It is recommended that every church or congregation should nominate one family per month, or at least one family per year. A special organisation to be set up in each Church to arrange nomination.

The Y.M.C.A. organisation in Great Britain, it is claimed, has special facilities for the selection of suitable immigrants, in co-operation with the Home Churches. Already an Overseas Hostel has been opened in London, in connection with the scheme, and Y.M.C.A. agents have been appointed on immigrant ships to organise the religious and social life on board. The Y.M.C.A. authorities are seeking the co-operation of our Church in the matter.

At the same time, there comes to hand details of a scheme promoted by the Overseas Bureau of our Methodist Brotherhood in London. It is suggested that Conference adopt the principle of group nomination, and that the Bureau be entrusted with the task of selecting the right stamp of immigrant. We are informed that the Overseas Department of the British Government is so anxious to encourage Church nomination, that it recommends the appointment of a Church representative, whose duty it shall be to tour the Dominion to foster nominations, and to find suitable openings for immigrants wanting employment. The British Government is apparently willing to find as much as 50 per cent. of the salary and travelling expenses of such an agent.

These various proposals were considered carefully at a special meeting of our Wellington Immigration Committee, and the following recommendations were made:—

I. That every encouragement be given to the nomination of selected immigrants on the part of our churches and congregations, and that suitable literature be prepared and circulated, giving full information to our people.

(Very generous terms are being offered to induce suitable immigrants to come to this country. Many immigrants are granted a free passage, and, under certain conditions, a man, his wife and ten children can be brought to New Zealand for the sum of £20. Any group nominating an immigrant undertakes to find both housing and employment on arrival.)

II. That the Conference agree to co-operate with the Overseas Department of our Methodist Brotherhood Bureau, entrusting them with the duty of selecting suitable immigrants, and catering for the comfort of them en route.

(The Australian Methodist Church has undertaken to make a financial contribution to the British Conference for this work.)

III. That to facilitate the work of nomination, and the securing of accommodation and employment, committees be formed in each District in the Dominion, to consist of not less than three members, to be nominated the first year by the Chairman of each District. The nominations made by these committees to be forwarded through, and approved by the Central Immigration Committee in Wellington.

The Wellington Committee to be as follows:—Revs. C. Eaton, A. N. Scotter, Messrs. H. P. Mourant, R. G. Denton, C. M. Luke, S. Martin, W. Clarke and Riddell. Convener, Rev. C. Eaton.

These proposals will, no doubt, receive the careful consideration of the Conference.

In concluding our report, we have to acknowledge our indebtedness to the Overseas Department of the Methodist Brotherhood Bureau for regular advices received of immigrants about to arrive in the Dominion. This has materially helped us to get into touch with the members and adherents of our Church coming to New Zealand. All incoming immigrant ships have been met on arrival, and every effort made to welcome new comers. We desire to acknowledge our debt to Mr. R. G. Denton for invaluable service rendered in this work.

Recommendation III. was adopted, with the insertion of the words "of immigrants" between "The nominations" and "made by these committees."

RESOLUTIONS.

That Immigration matters be entrusted to the Wellington District Executive, with power to co-opt members for Immigration matters.

That as the Dominion Immigration Association will be forming Immigration Welfare Committees in all the cities, provincial and smaller towns of the Dominion, we urge that our Ministers and church people take a live interest in these committees and their work of welcoming and assisting immigrants to settle into the work and social life of the Dominion.

- That the Wellington Immigration Committee be requested to explore the possibilities of securing immigrants from the orphanages of the various Methodist Churches of the Old Land.
- That Rev. C. Eaton be thanked for his services, and that he be appointed Chief Immigration Officer and Convener of the Immigration Committee.
- That the hearty thanks of Conference be presented to Mr. R. G. Denton and to the Immigration Officers for their work in the past year.

As will be seen by reference to the section dealing with Current Accounts, the total sum spent on purchases, erections and additions was £26,510 16s. 6d. This is somewhat less than the amount for the previous year. If the amounts stated in the Schedules may be relied on, the total debts on properties have been decreased by £3858. Unfortunately these returns vary so much from year to year that they offer very little guidance for purposes of comparison. Here too, the Auditors should give more careful attention to the previous year's statement. From the evidence available, it looks as though sometimes a bank overdraft is treated as a mortgage debt, and sometimes it is omitted from the total debt. In this matter a uniform custom is desirable, and bank overdraft, being included in the debit balance, should not be included also in the mortgage debt, and so counted twice over.

It is to be regretted that during the year the Conference rule requiring the consent of the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee before acquiring property and erecting buildings has been disregarded in several cases. The plea that decision had to be made quickly can hardly be accepted as an excuse, seeing that the Secretary can be reached by telegram, and arrangements made for dealing with such matters at short notice. In cases where plans and specifications can be sent only through

the Post Office, the urgency is never so great that building must be gone on with before consent is obtained. It is desirable that Superintendents of Circuits and Trustees should realise that Conference Rules are intended to be operative, and that they should not be treated as a dead letter.

Total Fire Insurances Reported, £529,426.

Last year's Report contained the following sentences:—"District Secretaries' report discrepancies in balances brought forward, and that in some cases no schedules are forthcoming. In several Home Mission Stations there does not appear to be any separate Trust Account kept, everything being paid out of the Circuit Fund." The same laxity is again reported by the District Secretaries in regard to the 1925 schedules. By comparing the returns for this year with those of last year it will be seen that in round figures £500 of the credit balances reported in 1924 has disappeared during the year, while the debit balances

brought forward are about £300 less than those reported in 1924. There are cases reported where the bank overdraft is not included in the debit balance. Surely it is not too much to expect auditors to see that this most elementary item of book-keeping is attended to. Chairmen of Districts, too, should see that the schedules for properties in Home Mission Stations are sent to them, as required by the resolution of the Conference of 1925, and after scrutiny sent on to the District Secretary of Church Property. (See Minutes, 1925, p. 73.)

The thanks of the Conference are due to the District Secretaries for their valuable services. On account of the death of Mr. C. Swiney, of Wellington, the President, at the request of the Chairman, appointed Mr. S. T. S. Martin to act in his place. Mr. Pepperell retires after many years of service as Secretary for the Taranaki-Wanganui District.

CHURCH PROPERTY RESOLUTIONS.

- 1.—That the Report be received, adopted and printed in the Minutes.
- 2.—That the thanks of the Conference be presented to District Secretaries for their valuable services, and those named in the Report be the District Secretaries for 1926.
- 3.—That the Circuit Property Schedules, with audited balance-sheets, be sent to the District Secretaries not later than 31st October, and that the revised Schedules with Summaries and Reports be sent by the District Secretaries to the General Secretary not later than 10th December.
- 4.—That the Property Schedules from Home Mission Stations be sent to the Chairman of the District not later than 31st October, and after due scrutiny sent by him to the District Secretary without delay.
- 5.—That with a view to facilitating the work of the District Secretaries, Circuit Superintendents be directed to carry out the totals of the several columns, and to see that a correct balance is secured on each Schedule.
- 6.—That the attention of auditors be called to the essential importance of seeing that the balances brought forward agree in every case with the balance given in the preceding year's accounts.

- That all moneys held in Trust by local church officers for special purposes be invested only in those securities authorised by the "Trust Act, 1908," or its Amendments.
- 10.—That the best thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. T. W. Newbold for the gift of a church site at Ocean Grove, St. Kilda; also to Mr. S. Ayers for his gift of a parsonage site at Rangiora.

B.—CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND. Report for Year 1925.

The Cash Statement showing Receipts and Expenditure for the year ending 30th September, 1925, and the Balance-sheet of the Fund, are presented herewith. The total receipts were £5724 9s. 2d. The cost of working the Fund was £210 18s. 9d., and the receipts for this purpose amounted to £289 9s. 2d., as there was a previous surplus on this account of over £75, the Treasurers have transferred £100 to the Capital Account, which now stands at £19,878 9s. 5d. On account of the greatly increased amount of building this is not nearly sufficient to meet all the needs that arise. An addition of £5000 could be made good use of at once

New Loans have been advanced as follows:—Kohukohu, £200; Waitoa, £100; Ngatea, £400; Riverton, £150; Te Hapara, Gisborne, £250; Brooklyn, £170; Tauranga, £150; Devonport, £500; Linwood, £250; Picton, £100; Worser Bay, £65; Plimmerston, £92 10s.; Wanganui East, £38 10s.; Penrose, £50; Opunake, £400; Te Awamutu, £70; Taihape, £200; New Lynn, £200; Dominion Road, £500; and rates added to previous loans, £5 3s. 1d.; making total of £3891 3s. 1d.

There has been only a very small response made to the offer of last Conference to write off £ for £ in certain cases where arrears were of long standing. Judging by the returns supplied through the Property Schedules, it would appear as if some of the long outstanding loans have been forgotten, as they are not included in the Trust debt. A reminder of the existence of such debts will be sent in due course.

Since the closing of the financial year, the Committee has had to deal with some very urgent cases of Trust difficulties. Special loans have been advanced to Opotiki and Whakatane, in conjunction with special grants from the Contingent and Home Mission Funds, and a large advance has been made to Wanganui East. In the last named case it is hoped this will be repaid by the sale of a portion of the land at an early date. In all these cases it is evident that liabilities were incurred without a reasonable prospect of being able to meet them, the calculations having been based on a too optimistic view of future developments.

A difficulty has arisen in connection with the lease of some land at Whitely township. The Model Deed does not give power to Trustees to lease land for mining purposes of any kind. Conference is recommended to make the necessary alteration to provide for this.

The Conference is again recommended to establish a fund to subsidise local efforts to purchase church sites, the Rules to be as set out in last year's report, viz.:—

That the sources of the Fund be:-

- (1)Interest on investment of moneys held in Trust by the Treasurers of the Church Building and Loan Fund.
- (2) A grant of not less than £50 per annum from the Home Mission Fund.
- (3) An annual contribution from the Connexional Fire Insurance Fund.

(4) Donations, bequests, etc.

The Fund shall be administered as part of the Church Building and Loan Fund.

Grants may be made towards the cost of purchasing land as sites for Churches subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) The purchase must be approved by the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee.
- (2) No grant shall be made until at least an equal amount has been raised locally from other sources.
- (3) Not more than £75 shall be granted towards the purchase of any one site.
- (4) The land thus purchased shall be conveyed to Trustees under the provisions of the Methodist Model Deed.
- (5) If any land prove unsuitable for the purpose for which it was purchased the same shall be resold, and unless the proceeds are required by the Trustees for the purchase of another site in the Circuit, the same shall be divided between the Church Building and Loan Fund and the Trustees of the land purchased, in proportion to the amounts contributed by them respectively towards the cost thereof.

Sales Sanctioned.

The following sales of property have been sanctioned by the Committee, and the Conference is requested to confirm the same by resolution:—

Auckland Central—Mission Parsonage, the proceeds to be used for discharge of mortgage, and balance to be held for future use.

Kawhia-Quarter acre of land by Mission Property Trustees.

Three Kings—Sections of Three Kings land, near Mount Albert—part of subdivision plan.

Onehunga—Part of land in Grey Street; the purchaser to do necessary roading, and give another piece of land in exchange.

Pukekohe—Three sections of parsonage property, estimated value £1000.

Proceeds towards cost of new brick church, approximate cost £3000.

Inglewood—Property at Egmont Village, the proceeds to be used for Trust purposes in the Inglewood Circuit,

Stratford—(1) Remaining sections of Stratford Parsonage land, on condition that new site is secured and a parsonage of brick or concrete erected thereon. (2) Parsonage at Midhirst, proceeds to new Parsonage at Stratford.

Wanganui North—(1) House property in Dublin Street, proceeds to pay off mortgage, repair parsonage, and balance for church improvements. (2) Land at Wanganui East, proceeds to repay advances from Loan Fund, and any balance to further reduction of debt.

Masterton—Parsonage property at Worksop Road, proceeds to new parsonage.

Rangiora—(1) Parsonage property in King Street for £675, proceeds towards new parsonage. (2) Parsonage site obtained in High Street, now no longer required.

Greendale-Malvern-Unused site at Sheffield for £50, proceeds to Greendale parsonage debt.

Temuka—Two quarter acre sections at back of parsonage, proceeds to be used towards securing a central church site.

C.—REPORT OF CUSTODIAN OF DEEDS AND AUTHORISED REPRESENTATIVE, 1925.

A report was sent to each District Synod showing the Deeds received during the year by the Custodian, also the names of all Trusts where Trustees had been either added or removed, giving the number in each case. All changes have been duly certified and sent to the Superintendents of Circuits concerned. I would, however, point out that somewhat frequent cases occur in which names are removed from the local records, and new Trustees elected, without any notification being sent to the Authorised Representative, as required by the Acts dealing with Methodist Church properties. Attention to this matter is important.

The various Deeds Registration Offices are now engaged bringing lands held under the old Conveyance system under the provisions of the Land Transfer Act. This is causing a good deal of extra work for the Authorised Representative, who is being called on to supply the Conveyances in his custody, and to furnish the names of present Trustees.

A certificate of Title is being issued to Trustees instead of the Conveyance, on payment of £1 5s. for each Title. Apparently where the property is not mortgaged, the simplest method is for the fee to be sent to the Authorised Representative, who will pay the money to the Registration Office and uplift the Title, and then place it in the Conference safe.

The fees received during the year for registration, etc., have been £35 6s. This amount has been paid into the Connexional Secretary's Fund.

We have pleasure in submitting Statement of Receipts and Expendi-

ture for the year ended 30th September, 1925.

The amount of rent collected for the year was seven hundred and eighty-one pounds seven shillings and elevenpence (£781 7s. 11d.), and interest collected amounted to thirty pounds thirteen shillings and four-pence (£30 13s. 4d.), the sum of £650 has been remitted to the Home Mission Treasurer, and there is a credit balance of £87 19s. 5d. in the Bank, of which amount £77 19s. 7d. will be required to pay Land Tax.

The sections are still changing hands, fifteen (15) consents to trans-

fer having been signed during the year.

Several sub-divisions of sections have been made since the new leases were issued, and in every case the Trustees have made their own valuation and charged increased rentals before consenting to sub-division.

The Trustees have resumed possession of the old "Mission House."

The Children's Home at Masterton has had a very successful yearthe number being well maintained. We desire to place on record our high opinion of the services of the Matron, Sister May, her assistant, Sister Annie, and the staff who have helped. The local Committee too, have done excellent work, and we ask for their reappointment.

Following on a visit to the Home by some of the Board members, the comfort and efficiency of the Home has been increased in the following matters:—Erection of a shelter verandah around the playroom for the children; connection of the Home with the Wairarapa Electric Power Board's electric lighting mains; and of the drainage system with the Borough Council scheme. These items cost over £200—but the sale of the old lighting plant realised £40.

Our financial operations for the year are herewith—those for the Home are submitted by the Treasurer (Rev. J. Cocker), with his report.

QUESTION XXXVII.—What is the Report on Connexional Fire Insurance?

REPORT OF CONNEXIONAL FIRE INSURANCE BOARD, 1925.

The Board has pleasure in reporting to Conference that it has had another year of successful business. During the year ending 31st October, new risks were accepted amounting to £37,900; and only a few small items were withdrawn, mostly because the properties concerned had passed out of Connexional possession.

After providing for all working expenses, reinsurances and losses by fire, the sum of £1678 16s. has been added to the accumulated funds. This is the largest surplus experienced in the history of the Fund. The Revenue Account shows that the total cost of management of the Fund is less than ten per cent. of the year's income. The Balance-sheet shows that the assets of the Fund approximate £19,000.

As authorised by the last Conference, the following amounts have been paid during the present year to Institutions and Funds of the Church:—Deaconess House, £100; Foreign Mission Fund, £100; Home Mission Fund, £100; Benevolent Branch of Supernumerary Fund, £50; Total, £350.

One of the objects contemplated when the Fund was instituted was to help the support of any Funds established by the Conference. In pursuance of this object, nearly £2200 has been paid to various Connexional Institutions and Funds during the past seven years.

The Board recommends that of the year's surplus £1178 16s, be added permanently to the Accumulated Funds, and that grants be made to other Funds as follows:—

From the time of its inception, the Fund has been fortunate in regard to loss by fire. Prior to Methodist Union, in 1913, the Primitive Methodist Fund had paid £508 8s. as loss by fire, and the Wesleyan Fund had paid £268 18s. 4d. for the same purpose. Since 1913 the united Fund has suffered loss to the extent of £1543 12s., the largest single item being £650 by the recent fire at Hokitika. Part of this was covered by reinsurance. This case is a striking illustration of the unwise policy of providing a small insurance cover because the risk is small.

Last Conference referred to this Board, the matter of arranging for an Accident Insurance Policy to cover voluntary workers in connection with Churches and Sunday Schools. The Board has considered the matter at length, and after making enquiries in several directions resolved to recommend that no action be taken at present.

The Board desires to place on record its thanks to the General Secretary for the very efficient services rendered by him during the year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 1925.

The work of the departments administered in the Connexional Office is set out in the report dealing with the several departments concerned. It is therefore not necessary to refer to them here in detail. Each department continues to grow, and may be expected to do so with the growth of the Church.

The working expenses of the Office have amounted to £961 9s. 2d., which is a little less than the estimate submitted to last Conference. The credit balance at the end of the year was £19 11s. 8d. A statement of receipts and expenditure will be submitted to Conference through the Committee on Balance-sheets.

The estimated expenditure for 1926 is £975. The Conference is requested to authorise the following appropriations to meet the same:—Contingent Fund, £175; Church Building and Loan Fund, £200; Fire Insurance Fund, £260; Supernumerary Fund, £220; Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund, £15; "Methodist Times," £75; Authorised Representative, £35. Total, £980.

The Committee has given a good deal of attention to the question of his successor, and has pleasure in nominating the Rev. M. A. Rugby Pratt for the position, the appointment to take effect in 1927.

QUESTION XXXIX.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Theological College?

THE METHODIST THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE.

A.—PRINCIPAL'S REPORT, 1925.

1. The College opened on the third Monday in March, when the fifteen men appointed by Conference were enrolled. Of these fourteen came into residence, while arrangements were made for Mr. Hailwood to reside at home and attend classes. Mr. Paulger was absent, having been granted a year's rest by Conference.

2. The attention of the men to their studies has been satisfactory, discipline has been well maintained, and sincerity and spiritual purpose have been evident in every department of College life. In addition to minor ailments there have been two serious cases of ill-health during Mr. F. J. Handy had to undergo an operation for appendicitis, and, recovery being somewhat slow, missed practically the whole of the Second Term's work. In September Mr. R. H. Miles began to show signs of serious nervous strain, and, after expert examination and advice, was released from College work and granted respite from the Third Term examination and the Conference examination at the end of the year.

3. The following awards were made at the close of last year's work. The "Edson" Prize (Greek) was won by Mr. B. R. Hames, with Mr. M. J. W. Paulger second. The "Garland" Prize (Theology, Homiletics and Exegesis) was won by Mr. A. H. Voyce, with Mr. B. R. Hames The Elocution Prizes for 1925 have been won by Mr. B. R. second.

Hames (senior grade), and Mr. F. H. Hayman (junior grade).
4. The changes in curriculum sanctioned by the last Conference Separate courses of lectures in Old and New have come into effect. Testament Introduction, Exegesis and Biblical Theology have been instituted, and students are now receiving a very thorough training in these subjects. To make this possible, Social Economics has been removed from the curriculum, and the Tutor has been relieved from that subject and from English, the latter being now under the charge of Mr. C. R. Laws, M.Sc.

5. The Course of Study for the year has been as follows:-

(1) Systematic Theology. The nature and sources of Christian Theo-The Being of God, including His nature, attributes, relation to the universe, and His Triune existence. The origin and nature of Man, his relation to God, his moral being, his racial relationship, etc. Text Book: Clarke's "Outline of Christian

Theology." Bi-weekly lectures by the Principal.

(2) Old Testament (a) Introduction. Weekly lectures by the Tutor during the first and second terms on the authorship, date, composition, contents, literary style of the prophetical books; and the personal characteristics of the Prophets. Text Books: Box's "Short Introduction to the Literature of the Old Testament." During the third term, weekly lectures by the (b) Exegesis. Tutor on the principles of Exegesis and a detailed exposition of the "Servant of the Lord" passages in Isaiah. (c) Biblical Theology. The Teaching of the individual Prophets. origins, development, functions, inspiration and fulfilment of Hebrew Prophecy. Text Book: Ottley's "The Hebrew Prophets." Weekly lectures by the Tutor.

(3) New Testament. (a) Introduction. Weekly lectures by the Principal. The Fourth Gospel, the Epistle to the Hebrews, the Epistles of James, Peter, John, and Jude, The Revelation. Full discussion of the characteristics authorship, date, literary style, and contents of these books, together with related problems. (b) Exegesis. Weekly lectures by the Principal. The principles of Exegesis and a detailed study of the Events and Discourses in the Upper Room (John XIII.-XVI.), and of I. John, chapters i. and ii. Biblical Theology. Weekly lectures by the Principal. The The Teaching of our Lord as found in Johannine Theology. the Fourth Gospel, and the Theology of St. John as found in the 1st Epistle.

- (4) Homiletics. Two classes conducted by the Principal. (a) Senior. Practical and Pastoral Theology with Gladden's "The Christian Pastor and the Working Church" as text book. (b) Junior. A Course of lectures on Sermon Preparation and Delivery, and on the Conduct of Public Worship, together with a study of Gillie's "The Minister in the Modern World." (c) In addition to the above weekly criticism sermons have been preached, followed by discussion in a special class under the Principal.
- (5) Greek. Senior and junior classes have been conducted bi-weekly by the Tutor. (a) Senior. Lectures in Syntax; reading of Matthew VI., I. John, Philippians II., Revelation III., Romans XIV., Hebrews XII., some papyrus remains and classical Greek. (b) Junior. Accidence, easy New Testament passages. Text Books: Moulton's Introduction, and Robertson's Short Grammar.
- (6) Latin. Bi-weekly classes conducted by the Tutor in preparation for the Matriculation examination.
- (7) Mental and Moral Philosophy. Weekly classes by the Tutor.
 Subject: The Elements of Deductive and Inductive Logic and
 Fallacies. Text Book: Mellone's Text Book of Logic.
- (8) Comparative Religion. Fortnightly lectures by the Tutor. Methods, Origins of Religions, Sacrifice, Magic, Ancestor-worship, the Future Life, Monotheism, the Mystery Religions, Modern Cults, Zoroastrianism, Buddhism, the superiority of Christianity. Text Books: Jevon's Comparative Religion.
- (9) English. Weekly classes (1) In Grammar, Composition, etc. (2) In Literature. In the former, Nesfield's Manual of English Grammar and Composition, and Rowe and Webb's "Guide to the Study of English," have been used, and exercises set and corrected. In the latter "Macbeth" has been studied in Class. Tutor: Mr. C. R. Laws, M.Sc.
- (10) Mathematics. Bi-weekly classes up to Matriculation standard have been conducted by the Rev. W. A. Burley, M.A.
- (11) Elocution and Voice Production. A Course of Instruction has been given by Mr. Thomas Harris, professional elocutionist.
- 6. University Work. The following are the particulars of University work done by students during the year:—
 - B. R. Hames, who passed for the B.A. degree last year in Economics and Mental and Moral Philosophy, has this year attended lectures and passed the required examinations in English, Education, and Advanced Philosophy, thus enabling him to sit for the B.A. Pass in these subjects.
 - A. R. Penn has attended lectures in Economics and History, and passed the Term examinations. He has sat for the B.A. Pass in these subjects.
 - R. H. Miles attended lectures in French until the failure of his health.
 N. P. Larsen will sit for the Matriculation examination in December next.
- N.B.—Messrs. A. H. Voyce and F. H. Hayman have taken courses of study in the St. John Ambulance Classes in First Aid and Home Nursing, in which Mr. Voyce secured a First Class Pass for the Medallion.
- 7. During the year the Rev. E. P. Blamires has delivered a course of three lectures on Young People's work and Sunday School organisation, and the senior students have visited certain graded schools in Auckland and handed in written reports to the Principal on their observations.

- 8. A full number of preaching services have been taken by the students during the year Work has also been undertaken in Circuits during vacation. In the month of June the Students, with some slight assistance from the Staff, conducted a Mission at the Dominion Road Church, which included week-night meetings and Sunday Services, Young People's and Children's Gatherings, Open-air work, and house to house visitation. The Mission was greatly blessed of God, and revealed evangelistic gifts of a high order in some of the men. The Students have also given assistance in Missionary work and, during the vacations in evangelistic work other than the above.
- 9. During the year the following have visited the College and addressed the Students: Rev. Lionel Fletcher, Rev. Vincent le C. Binet, Rev. G. B. Hinton, and Rev. Mr. McKenzie, of the Student Christian Movement.
- 10. Every attention has been given to the supervision of household affairs by Mrs. Laws, and the welfare of the men in residence has been adequately provided for.
- 11. The Correspondence Classes for Candidates for the Ministry and others have been carried on through the year. Some 29 Students enrolled; of whom 28 took Theology, 28 Bible Knowledge, 13 English, 10 History, 11 Geography, 12 Science, 6 Greek, and 6 Mathematics. Many of the Students did excellent work. In addition to the College staff, the Revs. W. G. Slade, M.A., and W. T. Blight, B.A., and Mr. C. R. Laws, M.Sc., have rendered valuable assistance in tuition.
- 12. The work of the Collegiate Church, under the immediate charge of Dr. Ranston, has been well maintained during the year, and the Students have given assistance in pulpit supply, pastoral visitation, work among the young, etc. The sum of £113 16s. 5d. has been received as the College share of the offertories for the year ending October 31st, 1925.

B.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The Committee has met frequently during the year, and has transacted much new College business, which will be reported on separately.

Death of Mr. G. A. Buttle.

The Committee suffered an irreparable loss in the death of Mr. Buttle. For many years he had acted as Treasurer, and had always shown not only marked ability, but also sympathetic interest in the discharge of his duties. He has left his impress on successive generations of Students, and the whole Church owes him a great debt.

Treasurer.

Mr. G. A. Buttle had acted as Treasurer during Mr. Winstone's absence in England, but when failing health compelled him to relinquish that office, Mr. A. J. Buttle kindly undertook the duties, and has ably discharged them.

Cost of Training.

The late Mr. Buttle interviewed each of the Students at the beginning of the College year on this matter and reported that the results were not encouraging. The Committee urges upon Superintendent

Ministers the duty of bringing this matter before prospective candidates, for it holds strongly that, where it is possible for a Student to contribute to the cost of his living, it is a moral obligation on him to do so.

Accommodation.

The extra number of Students to be accommodated necessitated special arrangements, and at present "Dunholme" is full to its utmost capacity. This and the unprecedented number of candidates offering this year accentuates the urgent need of the new College.

College Library.

During the year valuable additions have been made to the College Library by Mr. A. C. Caughey, Revs. P. N. Knight, B.A., J. Dawson, J. Cocker and Mr. A. H. Reed.

Divinity Degrees.

While the University Committee was sitting in Auckland the Principal, the Tutor, and Rev. A. B. Chappell, co-operating with other churches, presented evidence for the granting of Divinity Degrees by the New Zealand University. The members of the Commission were sympathetic, and in the report since published they strongly recommend that Divinity Degrees should be granted.

Finance.

A special report will be presented to Conference through the Auckland Synod.

C.—TREASURER'S REPORT.

The expenditure on maintenance of the College for the year ending 31st October, 1925, has been £2098 1s. 2d., or £71 18s, 10d. less than the estimate. However, on the Income received to date the account shows a debit of £289 12s. 7d., being made up as follows:—Deficit for year ending 31st October, 1924, £64 7s. 2d.; deficit for year ending 31st October, 1925, £225 5s. 5d.

Of the Income available it has been deemed advisable to reserve sufficient money in order to carry on the College until 31st March, 1926, and £875 has been provided for this purpose. As the expenditure during the first six months of the past year was £969, it will be seen that this reserve is little enough.

It has been necessary to spend some £100 odd on alterations to the household arrangements of the College, but against this a special donation of £50 has been received from Mr. A. C. Caughey.

Owing to the fact that the position of Treasurer has had to be changed twice during the year, it is not possible to make a comprehensive report, and these changes have also thrown a lot of extra work upon the Principal. The statement showing that the actual expenditure was less than the estimate is in itself a testimony to the very efficient management of Dr. and Mrs. Laws.

13.—That in view of the great importance to the Church of Leadership in Religious Education, it is essential that students for the ministry should receive special training for such leadership. The Conference expresses its appreciation of the training in this respect now being given to the students, and resolves that, in connection with the Sunday School to be worked under the direction of the College staff, practical training shall be provided in both Sunday School and Bible Class work.

JUBILEE OF THE COLLEGE.

The Conference records its profound gratitude to God for His blessing upon the work of our Theological College during the past 50 years. It recalls the faithful work of past Principals and Tutors, who by their wise instruction and personal influence have left their mark upon successive generations of students; it rejoices in the efficiency of the training given, as seen in the able work of so many devoted ministers of our Church, and, in thankfulness for a half-century of blessing, it resolves to give itself to the work of maintaining and developing the College with unabated vigour.

D .-- NEW COLLEGE AND HOSTEL SCHEME.

(For Resolutions of last Conference, see Minutes, pp. 88-89).

The development of the New College Scheme has received very careful attention during the year, and the Board reports as follows:—

1. That after full discussion it was decided to promote an Architectural Competition throughout the Dominion for the securing of a suitable Design for the New College. This has been widely advertised and the response from architects has been highly satisfactory. The Competition closes on January 21st, 1926, and the successful Designs will be exhibited at Conference. The Jury of Award is Professor C. P. Knight, M.A., B.Arch., of the University College, Mr. F L. Moogie, of Wilson & Moodie, Architects, and the following members of the College Board: Rev. E. Drake, Rev. A. B. Chappell, M.A., and Messrs. S. J. Ambury, J. Stanton, I.L.B., and the Principal.

2. That arrangements are being made for the prosecution of the canvass for subscriptions next year. It is proposed to seek the cooperation of laymen in various parts of the Dominion, who shall co-operate with the Principal in this work. The total sum required to carry out the portion of the Scheme at present proposed is £30,000, of which sum £11,000 is in hand from the Centenary Thanksgiving Fund, the sale of the Epsom site, and other sources. Suitable arrangements are to be made for the initiation of the Scheme at Conference.

The Report was received and adopted. The Balance-sheet and Statement from the Treasurers was also received and adopted.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1.—That the Conference learns with pleasure of the steps that have been taken during the year to promote the New College Scheme, and especially of the successful competition for a design for the College, in which 22 architects throughout the Dominion took part.
- 2.—That the Conference approves of the arrangements which have been made by which Dr. Ranston shall reside at the College as Resident Professor during the year, thus setting the Principal free for his canvass of the Dominion.

- 3.—That, believing that the erection of the new College and the adequate training of the Ministry thereat are of first importance for the future welfare and status of our Church in the Dominion, the Conference strongly commends to Ministers, officials and our people generally the mission of the Principal in his canvass for subscriptions to the Building and Equipment Fund, and urges the most sympathetic and liberal response to the appeal.
- 4.—That the following officers be appointed:—General Secretary, Rev. Dr. Laws; Treasurers, Rev. Dr. Ranston and Mr. A. Peak; Assistant Secretary, Rev. T. A. Joughin.
- That District Committees be set up, who shall co-operate with the Principal and further his work in the respective Districts. (For list see below.)
- 6.—That a small and effective Committee, with a suitable convener, be appointed in each Circuit at the March Quarterly Meeting, which shall make arrangements for the Principal's visit, and further his mission in every possible way.
- 7.—That, in view of the fact that every church in the Connexion is directly interested in the maintenance of an effective ministry, Boards of Trustees be strongly recommended to make an annual donation for the next three years to the New College Fund.
- 8.—That the Conference expresses its hearty appreciation of the liberality of the Pitt Street Church Trustees in making a grant of £2000 from their Shops Trust Fund, and of the donation of £300 from the Prince Albert College Trust, and earnestly recommends the support of the New College Scheme to any similar Trusts in the Dominion, and also to the Board of the Connexional Fire Insurance Fund.
- 9.—That the effort be commended to the sympathetic support of our Young People throughout the Church, and that the Young Men's and Young Women's Bible Class Unions be invited to further it through the Bible Classes.
- 10.—That the College Board be requested to make a recommendation to the Conference of 1927 as to the name of the College, and as to a suitable College motto.

QUESTION XL .- What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Wesley Training College?

BOARD OF THE WESLEY TRAINING COLLEGE. REPORT OF PRINCIPAL.

I have pleasure in reporting to Conference that the present year

has been marked with continued success.

Early in last year we had practically no roll, and yet ended with 35 scholars; this year we had 68 boys in residence. This has meant alterations and additions to the existing buildings. A large verandah was glassed in and an extra dormitory built. This has enabled us to take the 68 boys, but conditions have been somewhat cramped, and to ease the position and to enable the College to meet the increasing demand, the Board has erected a new wing to accommodate an additional 60 boys and the necessary staff, together with four schoolrooms, a carpentry shop and gymnasium. In addition, the Maids' quarters have been increased, and a house for a married master has been erected. Electric light has been installed throughout the College.

These improvements are now almost completed, and it is hoped to open the College in February next with everything completed. College can now take 115 boys, and already (in the middle of December) 93 of them have been enrolled. There seems little doubt but that we

will open with the school practically full.

The number of Maori boys present this year has been disappointing. In the early part of the year a large number of applications was received, but the outbreak of the infantile paralysis epidemic and the consequent delay in opening school caused many of them to go to work and be reluctant to forego wage earning when the restrictions were removed. We have had 14 in residence throughout the year, and at present, despite the present unrest among the Maoris which makes our work more difficult, we have 15 applications.

On the scholastic side we have made satisfactory progress. Of 22 boys sent up from the sixth standard for proficiency, 15 passed that test, and 7 gained their competency. Four Maori boys gained the proficiency, and three the competency. It is too early to speak of the Matriculation

examination, but we trust our results there will be similar.

The health of the boys has been excellent; the doctor has visited the College only twice during the year, and both occasions were for quite small matters, when we felt it wise to be cautious.

The College farm is doing excellently; steps have been taken to bring into cultivation a portion of the property which has for some time been unproductive; of this area of 130 acres, over 50 acres have been

ploughed and put into crop.

The dairy is already showing the result of the pedigree stock purchased last year, and of which more were purchased this year. A small stud flock of Southdowns has been started with 30 ewes and 9 rams, and it is hoped to develop this section in the near future. The main flock is Romney, and our best profits are to be found in the raising of fat lambs.

Every effort is being made to make the farm a commercial success, as there is little use in training boys under conditions which cannot be realised on their own farms in the future.

It is not to be taken that the farm is at the zenith of prosperity—far from it; much has been done in the past ten years to improve the property, and still much remains to be done before we can reap the full possibility of the farm. It is, however, I think, not too much to say that no one who now inspects the farm will doubt that we have a property of

which we have good cause to be proud.

The key note of our work at Paerata is optimism. Much has been done, but much still remains to be done. The most important part of our work is not the farm or the buildings, but the making of Christian men with high ideals and a sound outlook on life. It is this side of our work that we must keep most clearly before us. We have a big trust in our properties, but the characters of 115 boys is a trust infinitely more inportant.

The welfare of our College at Paerata and the welfare of the whole Church are intimately joined, for from the College will come many of our future Ministers and Missionaries, many of our teachers and

Christian laymen.

In conclusion, I would like to express my appreciation of the work done by the College staff. Growth means many difficulties and adjustments, and consequent work and worry, and yet no difficulty has arisen that has not been met with cheerfulness and keenness. I would particularly stress my debt to Mrs. Clark, who has played such a large part in surmounting these difficulties and adjustments.

REPORT ON PROPERTIES HELD BY WESLEY COLLEGE BOARD.

Last year a brief report was made to Conference on the properties held by the Board, and I am again asked to briefly report on our work for the year.

- 1. Paerata Farm.—Last year a profit of nearly £300 was shown. At the time of writing, this year's accounts are not made up, but there is every reason to believe a considerable increase in profits will be shown. Everything is going on satisfactorily, the land over the railway line, hitherto untouched, is being brought under cultivation, and in a short time will be made as profitable as the rest of the farm. Our pedigree stock is doing even better than expected. We have spent money freely in procuring up-to-date plant, but by so doing are greatly reducing the cost of production. Since last Conference our College buildings have been doubled in size, the cost of buildings at Paerata to date, is over £33,000. The Principal's report will deal fully with College doings.
- 2. Grafton Road.—There has been no change in this property during the year.

3. Waikowhai.—A large number of sections have been leased during the year, the annual income now stands at £600. We are spending a considerable amount in roading this property, but believe that within twelve months we shall double our income.

4. Three Kings.—Nothing has been done in cutting up this property, but we hope during the coming year to deal with a portion of it. The Borough Council is making a concrete road along one frontage of

our land.

5. Mt. Albert Road.—Only a few sections have been sold since last report, but we have spent nearly £2000 in draining and fencing. This will greatly improve the whole property, and already increased rents will more than pay interest on the expenditure. We are not anxious to hurry the sale of this farm.

- 1.—That the Conference expresses its pleasure at the success of Wesley College during the past year, and for the provision that has been made to accommodate 115 boys. It congratulates the Principal, Mr. R. C. Clark, M.A., and assures him of its great appreciation of his work at the College.
- That the thanks of the Conference be tendered to Mr. J. Veale for his splendid services in connection with the College and its properties.

That the Conference cannot give an en officio seat in Conference to the Principal. That, as Wesley Training College has been given the right of direct representation in Conference, this representation shall be by the Board electing one of its members as a Lay Representative.

QUESTION XLI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Connexional Funds?

1.—SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

Draft Report of Board of Management, 1925.

The Board again has pleasure in submitting its Annual Report to the Conference. The Revenue Account and Balance-sheet also are presented herewith. These show the income and expenditure for the year, and the nature and amount of the investments. It will be seen that the total revenue for the year was £11,951 0s. 10d., and the expenditure £8,108 18s. 6d., leaving £3,842 2s. 4d. to be added to the Accumulated Funds, after adding £100 to the Reserve Fund. The Accumulated Funds now amount to £124,738 8s. 3d., and the Investment Fluctuation Reserve Fund to £1,800, making a gross total of £126,538 8s. 3d.

Of the Accumulated Funds, £90,450 is investment on mortgage, bearing interest at rates varying from six to seven per cent. £32,306 15s. is investment in Government and Local Body Debentures. The

interest earned for the year amounted to £7,243 10s. 9d., being an average on the Mean Funds of about six per cent. The expenses of management were £273 1s. 2d., which is less than 7½ per cent. of the income from subscriptions and Circuit Levies.

During the year £7,453 5s. 2d. has been paid as Annuities, and £210 as Furniture Grants. The number of Supernumeraries now on the Fund is thirty-seven, and thirty-seven Ministers' Widows are receiving annuities, a total of seventy-four. Four Supernumeraries have died during the year, each leaving a widow as an Annuitant on the Fund. Early in the year it became evident that Rev. John Dawson was no longer able to carry on his work for the N.Z. Alliance, and a difficulty arose as to his relation to the Supernumerary Fund. He applied to be made a Supernumerary as from the first of April, 1925. No provision is made in the Rules for such a case as his. After conferring with the Chairman of the District, the Board recommended the President of the Conference to declare Mr. Dawson a Supernumerary. This the President agreed to, and the Conference is now requested to confirm his action in the matter.

The arrears of personal subscriptions and interest thereon amount to £435 10s. 7d. This includes the amounts due in lieu of Circuit Levies by Ministers who are resting. The following table shows how the arrears are:—

As compared with 1924 these figures show a small decrease in the amount of arrears, and a small increase in interest due. Ministers received from England have agreed to pay £887 6s. 7d. for the purchase of benefits in the Fund, and £587 6s. 7d. has been paid in cash, leaving £300 to be paid in the future. £69 is still outstanding for the purchase of benefits by Ministers who joined the Fund in connection with Methodist Union in 1913, besides interest amounting to £27 1s. 9d. The Board has not yet seen its way to proceed with the erection of a building on the property which it reported to last Conference as having been purchased. The matter is being carefully watched, and a special committee has been set up to consider the question of making a beginning with the building at an early date. Meanwhile the buildings on the property are bringing in a small rental, and the property is steadily increasing in value.

The Benevolent Branch.

During the year the Board has made grants to different persons, principally widows with very small annuities. The amount distributed was £157. The income for this branch of the Fund was derived from interest on investments, £66 16s. 4d.; contributions from Connexional Fire Insurance Fund, £50; and donations, £43 7s. 6d. The number of donors is very limited, and an increase would be heartily welcomed.

Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund.

The position of this Fund is set forth in the Statement of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance-sheet. £87 12s. 8d. has been paid to Home Missionaries who have retired, and £60 has been returned to the Treasurers of the Home Mission Fund in accordance with the Rules. The assets of the Fund have increased by £991 16s. 7d., including £100 received from the Centenary Fund, and now stand at £3742 13s. 9d. The interest earned during the year was £188 9s. 11d. This represents an average of nearly 6 per cent.

The North Canterbury District Synod referred to the Board for consideration and report to Conference the recommendation of the Home Mission Board on the Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund. The

following are the Board's recommendations:-

(1) Add N.B. to Rule 9, as follows:—All moneys derived from (c) and (d) shall be part of the capital of the Fund, and only the interest thereon shall be regarded as part of the annual income available for distribution under Rule 20.

(2) Rule 20 (b) to read:-Increasing the retiring allowances of Home Missionaries who have contributed for seven years continuously to the Fund, and who have complied with the Rules relating to the

conditions of status.

- (3) The Board does not recommend the deletion of Rule 22, and the consequent amendment of Rule 23. It would point out that in the case of Ministers resigning at any period of their ministry, the Rules do not provide for interest to be paid to them, nor do Deaconesses who retire before serving seven years receive interest on their contributions, unless the retirement is beause of the failure of health.
- (4) The Board approves the finding of the North Canterbury Synod with regard to the transfer of moneys accrued for the retirement of Senior Home Missionaries, viz., that such moneys be transferred to the Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund in three annual instalments.

Deaconess Retiring Fund.

As the number of Deaconesses employed is still small, the assets of the Fund are still on a limited scale, and it is only by being invested with the Supernumerary Fund that any considerable amount can be earned in the way of interest. The assets now amount to £912 5s. 2d., an increase during the year of £277 2s. 2d. The interest earned was £45 10s. 2d., or nearly 6 per cent. on the Mean Funds.

Board for 1926.

The retiring Lay member of the Board is Mr. J. C. Prudhoe, who towards the close of the year resigned his membership of the Board. The Board accepted the resignation with great regret, and placed on record its appreciation of his valuable services. The following are nominated as members of the Board for 1926:—The Connexional Secretary, Revs. W. Baumber, E. D. Patchett, P. R. Paris, J. Guy, W. A. Hay, Messrs. W. H. Seed (Treasurer), G. Bowron, A. F. Drayton, A. Borrows, P. J. Sharpe and E. W. Reed.

Amendment of Rules.

The Board recommends that the Rule on page 111 of the Book of Laws, under the heading "Miscellaneous," 58 (e), be amended by adding the words, "and any Resolutions of the Conference thereon, or relating to medical examinations."

2.—CHILDREN'S FUND.

The Balance-sheet was received and adopted.

RESOLUTIONS.

That the Treasurers, Rev. W. Rowe and Mr. E. Kellow, be thanked for their services, and that they be reappointed.

That the Wellington District Executive be directed to consider the matter of setting up a Committee to administer the Fund, and that a report be made to Synod and Conference.

3.—CONTINGENT FUND.

(For Statement of Income and Expenditure, see Appendix.)

(For Table of Levies, see Appendix.)

The Balance-sheet was received and adopted.

The Estimates for 1926 were adopted, and a levy of 8% was authorised.

RESOLUTIONS.

That the Treasurers, the Rev. W. Slade, M.A., and Mr. J. H. Blackwell, be thanked for their services, and that they be reappointed.

That a grant of £25 for a case of affliction be paid.

That the following be a consultative committee in connection with the administration of the Fund:—The Contingent Fund Treasurers, the Chairman of North Canterbury District, the Connexional Secretary, with Messrs. J. A. Flesher and A. F. Drayton.

That such members of the consultative committee as are present at the Conference, together with three others who shall be nominated at the beginning of Conference, be a committee to consider all matters affecting disbursements from this Fund.

That all proposals for grants from the Fund shall first be considered by

this Committee before being ratified by Conference. That the best thanks of Conference be presented to Mr. Isaac J. Wilson, A.P.A.N.Z., for his services as Auditor.

4.—REMOVAL EXPENSES FUND.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE, 1925.

The Removal Expenses Fund has run smoothly during its first year of work. The Committee desires to thank all its correspondents for their courteous assistance in arriving at what is deemed just decisions.

The year commenced with a credit balance of £1026 16s. 5d.; this has now increased to £1115 1s. 6d., with £361 9s. 4d. outstanding at 30th September, 1925.

£800 is on deposit with the Supernumerary Fund Board, and £296 8s. 11d. at the Post Office Savings Bank, and a current account balance at the Bank of New Zealand of £18 12s. 7d.

Last year's report estimated that the average yearly removal bill for the whole Dominion would be £985. The past year shows this cost at £412 2s. 5d. Next year will bring a much heavier charge, as a larger number of Ministers will be moving. The Committee recommends that next year's levy be reduced to $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on stipends of Ministers.

The following alterations to the resolutions and regulations of the Fund are recommended to Synod. Minutes of Conference, 1925, page 101:—

(1) Delete resolution 4.

(2) Resolution 5 to read:—4. "Any Circuit that is reduced to a Home Mission Station shall be entitled to a refund of all levies paid by it into this fund since the last removal."

(8) Resolution 5:—"When a Home Mission Station is constituted a Circuit it shall immediately participate in the full benefits of this

Fund."

(4) Add Regulation 14:—"The Treasurers of this Fund are empowered to advance a reasonable portion of the removal expenses of any Minister who is moving in harmony with the rules of the Fund."

(5) After Regulations 3 and 4 insert:—"N.B.—Paragraphs 3 and 4 do not apply to Probationers."

The Report was received.

The Balance-sheet was received and adopted.

RESOLUTIONS.

That a levy of 2% on stipends, and of £4 per annum on Departments for each minister be authorised.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

 Removal expenses shall be paid only on account of the Minister or Probationer, his wife, children, and adopted children, and (in the case only of a Minister who is a widower or bachelor), a housekeeper.

2. Removals within the bounds of a Circuit by appointment of Confer-

ence, but not otherwise, shall be a charge upon this Fund.

3. All Ministers applying to be removed from their Circuits before the expiration of three years, shall pay a proportion of their removal expenses; two-thirds if they remove after one year; one-third if they remove after two years—unless it can be shown to Conference that such removal is necessary.

This shall not apply to Probationers.

- 4. All Circuits seeking a change of Ministers before the expiration of three years shall pay towards the cost of such removals: two-thirds if a change takes place after one year; one-third if the change takes place after two years—unless it can be shown to Conference that such removal is necessary.

 This shall not apply to Probationers.
- Removals shall be effected by the cheapest route, first-class fare being allowed by rail or steamer.
- 6. Goods shall be sent by the cheapest route.
- 7. That when a Minister becomes a Supernumerary (his travelling expenses from the Circuit in which he terminates his active work to the place in which he intends to reside in New Zealand, shall be paid—up to £20; by this Fund, provided that such removal takes place during the Connexional year following the Conference at which he was made a Supernumerary.
- 8. That the removal expenses to their first place of residence in New Zealand of the widows and families of Ministers who die in active work, shall be paid by this Fund—up to £20—provided such removal takes place during the Connexional year following the Conference at which the death was reported.
- 9. That the levy each year shall be determined by the estimated expenditure, and shall be paid in equal quarterly instalments.
- All accounts for removal expenses shall be submitted to the Treasurers, with vouchers (except for railway, coaching and steamer fares) not later than April 30th.
- That not more than £2 2s. shall be allowed for packing and unpacking.
- 12. That when a Minister receives permission to rest for a year, his removal expenses shall be paid from the Circuit to which he was last appointed to the Circuit in which he resumes his active work.
- 13. That insurance shall be paid on all goods in transit.
- 14. Circuits that are reduced to the status of Home Mission Stations, shall be entitled to a refund of all levies paid by it into this Fund since the last removal
- 15. That where, on account of a shortage of Ministers, a Circuit receives a Ministerial Supply, such Circuit shall continue to pay the Circuit levies and shall receive the full benefits of the Fund.
- That when a Home Mission Station is constituted a Circuit, it shall immediately participate in the full benefits of the Fund.
- 17. The Treasurers of this Fund are empowered to advance a reasonable portion of the Removal Expenses of any Minister who is moving in harmony with the Rules of the Fund.
- That the following be the Committee for 1926:—Rev. W. A. Hay, E. D. Patchett, P. R. Paris, B. J. James, W. H. Speer, and H. L. Blamires, Messrs. W. H. Seed, A. A. Sandford, M. Kershaw, F. Thompson, W. Dobbs, H. W. Heslop, and A. Newman.

That the Treasurers, Rev. E. D. Patchett and Mr. A. A. Sandford, be thanked for their services, and that the Rev. W. A. Hay and Mr. A. A. Sandford be appointed Treasurers.

That the Convener, Rev. B. J. James, be thanked, and reappointed.

That the Opotiki Circuit share in the benefits of the Fund, less the amount already returned to the Circuit from the Fund.

QUESTION XLII.--What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Foreign Missions?

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS, 1925.

Most encouraging reports have come to hand during the year from the Mission Field with regard to the progress of the work. Writing of Bougainville, where the work is still in the pioneer stage, the Chairman of the District states that "the work is going ahead by leaps and bounds." The designation of Mr. Voyce for appointment next year will make possible much needed advance on this island. The health of our missionaries has on the whole been satisfactory, and the work has gone on without interruption, except as furlough arrangements have necessitated the absence of workers.

Furlough and Deputations.

Arrangements for deputations from the field this year have been very satisfactory. The Rev. and Mrs. V. le C. Binet gave two months to the North Island, and the Rev. and Mrs. Tom Dent gave the same time to the South Island. Both deputations enjoyed good health, were able to keep every appointment, and succeeded in thoroughly interesting their audiences with the splendid story they had to tell of successful work in the Solomons.

Deputation arrangements for next year do not promise so well. Mr. Cropp is over-due for furlough, and should be the deputation for the North, but at present it is not advisable for him to leave his work on Bougainville sufficiently long to permit of a visit to New Zealand. The Rev. J. R. Metcalfe will be the deputation for the South Island.

Mr. and Mrs. Chivers are due for furlough, and are expected in the Dominion shortly.

Mr. and Mrs. N. J. Jenkin.

The visit of Mr. N. J. Jenkin to many of the northern Circuits was greatly appreciated. His appeal was largely to the laymen of the Church, and should result in increased interest on their part in the work of Foreign Missions. Mr. Jenkin generously refused to accept anything in payment of his travelling expenses, making the whole a contribution to the funds of the Missionary Society.

Missionary Sisters.

Sisters May Barnett, Lilian Berry and Ethel McMillan are on furlough after a strenuous term of service. Nurse Lily White and Sister Jean Dalziel have been accepted for appointment, and are already on the field. Sister Lily going to Bilua and Sister Jean to Choiseul. The Women's Missionary Union Executive willingly undertook the responsibility for the support of the additional Sister. Miss McDonald, of the Deaconess House, and Miss Adkin, of Levin, have been accepted for training, and are soon to enter St. Helens Hospital, Wellington.

Medical Mission.

After careful consideration, the Board has decided to send Dr. Sayers to the School of Tropical Medicine in London. He will probably be leaving in November as a ship's medical officer. It is hoped that he will be ready to proceed to the Mission Field towards the end of next year.

Moving Picture.

In accordance with the decision of last Conference, the Board has purchased the Dominion rights of the motion picture "The Transformed Isle." A projector has also been purchased, enabling the picture to be used in our own buildings. The picture has been shown in a great many

places this year with most satisfactory results, and it is proposed next year to make use of it in every country Circuit where electric light is available.

Publications.

Our publications continue to find favour with our people. "The Open Door," under the editorship of the General Secretary, has a circulation of 5500, and "The Lotu," under the editorship of the Rev. E. P. Blamires, 6200. There is still room for increase in the circulation of each paper.

Finance.

The financial year does not close until the end of December, so that it is impossible to give the result of the appeal this year. The amount received up to October 15th is £8151. This is only about £500 in advance of the amount in hand at that date last year, and does not promise well for obtaining the amount required this year, viz., £15,000. Failure to raise the amount required will involve serious consequences for the work in the Solomons. The Rev. J. F. Goldie reports that it is anticipated that the Mission District may reach £3500, an advance of 2500 on the estimated income for the year. Legacies of £401 10s. 8d. from the late Mrs. Sowden, of Christchurch; £50 from the late Miss Butterick, of Wakanui, Ashburton; and £312 10s. on account of the legacy of £500 from the late William Winstone, of Mt. Albert, Auckland, have been received during the year.

Centenary Fund

The Centenary Fund Treasurer reported to the Conference that £5000 would be available from the Centenary Fund for Foreign Missions. Later in the year the Board of Missions was informed that a mistake had been made in the allocations, and that the amount available for Foreign Missions would only be £4300. This will probably involve an alteration in the allocation of the money as decided by the last Conference. The sum of £1500 has been received from the Centenary Fund Treasurers during the year, making a total received of £4000.

Waikawau Trust.

The sum of £900 is held by the Waikawau Trust Board, and is earmarked for the purchase of a printing press. The Board hopes to be able to provide the Mission Field with a suitable printing press next year, and enquiries are now being made as to the most suitable machine for the work which will have to be done.

The Chairman of the District reports concerning the sawmill that the big plant is now in full operation. This is of great importance, in view of the large building programme ahead.

The Board is co-operating with other Missionary Societies in providing exhibits, curios and literature for the Missionary Court in the Dunedin

Exhibition.

During the year the Board has taken possession of new offices in the Probert Chambers, which is the property of our Theological College. We are now provided with suitable accommodation for carrying on the work of the Missionary Society

The General Secretary, in addition to the administrative duties of the office, has undertaken deputation work in 69 Circuits and 6 Home Mission Stations. The Rev. G. T. Marshall, Clerical Treasurer, has carried out all his duties in his usual careful and efficient manner. The Board once more acknowledges its deep indebtedness to the Women's Auxiliaries for the splendid assistance they continue to render in supporting all the Missionary Sisters on the field. As a separate report is presented by the Women's Missionary Union it is not necessary to give a detailed account of the work of the Auxiliaries.

The thanks of the Board are presented to District Committees, District Secretaries, Circuit Committees and Secretaries, Deputations, Collectors and all workers who have rendered assistance to the missionary cause during the year.

METHODIST FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY OF NEW ZEALAND.

The Treasurers' Report for the Year ended December 31st, 1925.

The Treasurers have pleasure in presenting to the Mission Board the Balance-sheet and Financial Statements for the year ended 31st December, 1925. The accounts have been duly audited, and the Auditor's certificate is attached.

The Balance-sheet shows that the assets of the Society exceed the liabilities by £2078 10s, an improvement upon the position at the beginning of the year, when the capital account was overdrawn to the amount of £193 18s 4d.

Legacies to the sum of £951 0s 5d have been received during the year. Of this sum, £500 has been placed to Working Capital Fund, £451 0s 5d to the Equipment Fund. £1500 has been received from the Centenary Fund, of which £750 has been placed to the Medical Mission Fund, and £750 has been used to pay the fifth and last instalment of the debt taken over from the Australasian Missionary Society.

The income for the year, including the £750 from the Centenary Fund for debt reduction, but excluding the other items mentioned above, was £17,650 18s 11d. The expenditure was £15.87s 10s 7d—an excess of income over expenditure of £1772 8s 4d. This reduces the general deficit to £4110 6s 9d. The New Zealand contributions show an increase over 1924 of £866 19s 2d, and the Solomon Island contributions an increase of £1269 15s 8d.

The Banga Plantation Account, which is kept separate from the general accounts of the Society, shows a deficit on the year's working of £137 19s 11d. When this is compared with the deficit of £669 2s 0d in 1924, it will be seen that the Plantation is increasing rapidly in productiveness.

Viewing the improved condition of our funds at the present time, we thank God and take courage.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION.

Auxiliaries.

There are at present 38 Auxiliaries affiliated with the Union, which number shows an increase of 5 for the year's work. The names of those newly affiliated are:—Hamilton East, Petone, Wakefield, Matamata and Rangiora.

The membership stands at 2419, an increase of 59 on the previous year.

Extension Work.

After the Conference in Hastings in October, 1924, the President and Secretary visited the Nelson and Marlborough Districts, where, in some towns, new Auxiliaries were formed, while, in others, interest was stimulated in Auxiliaries already existing.

Mrs. Avery has visited Raetihi, Marton and Stratford.

In Wellington the members have visited Petone and formed an Auxiliary there; while the Auxiliary at Rangiora is due to the efforts of the Christchurch members.

Missionary Sisters.

On the Foreign Field there are seven Sisters supported by the Two of these have gone out this year, viz., Sister Lily White, a Deaconess and a fully trained nurse, and Sister Jean Dalziel, a Deacon-

ess, who has also had experience in the St. Helen's Hospital.

At present there are two applicants-Miss MacDonald, a trained Deaconess, of Christchurch, and Miss Adkin, of Levin-who, having been accepted for Foreign work, are waiting to enter St. Helen's Hospital, Wellington, where they will receive a year's training before taking up their new duties in the Solomons.

On the Home Field, working among the Maoris, there are two Sisters who are supported by the Union, viz., Sister Eleanor Dobby at

Hokianga, and Sister Marion Fabrin, at Te Kuiti.

Literature Department.

To quite a large extent interest among the members of the Auxiliaries is sustained by the reading of letters from the Sisters on the Field.

In order that all might have the benefit of this, it has been arranged that these letters go to the Literature Secretary, Mrs. Newcomb, who has them typed. Copies are then despatched to every Auxiliary.

Conference.

This year the Conference will be held in Dunedin, from October 28th, to October 31st, inclusive. So far this has been an annual fixture. but a remit will come before the members this session suggesting that the Conference be only bi-annual or triennial.

Box Department.

Under the able management of Mrs Smethurst, Dominion Box Organiser, this department has been well supported, and large supplies of gifts have gone to the Missionaries and the Sisters.

Finance.

The Treasurer has this year received the sum of £2092 8s. 5d. Credit Balance from last year was £510 1s. 7d., thus bringing the total income to £2602 10s. for 1925. The total income for the previous year was £1912 12s. 8d., of which £277 4s. 3d. was the Balance brought forward, thus it is seen that the increase on the sum actually raised during the year is £457.

Union Executive.

The Union Executive is at present in Auckland, and will next month enter upon its third and final year of office. At the coming Conference the seat of the next Executive will be chosen.

REPORT.

The Report and Financial Statements were received and adopted.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 2. That the expenditure on the Mission Field be limited to £14,500, exclusive of amounts voted from the Equipment Fund for buildings.
- 3. BANGA PLANTATION.
 - 1. The Conference expresses its satisfaction at the favourable character of the report on Banga Plantation, congratulates the chairman and those responsible for the results achieved, and trusts that a suitable manager for the Plantation may soon be found.
 - That all profits derived from the Banga Plantation, after the discharge of liabilities on it, be devoted to educational, industrial, agricultural, and medical work.
 - 3. That the accumulated deficiency on the General Fund of £4110 6s 9d be transferred to the Banga Plantation Account, and that the interest due from this account to the General Fund be 5 per cent., instead of 6½ per cent.

4. INSURANCE.

That an Insurance and Depreciation Fund be established, and that at least 1 per cent of the missionary income in New Zealand be paid into the Fund annually.

5. WORKING CAPITAL FUND.

That the following alterations be made in the regulations of the Working Capital Fund, Minutes of Conference 1920, P. 94, Par. 2:—

- That it be the aim of the Church to build up a Fund which shall be not less than the amount required for one year's working expenditure.
- 2. That the following take the place of Paragraph 5.

That legacies up to the amount of £500 per annum be devoted to the Working Capital Fund, and that any money accruing from legacies above the amount of £500 be dealt with from time to time at the discretion of the Board.

- 6. That the General Secretary of the Australasian Board of Missions and the President of the New South Wales Conference be requested to arrange for the ordination of the Rev. A. H. Cropp in Sydney.
- 7. That Dr. Sayers spend not more than three months in hospital work at the conclusion of the session of the School of Tropical Medicine, and that the aim be for Dr Sayers to farewell at the Conference of 1927, and to leave for the Mission Field immediately afterwards.
- 8. That the editors of "The Open Door" (Rev W. A. Sinclair) and of "The Lotu" (Rev E. P. Blamires) be thanked for their services, and re-appointed.

9. SEMI-JUBILEE OF THE MISSION.

 That a special deputation be sent from New Zealand to visit the Mission Field on the occasion of the celebration of the Semi-Jubilee of the Mission in 1927.

- 2. That, if possible, arrangements be made for the deputation to be on the field on May 23, the day on which the first Service was held in 1902.
- 3. That special services and meetings be held in the Home Churches on Sunday, May 22nd, and on Monday, May 23rd.
- 4. That the special feature of the year shall be the appointment of the first medical man to the Mission Field, and the establishment of medical work on a wider basis.
- 5. That a souvenir number of "The Open Door," and a supplement to "The Methodist Times," be published.
- 6. That the story of the Mission be published, and that the Rev J. F. Goldie, in conjunction with Mrs Goldie, be requested to undertake the preparation of the book, sufficient furlough to be given to enable Mr Goldie to do the work.
- 7. That the question of the number of the deputation be considered by the Board during the year, in consultation with Mr Goldie, and report to the Annual Meeting of the Board. That the Women's Missionary Union be requested to consider the possibility of representation of the Union on the deputation.
- 8. That the Board consider during the year the securing of another film during the visit of the deputation to the Mission Field.

10. TONGA CENTENARY.

- 1. That the hearty congratulations of the Methodist Church of New Zealand be tendered to the Methodist Church of Tonga upon its celebration of the completion of 100 years of continuous service in the Friendly Islands. We rejoice in the splendid record of missionary enterprise that has overcome the old heathen conditions, and brought to the Tongan people the blessings of an advanced Christian civilisation. We express our admiration of the noble missionary work done by the native Christian people, and acknowledge our own obligation to the Tongan Church for the gift of many devoted ministers and teachers to aid in the evangelisation of the Solomon Islands. We rejoice that the centenary of the work in Tonga is being celebrated by a united Church, and pray that the Divine blessing may continue to crown its work in the interests of the Kingdom of God.
- 2. That the Rev W. A. Sinclair be appointed to represent the New Zealand Church at the centenary celebrations in Tonga.
- 3. The Conference expresses its great satisfaction that Miss Gwen. Blamires and Miss Ruth Fabrin, two well-equipped New Zealand teachers, have volunteered and been accepted for educational service with the Methodist Church of Tonga, and prays that the blessing of God may attend them as they take up this important work in the Friendly Islands.

11. INCORPORATION OF THE BOARD.

That during this year the Board consider the advisability of having the Board of Foreign Missions incorporated.

12. WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION.

The Conference expresses its gratification at the success attained by the Women's Missionary Union, appreciates the splendid educational work it is doing in the Church, and prays that God's blessing may rest. on all future undertakings.

That the Women's Missionary Union be requested to consider the possibility of undertaking full responsibility for the support of Missionary Sisters, including all allowances and payments on their behalf.

- 13. That Question 31 in the order of Synod business be enlarged to include "The Lotu," as well as "The Open Door."
- 14. That all male candidates for the Mission Field be given an opportunity to gain knowledge of the working of an internal combustion engine.
- 15. That the question of the rota of the retirement of distant members be considered by the Board during the year, and a report presented thereon to the next Annual Meeting.
- 16. That the constitution of the Board of Missions be amended to provide for the addition of five members resident in Auckland, one of whom shall be a lady.
- 17. That the Rev. G. T. Marshall and Mr J. W. Court be heartily thanked for their services, and be re-appointed.
- 18. That the following be the Board of Missions for 1926: The President of the Conference (Rev. P. N. Knight), the General Secretary (Rev. W. A. Sinclair), the Treasurers (Rev. G. T. Marshall and Mr J. W. Court), the Chairman of the Solomon Islands District (Rev. J. F. Goldie), Mesdames G. Bowron, T. R. Hodder, T. H. Stevens, Miss Carr, Miss J. Buttle, the Chairman of the Auckland District (Rev. E. Drake), Revs. Dr. Laws, Dr. Ranston, C. H. Olds, A. Ashcroft, T. W. Vealie, J. E. Parsons, H. Ryan, Samuel Lawry, M. A. Rugby Pratt, W. It expresses profound appreciation of the sacrificial giving of the members of the Church on the Mission Field and sends to them its heartiest thanks and greetings.

QUESTION XLIII.—What are the Resolutions of Conference on the Home Mission and Church Extension Fund?

HOME MISSION REPORT.

The blessing of Almighty God has been manifestly upon the activities of the Department during the year, and the various branches of the work have been progressively developed by strenuous labour on

the part of Committee and Staff.
Under the general guidance of the Board, the Executive and sub-Committees, and the District Committees, have given effective oversight to those different phases of our Church Life and Work for which the Department is responsible to the Conference. Almost all of the District Committees have shewn both wisdom and zeal, and also a real spirit of helpfulness, in the way they have handled their heavy responsibilities, and they have placed not only their own Districts, but the whole Connexion under a debt of gratitude. Certain of the District Committees, however, while doing useful work, have been much behind the majority in manifestation of interest and enthusiasm concerning the constructive part of the programme of the Department, and the Board would be grateful to see them endeavouring to draw up level with the others.

1. Spiritual Advance.-

This Movement has made itself felt in every district, with varying but real success. In some Circuits great and permanent results have been achieved, and on the whole the year's organised Spiritual Advance Movement has been justified many times over by its results. In this however, as in many other similar matters, the Districts and Circuits that have the greatest need for such a Movement seem least conscious of their need. Indeed, a number of Circuits and Home Mission Stations have scarcely realised as yet that such a Movement is afoot, and it may be at least another year before they even begin to feel its impulse. For the sake, therefore, not only of those Circuits that are reaping such a fine harvest from the Movement, but also of those that are as yet almost untouched, it is imperative that the Movement be continued.

The Board therefore recommends:-

- (a) That at least one special series of Mission Services be held at each church and preaching place every year.
- (b) That more definite and frequent appeals for immediate decisions, and for reconsecrations be made in the ordinary services.
- (c) That greater emphasis be placed upon the spiritual value of the Communion and Covenant Services.
- (d) That Church Membership Preparatory Classes be given a prominent place in the yearly programme of each church, and that public reception services be held at least once a year.
- (e) That all ministers, officials, and other church workers be strongly urged to concentrate, with careful thought, prayer and enthusiasm, their best efforts upon the vital spiritual work of the Church.
- (f) That the Department should continue to produce and circulate literature similar to that sent out during the year.
- (g) That Resolutions 5 and 6 on page 114, 1925 Min. of Conference be reaffirmed.

2. Evangelistic Work.—

The District Committees have, in most cases, found Ministers and Home Missionaries and Lay Preachers very willing to render service in special Evangelistic Work. One of the most encouraging results achieved has been the discovery in some of the brethren of evangelistic gifts hitherto unsuspected. The further development of these gifts is a duty they owe to the Kingdom of Christ. Scores of successful Missions have been held throughout the Dominion, both in city and country. It is to be regretted, however, that in some cases the preparation has been very imperfect, and the local minister and people seemed to expect the Missioner to bring a revival, and, in some cases also, a congregation, in his handbag.

Our Home Mission Evangelist (Mr. Hooper) has done good work in some of the more needy areas, and his services are still very much in demand. Although exceptional weather conditions this year handicapped many of the Missions, much good work has been accomplished, and the Circuits visited by the Evangelist are stronger spiritually as a result of the Missions held.

Preliminary arrangements are now well in hand for the visit of Gipsy Smith next year. The Gipsy is due to arrive in New Zealand in August, and will conduct missions in Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch and Dunedin. The Gipsy will be accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Young, who have rendered invaluable assistance to the Gipsy in his great British campaigns. Mr. Young is a gifted musician, and Mrs. Young is a talented worker and speaker. The Gipsy, while a loyal

Methodist, desired to come to New Zealand as the ambassador of all the evangelical churches; therefore the Board approached our sister Churches seeking their co-operation. Very cordial replies were received, and representatives have been appointed to co-operate with our own representatives as a Committee to organise and control the whole of the arrangements for the New Zealand Gipsy Smith Campaign. The Dominion may confidently anticipate a real spiritual uplift as a result of this visit from one who is recognised to be the greatest of living evangelists.

3. Church Extension .-

The 1925 Conference made new appointments to, or revived old ones at the following places:—Wairoa, Sumner, Mokau, Broadwood, Kaihu, Tuakau and Tuatapere, and the districts concerned should be permanently influenced for good by these extensions of our activities. Almost, if not quite as important, is the local extension work being

done by established Circuits and Stations.

The Spiritual Advance Movement has had the effect of making some of our Circuits and Stations more missionary in their local, spiritual and social activities. Many preaching places have thus been opened or re-opened, and the Board is of the opinion that Conference should direct that all District Committees give still closer attention to this matter, and encourage Circuits to recognise their responsibility with regard to adjacent "No Man's Land." With renewed spiritual vitality in our churches and the increase of Lay Preachers and Missionary Bands, workers should be available for this urgent work of evangelising the needy areas adjacent to and some cases indeed, within the Circuit boundaries.

4. Aided Circuits and Home Mission Stations .-

For many years the "Watchmen" of our Church have been calling attention to the urgent need for inspirational and organising work by some trained and gifted visitor in the struggling Circuits and H.M. Stations. This need is now being met by the Department. After giving the necessary time and attention to the opening of Wairoa with the Tent Mission, the Assistant Superintendent visited Paraparaumu, Taumarunui, Ngarurwahia, Huntly, Whakatane, Opotiki, Apiti, Hawarden, Cromwell, Roxburgh, Milton, Bluff, and Nightcaps. At almost all these places Mr. Olds remained long enough to confer with all the people interested in the activities of our Church. Inspirational services and meetings were held, assistance was given to local organisation and finance, and almost invariably a general uplift of a solid character resulted from the visit.

5. Literature and Colporteur Work .-

This sub-Department is at yet but in the initial stages of development. The Appeal for the inaugural fund of £1000 has met with general approval. But it is very necessary for us to go slowly in the development of this important work until we have a reasonable amount of cash in hand. Meanwhile, we have been completing our scheme of organisation and methods of work for this sub-Department. The Board is getting a suitable motor van built, and the L. and C. sub-Committee is securing a small stock of suitable literature.

6. Home Mission Anniversary Services and Meetings .-

The 1924 Conference decided that there should be, in connection with the Circuit H.M. Anniversary, a visitation of every Circuit by "a Deputation of a type that should be both inspirational and educational,

and which, especially in the case of the weaker Circuits and H.M. Stations, should seek to assist and give impetus to the local work, as well as gain support for the Home Mission Fund."

It will be generally acknowledged that this ideal has been reasonably attained during the two years in which the Maori Parties have

rendered such effective service.

The General Superintendent is, however, strongly of the opinion that an effort should be made in 1926 to use the gifts of Home Missionaries, Deaconesses and Ministers with Home Mission experience.

7. Agents and Appointments .-

Through sickness and other causes it was found necessary to alter several appointments early in the year. The Board was fortunate, however, in that in every case, the District Chairman, and the Stations concerned, were satisfied, if not gratified, with the alteration. The appointments referred to now stand thus:—Lawrence, Bridgman; Maori Hill, Foot; Broad Bay, Hemmings; Methven, Henderson; Broadwood, McDonald; Whakatane, Tulloch.

The Balance-sheet was received and adopted, also the Estimates of Income and Expenditure and the Financial Statement of the Colporteur and Literature Fund.

The Home Mission Report was received and adopted, with slight alterations as hereunder:-

GENERAL RESOLUTIONS.

I. Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund.

- (a) That Section 20, Clause B, be amended to read:—Increasing the retiring allowances of Home Missionaries who have contributed for seven years continuously to the Fund, and who have complied with the Rules relating to the conditions of status.
- (b) That Section 22 be deleted.
- (c) That Section 23 be amended to read:—"If a Home Missionary or a Home Missionary Probationer enters the ministry, or the service of another Church, or withdraws after less than seven years' continuous service, unless on account of ill-health, or having reached the age of retirement, he shall be entitled only to a refund of his personal contributions with interest on the same.
- (d) That the Nota Bene after Section 24 be deleted at the close of the current year.
- (e) That Section 25 be amended to read:—"Any Home Missionary or Home Missionary Probationer now employed retiring from the work or entering the ministry after seven years' of continuous service, unless excepted as herein provided, shall be entitled to the full benefits of the Fund. Those entering the work at or after the Conference of 1926 shall, on retiring after seven years of continuous service, unless on account of ill-health or reaching the retiring age, only be entitled to benefits as per Section 9, Clauses (a) and (b), and shall forfeit any benefits derivable from (c) and (d) in the same Section. They shall also forfeit the benefits derivable under Clause (b) of Section 20.

- N.B.—The Board shall have the power to suspend the operation of the latter part of this Rule in cases of special hardship.
- (f) That Rule 9, Clause (a) be amended by the addition of the words, "surrendered contributions shall be regarded as part of the surplus of the Fund, available for distribution."

II. Literature and Colporteur Work.

- (a) That two Colporteurs be appointed in 1926.
- (b) That they be supported from the general Home Mission Fund, so as to do away with the necessity for the two Appeals every year.
- (c) That, for the present, the Special Fund now being established be used solely for the purchase and publication of literature for general working expenses.
- (d) That the proceeds from the sales of literature be paid into this Special Fund
- (e) That all Home Missionaries be directed to act as Agents of the Society, and that they receive, as a slight remuneration for this special work, a small percentage on the sales effected.
- (f) That Ministers—particularly those stationed in the country districts, be requested to act as Agents for the Society.
- (g) That at all Quarterly Meetings of Home Mission Stations and of Circuits where Home Missionaries are employed, the question be asked—What work has been done during the quarter for the Literature and Colporteur Society?

III. Home Mission Deputations, Etc.

- (a) That in the carrying out during 1926 of the Conference decision as recorded in Par. (j), Section 2, Page 116, Min. of 1924 Conference, the services of Home Missionaries, Deaconesses and Ministers with Home Mission experience be utilised.
- (b) That Circuit H.M. Committees be requested to secure the assistance of the best local talent to support the Deputation, and thus make a real success of the H.M. Anniversary Services and Festivals.
- (c) That real H.M. Anniversary Services (not merely the taking of the H.M. Collection) and also a week-night Home Mission Anniversary Festival be held in every preaching place each year.
- (d) That a carefully systematised effort be made by every Circuit to send the right type of collectors to secure a subscription each year from every member, adherent and well-wisher.
- (e) That while appreciating, as expressed in another resolution, the generous response of our people to the 1925 Home Mission appeal, the Conference draw the attention of all Ministers, Circuit officials, and H.M. Secretaries and Collectors to the fact that because of the urgent requirements of our advance movements in the Maori, Literature and Colporteur, Social and General Work, the Conference estimate of expenditure for 1926 exceeds the estimate of income for the same period by about £1420. The need, therefore, for an even more generous response this year than that of 1925 is apparent, and the Conference calls upon every Circuit and H.M. Station to do its utmost for the Home Mission Fund this year.

IV. Social Work.

That the Conference, recognising the urgent need of the Church's extending its Social Service operations, request the Wellington District Executive, in consultation with the Home Mission Board, to investigate thoroughly the possibilities of social work in the city of Wellington, with a view to initiating there, as soon as possible, this branch of practical Christian duty.

V. Home Missionaries' Reports.

That the regulation concerning the Home Missionaries' written reports be amended to read:—That each Home Missionary in charge of a Circuit or Station shall prepare quarterly in duplicate a brief report of his work and of the state of the Circuit in general, and shall forward, immediately after the Quarterly Meeting, one copy to the General Superintendent, and the other to the Chairman of his District. In each case a copy of the Quarterly Balance-sheet shall be attached.

VI. Supervision.

That in all cases where the Conference shall determine that a Circuit to which a Probationer is appointed, or a Home Mission Station, shall be placed under the supervision of the Superintendent of an adjacent Circuit, such supervision shall be exercised in consultation with the Chairman of the District concerned. This provision, however, shall not contravene any regulation affecting the rights and privileges of a Chairman of a District as Superintendent of such a Circuit or Home Mission Station.

VII. Regrouping.

- (a) That the Home Mission Board consider during the year the whole question of the grouping of our Agents, and of the boundaries of the Circuits and Home Mission Stations in the North Auckland District, with a view to securing greater efficiency and the better co-ordination of the Maori and the general work.
- (b) That for the present the Auckland and North Auckland Maori Circuits be worked as one Circuit, with Sectional Quarterly Meetings under the superintendency of the Kaipara Superintendent.

VIII. Life Membership of the Boad.

That Mr. T W. Jones be appointed a life member of the Board.

That Ngaruawahia and Huntly be placed under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Hamilton East Circuit.

That Portland and Hikurangi be placed under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Whangarei Circuit.

VOTES OF APPRECIATION.

That the Conference express its appreciation of the increasing interest which is being manifested throughout the whole Church in the ideals and funds of the Home Mission Department, and cordially thank the District and Circuit Secretaries, Committees, workers and subscribers for their self-sacrificing and record efforts during the year.

- That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. A. J. Seamer, General Superintendent of the Home Mission Department, for his excellent and successful service during the year. The Conference particularly appreciates his wisdom and judgment in dealing with Maori matters during a most critical period. It further expresses thanks for the splendid services rendered by the Maori Party in deputation work in 1925, and congratulates Mr. Seamer upon the educational, inspirational and financial success achieved.
- That the expectations of the Conference in the appointment of an Assistant Superintendent having been fully realised in the admirable services rendered by the Rev. E. T. Olds, the best thanks of Conference be accorded him.
- That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the General Treasurer for his invaluable services, and that he be reappointed.
- That Mr. J. Veale be heartily thanked for his services as Lay Treasurer, and that he be reappointed.
- That the Chairman of the Board, Rev. E. Drake, be thanked for his valuable services during the year.
- That the Corresponding Secretary, Rev. W. T. Blight, B.A., be thanked for his efficient services, and that he be reappointed.
- That the thanks of Conference be tendered to Mr. G. O. Blakey, Treasurer of the Literature and Colporteur Fund for his services during the year.

SPIRITUAL ADVANCE RESOLUTIONS.

QUESTION XLIV.—What is the State of the Maori Work, and What can be done to Promote its Interests?

THE REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD ON THE MAORI WORK.

It is quite impossible to review the present position of our Maori Mission without experiencing a deep sense of gratitude to Almighty God for the wonders He has wrought.

The general and religious apathy that was so apparent among most of the Maori tribes twenty years ago has now given place to strenuous activities born of a new hope. With the recognition that the physical decline of the race has been stemmed, and that most of the tribes were increasing in numbers, there has developed, in harmony with the general world movement, a new confidence, and, indeed, a somewhat exaggerated race consciousness. Springing from these there have arisen Religious and Superstitious Movements, some valuable, others dangerous. As the ancient Israelite's conception of God's relationship to man centred more in God's dealings with the nation than with the individual, so it is with the Maori of to-day. Even though he may not be conscious that God is speaking to him as an individual, he claims that God is speaking to his race. Not only has there been great enthusiasm shown in the genuine Religious Revival Movements more or less in harmony with New Testament Teaching, such as the Ratana and the Tuhura Movements, but also a certain recrudescence and definite re-organisation in certain localities of Superstitions such as the Ringatu, Paimarire, Te Whiti and Tohu cults.

All thoughtful students of Maori life to-day recognise that an entirely new situation has arisen which, while taxing the wisdom and patience of Mission Workers, is nevertheless opening up great possibilities of progress. We rejoice in these possibilities. Racial consciousness is, however, among certain tribes, running to extremes, and the solid facts of life in New Zealand will cause a reaction within a few years; for, strictly speaking, it is not after all the Maori themselves that are increasing, but those of mixed blood; and in this the hand of destiny is shown. Wise leaders, in both Church and State, while recognising the necessity for certain adaptation to meet the present situation, will not be led into any panic legislation that would jeopardise the future.

The Ratana Movement is still causing great excitement in certain circles. For ourselves, we prefer not to oppose Maori Movements as such, but to oppose only those features of them that are likely to be detrimental to the Kingdom of Christ, and, on the other hand, to encourage those features of them that are in the interests of that Kingdom.

The formal registration of the Ratana Church created a new situation that was at once carefully investigated. By the end of July, the Board declared its policy by passing the following resolution, a copy of which was sent to every Minister and Home Missionary of our Church, and also to the Leaders of other Churches and Missions:—
"That while regretting the schism created by the establishment of the New Maori Church and deprecating the secession of any of our Church members, the Board unanimouslyy re-endorses the policy agreed upon by our Maori Workers' Conference, held on June 15th, and endorsed by a special meeting of the Board, held on June 16th (the decisions being on all occasions unanimous).

"That policy, briefly stated, is as follows:-

"1. That we go straight on with our own work without making any

unnecessary comments concerning the New Organisation.

"2. That the pamphlet "Te Hahi Metoriti" (The Methodist Church) be freely circulated amongst our own Maori people so that they may have clear guidance concerning Methodist doctrines.

"3. That no opposition to the Movement be shewn by our Workers, as such a method would serve no good purpose, but would probably drive the New Movement to extremes, and also create bitterness than would last for generations. At the same time it is understood that our Workers will, in Christian love and charity, make our own teaching clear to the people, and will be loyal to our Church and her standards, and that any associations with the new Movement will be for the purpose of assisting to keep its teaching in harmony with New Testament teaching."

The Board has received replies from the Rev. T. G. Hammond, and from senior Presbyterian Missionaries expressing cordial approval of

No adverse criticism has come to hand.

As there are at present strong feelings of rivalry existing between the various Maori Movements and between some of those Movements and certain of the Churches, it is imperative that, to avoid misunderstandings, we should work quietly and patiently. At the same time, the great and increasing prestige of our Historic Mission demands that we should play no ignoble part during the clash of ideas, as well as of organisations, that is so manifest in most of the Maori Mission Districts to-day. We are strenuously but unostentatiously emphasing the great Christian principles for which our Mission stands, and, while patient with extremists of all types, we are in no way slackening our own witness.

The Board requests that discreet reticence be observed at present concerning the Ratana Movement, as sufficient data is not yet available for profitable discussion. It is confidently anticipated, however, that that data will be available before Conference assembles, and the Board

hopes to submit a valuable supplementary report on the question.

We are glad to be able to report much faithful work on the part of our Maori Ministers, Home Missionaries, Deaconesses and Nurses. In general, steady and consistent progress is being made. In the Waikato, one of the most difficult districts that we have to deal with, very definite advances have been made during the year, and converts have been won both from Maori Superstitions and from Mormonism.

The Deaconesses are now making their influence felt throughout the greater part of our Mission Fields, and the results of their work still continue to gladden our hearts. The Board recommends that an additional Deaconess be appointed, and is assured that no recommendation in connection with the work will appeal more strongly to the Con-

ference.

The King Country Hospital Committee Report shows that quiet

but valuable work is being done.

The Evangelistic Work has not been overlooked during the year, and good results have been recorded, but for reasons already stated, we have moved very steadily in these matters.

It is confidently anticipated that the establishment of the Literature and Colporteur Work will prove an invaluable asset to our general

organisation.

The Rev. R. T. Haddon has rendered very effective service in the Prohibition Cause during the year.

REPORT OF DUNEDIN CENTRAL MISSION.

It is with profound gratitude to God for His unfailing goodness that we send this Report of another year's work. In every department of the Mission the work has been well maintained.

It is a constant source of encouragement to see the large numbers of young men and women who attend the evening services. We are keenly conscious of the opportunity, and of the responsibility which this fact presents.

The labours of Sister Hazel have greatly contributed to the success achieved. Throughout the year an advertisement has appeared in the newspapers twice a week inviting lonely girls, and girls in need of friendly advice, to call upon our Sister. In this way a considerable number have been helped to renewed courage and a better life.

The Business Girls' Luncheon Club and Rest Room have met a felt need in the life of the city.

Social Work.

We are glad to report considerable advance in this department. This has been made possible by the Mayor, Mr. H. L. Tapley, M.P., granting the Mission the right to participate in public patriotic funds. Approximately the sum of £140 has been spent in ministering to the needs of the sick and the poor.

Finance.

With a view to reducing our heavy liabilities, Miss Boot generously promised that providing the sum of £750 was raised, she would donate a further sum of £250. By dint of special efforts, appeals, and avoiding all unnecessary expenditure, this condition was fulfilled, and it is with great gladness we report a reduction of £1000 in the Trust Debt. As the result of the Connexional appeal we received £155 14s. for which we are truly grateful.

The present debt is £9200. It is our intention to launch another

appeal to still further reduce the debt this year.

We regret to report that Miss Boot has returned to England after 10 years faithful and devoted service to the Mission.

Throughout the year there has been the closest co-operation between the Superintendent and the officials.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1925.

The work of the Institution has been carried out successfully during the year. Three students have been in training, viz., Miss Mills, Miss McDonald and Miss Jeffries. All have worked conscientiously, and creditably passed the usual examinations. Miss Mills and Miss McDonald complete their Deaconess House training at the close of the year. The former has been appointed as Deaconess to the Wellington South Church, the latter, Miss McDonald, has offered for service in the Solomons.

There have been six hostel boarders in residence throughout the year. Four of these will, in the ordinary course, be leaving at the end of the year, and there will consequently be vacancies for a similar number for 1926-7.

It is regretted that owing to a breakdown in health, Miss French, a student in training in 1924, was unable to enter upon her second year.

Sister Lily White, of Wellington South, and Sister Jean Dalziel, of Addington, have been accepted for the Foreign Field.

The Committee, with very sincere regret, have to report the resignation of Sister Ruth as Superintendent. In May last, owing to a serious breakdown in health, Sister Ruth was granted three months sick leave. Unfortunately she has since decided that her condition will not permit of her resuming charge of the Institution. Her resignation was accepted with great regret, to take effect as from the end of October. The Committee desires to place on record its appreciation of the devoted and highly valuable service rendered by Sister Ruth during her occupancy of the position of Superintendent, and it is hoped that her services may in time be again at the disposal of our Church.

Sister Annie Tocker has efficiently carried on the work as Acting-Superintendent.

The Committee is pleased to be able to report that Mrs. W. J. Williams (Sister Olive) was offered and has been pleased to accept the Superintendency of the Institution. The Rev. W. J. Williams also having residence at Deaconess House as Hon, Chaplain. The Committee is confident that this arrangement will commend itself to Conference, and ensure the highest order of training for those young women of our Church who may have it in their hearts to offer for Deaconess or Mission service.

It is matter for regret that the social work entered upon at the beginning of the year has been disappointing, in that it was found impossible by Sister Annie Tocker to do the work she desired except at a financial cost greater than could be undertaken. The first few months were spent in investigation by Sister Annie, who was then called upon

by the Committee to relieve Sister Ruth as already stated. Much good work has, however, been done by lectures on suitable subjects to the various women's organisations throughout the district.

The Committee desires to recommend the following resolution for acceptance by Conference:—

That with a view to distinguishing the members of the Order of Methodist Deaconesses from other women church workers who may be known as Sisters, we recommend that all who have been dedicated as Deaconesses should use the letters O.M.D. (Order of Methodist Deaconesses) after their names, e.g., Sister Jane, O.M.D., or Sister Jane Smith, O.M.D.

That we recommend Conference to give effect to this resolution in printing the names in the Official List of Deaconesses in the Minutes of Conference, and in the inscription placed in the Bible given at the Dedication Service.

During the year a canvass of the Auckland friends was made in the interests of the Institution funds by Messrs. Bowron and Isit and Mrs. W. J. Williams. The deputation was very cordially received by those waited upon, and a generous response resulted. Over £800 being received in cash and promises; about £250 having been already received.

The Committee received during the year a further grant of £539 7s. 6d. from the Centenary Thanksgiving Fund, and the balance due on account of the old Deaconess House (£50) has also been paid. As a result, the Committee has been able to reduce to balance due on the present Deaconess House by £1000—leaving an amount of £1100 still due.

Application is formally made for the usual grants from Contingent Fund (£75), Home Mission Fund (£75), Foreign Mission Board (£75), and Connexional Insurance Fund (£100), for maintenance purposes.

The following are nominated for the Committee for 1926:—The Chairman of the District, the Connexional Secretary, Superintendent Ministers of the Christchurch Circuits, together with the Ministers appointed to New Brighton, Linwood, and Edgeware Road, Messrs. L. M. Isitt, E. C. Brown, A. Borrows, C. A. Newman, W. Dobbs, G. Bowron, H. W. Heslop, and the five ladies of the House Committee.

With a view to encouraging offers from our young women for Deaconess service, a circular letter was recently issued to every minister of our Church, setting forth the need for enlistment and the opportunities for training offered at Deaconess House, but the results so far have not been inspiring, and this opportunity is taken to again urge our ministers to a keener interest in this department of our Church work.

We have to thank the Associate Members and the Women's Auxiliaries for their continued interest and support, and to express thanks to the ladies of the House Committee, and to the hon. lecturers for further willing and efficient services, and also to Mr. D. T. Lucas, whose advice and services as architect are willingly rendered when needed. The services of the foregoing have contributed much to the successful working of the Institution, and are greatly appreciated by the Committee.

A.—AUCKLAND CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE— MOUNT ALBERT AND EPSOM.

With thankfulness we record an interesting year of activity and advance.

It was a great gratification when Mrs Armitage early in the year saw her way to withdraw her resignation. During the year she has presided over two full Homes, assisted by a capable and willing staff.

A substantial anonymous bequest, realisable in the not distant future, the full extent of which is not yet known, resulted in our acquiring as an additional Home one of Auckland's finest suburban residences in Buckland Road, Epsom, as an additional Home, with a capacity of forty children. This handsome, two-storeyed mansion stands in five acres, tastefully laid out, and represents a cost, with furniture and structural alterations, of about £7000; interim finances have been kindly arranged by a member of the Board. Already twenty-seven children are in residence, the matron being Mrs Everiss, a widowed daughter of the late Rev J. H. Gray, capable, devoted and beloved by the children, assisted by an efficient staff. In the three Homes we now have ninety-seven children. We thank God that none of our children became victims to infantile paralysis, though the restrictions caused extra work and responsibility. With the exception of minor ai ments, good health has prevailed. The improvements to Mount Albert buildings have proved a great boon.

The headmasters and teachers of the Mount Albert and Roskill Schools take great interest in our children, and have supplied excellent reports concerning them.

Forty-five of our Mount Albert children passed the S.S.U. examinations and ten gained prizes.

The annual "Black Baby" sale at Mount Albert realised £54 for the F.M. Fund, a very gratifying effort.

The Ladies' Committee, with Mrs Caughey as president, continue their valuable work, the need for which has been increased by the new Home. Miss Agnes Mason is secretary and still resides at Epworth Home as honorary member in chief. Her self-denying work is beyond all praise.

A successful "At Home" at Pitt Street, arranged by the ladies, resulted in large gifts of clothing and £46 for the Clothing Fund. The Committee gratefully acknowledge these and many other gifts of fruit, produce, furniture, and many kindnesses shown to the children.

The response to the Christmas appeal was £367, a considerable decrease on the previous year. The subscriptions and donations collected by Miss E. Mason and Rev J. Blight, and sums paid direct to the treasurer, total £565 9s 6d, which is a substantial increase. Sunday Schools contribute £11 13s 1d. The bequests include: £865 2s 6d, Anon, one account; £450 from Miss Rathbone's estate; £5, Joseph Newzill.

We extend our sincere thanks to the friends who so kindly provided holiday homes for our children during the summer vacation, and to the many, who by their liberal gifts in cash or kind, and by various acts of kindness have assisted us in our great work, on behalf of the children.

The addition of the Epsom Home substantially increases our financial needs, and we earnestly ask for a liberal response to the coming Christmas Appeal, and also for a steady increase in annual subscriptions.

We gratefully acknowledge the valuable services rendered by Miss Ethel Mason and Rev. J. Blight as Collectors, Mr. A. Len Caughey, our Treasurer; Drs. Harold Pettit and Howard Thomas, Honorary Medical Advisers; and Mr. A. Peak, Hon. Solicitor.

We regret the enforced retirement of Rev. J. Blight, on grounds of health, and of our efficient Treasurer, Mr. A. Len Caughey, owing to the growth of the work.

We have been fortunate in securing a capable successor to Rev. J. Blight as Collector in the person of Miss Stables, of Glen Eden; and Rev. S. Griffith has been appointed Secretary and Treasurer, to whom all applications for the admission of children, and all money should be sent, his address being 10 Grange Road, Mount Eden.

B .- METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME, MASTERTON.

We sincerely thank God for His help during the past year. We feel His blessing has rested upon our efforts.

The members of the staff have not been hindered in their work by any serious illness. Sister May, the Matron, Sister Annie, her righthand helper, Miss Brooker, the seamstress, Miss Louie Churchill (the first girl who entered the Home, and who has now become a junior member of the staff), and the casual help have all done good and satisfactory work.

The Home has been open four years, and during that time 65 children have been admitted. For twenty of these suitable homes have been found. A few weeks ago a girl of five years was adopted into a Methodist home. At the present time there are forty-two boys and girls in the Home.

The health of the children during the year has been good. We were thankful that we had no case of infantile paralysis in the Home during the epidemic. Our chemists' accounts during the year have been very small.

We thank Dr Prior, our Honorary Medical Attendant, for his continued and attentive oversight of the health of the children and staff.

No efforts have been spared by the members of the staff and Management Committee in seeking the highest good of the boys and girls, so that by wise training and the placing of noble ideals before them their characters may be so developed that they may become useful Christian citizens.

Each morning and evening the Scriptures are read by the children, followed by a short explanation by the matron. During the year a written examination took place, when there were twenty-six candidates. During the visit of their Excellencies Sir Charles and Lady Fergusson, His Excellency, on behalf of the Committee, presented each boy and girl who took part with a copy of the Scriptures, and during his address impressed upon the children that they should prepare themselves for a life of useful service.

Support has been received from the churches and people in the Home area, with one exception all the Circuits contributed a Christmas or other collection. The people in the Masterton district have, in addition to cash donations, been liberal in their gifts of produce, fruit, food, and clothing. We have received grants of £100 from the Rathbone Estate, and a further grant of £200 from the trustees of the T. G. M'Carthy Fund. These sums have been of considerable help to us in our work.

Improvements have been made by erecting a wide verandah round the recreation hall, altering the splendid Home sleeping verandah, and planting a considerable number of trees in the grounds. The Home electric system has been connected with the Mangahao service.

As we see the increasing usefulness of the Home we are encouraged

and are full of hope for the future.

C .- THE SOUTH ISLAND ORPHANAGE.

It is with a feeling of devout thankfulness that we review our work

for the past year.

The health of the Staff and children has been remarkably good, there being no serious cases of sickness to report. Two of the children

were operated on for appendicitis, and are fully recovered.

Once again, we gladly express our appreciation of the capable manner in which the affairs of the Home are conducted, under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Butler, who are ably supported by a Staff of

willing and efficient helpers.

There are 58 children in residence—35 boys and 23 girls; whose ages range from 3 to 16 years; one third of whom are under seven years. In addition to these there are four boys in the Presbyterian Boys' Home, for whom we pay maintenance. Some such arrangement will need to be continued until we can erect our own Boys' Home.

Some of the children, who are showing more than average ability, are attending the Christchurch Technical College classes. Three boys are

apprenticed to trades.

Thirty children entered for the Scripture Examinations, twenty passed and two won prizes.

During the year it was found necessary to build a new wing, making accommodation for twelve additional children, at an approximate

cost of £433 (including new furnishings).

It will readily be seen that with this expansion of our work, an additional income is imperative to meet our demands. In this connection, we are sorry to report a serious falling off in Circuit income. Again we have had to draw to a considerable extent on our "Capital Fund," in order to meet ordinary expenditure.

We are glad to report that the Rev W. Laycock has taken up the work of Circuit Organiser, and has visited some of the Circuits with encouraging results, but the real result of his efforts will be seen at the Christmas season, when most Circuits make their Orphanage appeal. In selecting Mr. Laycock for this work the Board is fully convinced of the wisdom of its choice.

In addition to the eleven acres acquired last year, for the establishment of a Boys' Home, we have bought a further block of one acre for the purpose of providing better access for the sub-division of a portion of the land which will be in excess of the requirement of the new Home.

During the year the following legacies have been received:—From the estate of the late A. Cowie, £50; the late Wm. Morrow, £125; the late Miss Butterick, £100; the late Miss Kitchingman, £50.

The Board has decided to approach Conference for power to incorporate under the "Religious Charitable and Education Act, 1908."

In conclusion, we express our thanks to Drs. Orchard and Blackmore and Mr. Sevicke Jones (optician) for their gratuitous services; to the members of the Ladies' House Committee; to Mr. and Mrs. Butler and the Staff; and to all who have forwarded gifts during the year.

We appeal to all our people for a more generous support, and assure them of our appreciation of their gifts in money and kind.

The following was referred to the Temperance and Public Morals Committee with a view to their taking the necessary steps to make it effective:—"This Conference draws the attention of the Minister of Justice to the number of men deserting their wives and families, leaving them dependent upon the various Orphanages and Government Institutions. It urges that the Police be asked to use all vigilance to prevent such deserters leaving the Dominion, and to bring them to justice."

REPORT OF THE "METHODIST TIMES" AND LITERATURE COMMITTEE.

"Methodist Times."

The Committee desires to report that the circulation of the "Methodist Times" has slightly decreased during the year. In the opinion of the Committee this is not due to any dissatisfaction with the paper, but to the want of efficient agents in many of our Circuits. In some Circuits there is no agent. In some Circuits the Ministers, and in most Home Mission Stations, the Missionaries receive subscriptions and when a change of Ministers or Missionary takes place frequently no list of subscribers is left for his successor.

Changes of address are not so frequent as they were a few years ago, but often no intimation of a change is received, until the paper comes back through the Dead Letter Office. Every possible effort is then made to find the new address, and so retain the subscriber's connection with the paper, but often without success.

In accordance with a resolution of last Conference, a circular, appealing for more energy in extending the circulation of the "Times," was sent to each Quarterly Meeting. No adequate response followed.

New Editor.

The Committee nominated the Rev. W. B. Scott to the Synods as successor to the Rev. P. R. Paris. Mr. Scott has since requested that his name be withdrawn from nomination.

After reviewing the whole position, with the resolutions of the Synods before it, the Committee unanimously recommends that the Rev P. R. Paris be reappointed as Editor of the "Methodist Times," and further, that the consideration of the future editorship of the "Times" be referred to a special committee, to be appointed at the first session of Conference.

We wish to express our thanks to the Editors for their efficient work during the year. Our best thanks are also due to the Business Manager.

REPORT OF WELLINGTON MILITARY COMMITTEE FOR YEAR 1925.

Excellent work has been done by the Chaplains of our Church in connection with the Territorial Camps held throughout the Dominion during the year. We are glad to say that in each of the commands, the organisation of this work has been placed on a sound basis. Our Church has been fully represented in the camps held, and testimony is borne to the valuable service rendered by our Chaplains. In view of the fact that the number of Chaplains on the active list steadily decreases as the age limit is reached, and names are added to the "retired list." it will be well for the Conference Committee to see that, from time to time, fresh nominations are made from the ranks of our younger Ministers to fill the vacancies.

The appointment of Colonel Young to the Major-Generalship has given widespread satisfaction among the Churches, as he is known to be sympathetic with the work of the Chaplains. To increase the effciency of the Chaplain in camp, funds are urgently needed, and it is a pity that some portion of the Military Camps Fund is not made available for such purposes. We regret to report that owing to his having been placed on the retired list, and being also over the age for active service as a Chaplain of the second class, the Rev. A. Mitchell was not granted the well deserved promotion which was recommended by the Conference and strongly supported by the Chaplains' Board of the Central Command.

Naval Affairs.

The outstanding event of the year has been the visit of the American Fleet, under the command of Admiral Coontz, to New Zealand waters. In this connection once again our Naval Chaplains rose to the occasion, and in all the ports visited, the American sailors attached to the Methodist Church were most hospitably received and entertained. Admiral Coontz attended service at our Taranaki Street Church, in Wellington, and most cordially appreciated the official visit made by the Chairman of the District, the Secretary of the Conference, and the Naval Chaplain to the Flagship "Seattle." The thanks of the Church are due to the Naval Chaplains for their efforts worthily to entertain our naval visitors.

We recommend the reappointment of the Naval Chaplains, with such changes as may be rendered necessary by stationing

REPORT FOR 1925.

Since last Conference a number of Palmerston North Circuit Plans, and two Minute Books of Oxford Church have been received. I .- OFFICE OF VICE-PRESIDENT.

REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENCY COMMITTEE, 1925.

Title, Qualification and Mode of Election.

(a) A Vice-President (to be designated the Vice-President of the Conference of the Methodist Church of New Zealand) shall be elected annually at the Conference. He shall be a Layman who has been a member of Conference on at least three previous occasions.

(b) The election shall be by ballot, after nomination, and by an absolute majority of votes cast. Written nominations for the office shall be handed to the Secretary of the Conference, prior to the opening of Conference, signed by two members of the Conference and by the person nominated, as evidence of acceptance of the nomination. (Note .-A Nomination Paper to be provided in the Conference Agenda.)

(c) No person shall be eligible for election to the office of Vice-President for two years in succession.

Privileges of Vice-President.

(a) The Vice-President shall preside in the Conference, or in any Committee of the Conference, in the absence of the President, or at the request of the President, and while so acting he shall have a deliberative

and a casting vote.

(b) The Vice-President shall be, ex officio, a member of the Stationing Committee, both at the Conference at which he is elected and at the succeeding Conference, being regarded as one of the lay representatives of the District from which he comes.

(c) The Vice-President shall be, ex officio, a member of the Confer-

ence next succeeding his election.

(d) The Vice-President shall act as Chairman of all Conference functions in the absence of the President, unless required on other Conference business.

(e) The retiring Vice-President shall address the opening session of Conference on matters pertaining to the progress and welfare of the

Church.

(Note.—The address not to exceed 15 minutes in length.)
(f) The Vice-President shall have a seat on the platform during all sessions of the Conference, including the Ordination Service, and during the Conference at which he retires from office.

(g) The Vice-President shall be, ex officio, a member of the Synod of the District in which he resides, and shall be entitled, in the absence of, or at the wish of, the Chairman of the District, to preside over such

Synod.

(h) The Vice-President shall be, ex officio, a member of any Connexional Board or Committee (unless he be an elected or appointed member of such Board or Committee), but without the right of voting. He shall also be a member of the President's Committee of Advice.

(i) The Vice-President shall be, ex officio, a member of the District Executive situated in the District in which he resides, and shall be entitled to preside at any meeting of such District Executive in the absence of the Chairman of the District. (j) If in the opinion of the President, or his Committee of Advice, it is desirable that the Vice-President should represent the Church at any function, his out-of-pocket expenses while attending such function shall be paid from the Contingent Fund.

Limitation of Powers.

The office of Vice-President entitles the holder to distinguished consideration during the year, but does not encroach in any way upon the functions of the President as Chief Pastor of the Church, nor upon the functions of the Chairman of any District, notwithstanding anything herein contained to the contrary.

Continuation in Office.

The Vice-President shall hold office until the election of his successor, and shall welcome and introduce him to the President for induction to office. In the absence of the retiring Vice-President, this duty shall be performed by an ex-Vice-President.

NOTE.—The Committee recommend that the existing Regulation in the Book of Laws be rescinded, and that the foregoing Regulations be substituted in their stead.

That Clauses (i) and (j) be adopted.

"Limitations of Powers."

That the paragraph be adopted, with the addition of "nor upon the functions of the Superintendent of any Circuit," after the words "Chairman of District."

That the paragraph on "Continuation in Office" be adopted.

III.—SHORTENING THE TERM OF PROBATION.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF STUDIES TO SYNODS ON THE SHORTENING OF THE TERM OF PROBATION, ETC.

The following matters were referred to the Board:-

(1) The shortening of the Probation of those who have spent three years in College.

(2) Or, as an alternative, the remitting of any portion of the written examinations of such probationers.

(See Minutes, 1925, p. 40.)

1. After full consideration and correspondence with the two distant members, the Board is unable to recommend any shortening of the term of Probation. The following considerations, among others, have led to this decision:

(a) That in the near future there will be a considerably increased number of trained men on probation for whom the Church must be prepared to find married ministers' Circuits. This must inevitably lead to a much stricter insistence upon Circuits fulfilling their obligation to provide for a married minister than has obtained in recent years, and in few cases is relief likely to be granted. To shorten the term of probation can only increase the difficulties of the Connexion in this matter.

(b) That, with the reception of younger men as Candidates for the Ministry, the average age of students and probationers will be much lower than it has been for some time past, and thus the full term of probation cannot fairly be considered as a hardship.

(c) That the reception of probationers into full Connexion at the end of their third year would inevitably lead to many requests that they be allowed to marry at that time. The Conference may resolve that no guarantee of such a concession can be given, but this will not preclude strong pressure in that direction. In view of this contingency the following facts must be carefully borne in mind :-

- (1) That, remembering what has been stated in par. (a) above, the earlier marriage of probationers must be accompanied by a reduction of the four years' term now given to Circuits before they are required to take a married minister;
- (2) That, with the lower average age of candidate for the Ministry, men will be terminating their probation and requesting to marry at an unusually early age.
- (d) That a period of seven years in College and on probation is not too long for men of the age and attainments of the average candidate for the Ministry. The more thorough is the training and oversight in study and Circuit work which is given our younger men the stronger will be the Ministry of the Church. Men of zeal will not object to such a training, and men who may feel it irksome are those who need it most.
- (e) That although, largely owing to the effect of war conditions, a proportion of men have been received into the Ministry without College training, and after only four years' probation have received ordination, thus apparently placing Collegiate men at a disadvantage, this condition of things is fast passing away, and need not influence our regulations. Only in rare cases in the future will untrained men be received on probation.
- (f) That should any special cases arise, the Conference has ample power to deal with them on their merits.

II. As to the second matter in the order of reference, the Board does not recommend that the fourth year's probationary examination be remitted, believing that it entails no real hardship on one really anxious to equip himself for the Ministry. The Board, however, recommends the following alteration in the fourth year's requirements:—

That when a probationer, who has been three years in College, gains Honours in at least two out of the three years in the Probationers' Examinations, he shall, in the fourth year, be required to present himself for examination in only one book in Theology (to be specially set by the Board of Examiners), and shall substitute for the rest of the ordinary Course a thesis on some subject selected by the same Board.

Whilst the present system of taxation shows apparent anomalies, a better system, or a system where anomalies would not exist, has not been found.

Your Committee has no recommendation to make.

I.—NEW ZEALAND METHODIST LOCAL PREACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

ANNUAL REPORT.

A new Branch has been formed this year in the Taranaki District. Our Book Scheme is not taken advantage of to the extent that the Executive desire, but during the year Local Preacher Candidates, brethren on Full Plan and Home Missionaries have been supplied with books which, no doubt, have proved exceedingly helpful to them.

Last year we rendered financial help to a brother who had met with serious misfortune; the relief given has been of incalculable benefit to

our fellow-worker and his family.

A year ago our Association was privileged in assisting to send the magazine "Experience" to Ministers, Home Missionaries and Local Preachers: this year we are sending a little booklet to all Local Preachers in the Dominion.

We again stress the importance of the Conference provision for the public recognition of Local Preachers when being received on Full Plan, and we are glad to note the growing practice of holding such

Recognition Meetings.

Alderman J. S. Alcock, J.P., of Nottingham, who visited some of our Branches, and attended our Conference last year, is now President-Elect of the English Local Preachers' Association, which has several thousands of members, and raises and expends nearly £30,000 per annum on Local Preachers' work.

II.—WORLD CONFERENCE ON FAITH AND ORDER.

(See Minutes, 1925, page 135.)

The movement for a World Conference for the consideration of questions touching faith and order by all Christian communions throughout the world originated in the year 1910. Invitations were issued to participate in such a Conference to all Churches which accept the fact and doctrine of the In carnation. The movement has spread and now eighty-six nation-wide communions are sharing in a discussion of pre-

liminary matters.

A Continuation Committee that was set up by a preliminary Conference met at Stockholm from August 15 to 18, 1925, with a very representative attendance from Europe, America, Australia and other lands. It was decided that the World Conference proper be held at Lausanne, Switzerland, in August, 1927. The number of members of the Conference was set at approximately 500, the apportionment amongst co-operating Churches to be determined later. Our own Church will be entitled to some representation, and if necessary, some arrangement can possibly be made to give financial assistance from the funds of the movement to our chosen representative.

An Agenda has been drafted for the Conference, and covers such subjects as:-

The Call to Unity.
 The Nature of the Church.
 The Church's Common Confession of Faith in God.
 The Christian Ministry.
 The Sacraments.

6. The Unity of Christendom and the Place of Different Churches within it.

7. Arrangements for Continuing the Work of the Conference.

Whilst the object of the Conference is to consider how closer union can be secured amongst the Christian Churches of the world, it is understood that representatives of the World Conference shall have no power to bind their Churches to the decisions of the Conference.

Partly as an outcome of the activities of the World Conference on Faith and Order another movement has arisen which materialised in a Universal Christian Conference of Life and Work, which took place at Stockholm last August. The purpose of this Conference was not doctrinal but practical, and it made some contribution to Christian unity by frank discussions on such subjects as:-

1. The Church's Obligation Concerning God's World Purpose.

2. Economic and Industrial Relations.

3. Social and Moral Problems.

4. International Relations and World Peace.

5. Christian Education.

6. Co-operation between the Churches.

Over six hundred official representatives of all great Christian bodies, excepting the Roman Catholic, drawn from forty different nations, separated until then by political or racial differences, and by religious prejudices, met as brethren and found common ground for unreserved, yet sympathetic, counsel upon things that pertain to God's Kingdom on Earth.

It may be well for our own Conference to consider the nomination at the Conference of 1927 of some representative to attend the Lausanne Conference in August of that year.

During the year, Mr. J. C. Prudhoe has resigned from the Com-

mission appointed by our Conference.

(1) That the sum of £10 be voted from the Contingent Fund towards the Funds of the World Conference.

- President's Supply.-That the President be empowered each year to employ the services of a Supernumerary Minister, or other suitable supply, at a cost not exceeding £75, such cost to be borne equally by the Home Mission Fund and the Contingent Fund.
- Legal Adviser.—That Mr. J. A. Flesher, O.B.E., be cordially thanked for his generous services as Legal Adviser to the President, and that he be reappointed.
- President's Committee of Advice.—That the following be the President's Advisory Committee:-Revs. Principal Laws, B.A., D.D., S. Lawry, W. Grigg, E. Drake, W. A. Sinclair, and the Secretary of the Conference, Messrs. J. A. Flesher and the Vice-President.
- Memorials to Conference.-That Memorials must be delivered to the President not less than ten (10) days before the opening of the Conference. If they are found to be in order the President shall refer them to the proper committee for consideration and report to Conference.
