

Cross-cultural awareness

To become aware of, and challenged by, each other's cultures.

Justice

To work for justice for any who are oppressed in Aotearoa New Zealand, keeping in mind the implications of the Treaty of Waitangi. To share resources with the poor and disadvantaged in Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

Peace

To be peacemakers between people and in the world.

Healing

To listen for hurt and work for healing.

Ecology

To care for creation.

PROCEDURE FOR ELECTION OF PRESIDENT / VICE PRESIDENT

SECTION 7:5.1.7

- (d) Tauiwi and Te Taha Maori will each select its preferred candidates for the offices of both President and Vice-President according to their own procedures.
- (e) There shall be a Conference Panel, (the Panel), representing the Partnership, and selected from members of the Council of Conference by Hui Poari and Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing. The Panel shall, by consensus, agree on a recommendation to Conference as to who should be appointed to each of the offices of President and Vice-President.
- (f) The Panel shall then present its recommendations for both offices to the General Secretary.
- (g) The names of the recommended President and Vice-President elect are then announced by the President.
- (h) Conference shall affirm its support.

GUIDELINES FOR CONFERENCE DECISION-MAKING

The primary goal of the decision-making process is to enable Te Taha Maori (Tangata Whenua, the people who are of the land) and Tauiwi (the people who came later and settled here) – partners of Te Hahi Weteriana o Aotearoa, the Methodist Church of New Zealand – to make decisions which demonstrate partnership.

The first step in decision-making is for Te Taha Maori to reach general agreement and Tauiwi to reach general agreement on the decision before them. Then the two groups meet together to see if they can agree with a suggested decision.

Facilitation of the partnership decision-making process requires particular skills, which not all elected leaders will have developed, so an experienced facilitator may be asked by the President or Vice-President to lead the Conference at such times.

PRINCIPLES

The following are principles for making decisions in a manner which demonstrate our Treaty Partnership: i.e. between Taha Maori and Tauiwi.

- The aim of Conference decision-making is to discern what is best for the Church.
- A decision is made only when it is clear that both partners i.e. Taha Maori and Tauiwi can state that they can agree with the suggested decision.
- Taha Maori may caucus if this will enable their group to reach general agreement so a partnership decision can be explored.
- Partners may choose their own language for the discussion. (Tauiwi will need to decide the language(s) appropriate for them).
- When the partners do not agree, no decision can be made. Instead a process will be established which may lead to agreement in the future.
- The Council of Elders will monitor the process and may guide it.

DECISION-MAKING STRATEGIES

Consensus is a term often used when general agreement or substantial support, rather than majority rule, is a group's aim. "Consensus" as generally understood in relation to decision-making in large groups, enables:

- participation by a larger number of members
- the opportunity for minority options to be acknowledged
- a greater chance of obtaining unity of purpose in a group with a variety of values
- more stable, longer lasting decisions.

Consensus does not mean unanimity or total agreement. Rather it is the group agreeing to work together in a certain way, even though some members might prefer not to, e.g.

We are prepared to accept this decision because:

- it is for the good of the group
- we see it is so important
- we feel that our viewpoint has been adequately expressed
- we do not agree, but in the interests of the Church we will allow this to be the decision.

In consensus decision-making, if it is clear that no agreement is possible at the time of the discussion, before the topic is adjourned the President may choose to ask the Council of Conference to meet to explore whether there is any way forward. If Council reports that there is no way forward then plans will be made for other approaches which may lead to consensus in the future. In the meantime the status quo will continue.

MEMBERS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Consensus decision-making requires a high level of member responsibility and individuals need to be aware of how they can contribute in a helpful manner.

Members should:

- expect to contribute briefly, to the point, and only once on a topic
- prepare what they have to say and speak only if that point has not already been made
- contribute material if it assists the discussion or reconciles an apparent difference
- keep silent if they cannot contribute in a way which aids the discussion.

PROCESSES

Some processes help us to listen to each other and find a way forward for the Church. *For example:*

Discussion

Contribution which assists decision is about

- The issue
- <u>Theology</u> of the issue
- Suggested ways forward

Consensus

The process of seeking consensus can use a number of techniques which may assist the group to reach its **general agreement**.

Some of these are:

- caucusing
- brainstorming to collect ideas
- buzzing in pairs or threes to clarify a position
- dividing into small groups to respond to the same of different parts of the topic
- having a prepared presentation of the issues involved
- adjourning the topic till later in the agenda and having two or three people work at finding an alternative way forward
- a majority decision
- having members indicate non-verbally if they agree/disagree with the ideas being expressed
- identifying common ground and then working on areas of difference
- asking those with a different opinion if recording their view will enable them to allow the decision to be made.

Caucusing is a method used in large groups to assist decision making. It is a meeting of group(s) within the larger group. Caucusing enables any group to clarify its position on the business in hand. Conference does not continue when it divides into Taha Maori/Tauiwi caucus groups, so it is not appropriate for the President, Vice-President or facilitator of the Conference to continue facilitating any of the smaller groups.

In the Conference Taha Maori or Tauiwi can call for their group to caucus, <u>but only if doing</u> so seems likely to assist the full group to reach a decision.

There are 3 ways for this to happen:

- (a) the person presiding over the Conference may determine that caucusing is appropriate
- or (b) Tauiwi may call for a caucus
- or (c) Taha Maori may call for a caucus.

Conference then divides into Taha Maori and Tauiwi groups. The people who facilitate the full Conference do not lead the small groups, so these groups need to have their own facilitators ready.

Caucus process

Each group decides its own process for establishing its position on the topic.

- (a) They may work in one group
- or (b) They may divide into smaller groups, e.g. ethnic, gender, district or interest groups, who discuss their position regarding the topic.

The sub-group(s) come to their decision so they rejoin the larger group and report their position. Then that group seeks to reach agreement. This continues until all the sub-groups have rejoined the caucus. A sub-group may decide it cannot reach an agreed position but that it is prepared to support the one reached by the full group.

If at any time a sub-group cannot reach an agreed position and this prevents a decision being reached by the full group, then the sub-group may ask for a specified time to explore other approaches if that is expected to result in an eventual decision.

The caucus then discusses its position to see if it has been able to reach a common mind. If it has, the caucus rejoins the Conference.

What does the Conference do?

When Tauiwi and Te Taha Maori groups rejoin, Conference reconvenes, so the person presiding resumes his/her role. Normally the group which called the caucus reports first, then the other group reports its position. If the person presiding called the caucus, he/she will determine the order of reporting back. Then the whole Conference works toward a consensus decision.

When the process is complete the person presiding shall make a clear statement of the decision.

SUMMARY

- Conference decision-making is a process which demonstrates Te Taha Maori-Tauiwi partnership agreement and enables full participation from all member groups.
- Consensus agreement using caucus groups, and other methods of assisting decision-making is an appropriate mode for making partnership decisions.
- For such processes to be successful all group members need to participate in an informed and responsible manner.

Facilitation of these processes is a skilled task and the President and Vice-President may request experienced people to lead some sessions.

TREATY PARTNERSHIP DECISION-MAKING PROCEDURES THROUGH A CONSENSUS PROCESS:

Information/Clarification for Conference

CAUCUSING

a) Calling for a caucus

According to present procedures, calling for a caucus only relates to the convening of Te Taha Maori and Tauiwi caucuses. However, interest groups can meet within the Tauiwi caucus. If an individual or an interest group in the life of the Conference wishes to raise a process issue, they should approach their caucus facilitators and express their concern. The facilitators are:

Tauiwi: Sylvia 'Akau'ola-Tongotongo and Lani Tupu

- **Te Taha Maori**: Will choose their facilitators at their pre-conference meeting The facilitators will then take what action they feel is appropriate

b) Steps for making Treaty partnership decisions

In the process of making Treaty partnership decisions, we have discerned the following 5 steps:

Step One: Starting together

Both treaty partners are present. Caucusing does not occur in this step. The report is received. A presentation is made outlining the contents of the report and the suggested decisions. Space is made for questions seeking clarification etc.

• Step Two: Testing out how the Treaty partners feel about the issues under discussion

Focus is now upon the 'suggested decisions'. The President/Vice-President seeks the mind of Conference on 'suggested decisions' where there appears to be consensus, and these are processed. Where a consensus is not obvious on specific 'suggested decisions' there is clarification as to lack of consensus. For example, is it related to differences between the Treaty partners or within a partner? At this point either partner may request caucusing, or the President/Vice-President may suggest it. An initial time limit is proposed for the caucusing. The President/Vice-President clarifies for the whole Conference, what both caucuses will be addressing when they meet separately.

Step Three: Sharing responses from the caucuses

When both caucuses are ready to report back, both sets of facilitators will meet with the President and Vice-President to share the responses. This is suggested for two reasons. Firstly, it will avoid the President/Vice-President having to react 'cold' to what is reported to the Conference. Secondly, the sharing will indicate if either or both caucuses need to give reasons as to why they have arrived at a particular point. For example, if both caucuses were in agreement, there would be no need to share reason.

If a caucus does not achieve a consensus, this will be reported to the whole Conference. It would not be appropriate for the other caucus to indicate its response at this point. If finally within a caucus there is no consensus to proceed, no decision by Conference can be made(see page 9, last paragraph).

Step Four: Making a Treaty Partnership decision

If there is agreement by both caucuses, Conference can make a decision. Conference can only make a decision if both partners agree.

If there is no agreement between caucuses, or within a caucus, the areas where there is a lack of agreement will be clearly identified. Some or all of the following questions might then be asked: Is more information required? Is it necessary to caucus again? Could an 'ad-hoc' representative group meet during Conference to address the areas of disagreement and seek a way ahead? If there is still lack of agreement between the two partners, then no decision is made by the Conference, and the status quo remains. The President/Vice-President will define the 'status quo'.

Step Five: Moving on to the next business

Before this happens, Conference is asked if there are any concerns/issues arising from the discussion that need to be addressed and reported back to Synods/Conference the next year. This is important where Conference members agree 'in principle' with a particular proposal, and expect that their concerns will have been addressed when the 'fleshed-out' principle returns to the next Conference for final endorsement. Consequently, a decision might read "We have agreed that ... and the following concerns/issues have been referred to ... for consideration and a report to Synods and Conference next year".

If any Conference member wishes to record their dissent from a Conference decision, they should put it in writing and hand it to the Daily Record Secretaries.

PROCEDURES TO ENABLE THE BUSINESS OF CONFERENCE TO BE TAKEN "EN BLOCK"

- (1) Committees/Boards will be asked to advise the Conference as to those reports/resolutions that can be presented to the Conference En Bloc. On the recommendation of the Committees or Boards they will be put to the Conference En Bloc. Reports/Resolutions to be taken En Bloc will be highlighted on the PowerPoint presentation.
- (2) In order to safeguard the rights of members of Conference to speak on any report/resolution, any member may by simple request to the Chair, have removed from the "En Bloc" procedures any report/resolution.

(Minutes of Conference 1978, Resolution 1, page 564, amended 2004)

FUNCTION – COUNCIL OF ELDERS

The Council of Elders shall enable and assist the Church in its Bicultural Journey by seeking to model the equal partnership prefigured in the Treaty of Waitangi, and at Conference specifically will:

- (a) monitor and recommendations of all Conference Committees and Boards of the Conference, and
- (b) reflect and comment on the style, processes, work and priorities of all Conference Committees and Boards, Conference discussion and decision making, and
- (c) refer back for further consideration any report or recommendation which the Council of Elders considers will hinder or divert the Church from its Bicultural Journey, and
- (d) report each year to the Conference

COUNCIL OF CONFERENCE

Council of Conference

Information and Reporting Back

Theological Reflection / Workshops

Council of Conference has continued its practice of including a theology session at each of its meetings. The subject matter is discussed in advance and usually incorporates contemporary theological / biblical issues of the day.

In March, the Tumuaki facilitated the theology session on "Nationhood", the address given by Dr. Don Brash (Leader of the National Party) to the Orewa Rotary Club on 27 January 2004. We identified 'gut reactions' to the address then highlighted some commonalities. It was important for the Council to recap some of our Weteriana history regarding our Bicultural Journey and our Weteriana understandings of Te Tiriti O Waitangi. The Council then engaged in the task of doing some analysis in terms of identifying 'what is fact and what is fiction.

At the June meeting, the theology session focussed on "Te Reo Maori". Often it is misunderstood that Te Reo is just about correct pronunciation but it also involves knowledge of history, culture, customs, art / dance, political and social interaction and the way in which language impacts on society. We began by sharing personal experiences of learning or not wanting or being encouraged to learn our own language and the overall impact. We also explored issues such as identity and shared together our common knowledge of the history of Te Reo from pre-European era through to 2004 including the church's involvement of Te Reo Maori.

The theology session at the September meeting was led by Tovia Aumua and David McGeorge who shared a reflection on the topic of Bicultural / Multicultural using their notes from a seminar they led with Rev Percy Rushton at Manukau District Synod in July. Council of Conference members were asked a number of questions to reflect on before David read from Percy's notes that reflected his part in the Bicultural Journey from a Pakeha point of view. Percy was Methodist President at the start of the journey at the Napier Conference in 1982. Members commented on their memories of this time and it brought back the reasons for the power sharing that slowly took place from that point on. Percy expressed his view that most of the impact of the journey has taken place at National Church level and at grassroots congregational level, there has been little change. Tovia then gave his view of Multiculturalism in our Church. He expressed a view from the standpoint of one whose personal New Zealand Methodist journey started at the same Conference. Council of Conference members were clearly moved from what he had to say, as had been the people at the earlier Manukau District seminar on the topic. The discussion that followed showed clearly that people were seeking a way forward, and also that they appreciated the timely reminder of where we have come and why we needed to embark on power sharing in the first place.

Viv Whimster and Alison Molineux facilitated a workshop on Immigration. We addressed questions about our origins, our place in the world, our relationships with other cultural groups in particular people who have immigrated to Aotearoa-New Zealand. This helped us to examine more clearly the benefits immigrants would bring as well as the losses both personal and societal. It also clarified how the Tangata Whenua and the Treaty Partner felt about the presence and place of immigrants in our country. The Council were invited to draw upon biblical stories that would enable us to understand the place of immigrants arriving in a new land.

Future format of Conference

The Council Work Group completed its work on Stage Two of the "Future Format of Conference" and circulated a paper to the Church. Delegates to Conference will be given the opportunity to evaluate the new format and the results will be made available to the Church for discussions during 2005.

Nature, Role and Term of Presidency

The Council of Conference has reviewed at depth the major reports, which were presented to Conference in 1972, 1979, 1980, 1997. Council believes that all the issues relating to the nature, role and term of Presidency were dealt with well in these papers and that therefore the church has available to it sufficient information on which to base any future change it may wish to make to the Presidency. Accordingly, the Council reports to Conference that it has completed its work on this topic until such time as Conference has a specific change it wishes Council to address.

Budget

At the March meeting the Connexional budget was presented, showing a \$100,000 shortfall. This was after reducing the asking groups' grants. Council of Conference again expressed concern that the Connexional budget showed such a significant deficit.

This continuing deficit is cutting across the ability of the wider Church to move forward with vision and engage creatively in its mission.

As was noted last year, the Church's reluctance to set priorities for expenditure makes the task of creatively balancing the budget an impossible one.

In the light of the budget presentation the following decisions were carried out:

1. The Evangelical Network was commended for the decline in their request on the budget and their aim to be self-funding.

- 2. A letter was sent to the Board of Ministry, encouraging them to assist Wasewase Ko Viti Kei Rotuma E Niu Siladi to seek alternative sources of funding.
- 3. Council of Conference wrote to the Budget Task Group, expressing its thanks for the report.
- 4. The Connexional Office was asked to withhold the CCANZ \$10,000 funding until certain clarifications have been received by the General Secretary.

PAC Distribution Matters

Conference 2003 asked Council of Conference to explore options on the future use of the PAC Funds. This work is still to be completed and a Work Group has been set up to do this task.

Council received the discussion paper from the PAC Distribution Committee reconsidering the current PAC Distribution Group's 'touchstones and guidelines' and this will be referred to the Work Group.

Vision Statement

In 2002, Council of Conference presented a Vision Statement and Strategy to Conference as follows:

That the Vision Statement be:

Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa-The Methodist Church of New Zealand is a Church:

- Passionate in its commitment to living out the love and grace of God known in Jesus Christ;
- Actively concerned with all life;
- Committed to the Treaty of Waitangi and to talking and walking justice.

Strategy:

To achieve this Vision the Church will:

- Focus its people and finance resources in order to be innovative with its available resources / stewardship in the life of the diversity of the Church.
- Empower the people to live out the Vision by establishing cost effective: (a) communication networks;
 - (b) accessible education opportunities.
- Constantly evaluate its work against the Vision Statement.

Conference agreed that the Vision Statement and Strategy be accepted for use in 2003.

At its March meeting, Council of Conference agreed that the Vision Statement and Strategy have ongoing implementation in the life of the Church. As well as this Council of Conference are suggesting the following change to the Strategy Statement (bullet point 1):

Creatively focus its people, finances and resources in the life and Mission of the Church.

Connexional Appointments

This year the Council of Conference has processed the Connexional Appointment for the Chaplain, Wesley College and notes the partnership process has been followed. The Board, will, through Stationing bring the name to Conference.

The Board of Wesley Community Action has kept Council of Conference informed with progress on the position of Superintendent / Director.

4+4 Process

During the year the Council circulated a draft document outlining changes to the 4+4 Connexional Appointments process, in the light of the favourable response from Boards and Synods a new leaflet will be released in the New Year.

The changes do require changes to the Law Book, Section 6: 7.10.2 which is currently, "The Pastoral Committee shall arrange for consultation with all Connexional and Resource Appointees in their 9^{th} year of appointment with regards to their ministry after their 10^{th} year of appointment."

With

"Normally (and unless decided to the contrary by the Conference) each appointment shall be for an initial term of six years with a review at six years. Thereafter, on a three yearly basis. At a year nine review the Pastoral Committee shall arrange a consultation with the parties (the appointing Board, incumbent and Treaty Partner) and with them reach a decision regarding reappointment which shall be reported by the appointing body to the following Conference."

A number of Boards and Synods raised questions about the size of the 4+4 selection panel. Council of Conference has noted these concerns and will continue discussion about the number of people needed for a Connexional selection / interviewing process.

REPORT ON THE CONNEXIONAL BUDGET

SECTION A

2003-2004 Connexional Budget

For the year to 30 June 2004 contributions from parishes toward the wider work of the church through the Connexional Budget totalled \$584,748 a decrease of \$10,232 or 1¾%, over the contributions received during the previous year. However, with the continuing support from the PAC distribution group full payment of the allocations was made possible again this year.

The grants paid from the Connexional Budget for the year totalled \$699,605 compared with \$716,114 paid in the previous year. Of the total grants paid the parish contributions represented 83.6%, which was a small increase of 0.5% over the previous year. The gap between parish contributions and the grants paid was funded from a grant from the special account of \$37,917, Connexional legacies and donations of \$16,713, interest and sundry income of \$11,409. In addition \$68,357 of the PAC grant received was required in order for the fund to meet all of its obligations.

Members of the Connexional Budget Task Group for the current year are; Frank Claridge, Lynne Frith, Dina McCarthy, David McGeorge, Leah Scales, Diana Tana, Paula Taumoepeau Jill van de Geer, Pari Waaka, with secretarial support from David White of the Administration Division.

The process that has been used for several years was followed again this year to establish the Connexional Budget for presentation to the Council of Conference. The Task Group realises that there is little opportunity for discussion and dialogue at parish or congregational level. While it would be preferable to enable wider discussion on the proposed budget, the process of setting the budget cannot be started earlier as it commences soon after Conference, prior to Christmas which is more than six months prior to the commencement of the financial year, and the deadline to establish the final budget can not be moved.

It is pleasing to note that the contributions from parishes toward the work funded from the Connexional Budget is being held at current levels for the last two or three years after several years of declining contributions. However, the Task Group is still faced with the task of attempting to fund additional tasks requested through Conference when the Church is unable to fully fund its current work at a national level.

The task group continues to draw attention to the significant contribution which the Connexional banking arrangement makes to the budget and strongly urges any Methodist parishes or other Methodist church groups who operates an account outside of the Bank of New Zealand arrangement to transfer to the banking arrangement that the Church has negotiated with the Bank of New Zealand.

SUMMARY FINANCIAL REPORT

AUDIT REPORT TO THE MEMBERS IN RESPECT OF THE SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The summary of the Connexional Budget Account has been extracted from the audited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2004 on which we expressed an unqualified opinion dated 8 September 2004.

We conducted our audit in accordance with New Zealand auditing standards. In our opinion the amounts set out in the summary for the year ended 30 June 2004 have been correctly taken from the audited financial statements of the Connexional Budget Account from which they were extracted. For a better understanding of the scope of the audit, this audit report should be read in conjunction with the audit report on the full financial statements.

Te Taha Maori REPORT TO CONFERENCE 2004

Nga mate ki nga mate:

He reo tera i te rangi e mea ana: tuhituhia ka hari nga tupapaku e mate nei i roto i a te Karaiti. Na Ihowa i homai na Ihowa i tango, kia Whakapaingia te ingoa o Ihowa.

We acknowledge in fond and grateful memory all those of our Weteriana Whanau who had died since last Conference. In special tribute we mention Lilyan Vaoga (Minita-a-Iwi) who served Tamaki Rohe, Te Taha Maori and her community faithfully. She will be greatly missed.

INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK

Te Taha Maori Events

These events which offer both members, staff and our people the opportunity to meet, share and challenge beyond their own Rohe boundaries, the various issues that arise out of the social, political, economic and cultural milieu of the day. They add to the interest of their own growth in the faith and that of Te Taha Maori and the Church as a whole.

Central to these events is the way in which we engage in 'Doing Theology'. This continues to be important to the life and work of Te Taha Maori as reflected in our families and communities, our various workplaces and society generally.

Hui Poari: Our Hui Poari meetings this year have been held at Marae in Waima, Hokianga; Patea, Taranaki and one of our Church Centres, Te Rahui in Hamilton. Theological and workshop sessions have explored the following themes:

- Parihaka it's life and history.
- Theology of Birth and the role of Women in the Church.
- Te Reo Maori a journey of discovery and identifying some of the plus' and minus' of speaking Te Reo Maori and not being able to speak Te Reo Maori; the developments of the language through the education sector and the impact of politics and culture.
- Contemporary issues in Aotearoa the birth of the new Maori Party.
- Issues Destiny Church and the media concerns surrounding it / Civil Rights Union Bill.

Hui Poari continues to be our main policy and decision making forum. This year we were privileged to be able to host President Lynne Frith and the Superintendent of the Evangelical Network, Rev Nigel Hanscamp.

Rangatahi

Rangatahi work for Te Taha Maori lives and breathes out of the realities of the people in iwi, hapu and whanau of our Rohe. In January a small group of Rangatahi journeyed to Wanganui for the Ratana celebrations. We listened with interest to the mihimihi (speeches) sending a strong message of Maori opposition to the proposed Foreshore and Seabed legislation. Rangatahi joined in the historical Foreshore and Seabed hikoi.

As Rangatahi we value the opportunities that are given to us by Te Taha Maori and our Church to raise questions such as "where do we as Rangatahi belong within the life of our communities".

Our own Weteriana church traditions and our Maoritanga enables us to understand how other cultures can sometimes either have a negative or positive impact on our Rangatahi.

Rangatahi Co-coordinators from the rohe have met to discuss updating members on present structures and policy and looking at future planning of wananga.

At an ecumenical level we have been helping plan The Big E a professional forum for youth ministry leaders and trainers to be held in November. In looking forward we have also been involved in the planning of the Methodist Youth Conference to be held in January 2005.

Rangatahi continue to actively participate in the life of Te Taha Maori by serving on Te Taha Maori boards and committees. The strong rangatahi involvement in worship services throughout the motu has also been encouraging in raising consciousness of the rangatahi voice.

Education and Training

The programmes that come under this heading are central to the life and work of Te Taha Maori. They include both national and rohe wananga sessions, Enabling Ministry Team consultations, wananga for candidates training to be Minita-a-Iwi, continuing education and development programmes for Minita-a-Iwi and members and Rangatahi events.

Office Staff: Te Taha Maori Office Staff continue to ensure the smooth running of the office and provide appropriate support for the Rohe. The Staff also have the opportunity to upskill and engage in professional development programmes as required.

Enabling Ministry Team: This group has met once this year to assist with the planning and implementation of Te Taha Maori programmes and activities. We have another meeting scheduled for October 2004. Currently Hui Poari in consultation with the Rohe are reviewing the nature and role of the Enabling Ministry Team. This has been seen to be necessary as we begin the process of 'fine tuning' some of our activities as we move forward into the future.

Minita-a-Iwi: Te Taha Maori are indebted to our Minita-a-Iwi serving their Rohe and communities. Often their duties take a toll on family, iwi and hapu commitments; but they remain steadfast knowing that they have the full support of Te Taha Maori. Minita-a-Iwi Training Wananga held in Taranaki have explored the following themes:

- Worship and Preaching;
- Exploring new ways of Doing Theology;
- Developing tools / resources for preaching;
- Use of language / kawa observances;
- The appropriateness of blessing secular building sites.

Connexional Matters

Bicultural Journey / Partnership Issues: Te Taha Maori continues to remain committed to our Church's Bicultural Journey. Often our people resources in our Bicultural Journey are fully extended but because of our conviction and our own understanding, we continue to help where appropriate. Working documents that are occasionally released from the Connexional Office asking for a response from Te Taha Maori as well as Tauiwi sections of the Church provide us with an opportunity to present a Maori response.

In March this year, Te Taha Maori were invited to attend the Otago-Southland District Synod and School of Theology held in Queenstown. We were asked to give a presentation on the theological imperatives that underpin the work of Te Taha Maori and to set this along side Otago-Southland's questions about developing Regional Church.

The Tumuaki Diana Tana and President Lynne Frith accompanied by Lani Tupu as Cultural Advisor, attended the Methodist Pacific Consultative Council meeting held in April in Samoa.

One of the major issues Te Taha Maori has been involved with during the year relates to the *Memorandum of*. *Understanding*. We have attended partnership meetings led by the President and Vice President and worked hard to bring a document that will recognise the diversity of opinions in the Church.

Waikato Rohe hosted the annual meeting of WesleyCom, which also included their workshop. They have also hosted Council of Conference meetings during the year.

Te Taha Maori is represented on various Boards and Committees of the Church. We have also participated in the following:

- Induction services at the beginning of the year;
- Connexional 4+4 processes for Chaplain at Wesley College and the Superintendent / Director for Wesley Community Action.

Finance and Properties

Finances. The Budget Working Group has continued to meet and discuss the finances of Te Taha Maori. We were able to make a contribution to the Connexional Budget and will once more be within budget for the year ending 30th June 2004. We would like to thank Dina McCarthy, Finance Manager and Leah Scales, Financial Accountant, for the daily financial and budgetary issues they deal with on our behalf.

Te Taha Maori would like to record its thanks to the Grey Institute Trust, Kurahuna Committee, Margaret and Bruce Gordon Fund and the Wellington Methodist Charitable and Educational Endowments Trust for their financial support. We are pleased to inform Conference that four male students received funding from the Margaret and Bruce Gordon Fund to assist with their education; four female students received funding from the Kurahuna Committee to assist with their schooling; twelve women received funding from the Women's Resource Fund to help with various tertiary education and two were recipients of the Moutoa Scholarship Fund to assist with Postgraduate studies.

Properties. Finance and Properties have not met as often throughout the year. Discussions are ongoing about the future of *Te Huinga Centre, Te Kuiti* and Kowhai Consultancy has been contracted to complete the land story for this and other properties in Waikato and Te Rohe Potae. Tumuaki, Diana Tana and the Administrative Manager, Lana Lazarus visited Tai Tokerau rohe at the end of May and are pleased to report that the *Kaeo Farm* lease has now come to a satisfactory conclusion. Discussions have been taking place with the Rohe, Far North District Council and Board of Administration over the *Oak Tree* in *Waima, Hokianga* that was planted in the mid 1800's by the Reverend John Warren and the ownership of the land. Some repairs and maintenance have been completed at *Te Atawhai Centre, Kawakawa*, with additional work being carried out at *Te Rahui Centre, Hamilton* and extensive renovations being done at *Whakatuora Centre* in *Mangere East*.

Ecumenical Concerns

Methodist Mission and Ecumenical Committee. Te Taha Maori has two representatives on this Committee who report on a regular basis to Hui Poari. At July Hui Poari the meeting took time to discuss the document sent to District Synods, Boards and Committees regarding the Methodist Anglican dialogue. This was valuable time for members to have an in-depth understanding of the issues involved and what feedback they wished to provide.

Te Runanga Whakawhanaunga I Nga Haahi O Aotearoa. The Advisors have met occasionally during the year but sadly it is only two of the member churches that attend. Since the death of Moderator, Mona Riini last year, we have not received confirmation as to who the replacement for Te Aka Puaho is on this Committee. Issues Advisors have dealt with include:

- Updates on mema Haahi.
- Future of Te Runanga.
- The 'wider' ecumenical connection.
- Amorangi Whare Herehere (Prison Chaplaincies).
- Amorangi Turoro Services (Hospital Chaplaincies).

World Council of Churches (WCC). Lana Lazarus attended her third meeting of the WCC Communications Advisory Group (CAG) in Geneva, Switzerland last year at the end of September. The CAG reviewed the work of the Publications and Research Team and the Public Information Team, making recommendations to the Central Committee of the WCC. There have been many staff transitions since the CAG met in November 2001 due to declining finances. However, with all these changes, the staff are coping well and a good rapport has been built amongst them.

The final meeting of the CAG is to be held in Lebanon in December.

LOOKING FORWARD

We look towards continuing developing these areas of our work:

- Building up the Rohe membership throughout Te Taha Maori;
- Continuing work with the review of the Enabling Ministry Team and Hui Poari;
- The future of Te Runanga Whakawhanaunga I Nga Haahi O Aotearoa;
- Continuing support for our Minita-a-Iwi and members especially in areas of training, ministry and development.

We value the opportunities to continue building relationships within our Weteriana Whanau and look forward to the proposed visits to meet with the Auckland District Synod Executive and Taranaki-Wanganui District Synod and School of Theology in 2005.

We face the challenges of the various contemporary issues that impact on our people on a daily basis and aim to bring a Methodist Maori response.

SECTION A - INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK

Moturoa Land – Bayly Road, 3.58 Hectares, Lot 1, DP 18771

It was reported last year that the Maori Land Court had made a vesting order to gift the land owned by the current Trustees of the Grey Institute Trust to Ngati Te Whiti.

Confirmation was received in August, 2004, that copies of the Court Orders confirming the vesting of the land to the named Trustees and confirming the terms of the separate Trust Order have been received by the Grey Institute Trust solicitors.

The Trust formed by Ngati Te Whiti is to be known as the Bayly Road Trust.

Specifically within the Trust documentation it states:

"...The land is vested by the trustees of the Grey Institute Trust with no consideration payable, it being accepted that the disposition by the Grey Institute Trust represents a gift by the Grey Institute Trust acknowledged by the Court and interim trustees appointed by the Court to receive the land on behalf of Ngati Te Whiti Hapu as a gift in aid of creating a charitable trust..."

Rangiatea

The Kura Kaupapa, situated on what is known as the Rangiatea land, is now fully functional.

Discussions continue with the Western Institute of Technology Taranaki (WITT) and Te Kopae Tamariki Kia U Te Reo to relocate the Kohanga Reo from 5 Mission Street (a Trust Property) to the Rangiatea.site. The Trust continues to be supportive in this way of the continuing education of the young Maori people in Taranaki.

Assets of the Trust: Land and Investments

The assets of the Trust continue to be effectively managed by the Trustees with \$13,000 per month being advanced to Te Taha Maori along with a top up payment at year end, if funds permit.

Work is continuing on whether some of the Grey Institute Trust land can be better utilised to maximise the financial return to the Trust.

SECTION B - THE STRATEGIC PLAN

To effectively and efficiently manage the considerable assets of the Grey Institute Trust to maintain the capital base and to ensure an adequate return to Te Taha Maori

Land

To consult with the purpose of developing a strategy to deal with the rental reviews and lease renewals in 2006 and 2007 of the numerous 21 year leases over the land owned by the Trust.

Investments

To monitor the performance and security of the funds invested to ensure that the adequate returns are being received on these funds.

To review the use of Grey Institute Trust land to ensure the potential income for the Trust is maximised.

AUDIT REPORT TO THE MEMBERS IN RESPECT OF THE SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The summary of the Investment Funds Board -Te Taha Maori has been extracted from the audited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2004 on which we expressed an unqualified opinion dated 17 September 2004. We conducted our audit in accordance with New Zealand auditing standards. In our opinion the amounts set out in the summary for the year ended 30 June 2004 have been correctly taken from the audited financial statements of the Investment Funds Board -Te Taha Maori from which they were extracted. For a better understanding of the scope of the audit, this audit report should be read in conjunction with the audit report on the full financial statements.

Our examination of the summary was completed on 20 September 2004.

TAUIWI STRATEGY AND STATIONING Report to Conference 2004

Over the last year Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing have been grappling with the following issues:


Connexional Budget

Is it appropriate to draw on PAC funds to balance the budget? With this question a wide ranging discussion was initiated at our August meeting. It lead us to questions about;

- Priorities;
- Core Mission;
- Core Function or
- Creating a 'Methodist umbrella' of values, beliefs and vision.

It became evident at this point that until these questions are answered we are just playing with figures.

Questions of Finance and Human Resources



These discussions need to be both part of the Hui on Ministry and flow on from it into the life of parishes. The budget needs to flow from and reflect our priorities, core mission and core function. We are invited to be a people doing our mission with our money in Aotearoa/New Zealand.

Mission and Ministry

We recognise that the challenge we face in these days is to work together more effectively in ministry and mission. We suggest that mission and ministry form an integrated whole. In the light of this there is a need to develop more flexibility in our approach to ministry recruitment, training and deployment and in particular to look at the urgent development of models of lay ministry and lay and Presbyteral teams. We see the proposed Hui on Ministry as an important stage on the way towards an in depth exploration of these issues. Tauiwi Strategy sees parishes and congregations as a vital face of Mission and Ministry.

Stationing process

The committee has been grappling with its own processes in regards to stationing during 2004. A work group has been established to continue to explore the issues and bring a model for consideration to the November Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing Committee. A full report will be made to the Tauiwi meeting at Conference with a supplementary report to be circulated with the Conference agenda.

Support for Parishes in times of change

There is a need now for parishes to accept that change is inevitable, and to own and celebrate that this can be very positive. Steps towards this are;

- Sharing of information at all levels
- Loving the people into acceptance as a mission

Intentional and practical preparation for change is necessary;

- Identification of skills and interests of people
- Provide confidence building experiences, underlined with much affirmation

B(ii) - 1

- Provide workshops in specific areas of people's choice 9.g. pastoral care, grief, visiting, prayer)
- Experiences/opportunities for speaking in church/being involved in service preparation.
- Understanding administration.

This will need support from the wider church:

- Encouragement to employ a parish administration
- Financial support for workshops etc
- Resource people for workshops locally
- Opportunity/identification of training events available outside the local area
- Provision of adequate and appropriate supervision.

Seconded Ministry

Tauiw Strategy reflected on the history and purpose of seconded ministry for Wase wase ko Viti kei Rotuma e Niu Siladi, Sinoti Samoa Ekalesia Metotisi I Niu Sila and Vahefonua Tonga 'O Aotearoa. The meeting affirmed the general principle of reducing the dependence on seconded ministries and the desirability of actively recruiting and training presbyters from within our own context of Aotearoa New Zealand.

The meeting noted and supports Vahefonua Tonga in implementing earlier decisions for the establishment of several parishes in the Auckland – Manukau region and in other regions as necessary, and supports the urgency of this happening.

To reinforce this significant strategic direction, Tauiwi Strategy affirms that there will be no further seconded ministries for Vahefonua Tonga at the conclusion of the appointment currently being negotiated for the Auckland Manukau Tongan Parish and fully supports the agreed term of the appointment not exceeding four years.

SYNOD HIGHLIGHTS 2004

NORTHLAND

The work in Northland has been energized by the prospects of a re-organisation of the NUCC and JRC. There is hope that the new ecumenical council, which would include Anglicans and other denominations that wish to participate, would come into being early next year. Two people from Northland (Dave Mullan and Margaret Honere) are on the Standing Committee of the Forum and that closer link with other regions is welcomed. We've had a very successful ecumenical gathering to share stories of ministry in the parishes; a day to celebrate unity and diversity; a session on the Seabed and Foreshore, and in October Rev Stan Stewart will lead a day "Adding value to your Parish." The North celebrated the induction of Rev Dr Robyn McPhail to Kaeo-Kerikeri and Rev Anne Stephenson was appointed to Dargaville Methodist. A Key Direction for 2005 is to maintain a Methodist presence in Northland. We will be working with a number of parishes who are moving to more lay-intensive forms of ministry.

MANUKAU

The parishes of the Manukau District are in relatively good heart, including those which suffered deep division not long ago, but which now all appear to be regaining lost ground and a new spirit. Connexional and District obligations are being met and complex financial relationships between Sinoti and Manukau Districts have now been sorted out. Funding parish work is always a challenge, but our hope is to maintain current staffing levels across the District at least in the medium term and to look for suitable people to revitalise our Youth work.

The highlight of the year must be the opening of our new church premises at Meadowlands Methodist Community Church. Other substantial building projects in Howick/Pakuranga and Waiuku and rationalisations elsewhere testify to a Church that is facing the uncertain future with as much vision, faith and commitment as it can muster.

WAIKATO / WAIRIKI

As one of the geographically and numerically larger districts, 2004 has been one of experiment and discovery with the change in the style of District Superintendency. This change to a Separated Superintendent is the result of planning over a considerable period of time, John has a half time paid position. As there is now a change within the structure of this Synod, the position that is required for a Lay representative to TSS has a new title 'District Steward' together with a detailed Job description. This position is built around the Law Book requirements for the lay representative to Tauiwi

Stationing and Strategy but includes significant other involvement in the life of the district – reviews, support for parish stewards and advocacy.

This is a great Synod to be a part of and represent, and one that is planning for a hopeful future as a church, key objectives for the next year are:

Continue to evaluate and develop the separated superintendency model

Actively promote the work of the Methodist Church in the fastest growing region in the country – Bay of Plenty

Explore models of ministry which best suit some of the rural areas of the district.

Engage with Hamilton members to cater for the 'aging' membership and establish a presence in the new areas of the city.

HAWKES BAY / MANAWATU

Hawke's Bay/Manawatu District has had only one Synod meeting this year which was not combined with the other lower North Island Districts. This was the June Synod which was held in Waipawa.

It was "special" for two reasons.

The first was its location.

Waipawa is about midway between Napier and Palmerston North and is the home of the Waipawa Union Church, to which a new lay pastor had been commissioned about a month earlier. There has not been representation from Waipawa at Synods for some time, so holding our June meeting there was a bridge-building occasion, as well as a welcome to our District to Paul Forster.

And we WERE made welcome and fed royally into the bargain. It was good to share time with the people there. The second reason this Synod was special was the high-class entertainment we enjoyed in the afternoon. We finished our business by lunch-time so that we could enjoy the Fetuao Choir who travelled from Wesley Hastings to sing for us. Wesley Hastings has two wonderful Samoan Choirs. This one – with over fifty members – was the "small" one, which includes a lot of children. It was a highly professional performance with plenty of variety in the types of music presented.

The children, some of whom were very young, were obviously enjoying singing. We were all impressed that the amount of practice, which must precede such a high standard, could be accomplished without dimming the delight of the young people.

Their delight in what they were presenting was certainly a gift of delight to us as well. Their leaders are to be congratulated.

WELLINGTON

Talofa lava, Malo e lelei, Ni sa bula vinaka, Kia ora and Greetings in the name of Christ.

When Lynne Frith became President of the church, the district inducted Jeff Sanders and Suiva'aia Te'o in December 2003, to Co-Superintendent with Ron Gibson for the period of twelve months. For this reason the district has not looked at strategy and direction for this year. At the end of November this year, both Jeff and Sui will step down and Lynne takes over the Co-Superintendency with Ron again. Thanks to Jeff and Sui for their time and energy.

The High lights for the district this year have been the three induction services for Neil Keesing, Desmond Cooper and Robert McLay, and the combined synods and school of theology with Taranaki and Hawkes Bay Manawatu districts twice this year.

NELSON/MARLBOROUGH/WEST COAST

August Synod at Greymouth provided an opportunity to meet with old friends and new. Great hospitality, delicious meals, lots of laughter and a real sense of togetherness enabled us to work through the business of Synod in a spirit of hopefulness, that the church is alive and well.

Stories shared from Parishes gave us new insights into the joys and sorrows of ministry in a diverse geographical district. We rejoiced with the Greymouth Uniting Parish in the baptism of five children on the previous Sunday.

The Synod was delighted to put into action, one of the first steps in its ministry development resourcing/training plan. A cheque for \$100 to buy books was sent to every lay preacher in the district, with a letter affirming their ministry and ensuring them of our continued support and encouragement in their ongoing learning and growing in faith, to meet the challenge of the church of the 21st Century

NORTH /SOUTH CANTERBURY

The key Synod highlight for 2004 has been the conviction that South and North Canterbury Synods should become one Synod. The arguments for this were compelling.

Our Synod brought a recommendation to the North Canterbury Synod at a combined August meeting. We were encouraged and delighted by their response. They saw, as we did, in spite of the differences in size, not a "takeover", but a merger of two distinctive groups each bringing strengths and giftedness to the whole.

We see this development as (1) entirely consistent with intentions and expectations of the wider Church for a reduction in the number of Synods; and (2) enhancing and probably simplifying partnership with Nelson-Marlborough-West Coast, and Otago-Southland Synods.

KEY DIRECTION FOR 2005

The key directions for 2005 are (1) developing the Central South Island Synod and increasing co-operative relationships with the other South Island Synods; and (2) providing opportunities for more resourcing of Parishes in the South Canterbury region.

VAHEFONUA TONGA 'O AOTEAROA

Vahefonua work for 2004 has been challengingly messy. However, highlights have included the celebration of transferring the stewardship of the property at St Kilda to the Dunedin Tongan Congregation, the establishment of the Otara Tongan Parish, the recognition of the Christchurch Tongan Parish and establishing of ministry partnership with the Oamaru Union Parish. Looking forward to 2005, the direction will have consultations on Ministry Matters relating to Theological Training, Candidating for Ministry, Seconded Ministers, Supply appointments, Self-supporting, and Orientation Programmes. Other main areas of work will involve Structural and Operational Development, Separated Superintendency and New Parishes.

Evangelical Network of the Methodist Church of New Zealand 2004 Report to Conference

This year has brought some significant changes to the Network. The year began with the installation of Rev Nigel Hanscamp as Superintendent, at his home church in Matamata. It was great to have President Lynne Frith, Vice President David McGeorge, General Secretary Jill van de Geer, as well as John Murray and Tumuaki Diana Tana present at this event. In his address Nigel urged us to be salt and light in the communities in which we lived and among each other in the church. He also signalled that we need to look more carefully and intentionally at evangelism and at what we mean by being a network.

This year we also held a weekend event at Camp Morley, which was very successful. We were able to bring a significant number of people from the South Island, and enjoyed input from Rev Gordon Miller, Andre Le Roux and Alan Webster.

E-fish has continued to provide challenges to both writers and readers. E-fish is a weekly e-mail, compiled and written by ordained and lay people with reflections and ideas to get our creative processes working. It is offered to any who are interested. To get onto the list send an email to Brian Peterson bpeterson@paradise.net.nz. Back issues can be found on the Methodist website www.methodist.org.nz e-fish is always open for your contributions, and will be actively seeking contributors who can take a turn preparing it for a month.

We have also been working on an Evangelical Network Brochure, which will answer such questions as; What is the Network? How do I become a part of it? What does the Network stand for? How can I contribute to the Network? It is our hope that every congregation will have copies available both to answer people's questions and to show the breadth of the Church.

The memorandum of understanding took up a lot of time this year, and it showed us our strengths and differences as we worked through the issues involved. We are grateful to David Bush and Nigel Hanscamp for working so hard on our behalf on this group, and we look forward to the memorandum being agreed to in the near future.

This year we have had to grapple in more depth with evangelical Uniting congregations coming under Methodist oversight, some for the first time. This year there have been significant new contacts made with 5 parishes, 2 of which have been through stationing. This has also highlighted the difficulties of being a national organization, as well as the tremendous mutual support provided by and for District Superintendents.

For the past 3 years we have worked under the capable leadership of Rev Marion Peterson, to establish ourselves in the wider church and in our own structure. We are now entering a very different phase of our lives and, as with every change, we face the difficulties and joys that it brings. Financially we are unable to continue as we have been without significant refocussing of our work. Structurally we are also having to look at the composition of our executive and may be facing further changes. The new parishes coming on board have challenged us in what we mean when we call ourselves a network, and the communication that may entail.

The next 9 months will see us evaluate our future and set some specific goals and leadership needs for that. We look forward to the completion of the Memorandum, as well as the continuing development of relationships with Te Taha Maori and the new contacts being formed with evangelical Uniting congregations.

NEW ZEALAND METHODIST WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP ANNUAL REPORT 2003-2004

CELEBRATING 40 YEARS OF THE METHODIST WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

This has been the year when many MWF Districts and Fellowships have celebrated and rejoiced together, all that MWF has meant to them in their Christian life. Methodist Women's Fellowship was launched in February 1964 after lengthy discussions between the members of the Guild, the MWMU and the Fireside groups. The first National President was Florence Baber from the Manawatu District. I appreciate the opportunity that I have had as your President to join in many celebrations.

During the year I have had the opportunity to meet with members from most MWF Districts. This has been a great twoway opportunity for the members to meet Mary West, as I was just a name to the majority of 'grass roots' members and, I was able to visit Districts and Fellowships that had been places in name only to me!

Following the decision taken by the Delegates at Convention 2002 the main priority of this National Executive has been to be good and careful stewards of all MWF money. This has included careful planning in my travel arrangements. When it was possible I visited up to 4 Districts on one journey away from home. This worked well but was tiring! Travel costs were kept to a minimum by using public transport eg buses, and when air travel was necessary by booking in advance 'on-line'.

The National Executive has continued to meet monthly and has addressed all the recommendations that we were charged with at Convention 2002. This has involved considerable work over and above what had been anticipated.

The NZMWF Constitution has been carefully reviewed after further alterations that were requested by Districts at Council 2003. Mr Geoff Peake the legal adviser to the Methodist Church prior to his retirement reviewed the Constitution. The Constitution will be ratified at Convention 2004. FINANCE

The National Treasurer has worked extremely hard over the 2 years, and I am able to report that the responsibilities of the National Treasurer are now clearly documented in the recently updated job description.

Following a recommendation to Council 2003 that is to be ratified at Convention 2004, future NZMWF National Treasurer's may request financial expertise from an approved person within the District in which the National Executive is situated. The position of National Treasurer requires considerable skills and at times may require professional assistance. Thank you for the response to the request that the annual subscription be increased to \$6.00, this has been voluntary until it is ratified at Convention 2004. This has greatly helped the working account for the National Executive.

The Smethurst Trust Fund committee requested help from all the District Secretaries to distribute the 2004 application forms to all parishes with a Methodist component, regardless of whether they had a Fellowship group or not. THANK YOU this has worked very well. We have been able to give 48 Grants and Koha's from the \$16,140 that was available after all expenses were paid. This method for distributing application forms will be used again in 2005.

Kurahuna Trust is for Maori senior schoolgirls. Due to very few applications last year not all the funds were allocated. This money was returned to MWF and re-invested It is hoped that more applications will be received in 2004; this will enable more girls to get assistance towards school expenses. Edith Sealey and I attended their August meeting.

Friendship Scholarship is for Pacific Island girls in 6th and 7th form. The capital fund is much less that Smethurst and Kurahuna Trusts. The interest available to be given as grants is therefore considerably less. As there are many girls that could benefit from a grant for assistance towards school fees and books, \$8,500 .00 from the stamp money was allocated in 2003 to boost the capital in this Trust fund. A grant application was made to the PAC, and we rejoice with the news that this application was favourably received and \$40,000 was allocated to the fund. THANK YOU. This fund pays the grants directly to the school that the student attends.

Special Project. This continues to be an Annual combined Project with APW. The topic for 2003-2004 was 'Bridging the Gaps, From Poverty to Self- sufficiency'. The overseas subject was again chosen in consultation with CWS and is eligible for VASS support, ie for every \$1.00 raised an additional \$4.00 is added to the total. The monies will go to Southern India at Madurai for the Women's Development Resource Centre, and in New Zealand to the NZPARS Child Travel Fund.

MWF Fellowships and Districts, have raised in excess of \$34,000.00. 70% goes to the overseas and 30% to the NZ recipients

Medical and Educational and the Stamp Fund will be combined as a gift to Helena Goldie Hospital to create a memorial to Davinia Taylor in recognition of the work she has done for the hospital over many years.

NZMWF IN THE 21 CENTURY??

What have I experienced as I have met members from Dargaville in the North to Bluff in the South? MWF is alive and well, but yes it is has changed significantly since its birth in 1964.

I have met members that had been at the inaugural meeting in Palmerston North.

What is the future of NZMWF? The key word in the revised Constitution is <u>Flexibility</u>. Many Fellowships and Districts are unable to find leadership to take the roles that have been previously used. I have encouraged several Districts to explore the suggested format that APW is trialing. I have recommended that groups endeavour to have a minimum of 3 core members for an Executive ie. Convenor, Distributing Secretary and Treasurer.

Attending Rally or District days has been exciting, and I have appreciated the different ways in which these are organised. I would encourage ALL Districts to consider reducing the business part of these days to the absolute minimum. The business is the responsibility of the Executives, and only items of particular interest need to be shared.

Days that were fun, educational or devotional appeared to attract a better attendance. These days need to focus on Fellowship and Friendship.

I have particularly enjoyed the privilege of visiting older members, in their homes or resthomes, hearing their stories and being very humbled by the gracious way in which they welcomed me. In particular the visits to Vera Dowie and Doreen Hill past National Presidents reminded me of the many great MWF Presidents of earlier years. PLEASE continue to remember the older members, and when ever possible give them MWF news and a Presidents letter. To those Districts where it was not possible for me to do 'home visits' I would suggest that these may become an important part of planning when National Executives visit in the future.

To the 'new' Districts Samoan and Tongan. Thank you for the warm welcome that you gave to my representatives to your Annual meetings when I was away on other commitments. Your members have a great deal to offer NZMWF in the future, but remember, we also have a great heritage to be proud of.

In conclusion Thank you for the support you have given to the dream of the 40 year Love Gift offering that will assist your new President Nelma Woodfield to attend the World Assembly of WFM&UCW in July 2006 in South Korea.

The experience of being your President has enabled me to grow in areas that 2 years ago when I took office, were unexpected and now exciting, and only God knows what he has for me in the 21st century.

LAW REVISION

Law Revision

LAW REVISION REPORT TO CONFERENCE

The Law Revision Committee met throughout the year to consider the changes arising from last year's Conference as well as issues that have arisen during this year. These are set out below.

Section 8 Disciplinary Code

22. Mediation

- (a) Mediation shall not be used when the complaint is one of sexual harassment.
- (b) A Complaints Officer may arrange for mediation in respect of a complaint, but prior to mediation taking place there shall be consultation between the Complaints Officer and the General Secretary to confirm that adequate funds are available.
- (c) If the parties cannot reach agreement as to mediation within three working days of the Complaints Officer suggesting mediation, the Complaints Officer shall refer forward a report and a copy of the complaint to the Complaints Review Panel pursuant to section 23(b) of this Code.
- (d) Having agreed to attempt to reach a mediated resolution, mediation shall occur within 21 days ("the **Mediation Period**"). Written advice of the outcome of the mediation shall be provided to the Complaints Officer by the mediator and shall be signed by all present at the mediation.
- (e) If the mediation results in a resolution, the Complaints Officer shall prepare a report pursuant to section 23(a) of this Code and the complaint shall be deemed concluded.
- (f) If the parties cannot reach a mediated resolution within the Mediation Period, then subject to subsection (a) of this clause, the mediation process may be extended for one additional Mediation Period if all parties agree.
- (g) If at the end of the Mediation Period(s) no mediated resolution is reached, the Complaints Officer shall forward a report and a copy of the complaint to the Complaints Review Panel pursuant to section 23(b) of these Laws.
- (h) No complaint which may result in a Presbyter being found to be unsuitable to continue in Full Connexion with the Conference or involving dishonesty, shall be referred to a mediation process.

22. Mediation Process

If mediation is to take place, then subject to this Code, the mediator shall regulate the mediation procedure.

31. Functions of the Review Chairperson

- (a) To receive the report of any Complaints Officer.
- (b) Where the report from a Complaints Officer involves the reference of the complaint to a Complaints Review Committee then:
 - (i) Under Section 19(d)(iv)(2) to constitute a Complaints Review Committee from the Reviewers Panel
 - (ii) Under Section 19(d)(iv)(3) to constitute a Complaints Review Committee from the Review Panel only in the event the Complainant notifies that General Secretary within 14 days of receipt of the Complaints Officer's determination that he/she objects to the determination that the matter should not proceed further.
- (c) Where the Review Chairperson is not a member of a Complaints Review Committee when constituted, to appoint a Convenor who shall chair that Complaints Review Committee.
- (d) In respect of such matters as are advised to the Review Chairperson by a Complaints Review Committee, which are more appropriately dealt with by civil or criminal authorities to advise the Complainant to take the complaint to the appropriate authority, and where appropriate no further action will be taken until the appropriate authority has concluded its own procedures.

- (e) Ensure that all reports required of Complaints Review Committees are forwarded promptly to all concerned as provided by this Code.
- (f) To arrange the preparation of formal charges and filing with the Disciplinary Tribunal in accordance with sections 38 and 39.
- (g) In consultation with the General Secretary, to appoint legal or other suitable Counsel to prosecute any matter before the Disciplinary Tribunal.
- (h) Report to Conference each year as to the work of the Reviewers and the Complaints Review Committees, with any suggestions as to amendments to this Code.

33. Functions of each Complaints Review Committee

Each Complaints Review Committee shall:

- (a) ensure that the Complaints Officer has complied with the procedures contained in Sections 19-24 of this Code;
- (b) determine whether a complaint should be referred back to the Complaints Officer or another Complaints Officer in the event that the procedures in Sections 19 24 have not been followed;
- (c) consider and deal with any complaint properly referred to it;
- (d) determine if the matter is one which should be referred to the civil or criminal authorities and if so to advise the Review Chairperson;
- (e) determine if a Charge is to be brought. A Charge may be brought notwithstanding that the person complained against is being dealt with under the civil or criminal law. A Charge under this Code which depends, for its determination, upon the findings in a prosecution or claim under the civil or criminal law will not be dealt with under this Code until the civil or criminal process has been completed;
- (f) exercise and perform such other functions as are conferred upon the Committee by Conference.

34. Procedure of the Complaints Review Committee

- (a) The Complaints Review Committee shall review and consider the complaint and the accompanying report. Normally such review and consideration shall be completed within 14 days of the Complaints Review Committee being convened. ("the Review Period").
- (b) When reviewing the complaint and accompanying report, the Complaints Review Committee shall determine whether:
 - (i) the complaint shall be taken no further;
 - (ii) the person complained against shall be charged and brought before the Tribunal;
 - (iii) the complaint involves matters which should be referred to the civil or criminal authorities.
- (c) If, upon the expiry of the Review Period the Complaints Review Committee determines that:
 - (i) the complaint shall be taken no further, the Complaints Review Committee shall prepare a report pursuant to section 36(a) of this Code; or
 - (ii) the complaint shall be taken further and the person complained against be charged and brought before the Disciplinary Tribunal, the Complaints Review Committee is to act pursuant to section 37 of this Code; or
 - (iii) the complaint is one which should be referred to the Police, the Complaints Review Committee shall prepare a report pursuant to section 37(a) of this Code and refer the matter to the Police.

- (d) During the Review Period, the District Superintendent shall ensure that continuing suitable pastoral care and counselling is available to the parties, including where appropriate, members of the parish of the complainant and/or the respondent or any others affected.
- (e) The Complaints Review Committee shall not have power to deal with any matter where the effect of doing so would be to replace the procedures as to Stationing as set out in section 2.17.1ff of the Laws.
- (f) Subject to this Code and the rules of natural justice, the Complaints Review Committee shall regulate its procedure in such a manner as it thinks fit, and shall advise all parties as to the procedure for any matter before it at the earliest opportunity.
- (g) The Complaints Review Committee shall give written notice of the complaint to the person complained against, and shall request a response to the complaint.
- (h) The Complaints Review Committee shall contact and interview the person complained against, and may also contact and interview the complainant, and any other person the Complaints Review Committee believes to be, or may be, relevant to, or have information relevant to, the complaint.
- (i) The Complaints Review Committee shall be able to instruct the Complaints Officer who referred the complaint to the Complaints Review Committee to act as an agent of the Complaints Review Committee and conduct further investigations and interviews on its behalf.
- 64. Any time limits contained within this code are to be strictly adhered to, however, they may be extended from time to time for specified periods by the Complaints Review Chairperson or the Tribunal Chairperson as appropriate by written advice to the parties and the General Secretary. Any failure to meet time limits shall not invalidate any actions done or decisions made.

BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION REPORT TO CONFERENCE 2004

INTRODUCTION

The Administration Division has continued to refine the new administrative structure put in place during 2003. The restructuring of the office has led to increased efficiency with a more effective use and understanding of our software programmes. The move from manual to fully computerised systems has also enabled us to move from fourteen fulltime staff members to twelve in the Christchurch Office. We may need to employ short term staff during busy periods e.g. year end for accounts. The situation will be monitored on a regular basis.

The Division carries a large responsibility on behalf of the Connexion. We provide full accounting services for twenty five "clients", manage over \$100 million in funds as well as providing administration services for the Conference and office of the General Secretary.

During this year the Board has had a sub committee reviewing the structure and work of the Church Building and Loan Committee with a view to repositioning it to offer a more effective service to the Connexion in a time when legislative requirements have become complex and require more skilled advice from the Connexional resource people. The report of the Task Group is set out in detail in the body of this report.

STAFF

In June of this year Judith Williams indicated her wish to retire. Judith gave loyal and committed service to the Church for twenty five years as well as attending Conference as Secretary from 1979. She was first secretary to Allan Woodley then Personal Assistant to the Secretaries of Council for Mission and finally Personal Assistant to the Chief Accountant and Executive Officer of CB&L, Travel Agent, Receptionist and friend to all who phoned in. A Connexionally representative group of fifty people gathered at the Connexional Office for lunch and a time to pay tribute and share memories on 1 July, 2004. We wish Judith and Gordon a long and happy retirement

During 2003, as we moved to increased use of email and the web, a decision was taken to close down the printery. This move meant the position of Printer and Assistant to the Printer became redundant. Alison Sealby had undertaken the printing task commencing in the office in 1979. Alison was joined later by her husband Maurice and together for twenty three years they faithfully prepared Conference Agendas and Minutes, Information leaflets and undertook the huge task of printing, assembling and packing the 10th of the month mailing. The Board wishes to acknowledge the loyalty and commitment of Alison and Maurice and wishes them well for their future.

Within the Division we have already made a strategic staffing change to strengthen the property department within the office. Ruth Le Couteur has until this year been employed primarily as a financial accountant but in reality spent most of her time working in the property area where she has developed an extensive knowledge of and expertise in Church property matters. The 2002/3 Office review had suggested that changes to the administration of CB&L would be appropriate. Taking both these factors into account a new position of Administrator has been established which now enables Ruth to concentrate her time into property matters for the benefit of the Connexion. A key aspect of this task will be the Administrator making visits to Districts to offer workshops for District and Parish property committees as well as being available to offer assistance and advice by email and telephone.

Financial Accountant Jo Preston took twelve months maternity leave from April 2004 and has since notified the Division of her resignation, as she and her husband along with baby Harry, move to Ashburton. We wish the family well for the future as they make this move. Jo's clients are being cared for by Leah Scales our Financial Services Manager.

Stacey Cochrane began work in May as office junior. Stacey will undertake the reception task left vacant by Judith William's retirement.

The Division is putting a new travel booking system in place which is outlined in the body of this report.

Sarah Andrews has moved to a new position of assistant accountant.

The executive staff, Greg Wright, David White and Leah Scales continues to be available to the Connexion as key resource people.

REFLECTIONS FROM A FINANCIAL PERSPECTIVE

The Connexional Office currently provides accounting services to 25 church entities. These services include:

- providing use of a bank account
- payment of expenditure

- receipt of income
- debtors/creditors maintenance
- payroll services
- investment services
- loan management
- preparation of GST returns
- fixed asset maintenance
- accounting reports for monthly/quarterly management meetings
- annual Financial Statements
- overview of Audit process

We are in changing times with the possible introduction of the Charities Bill and the Adoption of International Reporting Standards, the level of reporting requirements for the church is about to change significantly.

GST, PAYE and employment issues are areas that legislation continues to be updated, and keeping up with these changes is a full time job. While support via information leaflets and treasurers manuals will continue to be provided it seems the expectation on treasurers is becoming increasingly high.

The Connexional office recognises this increasing burden and is currently looking at ways of reducing this by offering additional services.

Namely:

- Centralised payroll- paying Stipend's nationally will eliminate the need for Parishes to understand the complexities of PAYE deductions, and ensuring payments are made to the Inland Revenue Department on time.
- Centralised payment the Connexional office is well equipped to handle large volume of payments both through PC Banking and manual, it makes sense that we explore the possibilities of providing a banking service.
- Agency with Inland Revenue Department linking all church entities to an authority list held by the Connexional office will allow us to work directly with the Inland Revenue Department on your behalf with any tax queries/penalties/tax arrears.
- Computer packages looking into possible options for small computer systems for parish treasurers.

The hope is that these options can be progressed within the next financial year, if there are any other services you would like to see the Connexional Office provide or if you would like to obtain a quote for our current services, please contact Leah Scales, Financial Services Manager.

REIMBURSEMENT OF SUPERVISION FEES

Conference referred Memorial C (Minutes of Conference E18) regarding supervision costs to the Board for comment:

Because supervision is mandatory in the MCNZ for all those involved in professional ministry, This Synod asks Conference to move with urgency to establish a policy covering the reimbursement of fees of Presbyters, Deacons and stipended Lay Workers.

The question was addressed by the Stipend sub-committee of the Board which brings the recommendation that the entity responsible for payment of stipend should pay supervision costs up to an agreed figure.

STIPENDS

Review of Allowances

Presbyters were asked to maintain detailed records of their ministry related expenses during the year ended 31 March 2004. By the time the stipend review committee meet 31 responses had been received. These responses indicated:

- The amount spent on Ministry related expenses ranged from \$1,244.31 to \$7,924.65. The median or middle spending was \$2,805.78 and the average amount spent was \$3,305.78. The standard reimbursing allowance paid during the year was \$2,485.
- The amount spent on books, magazines, newspapers, internet and other resource materials ranged from \$551.44 to \$1,818.25. The median amount spent was \$1,057.90 and the average amount was \$1,101.45. The maximum book allowance reimbursement for the year was \$826.
- On average the Presbyters who returned survey response forms had own their current vehicle for around 4 years. The average price paid for the vehicle was \$9,719.
- The distance travelled on ministry related travel ranged from 2,982 kilometres to \$14,514 kilometres with an average travelling distance of 5,318 kilometres and the median distance was 6,952 kilometres.
- Using the standard reimbursement rates as approved by the Inland Revenue, the amount of travel allowance reimbursement should have ranged from \$1,658.58 to \$7,250.00 with the median allowance being \$3,701.35 and the average allowance of \$3,933.83.

• By apportioning the costs of owning and running the motor vehicle between church related travel and other travel, three of the Presbyters who responded spent more on the church related costs for their motor vehicles than the allowance they would have received. However in each case the expenses in the current year included some significant repair costs. On average 50.6% of the travel allowance was used to meet the church related costs of owning and running their vehicle. The analysis of costs did not include any allowance for the capital cost of owning the vehicle.

Stipend and Allowances from 1 July 2004

The Stipend Review Committee accepted that it was appropriate to increase the standard stipend, standard allowances and book allowance reimbursement by the annual movement in the Consumer Price Index to 31 March 2004. The amounts payable for the year commencing on 1 July 2004 as a result of 1.5% increase were:

Standard stipend	\$ 35,420
Standard allowances	\$ 2,522

CENTRALISED PAYMENTS OF STIPENDS

Introduction

The Methodist movement did not just spontaneously happen. Because of the constant travelling and preaching of John Wesley and his band of itinerant lay-preachers the movement grew and spread across England. The key factor that held the movement together and made it so effective was what Methodists today call Connexionalism. The Wesley's very intentionally sought to ensure that Methodists were 'one connected people'. Questions of polity, doctrine and property emerged as the movement grew and Wesley's response to these questions was, as always, pragmatic.

What began as a conversation between three clergy and six lay preachers in August 1745 at Bristol became the basis of Methodist polity: the Annual Conference. The Conference was the primary means of connecting the people called Methodists together. It did this by providing an annual forum to discuss issues of polity and doctrine, by resourcing the local societies and preachers and by providing the necessary administrative support so that Methodists according to John Wesley, 'could be more firmly and closely united'. This initiative in polity was so effective that after three short years there were United Societies in over seventy localities clustered into nine divisions or circuits. All of this grew out of John Wesley's dream that Methodists would always be united 'both in things spiritual and temporal'.

The tendency to 'centralise' the life of the Methodist people around the Conference freed the Wesleys and lay preachers to concentrate on building the movement beyond the Conference while stewards with appropriate skills were appointed to coordinate and oversee the 'temporal' matters of the connexion. In light of this historical context, the move to establish a central payroll system that facilitates the payment of Presbyter's stipends and provides an accounting service for other parish expenses is consistent with the way the Methodist connexion evolved. It also reflects Wesley's overall concern that there would be a general union of Methodists... 'firmly united by one spirit of love'. Such a centralised pay and accounting system could free presbyters and parishes alike to concentrate more fully on the mission of the Church in their local communities.

Issues

The Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing meeting identified a significant area of concern within parishes was finding people with sufficient knowledge and experience to undertake all of the functions of a parish treasurer. There was particular concern with the increasing legislative compliance requirements with the payment of stipend and wages. The Committee therefore asked the Board of Administration to investigate a centralised accounting service that could be offered to parishes.

Suggested Process

As a first stage the Administration Division would move to establish a central payroll system for the payment of Presbyters stipends. The hope would be to have this available from 1 February 2005. When stage one (the payment of stipends) had been implemented the Division would establish processes to enable other parish employees to be included within the centralized system.

As a third stage, the Administration Division would then plan a further development of the system to make payment of other parish expenses and thereby enable to the Division to offer a full accounting service for any parish seeking such a service. The payroll relationship would be between the Division and the Parish. Presbyters would relate to the Parish Stewards/Treasurers as is currently the case.

GENERAL PURPOSES TRUST BOARD

The Board of Administration has been concerned for some time that there are a number of legacies held in the General Purposes Trust Fund for the benefit of orphanages and children's homes. The Church in more recent times has shifted away from providing purpose built residential care for "at risk" children and has not operated an orphanage for many years. The focus is now on providing assistance by working with families in their own environment.

The Board sought guidance and assistance on the most appropriate action for the Church to take to allow the Church to use the monies from these legacies for the benefit of "at risk" children.

The advice received indicated that there were long term benefits and advantages in adopting the option of passing a private Act of parliament. This course of action has been successfully followed by both the Presbyterian and Anglican Churches. The Board resolved to ask Buddle Findlay to begin the process of promoting such an act after carefully looking at all legacies to make sure all unusable legacies are included.

CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND

The review material was sent by the Connexional Office in December, 2003, to selected parts of the Church, seeking responses by 31 March, 2004. Additional time was subsequently allowed.

9 replies were received, and considered by the committee, including a detailed, full response from the Auckland DPAC.

The committee notes that:-

- (a) the majority of the responses were affirmative of the present processes, and
- (b) many commented favourably about the Executive Officer, and
- (c) Auckland was the only DPAC to respond, and it therefore assumes that the other DPACs are satisfied with current practices and processes, and
- (d) The lack of further responses can be taken as indicating general satisfaction with present practices and processes.

One concern did emerge from the responses; that sometimes a Parish or congregation will deal with the local DPAC, or direct with CBL, without the knowledge of the other. This, the committee considers, can be easily remedied, and is dealt with in the recommendations.

It has also come to the committee's attention that premises for several Child-Care Centres seem to have been set up on Church land without, in some cases, DPAC or CBL consent, and, in some cases, independent Trusts seem to have been established for child care purposes.

Conclusions and recommendations arising from this part of the Report.

- 1. There is no mandate perceived to change present structures, procedures or processes of either CBL or DPACs, except that whenever an application or issue comes to one, each need to check direct with and inform the other, and to keep the other fully informed, during the consent process, noting that under Church Law, CBL has to issue any final consent subject to any decision of the Board of Administration. The committee see it as desirable that this position be retained.
- 2. The Church, and especially newer congregations and Parishes, need to be reminded that formal consent is required for all new buildings, and for alterations to existing buildings.
- 3. It would now be helpful in engendering both understanding of, and compliance with, the consent process if Property Information Leaflets and other process information as appropriate were to be available in each of the Samoan, Tongan and Fijian languages, and in other languages, as necessary.
- 4. The full Board should receive and consider the responses from the Auckland DPAC, and from one other raising suggestions regarding the future handling of the insurance of Church property.

Other Issues.

The above deals with the issues of structure and process. The committee also requested information direct from CBL regarding funds available to it, and the number of applications for funding being received and processed, with the object of reviewing the CBL function in providing loans to the Connexion.

The committee sees these as areas needing further examination. It is reluctant to make specific suggestions, as it does not have the detailed knowledge of the CBL Committee itself as to the likely effect of any changes, but it notes that:-

- (a) Palagi Church membership, and probably therefore the need for development funds, is shrinking, and
- (b) Parishes generally are struggling to make ends meet, and
- (c) there seem to be ample funds in the CBL coffers to enable much larger loans to be available to Parishes as of right, and
- (d) the policy of making the interest rate for the first two years of a loan term only 2.5%pa. seems exceptionally generous to the few Parishes which can afford a land purchase or building project, and
- (e) the funds in the Property Realisation Fund seem to be steadily increasing, without any apparent need or plan to utilise them for the benefit of the Church, and with little likelihood that the Parishes, which were obliged to lodge them, will in most cases, ever be able to access them again.

REMOVAL FUND

The Board of Administration has had to approve a significant increase in the Removal Fund levy from \$10.00 to \$16.00 per member for the year commencing July 2004. The fund has been incurring deficits for a number of years and despite receiving a grant of \$50,000 from P.A.C. during the 2003/4 financial year, had no funding left at the end of the financial year.

During the 2003-2004 year the fund was responsible for 29 moves with a total cost of in excess of \$108,000. The number of inter-Island moves has contributed significantly to the costs involved and indications are that this situation will continue in the current year.

The levy is based on the membership numbers provided in the annual statistical returns as at June 2003.

The Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing Committee acknowledged that the annual levy needed to be set at a rate that reflected the cost of moving presbyters into appointments, students into Theological College and retiring presbyters to their retirement home.

INSURANCE FUND

The Insurance Fund was very pleased to hold insurance premiums at the same level as last year.

The Fund provides comprehensive covers with minimal excesses and the benefit of quarterly payments of premium at most competitive rates.

In addition the Fund provides a full suite of liability covers for the protection of the Church and its members.

In large measure, the ability of the Church to provide excellent insurance cover is the result of the careful risk management exhibited throughout the Church. This is particularly so with regard to the notification of potential liability claims which gives the Church the opportunity of having these circumstances appropriately managed to achieve early resolution where possible or at least, to manage the process to ensure that all legal requirements are met and the Church is not exposed to claims for faulty process which are often more difficult to resolve than the original complaint.

An other factor impacting on the Church's ability to offer quality insurance cover is the use of alarm systems – (both smoke and intruder) which have proved highly effective in safeguarding the Church's property from serious harm.

The Fund is completing the agreement to provide further enhancements to the alarm protection system including the low cost installation of alarm systems within parsonages.

PARISH LIABILITY

Conference 1992 received a report from the Board of Administration and passed several resolutions regarding the indemnity available to parishes and parish officials undertaking the financial and contractual obligations of the Church. The Board of Administration is revisiting the report and resolutions to see if anything has transpired in the intervening twelve years to see if any review if necessary.

An information leaflet will be published during 2004.

ARCHIVES REVIEW

During 2002/3 the Board undertook a professional review of Church Archives and the resulting report was sent for discussion and action to a group representative of professional and user groups in the church. A small work group was formed from the membership of this group. The work group initially prepared a policy document which was distributed to Synods for comment and they followed this with a detailed business and implementation plan which is attached to this report for discussion and decision.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON THE CONNEXIONAL FINANCIAL REVIEW

This committee has continued to review and monitor the financial reports of all Synods, Committees and Boards of the Church. Generally these groups undertake a very high standard of reporting and the Committee is working to establish a standard for groups where some improvement is considered necessary.

In undertaking the financial statement reviews, where the Review Committee identified areas of concern they have worked with the particular groups to clarify the matters of concern and assisted in reaching an agreed approach on how to proceed in the future. The Review Committee considers that this approach is the way that Conference anticipated it would undertake its work; that is to offer its expertise in assisting groups to address any areas of concern rather than perform an overall internal audit function of the Connexional finances and report its findings to Conference.

DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

The Disciplinary Code continues to serve the Church well. It is allowing complaints to be handled objectively by independent people and frees the President and Vice President from the conflict of being pastor and often judge as was required under the old system.

Five complaints have been dealt with this year four new ones and one concluded from last year. Following are the outcomes:

- 1. Two complaints were found to be without substance
- 2. The third was settled at mediation
- 3. The fourth complaint went to the Review Panel who determined that "The complaint shall be taken no further..."
- 4. A fifth complaint is still under action at the time of printing.

Complaints Review Committee Chairperson Report

The chairperson of the Complaints Review Committee is required to report to Conference each year as to the work of the Complaints Reviewers and to make any suggestions as to amendments to the Disciplinary Code.

This year, there has been one complaint that has been considered by the Complaints Review Committee. The process of the complaint has been completed and the necessary reports have been forwarded to all those required under the Code.

There are some amendments to the Disciplinary Code that will be brought before Conference this year.

HUMAN RIGHTS ACT – BILL OF RIGHTS

Conference 2003 received the following notice of motion:

"The Conference in the past agreed to abide by the spirit and intention of the Human Rights Act as to the elimination of discrimination on the grounds of sexual orientation, therefore we ask that the whole Church expressly declare its acceptance of the total prohibition of all grounds of discrimination set out in the Human Rights Act and Bill of Rights Act."

Conference did not accept this motion but resolved:

"Conference refers this matter for the Board of Administration for comment and report to Conference 2004."

The Board had already sought a legal opinion regarding the application of the Human Rights Act and believe that the opinion given confirmed with the Church's understanding of its decision. A further opinion has been obtained in relation to the notice of motion and applications of the Bill of Rights Act. In summary:

Of particular relevance to the Notice of Motion is the limit on the application of the Act. It applies to the legislative, executive and judicial branches of the government of New Zealand or any other person or body in performance of a public function, power, or duty conferred or imposed by law. This is the affect of section 3 of the BORA, the application provision of the Act.

...Thus the BORA would only have application if members or the Church were acting as an agent of one of the three branches of government covered by subsection 3(a).

I am of the view that members of the Church or the general public would not be able to seek redress against the Church on the basis that it is in breach of the BORA. Steps or action taken by the Church which is not carried out "in the performance of any public function, power, or duty" will not be subject to redress under the BORA.

A full copy of the opinion is available from the Connexional Office.

HUMAN RESOURCES, EMPLOYMENT AND HEALTH AND SAFETY

Conference referred the following notice of motion to the Board of Administration for comment and report to Conference 2004

"We note with appreciation the work done by the Methodist Church of New Zealand Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa on important matters such as Procedures for dealing with Sexual Harassment and Abuse, The Disciplinary Code and work being undertaken with regard to Liability Risk Management Insurance. We ask that Conference ask The Board of Administration to urgently begin work to address the matters relating to Human Resources and employment and health and safety procedures; especially as they pertain to the Church's obligation to be a "good employer' and their relationship to the Methodist Church's understanding of pastoral care for lay workers, deacons and presbyters.

As a part of this process we ask that a small working group be established to research:

a) the experience of those currently or recently employed by the church

b) The current modern management practice related to these issues.
 (We use the term 'employment' in a broad sense, understanding that each is employed in doing that to which they are called)."

In response to this Notice of Motion:

- A standard exit interview form has been developed and is being trialled with staff who have recent concluded their employment in the Administration Division and the Christchurch Mission where an exit interview policy and procedure was already in place.
- Current information leaflets containing template employment agreement have been updated so as to incorporate changes in the Employment Relations Act 2000 and the Holidays Act 2003.
- Checklists have been produced to alert and assist parishes of their obligations under the Employment Relations Act 2000 and the Health & Safety in Employment Act 1992.
- From time to time the Administration Division will provide general information on indicative remuneration scales for paid employees within a parish.

CHARITIES BILL

The long-awaited Charities Bill became available in draft form to Parliament and the public at the beginning of April, and was referred to the Social Services Select Committee for consideration, and the presentation of public submissions.

If adopted the Bill establishes the Charities Commission and requires it to register charities and approved donees. Registration entitles a charity to exemption from income tax without any further reference to the Inland Revenue Department. The Commission must also monitor registered charities to ensure that the exemption from income tax continues to be justified by the activities carried out. Registration will be voluntary and will not affect the charity's legal status. Unregistered charities will not receive any exemption from income tax, and substantial gifts to them will be subject to gift duty.

Organisations are able to elect whether to register as a single entity, or branch by branch. The first option means a single annual return and registration fee. The second option requires a return from each branch, and multiple fees.

The nature and extent of the information to be filed on registration and each year, and the fees to be paid, will be detailed in statutory regulations which have not been published yet.

Staff members from the Connexional Office have attended various workshops, and a one-day internal workshop has been held to discuss the practical implications for the Methodist Church. Among our concerns are the difficulties in defining the Church and the organisations actually included in any registration process, and perhaps more importantly, the organisations that would fall outside the scope of a group registration and need to seek their own. There are practical difficulties in compiling a single set of financial information for the likely annual return.

Careful study convinced the internal group that a single group registration is the best option for the Church. Staff already have experience at compiling group GST returns, and once the systems are in place the work should be relatively straightforward. This will avoid the need for multiple registrations and relieve treasurers and other voluntary officers of the need to prepare and file their own individual annual returns directly with the Commission.

The Church is represented on the Inter-Church Working Party on Taxation, and has been working with that group on a submission to the Select Committee. The Methodist Church along with several parishes and other Methodist Church groups made submissions as well.

Staff have also been reflecting on the implications of the adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards to New Zealand. The indications are that these standards will require a higher level of accounting and financial reporting than the Church has been obliged to follow to date. The standards are likely to apply equally to not-for-profit and corporate sectors. The suggested criteria would place the Church in the category with the highest expected standard. This will also probably require the compilation of a single set of financial statements for the whole of the Methodist Church. The standards will come into effect in 2007 and we will have to adhere to them from the 2006 year in order to be able to show comparative figures when the regime becomes fully effective.

The Methodist Church, Partner Churches and the Inter-Church Working Party on Taxation have also made submissions on the financial reporting standards to the Ministry of Economic Development following the publication of a discussion document seeking comments and reactions.

RATES – LOCAL GOVERNMENT RATING ACT 2002

Rating under the new Act came into force on 1 July 2003 and it is evident that during the last twelve months a number of Local Authorities have been reviewing the exemptions and rebates available to enable them to achieve the widest possible rating base.

The most obvious impact of the new Act was the separation of rating charges by Regional Authorities from the local Government units who have previously collected rates on its behalf.

A number of local authorities have reviewed the exemptions provided to Churches in respect of rates.

Churches have been subject to targeted rates such as sewerage, water supply, waste collection etc, but are exempt from general rates.

The exemption from rating is contained under Section 9 of the new Act which is largely in the same format as the earlier legislation stating that general rates are not charged on Church property for

"Land used solely or principally –

- (a) as a place of religious worship:
- (b) for a Sunday or Sabbath school or other form of religious education and not used for private pecuniary profit."

In the schedule to the Act "not used for private pecuniary profit" is defined

"..... land must not be treated as being used for private pecuniary profit solely because charges are made for the use of that land if the net proceeds of the charges are applied....

(b) solely for the purposes of the organisation that makes those charges and no part of the charge is distributed as profit to any individual."

This provision seems to clearly validate the practice of many Churches in making a charge to community groups for the use of their premises so long as the monies received are used exclusively for the benefit of the Church group.

A number of local authorities have looked closely at the wording of the exemption and have decided that "solely or principally" and the expressions "religious worship and or religious education" are to be very narrowly interpreted and where Church properties are being used for the purposes of food banks, community group meetings, Handiscope groups, or any other use which is not religious worship or religious education, then the properties are subject to rates for that proportion of use which is non-exempt.

The Methodist Church of New Zealand in conjunction with the other major denominations have made strenuous representations that the Church's life and mission and therefore "religious worship" or "religious education", are expressed in a huge variety of ways other than liturgical worship or the teaching of bible stories. To date local authorities have not been persuaded to change their view and rates have been levied on a number of parishes on property which has previously been considered exempt.

The denominations through the Interchurch Working Party on Taxation and other issues has sought a legal opinion from Dr Roydon Somerville on the legal and practical implications of the exemption contained in the Local Government Rating Act and his opinion is expected prior to Conference.

Any parish which receives a declaration form or other request for a statement of the uses to which Church property is being put, should contact the Connexional Office before the form is completed and any parish which receives notice of an apportionment of valuation for the purposes of rating, should lodge an objection after discussion with the Connexional Office.

Once rates are levied, parishes are probably better to pay the rates on a "without prejudice basis" than incur the penalty charges that may apply whilst the legal position is being tested.

Some local authorities are offering rates relief grants to "make up for" the exemptions previously enjoyed. Any parish that applies for such a rebate or grant must do so on a without prejudice basis to the underlying belief that the properties are exempt from rates in the first instance.

Rates exemption is a statute based provision, rates relief is a discretionary activity under the control of the local authority and relief that may be granted one year may not be available in the future.

The Connexional Office is available to discuss individual parish experience as required.

PRESBYTERS LOAN FUND

Introduction:

For many years there have been two funds that have provided loan funding for Presbyters, one primarily for vehicles and the other to assist in the acquisition of housing for those acquiring a property prior to retirement. At the present time car loans are available for up to \$6,000 repayable over 5 years. Students coming out from Theological College have received interest free loans and other Presbyters have been eligible for interest bearing loans with a condition for the car loans that the borrower also have a deposit account which is intended to provide funding for when a new vehicle is purchased.

The Housing loans are available for up to \$25,000 or Presbyters interest in the Supernumerary Fund whichever is the lesser. These loans are repayable by the time of retirement or 10 years with monthly principal and interest payments.

Proposal:

It is proposed to "Incorporate a new fund, thereafter named 'Presbyters Loan Fund" formed by the merger of the Presbyters Housing Loan Fund and the Presbyters Deacons and Layworkers Loan Fund.

Purpose of Presbyters Loan Fund:

To provide loan facilities for the use of house purchases, including substantial alterations, up to a maximum of \$25,000. Vehicle purchases for those graduating from Theological College who are being stationed by Conference to a Stipendiary appointment up to a maximum of \$7,500 such loans being interest free with the existing grants from the Thorndon Trust being re-applied to the new fund to compensate for the interest that is not earned on the loans. The rationale for the grants received by the Presbyters Deacons and Layworkers Loan fund from the Thorndon Trust is to cover the interest lost on the interest free loans.

Suggested Operating Guidelines for all Loans:

- 1. All Housing loans authorised and advanced will be <u>subject to the limitation of the borrower's interest in the</u> <u>Supernumerary Fund.</u>
- 2. All new loans to be approved by the General Secretary and the Financial Services Manager.
- 3.. Repayment terms of all loans are detailed below in specific loan options any extensions beyond the maximum to be approved by the General Secretary and the Financial Services Manager.
- 4. All assets acquired with the proceeds of these loans must be insured for a value greater than the loan advanced and any other borrowings that may have been obtained from other sources.
- 5. Information on ability to service loans may need to be provided by the borrower, particularly from those seeking their first loan, or who do not have an established credit record.

Any exceptions outside these Operating Guidelines shall require the additional approval of the Chairperson of the Board of Administration.

Specific Loan Options:

The format and drawdown facilities of the loans will be as follows:

- 1. <u>Students Loans</u> students entering stipendiary ministry will be entitled to an interest free loan of up to \$7,500 repayable over 5 years. The loan can be uplifted after Conference has confirmed the stationing of the student and up to 6 months after taking up their first appointment. In the event of a probationer resigning from ministry and having insufficient funds in the Supernumerary Fund to fully repay the loan, the General Secretary shall have the discretion to enter into an arrangement with the borrower and negotiate repayments.
- 2. <u>Housing Loans</u> a loan facility of up to \$25,000 is to be made available for the purchase, including substantial alterations, of a residential property, repayable over 10 years, with interest and principal payable by equal monthly instalments. Interest rate to be in accord with the Westpac first mortgage 1 year fixed rate, changes to interest rate as at 31st March each year.

Other Issues:

The Presbyters Loan Fund will need funding to be able to make future loan advances. It is suggested that this funding be advanced from the following existing funds:

- Presbyters Deacons and Layworkers Loan Fund - Equity \$131K; with Loans of \$132K, Investments in M.T.A. \$108K; Depositors Funds \$118K

- Presbyters Housing Loan Fund - Equity \$562K, with \$233K in Presbyters Housing Loans, \$187K invested in M.T.A.; \$137K Supernumerary Loans.

The reasons for proposing the discontinuation of loans for other than Housing and those who are taking up their first appointment after completing their training at Theological College are as follows:-

- a. That having had assistance after commencing Ministry, with the purchasing of their first vehicle Presbyters should have the ability to fund replacement vehicles.
- b. At present, finance is readily available in the commercial market at competitive rates.
- c. The General Secretary can arrange financial assistance to Presbyters in extreme situations from other sources.
- d. Concern has been expressed that the criteria of limiting funding to Stipendiary Presbyters eliminated the availability of funding for Non-Stipendiary Presbyters.

With the changes in the criteria for loans the present policy of deposits will be discontinued and therefore additional funding may be required although the amalgamation of the funds at the 30^{th} June 2004 would see a deposit in the Methodist Trust Association of \$295,000.

Supernumerary Fund

At the end of July, Charlie Cahn, as actuary for the Supernumerary Fund, presented his report to the Trustee following the triennial actuarial valuation review of the Fund to 31 January 2004. A summary report of that Actuarial Review has been included as part of the Trustee's report to this Conference. Overall his report shows that fund is in a reasonably sound financial position and is able to meet its obligations to pensioners and members as they arise. However, the significant downturn in world wide investment markets during 2002 and 2003 has had an impact on the fund. A consequence of that downturn has necessitated holding the retirement benefit rate at its current value of \$373.28 for each year of contribution for the last three years. However, it is pleasing to note a significantly positive investment performance return in the 2004 year.

As part of the legislative requirements, the actuary is required to report on the ability of the fund to pay out every member had they all resigned and ceased to be members at the balance date. As the Trustee has reported in its last three annual reports to members, the total value of the investments held by the Supernumerary Fund would not be sufficient to make full payment to every member and pensioner at this time. While the Trustee believes that this is a very theoretical calculation with very little, if any, probability of actually happening, the actuary under his legal obligations has advised the Trustee that they need to have a contingency in place to meet the demand regardless of how unlikely that such a demand will eventuate.

The Board of Administration therefore seeks the direction of Conference to offer to the Trustee of the Supernumerary Fund a contingent guarantee, secured by a contingent mortgage over church property which the Trustee could call upon in the event that every member withdraws from the Fund and the Fund is unable to pay those commitments. It should be noted that in order for every member to withdraw from the Fund they would be required to resign from the Ministry of the Methodist Church of New Zealand. If, at a future time, the actuary is able to certify that the value of Supernumerary Fund investments exceed the value of benefits payable to every member and pensioner on withdrawing from the Fund, this contingent guarantee would be withdrawn.

QUESTION 28: What are the decisions of Conference on matters relating to the Administration Division?

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report is received
- 2. Conference acknowledges the 25 years of loyal and committed service given to the Connexion by Judith Williams and wishes her well for a long and happy retirement.
- 3. Conference acknowledges the 23 years of loyal and committed service of Alison and Maurice Sealby in the printery and thanks them for their contribution to the life of the Connexion. We wish them well in their retirement.
- 4. Conference receives the report on the CB&L Fund and thanks the Review Committee for its work.
- 5. Conference notes that the name of the Church Building and Loan fund will become Methodist Connexional Property Committee from 1 February 2005.
- 6. Conference encourages CB&L Fund to implement the recommendations contained in the Review report.
- 7. That Conference supports the establishment of a central stipend payment system by the Administration Division.
- 8. Conference encourages parishes to transfer responsibility for the payment of Presbyter Stipends to the Administration Division on commencement of the central payroll system.
- 9. Conference supports the decision of the Stipends Committee that responsibility for payment for supervision fees, up to an agreed figure, belongs to the entity responsible for the payment of stipend.
- 10. In the event of the Charities Act being passed into law, Conference agrees that the Administration Division is to register the Methodist Church as a single entity.
- 11. Conference asks the Board of Administration to ensure that proper and appropriate systems are in place to enable Methodist Church registration and compliance with the requirements of the International Financial reporting Standards.
- 12. That Conference acknowledges that Removal Levies must be set at a rate sufficient to meet all costs incurred in authorised moves.
- 13. Conference notes that Deloitte have been appointed auditors of the financial statements prepared by the Administration Division.
- 14. Conference directs that the Board of Administration prepares and executes a guarantee in favour of the Supernumerary Fund Trustee that would be available in the event that every member withdraws from the Supernumerary Fund and the Fund is unable to fully meet its obligations.
- 15. In support of the guarantee given by the Board of Administration to the Supernumerary Fund Trustee, Conference authorises the Board of Administration to arrange a contingent mortgage over its interest in the properties in Latimer Square, Christchurch and Great South Road, Penrose, Auckland
- 16. Conference receives the report on the future of Church Archives and thanks the Committee for its work.
- 17. Conference asks the Administration division to implement the Archives proposal as set out in the Conference Agenda, noting that the Board of Administration have secured initial funding for the first three years.
- 18. The Council of Conference discuss the question of putting Archives as an item on the Connexional Budget.

COORDINATING THE APPROACH TO METHODIST ARCHIVES

An implementation plan and funding proposal prepared by Judith Bright, Greg Morgan, Helen Laurenson, and Susan Thompson on behalf of the Archives Consultation Group.

June 2004

Draft Archive Policy

The Methodist Church of New Zealand / Te Hāhi Weteriana o Aotearoa operates a Church Archive. Governance responsibility for the Archive rests with the General Secretary in consultation with the Board of Administration. Operational management is the responsibility of the Archivist, who reports to the General Secretary.

The Archive will be operated (a) at one or more sites and (b) in cooperation with such other archives as may be determined by the Archivist and approved by the General Secretary from time to time.

All Archive policies will be consistent with the Church's Mission Statement and laws.

1. Archive objective

The purpose of the Church Archive is to acquire, preserve, and make available for consultation and research records relating to the activities of the Methodist Church in New Zealand.

Records pertaining to Te Taha Maori have an essence and use which will be recognised by the Archive in its policies and practices.

2. The Archivist

The Archivist will have relevant qualifications and/or professional work experience.

The Archivist reports to the General Secretary and is responsible for maintaining, coordinating, and developing the Church Archive.

The Archivist will develop and administer policies and procedures in respect of Church materials deposited with external archives.

The Archivist will advise the Connexion on systems and processes to ensure that records of lasting value are obtained for the Archive.

Management of the Church Archive will comply with the International Council on Archives (ICA) Code of Ethics adopted by the ICA General Assembly, September 1996 and any amendments.

3. Acquisition

3.1 Archives

Records generated by those working for the Church in an official capacity are the property of the Church and must be deposited in an approved repository. In general the Archivist will seek to ensure that the Church owns material deposited in the Archive, and will in other cases make a record of ownership.

The Church Archive will acquire records created and used by the Church and its affiliates through internal transfer processes at the end of the records' active life.

The Archive will not normally acquire records relating to organisations or individuals that are not part of the Church or connected with it through significant relationships.

Records and materials are received from organisations and individuals on the understanding that if they fall outside the scope of the Archive, they may be returned to the donor or otherwise disposed of.

3.2 Artefacts

In exceptional circumstances the Church Archive may acquire artefacts of significant interest created or used by the Church. The Archive will not acquire artefacts unconnected with the Church.

4. Appraisal

Staff will appraise records according to accepted archival principles of provenance, evidential and informational value and in accordance with the Church's retention schedules and collection policy.

5. Arrangement and description

The Church Archive will be arranged and described in a way that conforms to the practices of professional archive centres.

The Archivist will maintain uniform systems for the arrangement and description of items, including the compilation and maintenance of finding aids and other resources to facilitate their use.

6. Preservation

The Church will provide and maintain the space, facilities, and resources needed to ensure the preservation of the Church Archive.

7. Access

7.1 Access to archives maintained by the Church

Access to the Church Archive will be administered in accordance with archival principles and legal requirements. As a

matter of principle the Church and the public will have equal access to the Archive.

The Church Archive may charge an appropriate fee for access. Fees will be a fair and reasonable contribution to operational costs, and will be set at the discretion of the Archivist and with the approval of the General Secretary.

Access to the Church Archive will be made available for research under conditions which ensure the preservation of the Archive and are consistent with any restrictions placed on access to particular materials.

Where necessary, a written agreement between the Archivist and a depositor may restrict access to specific material. Archive staff will observe any such restrictions.

In special circumstances the Archivist may authorise the loan of materials for a defined period of time.

Access to materials in the Church Archive will be granted only after the user has signed an access agreement and agreed to abide by its terms.

The General Secretary will always have full access to the Church Archive.

7.2 Access to Methodist materials deposited with other archives

The Archivist will seek to build partnerships with other archives as appropriate, and will develop information systems and resources to enable users to have appropriate access to "the whole Church Archive".

As required, the Archivist will seek to negotiate suitable access arrangements with other archives that hold New Zealand Methodist material.

8. Obligations of Church Staff

Policy and procedures in respect of the Church Archive are to be observed by all Church staff and volunteers, and by all custodians of archives maintained by the Church.

9. Policy review

This policy will be reviewed by the Archivist in September each year.

Reference to Methodist Church retention schedules and collection policy Introduction

The heritage of Methodist people in Aotearoa New Zealand and the Pacific is a taonga to be recognised, cared for, and made known.

At the request of the General Secretary, an Archives Consultation Group of some twenty participants facilitated by the Rev. Barbara Stephens met in September 2003 to work on developing a vision for the future development of archives created by and available to the Methodist Church of New Zealand / Te Hāhi Weteriana o Aotearoa.

The group was aware of the many discussions over a number of years, and had input from Pauline Porteous. A key task of the group was to consider her July 2002 review report.

The wider group entrusted Susan Thompson, Judith Bright, Greg Morgan, and Helen Laurenson with the writing of what has become this report and proposal. This small group saw its task as being to turn the wheel, not reinvent it. For that reason some of the debates of yesteryear (e.g. whether or not to outsource the storage of particular records) are not rehearsed here: the emphasis is on a structure that provides for good management of the whole Archive, and which can make decisions as questions and potential answers occur.

Progress was reported to Conference 2003, which made these decisions in respect of the archives project:

That the Archive Draft Policy Document be circulated to Hui Poari and Tauiwi Strategy Committee for comment.

That the Archives Consultation Group take time during 2004 to discuss the various issues, and present a detailed report, including a new policy document, business plan and funding proposal to Conference 2004.

Approach

The Archives Consultation Group recommended a coordinated approach to Archive provision. This is reflected in the draft Archive policy, which envisions dispersed archives for which a managing Archivist is responsible.

The Archive policy entails the appointment of an Archivist to achieve its objective. A draft position description was written.

Once established in the position, the Archivist will advise the General Secretary and the Board of Administration on any need to review the Archive policy. It should be reviewed regularly, and a statement on the responsibility for and timing of review added to the document. It may be decided that a reference group should be appointed so that the Archivist has a stakeholder group with which to consult.

The subcommittee then developed a plan and funding proposal for the implementation of the Archive policy. **Needs**

The subcommittee drew on earlier work to identify the resources required to run a coordinated Archive effectively. The best specific locations of various records will be determined by the Archivist from time to time. In addition to the right mix of paid and volunteer staffing, some spending on computer equipment and systems is essential for the right tools to be in place and utilised fully. The understanding and support of the Church and its community of researchers

are also important. Only if the coordinated Archive is held in high esteem will it be able to acquire and facilitate access to records of lasting value.

Technology offers new opportunities in all areas of information management, including archives. The ARK software needs to be uniformly used in managing the Archive. Another example is digitisation undertaken for preservation and/or access reasons. One responsibility of the Archivist is to keep informed of current practice and guide the Church's exploration of better ways to preserve, promote, and facilitate the use of historical records.

Implementation costs

In order for the Archive to use properly the ARK system it has in part purchased already, more user modules will be required. ARK will operate across the Christchurch and Auckland sites, providing the main multi-level database, indexer and register functionality. The Church already has the network software in place to run the ARK suite, and the proposed budget allows for a computer upgrade to support the needs of end-users. Over time grant monies may be sought to enhance hardware configuration.

Funding

The Church must understand that its archival records are precious and will therefore make provision for their care. The proposed budget indicates estimated one-off and recurrent costs.

Coordinating an Archive that exists in more than one place will require the Archivist to travel, initially to Auckland and also to archives in Wellington and Dunedin that hold Methodist records.

It is recommended that the Board of Administration assume responsibility for developing funding cases to agencies that can support the activities of the Archive.

Sources of funding could be:

PAC grant (an increase can be sought to reflect the increased staffing cost)

Lottery Grants Board (a significant source of archive and heritage funds)

Deadlines: 5 November 2004 for its 11 March 2005 meeting; 18 February 2005 for its 3 June 2005 meeting. A likely source of funding for computer hardware and software and archival stationery (see Schedule).

COGS (local grants to community organizations – may be available for local archival projects coordinated by the Archive in the future)

Education providers in theology

Donations from the Connexion

Budget transfer from the Connexion as the Archive is "contracted" to manage a wider range of archives

Donations from users -- "friends of the Methodist Archive"

Endowments, legacies

User charges: contributions towards overhead costs

Other giving

It is acknowledged with appreciation that there has been a long history of voluntary donation to the Archive in terms of personal time, expertise and dedication. It is hoped and envisaged that this will continue. The voluntary giving of time, knowledge and skill will always be of value to the Archive.

This position will require a good understanding of the work and mission of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, Te Hāhi Weteriana o Aotearoa and its commitment to a bicultural structure and ethos.

Key duties and expected outcomes:

- 1. Develops, manages, and coordinates the operation of the Archives of the Methodist Church in their various locations.
 - 1.1. The dispersed Archive is adequately stored, maintained and available for the use of the Church and other researchers.
 - 1.2. There is appropriate consultation with stakeholders over major developments.
 - 1.3. The Archive is marketed effectively to users, stakeholders and funders (includes reports and publications, the web, and in person).

- 2. Implements acquisitions guidelines and collects records in accordance with them. Advises the Connexion on systems and processes to ensure that records of lasting value are identified, obtained, and preserved for the Archive.
 - 2.1. Acquisitions guidelines reflect the Archive Policy.
 - 2.2. Records created and used by Church offices, Districts, Synods, Rohe, Parishes, and individuals are surveyed and, where appropriate, transferred to archival custody.
 - 2.3. Guidelines take account of Te Taha Māori needs..
 - 2.4. Guidelines take account of the needs of the ethnic Synods.
- 3. Manages relations with other archives, including access arrangements with other repositories which hold New Zealand Methodist records (e.g. Kinder Library, Alexander Turnbull Library, Hocken Library).
 - 3.1. Procedures are developed in respect of Church materials deposited with external archives.
 - 3.2. The Church is enabled to have access to "the whole Church Archive".
- 4. Innovates, establishes and manages operating procedures and standards to document and control records and archives, and to compile online tools, guides, inventories, and indices to assist reference and research.
 - 4.1. Management of the Church Archive complies with appropriate international standards.
 - 4.2. Records are well maintained and accessible. Users are assisted to retrieve information.
 - 4.3. Correct environmental conditions for the storage and conservation of archival records are maintained.
 - 4.4. Preservation and disaster planning are undertaken.
 - 4.5. Technology options and other opportunities are explored as they become available.
 - 4.6. Best use is made of available technology and other opportunities.
- 5. Develops and writes an annual business plan and manages budgets. Assists with budget cases.
 - 5.1. Goals and priorities are identified and planned.
 - 5.2. Achievement is measured. Outcomes are reviewed.
 - 5.3. A budget is set in accordance with the Church's budgeting cycle.
 - 5.4. The budget is monitored and variances reported monthly.
 - 5.5. Reliable information assists the Board of Administration to make funding cases on behalf of the Archive.
- 6. Manages staff and volunteers.
 - 6.1. Church policy and practice on employment and volunteerism are followed.
 - 6.2. Clear role descriptions are developed and kept current.
 - 6.3. Training and supervision are provided at the appropriate level, and performance/development review is undertaken.
 - 6.4. Staff and volunteers are encouraged to work as a team.
- 7. Reports to the General Secretary and Board of Ministry as agreed.
 - 7.1. Reports are submitted on time.
 - 7.2. Reports indicate opportunities and any financial or other risks.


METHODIST TRUST ASSOCIATION ANNUAL REPORT

The Methodist Trust Association was formed by the Church in 1978 to provide a centralised investment fund for the Church which enabled professional management of the investments and also the opportunity of using the Church's funds to develop existing church owned property that was ready for commercial development.

The Association can only accept for deposit funds controlled by the Methodist Church of New Zealand (including Cooperative Ventures in which the Church has an interest) with the Association being directed by a Conference appointed Board currently consisting of 16 members.

The Association holds money in four separate investment pools – two **Income Fund** (one for funds expected to be required within 12 months and the other for funds of longer or indefinite term), a **Growth and Income Fund** for funds invested normally for the medium to longer term requiring an income return together with capital growth and an **Equity Fund** again medium to long term fund where the funds are invested solely in shares for long term value growth.

Over the years the Income Fund has maintained a consistently good rate of return comparable to market fixed interest yields while providing excellent security and liquidity to meet depositors requirements.



The Growth and Income Fund has been conservatively invested with the majority of the investments held in New Zealand property. As such, the Association has not provided the stellar returns of some of the equity based funds in the market but equally, has not had to report the huge write downs in value suffered by a number of those same funds when the share markets turned downwards.

Currently the Growth and Income Fund is maintaining an investment allocation of:

Fixed Interest	20%
Shares	30%
Property	50%

Although it is likely that the allocation between the property market and the share market will alter as market conditions change.

Distributions

The Association provides returns to depositors through quarterly distributions with a revaluation of the Growth and Income Fund equity assets (shares and property) at 30 June each year. Distribution returns for the year to 30 June 2004 have been:

whilst capital revaluations this year added a further \$2,534,216 to Growth and Income Fund depositors, a total return for the year of 11.8%.

Equity Fund.

The Equity Fund which is still a relatively small fund with holdings in six separate New Zealand listed companies, had a satisfactory year providing returns of 23.8% for the 12 months to 30 June 2004.

The Association believes the returns provided to the Church compare very favourably with the market especially given the widespread of investments held by the Association which provides excellent security and liquidity.

Administration Fees.

There has been considerable talk in the news media over the poor performance of managed funds particularly with regard to the amount of the income earned by the funds diverted to meet management and overhead expenses which in some cases was absorbing 25% to 70% of the benefits available to depositors. For the year to 30 June 2004 management and overhead expenses accounted for 6.9% of the income attributable to Income Fund depositors and 5.6% of the income and capital accretion attributable to Growth and Income Fund depositors. Management fees for the Growth and Income Fund are charged at .6% of the value of the assets managed and for the Income Fund at 6.5% of the income earned each year.

Ethical Investment.

The Association is always mindful of the ownership of the Fund's managers and considers all investments against the terms of the Church's guidelines for socially responsible investment. The Executive Officer presented a paper at the inaugural conference of the Council for Socially Responsible Investment on the Methodist Church of New Zealand's investments and its stance on ethical investment.

A more detailed report on the activities of the Association will be included, together with the annual audited accounts, in the annual report to depositors expected to be published by the end of August.

PACT 2086 TRUST

PACT 2086 Trust exists to manage the lessor's residual interest in the terminating ground lease of the property at the corner of Queen and Turner Streets Auckland together with the residual amount of the rental payment received at the commencement of the lease after the distribution of the majority of the rental to the PAC Endowment and Investment funds.

The Trust has had a successful year with accumulated funds increasing by approximately 13%. As at 30 June 2004 the Fund had an unconditional contract for the sale of its property in Karangahape Road Auckland which is due to be settled on 5 September 2004. The PACT 2086 Trust is moving to diversify its investments to provide for long term growth in the accumulated funds of the Trust against the eventual return of the Queen Street property in 2086.

The Trust's Board is made up of the members of the Board of the Methodist Trust Association.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Sharing in the highs and lows of mission together

"In my life in union with the Lord it is a great joy to me that after so long a time you once more had the chance of showing that you care for me. I don't mean that you had stopped caring for me – you just had no chance to show it. And I am not saying this because I feel neglected, for I have learned to be satisfied with what I have. I know what it is to be in need and what it is to have more than enough. I have learned this secret, so that anywhere, at any time, I am content, whether I am full or hungry, whether I have too much or too little. I have the strength to face all conditions by the power that Christ gives me. But it was very good of you to help me in my troubles. You Philippians know very well that when I left Macedonia in the early days of preaching the Good News, you were the only church to help me; you were the only ones who shared my profits and losses. More than once when I needed help in Thessalonica, you sent it to me. It is not that I just want to receive gifts; rather, I want to see profit added to your account. Here, then, is my receipt for everything you have given me –and it has been more than enough! I have all I need now that Epaphroditus has brought me all your gifts. They are like a sweet-smelling offering to God, a sacrifice which is acceptable and pleasing to him."

Philippians 4: 10 – 18.

This story from the early church talks to us about sharing mission – both the highs and the lows. Even at the cutting edge of pioneering Christian mission, Paul struggled for adequate resources. It was only the help of those who shared his vision and supported him with their own rich resources that enabled him to continue his Christian mission.

Our theological reflection on this passage inspired our theme for this year: MAKING A DIFFERENCE: Sharing in the highs and lows of mission together.

We sent the theme to Districts and other groups within the Church, so that the criteria for considering applications were well known.

We received many stories from the Church - and it showed the many mission initiatives presently being undertaken, or about to be undertaken by the Church. The breadth of those stories can be seen in the grants made.

We continue to be concerned by Connexional funding applications, and the requirement that the PAC Distribution Group can be setting Connexional policy by deciding to make or not make a grant to a particular Connexional funding request. We were told that our decision last year to send these requests with a global amount of funding to the Budget Task Group was also unhelpful. We believe that the PAC Distribution Group should not set Connexional policy, and that a way forward needs to be found by the Connexion. In the meantime, PAC Distribution Group has no option but to decide distributions based upon the theme set.

We are pleased that the touchstones and guidelines of the PAC Distribution Group will have been considered by Council of Conference. The PAC Distribution Group have discussed ways in which they may have some input to this discussion.

ROBERT GIBSON METHODIST TRUST BOARD

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2004

Section A – Looking Back

The past year has been an active one and historic decisions have been made. Mr Robert Gibson bequeathed his dairy farm to the Church in 1931. This farm is run as two 180 cow farms. In 1980 the Trust expanded by purchasing a third farm for \$314,162. Over the years that mortgage has been cleared and bursaries have increased. We have now sold this third farm for \$2.4 million, putting the proceeds and all our reserves into the purchase of a much larger property costing \$4.3 million. A major advantage is that the new farm is adjacent to the original legacy farms. As the majority of our funds are always distributed in bursaries and grants, we are now deeply in debt (\$1.6 million). However, our increased production will gradually pay off our mortgage, helped by inflation. We record our appreciation of the support and approval received from the Methodist Church of New Zealand Investment Advisory Board.

Production for 2003-04 was 204,679 kgms, which surpassed our previous record of 199,302 kgms in 2001-02. Final payout by Fonterra was \$4.25 per kgms. Our net surplus after meeting all expenses grants and bursaries was \$111,693.

We believe that Robert Gibson would be very pleased with the way his legacy is being nurtured, and that he would approve of the Trust's positive actions towards expanding our dairy farming operations. We continue to meet Robert Gibson's intentions by helping young people to help themselves, and by our support of the Methodist Youth Ministry.

Section B - Looking Forward

The following schedule is as recommended at our Annual General Meeting, August 2004. It is not a strict budget, as farming results can be influenced by many outside factors. What it does do, is confirm the expressed position of the Trustees to continue to meet our obligations under our Trust Deed in preference to retrenching to pay off our new debt. As always, bursaries will be granted on the quality and needs and potential of the applicants, rather than worked up or down to an arbitrary figure.

We benefit from excellent management and control of our dairy farming assets.

WESLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY (NZ): TE ROOPU HITORI O TE HAAHI WETERIANA O AOTEAROA ANNUAL REPORT 2004

SECTION A – Information and Reporting Back.

As the Wesley Historical Society (NZ) looks towards its 75th Anniversary in February 2005, mindful of the relationship between past, present and future, its members continue to address the task of recording, interpreting and understanding the history of Methodism in Aotearoa/New Zealand and the South Pacific. Reflecting that interest and commitment, the Society has a current individual and institutional membership of 243. During the past year, however, the deaths of valued members Bill Burnell, Allan Bellamy, C.G. Conway, Maida Chambers, Gwen Petch, Rev. John Hamlin, Mark Venables, and Rev Dr Jim Udy (NSW), have been recorded with sadness.

Newsletters keeping membership informed of current issues were produced during the year. Journal 2003 was published in July, with Methodists and a Questioning Faith in the first quarter of 2004, as No. 77 and 78 of the Society's Proceedings. Journal 2003 focused on the histories of several streams of Methodism, including the Free Methodists, the Bible Christians and the Primitive Methodists, as they established their congregations and churches in New Zealand prior to subsequent unions of these groups with the Wesleyan Church in 1896 and 1913. Methodists and a Questioning Faith, edited by Rev. Dr John Salmon, was seen by the Society as an opportunity to pay tribute to his retirement as Principal of Trinity Methodist Theological College. This publication well reflected the scholarship, experience, and insights of Dr Salmon, Rev Dr David Bell and Rev. Donald Phillipps as they explored significant and historical cases of theological debate within the New Zealand Methodist Church.

Our WHS (NZ), which began as a branch of the Wesley Historical Society in Great Britain, marked the 300th Anniversary of John Wesley's birth with a donation of £100 towards the appeal for the Wesley Centre at the Old Rectory, Epworth, and members were invited to contribute further to this cause. In another recognition of the year's significance, greeting cards featuring the Myers memorial window at the former Central Methodist Church, Invercargill, were available at 2003 Conference in envelopes specially designed for the occasion by the Society, and were issued as First Day Covers. Commemorating John Wesley's affirmation 'The world is my Parish', these cards were generously donated to the Society by Lindisfarne Community Centre, Invercargill. The Society acknowledges with thanks the Rev. Stanley Barnes whose ongoing interest in and work with the Methodist Philatelic Society has contributed to our Society's funds.

The Wesley Historical Society held its 2003 Annual General Meeting at the Johnsonville Uniting Church, Wellington. Bill Thomas' current research on the subject of the Rev William Morley - preacher, writer, administrator, educator and statesman, proved a lively and fascinating topic for the lecture that followed dinner. WHS members were informed and entertained by Bill's presentation on the many gifts and graces of this remarkable father of the Church. Gavin Sharp was welcomed to the meeting and donated an illuminated address that had been presented to his great-grandfather Tom Sharp in 1879 by the Bradford Methodist Church, as he prepared to emigrate to New Zealand. Generous donations of other resources have been received during the year including material from Rev. Mary Astley-Ford and Prof. Richard Bedford

Recognising that history is partly made by innovation, with people doing things that have not been done before, the Society now has a web-site, which continues to bring interesting queries from as far afield as Canada, Mexico City, Port Moresby and Ireland, and also closer to home from the University of Auckland's Archaeological Department. Helpful and encouraging links have been made through this medium.

Thanks are expressed to the members of the Executive, The Oceania Conference Planning Group, the Publications Committee, Secretary Rev. Barry Neal, Treasurer Rev. Phil Taylor, Editor Bernie Le Heron, Honoured Members, to Rev. Norman Brookes as he and Margaret leave for service with the Methodist Conference in Ireland, and to all those who have supported the work of the Society during this past year. Aware that ours is the oldest religious history society in New Zealand, we look forward to celebrating our Society's 75 years of 'making history' in the coming year.

SECTION B – Strategic Planning

- Financial assistance for postgraduate and other students who are undertaking historical study is offered by the Gilmore Smith Memorial Fund. The Executive of the WHS (NZ) accepts grant applications for research related to Methodist history in New Zealand and the South Pacific, which might result in publication by the Society.
- The Society's web-page is regularly updated.
- The WHS (NZ) continues to participate in future development plans for Methodist Archives.
- A planning group has been meeting regularly in Auckland to shape the Oceania Conference entitled: *Weaving the Unfinished Mats: Wesley's Legacy: Conflict, Confusion and Challenge in the South Pacific*, to be held from 28-31 January 2005 at Crossroads Church, Papakura. This promises to be a memorable and stimulating

gathering, for people and groups from throughout New Zealand, the South Pacific, Australia, and further afield, will be attending, presenting papers and leading workshops.

- The Society is supporting the publication of Rev Dr Susan Thompson's award-winning thesis on the history of Methodist ministry training in New Zealand, *Knowledge and Vital Piety*, during the 75th Anniversary year. Contributions towards the cost of this project have already been recorded from the PAC Communications Fund, the Hamilton Trust and Wesley College.
- With Rev. Dr David Bell, the Society is involved in planning for a three-strand history project to develop a comprehensive resource for the on-going development of history, theology and mission for the Methodist Church in Aotearoa/New Zealand. This will include:
 - 1. A co-ordinated programme for recording the Methodist Church's oral/social history.
 - 2. The creation of a library of electronic books for the Methodist Church of New Zealand, through digitalization of resources.
 - 3. The production of a definitive written history of Methodism in New Zealand. This will be a quality publication.

SUPERANNUATION FUND REPORT OF THE TRUSTEE TO CONFERENCE

FUND

Overview

With the improvement in the investment markets over the year to 31 January 2004 the Fund increased in value by \$1,263,555 compared to the reduction in value of \$4,413,684 in the previous year. During the year contributions received by the Fund amounted to \$492,671 (2003 \$496,480). Investment income and other revenue totalled \$2,185,050 for the year (2003 loss of \$3,453,126), paid \$1,308,552 (2003 \$1,351,998) in benefits and was charged \$105,645 (2003 \$105,040) in management and other expenses.

Although the Fund has recovered some of its losses incurred over the last two financial years the recovery has not been sufficient to allow the Trustee to increase the retirement benefit. Therefore as at the 1 February 2004 the retirement benefit rate remained at \$373.28 for each year of membership.

Investments

During the year the Fund achieved an overall return of almost 16.5% on the investments. This compares with an overall loss of almost 24.5% in the previous year.

The Trustee reviewed the investment strategy for the Fund and as a result changed the benchmark ratios of the investment sectors. In order to minimise the impact of the change the benchmark ratios will be implemented over a twelve month period rather than in one single move:

Following a number of changes to key personnel within BT Funds Management (NZ) Ltd the Trustees reviewed their appointment and decided to appoint a new investment manager. After careful considerations of suitable mangers it was decided to appoint Guardian Trust Funds Management now trading as Tyndall.

Conference referred the following notice of motion to the Supernumerary Trustee for comment and report to Conference 2004

"That the Finance Committee look again at the inequality which occurs when small churches have to pay their full amount of the superannuation. The inequality occurs when small parishes only pay a part of the stipend and when such parishes are vacant. The sum of \$129.00 a month seems excessive when a parish can only sustain a part-time salary."

Current church contributions, including tax, are \$295.17 monthly for a full member or \$147.58 for a fifty per cent member.

The Trustee referred the matter to the Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing Committee who after discussion felt that it was important to retain the mutuality of the fund and that all churches should contribute to the support of ministry. Therefore there is no recommendation for change.

Summary of Actuarial Review at 31 January 2004

Introduction

This is a summary of the actuarial review carried out at 31 January 2004. While it gives an overview of the review it should not be considered a substitute for the full report which is available from the Secretary of the Fund.

Purposes of the Review

The main purposes of the actuarial review are:

- to determine whether the contributions payable by the Church are adequate
- to make a recommendation on any change in the rate of pension; and
- to examine the security of members' benefits.

The previous actuarial review was carried out by me as at 31 January 2001. It is anticipated that the next review will be carried out in three years time, at 31 January 2007, or earlier if the Fund were to experience significant changes in membership, investment return, stipend or taxation.

It is a requirement of both the trust deed and the Superannuation Schemes Act that an actuarial review is carried out every three years.

Brief Details of the Fund

The retirement benefit from the Fund is a fixed dollar amount for each year of service (called the Retirement Benefit Rate). The Retirement Benefit Rate can be changed, and if it is, pensions currently being paid are changed in the same proportion.

The contribution rate by both members and Church is a fixed percentage of stipend, 7.5% for members and 10% for the Church in the case of Full Members. In the case of the Church the 10% is reduced by the cost of superannuation contribution withholding tax.

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Membership

Over the past three years the number of active members of the Fund has decreased from 129 to 109. The number of pensioners has increased from 205 to 215.

The average age of members has remained at 54.

Investment Performance and Retirement Benefit Increase

The investment returns of the Fund over the three years since the previous actuarial review are as follows:

Year ending 31 January 2002	-7.8%
Year ending 31 January 2003	-19.6%
Year ending 31 January 2004	16.6%
Three year period (per annum)	-5.2%

These returns are net of expenses.

The three year investment return is significantly lower then the return assumed in the previous actuarial review (6.5% pa). This led to significant deterioration of the financial position of the Fund.

As a result of this, the Trustee determined that the Retirement Benefit Rate, which had been assumed to increase so that it was a fixed percentage of Stipend, would no longer be assumed to increase and remain constant unless sufficient surplus emerged.

Valuation Approach

The financial position of the Fund is assessed by projecting forward the benefits payable and the contributions expected to be received after making assumptions about a number of factors including:

- the rate at which the Retirement Benefit Rate will be increased each year
- the rate at which members leave the scheme through death, resignation or retirement; and
- the rate at which pensioners die.

The stream of payments resulting from this projection is then expressed in present day terms by discounting at an assumed rate of earnings on the assets. This "present value" of the cash flows is then compared with the assets of the Fund.

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If the present value calculated is less than the assets, the Fund is said to be in 'surplus' while if the present value so calculated is greater than the assets the Fund is said to be in 'deficit'.

Results of the Valuation

The Fund has a surplus under the accrued benefits test but a deficit under the vested benefits test at 31 January 2004. This means that if future experience is as assumed in the review, the assets and future contributions are sufficient to provide for the benefits. However, the existing assets are not sufficient should all members resign or retire at the review date.

The main cause of this is investment returns over the last three years being lower than assumed in the previous review. This is offset to some extent by some changes in the Retirement Benefit Rate assumption.

Conclusions and Recommendations

In view of the financial position of the Fund I have recommended that:

- the Trustee makes no change to the Retirement Benefit Rate
- the Trustee follows up the issue of the vested benefit deficit

There is now a larger difference between vested and accrued benefits. As a result of the inconsistency between the resignation and retirement benefits, I have recommended that the Trustee implements a change to the resignation benefit.

There is an inconsistency between the trust deed and Trustee's practice in treating part years of service. The financial consequences are not material to the overall financial position of the Fund.

At present the Fund pays no tax and I have assumed a continuation of this situation. According to the proposed changes in the legislation, the Fund will need to comply with certain requirements to retain tax exempt status. If the Fund did become liable to pay tax this would have a significant financial affect on the Fund. In such a case a full actuarial review should be carried out as soon as practical.

Report to Conference 2004

Board of Ministry Part A: Information and Reporting Back

The Work of the Board

2004 has seen the Board induct its new Principal of Trinity Methodist Theological College, Rev Dr Mary Caygill. Mary is settling in very well, and the Board appreciates the skill she brings to her role.

In May a seminar day, facilitated by Graeme Nicholas, was held to assist the Board in its strategic thinking. Members reflected on the core functions of governance as distinct from management, and gave thought to the place of the Board within the Church and its wider environment. It was recognised that the Board has been in a development phase, and will now turn to set strategic boundaries and identify priorities that are within its scope. Engaging in discussions with other Church bodies over the expectations that exist in respect of the Board will be vital, as will ensuring that all stakeholders in the Board's activity are enabled to contribute to and understand its direction and work.

Mission Resourcing

As no appointment was made to the position of Director Mission Resourcing this year those tasks were contracted:

TAUIWI STRATEGY AND STATIONING:

Conference 2003 appointed John Murray as "Executive Officer Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing" to take effect from 1 February 2004. As Executive Officer for Tauiwi John works with Diana Tana, Tumuaki for Te Taha Maori, to give leadership within our Church, committed to a Bi-cultural partnership. John is co-ordinator for Tauiwi. He has a key leadership role in the Stationing process to see Parish and Presbyter Profiles are prepared and distributed. He coordinates Tauiwi business and assists the facilitators. Tertiary Chaplaincies (Hospital and University) continue to be John's responsibility.

MISSION RESOURCING OFFICE:

John Salmon is contracted to work with the Mission Resourcing office and Resource Team. He has established links with all staff members in a supportive role and works as the liaison person with the Board of Ministry. The staff at the Mission Resourcing Office are:

John Salmon also works with the Mission Resourcing Management Group.

MISSION RESOURCING MANAGEMENT GROUP:

This group meets on a regular basis to process applications for Computer and Development grants, and to consider matters referred to it within Mission Resourcing. The Computer Grants have assisted parishes in gaining online access to computers/printers to the Methodist Connexion website and other resources. The monies were provided from a grant from PAC. Most parishes now have computer access and by the end of June 2004 the fund was exhausted and is now wound up.

The membership of the Mission Resourcing Management Group is Kenneth Smith (Convenor), Audrey Dickinson, Brian Peterson, Aso Samoa Saleupolu, John Salmon and Lesley Utting

UNITING CONGREGATIONS OF AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND:

Tony Bell represents Mission Resourcing at The Uniting Congregations of Aotearoa New Zealand meetings. He has been one of The Board of Ministry's participants involved in conversation with the Faith and Order Committee considering a Methodist response to Local/Shared/Total Ministry.

TAUIWI PARTNERSHIP:

Norman West is contracted to work with Vahefonua Tonga, Sinoti Samoa, Wasewase Ko Viti Kei Rotuma E Niu Siladi, Korean and other ethnic ministries. The links are with their Superintendents and parish leaders concerning ministry: Local Covenants; seconded ministry; ministers from overseas; relationships with overseas Methodist Churches leaders; changes to parish boundaries and leadership appointments; funding sources etc. The work is primarily supportive and pastoral.

EDUCATION RESOURCING:

Most of the work in education resourcing has been 'hands on' within the parishes. The work includes ministry reviews, goal setting or planning days and theological exploration on current issues. The film 'The Passion of the Christ' resulted in a workshop exploring atonement theology. The work has involved visiting the parishes rather than providing written resources. Some resources have been posted on the Methodist web site www.methodist.org.nz

OVERSEAS MINISTRIES:

In the light of renewed discussions by Council of Conference around issues of immigration, Mission Resourcing in consultation with Te Taha Maori is reviewing the procedures for overseas supply and seconded ministry.

INTERCHURCH TERTIARY CHAPLAINCY COUNCIL:

At a recent annual meeting of the InterChurch Tertiary Chaplaincy Council they agreed to take on a new role in support and recognition of tertiary chaplains. It was agreed that the Tertiary Council will no longer receive and disperse money from the churches to local Chaplaincy Boards. In the light of that decision, the Board of Ministry brings the recommendation that it not seek funding for tertiary chaplaincy from the 2005/06 Connexional Budget.

MISSION RESOURCING FINANCES:

The financial result for Mission Resourcing was in line with the budgeted projections. Consequently we have used around \$75,000 of funds previously held in general reserves. The Board believes that it is still holding sufficient funds to cover the budgeted deficit for the 2004/2005 financial year. That is likely to complete the utilisation of available reserves and from then on Mission Resourcing is likely to be more dependent on the Connexional Budget than it has been in the last two or three years. The financial performance of Mission Resourcing in the short term future will depend on the number and nature of staff employed or stationed.

The continued support of the Robert Gibson Trust and the Doris Swadling Trust for Youth Ministry programmes is appreciated very much and enables those programmes to achieve valuable results.

The residential property in Auckland was sold during the year. The funds realised were held at the end of the financial year and will be re-invested in another suitable property as soon as one can be found. It is not yet clear whether there will be sufficient cash for this purpose.

The designated funds held by Mission Resourcing are being applied to the purposes for which they are held as rapidly as practical. The total funds have reduced significantly this year as a result of the actions taken.

TRINITY COLLEGE FELLOWSHIP

It is with a great deal of pleasure that the Board has appointed the Rev Dr John Salmon as a Fellow of Trinity College. This is an acknowledgement of the significant contribution John has made to the Methodist Church of New Zealand through his leadership of Trinity College. The Fellowship will be conferred at the Service of Transitions at Pitt Street Methodist Church on Sunday 21 November 2004.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMES:

The School of Theology -

This year has seen a considerable amount of work done to further develop the School of Theology. During the first half of the year new curriculum has been developed to take effect in March 2006. Faculty have been appointed to teach for the school on a five year term with Lynne Wall and Mary Caygill appointed to teach in the areas of Biblical Studies and

Pastoral and Practical Theology. These are part time appointments and the conditions and payments are established through a placement agreement between Trinity College and the University of Auckland.

Tertiary Education Commission -

Given that the Charter was approved and came into effect from 1 January 2004 for a period of three years, the next requirement for Trinity College as a Private Training Establishment was to submit a Profile which is the yearly document required by the Tertiary Education Commission to replace the Annual Plan and concretize the Charter on a yearly basis. In preparation of the Profile, as for the Charter, there was widespread consultation with persons and groups who have an active interest in the provisions of Trinity College programmes. Both the Charter and the Profile can be viewed on the Trinity College website.

Trinity College -

This year there have been 6 students in the Probationary programme, 2 in the Dispersed programme, 5 at Trinity Meadowbank, and 3 fulltime ordination and 4 fulltime independent students at Trinity Ministry Training Unit. All programmes have functioned well. The addition within the Diploma in Practical Theology of Dimension 3 being taught, rather than credited from other programmes, has enabled the diploma to be a fulltime course for Government funding purposes.

Three students (two from the Trinity Meadowbank programme and one from the dispersed programme) complete their studies this year and are available for stationing, two for itinerant ministry and one for local ministry.

To date, four candidates for presbyteral ministry have been accepted for admission in 2005.

STAFF:

Staff continue to teach across all programmes of Trinity College, thus maximizing the subject and skilled diversity embodied in the appointed staff. The staffing team has been enhanced this year with the additional expertise of John Salmon who as half time Tutor in Theology has been both teaching and writing new course material for Dimension 3 of the Diploma in Practical Theology.

The LAOS course material continues to be revised and it is hoped with the additional staff appointment to the Trinity teaching Faculty that this task can be completed with some urgency next year.

During the year discussions have taken place between the Faith and Order Committee and the Board of Ministry in relation to the model of lay ministry teams which are being developed by our ecumenical partners as to whether this is a model we wish to pursue and develop alongside other existing models of ministry within Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa. The Board is currently formulating policy in relation to this development and its implications for training, resourcing, and the future impact on the role of presbyter as mentor, teacher, and enabler. The Board acknowledges the urgency of this development and would see this as a priority focus for ministry education as we move into 2005.

HUI ON MINISTRY:

Conference 2003 asked the President to initiate a hui on ministry during this year in order to facilitate an overall integrated conversation about current and future ministry development. The hui was subject to funding being made available, but was delayed due to lack of this. Funding has now become available through a grant from PAC and planning is underway with the initial preparation of terms of reference and a date set for mid February 2005. The hui will be facilitated by the Rev Bruce Hanson, former Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand and one other person.

LAY MINISTRY APPOINTMENT:

Throughout the year a great deal of consultation has taken place as to the shape this appointment may need to take. The funding for this appointment will be provided by the income from the sale of Wellspring. Along with the consultation to date, the hui on ministry will hopefully provide enough of the larger picture of ministry and mission needs to guide the Board in establishing the nature of this position in order to respond to the diversity of ministry needs within the wider church.

MINISTRY EDUCATION FINANCES

Ministry Education finished the financial year in a satisfactory financial position. This was due to the continued availability of income from the Leonard Hames Scholarship Fund, and the smaller than expected number of students who needed full Trinity allowances. Capital profits were also realised with the sale of Wellspring, and residential properties in Lintaine Place and Jefferson St. Half of the net proceeds from Wellspring and Lintaine Place were distributed to the Orakei Parish and the other half placed in a Fund which will help to finance the Lay Ministry programmes currently being planned. A further house was purchased, partly from the proceeds of the Jefferson St sale.

The increasing age of the houses being used for student accommodation has brought with it severe maintenance problems which are being addressed currently. This is likely to use all of the available cash resources within the next

few months. With the anticipated student intake in 2005, Ministry Education will be hard-pressed to find sufficient student accommodation. However, we will certainly do all that we can to provide adequately for the students selected for training by the Church.

Ministry Education is appreciative of the ongoing support from a number of donors, including the Tidd Trust. Their generosity and commitment enables us to meet our obligations to students in a way that would simply not be possible without that support.

Part B: Strategic Plan

Strategic directions for Mission Resourcing

As the Board of Ministry has indicated above, it will continue to work with contracted staff during 2005 as it moves to set in place a new model of Leadership, working in a team relationship with District Superintendents, at Resourcing Parish ministry and mission.

Strategic directions for Ministry Education

Continued commitment to the offering of a diversity of programmes each of which aim to integrate theological practice and ministry practice by the following:

- Holding conversations through the hui on ministry in February 2005 in order to establish priorities for ministry directions especially lay ministry.
- Consolidating the new beginnings within the School of Theology.
- Seeking approval and accreditation for the Diploma in Practical Theology to become a local programme.
- Releasing funds to the Diaconate Task Group for its development of Diaconal Ministry.

Travel and Study Committee

Over recent time, it has been pleasing to note that lay people are applying for a wide range of grants to attend study programmes, conferences as well as the Presbyterate looking wider than tertiary study in terms of gaining expertise that is pertinent to their parish or Synod.

We congratulate Fuailelagi Samoa Saleupolu on her graduation for completing the Graduate Diploma in Theology. Congratulations also to Sylvia 'Akau'ola Tongotongo in completing a Master in Theology with the thesis "The Ordination of Women in the Free Wesleyan Church of Tonga".

Churches Education Commission

Continued funding from churches, and from some generous individual donors ensures that we continue as a Commission, and as a ministry in and to schools. However, our draft Budget 2004/2005 suggests we may face a leaner year. Our Annual General Meeting and Conference will be held in late July in Wellington. We welcome this chance to report back to our member churches.

We spent time in May at a Regional Leaders Gathering analysing our Religious Education Curriculum to identify the values in each lesson, which can link to a school's values education programme.

As 300 schools nationwide deal with mergers and closures, there is a great need for the Christian listening ear which our chaplains provide. Our Volunteer RE teachers are also offering support to their schools as they experience the loss and grief and anger of this process of change. Helen McGhie, National Chaplaincy Coordinator, has recently spent study leave exploring models of chaplaincy and training in Australia, and brings back many new insights. Four Chaplaincy training course will be run this calendar year, with increased numbers attending each one.

Diaconate Task Group Report

The Diaconate Task Group reported through the Board of Ministry, to the Conference last year, for the second time, that the function and structure and roles recommended by the Task Group would enable the development of the diaconate in our Church. This year the roles of National Diaconate Coordinator and Convener have continued on with the substantially reduced income of \$1,900 from the Board of Ministry. This meant the Task Group has dug deep, mostly from individual deacon's pockets to complete another year of work.

Four of the Task Group members were successful in obtaining a grant from the Travel and Study Committee, which enabled them to travel to Melbourne, Australia, and attend the Deacon, Uniting Church in Australia Conference and Continuing Education Program. Deacons Richard Williams, Brenda Fawkner and Lorna Goodwin enjoyed the experience of being with fifty other Deacons from all around Australia. Dcn Shirley-Joy Barrow attended the Conference and Continuing Education Program and successfully completed a Diaconal Ministry paper at BTheol. level.

The Task Group met after Convocation in June at Wanganui and agreed to continue to work within the Functions, and roles below.

Diaconate Task Group - Functions

The functions of the Diaconate Task Group shall be to:

- a) discern what God is calling the Diaconate to, and offer leadership and policy for the future;
- b) approve and regularly review the strategic direction and vision for Diaconal Ministry;

- c) report through the Board of Ministry to Conference yearly and make recommendations pertaining to Diaconal Ministry;
- d) provide oversight, accountability and administration of all grants and finances.
- e) liase with Ministry Education, Mission Resourcing and Board of Ministry regarding in regard to areas of selection, training, ordination of candidates for and stationing of Diaconal Ministries;
- f) oversee the appointment and review of a National Diaconal Coordinator, Secretary and Diaconal Advocates;
- g) provide information and support to Deacons, Presbyters, Lay Ministers, Parishes, Synods and District Assessment Convenors;
- h) undertake other duties as required by the Conference through the Board of Ministry.

Membership and Meetings

The membership of the Diaconate Task Group shall be determined annually by the Deacons and confirmed by the Board of Ministry and Conference, and shall comprise seven (7), of whom five (5) will be Ordained Deacons, and one (1) be Lay and one (1) Presbyters. A quorum shall consist of four (4) of whom two (2) shall be ordained Deacons.

The Diaconate Task Group shall recommend a National Diaconal Coordinator, Secretary and Deacon Advocates from its own members for Board of Ministry and Conference approval, and have power to co-opt other persons as required. The Diaconate Task Group shall meet on at least two occasions a year as funds allow, one of these times will be at the Annual Convocation.

Roles and Descriptions

There shall be a National Diaconal Coordinator, a Secretary and at least five Deacon Advocates. On all matters pertaining to their positions they shall be accountable directly to the Diaconate Task Group. The National Diaconal Coordinator shall report to the Board of Ministry at its meetings.

ROLE DESCRIPTIONS -

The National Diaconal Co-Ordinator will:

- a) be the initial point of contact person for the Diaconate
- b) be the National spokesperson as and when required
- c) be available to liase with the Connexional committees
- d) ensure effective communication in the wider Church
- e) co-ordinate and support Deacon Advocates
- f) report monthly to the Diaconate Task Group
- g) hold all files, covenants and attend to key administration tasks regarding covenanted Deacons
- This position is to be reviewed by Diaconate Task Group and the Board of Ministry before Conference 2005.

Task Group Secretary:

Attends to all administration, correspondence, minutes and mail-outs

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(Approx. 2.5 hours per week)

(Approx. 10 hours per week)

Deacon Advocates (in designated Synods):

The Deacon Advocates, within their designated Synods, shall:

- a) liase with the National Diaconate Coordinator
- b) advocate for all Deacons
- c) represent where appropriate in matters pertaining to Deacons
- d) be involved in recruitment for Diaconal ministry
- e) mentor Deacons, either candidating, in training, ordained and retired.
- f) undertake annual reviews of deacon's covenants in conjunction with the Parish and District Superintendents, ensuring supervision and continuing education are included.
- g) ensure correct information about Deacons be entered in the Questions of Conference.
- h) promote Diaconal ministry and an understanding of it in the Synod and the wider community.

The Task Group has struggled to do the work needed in developing the Diaconate, with its only income from two grants of \$2,900. We acknowledge the Board of Ministry's difficulties in finding funding for the Diaconate. We have for some time looked for any resources that the Church might see as funding for the Diaconate Task Group. The income from Morley Trust Fund appears to be the only Fund that can be traced from the Deaconesss Order, when it was disbanded. The Board of Ministry has agreed to release the income from the Morley Trust Fund, currently used by Ministry Education, to the Diaconate Task Group for its development of diaconal ministry during the next five years, with the provision that if there are diaconal candidates this would be reviewed.

Tauiwi Youth Ministry

TYTANZ

A major focus during this year has been putting the new structure for Tauiwi Youth in place. The first meeting of the new oversight group – TYTANZ (Tauiwi Youth Together in Aotearoa New Zealand) – met in May, with wide representation. This meeting generated a hopeful approach for the future of Tauiwi youth in the Methodist Church. The group developed further a sense of identity through establishing its vision and mission for Tauiwi youth.

Methodist Youth Conference 2005

Another focal point is the Youth Conference being planned for 13 - 16 January 2005 at Waikato University. The theme of the Conference is "What is the Spirit saying to the church?". Aimed at 16 - 30 year olds, it is an opportunity for young people from across the whole church to gather and share about – God, church, identity, relationships, theology, and faith alongside social issues.

Churches Youth Ministry Association (CYMA)

The Youth Ministry Studies Board was a part of CYMA's activities until the Board itself was disbanded last year. The training modules that were developed as part of the training offered in the Diploma of Youth Ministry Studies have been reformatted onto a CD Rom. The CD Rom became freely available in June this year to all member churches of CYMA. Many have already requested and received this home grown resource for youth ministry training.

Tauiwi National Resource Person Youth

Fuailelagi Samoa Saleupolu concludes her 5-year appointment this year, and the Board of Ministry will be engaging in a review of the position and bringing recommendations for the future to Conference. We record our thanks to Lagi for her commitment to the needs and aspirations of Tauiwi youth during this period.

Forum of Uniting Congregations of Aotearoa New Zealand

Following the 2003 Biennial Forum of Uniting Congregations of Aotearoa New Zealand, the Standing Committee has continued to work on the issues raised at the Forum and reported on to Conference last year. Five Work Groups have been established as follows:

- On going issues of Ministry Settlement in co-operative ventures
- Local shared ministry
- The life of Joint Regional Committees
- Partner Dialogue
- Ecumenical liturgy

A seminar for the Chairpersons of all Joint Regional Committees is being held in July.

John Jones and David Ross presented a short seminar for the students at Trinity/St John's on ministry in a co-operative venture. Such courses presented at partner ministry training schools are seen as part of the ongoing mission for co-operative ventures.

The Forum of Uniting Congregations Office has asked each parish to review their giving to the Co-operative Ventures Joint Mission Fund and suggested that parishes consider setting their target at 10% of their income. To date some parishes have increased their targets for the 2004/2005 financial year.

There are two issues that have been exercising the mind of the Standing Committee for some time and which have now been taken to a meeting with Partners' representatives for advice and action. The first concerns Ministry settlement where there have been a number of problems which, in the past, have caused pain to both Ministers and Parishes. It is hoped that a working group will be meeting in the near future to establish a consistent process for Partners, JRCs and Parishes. The second concern surrounds the question of Local Provided Ministry (or any equivalent term). There is a need to have the Common Provisions of the Guide to Procedures clarified and there are a considerable number of issues concerning oversight and accountability which need to be resolved. Finally the Forum will be seeking guidance as to the ramifications of the proposed Charities Act upon its members and will have to work closely with partners on this complex issue.

The Interchurch Council for Hospital Chaplaincy

Methodist Involvement

The Methodist Church is one of 9 denominations which make up the ICHC Trust Board. The Rev John Murray is the Methodist representative on the ICHC Trust Board and the Executive committee. There are currently eight Methodist Presbyters employed in the Hospital Chaplaincy Service. They are Rev Roy Alexander at North Shore Hospital, Rev Don Prince at The Princess Margaret Hospital, Rev Anne Dargaville at the Hawke's Bay Regional Hospital, Rev Roger Hey at Tauranga Hospital, Rev Dr Jock Hosking at Whangarei Hospital, Rev's Alan Leadley and Bob Short at Waikato Hospital and Rev Paul Tregurtha at Dunedin and Wakari Hospitals. A number of Methodist people serve as voluntary chaplaincy assistants or on local chaplaincy support committees throughout NZ.

General Overview

This past year has been spent implementing the Government's significant change from the historical chaplaincy funding arrangement, of paying a subsidy of \$19,000 toward each established position in individual hospitals, to contributing funding toward a chaplaincy service in each DHB area, according to the size of the population served by that DHB. This has led to considerable changes in the amounts of "Flexi funding" being received from \$13,000 to \$22,000 for individual positions. Coupled with this has been the need with hospital managements and local Chaplaincy committees to prioritise services and encourage the movement of funds to support an increased level of healthcare chaplaincy services in areas of higher population.

The result is that the number or size of chaplaincy positions in Palmerston North, Timaru, Southland, Otago and Waikato have decreased while the size of positions in Auckland, Counties-Manukau, Waitemata, and Northland, have increased. The ICHC Trust board has used some of it's reserves to subsidise some of the positions that have received a reduction in Government funding. It will continue to this until 30 June 2005.

The year has been one when contributions to the funding for chaplains positions from some denominational groups and district health boards (DHB's) have also decreased. Some very significantly.

Key issues to note

At time of writing, although our financial year does not finish until 30 June 2004, and we won't have our statistics available before late July, it seems clear that a significant decrease in the level of Chaplaincy services will be recorded. Along with a decline in services will be a decline in Chaplaincy positions to 58 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions from 66.6 FTE's in 2000. An additional 6 FTE positions in the Lower North Island, are under serious threat and 4 of these could well disappear or be drastically reduced in size by 30 December 2004.

The big issue and stress for most chaplains in this group, is the feeling that the Church is now letting them down, as their ministry to the sick and dying, is no longer seen as a valued and essential ministry by the Church. A position has been reached where senior career minded chaplains, who should be training and mentoring newer recruits, are finding their full-time positions under threat.

Inter-Church Tertiary Chaplaincy Council (ITCC)

The ministry of Chaplains to hundreds of thousands of tertiary students and staff here in Aotearoa-NZ continues to be a vital and essential one. The Methodist Church of NZ can be proud of its involvement in this strategic ministry which is a ministry of pastoral care, education and support to both students and staff of our tertiary institutions. Within our tertiary institutions there is a growing awareness of the need for quality pastoral care and spiritual support. This has recently been articulated in the creation and implementation of a Pastoral Care Code for the care of International students, but applies to the care of all students.

The Chairperson of the ITCC, the Rev. Dr Ken Booth, attended and spoke at the annual Conference of the Aotearoa-NZ Tertiary Chaplains' Association (ANZTCA) which met at Selwyn College, Otago University, Dunedin during November 2003, organised by the Otago Tertiary Chaplaincy team. There are currently approximately 40 people serving as tertiary chaplains in this country, 35 of whom attended the ANZTCA Conference in Dunedin. (see photo below and attached) This includes ten or so Roman Catholic Chaplains and one Mormon Church observer.

As decided at our 2003 meeting the ITCC exists:

- 1 To channel our Churches' commitment to resourcing and supporting tertiary chaplaincy in Aotearoa-NZ
- 2 To provide a national forum at which issues of common concern and practices can be discussed and policies developed.
- 3 To initiate, develop and maintain the links with the constituent Churches, chaplaincy boards, chaplains' association and tertiary institutions.

The funding from the Methodist Church of NZ is greatly appreciated. The funding is received with gratitude knowing that it carries with it a deep commitment of the Methodist Church to the spiritual well-being of our nations' tertiary students and staff.

Since the August 2003 meeting of the ITCC the following Methodist presbyters have completed their appointments as ecumenical tertiary chaplains :

Rev. Desmond Cooper - Waikato University Rev. Ruth Sandiford-Phelan - Tairawhiti Polytechnic, Gisborne Rev. Terry Wall - MacLaurin Chaplain, Auckland University

In September 2004 Rev Uesifili Unasa takes up his role as Maclaurin Chaplain at Auckland University. Rev. Greg Hughson is continuing on as Ecumenical Chaplain at Otago University (see <u>www.otago.ac.nz/chaplain</u>) and currently serves as the ANZTCA Regional co-ordinator of Tertiary Chaplaincy for the South Island. A South Island Regional Tertiary Chaplains' gathering is planned for October 2004.

Key issues for the Inter-Church Tertiary Chaplaincy Council include:

- 1. The crucial strategic importance of maintaining an effective and vital Ecumenical Chaplaincy presence in the tertiary institutions of Aotearoa-New Zealand;
- 2. The importance of responding to the need to establish new tertiary chaplaincies in institutions currently without such services;
- 3. The need for ongoing funding from the Methodist and other Churches to enable the above to happen;
- 4. The need for ongoing prayer, support and encouragement from Parishes, Synods, Presbyteries, the Board of Ministry and Conference for those Methodist Presbyters (and others) currently involved in tertiary chaplaincy.

New Zealand Born and Raised Pacific Islanders

The Project identifying and addressing issues relating to New Zealand born and raised Pacific Islanders has made a relevant and important contribution to the life of the Methodist Church of New Zealand. The full report of this project will be available from Mission Resourcing Office, Auckland. This specialized ministry was made possible with the vision and mission of the whole church and the financial generosity of the PAC Funds.

Focused ministry for the New Zealand born and raised Pacific Islanders sees major changes at the end of this year. The position of Resource Person for this ministry within the Mission Resourcing team finishes this year. The youth component of this project is being gradually merged with the Tauiwi Youth Ministry. Throughout this year the second

phase has begun focusing on adults, with seminars and workshops addressing issues pertaining to what and how adults have contributed to the generational differences and gaps, positively and otherwise. This ongoing ministry is anticipated being picked up at District and Parish levels.

Wasewase Ko Viti Kei Rotuma e Niu Siladi

Annual General Meeting

The annual meeting of the Wasewase was held in Wellington from 6 to 7 March 2004, chaired by the President, Rev Dr Lynne Frith, and Vice President, Mr David McGeorge. All but two of the seven areas of the Wasewase were represented at the meeting.

Among the letters received by the meeting was one from the Khyber Pass Fijian Methodist congregation informing us that they have withdrawn affiliation from the Tabacakacaka ko Viti e Okaladi and pastorship of Rev Tuwere, but will remain attached to the New Zealand Methodist Conference. The letter was signed by one Manueli Viqasi with 76 other unsigned names. An intense discussion followed. Members of the AGM were unhappy and disappointed at the way followed in the presentation of the letter to the AGM. It was recommended that in response the President write a letter to them expressing the following:

- 1 sadness
- 2 openness of all doors for dialogue
- 3 process that needs to be followed before recommendation to Conference

Tabacakacaka ko Viti e Okaladi (Fiji Methodist Circuit in Auckland)

The circuit has now formed one congregation combining those previously – Patumahoe, Khyber Pass and Mt Roskill. Part of Khyber Pass is with this combined congregation and worships at Mt Roskill Wesley Chapel on Sunday afternoons at 4pm. It is thriving at all levels and actively looking for a property of their own. The Fijian Methodist Fellowship in Hamilton joins us when they can in our monthly combined worship and fund raising.

Kingsland Rotuman Congregation

They have been worshipping at Kingsland for the past six years, with a membership of 36, with 13 confirmed, 5 lay preachers, 8 youth and 10 Sunday school members. Mrs Susau Strickland is their convenor.

Indian Fellowship

No report was received at the AGM in Wellington. Mrs Susau Strickland visited Bal Karan and was promised that they would send a report but this did not eventuate. The President and Vice President of the Methodist Church of New Zealand will visit the Indian Fellowship and Wasewase to keep its doors open.

Lower North and South Island

This region continues to hope for a presbyter to serve them fulltime. This is made difficult by the financial constraints they face, making it impossible to support a fulltime pastor. The presence of Rev Peni Tikoinaka, from the Fiji Methodist Conference, who is here temporarily on a family visit, has been greatly welcomed in the three areas of the region – Christchurch, Wellington and Wanganui. Mrs Fika Vucago is their convenor.

Methodist Lay Preachers Network

The Network is a low-key organisation that exists to address matters specifically relating to Lay Preachers active in Methodist and Uniting Churches. We do not hold meetings as such. E-mail is our main method of networking.

Certification, production of *Word and Worship* and general lay preacher concerns are under the authority of the national executive of the New Zealand Lay Preachers Association, an ecumenical organisation, currently based in Waikato.

Network Nucleus

The interim executive as proposed by Conference 2002 was: Jayne Alexander; Helen Buxton; Garth Cant; Colin Gibson; Keith Knox; Ron Malpass and Rosalie Sugrue. By the end of the year this *interim executive* will cease to exist. The two lay preachers appointed by each Synod will form the *Nucleus* of the *Network*.

National Register

Conference 2003 gave the Network the task of compiling a national register of Methodist and Uniting Church worship leaders. We have asked Synods to form their own lists and forward them to us. The lists need to show if the certificated preachers are active or retired. Our intention is to maintain two lists, the first being a Methodist legal requirement; the second being useful in facilitating district support, notifying training events etc.

- 1) Certificated LPs. Certificates issued by: the Methodist LPA or the NZLPA.
- In CV situations, equivalent denominational documentation from a partner church.
- 2) Other lay leaders who regularly accept responsibility for services ie all active non-certificated local preachers and worship leaders.

Lay Preacher Training

We encourage all worship leaders to achieve certification and continue with on-going training. The requirements for training are set out in leaflet 153 under *administration* on the church website. Certain conditions are mandatory but we believe training requirements should be flexible and welcome cross crediting from all reputable sources. Trinity College is responsible for training

Book Allowance

Conference 2003 instructed Synods and Parishes to explore ways of providing an annual book allowance for their 'Active and Accredited' Lay Preachers. Some Synods have begun working on this with positive results.

We define Accredited as holding a certificate as outlined for list one.

We suggest Active be defined as:

- taking responsibility for no less than five services in the previous year
- attending no less than eight hours on-going education in the previous year
- being a current member of the NZLPA.

Dorothy McRae-McMahon

The Wellington LPA, in conjunction with the NZLPA, is currently negotiating with this Australian Liturgist to conduct a series of worship workshops throughout NZ this year and through 2005. If your area is interested please let us know. We hope these workshops will strengthen existing groups and encourage the formation of other district associations.

Annual Gathering

The MLPA meets annually on Conference Sunday to discuss Methodist LP concerns and partake in a luncheon. This year the venue will be Birkenhead Methodist Church, North Shore. All lay preachers are most welcome to attend.

APPENDIX I

Discussion paper: Leadership for a Church in change

The Methodist Church of Aotearoa New Zealand is facing critical questions about Parish, District and Connexional leadership. Mission Resourcing has decided to continue working with contracted staff next year and to have conversation with the wider Methodist family about the leadership for resourcing parishes. Next year we will continue to contract out work previously done by the Director, Mission Resourcing.

The Board of Ministry has been exploring where we are going as a Church and what is needed for Parish resourcing for mission.

- We are committed to a bicultural partnership between Te Taha Maori and Tauiwi. This is our Church's primary partnership.
- Within Tauiwi we have multicultural partnerships.
- Partnership leadership is given
 - for Te Taha Maori by the Tumuaki
 - for Tauiwi by The Executive Officer, Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing.
- We understand conversations are continuing within the Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing Committee and in Synods about District leadership and the movement toward fewer Districts.
- It may mean four or five District Synods, along with Vahefonua Tonga, Wasewase Ko Viti Kei Rotuma e Niu Siladi and Sinoti Samoa, as members of the Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing Committee.
- The church is at a critical point of change which will have implications for Methodist parishes and Uniting Congregations.

MISSION RESOURCING - LEADERSHIP FOR THE FUTURE?

The Board of Ministry has been thinking about how to provide resourcing leadership.

- The position of the Executive Officer for Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing has been a half time position this year. We believe the "Executive Officer" half time position should be separated from the task of "Director" Mission Resourcing.
- The task we describe as "Resource Person" is a new concept, of a person providing leadership and resourcing for the mission of the Church. It would be a full time position with Mission Resourcing, and quite separate from the Executive Officer, Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing.
- We can identify some of the tasks of this "Resource Person"
 - 1. The "Resource Person" would work with the four or five District Superintendents, the Superintendents of Vahefonua Tonga, Wasewase Ko Viti Kei Rotuma e Niu Siladi Sinoti Samoa and the Evangelical Network, in a training, ongoing mentoring, supportive and encouraging role.
 - 2. We envisage a role for District Superintendents (who may be separated from Parish appointment or in part time appointments) would be parish focused to give support and education. Superintendents would be selected nationally and trained for their task. They would have peer support, supervision and regular evaluation, along with ongoing training.
 - 3. The Mission Resourcing "Resource Person" would work with District Superintendents to establish a national team. Their task would be to train and equip local leadership, which is critical for the future of our Church.
 - 4. The Board of Ministry recognises we need a name for the "Resource Person" The old title "Director" does not describe the task. Do you have any suggestions?
- Other tasks may be the responsibility of the "Resource Person" i.e. relationships with Uniting Congregations, with Vahefonua Tonga, Wasewase Ko Viti Kei Rotuma E Niu Siladi and Sinoti Samoa, Office management and staff relationships etc.

THE CHURCH IS AT A CRITICAL POINT OF CHANGE:

It is essential we clarify our theology and understanding of ministry before we determine how to provide national, district and parish resourcing. The anticipated Hui on Ministry will enable this conversation to take place.

It would be easy, and we believe foolish, to continue with "The Director" model and seek to fill the position next year.

While Districts may not have resolved new boundaries or moved to work together by the end of next year, the Board of Ministry believes it must anticipate that goal. In anticipation we propose a full time "Resource Person" position to stand alongside the part time position of "Executive Officer" Tauiwi and Stationing.

MEANWHILE "DREAM A NAME":

What name can we give the "Resource Person"? We invite your suggestions.

The Board of Ministry invites conversation and response to this paper, designed to test the waters with the Church concerning parish resourcing for mission.

Faith & Order Committee Report

Introduction

The committee is pleased to present its report to the Conference. This has been a demanding year for the committee with attention being given to a number of subjects. The dialogues with the Anglican and Catholic Churches are requiring greater attention as we move toward important milestones. A number of issues related to ministry are to the fore, especially in relation to the diaconate and Local Shared Ministry. Though parishes are seeking the appointment of presbyters, the ability of the church to make such appointments has diminished. There is an urgent need to keep God's call to ministry before our people as well as exploring alternatives.

Lectionary

We continue to be grateful for the work of the Tony Stroobant on the lectionary. He has developed further the template for publishing the lectionary and this will bear fruit in future years. In addition to that the committee has revised the lections suggested for special occasions, the first time in many years. We continue to welcome feedback about the lectionary and are committed to improving it as a resource for the church.

Joint Liturgical Group

This group meets twice a year under the convenorship of Anglican bishop George Connor. It brings together a representative from each of the Anglican, Methodist, Presbyterian and Roman Catholic Churches. Topics of mutual liturgical interest are considered with each representative reporting on recent liturgical developments within their church. In addition to that we hear reports from the international ELLC, the English Language Liturgical Consultation.

Adult Baptism Liturgy

The order of service for Adult Baptism has been revised in the light of comments from parishes and synods and final editing required by Conference. It is in the final stages of being prepared for the printer. The service will be made available very soon both in printed and in disc form. This represents the culmination of a long process and it is important that this order is seen alongside the order for Confirmation. The strong emphasis of commissioning for ministry is present in both liturgies.

Methodist Understandings of Inter-faith Relations

Conference 2001, responding to the attacks on the World Trade Centre, asked Faith & Order to prepare a statement on Methodist understandings of inter-faith relations. This statement was brought to the 2002 Conference and was commended to parishes and synods and Te Taha Maori. That Conference further asked that the statement be prepared as a resource for study within the church. This work has now been completed and at the time of writing is being printed for distribution. It will soon be available from the Connexional Office. It is hoped that the resource will be used widely in study groups. The standing committee always welcomes responses to the material prepared. The study offers encouragement for people in Methodist and Uniting congregations to meet with people of other faiths to build relationships, develop understanding and learn how others appreciate and practise their faith.

Methodist-Catholic Dialogue.

Two meetings are held each year, one in Hamilton and the other in Auckland. The dialogue continues to study the most recent document from the international conversations between our two churches. There have been illuminating presentations on the place of music in our two traditions. In relation to a desire for common witness a process of consultation has begun on the theme of evangelism in the context of secularism. Professor Elaine Wainwright, inaugural head of The University of Auckland's School of Theology, was invited to speak about theology in the context of the university at the last meeting.

Perhaps the most significant work that the dialogue has been engaged in relates to baptism. Recently Cardinal Walter Kaspar, Prefect of the Vatican's Congregation for the Promotion of Christian Unity, wrote to all bishops' conferences, asking them to give consideration to the place and practice of baptism in their respective countries. This invitation was particularly in relation to any ecumenical progress or agreement that may already exist, or could be created.

Taking up this invitation and momentum, the Methodist-Catholic dialogue in New Zealand, now in its third phase, has spent some time looking at the understanding and practice of baptism in our respective churches. We have noted that the rites of both churches affirm that baptism is with water and with the necessary Trinitarian formula.

It seems to the dialogue that there is a considerable degree of concord over the Sacrament of Baptism. At present we can speak of a unilateral recognition of the baptisms celebrated in each other's churches. Each of our churches has moved to recognize and affirm the validity of baptisms celebrated by ministers and members of other Churches.

The dialogue, following possibilities suggested by Cardinal Kaspar, believes that the time has come for our two churches to move from unilateral acceptance of each other's baptisms, to a Joint Declaration of the acceptance of each other's baptisms.

Faith & Order recognize what some synods have pointed out, that significant theological and ecclesial differences remain between the Catholic and Methodist Churches. The committee affirms the value of the dialogue in addressing concerns around these points and in identifying common commitments and goals. While acknowledging that major shifts in understandings and perceptions are not likely in the near future, the committee believes that recognizing each other's baptisms is an appropriate step in relation to theological and pastoral concerns.

A similar process is underway in the Roman Catholic Church's conversations in New Zealand with the Anglican and Presbyterian Churches.

In support of a Joint Declaration we would make the following points:

- 1. A Joint Declaration would emphasise that our shared belief is that Baptism is the sacramental bond of unity, indeed the foundation of communion, among all Christians. It would affirm that we have the same intention when we baptize.
- 2. A Joint Declaration would affirm the past practice, and acknowledge the closeness of present relationships between the two churches.
- 3. It would give formal, public and enduring recognition to what is the implicit practice.
- 4. It would align the local dialogue and relationship with developments in the international conversation between our two Churches.
- 5. It would be a sign of ecumenical goodwill and energy.
- 6. It would be a significant movement towards a closer baptismal practice at the pastoral and liturgical levels.
- 7. A Joint Declaration would give further evidence of a capacity and willingness to reflect upon shared experience and act upon shared analysis.
- 8. A Joint Declaration would give considerable impetus to a wider ecumenical scrutiny of baptismal understandings and practice.

Report on the Anglican-Methodist Conversations

Anglican Methodist Dialogue

1 Why this dialogue?

This Anglican Methodist Dialogue originated in a resolution of the Anglican General Synod of 2002:

That this General Synod/te Hinota Whanui

- a Recognises the strong historic links between the Anglican and Methodist traditions and the historic partnerships between these traditions in Aotearoa New Zealand and Polynesia from missionary days to the present, and rejoices in "An Anglican-Methodist covenant: Common statement of the formal conversations between the Methodist Church of Great Britain and the Church of England", published in 2001.
- b Encourages the Council of Ecumenism to initiate fresh dialogue with the Methodist Church of Aotearoa New Zealand based on the 2001 statement and to report to the 2004 General Synod/Hinota Whanui.

The Methodist Church Conference of 2002 responded with this decision:

In response to the May 2002 resolution of the Anglican General Synod, Te Hinota Whanui, which called for their Council of Ecumenism to initiate fresh dialogue with the Methodist Church, Conference welcomes the opportunity for renewed conversation about the unity of the church.

2 Participants

Anglican: Rev Nick Frater, Rev Diane Miller-Keeley, (Tikanga Pakeha); Rev Winston Halapua (Diocese of Polynesia); Rev Lem Pearse, Rev Robert McKay (Tikanga Maori). Substitutes: Rev Olive Wallace, Rev Prince Devanandan, Rose Katipa (Tikanga Maori).

Methodist: Rev Terry Wall, Rev 'Epeli Taungapeau; Rev John Roberts, Gwenda White, Sheila Thorne. Substitute: Helen Laurenson.

While there were no Te Taha Maori representatives in the dialogue they were invited to participate and have been kept informed of developments in the dialogue and remain open to future participation in the process.

Participants met on three occasions from April 2003 to February 2004. Matters discussed are reflected in the report that follows.

3 Celebrating together

a The many ways, both formal and informal, in which Anglicans, Methodists and Christians of other traditions already work together, including shared worship, music, Christian education material, resource people, Christian nurture through spiritual direction, retreats, conferences, courses and books, the mutual support of ministries through professional supervision, theological education, co-operative ventures, chaplaincies, ecumenical bodies and agencies. b The growing friendships and fluidity worship attendance among Christians today.

4 Acknowledge what has already been achieved

- 4.1 The Anglican participants acknowledge that their church has already agreed to the following:
- a Acceptance of each other's church as part of one holy, catholic and apostolic church. (General Synod 1976, 1980 & 1986)
- b Recognition that the ministry of the Methodist Church (and other non-episcopal churches) is a real ministry of Word and Sacrament given by Christ the Head of the Church. (General Synod 1976, 1980, & 1986)
- c Recognition by Anglicans of the apostolic content in the ordained ministry of the Methodist Church (and other non-episcopal churches). (General Synod 1986)
- d Recognition by Anglicans that the Methodist Church (and other non-episcopal churches) exercises a ministry of episkope. (General Synod 1986)
- e Commitment to unification of ministries. (General Synod 1980)
- f Mutual recognition of baptism and membership. (General Synod 1980)
- g Baptised members of the Methodist Church (and other non-episcopal churches) are free to receive Holy Communion in the Anglican Church and vice versa. (General Synod 1990)
- h Endorsement of the statement on "Unity by Stages" with the Provincial Council on Ecumenism encouraged to work towards the realisation of the principles set out in the statement. (General Synod 1986)
- 4.2 Both Anglican and Methodist participants in the dialogue rejoice in these achievements.
- 4.3 Methodist participants believe that their church also acknowledges such commitments but will ask their annual conference in November 2004 to formally acknowledge such commitments on the part of the Methodist Church.

5 We recognize

- a The dialogue of our two sister churches in the United Kingdom and have noted with considerable interest the report "An Anglican-Methodist Covenant" which has now been affirmed by both churches with an implementation group established. This has led us to see the need for our own Anglican-Methodist Dialogue in the context of Aotearoa New Zealand at this particular time.
- b That in the past there have been disappointments as well as hopes in the relationship between our two churches. However we are resolved to work at closer relations within the search to restore the visible unity of the church.
- c Each other's response to the Treaty of Waitangi -- the three-tikanga model of the Anglican Church (Pakeha/Maori/Polynesia), and the bicultural model of the Methodist Church (Maori/Tauiwi). Each model is an appropriate response for that particular church and is to be respected. Led by the Holy Spirit both our churches have been significantly transformed and continue to evolve in response to Treaty of Waitangi and other contextual issues.
- d That some Anglican bishops have worked hard to reframe rites of ordination for presbyters being received into the Anglican ministry from the Methodist Church. However, unnecessary hurt and misunderstanding will continue until we work together on processes and rituals acceptable to both churches as neither denying a presbyter's former ordination nor the deeply held values of the tradition into which he or she is moving.

6 We affirm:

- a That the unity of the church is not incidental to God's purpose. The unity of the church (which is the prayer of Jesus in John 17) demonstrates God's ability to reconcile through Christ and supports the mission of God. The unity of the church serves the unity of creation.
- b That visible unity of the churches involves mutual acceptance of faith, sacramental life and ministry, a common witness to the gospel, solidarity with the oppressed and the care of creation.
- c Each others understandings of the mission of the church which have a great deal in common, including concern for: proclamation of the gospel; the nurture of all members, especially those who are new to the church; evangelism; social service; and social justice.
- d That each church in its own way exercises the ministry of episkope or oversight in order to maintain unity in diversity. The Anglican Church does this through the office of bishops and synodical government. The Methodist Church does so through the annual conference, the presidency between conferences, and by devolution of the conference district superintendents and connexional boards and committees.
- e That episkope is to be expressed at three levels: the personal whereby the ordained are called to service and responsibility within the church; the collegial which calls the ordained to consult with each other and act

together in the exercise of the ministry of the oversight; the communal which recognizes that all baptised members participate not only in the mission of the church, but also in the ministry of oversight. We commend the statement in "Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry" (BEM) (World Council of Churches Faith and Order Paper No. 1811 1982 pages 25-26) and in "Episkope and Episcopacy and the Quest for Visible Unity" (World Council of Churches Faith and Order Paper No. 183 1999 pages 52-53)

- f That our two churches' different exercise of personal, collegial and communal oversight reflects ways in which our churches are variously nurtured in the faith, pastored, guided and disciplined.
- g The ministry of oversight in both our churches is concerned with the nurturing and maintenance of the community's fidelity to the teaching of the apostles, the preaching of the gospel, the authentic celebration of the sacraments, and the mission of the church.
- h That in the Anglican Church in this province unity in diversity and the ministry of oversight are expressed in the historic episcopal succession and synodical government within a three-tikanga structure. That in the Methodist Church care for faithful continuity through the ages lies in the act of ordination by those who were themselves ordained in succession, as well as in the exercise of oversight by corporate bodies such as conference and synods. In the Anglican Church this ministry of oversight is exercised within the three tikanga structure, and in the Methodist Church within the Tauiwi/Te Taha Maori model.
- 1 That efforts at convergence in the practice of episkope have too often been seen as a one-way process: namely, that churches in which episkope is exercised in a presbyteral or corporate fashion need to embrace personal episcopacy. We agree with the BEM statement that all churches are called to examine their practice of episkope. Non-episcopal churches need to consider the merits of a personal episcopate; churches which are episcopally ordered are challenged to seek the renewal of their practice of episcopal ministry, taking into account the positive contributions which can be made by systems of presbyteral and corporate oversight. A frank acceptance by all parties of the need for renewal and mutual enrichment would do much to remove negative perceptions and to advance koinonia and the process of convergence.
- j The need to develop "ecumenical space" as the setting in which, even in a state of division, we bear witness to our common allegiance to Jesus Christ and cooperate to advance the visible unity of the church. In this space we affirm our common Christian identity and have the possibility for a new discourse as we talk to one another in a new way. This provides a greater opportunity to discern together Christ's will for the church in ways that are not possible in isolation from each other. In this way ecumenical space brings the churches into living encounter with one another. We consider that the concept of ecumenical space has much to offer a bilateral dialogue such as the one we have been engaged in, and have committed ourselves to it as the model for engaging in dialogue. We commend the statement on ecumenical space in "Episkope and Episcopacy and the Quest for Visible Unity" (World Council of Churches Faith and Order Paper No. 183 1999 pages 43-45. See the appendix to this report).
- k The model we seek to follow at this time is one of visible unity (not organic unity). We are not sure at this time what such a visible unity would look like, or what its implications might be for our two churches. ("What we will yet be has not yet been revealed." (1 John 3:2) We see the search for such a visible unity as a journey in keeping with the model of "Unity by Stages" already affirmed by our two churches. We do not see this visible unity being expressed by one church absorbing another, or in the extinguishing of any of the existing identities within our churches. The treasures all bring are to be preserved (e.g. spiritualities, cultural identities). We seek a visible unity for our two churches that receives and cherishes all the gifts, all the insights, and all the treasures, and holds them together in a creative way that serves God's mission in the world.

7 Some issues for ongoing dialogue

- a Episkope and episcopacy. Further exploration of the ongoing need for episkope in both our churches.
- b Mutual recognition of and interchangeability of ministries between our two churches in the light of the Anglican Church's commitment to unification of ministries.
- c Further exploration of what it means to work for the visible unity of our two churches, and the "Unity by Stages" model already affirmed by both our churches.

8 Request of the Anglican General Synod

What would have to be achieved for our two churches to be recognised as being in "full communion" by the Anglican Church? (Note: In 1998 the Anglican Council on Ecumenism reported that reordination of Methodist clergy coming to serve in the Anglican Church, was required because our two churches "are not yet in full communion.")

9 What we offer our two churches at this time

a The concept of ecumenical space as a model for other interchurch and interfaith encounters involving our churches.

b A commitment to ongoing dialogue between our two churches around the issues identified above.

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Subject to the approval of the Anglican General Synod and the Methodist Conference, an opportunity to celebrate together annually throughout the country in an intentional way, our common faith through a focus on the offerings to the church of John and Charles Wesley who owned both the Anglican tradition and the Methodist way, on either the date set in the Anglican calendar (the Sunday nearest 8 March), or that provided for in the Methodist calendar (the Sunday nearest 24 May). We have committed ourselves to produce suitable liturgical material for such celebrations.

"Let us journey boldly where the timid dare to tread, let us meet gladly, openly and expectantly, and be prepared for surprises." (From a prayer offered at our last dialogue meeting)

Appendix

Ecumenical space

From "Episkope and Episcopacy and the Quest for Visible Unity" The report of two WCC Faith and Order consultations held in 1997 (WCC F&O paper 183)

Developing an appropriate setting: "ecumenical space"

"Ecumenical space" is the setting in which, even in a state of division, we bear witness to our common allegiance to Jesus Christ and cooperate to advance the visible unity of the church. In this space we affirm our common Christian identity. For this reason, we have the possibility of a new discourse: we talk to one another in a new way. In turn, we have a greater opportunity to discern together Christ's will for the church in ways that are not possible in isolation one from another. Space thus understood brings the churches into living encounter with one another. It is helpful to enumerate the presuppositions, characteristics, opportunities and obligations of being together in "ecumenical space".

Presuppositions of ecumenical space: - recognition of common baptism in Christ;

- search for theological understanding on the basis of scripture, tradition and experience;
- commitment to search for unity, to seek to transcend former divisions; commitment to processes of dialogue, and thus to transformation and renewal in the light of the common quest;
- maintenance of fellowship in the situation of divergent affirmations, thus demonstrating commitment to the process.

Characteristics of ecumenical space:

- frank and serious discussion, including search and discovery, questioning and listening;
- mutual respect, so that no church is required to deny its identity or heritage;
- restraint from judgment, thus excluding a purely negative attitude on the part of one church towards another.

Opportunities afforded by ecumenical space: - reconciliation of memories; - conversion and renewal; - common witness;

- guidance into the will of the Spirit;
- discernment of what will advance the visible unity of the church.
- Obligations of being together in ecumenical space:
- compatibility of attitude and behaviour within and outside this ecumenical space; avoidance of actions inconsistent with brotherly/sisterly relationships;
- mutual support, forbearance and accountability.

Within such space, discernment takes place through testing on the basis of scripture, tradition and experience and according to confessional criteria. Individuals function as representatives of their communities committed to dialogue. Deliberation continues even when disagreements seem incapable of resolution. Ecumenical space continues to be a place of interrogation and encouragement, a place where the process of the reconciliation of history must occur.

The process of discernment within the space will raise questions about the relation between the global, regional and national processes of dialogue. It is clear that internal decisions cannot be reached in isolation from partners, and decisions in one region or nation will have an impact on others. For this reason, in any significant decision or agreement concerning church life, compatibility and consistency with partner churches should be tested before finalisation. In sum, mutual accountability to partners must be a chief consideration in the stage-by-stage unfolding of a process that is under the Spirit and oriented to an ultimate future belonging to the Triune God.

We believe the need for an awareness and practice of ecumenical space is urgent with regard to the topic of episkope. Two questions arise:

- 1. Is there the possibility of ecumenical space allowing for a corporate exercise of episkope and ecumenical accountability across the churches? Could there be some structural form of episkope within the ecumenical space?
- 2. Is it possible to have institutional examples of ecumenical space where both episcopal and non-episcopal churches are able to question and listen to one another's experiences and reflections?

Deacons in Full Connexion

During 2003 the Diaconate Task Group raised the issue of whether consideration might be given to deacons being in full connexion with the Conference. The Faith & Order Committee gave some reflection to the question and briefly reported to Conference 2003 that it saw no reason why deacons should not be in full connexion, and some good reasons why they should. At the committee of detail at that Conference there was no consensus and the standing committee was asked to bring a report to the 2004 Conference.

- 1. A consistent theme in our recent understanding is that ministry belongs to the whole people of God. The Holy Spirit provides gifts that are to be offered in worship and mission to witness to the gospel of Christ. The baptized and confirmed are full members of the Body of Christ. They are called to be salt to the earth and light to the world. The church constantly offers support for diverse forms of lay ministry.
- 2. Within the ministry of the whole people of God Methodism recognizes the calling of some to be presbyters in the church. It is the calling of the presbyter to gather, guide and guard the life of the church. The presbyter exercises this calling through sacramental, kerygmatic and pastoral ministry.
- 3. Those who exercise this presbyteral ministry within Methodism are ordained and received into full connexion. The practice of receiving people into full connexion goes right back to John Wesley and the relationship that his traveling preachers had with him. It was an eighteenth century legal requirement for religious societies and preachers to be in full connexion with a clergyman of the Church of England. Otherwise they would have been considered subversive. Today being in full connexion acknowledges a particular relationship that exists between the ordained and the conference.
- 4. Being in full connexion introduces a collegial responsibility to the exercise of ministry. It ensures that ministry is exercised in mutuality rather than individually. Being received into full connexion brings the ministry under the full discipline of the church. This involves being in good standing and acting in a way that is consistent with the code of ethics. "Be what you proclaim." It underlines accountability of stewardship in vocation. The presbyter is a representative person. Being in full connexion recognizes limitations on the exercise of freedom within the Body of Christ.
- 5. Though deacons have been ordained in the church to a ministry of costly service and servant leadership, they have not been received into full connexion. The time has come to consider whether receiving deacons into full connexion might be desirable. We are aware that other Methodist conferences have recently taken this step.
- 6. Our understanding is that the deacon offers a ministry that is complementary and parallel to that of the presbyter. Whereas the presbyter primarily faces the church, the deacon primarily faces the world. Whereas the presbyter is a sign of the Good Shepherd to the church, the deacon is a sign of the servant Christ to the world. Out of a spirituality of the compassionate heart, the deacon detects and identifies the need of a hurting world. As a pioneer of mission the deacon brings stories back to the church. The deacon encourages others to respond to the need identified.
- 7. The presbyter's responsibility for the church, its loyalty to the gospel and its spiritual well-being, follows from the nature of the ministry of the presbyter. The spirituality of the presbyter is that which serves koinonia. Various administrative tasks follow from ordination to this form of ministry. Being in full connexion brings accountability to the conference. Being in full connexion does not change the nature of the ministry: rather it places it in a particular relationship to the conference in that it is under the discipline of the church.
- 8. If deacons were to be received into full connexion it would bring them fully under the discipline of the church. It would ensure accountability in the exercise of ministry and would strengthen the mutuality of vocation. It would change the nature of their relationship to the conference by enhancing the church's acceptance of their ministry as complementary and parallel to that of the presbyter. It would not change the nature of diaconal ministry by expecting the deacon to assume responsibility for the oversight or administration of the church.

- 9. The Faith & Order Committee sees good reason for supporting the call for deacons to be received into full connexion. It would emphasise that this ministry is offered on behalf of the church: it would stress the church's recognition of this ministry as complementary and parallel to that of the presbyter, it would increase the accountability of the deacon to the conference in the exercise of their ministry, and it would encourage that sense of mutuality that comes from being in full connexion.
- 10. For these reasons the Faith & Order Committee supports the request from the Diaconate Task Group that deacons be received into full connexion. We do not see that such a move would change the essence of diaconal ministry. Being in full connexion would not require deacons to adopt aspects of ministry that are presbyteral. We believe that resolving to receive deacons into full connexion would constitute a strong endorsement by the church of the centrality of diaconal ministry in the church's mission today.

Local Shared Ministry Lay Ministry Teams.

In Christchurch 2002, Conference made a decision that Lay Ministry Teams be recognized as a formal category of providing parish ministry alongside that of Presbyter and Lay Supply (see 2002 Decisions - Board of Ministry). Conference further affirmed that in the interim, the model for Lay Ministry Teams follow that laid down for Locally Provided Ministry in the Guidelines for Co-Operating Ventures.

During 2003 and 2004 Faith & Order have had discussions on Locally Provided Ministry (Co-Operating Ventures Model) and Local Shared Ministry (the Anglican model in Northland) as it impacts on Methodist practice, particularly within Co-Operative Ventures.

Faith & Order met with the Board of Ministry in June this year to discuss the practicalities of Lay Ministry Teams. At this point we learnt that the Board of Ministry's focus is on the hui on the theology of ministry planned for February 2005.

Some parishes, in the meantime, are facing the shortage of ordained presbyters, shrinking congregations and reduced ability to fund part or full stipends, and the loss of lay ministry education facilities, personnel and programmes.

It is the view of Faith & Order that the Lay Ministry Team model has much to commend it, as one of the options in lay and ordained ministry. It uses and nurtures the gifts of the laity. Ministry is owned by the whole people of God. It allows for the redeployment of ordained clergy as "ministry enablers". And it has within it the possibility of reestablishing circuits.

Given the decisions of Conference 2002 which

- recognized Lay Ministry Teams as a formal category of ministry
- affirmed the model set out in the Guidelines for Co-operating Ventures
- directed Mission Resourcing to provide trained facilitators for consultations with parishes
- directed Mission Resourcing to provide suitably qualified Ministry Enablers
- endorsed the Forum of Co-Operating Ventures's intent to offer training in Ministry in Co-Operative Ventures for lay and ordained ministry

We bring the following recommendations outlined in 5 below.

SUGGESTED DECISIONS:

- 1. That the study resource "Methodist Understandings of Inter-faith Relations" be commended to the Church.
- 2. That the Methodist Church, Te Hahi Weteriana o Aotearoa, share in a Joint Declaration with the Roman Catholic Church mutually recognizing each other's baptisms.
- 3. In relation to our conversation with the Anglican Church Conference acknowledges the following:
 - a Acceptance of each other's church as part of the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church.
 - b Recognition that the ministry of each church is a real ministry of Word and Sacrament given by Christ the Head of the Church.
 - c Recognition of the apostolic content in the ordained ministry of each church.
 - d Recognition that each church exercises a ministry of episkope.
 - e Commitment to unification of ministries.
 - f Mutual recognition of baptism and membership.
 - g Baptised members of each church are free to receive Holy Communion in each other's churches.
 - h Endorsement of the statement on "Unity by Stages" and realisation of the principles set out in the statement. (General Synod 1986)
- 4. Conference acknowledges the affirmations a-g in relation to all the former negotiating churches.

- 5. Conference supports an ongoing dialogue with the Anglican Church.
- 6. Conference supports the proposal for an annual celebration between our two churches, at the local level, of the offerings to the church of John and Charles Wesley (who owned both the Anglican tradition and the Methodist way) on either the date set in the Anglican calendar, or that provided for in the Methodist calendar.
- 7. That the report on "Deacons in Full Connexion" be received and that Conference resolve that Deacons be received into Full Connexion at Conference 2005.
- 8. In relation to Local Shared Ministry, the following is affirmed:
 - (a) that Conference asks Faith & Order Committee and Board of Ministry to continue in regular discussion during 2005;
 - (b) that Faith & Order organize a meeting with the Partner Churches for a discussion on Lay Ministry Teams

and

training of Enablers. Board of Ministry and Mission Resourcing to be part of this discussion;

(c) that when District Superintendents next meet (Feb 2005) they allow time in their discussions to share the models of ministry currently being practiced in their Districts, and a report sent to Faith & Order as background information for the ongoing discussions.

WesleyCom 2004 Conference Report

INTRODUCTION

WesleyCom presented a substantial, co-ordinated report to the 2003 Conference. That report included data from WesleyCom and each of the Missions and collated (as requested by a previous Conference) information received from Districts and Parishes on Social Service activity around the country. As Boards and Committees are being encouraged to report significantly bi-annually WesleyCom is for 2004 opting to present this "minor" report. WesleyCom has resolved that future Conference reports will parallel the Church's financial year i.e. 1 July – 30 June.

WesleyCom has met on four occasions since the 2003 Report. Conference 2003 approved the reshaping of the membership to include a member from each of the four Mission Boards.

TAUIWI LEADERSHIP TRAINING PROJECT

Conference 2002 resolved that funding for this project be from the **Everil Orr Fund.** Subsequent investigation has determined that the Fund, originally known as the 'Training Fund for Social Workers' is not a suitable funding resource for this project under the principles governing the use of the Fund.

BREAKING THE CYCLE

WesleyCom adopted a process to promote consciousness of the application of the *Breaking the Cycle* policy document on Social Responsibility by initiating two '*Breaking the Cycle - Doing Theology in Community*' seminars in Christchurch (February) and Hamilton (May). Resource persons and key speakers for both events were Karen Morrison-Hume (Director, Anglican Action Hamilton) and Rev. Dr Jim Stuart (Christchurch). At both seminars valuable issues for serious consideration have arisen from presented material and workshop debate.

WesleyCom has resolved therefore to prepare a paper, for presentation at Conference 2005, which will attempt to address the following:

- Breaking the Cycle document what, if any changes where to from here?
- what is the role and function of WesleyCom?
- what does the Church expect from WesleyCom?
- who owns WesleyCom? where does it fit with Mission Boards?
- development of a WesleyCom strategic plan

The preparation of the above mentioned paper is regarded by WesleyCom as work-in-hand requiring considerable and careful consideration.

WesleyCom will provide Conference 2004 an opportunity to participate in 'Doing Theology' using material extracted from presentations at the two seminars.

It is expected that the Annual Reports of each of the four Regional Missions will be available at Conference.

WEB SITE

The WesleyCom web site (<u>www.methodist.org.nz/index.cfm/Social_Services/WesleyCom_Aotearoa</u>) is offered as a resource and information base for social service issues with links to Methodist Missions at other centres.

WesleyCom thanks and has taken note of the comments of Otago-Southland and Waikato/Waiariki August Synods:

Otago-Southland:

- important for Missions link throughout country
- pleased with work on poverty begun last year
- that there was (is) a need to assist "nurturing" and resourcing suitable people for appointments in the Connexion and Missions
- Re Tauiwi Leadership Training Project
 - Otago-Southland believe that WesleyCom fits alongside other areas of the Church and must be careful about training people on it's own.
 - This is a serious issue and Otago-Southland do not see that WesleyCom should do this on their own but rather in conjunction with leadership training that is being developed in other areas of the Church.

Waikato/Waiariki:

"Breaking the Cycle" Document: Many had found it useful. The term "Breaking the Cycle" was confusing given that women's refuges are using the term in association with issues of violence.

Overall members felt that the implications of, and issues within "Breaking the Cycle" should be spelt out with greater clarity so that Parishes could become involved in its implementation.

Queries with regard to the 5 bullet points in the WesleyCom Report - noted by the presenter.

(WesleyCom as the report suggests has already begun the process in preparation for Conference 2005). How can the Missions respond to a civil emergency in their region? (Response – not geared).

Has any thought been given to establishing a Connexional/WesleyCom plan of action should this be required?

SUMMARY FINANCIAL REPORT

This summary financial report has been prepared from the full financial statements of Methodist Mission Northern for the year ended 30 June 2004 which were approved by the Board on 25th August 2004

The summary financial report can not be expected to provide as complete an understanding as provided by the full financial statements of the financial performance, financial position and cash flows.

The full financial report of Methodist Mission Northern has been audited and received an unqualified audit opinion. This is available for review from the Connexional Office, Christchurch.

AUDIT REPORT IN RESPECT OF THE SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the summary combined group financial statements of Methodist Mission Northern for the year ended 30 June 2004 as set out above, in accordance with New Zealand Auditing Standards.

In our opinion the information reported in the summary financial statements is consistent with the financial report from which it is derived and upon which we expressed an unqualified audit opinion

We completed our work for the purposes of this report on 25 August 2004.

Report to Conference

The financial result for the year ended 30 June 2004 is a net deficit of \$538,000 compared to a budget for the full year of \$357,000 deficit.

Although the budget was not achieved, this represents a very significant turnaround when compared to the prior year deficit of \$2,667,000.

Major contributing factors to the improved financial performance are:

- Increased fees from Ministry of Health for Rest Home and Hospital clients. On average \$5.25 per day or \$420,000 per annum
- Reconfiguration of residential services' care options and the introduction of assisted living accommodation resulting in better utilisation of resources
- Improved occupancy of residential services, in particular Wesley Village where occupancy levels improved from 65% to 85% in an 8 month period
- The targeting of funding from Charitable Trusts to support social services, in particular the Airedale Community Centre. In total donations and grants received exceeded the previous year by \$268,000
- Subcontracting of laundry and catering services resulting in reduced costs without any loss in service quality. In fact the outsourcing of catering has resulted in an improvement in the nutritional value of residents' meals
- The necessity, unfortunately, to close some services at the end of the previous financial year, such as Copeland House and Budget Services, to release funds to support major services such as residential care for the older person
- Profit on sale of land and buildings. This contributed \$197,000

Offsetting

- Market driven refurbishment within the residential aged care facilities and provisions for future improvements significantly increased facility costs
- Increased cost of servicing debt. Interest exceeded the previous year by \$133,000

METHODIST MISSION NORTHERN 2004 Conference Report

This year has been one of significant progress for Methodist Mission Northern. We have been guided throughout the year by our strong vision and have undertaken the necessary tasks to achieve our goals. This was made possible by a robust strategic planning programme combined with a dedicated Lead team who have worked diligently to complete the many tasks recorded in the annual delivery plans.

Through necessity, it was the financial sustainability of Methodist Mission Northern that was the prime focus of both Board and management and it is with pleasure we report that our financial situation is improving.

Although considerable energy has been focused on financial viability and sustainability, we have not lost focus on the many services we provide to the community.

Methodist Mission Northern has:

Provided 1,301 emergency food parcels to families and individuals in need;

Provided 35,809 meals to the homeless and disadvantaged;

Received 4,422 visits to our Pitt Street inner-city women's centre;

Provided 9,123 nights of foster care for children in need;

Provided 90,629 nights of residential care for older people;

Supported older people within their own homes with 255,947 hours of care and support.

To ensure that we maintain the ability to support our many clients we have focused on funding issues. For instance, it is apparent that whilst traditional means of funding our diverse social and community programmes have served us well in the past, they cannot be relied upon in the future. Government funding and contracts are certainly not without their difficulties and cannot be relied upon in the medium term. In signing such contracts, we also sign into their agenda and that may vary significantly from ours.

During this year, we have noticed that there are significant changes in the way in which charitable trusts are applying strict criteria to their grants. It is becoming increasingly difficult to get ongoing funding (particularly for salaries) for some of our community projects.

If therefore, we are to develop social and community programmes that address the 'cracks and crevices' in society in accordance with our own agenda and strategy, then the Mission must develop an independent funding base of its own. The three strategies to achieve our objective are broadly outlined as follows:

1. Focus on Fundraising and Profile: This year the Mission created the position

of Development Manager, an essential position in a not-for-profit organization of this size. The <u>underlying reason</u> for the re-establishment of a dedicated fundraising role within the Mission, and the appointment of Dr Lesley Mynett-Johnson, is the need to engage with a wider community of supporters and thus build a strong base of philanthropic support for the future. It is essential to do this in a co-ordinated and structured manner across the organization.

This strong emphasis on fundraising and communication will lead to a strengthening of the Mission's existing support base, as well as expanding it to include other funding streams, including a proactive bequesting programme. Already we are noticing a significant response to our higher profile, particularly from our traditional support base.

Communication and organizational profile are key issues associated with strengthening and expanding philanthropic support. This year we have been grateful for the interest and support of some AUT students who have chosen the Mission as their final year project. Their ongoing interaction with the Mission has reinforced to us the public's confusion surrounding our name, particularly our work in Metro Auckland. This issue will be addressed in 2005.

2. Commercial Strategies: Over many years, through careful stewardship, the Mission has developed a very significant land bank. Each site is strategically located, such as our commercial buildings in Queen Street opposite the Aotea Square.

In order to maximize the return on our land investment, a great deal of research and exploratory work has been ongoing during the year to develop significant commercial strategies that will provide a sound financial base for the Mission's future work and activities. As these remain in the feasibility stage, they are commercially sensitive and therefore not appropriate to publish widely at this time. We are working in consultation with MTA and the CB&L Fund Committee. Once out of the feasibility stage we will be in a position to declare further, the shape of our commercial strategies.

3. Focus on Annual Budgeting: During the year every effort has been made to reduce our budget deficit. These efforts are reflected in the financial result for the year ended 30 June 2004 with a net deficit recorded of (\$538,000) compared to an actual deficit for the full year last year of (\$2,667,000).

Major contributing factors to the improved financial performance are:

- Increased fees from Ministry of Health for Rest Home and Hospital clients. On average \$5.25 per day or \$420,000 per annum.
- Reconfiguration of residential services' care options and the introduction
- of assisted living accommodation resulting in better utilisation of resources.
- Improved occupancy of residential services, in particular Wesley Village where occupancy levels improved from 65% to 85% in an 8 month period.
- The targeting of funding from Charitable Trusts to support social services, in particular the Airedale Community Centre. In total, donations and grants received exceeded the previous year by \$268,000.
- Subcontracting of laundry and catering services resulting in reduced costs without any loss in service quality. In fact the outsourcing of catering has resulted in an improvement in the nutritional value of residents' meals.
- The necessity, unfortunately, to close some services at the end of the previous financial year, such as Copeland House and Budget Services, to release funds to support major services such as residential care for the older person.
- Profit on sale of land and buildings. This contributed \$197,000.

The focus on financial sustainability and the improvement of the result and, in turn, cash flow has released funds to the property portfolio and ensured market driven refurbishment within the residential aged care facilities and provisions for future improvements.

The focus on generating funding from donations and philanthropic trusts, plus the better utilisation of our own considerable resources, combined with an operational focus on delivering services efficiently and effectively will lead to more resources being available to us to meet the ongoing challenges posed by the community. To ensure that we are well prepared to both recognise and meet those challenges, we have been forging relationships and partnerships with well established agencies involved in research and analysis.

This is a new initiative as it is some years since Methodist Mission Northern has been involved in addressing social policy issues. To date, we have been reliant on our New Zealand Council of Christian Social Services for undertaking much of this work on our behalf. Methodist Mission Northern has however taken a significant step during the year to explore a working relationship with the Auckland University of Technology's Institute of Public Policy and their social and economic units. This move has been welcomed and encouraged by AUT.

In addition, over the past three years, strong links have been forged with UnitingCare Wesley (Mission) in Adelaide that has a strong social policy and research unit. In mid-November, Chris Talbot (Executive Manager) will visit Mission Northern to present a Seminar/Workshop based on their research on 'Homelessness' to our Mission people, the Auckland City Council, Ministry of Social Development and Auckland University of Technology. This has become a key social issue in Auckland and we have been active in our advocacy in ensuring that it is not dealt with as a 'law and order/security' issue, particularly in Central Auckland.

Our strong vision in the area of research and development is to establish a working coalition between Methodist Mission Northern and AUT in Auckland, and UnitingCare Wesley Adelaide, Flinders University in South Australia and Trinity Methodist Theological College in Auckland. We see value in some comparative studies being undertaken as well as a proposed student exchange programme being established.

For this Mission, the year ahead is full of promise and hope as we build on the foundations laid during the past year.

Wesley Community Action 2004 Conference Report

Community, compassion, change. These three words continue to guide us in our work. This report summarises key developments in Wesley Community Action over the past year.

Leadership and Governance:

We farewelled Jeff Sanders as Director and wished him well as CEO of Relationship Services. Interestingly Methodism has played a key role in the history Relationship Services (formerly Marriage Guidance), so we are pleased Jeff can continue that tradition. Due to the need to ensure leadership capacity at a time when a number of critical issues face WCA, the Board, in agreement with the President, decided to appoint an interim Director. The Board will undertake a full connexional appointment process for the Director's position over the next year. After a recruitment and selection process David Hanna was appointed interim Director until the connexional appointment process is completed in 2005.

With the shift of David Hanna as chair of the Board, Peter Glensor has picked up this role. Peter brings significant expertise across the community and health sectors to this position at governance and practitioner levels.

Subject to Conference approval, the Board is looking forward to welcoming Desmond Cooper and Jan Calvert as new members to the Board.

Services:

Wesley Community Action continues to provide a wide range of services for people aged from 5 to 105. Our services span the health, disabilities, aged care, child and youth, family, welfare, mental health and community development sectors and are spread from Otaki, Porirua and Hutt Valley to Wellington City.

New Developments / Challenges

Te Whare Whakapakari - this successful residential home for young people is being re-configured to operate as two houses (one for boys and one for girls)

Funding for aged care – the low level of government funding for supporting old people in residential care is a major concern. Wesley Community Action will contribute to the work of the New Zealand Council of Christian Social Services in challenging this situation.

Aged care - we are currently exploring new services for the vulnerable elderly based in the Hutt Valley, the outcomes of this process could impact on the future of Wesleyhaven.

Finances:

It is a challenge to achieve a balanced budget in the current context. For the 2004 year we had a \$415,740 operating deficit, and managed to offset this by our non-operating income resulting with a surplus of \$208,300.

Christchurch Methodist Mission 2004 Conference Report

For the Christchurch Methodist Mission, 2004 has included the appointment of a new Superintendent; reassessment and closure of the last of the Mission's goodwill trading operations; innovative service developments in ChildWise (the Mission's child and family services); a refocussing and reorganisation of emergency relief and advocacy services; and the completion of a major refurbishment of the main rest home and hospital building at Wesley Village.

Financially, the Mission concluded the year ending 30 June 2004 within budgeted expectations, with depreciation fully invested and the end of year result reporting a small surplus. The sale and settlement of Marina Cove Picton and Park Terrace Christchurch properties have been completed (or partially completed in the case of Marina Cove). A full copy of the audited accounts are published in the Conference Financial Reports.

Conclusion to Goodwill Trading

For many years, goodwill stores played an important role meeting not only the urgent needs of many low income households, but later also providing some the essential income the Mission required to maintain its services.

However, in recent years commercial enterprise became a significant market competitor and the availability of cheaper new clothing and goods eroded the viability of such retail services. The larger network of Christchurch goodwill shops had been closed in 2002 and the last remaining outlet was closed in April this year.

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Since 2002 the Mission has held a contract with a commercial operator and the many yellow "Methodist Mission Clothing Bins" (predominantly around the greater Christchurch region) remain a vital source of very considerable income to the Mission.

Community Services

ChildWise – the Mission's services to children and their families – Aratupu, the Mission's nursery and preschool care for low income families – and ER & 4C, the Mission's emergency relief, budgeting and advocacy services, have been incorporated this year into one management structure, Community Services. This change takes advantage of the natural synergy between these three community based services. It will allow a more integrated and aligned service delivery, resulting in a more holistic response for the families with whom each service may work.

ChildWise

- **HomeLink** offers parenting education and behavioural management programmes in the family's own home. In the year to 30 June 2004 it worked with 270 families and provided counselling for 148 children. The service responds to the needs of children who have experienced significant loss, trauma or abuse.
- Wise-Up Walk Tall Tamariki is a life skills programme for children aged 5 to 13 years and aims to assist children with emotional and behavioural self-management. 18 "Wise-Up' groups have been provided to schools and communities and through this programme 292 children have been offered new skills for life. A Stage 2 development of this very successful programme will offer mentoring and leadership development opportunities to children who have demonstrated potential during Stage 1 of the programme.
- **ParentWise** is a parenting education programme. In the past year, 73 parents have participated in the eight courses held around city and suburbs.
- **ParentWorks** is a parenting programme developed in partnership with the Home and Family Society and specialized in offering support and assistance to non-custodial parents. It includes home visits, encouragement and coaching when children are in the home for access visits.
- WomanWise is a group for women who have previously completed other ChildWise programmes. 8 women have participated in the one WomanWise programme held in the last year.

Aratupu Pre-school and Nursery

Aratupu provides early childhood education and care for up to 4 infants and 30 pre-schoolers, most of whom come from low-income families. In the past year 81 families and 97 children were enrolled at the Centre. The service provides a Family Worker to support these families and encourage them in their parenting. Plunket services are also located on-site.

This year a highly complimentary report endorsing the high quality of child care and education the children receive in this centre was received from the Education Review Office. It reflected the commitment and team work of the staff, the supportive management structure and the extensive centre refurbishment undertaken over the past two years. The report also commented on the significant support for parents and whanau; its inclusive culture being its key to success. The majority of teachers at the centre have professional teaching and early childhood learning qualifications and the staff have continued their professional development in Te Reo Maori to enhance the use of the language in the centre.

ER & 4C

This service continues an immediate response to urgent needs. Often it will include emergency intervention concerning benefit entitlements, housing or debt management – and certainly, the costs of rental housing and power supply continue to cripple many low income households. Most importantly however, it is about helping others towards breaking the cycle of circumstances or social conditions which leave children, adults, families and older persons in difficult conditions.

This year, a new partnership agreement has been established with the Ministry of Social Development which will enable a more holistic approach to this service. It will enable the Mission to more effectively resource, encourage and support people seeking to make the transition from unsustainable personal circumstances and to shape their own futures.

WesleyCare – services for the older person

This year high occupancy rates in both hospital and rest home services has continued and a Ministry of Health 3 year certification for these services was achieved – all of which reflects the very high standard of care these services offer. WesleyCare is now also able to provide home and hospital services for people requiring Disability Support care.

Although a major refurbishment to the three story rest home and 3rd floor hospital was completed this year at a cost of approximately \$950,000, the long term requirements of home and hospital care are in significant transition. Full depreciation of that complex will therefore be provided for over the next 12 years, by which time a clearer picture of the appropriate future scope of services for the older person will have emerged. In the meantime, a wide ranging review of the changing requirements in aged care services will be undertaken in early 2005 and is likely to lead to the diversification of services.

Inadequate funding is another area of concern. It is impacting directly upon aged care services and finally, unless corrected, will cause the retrenchment of essential services. In residential and hospital care for the older person, the shortfall is dramatic. It is a matter of urgent concern and is presently in the public and political arena. The Church's aged care services embrace unique qualities of care and it should be of worry to the whole community if such services were finally to be abandoned solely to the commercial sector.

The Challenges Ahead

The Christchurch Methodist Mission strives to ensure an inclusive, sympathetic and understanding response to those in need. In every one of its services, the Mission makes a firm commitment to address the cause, rather than simply the effect. But there are challenges looming.

Firstly, it seems that neither the descriptive "Methodist Mission (South Island)" nor even the word "Mission" any longer accurately portrays or conveys to the wider community the essential role and function of the Church's ministry of social services. In part, at least in Christchurch, that may be due to some confusion around the high profile use of this descriptive by more than one agency. An alternative descriptive is not yet apparent and further work will need to be undertaken around this issue.

Secondly, although we value our partnership with central government (whose various ministries and departments are contract partners and key funding-providers), social service agencies such as the Mission are burdened by rapidly escalating compliance costs and requirements.

On one hand the Mission is firmly committed to professional excellence in all of its services, management and administration. But on the other, each new layer of statutory compliance potentially erodes the capacity of the Mission to respond effectively to the needs of the community. The Charities Bill, Social Worker Registration, Certification of Rest Homes and Hospitals, The Retirement Villages Act, International Accounting Standards, amendments to the Employment Relations Act and Holidays Act are but a few examples from this year.

Finally however, in its commitment to breaking the cycle, the value and effectiveness of the services the Christchurch Methodist Mission will continue to offer, will be best measured by changed lives as people find new skills to live independently and with confidence.

Dunedin Methodist Mission 2004 Conference Report

Community, compassion, change. These three words continue to be particularly important to us guiding us through a number of exciting developments. This year we have moved our office from the commercial heart of the city to a site in South Dunedin; we continue to work towards a better link with the Dunedin Methodist Parish; there have been innovative developments with Approach (our skills training centre for adults) and child services programmes; reassessment and evaluation of aged care services and reorganisation of our administration.

As Board we have farewelled Uesifili Unasa who brought a strong connexional sense to our meetings and we will lose Murray Farley through retirement at the end of this year. Murray's wonderful financial understanding and acumen will be sorely missed.

Unfortunately this year we have discovered problems in the management of our financial records and our audit will not be finalised prior to Conference. We have appreciated the support and help provided through Leah Scales at the Connexional Office and have taken immediate steps to rectify the situation.

Relocation

Leaving behind the rather cramped and inaccessible location in which we have operated following our departure from the old Mission building in the Octagon, the Mission and Parish staff have taken up residence in a large South Dunedin house as we move closed to our dream of a new purpose-built community service centre based in South Dunedin – the community where we belong.

Approach – Adult Learning Centre

This year has been one of expansion, innovation and growth at approach with the development of some new programmes. Through this programme we are providing education opportunities to a wide range of people from a great variety of backgrounds, with the majority reaching their late thirties and beyond. Often seen as being "stuck" and at risk of long-term unemployment, people work with us to remove some of the "barriers" that can prevent them getting jobs, or moving on.

An increasing proportion of the students are gaining employment at the end of their courses, often in work they have not done before. The skills shortage in the current labour market accounts for part of this, but also the increasing appeal of older workers who may have a better work ethic, maturity and stability.

The courses at Approach promote personal communication skills, computing and technology, numeracy and literacy, as well as entry level vocational skills like horticulture, and call centre. Full time programmes all support the achievement of National qualifications.

Child Services

- Community gardens the gardens have a manifold effect, not just for children to learn about gardening, food and nutrition, but they can contribute to the science curriculum. Perhaps more importantly adults too can learn – or share useful skills for themselves and their families. They can also strengthen parent-school relationships by providing positive opportunities for parents' active participation in school life through working-bees.
- Citizens Early Learning Centre provides early childhood education and care for up to 15 infants and 36 preschoolers, most who come from the South Dunedin community. We currently make extensive use of technology at the centre in facilitating a range of children's learning, recalling group and personal experiences, empowering children to take control of their own learning and providing the facility to link children's families and communities. This is provided through technology communication (email, visual displays, small movies etc) and family members being given the opportunities to explore and learn to use a range of these technologies with their children together at the centre. We have explored the need for greater participation within the centre in providing advice and support for families and their children and this year have established a permanent position in the centre for a Whanau Support Worker who works closely with families and teachers to provide advocacy and access to support when needed. This role is similar to that of the Family Worker at Aratupu at Christchurch Mission. This year we have explored further how we can be more proactive in our community involvement through this centre and have developed a service for single parents with community sentences so they are able to complete their community service sentence at the centre and provide care for their children at the same time. We have also developed partnership with Barnardos to use the Centre after hours and at weekends as a Supervised Access Facility and have recently confirmed a notional role within the centre in partnership with the Ministry of Eduction to provide places for agencies such as Women's Refuge and Child Youth and Family.
- Wise Up Walk Tall Tamariki This programme was developed by staff at the Christchurch Mission and is a life skills programme for children aged 5 to 13 years and aims to assist children with emotional and behavioural self-management. This year we have been contracted to provide in-school courses as well as the community courses previously running. We have developed this programme in Central Otago with the assistance of the Alexandra Clyde Lauder Union Parish. There has been a real need for programmes such as this in rural communities who often miss out. We have now completed 2 courses in Alexandra with a further course running during the fourth term and have been approach by Child Youth and Family to now extend this to Balclutha in South Otago, which we aim to do next year.

Challenges Ahead

Our decision to move was, in part, motivated by a close examination of our current activities, what we should be aiming for and the image we portray. This self-anlysis has taken the form of a communications and marketing project with real implications for the future. We realise our services are highly respected, but not very well known. This lack of public profile has implications, especially when applying for funding. Over the next year we will be examining all our priorities with a view to presenting ourselves in a more appropriate manner.

The communications and marketing project also revealed conflicts between our name, Methodist Mission, and our stated aims. We may therefore look at a name change in the next year as we have found the word 'Mission' conjures images of old-school missionaries. We have begun to explore potential new positioning which will have the 'Methodist Mission' as the hub of services, connecting the services together, building partnerships with other organisations and individuals.

Methodist Mission and Ecumenical



The Methodist Mission and Ecumenical Committee (MM&E) has oversight of the two areas of work noted in its title: mission and ecumenical. 'Mission' refers primarily to overseas mission partner church relationships. In the past 'home' and 'overseas' mission were quite separate areas of mission. Today we find that the local and global forces are in constant interaction when we focus on mission. We seek to reflect this in our work. 'Ecumenical' refers to the promotion of an ecumenical outlook in the Methodist Church as well as management of a range of relationships with ecumenical agencies on behalf of the church. The mission and ecumenical areas rightly overlap, for mission is at its best when it can be done ecumenically, and the ecumenical exists, to a significant extent, to better serve the end of mission.

Information and reporting back

This report covers the period September 2003 to June 2004

Education and communication

The secretary has been involved in a range of communication and educational activities. These have included:

- Monthly newsletters.
- Regular occasional papers.
- Articles in 'Touchstone'.
- Preaching engagements.
- Presentations to MWF groups on overseas mission relationships.
- Seminars with parish groups on mission and ecumenical issues.
- Teaching on mission with Ministry Training Unit students.
- 'Transforming Mission' study resource to encourage parishes to reflect on how they can engage in mission, is at the layout and printing stage and will be available at conference. (Requested by conference 2003)
- 'Being Ecumenical' study resource to encourage parishes to reflect on how we engage in ecumenical activity, is moving towards the layout and printing stage and will be available at conference. (Requested by conference 2003)
- Displays to promote mission and ecumenical relationships and activity.

PowerPoint presentations have been used where appropriate and possible. Development of the Mission and Ecumenical space on the Methodist website is ongoing. The secretary has engaged in professional development, study and reading in the areas of mission and ecumenism.

Partner mission church relationships

United Church in the Solomon Islands

Moderator's visit 2003

The Moderator of the UCSI Rev Philemon Riti, and his wife Nancy, were the guests of Methodist Mission and Ecumenical from 1-20 November. They were official visitors at the annual conference of the Methodist Church of New Zealand (MCNZ) and had speaking engagements in Auckland, Hamilton, Tauranga, New Plymouth, Palmerston North, Wellington and Christchurch, and met with MM&E to review the relationship of the two churches. This visit was important for building our relationship with the UCSI. Conference 2003 reaffirmed the mission partner relationship of

the Methodist Church of new Zealand with the United Church of the Solomon Islands, and committed itself to ongoing assistance to that church through financial and personal assistance as well as its prayers.

Key staff changes

Gina Tukulu replaced Wilson Gina as General Secretary UCSI early in 2004. Philemon Riti completes his term as Moderator at the UCSI assembly in October 2004. There will be an election for a new moderator at the assembly.

Assembly 2004

The UCSI assembly is to be held at Munda 6-14 October 2004. The MM&E secretary has been invited and will attend.

Scholarships

Timothy Talasevo was on an MM&E scholarship studying dentistry at Fiji Medical School in 2003. He has since obtained a government scholarship and relinquished the MM&E funding. In 2004 Katena Tarabuku was assisted with a grant to study at the Asian Theological Seminary in the Philippines. Assistance was provided for Mallison Kotali for pharmacy studies at the University of Otago. Pastoral, financial, education and housing assistance have also been provided to Milton Talasasa who is here with his family, studying for an MTh at the University of Auckland.

Vella Lavella

In March 2004 circuits on Vella Lavella Island celebrated the centennial of the arrival of the gospel with Methodist missionaries. Jim and Meriel Cropp, who served the MCNZ on the island in the 1960s, were official visitors at the celebrations. Jim was also able to facilitate the process towards MM&E funding for a copra project to be administered by the circuit at Vonunu. We await a budget and business development plan before releasing funds.

Tabaka Bay Rural training Centre

Tabaka Bay Youth centre became a Rural Training Centre in 2003. It offers programmes for school drop-outs (boys and girls) in carpentry, mechanics, agriculture, tourism and fishing. In 2005 the roll will expand from 50 to 100 students. \$8260 has been forwarded for this activity.

Helena Goldie Hospital

2003 saw staff changes at Helena Goldie Hospital (HGH). Dr Ramindinthra Sailo is the new medical superintendent. His wife, Zochhuani Ralte, is the second doctor at the hospital. Harry Chris Leve continues as Chief Nursing Officer, with salary paid by MM&E. Ronald Ziru has taken over as HGH secretary. The new dining hall for the Nurse-aid Training School, funded with a PAC grant, has been completed. Other funds held for HGH are likely to be used to provide new houses for key staff at HGH. Appreciation is expressed to all those who support HGH.

Acknowledging the work of Phil Taylor

For a number of years Rev Phil Taylor (ably assisted by family members including his late wife Davinia) has organized the sending of educational supplies for the use of United Church of the Solomon Islands schools, medical and other equipment for Helena Goldie Hospital, as well as other items for use in the church and its fellowships. For a variety of reasons, including that the hospital now has its basic running costs met through AusAid, educational needs are being met by NZAid, there are less frequent NZ Airforce flights to Honiara, as well as changed personal circumstances, Phil has indicated it is appropriate that this work now cease. Mission and Ecumenical wishes to record its deep appreciation of Phil's significant work in this area.

United Church in Papua New Guinea

Moderator's visit 2004

The Moderator of UCPNG, Samson Lowa, and his wife Jessie will be the guests of MM&E in November. They will be in New Zealand 7-18 November and will be official visitors at the Methodist Conference in Auckland. Speaking engagements are being planned for various centres. This visit will be important for building our relationship with the UCPNG.

Scholarships

A scholarship has been provided for Samuel Suseve to train for ministry at Rarongo Theological College. The scholarship will extend over two years. Other scholarships for students at Rarongo are anticipated.

Rarongo Theological College

The appeal for the library book fund for Rarongo Theological College Library raised nearly \$7,000. Dr Keith Carley, a former lecturer at Rarongo and now at St John's College Auckland, is assisting in the purchase of books for the library. Thanks to those who have contributed to the appeal.

Bougainville

Plans for a new church administration centre at Buka, using a PAC grant, to replace one the one destroyed in the recent conflict on the island, are proceeding and it is hoped this will be completed in the 2004/05 year. The family of the late Gordon Comwell requested donations for the church on Bougainville in lieu of flowers at his funeral. These are to be forwarded to the church on Bougainville.

Mendi language New Testament

Fred and Marcia Baker, who served the MCNZ in the Papua New Guinea Highlands in the 1970s, were present in Mendi for the dedication of the first edition of the complete New Testament in the Mend Agale Heneng language. They have provided MM&E with a helpful report of their visit.

Ecumenical relationships

In previous years the Conference of Churches of Aotearoa New Zealand, Christian World Service, and the Churches Agency on International Issues have reported directly to conference, as have representatives on the Christian Conference of Asia and the World Council of Churches. The general secretary has advised that they should now report to the Mission and Ecumenical Committee, with this committee providing a summary of their activity in its report. The material in this section of the report has been prepared in consultation with those groups and individuals.

Relationship with Presbyterian Global Mission

Unfortunately it has not been possible to implement the joint meetings of the Presbyterian and Methodist secretaries and convenors proposed in the report to conference 2003. However the two secretaries will continue to communicate with and relate to each other on a regular basis. MM&E has indicated that it would welcome any future initiative to dialogue together as might be considered appropriate, and would welcome an opportunity for the secretaries and convenors of the two agencies to meet on an annual basis.

Uniting International Mission - Australia

While on an Easter holiday in Sydney, the secretary visited Bill Fischer, National Director of Uniting International Mission of the Uniting Church of Australia. The meeting enabled a sharing of respective work, especially with UCSI and UCPNG. A written account of the two churches commitments followed in the interest of better co-ordination and less duplication of our efforts.

Anglican Methodist dialogue

The MM&E secretary was invited by the Faith and Order committee to participate in this dialogue during 2003/04. He has acted in the role of Methodist convenor and report writer. The report was referred to synods and other groups for comment by 30 June. The final report will come to Conference through the Faith and Order Committee report.

Conference of Churches of Aotearoa New Zealand

Methodists serving on the presidium are Garth Cant, and on the executive Dale Peach and John Roberts. Alison Kane, Fika Vucago, Richard Biddle, Garth Cant, Norman West and Keith Hopner were Methodist representatives to the annual forum in Christchurch, September 2003. Alison Kane, Keith Hopner, David McGeorge, Barbara Stephens, Sheila Thorne, and Osaiasi Kupu are the representatives to the forum September 2004 in Auckland.

CCANZ inherited an ecumenical tradition from its predecessor the National Council of Churches, and is committed to the continuation of the ecumenical tradition. Having listened to its members, CCANZ is working together with others, during 2004 and 2005, to find a new expression of ecumenism that is more widely representative of Christian traditions in New Zealand. Catholics, Evangelicals and Charismatics, Pacific and Asian congregations are an important part of this wider ecumenical diversity. The CCANZ executive has agreed to close CCANZ, and hand on its ecumenical vision and knowledge, at the same time facilitate a revisioning of ecumenical relationships in Aotearoa New Zealand. 2004 and 2005 are seen to be the years when CCANZ will bring its own work to completion in a positive, orderly and celebratory way. The executive will be proposing to the 2004 forum that CCANZ finish its life in terms of the constitution in 2005 with a final forum in September of that year. It is envisaged that a small residual group (temporary ecumenical secretariat) will need to remain in place to manage funds, provide financial support for the new ecumenical initiative, be a conduit for ongoing correspondence, communicate with member churches, manage the website, and secure any ongoing funding required. The residual group would likely stay in place till the new shape of ecumenical relations at the national level has been determined. The CCANZ Executive will be proposing to forum 2004 that 2005 be a year to celebrate ecumenical life, to remember and celebrate the good things of the ecumenical past, to publicise that which continues, and to anticipate new ecumenical possibilities. It is suggested there be a series of local and regional events which bring together resource people from the wider ecumenical scene and those involved in local ecumenical initiatives. CCANZ will provide a flexible template for such events with options for timing and duration to fit local configurations. Such events will be local initiatives and not driven by CCANZ.

The Decade to Overcome Violence (DOV) is the major programme thrust of CCANZ. The co-ordinator, Robyn Cave, has taken a number of initiatives that seek to resource Christians and congregations to engage in action to overcome violence and seek peace. A DOV kit has been distributed to approximately 1500 ministry units belonging to CCANZ member churches. It provides information and ideas for taking local initiatives. Material was prepared for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity for which the international theme was, "My peace I give to you." The kereru kit is designed for intergenerational use in parish settings and a number of these will circulate around parishes throughout the country. The flight of Kere the kereru will be mapped on the CCANZ website – www.ccanz.net.nz/dov This kit includes a hand puppet and a CD with stories. The board game "The Incredible journey" has been gifted to most primary schools throughout the country and has been purchased by church groups and individuals. A regionally focused initiative seeks to work with churches and communities using the story telling dynamic offered by "play-back" theatre. The first of these is scheduled for Timaru in August with another in the planning for Napier. The co-coordinator has promoted DOV at the Anglican General Synod in May, the National Council of Churches of Australia in July, and the School

Chaplains and Religious Teachers annual conference in August. A mobile display has been used on several other occasions as well. A five year strategic plan for DOV is being developed. The DOV Co-coordinator position will continue full time till the end of January 2005 and then become up to half-time for two to three years.

New ecumenical initiative

CCANZ's role in the new ecumenical initiative has been to put a group of people (referred to as the "process group") in place. CCANZ will then stand back and let the process group get on with the task of facilitating the formation of a new ecumenical initiative. The Roman Catholic Church has agreed to participate and has nominated a laywoman, Pat Belgrave, as its representative. The five former negotiating churches (Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist, Congregational and Associated Churches of Christ) have appointed Graeme Nicholas, an Anglican priest, as it representative. CCANZ has appointed Bob Scott, an Anglican priest with World Council of Churches experience, as its representative. Vision Network New Zealand has asked Glyn Carpenter and Bruce Patrick to attend the first meeting of the process group. Asian Church representatives will be Dadai Norman, a Roman Catholic laywoman (Filipino), and Paul Monash, an Anglican layman (Malaysian Indian). Pacific Island representatives will be Fei Taule'ale'ausumai, an ordained Presbyterian (Samoan), and Osaiasi Kupu, a Methodist layman (Tongan). Consultation is taking place with Te Runanga Whakawhanaunga I Nga Hahi (the Maori ecumenical body). The process group will select a convenor from within its own membership and identify its own style of working.

Christian World Service

Jill Hawkey was farewelled as CWS Director in April 2004. Jonathan Fletcher was then welcomed into the position. John Roberts is Methodist representative on the CWS National Council. David White serves on the CWS Board. The 2003 Christmas appeal reached its target of \$540,000. The 2004 appeal has a target of \$560,000 and will see a widened street appeal following the 2003 trial. Methodist support for CWS continues to be the highest of any denomination with nearly 80% off all Methodist and Uniting Congregations supporting the 2003 Christmas Appeal. Many members also support CWS by direct debit or other contributions. Each year the Methodist Women's Fellowship in conjunction with the Association of Presbyterian Women 'adopts' a CWS partner as their special project. Since 2000, this initiative has enabled over \$750,000 to be sent to the supported projects. CWS is deeply appreciative of all this support. Parish link persons are important in promoting the work of CWS in their parishes. About 40% of Methodist and Uniting Congregations have parish link persons and CWS would like to see an increase in that number. CWS is currently supporting 31 development programmes in 21 countries throughout the world. With additional government support CWS provides approximately \$2 million per year for these projects. The '@World' magazine is CWS's primary communication with its supporters It is now being produced three times a year. The 2004 video and study guide has the theme 'The global banquet: food for everyone'. 'Youth Topics' continue to be produced, the latest explores environmental issues affecting the world and how we can contribute to a just and sustainable world. 'World "Watch' a resource for use with children continues to be produced three times a year. CWS launched emergency appeals for Niue following the devastation of Cyclone Heta, for Bam in Iran following the massive earthquake there, and the Sudan following the deteriorating situation in the country. MM&E contributed from its disaster relief fund to all three appeals. CWS staff have visited project partners in Mudurai South India (Women's Development Resource Centre), and Sudan (New Sudan Council of Churches). CWS has been represented at ACT (Action by Churches Together) meetings in Geneva. The director was one of a party that accompanied the Minister of Foreign Affairs on a visit to the Marshall Islands, Palau and the Solomon Islands in June. CWS is considering new projects in East Timor. CWS supports the 0.7% goal for New Zealand's overseas aid budget. CWS collected more than 2000 signed postcards supporting this campaign at the Parachute Youth Festival in January. In April these were presented to the Minister responsible for overseas aid. CWS also supports the "wipe the debt" campaign calling for the removal of unrepayable debt owed by the least developed nations of the world. MM&E has assisted in distributing postcards that promote this campaign. CWS encourages youth to join this campaign through a "Wipe out poverty week" of fund raising activities. CWS has been actively involved in the "Trade for people, not People for Trade" campaign for fair and equitable international trading rules. A position paper "Talk trade" has been produced by CWS. CWS is supporting the Ecumenical Coalition for Justice in its production of resources to help congregations gain a Christian perspective on Treaty of Waitangi issues, including the foreshore and seabed debate.

Until late 2003 Christian World Service was an agency of the Conference of Churches in Aotearoa New Zealand. Changing circumstances now mean it is necessary to have a separate legal and financial structure. CWS is now a Trust Board under the Charitable Trusts Act. The new constitution requires churches to seek membership of CWS. A paper on this matter and the new constitution has been considered by the MM&E committee. A response is included in the list of suggested decisions at the end of this report. A detailed report on CWS activities has been received by the MM&E secretary and is available on request.

Churches Agency on International Issues

The backgrounder "Israel/Palestine: Understanding conflict in the Holy Land" was reprinted in February and is now being sold for \$6.50. A study guide has also been printed and widely distributed. Feedback on this resource has been most encouraging. Future resources will pick up on the theme of 'hot topics'. The first to appear in August will be country related and will feature Zimbabwe. The second will be on the Sudan while the third will feature the war on terror.

The oversight group has discussed the future of this agency beyond August 2004 when the pilot period ends. As it stands the current level of funding for the project is not sufficient to enable CAII to continue as a separate agency in its own right. The proposal is that the work comes under the umbrella of Christian World Service with the present

committee of oversight being retained, and funding from member churches to continue as at present. It be known as "The Churches Agency on international Issues resourced by Anglican Methodist and Presbyterian Churches and the Salvation Army." The MM&E secretary is a member of the oversight group.

Ecumenical Coalition for Justice

This is an informal coalition of people from the Anglican, Catholic, Presbyterian and Methodist Churches. The Methodists involved are Keith Taylor and John Roberts. The ECJ was formed in 1999 to oppose the APEC free trade agenda when that body met in Auckland. It has also produced resources for general elections, and on child poverty. The current project on the foreshore and seabed debate and another on the treaty and immigration are being funded by church aid and justice agencies, including CWS. The group meets monthly. It now has a website - socialjustice.org.nz where resources relating to the issues it is working on are posted. Foreshore and seabed study resources are available on the website.

Christian Conference of Asia

CCA's "Narrative Report 2003" setting out the full range of activities of the council has been received by MM&E. Asia Sunday is a focus for the life and work of the Christian Conference of Asia (CCA). This year the theme was "Serving Together Beyond Boundaries." Although scheduled for a Sunday in May, Asia Sunday can be observed on any suitable Sunday in the year. We were invited to nominate a person to attend the Asia Ecumenical Academy in Chiang Mai Thailand 8-28 August 2004. Following consultation with the Tumuaki of Te Taha Maori, the name of Mark Gibson was submitted and financial support of \$1,000 sought from the Travel and Study Fund. Mark has been accepted for the course. Fuaileagi Samoa Saleupolu completes her term on the General Committee of CCA in May next year. The 12th General Assembly of the CCA takes place 31 March to 6 April 2005 in Chiang Mai, Thailand. The Methodist Church of New Zealand is entitled to one delegate. In consultation with the Tumuaki of Te Taha Maori a criteria and selection process was drawn up and agreed to by the MM&E Committee. That process is currently being followed and a name of the delegate will be notified to Council of Conference in due course.

Report from World Methodist Council Executive, Port Elizabeth, September 2004

The Executive of the World Methodist Council met in Port Elizabeth, South Africa, September 15 – 19 2004. Mary Caygill and Jill van de Geer attended representing the New Zealand Methodist Church.

The group numbered around 200 and represented most of the 132 member countries.

The basic objective for meeting was to enable the standing committees to meet to do their final preparation for World Methodist Council Conference to be held in Seoul, Korea, July 2006.

Standing Committee

The New Zealand Church has chosen to identify with the Social and International Affairs Standing Committee. The Committee invited Dr Lee of the Korean delegation to come and speak about what the Committee might do to assist the Korean Church have a prominent voice regarding major issues of concern. Dr Lee identified the following issues of concern:

- Reconciliation between North and South Korea
- Comfort women
- refugee migrants from the North
- Intergenerational conflict

The Social and International Affairs Committee met in Nashville in 2003 and as part of its work at that time had sent a letter to the WMC Officers asking that the following points be taken into account when organising the next conference in Seoul:

- That all meetings and conferences be planned in extensive consultation with resident communities within the host country
- That the values of hospitality, solidarity and courtesy are enhanced wherever meetings or Conferences are held
- That meetings and conference exhibit a sense of pilgrimage rather than a tourist package
- That engagement with local people, culture and customs is optimised during meetings and conferences
- That every endeavour be made to address the complexities involved in becoming truly inclusive, enabling people to speak with their own voice and to feel that their regional and national concerns are intrinsic to the central agenda.

The Officers thanked the group for their letter and assured them that the concerns had been noted by the planning committee.

World Methodist Evangelical Division

The World Evangelism Division had been asked to look at relationships between Christians and Islam. A major paper had been prepared and was presented to the meeting for adoption. Copies will be made available when the final version is released.

Rev Dr Beyers Naude

While the Executive gathered we learned of the death of Dr Beyers Naude – a member of the Dutch Reformed Church who broke ranks with his church, was defrocked, rejected and made to suffer by his own.

Rev Dr Ivan Abrahams, the presiding bishop of South Africa read greetings from the WMC at the funeral, a paragraph of which is set out below:

A compassionate pastor, a man of heroic courage, a single-minded promoter of Christian unity, a man of deep faith and a legend in his own time, the WMC rejoices in the fact that by God's grace, Dr Naude lived to see the creation of a just society in South Africa.

The Social and International Affairs Committee accompanied members of the St John's Church on a visit to a settlement where we were made acutely aware of the magnitude of the HIV pandemic. AIDS has created 14 million orphans around the world, 11 million of them in sub-Sahara South Africa where 20.1% of the population are HIV infected adults and children. 12 African countries have infection rates of more than 10% of the adult population, 7 of these, mostly in Southern Africa are over 20%.

The South African Methodist Church has a poster which we saw prominently displayed in two churches which states – *This Church has HIV AIDS.*

All Methodist worship begins by lighting a candle which has a red ribbon on it followed by an opening Prayer – God Bless Africa

- Guard her children
- Guide her leaders
- Bring peace to this land

While we observed wonderful self-help work a black American bishop reminded us not to romanticise what we saw as any significant change will need massive government assistance at every level.

Restructuring Committee

The Restructuring Committee had their proposal for a nominations committee accepted. It will require a Council vote in Seoul to put this into the Constitution so a compromise was agreed to that for the election of Officers for the 2006 Council the Officers would be joined by six independent people to constitute the Nominations Committee. Jill van de Geer was elected to this group.

There is significant change happening within the World Methodist Council and we believe the New Zealand Church is able to have a positive input towards this change at this time.

World Council of Churches

The WCC annual review for 2003 has been received. Konrad Raiser retired as General Secretary in December 2003 and Sam Kobia moved into the position in January 2004. Guillermo Kerber, a WCC staff member visited New Zealand in December to attend a meeting of the Council for International Development. Two additional ecumenical events for people to meet with him were arranged in Christchurch and Auckland around the theme of "Immunity, truth, justice and reconciliation." In January the MM&E secretary represented the WCC at the Friends (Quaker) World Committee for Consultation meeting held in Auckland. The MM&E Committee has responded to WCC documents on membership issues and the future shape of the ecumenical movement. John Roberts will attend the next meeting of the WCC Central Committee in February 2005. A World Mission and Evangelism Conference will be held in Athens, Greece, in May 2005, with the theme "Come Holy Spirit heal and reconcile". Three Methodist nominations from the MCNZ were submitted to the planning group. To date there has been no reply. The 9th WCC Assembly will be held in February 2006 in Porto Alegre, Brazil with the theme, "God, in your Grace, Transform the World". This will be a smaller assembly than in the past and the MCNZ is entitled to just one delegate this time. In consultation with the Tumuaki of Te Taha Maori a criteria and selection process was drawn up and agreed to by the MM&E Committee. That process is currently being followed and a name of the delegate will be notified to Council of Conference in due course.

Interreligious relationships

Relationships with other faiths are now recognized to be both an important mission and ecumenical issue. The MM&E secretary has served on the executive of the Auckland Interfaith Council which is organizing a national interfaith gathering in September 2004. The secretary has also attended meetings of the Councils of Christians and Jews and Christians and Muslims.

Secretary's performance review

The committee convenor and the Vice–President elect carried out a performance review on the work of the secretary in July with a positive and affirming outcome.

Strategic plan

Methodist Mission and Ecumenical is the official agency of the Methodist Church of New Zealand (MCNZ) that promotes its overseas mission church relationships, its ecumenical relationships both local and international, as well as its confessional relationships.

Our vision

- To embrace theological understandings of mission and ecumenism that reflect the nature of the God made known to us in Jesus Christ.
- To see mission and ecumenical endeavour as being at the very core of our church's existence.
- Mission to be given expression at the global as well as the local level.
- Existing partner church relationships to be maintained by a one person visit either to or from the partner church, subject to availability of finance.
- New relationships able to be developed.
- Ecumenical thinking and action to be seen as essential to our church's life.
- Supporting and encouraging existing ecumenical relationships while looking for new expressions of ecumenism.
- To develop links with other churches and agencies within the world Methodist family.

Our key goals

Theology and practice of mission

- Continue to use the "Transforming Mission" paper as a working document that provides a theological base for the work of the committee and secretary.
- Produce a series of professionally formatted and published studies for parish use based on the "Transforming Mission" paper by August 2004.
- Have these studies promoted and circulated at Methodist conference 2004.
- Promote the use of these studies in 2005 with a minimum target take-up of 25 parishes by the end of 2005.
- Produce a paper on "Mission in a Wesleyan Spirit" in 2005.
- Have this paper available for use in a variety of settings to stimulate further thinking about mission in the connexion.

Overseas mission relationships

- Promote support and strengthen the world-wide mission of the Methodist Church of New Zealand in particular the partnership relationships with the United Church of Papua New Guinea (UCPNG) and the United Church of the Solomon Islands (UCSI).
- To further the relationship with the UCSI through the secretary attending the UCSI's Assembly in October 2004 and meeting with assembly staff, Helena Goldie Hospital staff, and following up on projects that MM&E has provided financial assistance for.
- To provide funding for specific projects or programmes of the UCSI subject to the provisions of the MM&E budget 2004/05.
- To further the relationship with the UCSI through the visit of the Moderator, Samson Lowa, to the Methodist Conference in November 2004 and visits to regions following the conference, as well as dialogue with the MM&E committee.
- To provide funding for specific projects or programmes of the UCPNG subject to the provisions of the MM&E budget 2004/05.

Theology and practice of ecumenism

- Promote, support and strengthen the ecumenical understandings and commitment of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.
- Produce a series of professionally formatted and published studies for parish use based on the "Being ecumenical" paper by September 2004.
- Have these studies promoted and circulated at Methodist conference 2004.
- Promote the use of these studies in 2005 with a minimum target take-up of 25 parishes by the end of 2005.
- Produce a paper on "Ecumenism in a Wesleyan Spirit" in 2005.
- Have this paper available for use in a variety of settings to stimulate further thinking about ecumenism in the connexion.

Ecumenical relationships

• Promote and strengthen relationships with ecumenical agencies of which the Methodist Church of New Zealand is a member – Conference of Churches of Aotearoa New Zealand (CCANZ), Christian World Service, Churches Agency on International Issues CAII), Ecumenical Coalition for Justice (ECJ), Christian Conference of Asia (CCA), and the World Council of Churches (WCC), and interfaith bodies.

- Oversee for the Methodist Church the transition from CCANZ to a new more representative national ecumenical body on 2005 the secretary to continue on the CCANZ executive through this process, along with Dale peach and Garth Cant (president).
- Strengthen and build the Methodist relationship with CWS through the secretary's membership of the CWS National Council and David White's membership of the CWS Board, and the sharing of information with the connexion.
- Strengthen and build the Methodist relationship with the CAII through the secretary's membership of the CAII oversight group along with Barbara Stephens.
- Strengthen and build the Methodist relationship with the Auckland based Ecumenical Coalition for Justice through the involvement of the secretary and Keith Taylor, and the sharing of information with the connexion in 2005.
- Strengthen and build the Methodist relationship with the CCA in the lead up to its General Assembly in March/April 2005 and beyond through regular contact and the sharing of information with the connexion.
- Strengthen and build the Methodist relationship with the WCC through the secretary's membership of the WCC Central Committee in the lead-up to the 9th assembly in February 2006, through regular contact and the sharing of information with the connexion.

Promote the relationships of the Methodist Church of New Zealand with world Methodism

- Strengthen and build the relationship with the World Methodist Council through the involvement of the church's General Secretary, Jill van de Geer and Mary Caygill on the WMC Executive committee in the lead-up to the World Methodist Conference in 2006.
- Strengthen and build the relationship with the Methodist and Uniting Churches Consultative Council of the Pacific through the attendance of connexional leaders at the annual meetings.
- Strengthen and build the relationship with Methodist Churches in the Asia/Pacific region through the attendance of the MM&E secretary and Mary Caygill at the round-table in Hong Kong December 2005.

Education and communication

- Produce information kits on the work of MM&E for connexional leaders and district superintendents to promote the work of MM&E in 2005.
- The secretary to be involved in as many mission and ecumenical educational initiatives as possible in parishes, and districts etc. The secretary and committee to be proactive in this regard in 2005.
- Produce a monthly newsletter, occasional papers, information leaflets and articles in "Touchstone" in 2004/05.
- The secretary to gain further training in use of the Methodist website and then to maintain effective Mission and Ecumenical content.

Suggested decisions

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. Conference commends the "Transforming Mission" and "Being Ecumenical Studies" for use in parishes and other church groups in 2005 and beyond.
- 3. Conference reaffirms the mission partner relationship of the Methodist Church of New Zealand with the United Church of Papua New Guinea, and commits itself to ongoing assistance to that church through financial and personal support, as well as its prayers.
- 4. Conference expresses its appreciation to Rev Phil Taylor for the work he has done over a number of years in soliciting and sending goods for use by the United Church of the Solomon Islands and Helena Goldie Hospital.
- 5. Conference expresses its support in principle for the steps being taken toward a new ecumenical initiative at the national level in Aotearoa New Zealand.
- 6. Conference supports the proposal that 2005 be a year to celebrate ecumenical life, past present and future.
- 7. Conference agrees that ecumenism at the national level (whatever form it takes) will require a measure of ongoing financial commitment from the churches, and that budget provision should continue to be made in the light of a specific proposal submitted for consideration.
- 8. Conference affirms the Decade to Overcome Violence: encourages parishes to make use of the resources including the DOV kit already circulated to parishes, the 'Kere the Kereru kit' as it makes it way around parishes, and 'The incredible Journey' board game; and to engage in the development of regional initiatives.
- 9. Conference welcomes the appointment of Jonathan Fletcher as National Director of Christian World Service and assures him and the agency of its ongoing support.
- 10. Conference reaffirms that Christian World Service is the official aid, development and justice agency of the Methodist Church of New Zealand and in so doing formally renews it membership of the agency.
- 11. Conference encourages parishes to promote and support the Christian World Service Christmas 2004 and emergency appeals.
- 12. Conference encourages all parishes that have not already done so to appoint a parish link person to relate to CWS.
- 13. Conference notes the availability of Christian World Service educational and study group materials for adults, young people and children, and encourages parishes to make use of these.

- 13 Conference supports the Churches Agency on International Issues coming under the umbrella of Christian World Service and to be known as "The Churches Agency on International Issues resourced by Anglican Methodist and Presbyterian Churches and the Salvation Army." The current oversight committee, and current funding arrangements from member churches to continue (\$4,000 from the Methodist Church).
- 14 Conference asks Mission & Ecumenical in 2005 to engage in discussion with Faith and Order and Mission Resourcing as to the most appropriate way to manage the various ecumenical relationships of the Methodist Church of New Zealand at this time.
- 15 The committee membership for 2004 be: Keith Hopner (convenor), Margaret Donald, Kilifi Heimuli, Keita Hotere, Alison Kehely, Lana Lazarus, Shanti Sinnaduray, Kerry Taylor, and John Roberts (secretary), and up to three others to be appointed following conference.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT TO CONFERENCE 2004.

WWW.METHODIST.ORG.NZ THE METHODIST WEBSITE.

During 2004 every parish has had basic contact details placed on the website. It is also pleasing to see an increasing number of parishes customising their own pages by writing and adding their own content. This is how the site is designed. The goal is to have most parishes able to keep their own pages up to date and interesting. The achievement of this goal will then allow the webmaster, use his time on making enhancements to the overall site.

The website and all its running costs are paid for from a PAC grant. There are sufficient funds to operate the site for some years to come at no additional cost to the church. There is no need for Parishes to pay to have their own independent sites constructed and hosted. They may of course wish to use professional services to design and maintain their pages on the Methodist website at their own expense.

A workshop in Auckland was severely curtailed when Auckland airport was closed. This will be rescheduled and further workshops will be held in 2005. Future workshops will also include preparing content and writing for the website, in addition to the technical matters.

Following a request for a simplified web address, the software developers are investigating how to implement this. The hope is that an address in the form <u>www.parishname.methodist.org.nz</u> will be able to be offered. Such a simplified address will be easier to advertise and remember and should increase the usefulness of the website in the local setting.

The site search facility is an excellent way to find pages and content. Type a keyword or phrase into the search box, and within seconds the pages you are looking for will be displayed. In addition the 'Home' page or first page of the website is also to be redesigned to enable visitors to more easily and more quickly find the content they want.

In a typical week, the site had 3201 unique visitors. Along with those from New Zealand significant numbers came from USA, Australia and Uruguay, with a smaller number from countries such as Israel, Spain, Peru and Japan. Successful searches included Taupo Methodist Church and Wesleydale. The most viewed pages for the week were the e-messenger.

Remember the website is also a resource at your finger tips. Look on the website for:

- The most up to date information leaflets
- The Law Book.
- The Lectionary
- Worship resources.
- Summaries of key articles in Touchstone

New material is being added all the time. Don't forget to check the website first. It is designed to save you time and make resources available.

In September David Bush and Viki Forscut attended a workshop with Gerry McGovern. "Managing a website on a tight budget". It was pleasing to discover that we are on track with the Methodist website. The key to an effective website, is a site with good, up to date information which is easy find and quick to download. A reasonable goal, is to make the website the first place Methodists go for information and resources about the Methodist church, and the place where those seeking to find a Methodist church or Uniting Congregation can easily find out how to get in contact with that congregation.

To make the website work for us, your feed back is required so that improvements and enhancements can be made.

TECHNOLOGY IN THE CHURCH

John Drane in his book "McDonaldisation of the Church" [page 191] says: '..the move from word to image is unmistakable, and it has wide-ranging implications not only for worship, but for the whole of Christian belief and practice. What is now happening in this cultural shift can be compared to what took place with the invention of the printing press, something which if it did not exactly spark off the Protestant Reformation, certainly became an incredibly powerful tool of mass communication in the hands of the Reformers and their successors. Regrettably, today's Christians have not had anything like the same level of foresight to enable them to grasp hold of the new opportunities now available. Some are simply unaware of the magnitude of the cultural change that is taking place..."

During the industrial revolution new technologies which were substantially the introduction of process and method into the production of goods totally changed the structure of communities. A methodical approach to faith which mirrored the technological changes resulted in the name 'Methodist' for those who dared to be different.

It could be said that the beginnings of the Methodist movement, its shape and its form owe a great deal to the new technologies being adopted in Europe at that time.

More often however, the church has not only been slow to adopt new technology, it has opposed it. The printing press made it possible to mass produce the Bible. For his trouble Tyndale was burned at the stake. The introduction of the organ into church life was similarly opposed and many have stories to tell of the reluctance to embrace a new hymn books. Be it 1933 or 1983.

For this reluctance to continue in our present era, is to jeopardise the possibility of the mission of the church. Information and its presentation with image and sound, with colour and immediacy is central to 21st Century culture. Ask any teenager who easily sends several 100 text messages per month. Observe the renewed popularity of movie events and the all pervasive 'reality' television.

If we are to seriously interact with the people who live around us, so that meaningful relationships can be formed, we need to examine the technology we employ. Should we be using musical instruments and styles which are now seldom heard outside of the church? Can we afford to be the only people who make presentations without the enhancement of picture, sound and image. Do the words and sentence structure we employ convey meaning? Bemoaning the fact that things are not the way they were, or that standards have slipped is irrelevant. Our task is to communicate the good news of a God who became one with us, incarnate. To become 'incarnate' to this new age is to grapple with, and embrace new technology.

It is key to do things well. New technology is not a silver bullet which will make tired worship relevant. We strongly encourage Parishes to use the best of old and new. Perhaps a series of workshops on wisely using technology would be useful?

Data Projectors:

The Communications Committee made a submission to the PAC Distribution group for funds to establish a technology fund. The primary purpose to enable the purchase of data projectors. The Distribution Group decided to make grants to the individual Parishes which applied. The Communications Committee is likely to resubmit its application to PAC in 2005, as there are enormous benefits in being able to negotiate bulk purchase deals. Potential savings in excess of 20% were negotiated this year, with the deal also bringing additional ongoing servicing benefits. The message is that any Parish considering making such a purchase is unwise to do so alone.

Parishes considering the purchase of a data projector will find the website <u>http://www.usingpowerpointinchurch.com</u> provides helpful insights into maximising benefits and minimising costs. For example they recommend using a Desk top rather than Laptop computer. For many churches this will mean the existing Parish computer can be utilised. The addition of a dual head video card [Approx. \$65] will make PowerPoint much easier to use, and eliminate the need for more expensive customised software. The Committee as it is able will seek to advise churches on the set up which is best for their situation.

The United Church of Australia has produced collections of multimedia video clips based on the Lectionary. It includes Calls to worship, prayers, blessings and discussion starters. Check out <u>www.digistry.org</u>. The resource will be available for viewing at Conference. The Committee asked the question. 'How might we collect photographs, backgrounds, and creative work which has been produced in New Zealand'?

ADVERTISING THE CHURCH

How does the general public come to know what we stand for, or what we do in our churches? A few congregations advertise services in their local papers. But is this the place where someone searching for answers, or community, or hope would begin to look?

We were interested to read a report of advertising campaigns conducted by churches in the United States. "The United Churches of Christ's advertisements were described as 'especially edgy'. One shows a pair of bouncers manning a rope line outside a church, admitting a white heterosexual couple but barring gays and racial minorities. "Jesus didn't turn people away. Neither do we," the ad says."

The United Methodist Church has as its slogan: -- "Open Hearts. Open Minds. Open Doors." -- portraying Methodists as warm and welcoming. And, according to research commissioned by the church, first-time attendance has risen 14 percent and overall worship attendance is up 6 percent at a nationwide sample of 149 Methodist churches since the ads began appearing."

While we cannot afford the sort of budgets being set aside for advertising in the USA, we would like to suggest that thought be given to how the resources we do spent on publicity are used.

We found ourselves asking; "Could our churches live up to an advertising campaign?" In other words are we welcoming, open and forward looking? A careful examination of what makes people feel welcome, research into the real needs people have and spending time and money in training 'midwives' to be aware of the needs of those at worship would in our view be more appropriate than 'advertising' for our setting.

We also noted that the best advertisement is what people experience of those of in the church, both in the church setting and during the week. The most powerful invitation is not via the media, but the careful listening to another's story, followed by an appropriate invitation, 'will you come with me'.

Congregations might begin a conversation by asking; 'How do people in our community come to know of the hope we have to offer to a hurting world'?

Wellington, Hawkes Bay-Manawatu, Taranaki-Wanganui Combined Synod asked; Are we open to being more proactive? Sporting bodies get plenty of publicity – do we need to cultivate the media more purposefully. One group told of cultivating a reporter from a local paper, who then kept in touch. Another spoke of a school holiday programme which was well received and supported after being well advertised.

HEARING LOOPS:

Can those who use hearing aids participate in your services? Installing a hearing loop is relatively inexpensive, and will enable those with impaired hearing who have a 'T' switch to more fully participate. The Committee can make available technical information to enable a Hearing Loop to be installed. This do it yourself option will require someone with a knowledge of electronics. To have a loop installed commercially will cost in the order of \$500 to \$700 for materials, plus installation. In same cases the running of the loop wire maybe difficult, and therefore expensive. This may also be something many churches can do for themselves. We strongly encourage any worship facilities without a hearing loop to have one installed during 2005. If funding is a difficulty the PAC Media and Communications Fund has assisted with such projects in the past.

Once installed, it should be made known both by a hearing symbol being displayed prominently and by instructions printed in newsletters and worship bulletins.

WHO PAYS: A WARNING

E-mail has revolutionised the way we communicate with one another as letters and documents are sent around the world in an instant. It is all too easy however to shift costs from Connexion and Synod to individuals. For August Synod this year, one District made the decision to photocopy and post reports as it realised it would cost up to three times more for individuals to print nearly 30 pages of reports, than it would for the Synod to copy and post In using e-mail, it must be kept in mind that ink-jet printing is many times more expensive than photocopying.

BECOMING INCLUSIVE: A GOOD NEWS STORY

We need to remember that both what we say and do are important in our efforts to communicate.. One committee member was recently at a service of Holy Communion where Gluten Free wafers were offered along with the cubes of bread. A small thing, which said a great deal about how all people were valued in that congregation. It felt good and was affirming even for those without gluten intolerance.

- 1. That the Report be received

Annual Report of the Churches Broadcasting Commission 2003 - 2004

Meetings

Four meetings were held throughout the year with an average attendance of 14 members. Three meetings were held in Laughton House, Wellington (our thanks to the Presbyterian Church for making this possible) and one in the Pompallier Centre, Auckland (our thanks to the Auckland Diocese of the Catholic Church for making this possible).

Financial

Although, at the time of writing, our finances for the year have yet to be finalised and audited, we can report that these have diminished significantly this current year. It is in large part due to the initial 'seeding' money paid out to establish the Broadcasting Scholarship (\$11,350.00). Otherwise, income and expenditure will mirror that of the previous year.

Activities

- 1. Freedom of Speech. Richard Davis has been working on this project and Susan Fountain who is doing research with Human Rights Commission and Bill Hastings from Internal Affairs have also interviewed Richard on this project. He is also to meet with David Lane fromSociety for Protection of Community Standards and Broadcasting Standards Authority. There are key legal proceedings current in NZ about these issues.
- 2. The CBC Broadcasting Scholarships. The first Scholarships were awarded this year at functions in Wellington and Auckland. There were 16 applicants for the Scholarships and 6 were awarded the sum of \$1,500.00 each. It was generally agreed that this is one of the most effective initiatives taken by CBC in recent years and it is

anticipated that it will be an annual event, providing the money required (about \$10,000 p.a. minimum) can be gathered from churches and the Christian community. Full details of the Scholarship and what it offers and what is required of the awardees can be found on our website.

- 3. *Website.* Our website came into its own this year with postings of the Broadcasting Scholarship, media releases and other items of interest being made available for public viewing. While it is not extensive, it is an insight in to the workings of the Commission and we intend to increase our information-sharing using this method in the future. (Website address: www.broadcasting.churches.org.nz)
- 4. Charities Commission Bill. We made a written submission to the Parliamentary Select Committee hearing on the Charities Commission Bill. With the need to raise funds for further Broadcasting Scholarships, we now have a vested interest in this area and believe that the Bill will be a significant and costly hindrance to a small 'charity' such as CBC is in terms of gathering funds to support the Scholarship.
- 5. *Media Releases.* Three media releases were issued throughout the year. Two were about the Broadcasting Scholarships and the third a response to the Minister of Broadcasting, Steve Maharey's own media release lauding the increase in 'Kiwi TV statistics'. We pointed out that while some areas of programming may have increased, those of a spiritual nature continue to remain static and, it could be argued, have decreased. We suggested that the 70 percent plus of the population who regard themselves as having some religious affiliation in the census, deserve better in terms of spiritual programming on our public electronic media than they are currently receiving.
- 6. **Other matters.** Members raised other matters, mostly of a one-off nature, that have been discussed and dealt with. These include representation and reports from other ecumenical bodies (e.g. the CCANZ) and also discussions with quasi-government organisations such as New Zealand On Air, the Broadcasting Standards Authority, and the Advertising Standards Authority.

Future planning

Freedom of Speech. Once the research and interviews have been completed for this project, the final document will be available to all churches.

CBC Broadcasting Scholarships. We are very keen to continue to be able to offer Broadcasting Scholarships for the 2005 academic year. This will mean that the Commission will be entering the world of fundraising. But we believe that the concept is such that it will be a very worthwhile investment and one that we intend to continue offering on an annual basis.

TVNZ and RNZ. It is important that personal contact and relationship building is begun with the top management on both TVNZ and RNZ. To this end we will attempt again, to begin dialogue with the executives of our publicly owned electronic media.

Political Lobbying. Politicians have expressed on-going interest in the work of the Commission and we will be keeping them informed of our activities on a regular basis, both by written communication and by in-person visits.

*Watching Brief*². As always, we will keep a 'watching brief' on all aspects of the electronic media to ensure that the highest standards of broadcasting are met in every respect and where we believe they fall short, take remedial action through the appropriate channels.

Appreciation

The Commission could not function without the blessing and financial support of members churches.

We are pleased that the fifteen denominations who have membership on the Commission see value in the work of the Commission and we will continue to work to ensure that the churches voice continues to be heard in the wider media, as best as we are able.

Trish Moseley has been again been voted unanimously to continue as Chair for another term on this Commission. Her work is very much appreciated by the Commission members.

Methodist Publishing Board Report to Conference 2004

This has been a challenging year for the Methodist Publishing Board. The Board continues to work with the editor, Paul Titus, to provide the wider church with a quality newspaper that not only provides important information but also addresses the issues that are important to the life of the church. The Board is grateful for the leadership of Paul Titus and his vision for the paper. The Board believes Touchstone continues to be a paper committed to the Treaty partnership, ecumenical in spirit, outward looking in its focus and exploring the need for a vibrant faith in a changing world.

Since Touchstone has been free to parishes, circulation has increased from 11,500 to approximately 14,500. The long term goal is to increase circulation to 20,000 over a period of three years. Unfortunately, advertising revenues has not increased as initially expected. The primary reason for this is the difficulty of finding the right person for the advertising sales position. The Board is working with the editor on this matter. Furthermore, increasing the size of Touchstone to accommodate more advertising will entail additional costs.

The Board continues to explore possible new publishing initiatives to resource the church. However, until Touchstone is secure and reasonably self-sustaining, the Board does not have the resources to make this happen.

At the moment the Board has adequate funds to produce the paper until March 2005, thanks to the generosity of the Prince Albert College Trust and grants from the Board of Administration.

The Board is particularly grateful to new members of the Board who joined this year and bring valuable expertise. The Rev Inoke Siulangepo provides ongoing liaison with the Tongan community. Pieter Van der Berg has brought to the Board his considerable experience in publishing, design and marketing. John Wilson joined the Board in July and adds his extensive experience in accounting and financial management. The Board is particularly grateful to Leah Scales of the Administration for monitoring the finances and to Bles Sutherland for keeping the accounts. Karen Isaacs continues to take the minutes of the meetings and assists the editor in the area of distribution and circulation.

Finances

Currently Touchstone produces 11 editions annually. Based on 2004 figures the net cost to produce this publication is \$64,962. This is after a Connexional Budget Grant of \$32,000 and accounting support provided by Board of Administration.

In 2003 the charge for subscriptions was eliminated, on the premise that if the publication was free it would increase circulation therefore increasing advertising revenue. During 2004 circulation numbers have increased by 3000 copies, however advertising revenue has yet to increase proportionally. Our expectations are that while an increased dedicated effort in selling advertising will increase current levels it is a limited market and employing sales personnel within the industry is difficult.

A reliance on other church funding (ie PAC, Futures Group) in the past has allowed the paper to continue, however this is not guaranteed funding and the resources remaining from past grants will soon be absorbed within 2005.

With increases in production/distribution costs and no subscription income the budgeted loss for 2005 is \$56,675. Again this is after a Connexional Budget Grant of \$57,000 and without a further financial grant from the Prince Albert College Trust.

It seems timely that the Church review the future of Touchstone and the value the Church wants to put on this publication. A number of options are available, all with positive and negative outcomes:

- 1. Continue producing the paper as is with continued reliance on the Connexional Budget and applying for other funding ie PAC
- 2. Reduce the paper to 6 editions a year, this will reduce direct costs, but may have implications on ability to retain staffing/advertising
- 3. Change the format of the publication from a newspaper to a newsletter.

In a period of constant fragmentation and restructuring within Methodism the Board sees that the need for Touchstone has never been greater. It plays a crucial role in helping maintain our unity in diversity. We believe that without it we would have a far weaker sense of what it means to be a connexional church. For most people at congregational level it is one of the few ways in which they receive any sense of the wider church to which they belong. If we are still committed to being a connexional church can we afford to not have Touchstone, or a very similar publication?

The Board is committed to the publication of Touchstone in its present format but is concerned to find out what the mind of the Church is. If the Church wants a paper of the quality of Touchstone, in the end it will have to establish Touchstone as an ongoing financial priority.

WESLEY COLLEGE TRUST BOARD

INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK

PERSONNEL

After 35 years of service to Wesley College, Norman Johnston has retired from the position of General Secretary. Christopher Johnston has moved from the position of Bursar to fill this key position for the College. Norman will continue in a semi-retired advisory position for the College and assist with other Church Boards.

STUDENT SUPPORT

All hostel areas are now supervised by House Parents. The Boarding Manager works closely with these house parents to ensure that hostels are effectively managed and that students are provided with appropriate supervision, support and pastoral care. A new 32 bed senior boys' dormitory was opened at the beginning of the year and Denton Hall has been refurbished to sleep 70 boys. The positive effect of closer adult supervision and improved facilities has been reflected in the recent Education Review Office report.

EDUCATION REVIEW OFFICE REPORT

A positive Education Review Office report now allows the Board of Trustees and the Trust Board to prioritise future developments and to look towards the future with confidence.

"The board's appointment of a new principal has reinvigorated the school. The principal is providing decisive, focused and forward-looking leadership. As a result of prioritising improvements to the physical and emotional safety of the environment during 2003, he has raised staff morale and enhanced the quality of the learning environment for students. This report affirms recent school developments in these areas and includes recommendations for continuing to strengthen student achievement levels."

"The report notes that there are positive educational outcomes for Maori and Pacific students, and that the school provides well for foreign fee paying students in the school hostel."

DAIRY FARM

There was a change of sharemilkers at the end of the season. The new sharemilkers are Steve and Andrea Mills. They are keen to work with the school to encourage Agricultural teaching on the Farm. A new rotary milking shed will be operational in August 2004. A combination of the new milking shed and increased farm size should increase the returns to the College.

PRESIDENTIAL VISIT

Wesley College Church life in 2004 began with the Service of Beginnings held on the first Sunday of February. The College always has the honour of the President of the Methodist Church of New Zealand – Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa as our guest speaker. Rev Dr Lynne Frith moved the worshipping community with her theme of love. Her message was called "All you need is Love". She recalled her days as a local student at Pukekohe High School and told of her memories of when she was part of the Wesley College campus community. A powhiri to new students is held prior to the service involving Te Taha Maori, students and the local community.

ROLL

The College roll on 1 March 2004 was 331: 299 male and 33 female; 310 domestic students and 21 overseas students. The boarding roll was 31 female and 259 male.

EDUCATIONAL

The introduction of the National Certificate in Educational Achievement [NCEA] Level 3 to Year 13 programmes this year means that all students are now working towards having their achievement recognised through NCEA. This form of assessment is working well for Wesley College. Through NCEA a 'culture of success' is developing. Students take a keen interest in the number of credits they have achieved and this has a positive bearing on how they approach their classroom learning. This is reflected in the 2003 statistics that showed Year 11 students attaining the literacy and numeracy requirements for NCEA Level 1 above the National average; and the number of year 11 students completing NCEA Level 1 was also above the National average.

Classroom Music and Food Technology were introduced to the curriculum this year and are proving to be popular subjects. It is a challenge to maintain a wide range of subjects to meet the needs of a diverse student body.

SCHOOL CULTURE

A consequence of the Ministry of Education funded Eliminating Violence programme that all staff, both teaching and non-teaching, took part in during April 2003 has been a recognition that verbal and physical violence is destructive to good working relationships between members of the Wesley College community. Students have responded well to the removal of some of the more coercive aspects of boarding school life such as dormitory prefects and regimented organisation. The role of the School Prefect has been redefined. Prefects acting as role models, as opposed to disciplinarians, have enhanced relationships between students.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The Trust Board wishes to acknowledge the contribution made to the life of Wesley College by the employees of both the Trust Board and the Board of Trustees. Staff members are often seen going the "extra mile" working with and encouraging students in their academic work, on the sports field, in their cultural and spiritual pursuits.

The Trust Board wishes to acknowledge the retirement from the board of Audrey Matthews. Audrey has been a member of the Trust Board since 1994.

Also, the Trust Board wishes to acknowledge the contribution made to Wesley College by the Chaplain, Rev Stephen Tema. Stephen, the 1986 Head Boy of Wesley College, was initially employed as a teacher of Life and Faith / Guidance Counsellor, then as Chaplain / Guidance Counsellor, and then this year as Chaplain. From 2005 Stephen will continue to serve the College as Guidance Counsellor. Stephen's stewardship has been student-centred, focussing on sound relationships and open communication.

LOOKING FORWARD

STRATEGIC PLAN

The Wesley College Board of Trustees has recently adopted a new strategic plan. This plan focuses on the curriculum (teaching and learning), a safe physical and emotional environment, the professional development of teaching staff, and the development of buildings and equipment to support the delivery of the curriculum.

Development of a purpose-built computer suite has begun and there are plans to upgrade and refurnish a number of classrooms.

THE WESLEY FOUNDATION

A Charitable Trust known as the Wesley Foundation is about to be registered. This Trust will actively seek funding to support the work of Wesley College, particularly to build a capital base from which the Board's student beneficiary work is able to be enhanced.

APPOINTMENT OF CHAPLAIN

The College looks forward to the appointment of a full time Chaplain for 2005. The Board welcomes the appointment of Sylvia 'Akau'ola Tongotongo as Chaplain of Wesley College.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Financial statements presented here are for the entity Epworth Bookshop Trust which is a charitable trust incorporated under the Charitable Trust Act 1957.

Epworth Bookshop Trust is a reporting entity under the Financial Reporting Act 1993. These Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Act 1993.

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on an historical cost basis have been used, with the exception of certain items for which specific accounting policies have been identified.

(a) **Changes in Accounting Policies**

Epworth Bookshop Trust has sold the business operation of the Trust. The settlement date for the sale was 1 August 2003. Business operations ceased as at this date.

(b) Differential Reporting

Epworth Bookshop Trust is a qualifying entity in that it qualifies for Differential Reporting as it is not publicly accountable and there is no separation between the owners and the governing body.

All Differential Reporting exemptions have been applied with the exception of:

FRS-19 Accounting for Goods and Services Tax

(c) Fixed Assets & Depreciation

The entity has the following classes of fixed assets;

All fixed assets are recorded at net realisable value.

(d) Goods & Services Tax

The Statement of Financial Performance and Statement of Cashflows (where included) have been prepared so that all components are stated exclusive of GST. All items in the Statement of Financial Position are stated net of GST, with the exception of account receivables and payables.

(e) Income Tax

No provision for Income Tax has been made as there is no current or deferred tax payable.

(f) Inventories

Inventories are recorded at net realisable value.

(g) Leased Assets

Operating Leases

Operating leases are those which all the risks and benefits are substantially retained by the lessor. Lease payments are expensed in the periods the amounts are payable.

(h) Receivables

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value. Bad debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.

- whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Bookshop's circumstances and are consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We have conducted the audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in New Zealand except our work limited as explained below. We planned and performed the audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial report is free from material misstatements, whether caused by fraud or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial report.

Other than in our capacity as auditor, we have no relationship with or interests in the Bookshop.

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CHURCHES AGENCY ON SOCIAL ISSUES

 Churches Agency on Social Issues

The Churches Agency on Social Issues Report to Methodist Church July 2004

SECTION A: INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK.

1. CASI

The Churches' Agency on Social Issues is an inter-church organisation. It works in the area of social justice and related issues that rise within New Zealand. The Agency consists of up to 16 members appointed by the national bodies of the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, the Associated Churches of Christ, and the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers). The agency employs a part-time research and liaison officer.

The Agency meets monthly in Wellington. The co-convenors from each of the four churches meet as an Executive in advance of those meetings, and the chair is taken by each convenor in turn for a six month term. The current Methodist representatives on the Agency are David Beeston (Convenor), Fletcher Thomas, Ken Rae, Rosalie Sugrue.

2. Resourcing Faith Communities

- 2.1. Julia Stuart, the Agency's part-time Research and Liaison Officer, continues to network effectively with groups around the country, and attends church meetings and seminars wherever opportunity arises. *Broadsheet* is produced every two months and gets positive feedback. It is now available as a PDF file from the website or is posted direct to parishes and individuals.
- 2.2. The Agency corresponds monthly with about 60 groups, some of which focus on only one social issue (e.g. housing) and others which work on a broader range, including those at a local government level. These groups feed submissions in to CASI, try out new resources, and may respond directly to national initiatives (such as the consultation documents on Work-Life Balance and the Right to Education) which CASI has brought to their attention. The Agency continues to make submissions, to produce resources, and to advise church leaders about current topical social issues
- 2.3. Individual parishes and social issues groups regularly contact the CASI office seeking information about issues, and material to support local submissions. For example, a new ecumenical group in Palmerston North made submissions on their City plan; a North Shore Auckland group made submissions on poker machine site policy; a Central Otago parish sought information to back their objection to casino efforts to reduce social benefit contributions (they succeeded); and a group in Nelson made representations on advertising of commercial sexual services in the city.
- 2.4. The Agency has developed a good working relationship with the Human Rights Commission, particularly on its community Treaty education initiative. Some CASI members have trained to become facilitators for this constructive way of dealing with a contentious topic, which CASI believes will enable positive, locally-relevant outcomes. A short version was used during a group session at the 2003 Methodist Conference and response was very positive. We have been in consultation with Maori church partners about matters of mutual concern, and have given financial support to the Ecumenical Coalition for Justice in its development of a Treaty resource.
- 2.5. In 2003 the Agency redesigned its website (<u>www.casi.org.nz</u>) to focus on topical and relevant issues. The amount of use increased significantly, and in March/April this year the newly-placed Seabed and Foreshore page was the most accessed topic, with a 20% increase in traffic. Daily traffic trebled when we placed a new section on civil unions. News and new sections are placed regularly, sometimes daily. All the submissions and papers mentioned in this Report are available on the Agency's website; earlier material is also accessible.
- 2.6. The Agency maintains a small and carefully-selected library on social issues. This is increasingly used by people working on research, tertiary-level essays and social issues papers, as well as by church members. Members of partner churches are welcome to borrow books and other publications. A copy of the library catalogue can be emailed to inquirers.
- 2.7. CASI continues to produce resources to encourage in-depth study of social issues. In the last year the Agency has published resources on Climate Change, Euthanasia, Immigration and Civil Unions. It has also commissioned the Ecumenical Coalition for Justice to produce material for us about race and Treaty issues, including the Foreshore and Seabed issue. A 12-part Social Issues Resource Kit for parishes and groups, with material ranging from worship resources, setting up a discussion group, organising for advocacy, to research and media liaison, will be available at the Conference.

- 2.8. Work has begun on producing material for resources to do with on the repeal of section 59 of the Crimes Act. This section deals with corporal punishment of children. This work has been delayed as the Government has not introduced expected legislation. CASI has in mind to develop resources for parents, a discussion document and a submission as well as links from the web site.
- 2.9. The Agency continues to play a leading role in the Capital City Forum, alongside the Catholic and Anglican social justice agencies. Recently CASI undertook organisation of a Forum on ethical investment, reaching a wide range of church and community groups in Wellington. When resources permit, we are happy to discuss support of similar events in other centres.

3. Bioethical Issues

- 3.1. The Interchurch Bioethics Council (ICBC) relates to the Methodist Conference through the Churches' Agency on Social Issues. Members are drawn from the Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches.
- 3.2. It has an educational role providing opportunities for consultation and for dialogue with church members and the community generally. It also develops submissions and makes comments to the Government-appointed NZ Bioethics Council and other relevant bodies. The Chairperson continues to be Dr Audrey Jarvis of Palmerston North. Julia Stuart attends ICBC meetings and maintains an effective liaison between ICBC and CASI.
- 3.3. The ICBC produced a resource on the lifting of the Moratorium on Genetic Modification in 2003, prior to the lifting of the GM Moratorium. In 2004 produced dialogue material on *Making Good Decisions in Biotechnology*, and a resource on Euthanasia in response to the heightened interest in this topic. CASI assisted with promotion, publishing and distribution of these resources.

4. Statements and Representations

- 4.1. Making submissions and representations continues to be an important part of CASI's work. The opportunities presenting themselves and the topics of interest to the Churches are too numerous for all to be addressed within the resources available, so CASI has adopted the following guidelines.
 - □ Do we have anything important and distinctive to say from a Christian perspective?
 - □ Do we need to speak out, or will other Christians do so in ways that we cannot?
 - □ What have we said in the past on the particular subject, and do we need to continue to speak out?
 - □ Do we have the time and resources necessary to prepare a considered and helpful contribution to debate on the issue?

Over the last two years CASI has made submissions on a variety of subjects, including Shop Trading Hours, pay equity, 'clean slate' bills, review of the Public Health Act and gambling, liquor advertising, oaths and declarations and the legal status of parents. As at the time of writing, the Agency has prepared a submission on the Foreshore and Seabed legislation, and intends making submissions on the Civil Unions and Relationships Status Bills

4.2. CASI staff support the Church Leaders in their regular discussions with Government and with political parties. The Methodist Church nominated a representative, the Rev Suiva'aia Teo of Petone, to the on-going Church Leaders Housing Forum (which meets quarterly).

5. Finance, Staffing and Membership.

- 5.1. The bulk of the Agency's financing comes from grants from the member Churches. In 2003/04, the Associated Churches of Christ contributed \$500, the Religious Society of Friends \$2,000, the Methodist Church \$11,000, and the Presbyterian Church \$35,000.
- 5.2. About two thirds of the Agency's income is used to employ its part-time Research and Liaison Officer, and about half of the rest on producing publications.
- 5.3. Currently only four of the 6 positions available for Methodist members of CASI are occupied. It is of concern that we have not been able to maintain a full complement of members on the Agency, as this limits CASI's

capacity to function.

SECTION B: STRATEGIC PLAN.

CASI believes its strategic direction in the last few years represents the best use of its resources. The Strategic Plan remains essentially the same as noted in last year's report.

Recognising that the agency members are not themselves experts in every area of the agency's work, CASI will continue to involve and sponsor other church groups in its activities. This allows CASI to deal with a wider range of issues than is otherwise possible. CASI will continue to encourage and resource people in local congregations who engage with social issues.

The Agency will continue to speak in its own right. CASI's approach will be to comment when it feels it has a point or perspective on an issue that otherwise might not be heard. It does this mainly through submissions to government and by issuing press statements.

CASI will work with other groups including the ICBC, the Human Rights Commission, and the social justice organisations affiliated to other churches where appropriate.

This year has seen a large increase in the number of hits on the reworked CASI website. CASI aims to make available a balanced range of views on topical issues via this site. The Broadsheet publication has been well received in the last year. Both these media will continue be a high priority for the Agency.

Combating Poverty.

In its 2004 Budget, the current Government moved to improve support to poorer families in New Zealand. However, the slow rate at which these changes will take effect inevitably means some families, and particularly children, will continue to suffer an unacceptable level of poverty. Accordingly it is recommended that:

This Conference expresses to the Prime Minister its support for the direction of the 2004 Budget towards assisting poorer families and the children of those families, and urges the Government to consider making this assistance available more quickly.

Rights of Children.

Poor parenting skills underlie much suffering of children in New Zealand. Both poverty and increased mobility mean that traditional family networks no longer adequately support new parents, and significant numbers are struggling to safely nurture young children. The 'SKIP' programme introduced in May is a start but does not appear to deal with critical issues such as child discipline, and may not reach those most in need of guidance. This leads us to recommend that:

This Conference urges the Government to develop resources to support the education of those new parents who are most likely to lack necessary skills for keeping their children safe.

Foreshore and Seabed.

The Foreshore and Seabed issue has been particularly painful for relationships between Maori and other New Zealanders. Progress has not been helped by either political fear-mongering or poorly researched journalism. CASI recognises the Government has made an honest and sincere attempt in the bill before the House to resolve a difficult and complex issue. However the legislation has proved divisive and a real threat to race relations in Aotearoa New Zealand.

CASI believes the prime task at this time is to rebuild trust between the Treaty partners so that they can discuss the issue in an atmosphere of mutual respect for rights, and with due regard for our joint past history. Accordingly it is recommended that:

This Conference urges the Government (a) not to proceed with the Foreshore and Seabed legislation at the present time, but to engage in further discussion and consultation; and (b) to ensure any legislation is the minimum required to deal with immediate and particular issues, including those of inalienability and public access.

Civil Union.

If passed the Civil Union Bill would provide legal recognition for a Civil Union and this would include recognition of same-sex relationships. In the context of our secular New Zealand society, it is clear that there are both heterosexual and homosexual couples who deeply desire legal recognition of their relationship, but have strong reasons to reject marriage, whether by a civil or a religious ceremony.

CASI is aware that within each of its member churches there is honest division on whether committed homosexual relationships are compatible with Christian morality, and accepts that some members and congregations will make submissions accordingly. CASI however sees this matter as an issue of justice because at this time one section of the community is denied next-of-kin rights which CASI believes should be available to all couples in a committed relationship. Therefore CASI recommends that:

This Conference urges MPs to pass the Civil Union Bill into law.

TRIBUTES TO DECEASED PRESBYTERS, MINITA-A-IWI, DEACONS & LAYPEOPLE

NOEL BILLINGHURST 15 September 1928 - 1 July 2004

Noel was born on the 15 September 1928, and was raised at the Apiti Mission Station receiving schooling at Rangiwahia until his fourth form. After attending Fielding District High School for two years, he left to study English, History, Psychology, Geography and Economics at Auckland University. In his later teens he felt a call to ministry, initially in missionary work. The focus of ministry changed while at university and on returning to the farm in 1950 he candidated for the Methodist Church under the guidance of Home Missionary Frank Fitzsimons.

Following three years at Trinity College, his first appointment was to Lincoln Road, Riccarton in 1954, with Sockburn the next year. It was in these probation years that he met Daphne Cock of St Johns church, Bryndwr, at a Bible Class picnic, and they married during that appointment. Throughout his ministry, Daphne was involved in church work in Bible Class, Girl's Brigade, District Arrangements, Women's Guild, Missionary Auxiliary, and Conference Lay Rep. (Three other minister's wives came from the same Bible class - Margaret Pitcher married Bruce Gordan, Margaret Whitfield married Alan Newton and Barbara Rogers married Derrick Nichols).

He was ordained at Pitt Street Methodist Church at the 1956 Auckland Conference while at Nelson South. Noel was ecumenical in spirit from early in his ministry and sought fellowship with Christians of other denominations throughout his ministry. He was the first ordained minister to Te Puke in 1957, following a number of Home Missioners. With their first children, Christine and Graham Noel and Daphne grew close to other 'young marrieds' and Bible class people and earned a reputation for 'tying the knot'. He was also involved in early negotiations for the building of the new church, returning to attend the laying of the foundation stone in 1963 and the opening a year later.

Ruth and Kelvin were born during the Paraparaumu appointment, (1961-1965). The next stationing was to Greendale, Darfield (1966-1970), and then Westown, New Plymouth (1971-1973). In each parish, his careful and understanding pastoral work and thought-provoking preaching endeared him to congregations. His longest appointment was to Waitara (1976-1983). For nineteen of his thirteen years in Taranaki, he was District Secretary and his meticulous attention to business greatly assisted the Chairmen with whom he worked. During his final appointment to Wairoa (1984-1989), Noel had major heart surgery, and retired from there to their house in Waitara.

Noel was involved with the Charismatic Movement, the Aldersgate Fellowship, and a supporter of the Wesley Historical Society with a life-long interest in New Zealand church history. He was warm-hearted, steady, faithful and thorough in his ministry, and open to people of all theological persuasions. Humility and dedication characterised his ministry which was centred on Christ and the people he served. He died at home in the care of his family, fifty years from his first meeting Daphne, after a short illness.

GORDON CORNWELL 3 September 1922 - 17 May 2004

It is a great honour to be asked to prepare this tribute in celebration of the life of Gordon Albert Reid Cornwell.. This is a celebration, a thanksgiving for a man who lived life passionately and to the full; savouring the experiences that came his way, sometimes fighting against great odds and never giving up. A devoted Christian, a great servant of the Methodist Church, son, brother, lover, husband, father, grandfather and friend.

You were Gordon was a great story teller, with all the details that made stories live, and it is a challenge for me to do your story justice,

My connection with Gordon and Irene Cornwell goes back to the 1940's to Masterton and my boyhood during the 2nd World war, for my parents were close friends of Irene's parents the Shoosmiths and I heard about Gordon Cornwell, a soldier engineer, who was helping to build military camps in the Wairarapa in 1940's. Chaplain, Harry Kings took Gordon around to the Shoesmith house where he met Irene and her brothers and sister who befriend a home sick soldier.

Because Gordon was not old enough for the army to send him overseas, he enrolled in the Navy, and the Navy sent him to fight in Europe. Irene came up to Auckland, with her mother to see him off, and Gordon knew then that she was the one.

In England he was posted as Engineer on a motor torpedo boat operating in the English Channel. It was a new boat, on its first voyage, with engineer Gordon in charge of the twin Rolls Royce engines, when an enemy bomb hit the bridge, wiped out the officers, and sunk the boat. Gordon found himself in the sea with 16 of the 26 man crew, the only officer alive and he was wounded. It

is typical of Gordon that he kept in touch with those survivors down the years, until he was the last one left.

After he recovered from his wounds, the Navy decided his war was over and prepared to send him back to New Zealand. But Cornwell spoke up. "I thought there was a shortage of engineers" he said, and he volunteered for more service. He was posted to the Fleet Air Arm and sent to Quorm, to the University there for a two year degree course in aeronautical engineering. He learnt to fly, he was a natural and on the third day of his training was given his wings.

When he graduated as Officer Engineer he was posted to a special unit as a Test Pilot. The damaged planes, mostly Spitfires were sent to the engineering works near by to be repaired, reconditioned, and if operational returned to the Royal Air Force. Some one had to fly them, to test them, to see if they were safe to fly, and Gordon Cornwall did that dangerous task, for two years. In that time he saw 28 of his fellow officers and friends killed in plane crashes. He himself survived 16 crashes, and years after he still had nightmares dreaming that his parachute was caught around the tail of the plane and he had to get free before it crashed into the sea.

Irene was finished nursing training in Masterton when Gordon came out of the Navy in 1946 a 24 year old veteran, and he popped the question. And she said --"Yes!" Gordon and Irene have had a life long love affair, never going to sleep with out a kiss and a "God bless."

Gordon had long felt the call to the mission field and entered Trinity Theological College to train for the Ministry. The Methodist Church also gave them permission to marry and the deed was done by a good man. Yes! George Goodman in the Masterton Methodist Church 56 years ago.

There followed a 2nd year of study at Trinity College for Gordon and the newly weds lived in a flat in Robbins Corner, Onehunga, while Irene was a Plunket nurse. Then the appointment to the Solomon Islands. Rev A H Scriven stationed them at Buka in Bougainville, and for 15 years they served their Lord and Master there together

at Buka. The Cornwell Team. Irene; Wife and mother but also Nurse, teacher, and leader. Gordon; Husband, father, Pastor, teacher, preacher, builder, boat builder, and engineer in charge of the Methodist Mission Fleet. It was a time of rebuilding both the mission work and the mission stations following the war with the Japanese. It was busy, exhausting and exhilarating days. Gordon survived several bad storms at sea, with the boat alive with the flames of St Elmo's fire. He was a good sailor, cool, calm and level headed and he always returned safely.

Ruth was born at Bougainville, and the twins Graeme and Neil, and Pauline. So the four kids they are really all Solomon Islanders, or Bougainvillians, or is it Bukamanians?

The link with the Solomons is underlined by the request in the death notice in the NZ Herald. "Cut flowers preferred and donations to the Methodist Mission for Bougainville."

In 1963 the Cornwell family returned to New Zealand and Gordon served as Methodist Minister in Circuits at Okato in Taranaki. Kaikohe in Northland, and at Dominion Rd, Auckland. Gordon was a faithful Pastor, a diligent visitor and a practical parson.

When Gordon was Minister at Dominion Rd in 1975, he had serious heart trouble and if affected his voice, Gordon got his voice back, following his second heart operation, but Irene says sometimes she remembers those quiet days!! Gordon superannuated from the Methodist Ministry in 1977 on the grounds of ill health, and has been a loved and respected member of this Church for the past 27 years.

When his health improved he took up work as technical manager at the Auckland University School of Architecture under Professor Harold Marshall. It was exciting, stimulating and pioneering work in acoustics where his engineering and practical skills were given full rein. (Harold he loved working with you, and said that that

Acoustics Laboratory is in some way his memorial.)

In latter years Gordon has been busy with odd preaching, (make that occasional preaching), pastoral concerns, (how he loved people and there was always folk to help), woodworking projects, gardening,(he was a great gardener), stamps (he had great stamp collection, and raised many thousands of dollars from used stamps for the Women's Fellowship with that Friday group). And then there was - bowls. Now this Bowls, is it a sport or an addiction. The Cornwells have spent many happy hours at Rocky Nook in the comradeship of the bowling fraternity, and it is great to see so many paying their respects to him today.

For 15 years this couple lived at Rangeview Rd. There followed the move to 4/40 Richardson Rd, which was Gordon's final home.

I would like to pay a tribute to the courage, the fortitude and the faith of Gordon Cornwell in the face of much pain and weakness. Over the last 30 years he has suffered much but always cheerful and hopefully, with Christian grace and dignity. He has cheated death on many occasions, during the war, in the Islands, and in hospital.

There have been hard days, tough days, illness, bereavement, disappointment, loss, financial hardship, but he has always soldiered, no he sailored on. His faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and his desire to serve Him through others has been the driving force of his life. Having put his hand to the plough long since, he has never turned back.

CAMPBELL (CAM) LUCAS 1912 – 23 August 2004

Campbell Lucas was born in Dannevirke in 1912 of farming parents. Following four years at Eketahuna High School he engaged in dairy farming in very isolated areas during the stringent depression years. After moving to Mangamaire in the Pahiatua Parish Campbell developed the local Sunday School for which he is still remembered. The 1936 Conference accepted him for theological Training in Trinity College where, in his final year, he served as Senior Student.

Campbell spent his four year probationary period in the Whakatane and Huntly Parishes, then, after ordination, he served in the Brooklyn(Wellington), Opunake, Levin and Rangiora Parishes for five years each and in Matamata and Putaruru for seven years each.

During his Brooklyn ministry Cambell married Myra Moore who shared with him faithfully a very caring ministry. Myra's gifts and skills, especially in drama, added considerably to their work in each Parish. After 38 years of active ministry Campbell and Myra retired to Matamata.

Campbell's theological outlook was consistently evangelistic and ecumenical and his ministry essentially a pastoral and teaching one. While in Brooklyn he formed a close association with The Boys' Brigade. This he maintained throughout his ministry eventually leading to his election to the National Executive.

Secretary of District Youth Councils and Camp Leader at Easter Camps gave Campbell an opportunity to work with young people to whom he was always a good friend. He also served on the Spiritual Advance Committee and as Associate Editor of ' The Methodist Times '.

Campbell had a very warm and friendly disposition and fine relationship skills which won him the esteem and affection both of his ministerial brethren and of the lay folk in the Parishes in which he served. In each Parish his strong ecumenical convictions found expression in increased understanding and co-operation with other denominations culminating, in Putaruru, in the formation of the Anglican-Methodist Co-operating Parish.

A very good sportsman in his younger years, Campbell excelled at football, cricket and tennis and then, in later years, at lawn bowls. In his years farming in isolated areas he developed a great love for the environment, for the bush and the bird life. He records that this awakened in him a real appreciation of God's creation which remained with him for the rest of his life.

We express to Myra and to her children, Beverly, Jocelyn, David and Graeme, our loving sympathy and support in the death of Campbell and thank them for the shared contribution which they made to his ministry.

DAVINIA JUNE TAYLOR 9 August 1927 – 29 July 2004

Davinia was born in Gisborne, into a family steeped in music and drama. She grew up in Tauranga, going to her Father's Seventh Day Adventist church on Saturdays and her Mother's Methodist church on Sundays. Her interest in missions was sparked early in her teens. While she was doing her nursing and maternity training, Davinia kept in touch with the Methodist Overseas Mission Board. In April 1950 she traveled to Buka (Papua New Guinea), and spent the next 9 months learning the language and working as sole charge nurse, nursing teacher, assisting with building concrete tanks and assisting with music in worship. Then she was moved to Munda, Western Solomons, to Helena Goldie Hospital – to learn a new language and culture. She reveled in the opportunity to travel by canoe, doing village clinics, and teaching health care to the mothers.

She did two 3-year terms, came home to marry Phil and then returned for a further 3 year term. Over the next few years 3 children arrived, and as well as mothering the children, Davinia helped as needed with the nursing, village clinics, ran the station store, wrung the necks of chickens, was midwife to some of the cows, contributed to worship services with song and prayer.

In 1966 Phil & Davinia returned to NZ, to Parishes at Onehunga, Papakura and Northcote. In each Parish to which Phil was appointed, Davinia worked as his partner in ministry. Her love of music was a welcome contribution to worship. There was always a place at the table for visitors and parishioners. She visited the sick, the lonely, and new folk to the Parish, kept abreast with mission news, organized Parish dinners, enjoyed Bible Studies. She was active in the Womens Fellowship and served as District President in Franklin and Waitemata Districts.

Although Phil and Davinia left the overseas mission field in 1966, they never stopped working for the Solomon Islands. They have continued to send 60-70 boxes of goods at a time, collected up from all over NZ. Davinia has spent many hours sorting and washing and packing. She was a great advocate for the people of the Solomons and kept the profile of Helena Goldie Hospital visible to all the groups she was involved in. She has had a great ministry of pastoral care and support in the parishes - a gracious presence, a comforter and encourager, a devoted woman of prayer.

The church extends deep sympathy to Phil and the family. We give thanks to God for Davinia's life and ministry.

LILYAN TE AO MARAMA VAOGA Passed away 14 July 2004

Lilyan Te Ao Marama Vaoga passed away on 14 July 2004 following a long illness.

Lilyan was the daughter of Waata and Taari Moka. They lived in Omanaia in the Hokianga – a faithful Methodist community.

Children were a valued part of Lilyan's life. She held Sunday School on a monthly basis at her home in Kelston, West Auckland for tamariki. She was also a strong advocate for Te Reo Maori working as a full time Kaiwhakahaere at her local Te Kohanga Reo.

Lilyan was received as a Minita-a-Iwi in 2001, a ministry that she took seriously. Although she did not drive, Lilyan travelled extensively attending many hui on behalf of Te Taha Maori and Tamaki Rohe. She engaged in 'lively' discussions sharing her thoughts and ideas on respective issues. Such hui included:

- Te Taha Maori representative on Council of Conference
- Te Taha Maori representative to Hui Toopu
- Rohe representative to Hui Poari
- Minita-a-Iwi training wananga
- Rohe wananga and karakia

Lilyan was laid to rest at Waikumete Cemetery. We give thanks for her life and ministry among us. To Samuel and their whanau we offer our sympathy and love.

ALLEN HARRY HALL O.A.M., M.A., DipTchg., PhD, DipTheol., ATCL Passed away 24 July 2004

The death of Allen Hall on 24 July 2004, brought to an end a unique and quite remarkable life.

Allen trained as a teacher in Dunedin and taught for five years. He also learned pipe organ, gaining teaching proficiency with the Associate Teachers College of London. Military training equipped him as an officer in Infantry, Tanks and Signals. He spent over three years in war service, one year being in New Caledonia where Chaplain Harry Voyce challenged him to act on his missionary call (first heard at the age of twelve.)

Accepted as a candidate for the ministry, he entered Trinity Methodist Theological College in 1945. In 1947 he was released early from the College to recommence the District Training Institution of the Solomon Islands Methodist District. There he held the post of Principal until the end of 1961 when he returned to New Zealand in order to become a full time Bible translator.

After completing the translation of the Old Testament into the Roviana language, he took up post graduate research with the University of Queensland, Australia. He accepted a fellowship and research scholarship to reduce a spoken Aboriginal language to written form, and later created a dictionary and bilingual programme in the Thaayoore language for a people group of 350 Aboriginals at Edward River, Cape York. He completed his PhD studies in Linguistics in 1972. The Governor General of Queensland presented Dr Hall with the Order of Australia Medal in honour and recognition of service, particularly to the Indigene of Australia.

Throughout his ministry, Allen was strongly supported and richly blessed by his wife, Joyce (nee Rushton). Their home was always a centre of Christian worship, fellowship and service. They have six children and twenty-one grandchildren. Amongst the family are four ordained ministers and two missionary couples, all adult offspring actively involved in Christian ministry.

We give thanks to God for this man of many talents and rich achievements, especially for his gift to people of God's Word in their own language.

JOHN BARRY CURRIE 25 March 1939 to 15 October 2004

John's whole life was full to the brim with vitality and interest, a workaholic many would say, who learnt the butcher's trade in his father's shop while still at primary school. After College he worked in Hawke's Bay. He felt called to the ministry and entered Trinity College in 1959, graduating with a Dip Theol 1961. Then appointed to a Probationer's single post at Avalon in Lower Hutt for 3 years. He married Glenys in 1963; she also came from Hastings where her father ran a carrying firm and her whole family was involved in church life.

After ordination he went, in Feb 1965, to the Islington Templeton circuit Christchurch, and after 4 years ran also the adjacent Springston circuit when Jock Hosking moved. While there John completed his B A in Psychology commenced at Auckland. He actually completed the papers for his MA but never took the degree. Visited the Templeton hospital and was involved in the IHC. Was a keen Rugby player, and a Borough Councillor at Hornby, its youngest councillor ever; in addition to the duties of a double circuit.

In 1973 a year off as farm manager for a friend outback in Tiraumea. A wonderful spot for 2 growing children. April 1974 he moved to a new combined Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist Parish in Tamatea, a new housing development out of Napier. Many young couples, a lot very willing to take and capable of leadership, and John, who had always believed that all were ministers suggested that he would join them ,get a job, take no stipend but still live in the church house and take funerals as well as some services. The congregation all agreed but all 3 parent churches rejected the idea. John felt he must live by his principles so resigned. Regrettably a man before his time. It was 20 months before a replacement came to the flourishing congregation!

1975 to 1977 Assistant Personel manager J Watties Canneries.

1977 to 1979 Personel Manager at Watties. At same time family continued to run the cattery present on site when they bought their house. Glen and John also raised wonderful Tollemache Gardens tomatoes in the commercial glasshouse, with shop on site. John also delivered bread to the markets in the early morning hours. 1980 to 1984 Industrial Relations Manager at Whakatu Freezing Works.—Always enterprising John also grew cab sauvignon grapes for Vidals.

1984 to 1986 Appointed to the same position at new Oringi Freezing works at out of Dannevirke, and while there John helped in Dannevirke church.

In 1984 he and Glen bought a dream property alongside Tukituki river with a log house . Having finished the log house and worked up the river flats over 3 years, cruelly devastating floods with Cyclone Bola plus interest rates soaring rapidly to 32% forced sale to the combined churches and the property has become the Camp David Christian Adventure Centre. In 1987 after sale employed as Liaison Officer, State Services Commission Social Impact Unit, dealing with families out of work as a result of the changes in Government policies under Roger Douglas.

1987 to 1990 John was a self employed Training Provider for those out of work, a Job Search Project.

June 1991 to June 1997 He was appointed CEO of the Inter church Trade and Industry Mission (ITIM), in the lower North Island, encouraging many more firms to employ Industrial Chaplains—the church in the workplace.

In June 1997 He was appointed supply parish minister in the Hutt Uniting Parish. Now also his love of the land and animals saw them buy a week end (Sunday pm + Monday) farm "Glen Crieff" at Bideford, out of Masterton.

In Feb 1999 he accepted the position of minister at St Luke's Union Parish Masterton, or Ekalasia a Luka, a congregation where the Samoan Fellowship are about 25% of the members. Here, with the help of Rev James Veitch, he has led the exploration of a theology based on what was, for John, a rediscovery of the Gospels set in their first and second century cultural and historic contexts. The explorations group attracted people from throughout the Wairarapa and from a diversity of churchand non church backgrounds. His leadership of the church service also developed during this period as did the way communion was celebrated.

He was great with the Samoan children and with the Solway College pupils who were attending and participating more but wanted to find a way to get through to the 15 to 45 age group who were ignoring the church. In spite of involvement in Rotary and always seeking to project the relevance of the church in community he never found a way forward in speaking to the needs of this age group.

John was always inclusive. He understood the healing love and acceptance of Jesus to be the basis for community, could not understand the vote of Assembly on gay people and those living in relationships and was much more supportive of the Methodist solution. He as ever continued to regard all lay people as equal with the presbyter in all respects. He was impatient with bureaucracy, did not suffer fools gladly, and had strong commitments to justice and

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fairness for all. His sense of humour carried him through many a crisis and Glen's influence in family life gave him the stability he valued.

From 1992 until he died John was a member of the Wellington Medical Ethics Committee, and Chairman since 2002. In 1995 he was appointed to the Complaints Assessment Committee of the Medical Council ,and became its convenor. His huge contribution to medical research and the assessing of complaints against doctors was acknowledged at his funeral.

He died suddenly on 15 October 2004 whilst in Hastings with Glen to attend the 25th anniversary celebrations of the Girls and Boys High Schools.

The church gives thanks for John's life and for his many sided contribution to the church and to the wider community and extends its sympathy to Glen and her family at his passing.

Throughout all the ups and downs he remained his own man. A true servant of his God as he understood God the Father and Mother, with a huge breadth of background experience and an impish sense of humour, a workaholic and a wonderful friend.

IAN DESMOND GRANT 17 February 1921 - 14 October 2004

Ian was born in Wellsford, the youngest of three children of Frank and Florence (Dot) Grant. The others were Chris the oldest and Daphne. As Frank was teacher the family lived at various places during Ian's childhood and adolescence (a fore taste of itinerancy to come!).

Ian was 18 and living with the family in Opotiki when World War II came in 1939. Like many of his age group he enlisted for the war effort and was accepted into the air force for pilot training at one of the Commonwealth training schools in Canada. As a result of this he became a trainer and spent most of the war in Canada training pilots for action. Near the end of the war Ian spent some time in England where he met up with another Opotiki resident and friend, Roy Forbes, who became his brother-in-law not long after their return to New Zealand at the conclusion of the war.

Ian worked at the Farmers in Opotiki immediately after the war and it was at this time that two people began to have a profound effect on the direction that his life was to take. The first was Les Clements, the Methodist minister who struck a chord with Ian which was to ultimately result in his calling to ordained ministry in the Methodist Church. The other was Huia, the local district nurse, who he met at church and married in 1947.

For a while Ian farmed at Opotiki having taken advantage of the government scheme to rehabilitate ex-servicemen by financing them into farms at the end of the war. His first son Roy was born during this period in 1948. However the calling of the church was too strong and in 1950 he relinquished his farm to begin his ministry training. Philippa was born the same year. His probation was served in Inglewood in 1952 and 1953. He was then posted to Grey Lynn where he stayed for five years (1954-1958). The family was completed in 1954 with the arrival of John.

Ian became ordained as a fully accredited presbyter for the Methodist Church in 1957. There followed a succession of appointments to churches throughout New Zealand, mainly for periods of 6 years at a time, at Stoke (Nelson), Pukekohe, Birkenhead (Auckland) and finally Matamata. It was at Matamata where he was to 'retire', if one ever does from ministry. This retirement brought Ian and Huia to Mount Maunganui and after a few years to their home and continuing life in the church at Papamoa.

Ian enjoyed playing sport in his younger days and experienced some success through to provincial level in cricket, a gift passed on to his sons and their sons. He was also passionate about rugby. A love of the garden to which he gave much tender loving care enabled many to receive its fruits - vegetables and flowers. His family and their families were very special to him, as was his relationship with Huia his partner in marriage and in ministry.

There are many words that apply to Ian - gracious, wise, a scholar, a peacemaker, methodical, welcoming, caring, responsible, hardworking, appreciative, loyal, trustworthy; his preaching was sincere and heartfelt, and he always believed there was still more to discover about his God. He was a true man of God who lived his faith daily and exercised his ministry in an unassuming and loving manner.

- It was with courage that Ian ran the race,
- it was with spirit that he finished the course,
- it was with integrity he kept the faith.

The thoughts and prayers of the church are with Huia and Ian's family as the grieve the loss of Ian, and as a church we say thank you for sharing Ian with us and thank you for his ministry among us.

FRANCIS (FRANK) PARKER 28 June 1914 – 13 October 2004

Francis (Frank) Harry Parker was born on 28th June 1914, ironically for this committed pacifist, the year the so called 'great war' (WW1) broke out.

He was the only surviving child of Nancy (nee Posswillow) & Fred Parker – sadly his sister died as a very young baby.

Unlike many NZ artists/artisans, Fred was able to make a living as a painter, blacksmith, silversmith and carver. An accomplished flautist and singer, he had the distinction of studying singing in Melbourne.

Frank's parents were committed Christian people active in the Congregationalist Church, where Nancy was a Bible Class leader and their home was one where the sick, lonely and troubled always were made welcome and offered generous hospitality.

Frank readily attributed his Christian commitment to the influence of his parents - his faith to the influence of his mother and his evangelistic zeal to the example of his father.

Frank learnt a "practical Christianity" and showed the same practical compassion for people throughout his life.

After formal schooling he hoped to train as a teacher, but it was the 'Great Depression' and the training colleges were closed. Instead he worked for ten years in hospital administration at Cook Hospital Gisborne. During this time he was a bible class leader and trained as a lay preacher.

As a committed pacifist, he spent the war years serving in the Medical Corp.

It was at church that he met Vivienne Bates, a mantle buyer who'd recently moved from Wanganui to Gisborne. He was mesmerised by her golden hair. Two days after their wedding in 1941 he was off to military camp and Vivienne lived with her in-laws whilst Frank was overseas serving with the Medical Corp. in Fiji, where he was in charge of records.

Whilst home on leave in 1942 he was pressed by Selwyn Dawson & George Laurenson to offer for full-time Christian ministry. He gave home mission service firstly in Masterton and then in Marton, where Helen was born. Accepted as a candidate in 1944 he was appointed to Kingsland as a Student Pastor and trained as an extra-mural theological student at Trinity College from 1945 -1947. Here it was that John was born.

Ordained in 1949 Frank then served in parishes at Papakura (1949-52) where Mike was born; Fielding (1952-57); Upper Hutt (1957-64) and Morrinsville (1964-1969) before moving into hospital chaplaincy ministry at Auckland Hospital where he served for ten years from 1969. It was there that he, and Canon Hancock pioneered lay chaplaincy and developed the first team chaplaincy in a NZ hospital with more than lay 50 chaplains, including myself.

He served initially as Methodist chaplain before moving into an ecumenical appointment at both Auckland and Mater hospitals.

During this time Vivienne worked at Epworth Bookroom in the Auckland Central Mission Building in Queen Street. I remember her courteous service when I was a theological student at Trinity / St. John's in the late 1970's.

Frank retired from ministry in 1979 and he and Vivienne lived briefly in Palmerston North before settling in Te Awamutu where they could be near their three families who were now all living in the Waikato.

They have been associated with this church and community since the early 1980's, living at Racecourse Road until Frank's deteriorating health meant he went to live at Tara Hill for six years before the requirements of full-time nursing meant he moved into Matariki Hospital early this year. The family are most grateful for the wonderful care Frank received at both Matariki and Tara Hill.

Frank had been an active Rotarian in five different clubs, including President of the Morrinsville club. In his retirement he continued his community involvement doing reading recovery work at Te Awamutu College. He and Vivienne shared a loved of music and gardening – she maintained the plants, he mowed the lawns.

Frank's first loves were his Lord - he maintaining a daily devotional routine of scripture reading and prayer right up until just a day or two before he died; Christ's Church whom he served faithfully and well through a strong pastoral ministry; and his wife and children and their families whom he loved dearly.

On Wednesday night as we gathered to prepare this tribute, the family talked about the precious times spent with 'Pop' – like Sunday afternoon 'family time' going to yet another service! (three services each Sunday).

Frank loved life and was grateful to God for the opportunity and privilege of service. He believed implicitly that "whenever you did this for one of the least of these my children, you did it for me" (Matt. 25 : 40) He felt things very deeply and this empathy was often apparent as his eyes watered in response to people's joys and sadness.

He loved a laugh and telling and retelling stories - so much so that he would sometimes start laughing before he got to the punch line.

Frank was fond of quoting John Wesley when he said, "the best is yet to come". He lived and died in that faith and hope.

His dying wish was "God bless you all". You got your wish Frank. We have all been greatly blessed for having known and shared life's journey with such a gentleman, one who so faithfully lived the gospel he preached - truly a man of God.

Well done good and faithful servant.

PRUE PATRICK 1921 – July 20 2004

Prue Patrick grew up in Petone where she was deeply involved with the local Methodist Church as Circuit Steward, Choir Member and Youth Leader. She also served as Secretary of the Wellington District Youth Council. She was Assistant Manager of the legal publishing firm, Butterworths. Prue moved to the Manawatu in 1963 to become Matron of the Catherine Jamieson Girls Hostel and Y.W.C.A. Secretary. These positions she held concurrently for some years. She moved to Pahiatua in 1973, to take up the position as Parish Assistant, living there until she died on July 20th, 2004

How can we condense into a few words what Prue meant to the Women's Fellowship in the Manawatu District? Prue had a happy knack of being able to fulfil any position and do it well. She never let the fact that she didn't drive prevent her from being at meetings. The bus service from Pahiatua was not the most convenient, meaning very early starts to the day for meetings in Palmerston North. Prue held many positions – District Secretary, District Treasurer and most recently District President and was holding this position when she died. Prue served on the National Programme Committee 1991-1993. She was on the 1994-1996 National Executive as Treasurer. She served as Treasurer and Registrar on the Local Arrangements Committee that organised the 1998 Convention held at Forest Lakes. She enjoyed her time at many National Conventions in her various positions.

Prue was a tower of strength in the local MWF – always cheerful – never making a fuss, but with quiet dignity getting things done and by example helped us all to realise that we could do more than perhaps we thought we could.

She was the Parish Assistant in the Pahiatua Union Church, where she counselled young people, acted as the local Budget Advisory Service, established the local Op shop and the Union Church "Trash and Treasure" initiative. Prue was also the prime mover in the Union Church Family Welfare Centre which was established when the new building was completed. This centre was used by Social Welfare, the Probation Service and the Housing Department for their interviews for which Prue arranged the appointments. She represented Pahiatua at Synod, and was in this position when she died. She served as Synod secretary for a number of years.

Prue travelled widely, both in New Zealand and overseas. Having no surviving relations in New Zealand she travelled to visit her nephews and niece living overseas. She always had a humorous tale to tell of her adventures! Most recently she visited her nephew and family in Bahrain!. No mean feat for an 80 year old!

At her memorial service we heard that Prue was active in many organisations right up until the time of her death. We recall tributes from: Pahiatua Repertory Society, Pahiatua Community Social Services Club, Garden Group[, and in earlier years w as a leader in the Pahiatua Boys' Brigade, She was Immediate Past President of Pahiatua Probus. We heard she took an active part in all of these organisations and was either Secretary or Treasurer (Sometimes both!) of each.

Prue was a very private person and hardly mentioned her 'other interests' which she worked at with quiet dedication. We all learned much at her Memorial Service of her activities and actions to help others. As the Presbyter said at the completion of the Memorial Service "Thank God for Prue"!! We can only say 'AMEN' to that.



RECORD OF SERVICE RETIRING PRESBYTERS & DEACONS

GORDON ABERNETHY

Gordon entered full time ministry just 7 years ago at an age at which most people are thinking about retirement.

Bible Class days at Shirley Methodist in Christchurch with Rev Len Willing and Rod Brown, laid the foundations for his future work in the Church.

On leaving High School in 1956 Gordon joined the Ministry of Works in Christchurch as a draughting cadet in Housing Division, planning subdivisions, roading and services. In 1961 he married Anne and they moved to Dunedin where he moved into Highway and Motorway design. Just before the Ministry of Works was split up and substantially reduced in size, he changed careers by applying and being accepted for primary school teaching, entering Dunedin Teachers College the same week his eldest daughter started High School, eldest son Intermediate and youngest son morning Kindy! Anne helped support all 6 'students' over the next 3 years through various part-time work. Then followed 15 years of teaching in various primary schools around the Dunedin area until 1993 when he became 'surplus to requirements'.

During these years he became very involved, with his family, in Sunday School and Bible Class teaching at Mosgiel, as well as leading worship and fulfilling other duties in the Dunedin Parish, qualifying as an accredited lay preacher in 1991.

Following redundancy from school teaching his thoughts turned to free-lance photography, but some people in the Dunedin Parish had other ideas, and he was asked to join the Dunedin Parish Ministerial team as a part-time Lay minister. So in 1994 he changed careers for the third time and began part-time Lay Ministry with oversight of the St Kilda Church, as well as helping out in other areas of the Dunedin Parish. As part of his training as a Lay Minister he studied for and completed, the Diploma of Theology at Otago University, and at the same time completed his training for the Ministry through the Home Setting course.

Following ordination at the 1997 Methodist Conference, he accepted itinerancy and became the Presbyter of the Ashburton Parish in 1998 where he remained until his retirement.

Anne and their family have always been very supportive throughout the changes. "We may not be as rich, 'money-wise', as we would have been had I stuck to a Design/Draughting career, but personally I'm far richer through all my experiences with people, children and God."

Gordon now looks forward to gardening, photography, an hour or two with the 'boys' at the Ashburton Aviation Museum, getting involved in helping one daughter renovate a 100 year plus home in Dunedin as well as getting under Anne's feet in the kitchen!

We give thanks to God for people enriched through the service given by Gordon and Anne over many years.

We wish them both a relaxed enjoyable retirement.

G. JEAN BRUCE

Born in Christchurch Jean spent most of her formative years in that city. She joined the "Crusaders" Group at Avonside Girl's High School and came to faith at a Crusader Camp at Okains Bay. A friend then took Jean to Shirley Methodist Church where she was baptised and confirmed. There she became a member of the Bible Class, the choir and leader of the Team Section of the Boys' Brigade known as Life Boys'

The Rev. Leonard Willing, minister at Shirley, made a prophetic statement when Jean stood in the pulpit for the first time – "One day you will be doing this." Later Jean's love of music led her to Durham Street to sing in the choir.

On leaving school Jean began work in the National Bank in Christchurch, Hokitika and Papanui She left the bank and moved to Dunedin. to train as a Primary School Teacher. The Rev Selwyn Dawson married Jean and Andrew Bruce in 1996 in the Durham Street Methodist Church

In 1977 Jean returned as an adult student to South Otago High School in Balclutha to sit University Entrance which enabled her to sit accountancy exams.

While living in Balclutha and Nelson she worked in legal offices as the accountant.

It was from St Luke's Union Church Nelson that Jean candidated for ministry. Because her husband Andrew could transfer to Dunedin in his job Jean trained at the Theological Hall, Knox College from 1986–1988 graduating with a B. Theol. She has had parish appointments at Sumner Redcliffs Union, Ashburton Methodist Parish, Dunedin Methodist Parish – with responsibility for Mosgiel, Trinity Hall and Dunedin South, and Oxford District Union Parish

While in Ashburton . and three months after their 30th wedding anniversary Andy died suddenly. Andy 'was always there' in the background, describing himself as "chief cook, bottle washer and the gardener." He was fondly known in Sumner and Ashburton as the 'Ecclesiastical Postman.'

Jean has played an active role in the wider church and community serving on a number of bodies including the inaugural two years of The Council of Conference, Christian World Service, the Conference and Joint Regional Committees. While in The Dunedin Parish she conducted Radio Church for Hills AM for 5 years, with 2 years on the committee, served 4 years on the Board of Anglican Methodist Family Care, three of them as chairperson. and one year on the Board of the Dunedin Methodist Mission. Jean was first interested in the Order of St. Luke during her years in Nelson and has remained a member and fulfilled the task of Chaplain.

Jean continues as District Candidates Convenor South Island and District Assessor of Probationers South Island.

Jean's strengths in ministry include music, creative liturgy, special services celebrating the seasons of the church and of people's lives. She is an enabler, encouraging and empowering others to participate fully in 'the worship of the people' in ways they never dreamed they could. Jean is a facilitator of change which "has not always been received with enthusiasm." However her testimonial from a former parishioner is that she `identified herself with people bringing the gospel to them where they were at. Everyone in our congregation loved Jean.'

Two personal highlights have involved overseas travel, the first in 1988 with a group of forty-two New Zealanders led by Geoff and Doreen Hill to attend the 250th celebrations of John Wesley's Aldersgate Conversion Experience. The second came in 2000 as part of her delayed long service leave when Jean again went overseas to Canada, Britain and Europe, seeing the Millenium celebration of the Passion Play at Oberammagau.

On completion of her supply ministry Jean will retire to Rangiora.

RAEWYN F. CUBIN

Raewyn retires from the Diaconate at the 2004 Conference after more than 20 years of service to Wesley Church, Taranaki Street, the wider church and the community. She came to Wesley from Brooklyn Church in 1978 and immediately became involved the life of the congregation. In that year she was appointed part-time secretary in the Wesley Church office and later served as part-time secretary for the Wesley Social Services Trust Board. When celebrations were held at Easter 1980 to mark the centennial of the opening of the church in Taranaki Street, Raewyn organised the arrangements. She convened the Pastoral Committee and was a leader in the Children's Ministry programme. For some years she served on various committees and councils including the District Synod and the Hospital Chaplaincy Committee. Other voluntary services for which Raewyn worked included the Samaritans, the Victim Support Group and Mary Potter Hospice. She was co-convenor for a time of the Wellington Adoption Support Group.

In 1983 Raewyn was accepted as a deacon-in-training and was ordained deacon at the 1986 Conference. In 1985 she began work as a part-time ITIM field chaplain and was appointed as a full-time industrial chaplain in 1989. Early in 1987 the President called on Raewyn at short notice to undertake an interim diaconal supply ministry on a part-time basis at St John's Church, Karori. She gave pastoral oversight and coordinated the work there until the arrival of the Rev Dr Harry Haines at the end of July. Raewyn commented 'God moves in mysteriously and unexpected ways, and certainly at times with great speed'. In 1988 she became a marriage celebrant. Another of Raewyn's initiatives was launching of a mid-week ecumenical service at the Plimmer Towers Hotel Chapel, designed to meet the needs of hotel guests and inner-city workers. In recent years Raewyn has been left without appointment on the stationing sheet because of work and family commitments. But she has continued as an active member of Wesley's 10AM Congregation.

The strengths of Raewyn's diaconal ministry have been primarily in pastoral care, in administrative skills and in initiating and developing programmes. The Church is grateful for Raewyn's commitment and service

MALCOLM McLEOD

Malcolm McLeod was an active lay person in the life of the Methodist Church at Devonport and more recently at Birkenhead. He had worked as a project manager for a Public Accountant and in the Newspaper industry. But he felt that God was calling him to use his particular gifts in the service of the church. In 1992 Malcolm candidated, and he was ordained Deacon in 1996.

His active ministry was as a pastoral support person for the Birkenhead Parish to the wider community. Malcolm became an advocate and support for those accessing Income Support services, and for those requiring the services of

local community service groups. He assisted families who are socially financially and physically disadvantaged, especially those residing in the Beach Haven and Birkdale area.

When the Parish adjusted its priorities Malcolm found work with the Presbyterian Savings and development Society, and was instrumental in making Grants and loans to Presbyterian Churches all over New Zealand. He has spoken and led worship in all twenty four Presbyteries.

Malcolm is a Justice of the Peace and as such became a Marriage and Funeral Celebrant. Many couples and families are thankful that they received the benefits of his careful preparation and planning for weddings and funerals.

Malcolm is also a Lay preacher, is frequently on the preaching plan of both Methodist and Presbyterian Parishes. His leadership of worship is thoughtfully planned and carried out, and his children's talks are much appreciated by young and old.

Malcolm McLeod's ministry as a deacon has touched the lives of many people and his work will be remembered with gratitude.

8.19(d)(iv)(3) (new)

where the complaint is of substance and mediation would not be appropriate, or any mediation held has failed to resolve the complaint, or consent under s.22(a) is not available, and the Complaints Officer determines that the matter should not proceed further, the Complaints Officer shall prepare a report pursuant to section 23(b) of these Laws, and refer the report and the complaint to the Complaints Review Panel Chairperson.

Amendment to Section 23 Reporting and Referring on Complaints

As part of the record of the investigation when:

- (a) a Complaints Officer determines that:
 - (i) a complaint is of no substance and requires no further action; or
 - (i) the complaint is resolved by mediation,

the Complaints Officer shall prepare a report stating the nature of the complaint and either, his or her reasons for believing the complaint is of no substance, or the result of the mediation.

(b) the parties cannot reach agreement as to mediation following a determination under section 19(d)(iv)(1), or a determination has been made under section 19(d)(iv)(2), or Section 19(d)(iv)(3), the Complaints Officer shall prepare a report stating the nature of the complaint, the steps taken in reaching a determination, the Complaints Officer's conclusions and the reasons for those conclusions. The report shall be sent to the Complaints Review Panel Chairperson.

A copy of reports under this section shall be forwarded to the parties and the General Secretary.

22. Mediation

- (a) Mediation shall not be used when the complaint is one of sexual harassment. [previously S33(d)]
- (b) A Complaints Officer may arrange for mediation in respect of a complaint, but prior to mediation taking place there shall be consultation between the Complaints Officer and the General Secretary to confirm that adequate funds are available. [previously S22(a)]
- (c) If the parties cannot reach agreement as to mediation within three working days of the Complaints Officer suggesting mediation, the Complaints Officer shall refer forward a report and a copy of the complaint to the Complaints Review Panel pursuant to section 23(b) of this Code. [previously S22(b)]
- (d) Having agreed to attempt to reach a mediated resolution, mediation shall occur within 21 days ("the **Mediation Period**"). Written advice of the outcome of the mediation shall be provided to the Complaints Officer by the mediator and shall be signed by all present at the mediation. [previously S22(c)]
- (e) If the mediation results in a resolution, the Complaints Officer shall prepare a report pursuant to section 23(a) of this Code and the complaint shall be deemed concluded. [previously S22(d)]
- (f) If the parties cannot reach a mediated resolution within the Mediation Period, then subject to subsection (a) of this clause, the mediation process may be extended for one additional Mediation Period if all parties agree. [previously S22(e)]
- (g) If at the end of the Mediation Period(s) no mediated resolution is reached, the Complaints Officer shall forward a report and a copy of the complaint to the Complaints Review Panel pursuant to section 23(b) of these Laws. [previously S22(f)]
- (h) No complaint which may result in a Presbyter being found to be unsuitable to continue in Full Connexion with the Conference or involving dishonesty, shall be referred to a mediation process. [previously S34(c)]

23. Mediation Process [New]

If mediation is to take place, then subject to this Code, the mediator shall regulate the mediation procedure.

31. Functions of the Review Chairperson

- (a) To receive the report of any Complaints Officer. (existing)
- (b) Where the report from a Complaints Officer involves the reference of the complaint to a Complaints Review Committee:
 - (i) Under Section 19(d)(iv)(2), to constitute a Complaints Review Committee from the Reviewers Panel (existing)
 - (ii) Under Section 19(d)(iv)(3) to constitute a Complaints Review Committee from the Review Panel only in the event the Complainant notifies that General Secretary within 14 days of receipt of the Complaints Officer's determination that he/she objects to the determination that the matter should not proceed further.

[New, replaces

- b) Where the report from a Complaints Officer involves the reference of the complaint to a Complaints Review Committee, to constitute a Complaints Review Committee from the Reviewers Panel. Where the Review Chairperson is not a member of a Complaints Review Committee when constituted, to appoint a Convenor who shall chair that Complaints Review Committee.)
- c) To refer complaints received to a Complaints Review Committee]

33. Functions of each Complaints Review Committee

34. Procedure of the Complaints Review Committee

[All of this section is existing law under the old Section 33. The only alterations are the deletions to the references to mediation in subclauses (b) and (c) and the old Section 33(d) is now included in Section 22. The deletions to references to mediation in this clause and the one above are because the Complaints Officer is required to consider the appropriateness of mediation and that will be considered when the Complaints Review Committee ensures that the Complaints Officer has complied with the procedures contained in Sections 19-24 of the Code.]

- (a) The Complaints Review Committee shall review and consider the complaint and the accompanying report. Normally such review and consideration shall be completed within 14 days of the Complaints Review Committee being convened. ("the Review Period").
- (b) When reviewing the complaint and accompanying report, the Complaints Review Committee shall determine whether:
 - (i) the complaint shall be taken no further;
 - (ii) the person complained against shall be charged and brought before the Tribunal;
 - (iii) the complaint involves matters which should be referred to the civil or criminal authorities.
- (c) If, upon the expiry of the Review Period the Complaints Review Committee determines that:
 - (i) the complaint shall be taken no further, the Complaints Review Committee shall prepare a report pursuant to section 36(a) of this Code; or
 - (ii) the complaint shall be taken further and the person complained against be charged and brought before the Disciplinary Tribunal, the Complaints Review Committee is to act pursuant to section 37 of this Code; or
 - (iii) the complaint is one which should be referred to the Police, the Complaints Review Committee shall prepare a report pursuant to section 37(a) of this Code and refer the matter to the Police.
- (d) During the Review Period, the District Superintendent shall ensure that continuing suitable pastoral care and counselling is available to the parties, including where appropriate, members of the parish of the complainant and/or the respondent or any others affected.
- (e) The Complaints Review Committee shall not have power to deal with any matter where the effect of doing so would be to replace the procedures as to Stationing as set out in section 2.17.1ff of the Laws.
- (f) Subject to this Code and the rules of natural justice, the Complaints Review Committee shall regulate its procedure in such a manner as it thinks fit, and shall advise all parties as to the procedure for any matter before it at the earliest opportunity.
- (g) The Complaints Review Committee shall give written notice of the complaint to the person complained against, and shall request a response to the complaint.
- (h) The Complaints Review Committee may contact and interview the person complained against, and may also contact and interview the complainant, and any other person the Complaints Review Committee believes to be, or may be, relevant to, or have information relevant to, the complaint.
- (i) The Complaints Review Committee shall be able to instruct the Complaints Officer who referred the complaint to the Complaints Review Committee to act as an agent of the Complaints Review Committee and conduct further investigations and interviews on its behalf.

We, as members of the Methodist Church in New Zealand, Te Hahi Weteriana O Aotearoa, hereby express our utmost disappointment and disagreement with the decision of the Church to go ahead with the ordination of a self-confessed 'lesbian' woman into full Ministry within the Methodist Church in New Zealand during the Conference 2004.

We perceive this not only as a violation of Biblical morality but a deliberate abandonment and disobedience to God's commandments. It is therefore an abomination in the sight of God as far as we are concerned and we therefore can not passively stand by any longer and pretend that it does not hurt or bother us in our church life. We deeply feel the discomfort of worshipping and serving God in such a context of being increasingly alienated from identifying our Methodism with that decision.

We therefore ask Conference:

- (1) To forbid any future ordination of any known and self-confessed homosexual or lesbian into full Ministry within the Methodist Church of New Zealand.
- (2) Where an ordained Presbyter subsequently confesses to being an active homosexual or lesbian, he or she must be stripped of all privileges of being an ordained Presbyter of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.
