INTRODUCTION

The creation of this Register grew out of the author's compilation of the *Companion to William Morley's History of Methodism in New Zealand* published in 2006. It had become evident, in the course of this project, that Methodist historiography so far as it concerns ministry, is limited because so often its principal emphasis is on those whose whole career has been given to full-time stipended and ordained ministry, and who 'died in the work'. Those who left the ministry for other reasons were not always acknowledged, and the work of the home missionary, especially, was critically lacking in detail, or even overlooked. Ministers who resigned – for conscience' sake, or because of theological or ecclesiastical unease, or in order to enter another denomination, or to take up a different career altogether – were largely passed over in silence.

This is well illustrated in the four editions of J.T. Pinfold's *An Alphabetical Arrangement of all the Methodist Ministers and Preachers on Trial* (eds. 1889, 1898, 1913, 1922) and in the continuation volume, by W.T. Blight, *Ministerial and Circuit Appointments 1920-1960*, (n.d.). All these set out the Circuits of the Methodist Church of New Zealand and the appointments made to them, but if an appointment is that of a Home Missionary (or 'lay agent' as they were initially described) no name is given. It became, for this author, a matter of equity to compile as accurate a list of all these men (and just a few women) and their appointments.

It proved, initially, to be a frustrating task. While the process of entering the ordained ministry is accurately recorded in the Conference Minutes - from the moment a candidate is received for theological training to the moment of their reception into Full Connexion and Ordination - there is no comparable official record for Home Missionaries. The archives of both the former Home and Maori Mission Department and of Te Taha Maori are seriously incomplete in this connection. Such appointments were not even recorded on the List of Stations until 1875. It is, however, appropriate at this point to acknowledge the years of work that the late Rev'd Doug Burt put into ordering the Department's Home Missionary records. They have proved to be a more than useful check-list in the preparation of this Register.

A word also needs to be said here about the selection of Home Missionaries. The Law Book simply required that they be an authorised Local Preacher, who had a proven fitness for the task (was 'acceptable), and had received the endorsement of the District Chairman and/or the General Superintendent of Home Missions. For both the individual and for the Church such an appointment was often a means of testing an individual's suitability for ordained ministry. For whatever reason, nevertheless, the Home Missionary fulfilled an essential role, especially in providing ministry in isolated country Circuits. Some men made it their whole career. As a whole their archival records are thin on the shelves.

Though this may appear to be something of a technicality, the method of recording Home Mission appointments in the Conference Minutes also underlines how different the stationing process was for the two categories of ministry. The Stationing Committee which held its final meeting at the time of the Annual Conference had before it a complete list of Circuits with all those presently requiring appointments particularly noted. Probationers and ordained ministers available for appointment were listed, and it was the task of the Committee to 'match' the vacancies to those ministers available. Conference's powers being what they were it was perfectly in order for a minister to be unexpectedly 'lifted' and appointed to a needy Circuit. When Conference concluded (the Stationing Committee having met on more than one occasion during the period of the Conference) the Final Stationing Sheet was read and confirmed by Conference as a whole. That document, as a rule, named only the probationers and ordained ministers.

Every District had within its bounds localities that were designated 'Home Mission Stations.' Some Circuits, in towns or cities, included smaller or emerging Societies that warranted and sought the appointment of a minister. It was the task of the General Superintendent of Home Missions to provide, as soon as possible after Conference, a list of Home Missionaries (or supplies – see below) who would take up these appointments. When the Conference Minutes were finally printed, the list of Home Mission Appointments followed the 'Stations of Ministers'. In the alphabetical lists of ministers, the two categories were kept separate. These procedures continued until the office of Home Missionary was effectively abolished in 1974.

The author soon realized that the lists of Home Missionaries printed in the Conference Minutes were unreliable. By

the very nature of the stationing process, deaths and resignations, illness and changing Circuit circumstances, required that there should be the ability to make decisions about adjusting appointments as the need arose, sometimes even within days of the closing of Conference. The General Superintendent of Home Missions might do this on his own authority, or in consultation with a District Chairman, but in more 'significant' situations, he needed to act with the approval and endorsement of the President. All these considerations meant that this researcher could not rely on the accuracy of the Conference Minutes.

One regrettable deficiency in this Register is the absence of the record of many who served as Maori Home Missionaries. These were appointed, firstly, in the period around the 1914-1918 War, and were itinerant to a limited extent. From the 1930s an additional category was added, entitled "Honorary Maori Home Missionaries". These were men of *mana*, leaders in communities that had an historic identification with Weteriana. The records for these men, in any systematic sense, are virtually non-existent. From such sources as are available the author has prepared a record which is now held by Te Taha Maori, but it is sadly inadequate for the purposes of this Register.

A problem arises from the older practice of anglicizing Maori names, particularly in the case of the deaconesses in Maori work. Preference is always given to the individual's Maori name, and cross-references are provided where confusion may arise when relating this Register to the official records in the Conference minutes. Even when the Maori name was used, the ordering of the several elements often changed during that person's ministry.

The inclusion of Deaconesses came at a later stage in the compilation of this Register. It is a subject lacking clear definition, the official status of women in full-time service being undecided until the 1930s. Their names appear unsystematically in the Conference minutes from the first decade of the 20th century – usually as 'Sisters' within the Central Missions, in association with the Deaconess Institution, or as appointments made by the Foreign/Overseas Mission Department. Very little by way of biographical data is published, and there is no single source of information. W.C. Chambers' *Not Self But Others* (1987) and Marcia Baker's *For Others With Love* (2007) taken together cover most of those who served in New Zealand, while George Carter's *A Family Affair* (1973) provides a complete list of names of those who served overseas, but with sparse information in some cases. Another invaluable source, of a more general nature, is Ruth Fry's *Out of the Silence* (1987).

The writer decided it would be invidious, in a sense 'un-Methodist', to make distinctions in respect to ministerial 'status'. This is particularly relevant in respect to missionary sisters, some of whom who were trained nurses and teachers, and others, more simply, assistants to the missionaries, providing pastoral care for families who lived within the bounds of the mission station. Those appointed from 1905 to 1923 were not in the 'employ' of the New Zealand Methodist Church - they were under the jurisdiction of the New South Wales Conference, serving in the Papua, New Guinea and Solomon Islands Regions, and Fiji. Even so, because they had been specifically selected for missionary service, they were often financially supported by some group linked with the New Zealand Methodist Women's Missionary Auxiliary.

All women, therefore, who have been in the employ of the Church or one of its agencies in what, appropriately, may be called 'a ministry' are included here. Some of their entries lack essential information, simply because it was not efficiently recorded. It is hoped no-one is omitted, and equally it is hoped that the publication of this Register will enable additional relevant data to be discovered and incorporated.

The preparation of this Register has been immeasurably enhanced by access to *PapersPast* and *Trove*, the two digitized newspaper resources. Moreover, the Methodist newspapers are now available on-line, up to 1948, per courtesy of the Kinder Library. It is somewhat ironic that the most reliable way of knowing where a particular minister is at any particular time is by finding their name in an advertisement for religious worship services Sunday by Sunday. But until the digitized sources are relatively complete (i.e. say, all NZ newspapers up to 1945 even) this Register will itself remain a work in progress.

NOTE

Donald Phillipps, as compiler of this Register, asserts his moral right to be identified as author. The Register is maintained as a publicly available resource provided that this source is acknowledged.

This Register is solely an historical database, and is not an official document of the Methodist Church of New Zealand. Every care has been taken to achieve accuracy, and it is offered to the reader as an opening to dialogue. It has been carefully proofread, but if there are errors, I welcome their correction and offer an apology. The reader is now invited to offer comment, amendment and additional information.

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TERMINOLOGY

Candidate

Candidates firstly appear in the Circuit records. They may have been tapped on the shoulder by a minister who believed they had the requisite gifts and graces. They may have had a personal sense of 'call' to ministry, and took the initiative themselves to approach the local minister. Candidates who lacked local Circuit experience were at some disadvantage - almost without exception they would have been expected to have become an accredited local preacher before being accepted formally as a candidate. Candidates were examined at three levels – by the Leaders' Meeting, by the District Synod who formally proposed them, and by the Conference who made the final decision. Always, in the background, was the element of acceptance and endorsement they had received from among their own people in their own congregations.

Received for Theological Education

The implication of this phrase is that the candidate who is now accepted by Conference will, forthwith, commence a period of training. In the earliest period, before there was a Theological Institution, the received candidate might be sent as a sort of assistant to the minister of a large urban Circuit where he could receive personal mentoring. Even when, in the 1880s an Institution was established, the number of places available for the preparation of students for ministry was limited, and often candidates accepted 'to enter the Theological Institution' would be sent (by direction of the President) to fill a gap in the Stationing Sheet. Sometimes they just had to bide their time, though they might more formally be noted as being on 'the President's List of Reserve.'

Stationing

Methodist ministers are 'stationed' (i.e., appointed) by Conference). Strictly speaking, in accordance with Methodist law, and in keeping with the principle of itinerancy, each appointment is for one year, but may be extended. There was a strict observance of a maximum of three years for Circuit appointments, and this applied until the late 1880s, though missionary and City Mission appointments were generally for extended periods. The length of a Circuit appointment was further extended and the procedures modified throughout the 20th century. Some ministerial appointments, to Connexional positions such as the Theological College, the Connexional Secretaryship, the Superintendency of the Home and Maori Division and the Foreign Missions Department, were seen as requiring extended terms.

A word needs to be said here about the Methodist principle of the 'itinerancy of the ministry.' This is one of the few enshrined principles of Methodism that even Conference cannot significantly alter. In Wesley's time it meant, largely, one year only at a place. Its rigorous administration proved an impossibility and the three-year norm developed out of necessity. The principle is theoretically and symbolically maintained by the fact that every Conference annually approves by resolution the whole of the stationing of its ministers.

The Annual Conference, whether Australasian or New Zealand, met at the beginning of the year, until 1949. To that time moving from one appointment to another took place at the beginning of April. In 1949 the date of Conference was moved to November, and since then changes to Circuit appointments are to be completed by the beginning of the following February. The year noted for the completion of a ministry in this Register always takes account of the month(s) immediately prior to the time of removal.

Deaconesses and Missionary Sisters were not usually stationed in the strict sense of the term, though in later years their names might appear on the Stationing List.

Probation

The approved candidate, whether at the completion of the prescribed course of training, or appointed immediately to Circuit work, spent a number of years of supervised training, and continuing study, within a Circuit. Throughout the initial period covered by this Register the term was four years, which in 1950 was reduced to three years. Conference

always retained the right to lengthen the period of probation if the probationer's performance was unsatisfactory, or had been impeded by ill-health. Occasionally probation might be reduced by a year, for example for probationers with a university degree.

In the Primitive Methodist, UMFC and Bible Christian branches these rules were interpreted rather more flexibly, and the length of probation depended to some degree, it would seem, on personal abilities. The term 'probation' has been generally used here, but the phrase 'on trial' is an occasional alternative.

In the Primitive Methodist Connexion the entry into Probation was marked by the completion of a standard 'Pledge' signed by the Probationer and making undertakings to the Quarterly Meeting in respect to his ministry.

Full Connexion

The completion of probation was signaled in two ways. Probationers were received into Full Connexion, a specifically Methodist term indicating their acknowledgement as a full member of the Conference, and a full participant in the beneficiary funds of the Church. This reception was symbolized by the presentation of the Church's Law Book, which the minister, within the service of Reception, promised to both keep and administer.

In the Primitive Methodist Connexion the candidate who had successfully completed his period of probation and had been duly examined by Conference was 'received into the Approved List.' This Conference decision seems not to have been accompanied by any formal service of ordination.

Ordination

It took many years for the idea of ordination to be accepted within Methodism. In the early missionary period, however, a young probationary minister sent overseas as a missionary, was normally ordained by the senior ministers of the Wesleyan Missionary Society on his departure from England. This act gave his ministry a qualified recognition within his parent Church, possibly some undefined status within colonial society, but no more official status than any other probationer in England.

The act of ordination into the 'Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church' was of relatively late acceptance. Up to 1873 ordinations were held as and when the opportunity offered, such as when a senior officer of the Conference, including the President, and other ordained ministers, could be present to share in the laying-on of hands. In the period up to 1873, since such occasions were relatively rare, there is no complete record of ordination services.

Ordination, nevertheless, was an act of the New Zealand Conference from 1873, when it was possible for the first time for all those who had completed their probation to be present at the same Conference. Only then did the Ordination Service assume the symbolic significance it now carries.

<u>Superannuation</u>

There was no specified age at which a minister should retire. Until the advent of Universal Superannuation in 1938 ministers often remained active until they turned 70. Since, however, the average age of entry into active ministry was probably about 24 or 25, it is no coincidence that most retired after about 40 years' service. In addition, because there was no specified age for retirement the person wishing to do so had to seek Conference approval, and this was not automatically given. This point needs to be underlined. The minister seeking retirement became eligible for superannuation only by the decision of Conference.

Conference took upon itself the right to decide in such matters, and the state of the Stationing Sheet was clearly a factor that was taken into account. Short-term retirements were not uncommon, and it seems likely that the income available to the temporary superannuitant enabled that person to recover his health, or, possibly, to enjoy a brief respite from a very demanding vocation. So long as the majority of New Zealand ministers were English-born there was the understandable desire to enjoy a year's return Home, and temporary retirement made this feasible.

Supply

The meaning of this term is not well defined. In the period covered by this Register it did not apply to the 'regular' stationed appointments of Ministers and Home Missionaries whose names had been submitted to Conference for approval through normal stationing procedures. It is used for temporary appointments to fill unexpected or irregular vacancies. It is used for superannuated or other 'non-active' ministers who have agreed to fill a longer-term vacancy. The oversight and deployment of supply ministries was essentially the responsibility of the General Superintendent of Home and Maori Missions and his successors. That position carried with it the authority to act on behalf of Conference (generally with the endorsement of the President) to ensure that Circuits were 'supplied' with ministry sufficient for their needs.

Hired Local Preacher

Here is yet another example of Methodist pragmatism. The rather quaint phrase is of Primitive Methodist origin, and it is used frequently enough in this Register. Occasionally the compiler has applied it to a Wesleyan Circuit appointment. The process of filling a vacancy in the 'early' days could take weeks (and more) if the central authority's pool of appropriately qualified preachers was limited. A local Circuit or Station might well have more immediate access to such a person and for a local Quarterly/Station Meeting the approval of the Superintendent Minister would have seemed sufficient authority in the interim. It simply denotes here a local arrangement with local funding, made to meet an immediate need.

Colporteur

A brief explanation is warranted. For about three decades, starting in the mid-1920s, the Home and Maori Mission Department supported a mobile ministry, largely in the north of the North Island. A van, 'accommodating' one or even two young men (often Home Missionaries), carried supplies of cheap books and tracts for distribution in areas not so often visited by an appointed minister. This ministry included the conduct of worship on an ad hoc basis.

Circuit/Station

A Circuit or Station consists of a number of preaching-places, some of these with their own resident minister. The term goes back to the days of the minister riding around the preaching-places for which he was responsible, and reflects the 18th century legal term describing a judge's area of authority. Within a single Circuit, therefore, there might be as many as four or more stipended ministers and/or Home Missionaries. Where a minister's appointment states a place followed by another name in brackets, the latter name is that of the Circuit as a whole. Within the Primitive Methodist Connexion the term 'station' was preferred. While in country areas some regional geographic name was adopted, in the cities the 'Stations' were simply numbered.

Occasionally the term '2nd appointment' is used. This generally refers to a junior minister, probably unmarried, and appointed to the whole Circuit rather than to a particular local responsibility. An assistant might, for example, have a particular care for a smaller congregation, or undertake additional pastoral tasks to relieve a senior minister who had significant administrative responsibilities. The term 'supply' might refer to a short-term appointment made to fill a particular gap, say, through the death of the stationed minister. It might also refer to a situation where a growing area within a Circuit might justify additional resources, but without a precise center of operation.

In this respect Station is a purely Primitive Methodist terminology, and ceased to be used on the achievement of Union in 1913. The Church discontinued the use of the traditional term 'Circuit' with the revision of the Laws and Regulations in 1981. From that time the basic administrative unit of the Connexion has been known as a 'Parish'.

Conference

From the 1850s the Annual Conference, whether in Australia or New Zealand, was held at the beginning of the year – sometimes as early as mid-January, but as often as not towards the end of the month. This practice held until 1891 when the date was put forward to the first week in March, and so it remained until the 1940s when, after much

discussion, it was agreed that Conference be held in November. Many factors were taken into account in making the change, but so far as this register is concerned one in particular must be noted.

Reference has already been made to the fact that when Conference was held early in the year it was the rule that those ministers who were to move must do so by the end of March, so that they could take up their new appointment in the first week in April. The change to the November Conference meant that ministers were now to move by the end of January, and take up their appointment in the first week in February. In either case the stationing of a minister was completed when the minister moved, and not when the Conference decision was formally announced. This detail has, in this writer's judgement, always given rise to some confusion over the length of a minister's appointment. In this Register the years of a minister's appointment always take into account, unless specially noted, the month, or the three months (as was formerly the case) during which the ministers continued in their Circuit prior to their departure.

Conference Minutes

These are normally published within a month of the completion of the Conference. In the 1870s they ran to 60-70 pages, but had doubled in size by the turn of the century, had doubled again by 1930, and comprised over 400 pages by the 1960s. They are essentially a summary of the proceedings of the Conference, and for the purposes of this Register provide much basic data in regard to annual appointments, obituaries, and tributes paid at the time of retirement. From a biographical point-of-view the Minutes record much other significant material relating to an individual minister, but since this Register is primarily a chronology of an individual career rather than a potted biography, much available detail that is available to the researcher is omitted.

The availability on-line of the *Blain Directory of Anglican Clergy in the South Pacific* and the Presbyterian Archive Research Centre's *Register (Fasti) of New Zealand Presbyterian Ministers, Deaconesses & Missionaries 1840 to 2014* has meant that entries which cross denominational boundaries can be checked for accuracy. My respect for the work of the Rev'ds Michael Blain and Ian Fraser is unbounded.

As has been said the format used is in the style of a brief chronology. The vital statistics are limited to accurate dates and names for the minister's life events, and some further identification through the father's occupation. Data on education and employment have been sought, but not always with success. Family relationships have been considered useful, but not essential. Not every position occupied within the Church warrants a special mention, but some are obvious as indicators of leadership. Every effort has been made to find a published obituary. The secular newspaper records are by no means complete, and as they become available they will be added. It is regrettable that the Connexional newspapers are neither reliable nor thorough as a source of biographical information.

Finally, there are the numberless individuals with whom I have engaged in conversation, either by phone or letter or e-mail, or through a website such as *Rootschat*. The very nature of such communications means that this Register will never be complete. To make it available publicly now is to continue the process of amendment, and the need for this is abundantly clear and necessary to the compiler, who stands by his labours but would never dare to vouch for its total accuracy.
