

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HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

Organised Methodism in Australasia, as a part of the Foreign Missions under the direction of the British Conference, dates from the appointment of the Rev. Samuel Leigh to New South Wales in 1815.—(Mins. Brit. Conf., 1814).

"The Missions in Australia, Van Diemen's Land, the Friendly Islands and Feejee" were constituted by the British Conference of 1854 "a distinct Connexion, to be denominated "The Australasian Wesleyan-Methodist Connexion," with an Annual Conference, affiliated to the Parent English Conference."—(Mins. Brit. Conf., 1854).

The first Australasian Conference was held in Sydney in the year 1855.

A Scheme of Annual and General Conferences was determined by the Australasian Conference of 1873.

THE FIRST NEW ZEALAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church was held in 1874.

THE TWENTY-FOURTH NEW ZEALAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church, which was also the First United Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, the United Methodist Free Churches, and the Bible Christian Church in New Zealand, was held in 1897.

THE FIRST ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of Australasia in New Zealand was held in 1903.

THE FIRST CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of New Zealand was held in 1913, separation from the General Conference of Australasia having become operative on January 1st of that year by declaration of the President of the General Conference.

THE FIRST CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of New Zealand (United) was held in 1913.

JAMES HENRY ALLEN

J. Henry Allen was born at Normanby, Taranaki, in 1891. Although early associations were with the Church of England, he heard the call to become a Methodist preacher in the Hawera Circuit, was accepted as a Home Missionary in 1917 and stationed at the Bay of Islands and Hikurangi adjacent to the last Circuit of his ministry.

He was a Candidate for the Ministry at the Centennial Conference 1922, and was ordained in 1926. Subsequently he exercised fruitful ministries in six circuits. While stationed in Christchurch he became Chairman of the District and also served in that capacity in the Taranaki-Wanganui and Auckland districts and was at the time of his death Deputy Chairman of Auckland.

He had the qualities of an able leader which gained recognition by the Church which called him to the Presidency in 1952. Mr Allen unreservedly consecrated his gifts and abilities as an eloquent, thoughtful preacher, an able administrator and an excellent pastor, to Christ and His Church. His passion for sincerity, honesty, friendship and service endeared him to a wide circle of friends. He was twice married and had a family of four children, one of whom Rev. R. H. Allen was Youth Director for four years. The present Mrs Allen was Miss Allnut of Dunedin Both ladies have rendered conspicuous service to the Church and the ministry of Mr Allen was enriched by their choice personalities and gifts.

After a grave illness "Harry" Allen passed away on December 6th, 1955. The Church is the poorer for his going. We thank God for his sincere, devoted, effective life and ministry dominated by the spirit of His Lord.

To Mrs Allen, the Rev. R. H. Allen, and the other members of the family, the Church extends its sympathy as it pays tribute to a choice personality and great Churchman.

FRED GREENWOOD

The death of the Rev. Fred. Greenwood in Lower Hutt on 18th October, 1956, at the age of 88 brought to its early close a long life and fruitful ministry. As a young man he trained as an engineer and also served with the Grenadier Guards. He joined the Wesleyan Church and began to preach when 18 years of age. In 1880 he journeyed to Australia and later served in Mission work among the Kanakas. He was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry at the Rockhampton Synod in 1897 and was placed on probation. After three years, he trained for a year at Queen's College, Melbourne. During World War I he went to England, serving as a Wesleyan Chaplain in the Dover Patrol. In 1918 he returned to Australia and on the advice of the Rev. J. H. Simmonds transferred to the New Zealand Conference. He maintained a devoted ministry of faithful service in this country. He possessed an evangelistic fervour which led people to Christ and he was active in relieving human distress. Fred. Greenwood had a wide vision of the Christian Church and ably served for some years as convener of the Ecumenical Committee. He retired from the active Ministry in 1934 and settled in Wellington where he preached regularly with great acceptance. He has left behind him a fragrant memory.

ROBERT McGREGOR

Robert McGregor was born in Dunedin in 1887 and in his early years attended the Cargill Road Church: He commenced studies in Law, but the early death of his father closed that avenue of occupation.

He was keenly interested in Youth Work and his gifts in this direction led to his appointment as General Secretary of the Dunedin Y.M.C.A. His interest in the Young Men's Bible Class Movement, then in its infancy, gave opportunity for important Otago District forward work and he became one of the early Secretaries of the Dominion Executive.

At the outbreak of the First World War he enlisted in the Medical Corps and served overseas. He was on the ill-fated hospital ship, "Marquette," torpedoed in the Mediterranean.

In 1932 he married Miss Davison, daughter of Mr J. W. Davison, of Cargill Road, offered for Home Mission work, and was appointed to Cromwell.

Accepted as a candidate for the Ministry he served his Probation in the Bluff Circuit and subsequently served in five circuits—in one of which (Greendale) he ministered for fourteen years.

Robert McGregor was a most brotherly and saintly Minister, keenly interested in people. In turn he enjoyed the love and esteem of his congregations. He excelled as a *pastor and he will long be remembered

with gratitude and affection by a wide circle of people. He passed away in the active work after 34 years' service.

Robert McGregor's ministry was greatly enriched by the loyal comradeship and co-operation of Mrs McGregor, whose gracious personality and ability won the affection of all their congregations.

WALTER JOHN OXBROW

Walter John Oxbrow was born in Ballarat, Victoria, in 1873, and came to New Zealand with a view to entering the ministry.

He was accepted as a Candidate and entered Prince Albert College in 1900. After one year he was sent out to Circuit work. In the early years of his ministry he was appointed to a succession of Circuits in the South Island. In all his Circuits he laboured with zeal and devotion and was greatly loved by many.

Conference recognised his gifts by calling him to be Chairman of the Taranaki-Wanganui and the South Auckland Districts. He was an original thinker and preacher, and held a high place in the esteem and affection of his brethren.

Throughout all the years of his active ministry Mrs Oxbrow, who predeceased him, was his loyal and faithful helper and support.

Mr Oxbrow passed peacefully away on June 29th, 1956.

RAKENA P. RAKENA

Rakena Piripi Rakena was born at Mangamuka, Northland, m 1890, and died at Hawera in February, 1956, after an illness of some months

Mr Rakena, who had ancestral connections with Ngapuhi and Taranaki, was a son of the late Rev. Piripi Rakena. He responded early to the Christian influences that surrounded him, and received his education and training for the ministry at Three Kings College. He entered the ministry in 1908 and was ordained in 1914. He served in the South Island, King Country, Hokianga and Taranaki.

He possessed preaching gifts above the average and by his quiet integrity won the confidence of his people. Right to the end he maintained a deep interest in the training of young people in Christian discipleship and was their faithful guide and counsellor.

Mr Rakena married Miss May Couch of Rapaki, Lyttelton. He is survived by his widow, who through all the years has stood faithfully by her husband. One of the sons is in the ministry, making the third generation which has given a son to the work.

In traditional manner the people paid their tribute at Kanihi Pa, Taranaki, before the body was taken to Rapaki for burial.

To Mrs Rakena and the family the Church extends hands of loving sympathy and expresses gratitude for a long and devoted ministry.

HAROLD ANGUS SHARP

Harold Sharp was born in Christchurch on April 7th, 1885. He was brought up in the Battersea Street Primitive Methodist Church and was converted in a mission held by Dr Grattan Guinness. He became a Sunday School teacher and a local preacher, preaching his first sermon when only 16. When 22 he was accepted as a Home Missionary and then received on Probation in 1910, and ordained in 1914. His 32 years of subsequent ministry were served in seven circuits. Ill-health compelled superannuation in 1947. His last years were marked by continued ill-health, but through them all he maintained his faith in God and loved the fellowship of his brethren and of his many friends. He was among our strongest preachers and was a valued pastor.

As a Chaplain in both World Wars, as a member of the Board of Examiners and as a member of several Connexional Committees he served honourably through the years.

In 1914 he married Miss Elsie Dobbs of Christchurch and she stood loyally by him and the Church. To her and to the family the Conference conveys its appreciation of an effective ministry and its sympathy in a great loss.

ROBERT EBENEZER FORDYCE, A.A. (Oxon.)

The Rev. Robert Ebenezer Fordyce was born in London in 1894. With the intention of becoming a schoolteacher he won a Scholarship and later became an Associate in Arts of Oxford University.

He was converted at 14 years of age and travelled to New Zealand three years later. He served for three years as a pupil teacher after which he became a Home Missionary.

He entered "Dunholme" College in 1915, was received on probation in 1916, and was ordained in Wellington in 1921.

Two years later he married Miss Elizabeth Margaret Bunn, and was greatly blessed in the woman who became his wife and who has shared wholeheartedly in the work of his ministry.

Mr Fordyce was for six and a half years Children's Editor (under the name of "Uncle Ben") of the New Zealand Methodist Times; he has served in District Synods as Journal Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Press Reporter; and in Conference on the Daily Record Committee. He has served in seventeen circuits. In all of them he has been concerned with property matters.

In the community he has given good service as Scouter and Group Scouter, as an active member of the St John Ambulance Brigade, as a past Grand Master of the Manchester Unity Independent Order of Oddfellows, and has served on school committees and Parent-Teacher Associations.

A passion for social righteousness has marked his life and ministry. He has always been a fearless crusader for what he believes to be right, although this has not always made him a popular figure.

Mr Fordyce has been a "good and faithful servant" of his Church and his God. People have been converted to Christ and some have entered full time service of the Church under his ministry. He has served his course with energy and selfless devotion and retires from the active ministry with the respect of those who have known him.

EDWIN THOMAS OLDS

The retirement of Edwin Thomas Olds removes from the active work one whose ministry has brought spiritual enrichment to the whole church. His forthright and fearless preaching of the Gospel won many decisions for Christ and His Church.

Throughout the 42 years of his ministry he has been equally effective on the public platform where he courageously espoused National Prohibition; better housing conditions; Bible in State Schools; and other moral movements of the day.

For over a quarter of a century his voice has been familiar on the radio where he confidently offered Christ as the supreme hope of men. In and through all his messages there has been the note of certainty which has carried conviction to many lives.

Mr Olds owes a great debt to his home training. From that home Methodism has been greatly served by Christian workers in many fields.

On the nomination of Dr C. H. Laws in 1912, Mr Olds was accepted as a candidate for the ministry. After a year on the "List of Reserve" he entered "Dunholme". In consequence of the War, College was closed early in 1915, and the next three years were spent overseas.

In his active ministry he served in seven circuits (in one, Auckland Central, for 15 years) and for three years he was Assistant Superintendent of the Home Mission Department and Chairman of Districts for fourteen years.

It has been his lot to be associated with Church extensions and new building projects. In 1948 the Church accorded its honour by electing him President of Conference. His period of office was unique in that, owing to the altered time of Conference, it continued for a year and nine months.

In all his appointments he has rendered faithful and devoted service.

In 1919 he married Miss Kathleen Daisy Calvert of Wellington, without whose support, love and care, his ministry would not have been the success it has.

A poignant sorrow befell them when David, their only son, whilst on loan from the Fleet Air Arm to the R.A.F. prior to D-Day, was killed on Active Service in August, 1944. This too was woven into their lives. Into their retirement they carry the love and affection of the Church.

THESIS:

Ministers are required to produce and present a thesis of not less than 10,000 words, within two years after their reception into Full Connexion, on some subject of theological or religious character, approved by the Rev. L. Gordon Hanna, who shall, on its completion, submit it to a panel of judges. A system of honours for those producing such theses will be followed, and a precis of suitable theses may be published in the "Methodist Times".

REGULATIONS.

- All Probationers who have completed the two-year Hebrew Course in Auckland University College shall take Hebrew Old Testament, provided that any Probationer taking a B.D. Course may substitute in lieu thereof the Hebrew prescribed in the B.D. Syllabus for that year.
- Unless special exemption is granted by the Examination Committee, Greek New Testament shall be compulsory for all Probationers who have been through College, provided that any Probationer taking a B.D. Course, may substitute in lieu thereof the Greek prescribed in the B.D. Syllabus for that year.
- Probationers, to whom (1) and/or (2) do not apply, shall be permitted to take the alternative English Old Testament and/or English New Testament in lieu of Hebrew and/or Greek respectively.
- 4. The Examination in Hebrew Old Testament and Greek New Testament shall be mainly on translation, grammar, and exegesis, and that in English O.T. and English N.T. shall be mainly on the exegesis of the sections specified.
- 5. (a) Greek and Theology shall be taken under Correspondence Tutors. Tutorial papers shall be done, marks being assessed as follows: Correspondence work, 40; Examination, 60. Each Tutor appointed shall send out study papers for four consecutive months beginning in mid-January and mid-May respectively. He shall mark the work sent in, return the corrected work together with suitable guidance. (Maximum marks for each study paper, 10). Each Tutor shall keep full records of every individual case, and, on or before October 1, forward a complete report to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners. N.B. Tutorials are required from all probationers by the due dates.
 - (b) Any Probationer taking a Theological subject for a B.D. Course shall be permitted to substitute the same for that set down for his Probationary year.
- 6. Examinations, when not specifically limited to one particular text-book, shall be on the subject as a whole. Text-books are intended to provide a basis for wider and more thorough reading in the subject, and Probationers are encouraged to pursue the more extensive study, rather than limit it to one or two works.
- 7. Any Probationer pursuing a University Course shall be entitled to exemption from subjects (1) and (4) for two years of his Probation, but such exemption shall not be granted in his third year. Examination results shall be reported immediately to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners.
- 8. Examinations in the subjects 2, (Greek or English New Testament) and 4 (General) shall be conducted in May and in the subjects 1 (Hebrew or English Old Testament) and 3 (Theology) be conducted in September.
- 9. Book List. Every Probationer shall forward to his Chairman, not later than August 15th, a Book List as specified for the year, including all Text Books read. A small committee, appointed by the March District Ministerial Committee, shall conduct a private examination in books on the submitted list and report to the Ministerial Committee of Synod.

When University work is taken by a Probationer he shall report to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners the results as soon as they are known.

QUESTION XXXIV.—What is the Report from the General Statistical Secretary?

Report of the Statistical Secretary

General:

The added column 'No. of members on roll at 30th June last year' has already proved its worth because all the District Returns were to hand by the 10th of September and in nearly every case correct, showing that when the responsibility is placed on the Circuit level, results justify the experiment.

This is the first occasion for the last seven years that the Statistical Returns have been completed early enough for inclusion in the Conference Agenda and I would like to record my appreciation to the District Secretaries for their work in this connection.

Enquiries at the end of last month to the Government Statistical Department re the Religious affiliations of the population according to the Cenus taken in April this year show that it will be about another year before this information is made available.

The questions on the statistical Forms have been simplified and yet there are circuits that refuse to answer the questions that Conference requests. For example, Circuits still return in answer to the question 'Travelling or Car Allowance'—"All exes. Paid" . . . "Conference Scale" . . . "Mileage" . . . Such answers are useless and the unfortunate part is that we can form no comparison between the costs of Travelling in Circuit or Minister's cars. It is to be hoped that Circuits return the amounts paid according to the Quarterly Statements and thus help to give a more correct answer to this question.

The new forms as approved by Conference last year were used this year and in some instances comparisons will not be possible until next year's returns come to hand.

Buildings:

Churches show a net increase of two bringing the total as at the 30th June to 448. Schoolrooms and Parsonages remain at the same figures, namely 276 Schoolrooms and 205 Parsonages.

Other Preaching Places:

Eight Districts report a decrease in the number of other Preaching places totalling 27 in all. The remaining district reported an increase of 3 making a net decrease of 24 the total now standing at 299.

Since 1951 when the total of Other Preaching Places was returned at 346 we have to-day 47 less preaching Places. After allowing for an increase of 16 Churches in that period some of which are new communities altogether the fact remains that our Methodist witness has been withdrawn from over 30 places since 1951. This fact should not be taken lightly. No doubt Synods are appraised of the situations as they concern their Districts.

Staffing:

An increase of 3 brings the total of Ministers and Probationers to 241. Home Missionaries show a decrease of 5 bringing their total to 30. Deaconnesses number 12, the same as last year. It is pleasing to note that the Local Preachers again show an increase, this year of 13 and their number now stands at 701.

Membership:

One circuit last year did not return 'inactive members'. This position has now been rectified but it means that last year's figure has had to be adjusted to arrive at the correct comparison this year.

New Members are now returned under two headings, under 20 years 822; and over 20 years 757 giving a total of 1579 New Members for the year. In addition to this figure 20 Circuits in 8 Districts reported 102 members on Probation. There still appears to be a leakage as far as Transfers are concerned. 207 members were transferred from Circuits and not received by other Circuits. After allowing for transfers in the mail, etc., the number is still far too many, showing that greater care must be exercised in this matter. Where it is possible the transfer should be in the hands of the new Circuit before the folk concerned have an opportunity to be interested in other activities.

"Members ceased to Attend" again calls for serious comment. 479 people have been returned under this heading this year.

During the last 10 years no less than 3986 people have been returned as having ceased to attend giving an average loss of 398.6 per year. This should give us cause for serious thought. We first recorded "members ceased to attend" in 1945, and since that time our total stands at 5,017—an average of approximately 418 per year.

There appears to be no end to this situation and we are well above the average again this year. It is high time that some enquiry was made into this question of lapsed membership and some efforts should be made to stop this very serious loss in Church membership.

381 members have died during the year under review.

It is pleasing to note in spite of the serious position outlined above that we have a net increase this year of 512 members bringing our total membership to 28,215.

Communicants are returned at 24,505 an increase of 1199 on last year.

Youth Returns

This is the first time that I have been able to make any comment on the Youth Returns for some years as there has always been delay in the returns arriving on time.

Our Sunday School Returns show 2932 Baptisms an increase of 10 on last year. The number of children on the cradle Roll stands at 7275 an increase of 231 on last year's figures. Children in the Beginners and Primary show a decrease of 1,038 the number being 11,025 as at the 30th June.

Increases of 582 in the Junior and 696 in the Intermediate Departments bring these figures to 8,780 and 6,234 respectively.

The number of Sunday School Teachers stands at 2,849 and this represents a loss of 171 teachers in our Sunday Schools during the year under review. The Bible Class section records increases in every department, there being 86 in the Junior, 329 in the intermediate and 158 in the Senior

sections. Bible Class Leadership has increased by 41 men and 23 women, being a total increase of 64 Leaders for the past year, and the numbers now stand at 410 men and 288 women making a total of 698 Bible Class Leaders.

Allowing for the increases in Bible Class Leadership the returns disclose the disquieting fact that we have over 100 Youth Leaders less this year than last year. No doubt this will claim the attention of the Youth Dept.

Pastoral Care:

This information should include everyone who is on the pastoral lists of our church; not merely the families of our Sunday School Scholars.

It will be some little while before we shall have anything approaching accuracy in this matter but we are at least on the road to some interesting information as to our effective contact of census declared Methodists. The 1951 Census returned 156,077 Methodists. This year our returns show 116,828 Methodists on our Pastoral Rolls. The last Maori Returns to hand was in 1954 when the number stood at 9979. This would indicate that as a Church we are contacting 127,000 Methodists, European and Maori; and there are approximately 29,000 Methodists who are out of touch with the Church altogether.

When we receive this year's Census figures and the figures for the "Pastoral Care" are a little more accurate we should be able to ascertain where more pastoral visitation is necessary and circuits will be able to plan accordingly.

Finances:

Travelling allowances show an increase of £2,468 7s 10d on last year though there are still a few circuits who refuse to state how much the travelling has cost the circuit.

Circuit Credits stand at £12,494 5s 11d a decrease of £46 0s 1d, while Circuit Debits have decreased by £143 3s 2d the total now being £1774 1s 4d.

Trust Accounts show an increase in the Credits of £6,417 14s 10d and a decrease of £506 5s 3d, the totals being—Credits £53,746 5s 2d and Debits £31,915 2s 3d.

Cars owned by Circuits show an increase of 1 to the total now being 25, while cars owned by Ministers show an increase of 6, the total being 162.

Maori Mission and Solomon Islands District Returns are not yet to hand. No doubt they will form a report for the Supplementary Agenda.

Conclusion:

The special Report as requested by last Conference was cyclostyled and sufficient copies were forwarded to District Secretaries in time for distribution at the Ministerial Synods in March. Each Minister should therefore have received his copy in ample time for the March Quarterly Meeting

My thanks are extended to Ministers on Circuit and District levels

for their co-operation this year in the matter of statistics.

Solomon Islands District Report

An increase of 18 Churches reported this year brings the total of Churches to 248. Against this increase there are eight less Other Preaching Places the number being 30 as at the 30th June. This means that there are ten new places where services are being held.

Eight European ministers and one doctor are reported for the year there being one additional minister as at 30th June.

17 Sisters are reported serving in the District and the number is the same as last year.

1 Lay Missionary, 6 Lay Workers, 7 Native Ministers, 1 Native Agriculturist remain at the same level as last year.

1 Additional Catechist brings the total to 31 as at the 30th June.

An increase of 11 Native Teachers this year brings the total to 274. 27 Native Medical Assistants are reported for the year, an increase of 2 for the year the new appointments being at Roviana and Vella Lavella.

The number of Local Preachers show a slight decrease of 3 the total

now being 227. Class Leaders total 142.

Membership returns show increases in every department: European Membership stands at 39, an increase of 3, while the Youth Roll stands at 20 with an increase of 5 and an increase of 1 Adherent brings the total

Native Membership show increases of 470 Senior, 239 Youth and 161 Adherents the totals at the 30th June being 7,815 Senior, 6775 Youth, and 5001 Adherents.

Sunday Schools show an increase of 16, the number as at the 30th June being 144; while the Number of Sunday School Scholars at 4,803 show an increase of 898 for the year.

14 Additional Day Schools brings the total to 239 and 37 additional Teachers making a total of 383 are in charge of 6,516 Day School Scholars an increase of 231 for the year.

Members and Adherents now number 19,670 showing a net increase of 880 for the year under review.

MAORI MISSION RETURNS

RESOLUTIONS

2 That to avoid discrepancies in Circuit returns arising from differing interpretations of terms, the General Secretary supply an explanatory form each year regarding the definition of terms on the Statistical Form viz., Churches, Other Preaching Places, Schoolrooms, Parsonages, etc.

3 (a) That Synod Standing Committees give careful consideration to the question of lapsed membership and efforts to reduce this serious loss.

(b) That with a view to assisting pastoral oversight of members and adherents of our church in scattered areas of the Dominion, particularly those living in rural areas and removed from a worshipping centre, the Synod Standing Committees (1) institute a roll of Methodists within the District, a copy to be sent to the nearest Circuit Minister; (2) distribute Methodist literature, including "Methodist Times", nearest Circuit magazine, missionary literature, Reports and also an annual letter summarizing Dominion and District news; (3) invite financial contributions towards the work of the Methodist Church.

QUESTION XXXV.-What are the resolutions of the Conference on the Welfare of the Church?

A-Welfare of the Church Committee REPORT FOR 1956

Lectionary:

The Lectionary for 1957-58 has been prepared, based on that issued by the British Conference, with the necessary adjustments to meet New Zealand conditions. The Committee again recommends the booklet providing for each of the selected passages a concise introduction, to be read by preachers as a preface to the prescribed Lessons. The Booklet is available from the Epworth Bookrooms (Price 1/6).

Wider Use of Laymen:

Two Resolutions of Conference were considered by the Committee. On the second of these, the proposal to create a new office named "The Circuit Lay Statistical Secretary" the Committee has no recommendation to make. After careful consideration the Committee concluded that the proposal is impracticable.

On the other proposal to consider the wider use of full-time lay employees to handle legal, accounting and administrative work within the Connexion and various Departments of the Church, we make the follow-

ing report:

The Committee believes it is highly desirable to release Ministers from accounting, legal and administrative work, when and where this can be handled by suitable laymen, in order that such Ministers devote themselves to the Ministerial and Pastoral Office. This is consistent with the implications of Ordination and faithful to the Minister's sense of Call to the Preaching and Pastoral Office. The Church should stand guard over the true function of the Ministry.

It is necessary to stress that laymen be offered positions of responsibility wherein their executive abilities could be utilised. Holding in mind also the renewed emphasis upon the Lay-Apostolate there should be ample scope for spiritual work.

Positions that Laymen might occupy in full or in part:

1. The Connexional Secretaryship.

- City Missions. Collecting of finance and much of the administrative work.
- 3. Home and Overseas Missions. By combining our Missionary work under one Ministerial head, much of the administrative work could be taken over by laymen.
- Editor-Manager of the "Methodist Times" and ultimately of the whole field of publications.
- 5. The Youth Department, Laymen may offer as Youth Directors and should be encouraged to do so.
- It should be noted that in some countries there are Theological Tutors who are Laymen.

Membership Cards:

The Committee having been asked to prepare a new and more worthy design for Membership Cards, submits designs for the consideration of Synods and Conference.

Welfare of the Ministry:

Over the past five years the Committee has consistently stated the opinion that a Welfare of the Ministry Committee is not necessary to the life of our Church, and reasons for this were given in our report for 1955. Conference has requested that the question be reconsidered. In order to test the mind of Conference the Committee recommends that the name of the present Stipend Committee be changed to that of the Welfare of the Ministry Committee, and that its functions be widened to include matters pertaining to the Welfare and efficiency of the Ministry. Questions for the immediate consideration of such a committee could include (1) An enquiry into the continuing shortage of Ministers from the standpoint of their welfare, and that of their families, and the serious frustration to ministerial and pastoral efficiency owing to existing claims upon a Minister's time. (2) The establishment of a Book Fund to provide Ministers with at least £10 worth of books per year for at least the first 20 years of their ministry. (3) That owing to the effect upon the health of Ministers resulting

from over strain, Quarterly Meetings encourage Ministers wherever practicable to take a week's holiday from Circuit work, including one Sunday, in the spring. (4) That Parsonage furnishings be brought under the oversight of a District Committee.

Conference Session "Conversation on the Work of God":

In consultation with the Law Revision Committee, thought has been in consultation with the Law Revision Confinence, thought has been given to the title of this Session of the Conference, with a view to retaining the historic associations of the Session and to create a title that adequately expresses the meaning and purpose of the Session concerned. The Committee recommends that the title be "SESSION OF INSPIRATION" AND DEDICATION."

Organised Life of the Church: (Minutes Page 65 Rec. 6).

Any research into the organised life of the Church with a view to its effectiveness must make its starting point in the conception of the Church as a Redeemed and a Redeeming Community. Due to the growing indifference on the part of the community and a hesitancy within the Church itself, this task has been increasingly difficult to realise, and this has tended to make the Church compensate by turning in on its own life in an endeavour to preserve the status quo, thus producing a Ministry and Laity busy on committees and in organisations which have little direct bearing on her real task.

Again the spiritual effectiveness is being impeded by an organisation that is top heavy for its present strength. The effective Church Membership has remained static over the past thirty years in comparison with an expanding community and the consequent increasing demands of this expansion. The following suggestions are being considered by the Committee:

1. Modification of existing organisation: We intend to look at the whole question of our Circuit system and local Church organisation with a view to some modification that will increase our efficiency and effectiveness.

2. Working within the existing organisation: How to overcome the fragmentation which occurs in the organisations within the Church, resulting in an inadequate understanding by the separate organisations of the needs of the whole Church.

3. Church Finance: Consideration of the budget system and the elimination of unrelated appeals. The relation of the budget system to the envelope system and the establishment of a tithing core in every Church. (This is being dealt with fully by a special Conference Committee).

Church Membership:

By direction of last Conference a study on Church Membership with reference to objective tests, was prepared for the Committee by Rev W. J. Morrison, M.A., and was forwarded to March Ministerial Synods. We record our thanks to Rev W. J. Morrison for his work in preparing the

Candidates for the Ministry, Deaconess Order and Other Avenues of Christian Service:

- The Committee has looked into the question of the inadequate number of Candidates offering for the Ministry, the Deaconess Order and other avenues of Christian service, and finds that indications seem to declare:
 - (a) That there is an inadequate number of Ministers today.
- (b) That there is a more adequate number of Candidates offering at
- (c) That the position is likely to be more satisfactory within a few years.
- (2) The Committee believes that an investigation should be made into the status, function and training of Deaconesses.

(3) Enquiring into the reasons for the inadequate number of Candidates for the various avenues of Church service, the Committee submits the following:

(a) A lack of a sense of stewardship of gifts and life.

(b) Modern life allows little time for quiet thought and meditation, consequently so often God's Call is unheard and unheeded. This may be a reason why so many of the Candidates come from country Circuits.

(c) There is often insufficient emphasis in preaching on life-dedication

and self-commitment.

A remedy is suggested in each of the causes named, as well as in the substance of Resolution 3 page 109 of Minutes of Conference 1955.

Recording the Number of Communicants:

The Committee gave this question careful thought and considers the present method of recording the number of Communicants to be satisfactory, and further believes that Ministers should be sufficiently in touch with their Rolls and statistical records as to be able to return correctly the number of people who attend at least one Communion service a year. The Committee therefore has no recommendation to make.

B—Spiritual Advance Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

The Committee has met in Palmerston North every two months and the meetings have been well attended.

Literature:

The Lenten Leaflet was written by the Rev. W. E. A. Carr and was extensively used throughout the Connexion. A new publication was the Advent Leaflet which was written by the Rev. R. B. Tinsley. The Board of Publications is seeking information from the circuits with regard to the use made and the general acceptance of these leaflets. leaflet for general household distribution was written by the Rev. W. S. Dawson and the committee considers this to be one of the finest of this type of leaflet available. In co-operation with the Board of Publications the Prayer Calendar was issued.

Community Year

A very comprehensive study was prepared for the March Minis-terial Synods. Various writers treated the different aspects of evangelism as applied to present day needs and conditions. The Synods were asked to plan on a district scale and to choose areas for concentrated attention. District conveners were appointed by the synods and it is hoped that in the future these conveners will be able to bring the work of spiritual advance more prominently before district and other meetings and generally draw attention to the emphases of the year. Circuits were circularised and given programmes and suggestions for action. We have been glad to hear of some experiments in outdoor evangelism and are encouraged because of an increasing number of missions being conducted in our Churches. Our Committee has available a list of names of those willing to lead missions. We would be glad to receive more offers from men prepared to do this work.

Overseas Visitor:

The visit of the Rev. Dr Donald O. Soper was the first occasion on which our Church has brought a visitor from England to serve the on which our Church has brought a visitor from England to serve the New Zealand Church only. We are sure that our people were stirred and greatly challenged by the visit. Our regret is that such visits are too short to gain all the benefits which outstanding leaders can bring us. We are sure that the doubling of the time spent in New Zealand would have won the sympathetic interest and conviction of great numbers of people. Our committee has thanked Dr. Soper for his outstanding service. We wish to draw attention to the necessity for districts and visited areas to meet the sum allocated for expenses. If, as in the case of the last visit some areas are able to do this we feel that others of the last visit, some areas are able to do this we feel that others

should be able to do so. Until the Church has devised some other and more adequate way of financing the visits of overseas people our committee will be embarrassed when deficits result.

Future Visitors:

The President-General of the Methodist Church of Australasia, is expected for a period of two or three weeks from the second week in March.

The Rev. Dr. Maldwyn Edwards hopes to arrive in New Zealand during the first week in June. He returns in mid-July.

A team of American ministers is expected for a two or three week visit during August-September. The intention is that working in pairs these American ministers will conduct four missions of one week's duration in carefully chosen places. Schools for instruction in visitation evangelism will be held in the mornings. The afternoons will be spent in visiting homes in the area with mission services and meetings in the evenings. It is hoped that all ministers and interested lay workers will be able to study and work under the guidance of these visitors.

A visit from Professor Cecil Pawson is likely.

Crusade for Christ and His Kingdom

The Crusade will end this year and our committee feels that some word should be said in summing up.

It is impossible to evaluate the influence of the Crusade on the life and work of the Church by producing facts and figures. We are confident that good has come of our efforts and that many of the emphases made will continue and grow as they are accepted and worked out in the normal activity of churches and circuits. Among the signs which promise well for the future we have noted: The increasing desire to engage in the work of evangelism and some very worthwhile efforts in this direction: The increasing worthy observance of the great festivals of the Church and the use of literature which assists in this: A more worthy attitude to membership and a higher standard of preparation for membership: an increase in the number of Leaders Meetings held and in the number of fellowship groups. Where visitation evangelism was engaged in there has been a response not only in the lives of those visited but also in the spiritual experience of those visiting. Our committee feels that the most successful year was that in which Teaching and Evangelistic Missions were held. The readiness of our people to accept instruction in the faith was something which was heartening and is a guide for future planning. In the opinion of our committee lessons to be learned from the Crusade are as follows. While we feel that the emphases made were well conceived and set out, stewardship could have been given a more prominent place and the Crusade linked with the extension work of the Church. It is felt that there is need for a much greater loyalty to plans and programmes approved by Conference and to which the whole Church ought to feel committed. Our committee feels the need for a stronger sense of responsibility in this regard. It is our belief that the successful carrying through of a campaign such as "The Crusade for Christ and His Kingdom" necessitates the appointment of a director who is able to give full time to the work. We are certain that the emphases of the crusade, membership, leadership, stewardship and visitation evangelism must be continued and urge ministers and circuits to take all possible steps to see that stress is placed on these.

At the conclusion of the Crusade we wish to place on record our thanks to all who have assisted the committee in writing material for studies and printed publications. The assistance of those who have given their time in organisation is fully appreciated. Special mention should be made of the Rev G. I. Laurenson who has been Field Representative throughout.

Future Work of The Spiritual Advance Committee:

With the close of the Crusade the work of the committee will change. After giving this matter some thought we feel that the Church can best be served by our committee emphasising some aspect of Church life or spiritual culture in each year. During 1957 our emphasis will be on the spiritual culture in each year, prayer life of our Church and people.

C-Church Council

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

The Church Council reports on matters considered at its sessions at Wallis House, Lower Hutt, on 8th and 9th May.

Synod Standing Committee. Constitution and Membership:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 69, Res, 4[b])

It was noted, as in discussion the previous year, that the present constitution is wide enough to cover all that the committee could reasonably do. There is ample power for it to work effectively. The present constitution has not been proved inadequate.

However, membership of the Committee should be not fewer than three and not more than fifteen ministers and an equal number of laymen.

It was felt that there should be a question added to the Agenda of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting asking for consideration of matters referred from the Synod Standing Committee.

Consideration could well be given to the preparation of a triennial questionnaire to Circuits from the Synod Standing Committee. This is to receive further investigation.

A question regarding the travelling expenses of members of the Synod Standing Committees or Area Sub-committees was raised, especially of those members travelling distances by car. This matter is covered by Law Book, Para. 510 (8) (c), page 129, re 'Incidental expenses of Synods.'

Size of Stationing Committee:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, pages 70f) There is no universal Methodist system or practice regarding the Stationing Committee. Any committee must be fully representative of the ministers and laymen; must be an impartial committee; must be a committee that knows the men and the circuits.

Weaknesses of the present system appear to be (a) The use of an unduly large committee of forty members to station about forty ministers; (b) Confidential matters are dealt with by the committee and the fewer who know these matters the better.

Advantages of a smaller committee would be (a) That the committee would have more experienced members and would do its work more expeditiously than a larger committee; (b) Confidential matters would be known to fewer members.

Disadvantages of the smaller committee would seem to be (a) The loss of a certain element of confidence placed in a larger committee; (b) Certain men would be deprived of the privilege of membrship of the committee.

The Voting of the Circuits indicated a desire for a change in the present size of the Committee. The majority of the Synods voted against any change.

After a full discussion the Council feels that the present size of the Stationing Committee should be retained, believing this is the mind of the Church as expressed through the Synods. The Council has no recommendation to make.

3. Time of Determining Ministerial Appointments:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, pages 67f and 70 (8a).

The Council is of the opinion there is merit in the scheme outlined in the Minutes of Conference, but after consideration refers the whole matter to the special Committee on the Business of Conference.

Bringing forward Sessions of Conference by One Day:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 70 (7e). The Council refers this matter to the Special Committee on the

5. Commencing Date of Minister's Appointment:

Business of Conference.

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 70 (8c).

There are many disadvantages in changing the date to the first Sunday in February. It should be observed that the Law must have been framed in its present form for some good reason. Inductions would be more difficult to arrange at the end of January or so early in February. Also, it would mean that ministers would be moving in one of the busiest travel weeks of the year. The Council therefore has no Recommendation to make.

6. Annual Appeal for Capital and Extension Work:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 99, Res. 4).

A memorandum before the Council showed that enormous community developments can be expected in this country during the remaining part of this century. The whole Church must be asked for a continuance of a united simultaneous effort for extension work. Our people will have to be challenged with the support of a family gift of New Zealand Methodism for new causes. We are likely to lose ground if we change the basis or the name of our special fund or appeal. After considerable discussion it was decided by the Council to recommend that the Advance Methodism appeal be continued and that each year two-thirds of the amount raised be for some special objective and that one-third be for Church Extension allocated as at present for Loans and Gifts. The special objective for 1957 would be for Hostels. A special appeal for substantial gifts apart from those received from Circuits would be organised by the N.Z.M.S.S.A. The organisation and publicity for next year to be undertaken by the present Advance Methodism Appeal committees in conjunction with the N.Z.M.S.S.A.

7. Ministers and Honoraria Paid from State and Other Sources: (Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 62, Res. 3 of 'Institutional Chaplains)

It was shown that the Church accepts and sets apart men as ministers for the full time work of the Church. A minister must not accept any outside employment for which payment is made without the consent of both his Quarterly Meeting and the President of Conference. (See Law Book, page 20, para. 123).

The COUNCIL presents the following statement regarding the question:

Conference in appointing ministers to Circuits, Departments or Institutions, pays stipends and allowances in recognition of the principle that the minister is in full time service with the Church. Where Conference also appoints a minister to serve part time, as for example as an institutional chaplain or military chaplain, in respect of which an emolument is paid from other than Church Funds, an adjustment should be made with the Circuit in relation to the amount paid by it. In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter should be referred to the Chairman of the District.

The Council also draws the attention of the Church to Law Book, para. 123, page 20, regarding the consent of ministers 'to nomination for any Parliamentary, Civic, Public Office or for any outside employment for which payment is to be received or which will involve such a measure of service as to interfere with his ministerial duties' within the Circuit. In respect to remuneration received from such employment, the above principle shall apply.

8. Preachers and Conscience:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, pages 71ff). The whole matter, together with the Synod Resolutions, was referred to the Council by Conference. It was felt that the question had received thorough consideration by Synods and that the recommendations of the Auckland Synod met the position. The Council therefore recommends the statement for adoption by Conference. Also the request from Otago-Southland Synod for clarification of Law Book, para. 207, is referred to the Law Revision Committee.

9. Use of Manpower and Amenities:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 69, Res. 3 (1) and (2).

(a) An improvement is noted in the manpower position in our Church, but until all Circuits are adequately staffed some method could be devised whereby fully staffed Circuits could assist understaffed Circuits, preferably by giving a number of preaching appointments each quarter.

(b) Consideration was given to the position of 'married' probationers. An urgent matter is the establishment of parsonages in Circuits requiring probationers so as to give continuity of ministry in such Circuits.

(c) In new housing areas there should be about two miles between Methodist Churches. Circuits should keep in mind the desirability of transferring certain members from established areas to the roll of a Church in a new area. The Council has discussed Res. 2a, b and c, page 69, Minutes of Conference, 1955, and recommends that the matters be considered by Synod Standing Committees.

(d) Thorough investigation should be made into the question of Separated Chairmen of Districts. The Council asks leave to give further

consideration to the whole matter.

10. Report on Regional Joint Committees:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 69, Res. 3(3). Chairmen of Districts reported in accord with the above resolution of Conference. In some districts Regional Joint Committees have not yet been appointed; in one or two cases they have been appointed but have not yet

met; in the other districts Committees are meeting and making a valuable contribution to inter-church understanding.

11. The Status of a Woman Minister who Marries:

There is need of a Conference policy regarding this matter. The Council believes that Conference should put into train inquiries and consideration regarding the question and suggests that a committee located in Christchurch should undertake investigations.

12. Gown for the President of Conference:

It is the opinion of the Council that the time has arrived for the Church to supply to the President on his induction into office a Gown which should be retained by him after his term of office. The General Purposes Committee and the Contingent Fund Treasurers should be asked to consider this matter and also that of an appropriate stole for the Ex-President.

13. Church Budget System:

A representative of the Wells Organisations addressed the Church Council on 'Creative Fund Raising'. It was felt that the immediate effects of the system should be considered by the Special Budget Committee. The nature of the system in any specific case should be referred to and surveyed by the Chairman of the District.

14. Loyal Churchmanship:

The Council intends to consider at its next sessions the question of the loyalty of church members and the nature of churchmanship.

- (b) That the request of the Otago-Southland Synod for clarification of Law Book, para. 207, be referred to the Law Revision Committee.

11. Use of Manpower and Amenities:

- (a) That Conference, advised by the Stationing Committee, direct certain fully staffed circuits to give a specified number of preaching appointments each quarter to certain understaffed circuits.

D-Spiritual Healing Committee

REPORT TO SYNODS AND CONFERENCE 1956

The Spiritual Healing Committee held fourteen fortnightly meetings with an average attendance of nine members. The committee undertook studies in the field of spiritual healing, persons known to the committee with specific needs were prayed for, and ministers of the committee took part in Services of Laying-on of Hands.

To give some guidance to the people of our Church on matters related to spiritual healing, to let them share in the studies of the committee, and to enable them to gain some appreciation of the issues involved and the complexities of the subject, the committee has published in the columns of the Methodist Times precis of material studied, brief articles, and assessments of available books and booklets.

The Healing Ministry of the Church:

The committee believes that a healing ministry is a proper function of the Church. Our Master sent forth His Disciples not only to preach the Word, but also to "heal all manner of sickness and all manner of disease." It was plainly the practice of the New Testament Church.

Unfortunately, spiritual healing has become for some time the practice of many of the sects, frequently with attendant undesirable features. The committee sees the reawakening, throughout the whole Church of interest in spiritual healing, as the work of the Holy Spirit, and calls upon our Methodist people to seek to fulfil the healing ministry.

Spiritual Healing in the Local Church:

It is through fellowship that God's healing power is made available for those in need. It is a ministry of the whole Church. A minister who undertakes spiritual healing in his pastoral capacity needs the support and fellowship of a group of studying and praying Christians.

Such a group, wisely led, studying together the healing ministry of Christ and present-day manifestations of God's healing grace, could bring before God the needs of men and women who seek prayer for their suffering, and at the same time themselves be given insight into His healing power by the Holy Spirit.

Organisation of Local Groups:

It is not suggested that local groups be organised from this central committee. Rather it is anticipated that small prayer and study fellowships will arise in response to particular local needs. That spontaneity is considered to be important. Any such groups should be integrated with the local Church and guided by the minister. The Spiritual Healing Committee is available for advice and encouragement.

The Laying-on of Hands:

Intercessions at services of worship for sufferers and especially at the Sacrament of Holy Communion, are recommended, and the committee notes with approval that in the proposed revised order for the Sacrament provision is made in the prayer for the Whole Estate of Christ's Church for the naming of persons in need.

But there is also a place for the more intimate ministry to the sick in which such biblical practice as the laying-on of hands can be used. This service should be entered into with the aim of bringing the sufferer into complete harmony with God.

Prior to all services for the laying-on of hands, or any other form of spiritual healing, the patient should receive instruction as to the nature and purpose of the service. Whether or not physical healing is effected, the patient should be led to expect spiritual strengthening.

Though there may be occasions when it is desirable to hold the service in the Church, and while the minister conducting the service should generally be accompanied by persons from the group which has upheld the patient's needs in prayer, it should never be in any sense a public gathering.

Spiritual Healing and Public Meetings:

The committee considers it unwise for anything in the nature of public meetings to be held for any form of spiritual healing. Such gatherings may easily be attended by dangerous forms of mass hysteria, and while good may result for a few, many may be adversely affected. The disappearance of symptoms under the emotional excitement is often mistaken for cure, and depressing relapses follow. Suggestibility may be mistaken for faith.

Co-operation Between the Ministry and the Medical Profession:

Because the healing power of God is found in medical practice the committee considers as important the meeting together of ministers, laymen, and medical practitioners in vital Christian fellowship, and believes that groups could now be formed in several centres in this country.

This development would help Christian doctors to apply spiritual insights in their practice and would tend to keep the awakening interest in spiritual healing among our people from taking irresponsible and unsound direction.

Such groups could be loosely linked with this committee and could meet for the following purposes:

- (a) To study spiritual healing—both Christ's healing ministry, and the work of the Holy Spirit in healing today.
- (b) To further co-operation between the ministry and the medical profession.
 - (c) To pray by name for persons seeking spiritual healing.
 - (d) To undertake, where requested, the service of Laying-on of Hands.

(e) To give guidance to local fellowship healing groups.

It is in such consecrated fellowship, where there is study and prayer together, that the deepest spiritual resources for healing are realised. Conclusion:

The committee is aware, from study of work overseas, and from its own experience, that spiritual healing is a very difficult subject and frequently misunderstood. Many important questions await answers. But the members of the committee gratefully acknowledge before God the deepening insights, the challenge to faith, and the experiences of the power of prayer, that have been given in the fellowship of the committee.

E-Local Preachers' Association

REPORT FOR 1956

In presenting the Annual Report of the New Zealand Methodist Local Preachers' Association for the year ended 30th June, 1956, we are mindful of the blessings and opportunities which have attended the work of our brethren during another year. We give thanks to God that we can be used in the Church as we are and to Him we give the glory.

Annual Meeting 1955:

- This was well attended and thanks are due to the Otago-Southland Branch for the excellent way in which the tea and meeting were arranged. The pressure and demands of other Conference business make it difficult to give the time and attention which is desired for adequate consideration of business at the Annual Meeting. Despite these limitations it was a satisfactory meeting. With the object of strengthening the work of the Association and making it more effective in the life and witness of the Church, the Executive submitted the following proposals for consideration:
- (a) In view of the large number of services conducted by Local Preachers throughout the country, the Association is conscious of the great importance to the Church as a whole of the standard of preaching being maintained at the highest level.
- (b) The Local Preachers' Association can do this far more effectively by means of a greater use of newsletters and the distribution of other suitable literature and preaching aids, but present funds are insufficient for the purpose.
- That permission be sought from Conference for this responsibility to be shared by the Church as a whole by either: (i) an allocation from the Combined Connexional Appeal or (ii) by the Local Preachers' Association having the benefit of an offering on Local Preachers' Sunday.
- (d) That Conference consider the eventual establishment of a Local Preachers' Department under the full or part time supervision of an ordained Minister.

Following the meeting, these proposals were circulated as part of the Minutes to all Local Preachers and Branches with an invitation to com-Minutes to all Local Preachers and Branches with an invitation to comment. There has been little response to date from the rank and file of members, but several Branches have forwarded their views. While these do not contain unanimous support for the Executive's proposals, the comments expressed will be of assistance in reporting and making recommendations to the next Annual Meeting. Whatever changes may eventuate, these will no doubt be gradual. The Executive naturally does not wish to formulate proposals merely for the sake of justifying its office or attracting attention and it recognises that no good purpose will be served by taking action without thorough prior consideration.

We pay tribute to those brethren who have been called to Higher Service during the year and give thanks to God for their work and witness. The following are the deaths which have been notified to the Executive, but this is by no means a Dominion coverage:

The number presenting for the Examinations is encouraging, but the rather high proportion of failures in December 1955 prompted the Executive to communicate with the Board of Examiners suggesting that a brief report be obtained from the Examiners in each subject. This has been agreed to. From information supplied by the Board, it is obvious that in some cases candidates do not apply themselves to the course of study as they should or require more assistance from Ministers and experienced Local Preachers. To those who have completed the written examination and complied with all other requirements for the status of fully accredited members, we offer congratulations and welcome them into the fellowship of the Association for service in preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Of the 25 members received during the year, it is indeed pleasing to record that 7 were women:—

The Association also had much pleasure in issuing Certificates and Presentation Books to two faithful preachers of long standing, who were accepted as Local Preachers by St Peters Invercargill Quarterly Meeting. The brethren are Alex R. Jordan and Hugh M. Thompson.

Book Scheme:

On the recommendation of the last Annual Meeting, the Book Scheme concession has been reduced from 50% to 20% discount. The Executive naturally regrets this step, which was necessary on account of the considerable drain which the Association subsidy was making on our income. Although considerably reduced, the new rate of 20% still offers members a helpful concession on the quota of books they are entitled to purchase each year under the scheme. It is commended to all Local Preachers, accredited or on trial. Book Lists present a problem, in that it is difficult to obtain a list which will give members a reasonably wide choice, in sufficient quantities for general distribution. This is receiving attention and it is hoped it will be possible to provide members with more information than at present.

Long Service Diplomas:

In recognition of long service as Local Preachers, we have had the privilege and pleasure of issuing Long Service Diplomas to two members during the year. They are Bros J. T. Williams of Kaitaia and J. Richardson, J.P., of Kaitangata. Both have given at least 50 years service and we honour them.

Food Parcels Scheme:

Through the Food Parcels Scheme which originated during the years of World War II, Christmas cheer has been shared with many aged and

infirm Local Preachers in England. That these gifts have been of blessing and help wherever received is obvious from the numerous letters of thanks which have come back to New Zealand. With the end of rationing in the United Kingdom it is naturally to be expected that the response to the scheme has lessened over the last 2-3 years and only two donations were received in response to the 1955 Appeal. These contributions, plus a small balance from the previous year made it possible to send £10 to the Methodist Local Preachers' Mutual Aid Association, London. This was distributed in 10/- gifts to twenty of the Association's most needy cases, all of whom have written expressing heartfelt thanks for the assistance. In closing the scheme, at least for the present, it is desired to express thanks to all members and others who have contributed so generously and made it possible to share our blessings with others in need.

Local Branches:

Recognition is recorded of the valuable work which is being carried out by Branches in arranging for preachers to be available where needed; of encouraging youth and others to qualify and serve as local preachers and in ensuring wherever possible that the offering of service which is made Sunday by Sunday is of a high and worthy standard. Although local and inter-Branch Rallies cannot be held as frequently as desired, the majority of Branches recognise the value there is to be gained in meeting as much as possible for inspiration and fellowship. On the question of travelling expenses for local preachers required to travel considerable distances either in their own or neighbouring circuits, a reminder is given that the provision of adequate means of transport and other expenses necessary for the efficient working of the Circuit are recognised by the Church in its laws as a charge against the Circuit Fund. Sec. 287 (f) and (g).

Address Lists and Central Register:

The considerable number of letters containing the Annual Report and Minutes of the Annual Meeting which were returned "Address unknown" serves to illustrate the need for members and Branches to regularly notify changes of address to the Dominion Executive. All will realise the value of correspondence reaching members while it is fresh. During the next few months, it is hoped to compile a Central Card Register from information supplied by Branches.

Financial:

The financial report indicates a somewhat stronger position than last year and there should now be no need, as was once feared, of making inroads into capital funds to meet expenses. A very helpful contribution from one Branch is gratefully acknowledged.

Location of Dominion Executive:

In accordance with the decision of the 1953 Annual Meeting, held at Wellington, the location of the Dominion Executive, at present in Wellington, is due for transfer for a three year period, commencing as from Conference 1957. It is the intention of the present Executive to propose that Dunedin be the new headquarters for that period.

Conclusion:

In concluding this Report, the Executive desires to express appreciation of the assistance and interest it has received during the year from members, ministers and all concerned with its work. In meeting regularly and discussing the wide scope of Association affairs we have endeavoured to regard the organisation as a means of serving the Church we love and glorifying God. May He help us all in this great opportunity.

F-Methodist Men's Fellowship

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

This year marks the 25th milestone in the life of the Methodist Men's Fellowship, and we bring the greetings of our President, Mr Frank Pace,

as a fitting introduction:

"How the years fly by. It certainly does not seem 25 years since our beloved friend William S. MacKay had the vision of the men of the Church banded together into one great fellowship. Looking down through the years, he saw a group of men in each Church working for their Master, and seeking through fellowship to know Him better and to love Him more. He saw these men at work, amidst their colleagues, winning them, too, for Christ. That great dream has not yet become a reality in every respect, much has been accomplished, and a great deal of work done for the Church by the men. Many outside the Church have been brought inside, finding joy and fellowship with the Master and His servants.

Still we are not satisfied, and in this Jubilee year our earnest desire is to see the founder's dream fulfilled. We want to see established in every Church a group of men, working for the Master, and seeking others for Him. I challenge the men of the Church, in the name of our Master, to strengthen their own fellowship, and then to help others into our great movement. The only hope of the world to-day is to be found in Christ Jesus. Let us see the world knows and hears the Gospel message. May God bless you all, and give you much joy in His service."

During the year, steady progress of the movement is recorded, with increased membership and deepened interest. This is shown in the practical attention given to many local Church activities. With the tremendous urge of expansion work in many districts, our members have accepted the

challenge and have given much time, thought, and labour in furthering these new causes.

"The Layman", our official paper, continues to render good service, and is a splendid means of maintaining contact with the 107 groups with approximately 2500 members on our mailing list. Good use is made in keeping groups informed of activities in various parts of the Dominion, and stressing the importance of the laity, especially in the future life of our Church.

In co-operation with the Wesley Historical Society, the Men's Fellowship sponsored the erection of a Memorial Baptismal Font in the Leigh Memorial Church at Kaeo to the memory of the wives and families of our Pioneer Missionaries. A beautiful font was designed in the workshop of the late Fletcher Wallis, himself the son of a pioneer missionary, and

was presented and dedicated at a special service held in Church last November.

Authority was given to the Overseas Mission Board to use the balance standing to the credit of the Solomon Island Tool Fund to purchase a Thicknesser and joinery tools for the use of the joiner at Roviana in the Solomon Islands. This made a very satisfactory finalising of this account.

The Men's Fellowship desire to place on record their appreciation of the splendid service rendered to our Movement by our Patron, the Vice-President of Conference, Mr Len Davis, during his year in office, and tender him our sincere thanks.

After a long, painful illness in hospital where it was found necessary to amputate one leg, our President is now at home. He still requires medical attention, and we pray that he will be sustained and comforted by the presence of the Master he loves and serves, and that he may be well enough to be with us again in the near future.

Mr Allen McKerras, President of the Auckland District, is acting President during Mr Pace's absence.

We go forward with renewed faith and prayer that our movement under the guidance of God's Holy Spirit will grow from strength to strength.

In the various districts, representatives continue to be appointed to National Council of Women, National Council of Churches, "Corso", British Sailors' Society and similar organisations. In addition, considerable social service activity is undertaken as well as hostess responsibilities for functions of a varying nature.

Reports from Districts during the year indicate a live interest and guilds are well represented at the District meetings of the Guild Fellowship. Individual guilds are approaching their District Executives asking for assistance. As a result of a request, the New Zealand Executive was asked to prepare a Devotional Guide for the use of those leading Devotions at Guild Meetings, and in particular, for the benefit of newly formed guilds. The possibility of sending a woman, representing women, to overseas conferences, was also to be kept in view.

Travel difficulties militate against full representation at District Meetings. In some districts the meetings are held in various places to spread the travel and the interest. This practice has much to commend it.

Any guild in a district where a Fellowship has not yet been formed, may affiliate direct with the New Zealand Executive and receive the President's letters, etc., as well as help at apy time.

At the Annual Meeting the incoming executive was asked to investigate the position of Fireside and other kindred groups and report to the next Annual Meeting.

All guilds give unstinted service to our Methodist Church and we pray that they may always keep before them the Pledge and Prayer of the Women's Guild Fellowship.

QUESTION XXXVI.—What are the Resolutions respecting Sunday Schools and the Youth of the Church?

A-Youth Department

By the Grace of God our Department has spent a busy and useful year. It has been a pleasure for all concerned to share in a glad task. Helping to give our young people a Faith to live by is always exciting, and doubly so when there is an evident response.

As a Board we rejoice in our responsibility, and we gladly share with the whole church her mission towards her young members.

Staff:

During the year both the Rev R, H. Allen and Miss D. M. Jones found it necessary to relinquish their position as Directors. The latter half of the year has therefore placed an added task before the Senior Youth Director and the office staff. Channells have been kept open and we feel that all will be in readiness for the Rev W. F. Ford to begin his duties. With the appointment of Mr Ford, the Rev A. J. Johnston, who has served as Senior Youth Director in a part time capacity for the past four years, retires from office and the Board desires to record its very warm appreciation of the services he has rendered. He has had the unenviable task of acting as Senior Youth Director whilst being Superintendent of the Wellington South Circuit, and he has handled this difficult situation with credit to himself and benefit to the church. He retires with the goodwill and thanks of the Department.

Policy:

It is the policy of the Board to appoint as soon as practicable further directors or workers.

Their appointment will doubtless be affected by the decisions of the Conference relative to recommendations of the Christian Education Committee. Accordingly the Board awaits the outcome of the Conference, and the actual appointment of Mr Ford, before putting into effect its policy with regard to Directors and other major policy.

Publications:

In addition to the production and distribution in co-operation with Australia, of the Graded Lesson material and Bible Class Syllabus, the Department has kept a steady stream of helpful material flowing towards Circuits and L.Y.C.'s. Camp and School Studies, Avenues of Service Leaflets, Orders of Service, Home and Family Literature, Badges, film strips slides and records were constantly in demand.

Christian Education Handbook. The monthly Packet has been found very useful. In response to a steady demand for more copies, and for a regular monthly publication that would give teaching material, departmental helps, and movement news, the Board has issued the new monthly Christian Education Handbook. In this we aim to combine the best from the old 'Christian Education' Quarterly and the monthly Packet. This new publication which we commend to all the Church, is a loose-leaf format, and designed to file monthly into a folder, thereby building up a resource book of both the theoretical and practical aspects of Christian Education. It will also serve as a link within the Movement.

Christian Education Conference:

This Committee reports direct to Conference. The Board, has naturally a keen interest in the work of this Committee. A strong representation attended the Conference. The field of Christian Education is extending and the Board supports the church in this move.

Youth Conference and Convention:

We report a most successful Conference and Convention held at John McGlashan College, Dunedin. Over 200 young Methodists attended. A feature of the Conference was the method whereby the Conference in groups prepared its own study from Scripture references and questions provided. Also a feature, was the official visit paid to the Presbyterian Conference at Oamaru, and a return visit by the Presbyterian officials.

A holiday tour (now a feature of all Conferences) followed, through the scenic parts of the South Island. Mr H. W. Beaumont was in charge and reported most enthusiastically of the character of the tourists and the conduct of the tour. Bookroom:

The year has been a very busy one, and as an early venture, a most successful one. The Connexion is gradually becoming aware of the facilities offered. This reflects itself, not only in an increased turnover, but in a growing correspondence. Also, as interest increases more and more lines are asked for. This, in turn means in the initial stages more work for a proportionate return. The Bookroom has tried to meet the tastes and requirements of the Church as well as limited experience could gauge. It may be said that in an endeavour not to overstock, because of our limited resources and storage space there has been understocking, and some lines have sold out before the demand was met.

Three aspects of the enterprise need close attention at the present time,

namely, staffing, advertising and premises.

We feel that the net results of the year's trading amply justify the Conference's decision to set up Epworth Bookroom (Wellington), and there is good reason to believe that not only is the financial position satisfactory, but that a real service is being rendered the Connexion in this area. Everywhere the name of the Bookroom is held in high regard. It is now apparent that there is ample room within the Connexion for two Bookrooms. Each keeps within the limits of its own respective area.

Ecumenical:

The Department carries its full share of responsibility here. A Conference of all Youth Groups within the N.C.C. is planned for Palmerston North this year, and our Annual Convention will be held within the framework of this ecumenical gathering.

Committees:

The Leadership Training Committee located in Christchurch reports a year of full activity. We are well served in this Committee, under the leadership of Rev P. Stead. Our Leadership Schools and Leadership Training programme are still a major part of our work. The standard is being well maintained. The National Committee on Church Home Relationships situated in Auckland is increasing in importance. It works in a field that is being recognised as of paramount importance to the Church. We see for it a future filling a real need in our Church life.

The Home Sunday School and Bible Class under Rev W. A. Burley and Miss N. Tiddy report increased rolls with the highest totals on record—to these people we owe much.

With the facilities provided by the Bookroom, and the general literature now readily available on recreation and leisure, the National Committee on Recreation and Leisure was disbanded during the year and its stock transferred to Epworth Bookroom (Wellington).

The C.Y.M.M.:

With the passing of the years the vision and the wisdom of Rev C. T. Symons and those who worked with him is being increasingly evident. The framework of the C.Y.M.M. serves our New Zealand Church well. It is comprehensive, democratic, regular in pattern and is well suited to the present rising emphasis within the Church upon the unity of the congregation. The Board feels that in any enlargement of the scope of Christian Education the C.Y.M.M. must remain substantially an entity as at present.

Christian Standards:

Last year's Convention received with enthusiasm the Boards proposals for the replacement of 'Pledged Membership' within the C.Y.M.M. by 'Christian Standards'.

The basic difference is that under 'Christian Standards' the total membership are confronted on joining the Bible Class, and on regular subsequent occasions, with the standards and expectations of the Movement. It is proposed, by wall text and personal card to keep these

Christian Standards always before all members , and continually press for a committed life for every member.

Order of St Stephen:

This aspect of our C.Y.M.M. programme continues to attract attention from other denominations, in New Zealand and overseas. Within our church it provides a real avenue of lay service, with a strong challenge to sacrifice. The roll of members continues to grow. Four members are serving during the present year—in Circuit work, in our Maori work and two on our Foreign Mission field.

Personal

Miss P. Yearbury is enjoying a year's leave of absence. She is utilising some of her time in making contacts overseas for the Board. Her place has been ably filled by Miss Elwyn Hall. Miss Isobel Bennett as manager of the Bookroom serves us admirably. The success of our new venture is largely due to her ability, energy and courtesy.

The entire office staff have continued to work most harmoniously and

give unstintingly of their time and overtime to the Church.

The office continues to provide a meeting place and amenities for the Connexion. We are always happy to meet Methodists old and young who are passing through Wellington.

Summary of Statistics:

In conclusion we offer our gratitude for the manner in which our assistance is received by the Circuits. We have a task that can only be done together. We rely upon local co-operation and enthusiasm.

B—Christian Education Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

(MINUTES OF CONFERENCE, 1955, PAGE 82)

This special Committee met at Wallis House on May 9th, 10th and 11th. It began its work on ground well prepared by the preliminary conference on our future policy with regard to Christian Education, held at the same place last year. The report of last year's conference submitted to the Church Conference in 1955, and unanimously endorsed, sets out much of the theoretical aspect of the subject giving aims and objectives and some indication of the requirements of a good curriculum.

Consequently, this year's meeting of the Committee began on the complementary note of the more practical aspects of the subject reviewing the field of operations, assessing our efficiency, and considering practical suggestions whereby we can best meet the needs of the new day.

The Church was well and widely represented, from all sections of Church life responsible for Christian Education. Furthermore there was a marked spirit of goodwill and helpfulness throughout. All the sections of the Church concerned accepted the task as a combined responsibility-Christian Education is the job of the whole Church, all the time. Under the Chairmanship of the President of the Conference and the direction of the Senior Youth Director the committee presents, unanimously, the following report and recommendations.

CONFERENCE FINDINGS

The conference was confronted with facts which revealed:

- 1. That three out of five attending our Sunday Schools do not become members of the Church.
- 2. That despite the sacrificial service of many of our teachers and leaders the Church is forced to use many untrained and immature persons.
- 3. That it is apparent from statistics that even allowing for the increasing pressures of competing loyalties at this age, our educational

processes become increasingly ineffective from the age of eleven to adult-hood.

- 4. That the children who are lost to us, having received only an immature view of Christianity, are in later years among the hardest people to win for Christ and His Church.
- 5. That there is an all too frequent divorce between the Sunday School and the worshipping Church with the result that the Sunday School is often regarded as an end in itself.
- 6. That this mistaken view of the Sunday School has encouraged parents to evade their responsibility of transmitting religion to their children.

The experience of the Youth Department and its Directors indicates that this situation cannot be met solely by attempts to improve the efficiency of the existing system, it calls for a new and more comprehensive approach.

This demand will be met only by the inclusion of a system of Adult Christian Education which should help arrest this serious loss, offer effective training for teachers and leaders, encourage and inform parents in assuming their religious responsibilities, and ensure the continuing growth of all in the Christian life.

To this end we recommend:

- 1. That a Department of Christian Education be established within the Church to include the present Youth Department.
 - 2. That the immediate staffing of the Department be:
- (a) A Senior Director who shall be the chief executive officer responsible for the general direction of the work of the Department.
- (b) A Director who shall be responsible for the provision of resource material for every aspect of the work.
- (c) A Director of Adult Educational activities to implement and develop this phase of the work.
- (d) It is envisaged that as the work develops Area Directors will be appointed as required and available.
- 3. The staff of the department may be either Ministerial or Lay appointments.
 - 4. This Department shall be responsible for:
- (a) The work of the Church among young people through public worship, Sunday School, Bible Class, Week-day Activities and home teaching.

(b) The fostering of the C.Y.M.M.

(c) The provision of a programme of adult education.

It is recognized that the full educational work of the Church at the local level cannot be done through the agency of this Department. As at present, aspects of this work will continue to be done through the Home Mission and Foreign Mission Departments, Board of Publications and Spiritual Advance Committee. The training of the ministry is also a very important factor in this regard. In order to secure the highest standard of planning and overall co-operation it is recommended that there be an annual Conference of all sections of the Church working in these fields to plan a Policy and generally recommend action in the total field of Christian Education.

Also because of the enlarged field of operation for which this Department will be responsible a Board fully representative of all sections of the work will be required, including where possible representatives of related Boards and Committees.

It is recommended further that at the local level the necessary oversight would be given of a developing programme of Christian Education through the Leaders' Meeting working in close co-operation with the L.Y.C.

Immediate objectives appear to be:

1. That the Department quicken the Churches interest in the need for Adult Education particularly emphasising group fellowship as a teaching method.

ing method.

2. While our Sunday Schools and Bible Classes are at present well served by our Syllabus the Department provide adequate resource material of sound scholarship on the Biblical and Doctrinal aspects of our Faith for Adult Groups.

3. This new approach be fostered within existing Church groups.

Conclusion:

The Committee has every confidence in submitting this report, as it is aware of a growing interest throughout the Church in Christian Education. It senses a deepening conviction that this matter is the concern of us all.

It is emphasised again that this programme is the responsibility of the whole Church. The Minister in his function as Preacher, Pastor and Teacher holds a key position of responsibility, but in all aspects urgent efforts should be made to develop lay leadership.

QUESTION XXXVII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference in regard to Public Questions?

A-Public Questions Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

Monthly meetings have been held. The major items on the agenda are referred to in the report.

The Committee has been very conscious of the loss it sustained with the transfer of the Rev J. D. Grocott who had been Convener for ten years. His long experience and many personal contacts were invaluable.

(1) Penal Reform:

Under the guidance of the Rev L. C. Clements the Committee has examined New Zealand's penal policy. Significant changes, which merit the study and support of Christian people, have been made. The Committee will continue its study of the matter and, later, make recommendations.

(2) Immigration:

(1955 Minutes, p.88.)

The present basic policy on immigration was clearly defined by the Minister on 25th June, 1956. It is to bring in the type of people able to make some contribution to national development and production of essential goods; and to adopt the Immigration Advisory Council's recent recommendations that assisted immigration be reduced to 5000 annually and other immigration to 5000, compared with the previous total target of 15,000. The number actually admitted for the year ended 31st March, 1956 was 11,442.

European Refugees: Inquiries made received the reply that no consideration could be given to these special categories. They must apply and undergo the same selection tests as other would-be immigrants. An indication has, however, been given that, if the Inter-Church Council on Public Affairs would sponsor them, the authorities would favourably consider granting permits to ten refugee families.

Asian Immigrants: No progress has been made on the suggestion of a quota system for Asian immigrants. As for a number of past years any Asiatic may apply but the reply is usually negative. More favourable consideration is given to the immediate relatives of Indians or Chinese at present living in New Zealand.

Naturalised Citizenship: The law having not been amended since 1908 is now under review. There is no intention of granting automatic rights of permanent residence in New Zealand to people naturalised in other Commonwealth countries.

Further, anyone naturalised in New Zealand is at a disadvantage compared with New Zealand born citizens:

(a) If, within 5 years of naturalisation he is convicted and serves imprisonment of 12 months or more, he is liable to lose his citizenship.

(b) If leaving the country to reside temporarily in a Non-Commonwealth country his application for extension beyond 5 years may not be granted.

(c) Rights of naturalisation would be lost if the person applied for naturalisation in another country.

(In no case would naturalised citizenship be taken away from a person who formerly was stateless.)

The Committee believes that the Church should continue to press for a more compassionate approach to this whole matter of immigration and that Christians should be prepared, if necessary, to accept any consequent reduction in their standard of living.

(3) State Aid for Roman Catholic Schools:

Because of the urgency of this matter the following statement enlarging on the resolution of last Conference was published in the "Methodist Times" under the name of the President. The attention of all Ministers has since been drawn to it and suggestions made for acquainting our people with the issue. A further article for wider distribution is being prepared for the Committee by the Rev J. Silvester. The statement is now presented for adoption by Synods and Conference.

Methodist Statement on State Aid to Private Schools

i. The Methodist Church approves and supports the principle of a single national system of education. Such a system is in the best interests of 'sound learning, equal justice, national unity and a broad Christianity'.

ii. When for their own reasons Churches, or other interested parties, establish private schools, the costs involved should be carried by those who avail themselves of the provisions thus created. Any departure from this principle can result only in a resurgence of community sectionalism and Church sectarianism, together with a decline in the strength of the single national system of education. These dangers should be strenuously avoided.

- iii. In actual fact all private schools already may receive considerable "state aid" in terms of equipment, textbooks, milk, transport and other items. Any extension beyond these limits is neither desirable nor warranted.
- iv. It should be clearly understood that there is a distinct difference between "state aid" for private schools and religious instruction in state schools. Care must be taken not to confuse these two issues in any discussion on the subject of "state aid". In opposing the former the Methodist Church does not automatically give its support to the legal secularism which is an integral part of the present national system of education.
- v. The Methodist Church believes that the present national system of education cannot be regarded as fully adequate until legal and practical provision is made within the system to impart knowledge concerning the nation's total cultural heritage, which includes the Bible, the Christian Faith, and Christian ethical standards. Such knowledge can best be imparted through a single national system of education which recognises the rightful place of the Christian heritage of the nation.
- vi. In the event of Methodist people being asked to support any action "on behalf of all private schools providing secular education for New Zealand children, and asking for a just disbursement of tax proceeds to cover the cost of such education", or for a Committee of Inquiry to report on such matters, it is pointed out that the Methodist Church has not sponsored any such action. It is believed that the true ends of faith equality, justice and freedom can best be served through a single national system of education which makes provision for the complete education of every child on a non-sectional basis.

(4) Capital Punishment:

On the eve of the Parliamentary debate a letter was sent to all Members of Parliament quoting the resolution of last Conference and drawing attention to the main issues involved. The following quotation summarises the representations made: "In opposing Capital Punishment we are aware of the difficult problem we are handing over to the State. But we believe that it is possible to uphold the authority of the law, protect society and lay responsibility on the criminal without resort to Capital Punishment. Such an approach leaves opportunity for reformative treatment and the acknowledgment that Society shares in the criminal's guilt."

The proposal to hold a referendum has been examined and the Committee has written to the Minister of Justice urging the Government to reconsider its decision. It will be impossible adequately to inform the people of the complex facts and conflicting points of view which need to be taken into account before coming to a decision. And on the past unfortunate history of this question it will be difficult to avoid the serious mistake of deciding the referendum according to party politics. The decision as to whether people should live or die should be decided on its own merits and not be confused with the other issues involved in party politics.

(5) The Christian Sunday:

It was clear during the discussion at the 1955 Conference that there is the need for some clarification of the Church's attitude to the Christian Sunday. The following statement is presented, not as a complete exposition, but for consideration by, and the guidance of, our people.

The Christian Sunday

- The Christian Sunday is not based on the Jewish Sabbath described in the Old Testament. Neither is it bound by the petty restrictions which Sabbatarianism has attempted to impose.
- ii. Christians should enjoy Sunday as the day of their Lord's Resurrection. They have always met on that Lord's Day because their love for Him drew them together for fellowship with Him and with one another.

iii. The chief purpose, therefore, of the day is public worship and instruction in the Faith. Christians cannot, without loss, forego their privilege of joining together for these purposes.

iv. The day can well be used to strengthen family ties. By careful planning on the part of parents, children should be able to remember the day, not for its prohibitions, but for the positive enjoyment the day held.

v. Christian people could well make greater use of the day for service to such sections of the community as the sick, lonely, and young people in hostels and rooms.

vi. Without wishing to legislate for the community the Church believes that the gradual destruction of the specific nature of Sunday as a day of worship, service, rest and re-creation, cannot be for the good of the community. There is room in the day for the private enjoyment of any indoor or outdoor activity which does not offend the essential spirit of the day, which is a day of worship. But the Church warns the community of the danger to its warfare of organised Sunday sport and entertainment. Man's spiritual and social wellbeing demands a day free from the activity and strain of other days. It is recognised that some Sunday work is necessary to maintain essential services, yet the community should guard against the increase of work done for private gain or higher production.

(6) Kenya:

After studying a great deal of material, including some obtained from Kenya, the Committee felt unable to publish articles in the "Methodist Times" as requested by last Conference. Instead, the attention of the Editor has been drawn to articles in other papers written by qualified people nearer the scene and suitable for publication in New Zealand. It is intended to continue this action.

(7) Asia:

Believing with the Evanston Assembly that the Church and the Government have a responsibility to endeavour to ease international tension, the following resolution was sent to the Minister of External Affairs:

"This Committee believes that the refusal of some nations to grant, at least, de facto recognition to New China is adding unnecessarily to international tension. We note that within SEATO there are several nations that have established some form of diplomatic relations with China and we consider that relations with India and rising Asian nationalism would be improved by other nations taking the same step.

We therefore urge the Government to take the earliest convenient opportunity of raising the matter in the councils of the Commonwealth and SEATO.

We also recommend that, in view of the recent admission to the United Nations of a number of countries, including some with undemocratic governments, New Zealand should, at the next Assembly support the consideration of the admission of China so that the U.N. might be more truly an international forum."

This action was taken after consulting the Methodist World Peace Committee. Some points arising out of the Minister's reply are being taken up by the Committee.

(8) Football Pools:

The Committee has expressed to the Minister its gratification that the Government has been able to prevent the entry into New Zealand of British Football Pools.

(9) Inter-Church Council on Public Affairs:

This council continues to deal with certain public questions and to make representations in the name of all the Christian Churches. Matters considered this year have included compassionate immigration, exemption from duty of film strip projectors, Chaplains to migrant ships, juvenile deliquency and film censorship regulations. A request is being made that

the Women's Auxiliary should cease to function and that representation on the Council be enlarged to allow for the appointment of at least one woman among the representatives from each Church.

(10) The N.Z. Council for Christian Education:

The appointment of the Rev W. P. B. Gamlen as successor to the Rev J. D. Grocott in the office of General Secretary provides a continuity of capable and devoted leadership. District Committees are now formed and working in most parts of the Dominion. This year has seen the completion and publication of the "Handbooks for Teachers" and the "Activity Books" for class expression work. These should make the work in schools more effective. There continues to be an encouraging number of enrolments for the Certificated Course for voluntary teachers.

The Council is now turning its attention to the Post-Primary Schools. Much good work is being done in many places but more can be accomplished when the Council is able to provide suitable material and guidance.

The Council has placed on record its appreciation of the services rendered by the Rev H. L. Fiebig as President during the past two years, and of the outstanding contribution made to the work by the Rev J. D. Grocott as General Secretary.

- 1. That the Report be received and adopted.
- 2. That a grant of £25 be made to the Committee from the Contingent Fund.
- 3. Immigration: (a) Conference learns with pleasure that the Government is now willing to make arrangements for some refugee families to come to New Zealand and assures the Government of the Church's willingness to assist in their settlement.
- (b) Conference declares its conviction that the refusal of New Zealand to accept immigrants from Asia is an un-Christian attitude to our neighbours and is likely to increase suspicion and mistrust. We urge the Government to allow entrance to at least a quota of Asian immigrants.
 - 4. State Aid: i. That the Statement be adopted
- ii. That the Public Questions Committee be asked to consider what is the nature of a Christian Education System.
- 5. The Christian Sunday: That the Statement be received and commended to Church groups for study.
 - 6. Capital Punishment: We strongly urge upon the Government:-
- (1) That this matter should be the subject of an impartial committee of inquiry, and not of a national referendum.
- (2) That if in opposition to this principle, the Government does decide to hold a referendum, it is essential that such a referendum should be completely dissociated from a General election.
- (3) That the Resolution of Conference, 1955 Minutes, page 88 Rec. 7 (a) and (b) be reaffirmed.
- (a) Believing that Capital Punishment violates the Christian principle of the sacredness of human life, and is out of harmony with a modern civilised state, Conference urges the Government to repeal this provision of the Act.
- (b) Conference urges our people to do their utmost in supporting all efforts directed toward the abolition of Capital Punishment.
- 7. Inter-Church Council: That the Constitution of the I.C.C. be altered to give each Church the right to appoint up to 4 members with a view to adequate representation of men and women.

That the representatives on the I.C.C. be the Wellington District Chairman, Convener Public Questions Committee, and Mr A. E. Hurley.

- 8. Council for Christian Education: (a) That representatives on the Council be the Chairman of the Wellington District, Senior Youth Director, Rev J. D. Grocott and Mr G. F. Briggs.
 - (b) That a grant of £200 be made from the General Connexional Appeal
- 9. Source Material: Because it is often difficult to obtain adequate and authorative source information before holding discussion groups on controversial issues such as the Capital Punishment issue it is suggested that the Public Questions Committee be asked:—
 - (a) To publish in the Methodist Times a bibliography relating to each

issue referred to it by Conference.

- (b) To make available on request, a list of source material on issues other than those mentioned in (a) and that this availability be publicised throughout the Church.
- 10. International Affairs Committee: (1) That the Public Questions Committee in consultation with the World Peace Committee investigate the possibility of the establishment of an International Affairs Committee of the church, which would inform the Church on current affairs.
- (2) That the Editor of the Methodist Times be asked to provide that articles be published in each issue of the Methodist Times on International Affairs.
- (3) That the Board of Publication print in pamphlet form the various statements and pronouncements of the Conference on major issues.
- 11. China and the United Nations: So that the United Nations Organisation should be more truly an international Forum, Conference urges the Government that New Zealand should at the next assembly of the United Nations, support the admission of the de Facto Government of China.
- 12. Needy People: That Conference: (1) View with appreciation the assistance given through the New Zealand Government to the needy people of the world through the Colombo Plan and the United Nations agencies.
- (2) Urge the Government to increase substantially assistance on behalf of these people, in view of New Zealand's relatively high standard of living.
- (3) Urge the Methodist people to support such a policy of increase of assistance.
- (4) That the Public Questions Committee prepare a statement for presentation to Conference outlining practical steps that may be taken to ensure action regarding positive channels of greater assistance to the undeveloped countries of the world.

13. Lottery Method of Government Bonds:

That Conference place on record its objection to the lottery method of Government Bonds and that the Public Questions Committee be vigilant in making the Church's attitude known to the Government should any such proposals be forthcoming.

14. Child Welfare:

- (a) That the Public Questions Committee secure from the Department of Mental Hygiene and the Child Welfare Division information concerning ways in which the Church may co-operate with their institutions and district officers in the care of the mentally ill, and the well being of children.
- (b) That Conference commends to our people the field of Christian service open to those who provide homes for State wards.

15. Religious Liberty in Spain:

(a) (1) That Conference learns with deep concern of the infringements of religious liberty in Spain by the closing earlier this year of the Protestant

Theological Seminary in Madrid and the failure of the authorities to take as yet, such action as will enable the Seminary fully to recommence its work; and more recently, the forcible removal of several thousands of Bibles from the Bible Society's headquarters in Madrid. Conference strongly protests against such action especially in view of Spain's recent admission to the United Nations, and requests the Government to make urgent representations to the Government of Spain. (2) That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the United Nations Association in N.Z.

(b) Latin America: That the Public Questions Committee seek information concerning the situation in Latin America.

16. Sunday Trading:

That Conference is opposed to increased provision for trade on Sundays. It views with concern the fact that since recent legislation has permitted an increased number of articles to be sold on Sundays and the apparent lenient approach by Magistrates to applications for further facilities, Sunday trading has greatly accelerated, with the possible development of a Continental Sunday.

17. Students from Indonesia:

- (a) That Conference request the N.C.C. to arrange with member Churches, in consultation with the colleges where possible, to invite suitable students from Indonesia to undertake theological study in N.Z.
- (b) That Conference refer to the Theological College Council the suggestion of inviting suitable students from Indonesia for theological training in Trinity College.

18. International Situation:

Conference considers that the International situation in the Middle East and Hungary is of sufficient gravity to warrant personal consultation between the leaders of the State and Representatives of the Churches. Accordingly after discussions with the Representatives of the Presbyterian Assembly, Conference recommends that further immediate action be referred to the Inter-Church Council on Public Affairs, with the request that the Council meet the Prime Minister at the earliest possible moment.

We suggest that among other things the Council:-

- (a) Assure the Prime Minister and the Government of the prayers of the Church;
- (b) Express to the Prime Minister the deep concern of the Churches at the march of events, giving reasons for this concern.
- (c) That we recommend to the Government the necessity of supporting the United Nations Organisation in its intention to uphold international law, and create the conditions of peace.
- (d) Seek information from the Prime Minister on aspects of the situation which raise the issues of International morality and collective security.
- (e) Inform the Churches, through the Press and Church papers, of the result of the consultation and advise the relevant committees of the Churches on any further action which should be taken.

19. Social Security Benefits:

That the M.S.S.A. investigate the adequacy of present Social Security Benefits and if in their judgment such provision is inadequate they make representations to the appropriate authorities.

20. That the Committee for 1957 be as printed on page 12 herein.

B-Methodist World Peace Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

The Committee has met six times during the year. Consistent contacts have been maintained with the Public Questions Committee; the Methodist Board of World Peace, U.S.A. and the Regional Representatives. The Youth Board and the Citizenship Committee of the British Methodist Conference have also been corresponded with in matters affecting the Committee.

The following matters have been given consideration:

Film-"More For Peace":

At our request last year the Religious Film Society of New Zealand ordered from U.S.A. the film "More for Peace." This film is now to hand and is available for hire at current rates. The Committee recommends this film for its message, photography and appeal.

Church Peace Posters:

In conjunction with the Epworth Bookroom, Wellington, arrangements have been made for the sale of these posters from their Bookroom. Samples will be available at Synods and Conference:

As directed by last Conference a list of books and articles on this subject has been compiled and appears in the recommendations.

Comprehensive Statement:

The British Conference is preparing a statement to replace that of 1933 on Peace and War, and the 1936 Declaration on the Church and Peace. We have already received the report which the Committee is to present to the Conference in July, in which the Committee is asking for another year to enable it to complete its work. We feel that this statement of British Methodism will be worth waiting for, and in the meantime suggest that the Evanston Statement be studied by our Church.

Construction of World Peace Committee:

In conjunction with the Law Revision Committee, we have agreed upon a constitution to be included in the Book of Laws. The Law Revision Committee is including the wording of the Constitution in its report.

World Federalist Movement:

At the request of Conference we have examined the literature of the above movement and are of the opinion that, whilst its total aim is world peace, it does not place sufficient emphasis on the Christian view of God and Man. Hence its approach is largely political. A central plank in its platform is the establishment of a "police army" to control belligerents. This, in the last analysis, means peace maintained by armed force, and this, though a distinct advance on the present international arms race, yet falls short of the ideal peace which, as followers of Jesus Christ, we are pledged to pursue.

Action for Peace Column:

For some unaccountable reason, material sent forward for this column in the "Methodist Times" has not regularly reached the paper. Enquiries from the Editors and the contributors have failed to solve the problem. However, we trust that more regular contributions will appear in the future.

Conclusion:

In conclusion we commend the cause of World Peace to your prayers believing that only by persistent and earnest prayer can we be fitted to play our part in this great cause.

2. The Consequences of Nuclear Warfare:

- a. That Conference draw the attention of the Government to the anxiety of the Methodist people at the consequences of total war as they have been outlined by scientists. The total destruction of present civilisation is the fearful possibility of the use of nuclear weapons. The prospect of allout nuclear warfare staggers the imagination. Conference is therefore alarmed to learn that there are authorities who believe that a war of nuclear weapons can be contained within territorial boundaries. The development of nuclear weapons makes fear a predominant characteristic of this age. An enduring peace can never be built on Fear.
- b. That Conference request the Government to seek through the United Nations a pledge from the nations to refrain from the threat and the use of nuclear weapons and all other weapons of mass destruction in all circumstances. And in addition asks that the manufacture of nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass destruction be prohiibted, and that bomb tests be discontinued.
- c. That Conference request the Government to give adequate publicity to the authoritative statements of scientists and nuclear research experts concerning the devastating results of nuclear bomb tests.

10. Christians and Peace:

- (a) That Conference remind the Methodist people that the immediate responsibility of Christian people is to bring the transforming power of Jesus Christ to bear upon the hearts of men. As stated in the Evanston report of the World Council of Churches—Christians "must pray more fervently for peace, repent more earnestly of their individual and collective failures to further world order, and strive more urgently to establish world contacts for reconciliation, fellowship and love".
- (b) That the Board of Publications consult the World Peace Commission of the American Methodist Church with a view to securing and distributing their material.
 - 12. That the Committee be as printed on page 13 herein.

C—Temperance Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

1. Venue and Personnel:

As instructed by Conference the Committee was constituted by the Standing Committee of the South Auckland District Synod, and consists of eleven members and one corresponding member, under the chairman-ship of the Rev. S. J. Werren.

There were no specific matters remitted to the Temperance Committee by last Conference, and we have felt that this year's work would of necessity be exploratory. The following questions have been studied:

2. Temperance Education:

The importance of a sound educational approach to the teaching of Temperance cannot be over-stressed, and the committee has made further investigations into the actual teaching on this subject given in the day schools. While a detailed survey was not desirable it does appear from our enquiries over a limited area that one thing which could be done to aid teachers to provide this instruction, would be the compilation of a suitable handbook on the subject. This would need to be strictly factual and within the range of the Primary School Syllabus as set out in the 1955 Minutes of Conference, page 91. Provided there was no suggestion of propoganda there seems no good reason why such a handbook should not be approved by the educational authorities for optional use. A resolution on this point is appended and the committee is carrying on discussions with local teachers.

An investigation of Temperance films is being carried out and later in the year the committee hopes to be able to circulate to Ministers a list of films which it has viewed and can recommend with confidence. In the past there has probably been some hesitation on the part of Churches to use this means of temperance education, because a few examples have been

of rather poor quality.

There was apparently some misunderstanding over the preparation of a study on Temperance for our Methodist young people, as directed by the 1954 Conference (Resolution 3b, page 83), and this has not yet been completed. The work on this study is now definitely in hand and we hope that it will be ready for publication before very long.

The committee would like to commend to the Church the splendid work in Temperance Education already being carried out by the Boys'

Brigade and Girls' Life Brigade.

3. Trust Control:

The committee feels that while a factual report on Trust Control has been brought before the Conference, we have not yet as a Church sorted out the question of principle sufficiently to formulate our Methodist attitude towards this new factor in the liquor trade. There appear to be three conceivable attitudes on the issue of Trust Control:

(a) That Trust Control will largely remove the abuses of the liquor trade inherent in brewery control, and thus meet our Christian requirements. (This would of course represent a departure from our traditional policy.)

(b) That while prohibition of the liquor traffic must remain our ultimate objective, Trust Control is a step in the right direction, and is more practicable as an immediate objective.

(c) That our ultimate objective must remain the prohibition of the liquor traffic, and Trust Control is a dangerous form of compromise which would undermine the true temperance cause.

The committee has set itself as a long term project to study this issue more fully with a view to bringing down a statement to the 1957 Conference.

4. The 1957 Liquor Poll:

It seems unlikely that there will be any change in the ballot paper presented at the next national liquor poll, and therefore it should be pointed out that whatever are the pros and cons of any other form of control, the only practical vote against the present system of liquor control in the meantime, is a vote for Prohibition.

5. Questionnaire to Ministers:

The effectiveness of the Church's temperance policy is always dependent on its implementation at the local level and the committee felt that

the time was opportune for us to obtain an expression of opinion on our declared policy, by those who are largely responsible for carrying it through. To this end, a comprehensive questionnaire on temperance policy was prepared and circulated to all Ministers, Probationers, Home Missionaries and Deaconesses in the active work. At the time of the compiling of this report only about half the questionnaires have been returned, but the committee is studying the replies received and when there are sufficient to hand will collate the answers and report in due course.

Alcoholism and the Drink Problem: While we commend the fine work being done by various groups in seeking to aid the alcoholic, we wish to point out to the Church that the problem of drink and drunkenness is much wider than the question of alcoholism. Alcoholism is a specific medical condition to which a proportion of people who drink are subject. These are the compulsive drinkers who are actually unable to break the habit without medical and other outside help. However, apart from these there are a great number of people whose over indulgence in alcohol causes havoc in home, community and personal life, but who are not and may never become, alcoholics in the strict sense.

Thus, while the Church should give every support to the work of such groups as Alcoholics Anonymous and the National Educational Society on Alcoholism, we must realise that they work only on one specific part of the problem. Therefore we cannot regard their approach as a substitute for ours. The medical and scientific approach is of considerable value in the treatment of the alcoholic, although even here, spiritual factors are also decisive. On the other hand when we come to deal with the much wider problem of the general effects of alcohol in the community, although medical and psychological factors still have to be considered, the primary issues involved are questions of right conduct and the redemption of men and women. The basic approach then, must remain ethical and religious, and for this task the Christian Church alone has both the responsibility and the resources.

Facilities for the Sale of Liquor:

As the law stands at present licenses for the sale of New Zelaand wines can be granted to many retail businesses, under conditions which make proper police supervision almost an impossibility. The New Zealand Alliance has made and will continue to make representations to the Government, and the committee feels that as a Church we should support them in this matter.

It is also noted that the Restaurant Proprietors' Association has made representations to the Government to permit the serving of liquor with meals, and unless there is widespread and determined opposition, there seems every possibility of legislation to this effect being brought in.

One of the most practical and immediate steps that can be taken to ensure that the sale of liquor is kept under stricter control is for temperance interests to be much more strongly represented on local Licensing Committees. These committees are normally elected within three months of a General Election. They have quite wide powers and the preponderance of either liquor or temperance interests among the personnel can make a substantial difference to the conduct of the liquor trade within that district. This is a worthwhile sphere of service which some of our laymen might well consider.

Additional Corresponding Members:

It would be an advantage if additional corresponding members with a 'watching brief' were appointed to the committee in each of the other Synodal Districts, in order that the committee could be kept informed of any matters relating to its work throughout the Dominion.

RESOLUTIONS

- 1. That the report be received and adopted.
- 2. (a) That Conference request the National Council of Churches to undertake the preparation of a suitable handbook of factual material to assist teachers in state schools in providing education on temperance and the effects of alcohol.
- 2. (b) That Conference request the National Council of Churches to urge the Education Department to implement the factual teaching with regard to the effects of alcohol as provided for in the Syllabus of Instruction 1928 republished in 1937.
- 3. (a) That Conference re-iterate its strong protest against the present anomalous ballot paper in the liquor poll and the failure of the Government to implement the recommendations of the Royal Commission in this regard and urge the Government to consider the various proposals that have since been put forward for the removal of the "State Purchase and Control" issue from the ballot paper and that electors be given the opportunity to vote separately on the two issues "Prohibition or Continuance" and "Trust Control or Private Enterprise".
- (b) That in the event of there being no change in the ballot paper to be presented at the next national liquor poll, Conference urge all Ministers, Probationers and Home Missionaries to point out to their congregations that whatever may be the pros and cons of other forms of control, the only practical vote against the present system of liquor control, at the forthcoming poll, is a vote for Prohibition.
- 4. That Conference protest to the Government against the granting of licenses for the sale of New Zealand wines to grocers and other retail businesses, and express its whole hearted support of representations made to the Government by the New Zealand Alliance, to restrict the continuation or extension of such facilities.
- 5. That Conference strongly urge the Government not to enact any legislation granting permission for the sale of alcoholic liquor with meals in restaurants, on the ground that
 - (a) Any further extension of facilities for the sale of liquor, especially in the places where many people are obliged to have their meals, would not be in the interests of public welfare.
 - (b) As restaurants serve a large proportion of the travelling public including drivers of motor vehicles, the sale of intoxicants in this manner would not only be retrograde legislation but could also lead to yet higher toll of life on the roads.
- 6. That in view of the fact that the interpetration of the law given in a recent judgment of the Court of Appeal allows the public bars of licensed hotels to be opened to boarders outside the normal hours of trading, thereby thwarting the obvious intention of the six o'clock closing legislation, Conference request the Government to make the necessary amendment to the law to safeguard the principle that there shall be no supplying of liquor from public bars whatever outside the hours of normal trade.
- 7. That attention be drawn to the efforts being made by the liquor interests to legalise staggered hours for drinking, and that the Temperance Committee take steps to combat this propaganda.
- 8. (a) That Conference point out to the Laymen of the Church, the need for more Christian people to offer for nomination as candidates for local Licensing Committees, and that this provides a worthwhile avenue of service to Church and community.
- (b) That Conference request all Ministers to use their influence through Ministers' Associations and other inter-church bodies to urge all Christian

people to cast their vote at the election of local Licensing Committees in favour of suitable candidates with temperance interests at heart.

- That Conference express its confidence in the New Zealand Alliance as the best available means of united protest against the evils of the Liquor Traffic, and commend it to the interest and support of our people.
- 10. That Conference place on record its appreciation of the outstanding service given by the Rev. G. H. Goodman, as Dominion President of the New Zealand Alliance during the past six years.
- 11. That Standing Committees of District Synods other than those in Auckland and South Auckland Districts be asked to appoint in each District a Minister or Layman as a corresponding member of the Temperance Committee.
 - 12. That Conference express appreciation of the Committee's work.
- 13. That the committee for 1957 receive a grant of £5 from the Contingent Fund.
 - 14. That the Committee for 1957 be as printed on page 13 herein.

B-Church Building and Loan Fund Committee

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

That the Church is sustaining a positive building programme to enable it to keep abreast of population trends is evidenced from the following summary of projects approved by the Committee for the year ended 30th June.

- (a) New Sites, 4 (excluding additional land purchases in existing causes).
- (b) New Churches, plans approved, 9.
- (c) New Halls, plans approved, 11.
- (d) New Parsonages, plans approved, 7.
- (e) Additions to Halls, etc., plans approved, 12.
- (f) Sundry properties bought or erected (shops, etc.) 5.

Loans

(a) Already the effect of the Advance Methodism Fund is reflected in the number of new loans advanced, 18 in number, as follows: Pitt Street (£1000), Dominion Road (£750), Epsom (£1000), Rothesay Bay (£1000), Whiteley, New Plymouth (£1000), Westown, New Plymouth (£650), Hastings (£1000), Sanson-Rongotea (£500), Khandallah, Wellington (£600), Richmond, Nelson (£1000), Reefton (£800), North Beach (£800), Islington

(£1250), Balclutha (£750), Alexandra (£800); total £15,700, compared with 7 last year amounting to £5050.

- (b) The total amount of loans—at date is £33,446/18/9 advanced to 71 trusts, compared with the sum of £23,775/4/5 last year, advanced to 55 trusts.
- (c) On our priority list the names of 36 trusts appear waiting for loans amounting to £33,000. We have said previously that if the Advance Methodism Appeal is 100% successful we will take up all these promised loans early in 1957. That will not now be possible.

Sites Fund:

Grants for new sites have been made as follows: Helensville (New Parsonage) £50, Greenhithe £25, Upper Hutt (Cottle Block) £50, Taupo £50, Islington £25, Wairakei Road £60; a total of £260.

Advance Methodism Fund:

Is reported on separately.

GENERAL

(a) Connexional Committee and Standing Committee of Synods:

The question has been raised in one or two quarters as to whether District Standing Committees should not be given the authority to finalize property matters such as the purchase or sale of properties—approving plans for new buildings and so on.

The Committee points out the weaknesses in such a suggestion.

It is recognised that members of Standing Committees may be in closer contact with a given circuit or area than a central committee.

At the same time it is of value and indeed very necessary to put the final responsibility for decisions on a Committee that has no relationship at all with a given circuit or area. Such a central committee must of necessity be able to regard a project more objectively than a local committee. Time and time again local and personal factors enter in that could affect the decision made one way or another. Often a trust or a district is in danger of being dominated by an individual or a group, and others who might not agree with that individual or group nevertheless are hesitant to go contrary to their wishes.

In regard to plans for a new building an architect may try and dominate a trust or a trust may try to over-rule an architect. It is of inestimable value to rest the final decisions with an outside committee which has no bias or prejudices and so can regard every undertaking in an entirely objective and dispassionate manner.

Instances could be listed of district committees being influenced against their better judgment into certain attitudes, or of being unwilling to go contrary to the wishes of a certain individual or group. A central Committee is not subject to such pressure or is more able to resist it.

It needs to be pointed out that where necessary the Central Committee always confers with Standing Committees of Synods in regard to policy matters. It is not being stated herein that a Central Committee (in its personnel) is superior to that of any given local Committee. It is however stated that a central Committee is in a better position to make impartial objective decisions than any local committee which inevitably must always be in danger of being subject to pressure and thus adversely influenced in its decisions.

(b) Infringement of Regulations:

The Committee reports work commenced on properties without the final approval of the Committee in the following cases: Horrelville (North Canterbury), Otatara (Invercargill), Newfield (Invercargill).

Although it ought to be widely known it seems necessary to state again that the Committee meets on the third Friday of each month. The Building Sub-Committee meets regularly prior to that meeting and considers plans submitted. Often the latter committee is required to meet

twice in a month in addition to the full committee meeting. The Committee tries to expedite the business remitted to it. It is pointed out that trusts can sometimes be most unreasonable in their requests. Often a matter concerning a new building has been under consideration locally for many months, even years. Because a final decision is often not given at the first meeting of the Committee complaints are lodged of unnecessary delay. It needs to be stressed that there are no delays beyond those required by the necessary policy of examining and reporting first on preliminary plans before the final plan and specifications are endorsed. In undertakings that involve thousands of pounds and that will affect the work of the Church for half a century or more time taken at the beginning to arrive at a right decision is time well spent and money and embarrassment saved.

Advance Methodism Fund

(A) 1955 Appeal:

The final figure taken into our accounts as at 31st May, 1956, was £19,437/7/-. This includes a grant from the Fire Insurance Fund of £850, Expenses for printing, postages, and advertising amounted to £462/16/8 (2.4%). Two-thirds of the balance was transferred to the Loan Fund Capital Account (12,650/10/4) and one-third credited to an Advance Methodism Grants Capital Account (6324).

Loans were dealt with in the ordinary way, except that in a few instances in new areas certain trusts were treated as special cases and a sum in excess of the amount of £1000 was advanced.

Grants were dealt with on a District basis, Standing Committees of Synods being asked to list priorities which were then finalized in consultation with the Home Mission Board. It needs to be said that the allocation of these grants has not been a simple matter. Districts had been requested to list one or two projects of outstanding urgency rather than

to spread the money available over a number of enterprises which thus could inevitably only receive a small amount.

Distributions agreed upon were as follows: Auckland £1200, South Auckland £1200, Hawkes Bay-Manawatu £750, Wellington £1200, North Canterbury £1200, Otago-Southland £500.

At the close of the financial year the sum of £2200 had been paid out to Districts. At the time of the report the amount was £3500.

(B) 1956 Appeal:

At the time of preparing this report the sum of £17,191 has been reported through the nine Districts as having been contributed on Advance Methodism Sunday or immediately following: Auckland £4030, South Auckland £2070, Taranaki-Wanganui £706, Hawkes Bay-Manawatu £1434, Wellington £2096, Nelson £1285, North Canterbury £2664, South Canterbury £1406, Otago-Southland £1450.

All Districts reported that the figures were far from complete.

It will seem that the ultimate target of £50,000 will not be reached An estimate of the total final figure may be put at something less than £40,000.

A supplementary report will be presented to Conference with fuller details. At this stage four observations only are possible:

Every effort was made through the Methodist Times and other publicity material to acquaint all our people with the need for and the objects of the Fund.

It must be emphasised again that where the methods recommended by the Conference were adopted enthusiastically and applied faithfully 100% success resulted.

Gratitude must be expressed to the people who have loyally supported the effort and given to the Church increased resources for carrying on its task.

A number of circuits with major local projects evidently felt themselves unable to give this effort anything in the nature of whole-hearted support. Many of these places have current loans. Others have their names on the priority list of loans or are anticipating seeking assistances. The hope is strongly expressed that such circuits will feel that the way will still be open for them to make a major contribution at some time in the future, and will make a worthy effort to do so. There is nothing to stop them from planning along these lines.

From reports received earlier concerning amounts raised in these circuits there should be at least £1000 still to be received.

Appointment of District Property Committees:

The Committee has considered the recommendations of the Wellington Synod urging the establishment of 9 property Committees, one in each Synodal District, the Connexional Church Building and Loan Fund Committee to be consulted when some particular situation warrants such action, in addition, distributing loan moneys on the basis of advice received from such District Committees.

Procedure

It is pointed out, first of all, that our Church Property is vested in a number of local Trusts which administer such property on behalf of the Connexion. It is most desirable, and indeed very necessary, that in consultation with one central consulting and approving Committee, rather than with many Committees, and with a central office with one experienced permanent officer reporting to the Conference than with a number of committee conveners in all parts of the country.

It needs to be remembered that many aspects of property activity are bound up together in the purchase of land, the preparation of necessary documents, the handling of transfers and deeds, the effecting of insurance, the approving of plans, the recording of Trustees—all these things must be done in a central office and be handled by some responsible person. To have some of these things handled by District Committees, with information to be forwarded (or not forwarded as would inevitably happen in some cases) to the Connexional Office, and other aspects to be dealt with by the latter office would result in much confusion. It is absolutely necessary for the Connexional Office, which is handling these things constantly, to deal with them directly through Church Trusts, rather than by some indirect method. A systematic Check is imposed in the office upon all the aspects of each undertaking as mentioned above, but this would be very difficult, if not impossible, under the Wellington Synod's proposals.

The Church Building and Loan Fund Committee acts throughout the year on behalf of the Conference to which it reports its decisions. During the year Presidential approval has to be obtained on many documents. This must be done through a central office and to have to relay them through district committees would cause confusion and loss of time.

Plans

For the sake of efficiency and to maintain a certain standard of work all plans should be approved by the one Committee, which is in a position to see that the policy of the Conference is carried out and its requirements complied with.

While all property matters are dealt with by one Committee, that Committee has detailed knowledge of what is being done throughout the whole Connexion, and so is in a position to build up a store of knowledge and experience which would be impossible with 9 separate Committees, each restricted to what is being done only in its own District.

Professional and architectural advice is as readily available to Trusts as to a District Committee. The Committee encourages trusts always to seek such guidance. With comments and recommendations made by its Building Sub-Committee on preliminary plans submitted, work carried out in the light of experience gained through handling many such matters, architects and trusts can work successfully together. The results of such consultations between trusts and architects and builders channelled through the one Committee must be more effective than if 9 separate Committees were attempting to handle the work.

Volume of Work

A careful analysis of the facts indicate that the volume of work in the Synodal districts past, present and future, does not warrant the decentralisation envisaged. To set up a special district property committee in each Dis-

trict in addition to a central committee and office (which must be maintained), would be to create more unnecessary organisation at a time when the Church is seeking to solve this very problem of the multiplicity of committees.

The Church Building and Loan Fund Committee meets regularly on the third Friday of each month, with frequent additional meetings of the Executive and the Building Sub-Committee. It should not be necessary for any committee to meet more often than that. There is never any delay in handling matters submitted to it by Trusts. Any so-called delays are the result of insufficient or erroneous information being given in the first instance. Where urgency is called for in exceptional cases this is always accorded as it may be required.

Finance

The Church Building and Loan Fund Committee administers the Sites Fund and the Loan Fund. The making of grants from the former, and the advancing of loans from the latter is intimately related to the whole work of land purchase, approval of plans and so on. It is absolutely necessary that the Committee which administers these Funds, must also be the one which approves of all undertakings which will have recourse to the Funds. Any other system must prove unsatisfactory and inefficient.

Conclusion

In the judgment of the Committee the proposals embodied in the recommendations from the Wellington Synod ignore a number of aspects that are vital to the effective administration and oversight of this entire aspect of the work of our Church and accordingly reports that it has no recommendation to make.

QUESTION XXXIX.—What is the condition of the various Mission, Educational and General Connexional Properties and Investments?

1.—THE PROBERT TRUST BOARD OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF NEW ZEALAND

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the year ended 30th June, 1956.

Repairs and maintenance of all properties have been carefully attended to and they are in good order.

We have maintained our contribuation of £1500 to Trinity Theological College.

We have carefully considered the need for providing for an increased Capital Renewals Fund. This was commenced only 3 years since and now amounts to £2261. The Government valuation on our buildings (exclusive of Land Values) is £38,000. Their renewal in say 20 to 25 years time will be becoming necessary and, at the increased cost of building, will necessitate much greater Capital funds. We recommend that the Annual provision for the Capital Renewal Fund be increased to £1500 per annum. This sum compounded should provide approximately £45,000 in 20 years time.

2.—PRINCE ALBERT COLLEGE TRUST REPORT OF TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30th JUNE, 1955

A grant of £400 was again made to Trinity Theological College, and during the coming financial year a fairly heavy charge will be met for the repairs to the roofs of the shops.

Steps will also be taken this year for the utilisation of the seven sections fronting Turner Street, when the question of the renewal of the Salvation Army Lease has been settled.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1955

We have pleasure in presenting to the Conference the Annual Report of the Board, and Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1955.

Apart from the annual grant of £600 to the Rangiatea Maori Girls College Trust, our main activity has again centred around the provision of the necessary finance for the running of the Masterton Methodist Children's Home.

Masterton Methodist Children's Home

In accordance with the recommendation of the 1954 Conference that the Masterton Committee should assume full control of the Home, considerable thought has been given to the preparation of a formula which would prove mutually acceptable to the Board and to the Home Committee. The Masterton Committee has not seen its way clear to accept a proposition put forward by the Board, as it feels that rising costs would more than absorb the proposed income. Further consideration will be given to the matter in the hope that an acceptable scheme can be devolved.

The Board endorses the recommendations which the Committee has made in its report to the Conference, and records its sincere appreciation of the loving care and attention which the members of the committee and the Staff give so unstintingly to the children under their care.

Rangiatea Maori Girls' College
Messrs A. E. Hurley, T. M. Pacey and G. C. Burton have continued as our representatives on the Board of the College.

The Board is pleased to learn that plans for the new college have at last been received from the architects and have been submitted to the Maori Affairs Department for approval. It now appears possible that the Rangiatea Board may be in a position to call for tenders before the end of 1956.

Finance

The upward trend in interest rates is reflected in the Revenue Account, total receipts under this heading having increase by £147, whilst one lease has been renewed at an increased rental of £18 per annum.

Rates and Land Tax have increased by £40.

Net Revenue is £126 higher than last year, and after providing for the grant of £600 to Rangiatea Maori Girls' College and £165 for Masterton Home there is an excess of Income over Expenditure amounting to £876 which brings Capital Account up to £45,459.

The Capital Account of the Masterton Home has been increased by legacies of £100 from the Estate of the late W. H. Denton plus a small final payment of £5 from the Estate of the late Mrs M. E. Tills. Capital expenditure debited to the account amounts to £504 and the balance now stands at £17,299.

The Board unanimously recommends that the Rev. G. H. Goodman be reappointed Chairman.

The sum of £750 was paid off the loans advanced by the Home Mission Board, and a Grant of £150 was made to the Rangiatea Maori College Trust.

That in view of the fact that moneys within the Gibson Trust cannot be usefully employed in the building and running of an orphanage, this Synod recommends to Conference that an application be made to the Supreme Court covering a variation in the terms of the will of the late Robert Gibson as follows:—

- 1. That the assets be vested in a Methodist Church Trust to be established under the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee of the Church.
 - 2. That not less than £5000 be held as a reserve fund.
- 3. That out of moneys now in hand a grant shall be made for the completion of a Methodist Youth Centre at Manaia to be known as the Robert Gibson Memorial Hall.

4. That the residue of income be divided as follows:-

(a) For allocation by the Trust within Taranaki in the establishment of buildings for the training of youth two-thirds.

(b) For Methodist Children's Homes at Auckland and Masterton

Additional:

That owing to the death of Mr Robert Hooper and the fact that Manaia Circuit has no representation on the Board of Trustees, Synod accept the nomination of Mr S. W. Bailey of Auroa and recommend his appointment to the Advisory Trust Board of the Gibson Estate.

3. That Mr S. W. Bailey be appointed to the advisory Trust Board.

- (b) The capital and income of the Trust may be applied in and toward the Youth Work of the Methodist Church of N.Z. in such manner as shall, from time to time, be determined by Conference.
- (c) Such order shall seek such further or other powers authorities and discretions as shall be deemed necessary by the President.
- (3) That upon the consent of the Court having been obtained as aforesaid the Trust shall be under the control of a Trust Board under the direction of, and responsible to the Methodist Conference and that as an immediate direction to any Trust Boards so appointed, conference now resolves:—
 - (a) That a capital sum of not less than £5000 whether in cash or Trustee Investments shall be at all times held in the trust accounts a "reserve fund."
 - (b) That out of accumulated funds the Trust Board may at its discretion make a grant of such amount as the Board, after consultation with the President, considers proper for the erection of a Methodist Youth Centre at Manaia which shall be named "The Robert Gibson Memorial Hall".
 - (c) That the Trust Board shall make available from time to time out of income such moneys as may be necessary for bursaries for Taranaki Boys attending Wesley College, Paerata.
 - (d) That the residue of income arising in the Trust shall be applied as follows:—
 - For allocation by the Trust Board within Taranaki in the establishment of buildings and acquisition of lands for the training of youth—two-thirds.

- ii. For the Methodist Children's Homes at Auckland and Masterton - one-third.
- (e) That the present Advisory Board of Trustees together with the surviving advisory trustee in the estate shall form the first Board of Trustees to control the trust viz.:

The Chairman for the time being of the Taranaki-Wanganui District, Mr O. T. Parry, Mr L. M. Moss, Mr K. F. Andrews, Mr A. Pettigrew, Mr M. S. Hughson, Mr S. W. Bailey.

(4) That pending the order of the Court aforesaid, the present advisory Board of Trustees viz.:

QUESTION XL.-What is the report of the Board of Connexional Insurance?

Connexional Fire Insurance Fund Board

ANNUAL REPORT, 1956

The Board has pleasure in reporting to Conference a successful year's operations for the year ended 31st May, 1956.

New Insurance:

New and additional cover has been written up amounting to £333,075.

Income:

Earned income is as follows: - Premiums and Commission £3,828 2s 10d. Mortgage, Debenture and Deposit interest, £2,140 9s 5d. Costs of administration amounted to £843 14s 5d. The sum of £5,124 17s 10d was transferred to Profit and Loss Appropriation account, an increase for the year of £886 13s 6d.

Adding to this amount the sum of £135 9s 9d brought forward from last year after provision for grants, £2,284, the total herein is £5,260 7s 7d. The sum of £2,000 has been transferred to Fire Loss Reserve and £200 to Investment Contingency Reserve. Grants recommended as set out below amount to £2,500. Transfers and recommended grants thus total £4,700, leaving the sum of £560 7s 7d to be carried forward.

Accumulated Funds and Reserves:

After provision made as above, the Accumulated Fund stands at £33,500, the Fire Loss Reserve at £19,115, and the Investment Contingency Reserve at £2,367 12s 10d.

Claims:

Although claims amounting to £618 7s 7d have been handled during the year no portion of same has been a charge on the Fund, our re-insurance provision meeting the full amount.

New Tariff:

During the year a revision of premium rates on all Church properties has been reported on by the Underwriters' Association. This will mean a reduction in rates for most (not all) of our properties throughout N.Z. This will be revealed in the renewals and demand notes issued to trusts month by month.

While trusts will benefit from such reductions the overall income earned by the Fund will, of course, be decreased. The grants to be made must be determined by the net income earned but the Board hopes that it will be in a position which will enable it to still maintain a high level in this respect as in the past.

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

The work involved in the various departments concerned has proceeded satisfactorily during the past year.

The following appropriations are budgeted for:

Supernumerary and Allied Funds £725, Fire Insurance Fund £725, Church Building and Loan Fund £450, General Purposes Trust Fund £275, Methodist Times £375, Contingent Fund £325.

A number of enquiries have come to the Connexional Secretary from time to time concerning matters relating to District Accounts. It would appear that the time is long overdue when a standard set of account books should be used in all districts. In consultation with the office auditor, Mr W. E. Clothier, B.Com., A.P.A.N.Z., a model set of account books has been prepared and it is recommended that this set be used in each Synodal district. In this way uniformity will be attained and confusion obviated. The question of annual audit also needs to be regularised, to bring this matter into conformity with our general practice and requirements.

Designation of Connexional Secretary:

The Rev H. L. Fiebig will complete his second term of six years in March 1958. The Committee heartily nominates him to the forthcoming Conference for re-appointment by the 1957 Conference for a further term of six years.

QUESTION XLII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Trinity Theological College and Hostel?

Trinity Methodist Theological College Council

The Council's responsibility relates more particularly to the care of the property and concern for the domestic arrangements of the College, but it inevitably comes into fairly close contact with the other phases of the College life. In that regard the Council is pleased to report that an excellent spirit pervades the College and that the relationship between students and staff is a very happy one. This year there are 23 Divinity men in residence, in addition to one woman, one student pastor and one married student living out. There are 34 hostel residents.

New Chapel:

Our principal concern this year has been to push forward the building of the new Chapel. By Conference we hope the new building will be well under way. It is to be an attractive brick structure to seat 90, and is designed so as to harmonise with future extensions to the other College buildings. The cost is estimated at £11,000. It will add greatly to the attractiveness of the College property and also to the devotional life of the College. The old Collegiate church had become dilapidated, uneconomic to repair any further, and actually dangerous on the present site. Our people will be glad to know that it is not being lost to Methodism. It is being shifted to White Swan Road in the Auckland South Circuit. The organ has been purchased by Wesley College (being too large for the new Chapel). A new and smaller instrument is being built by Mr Croft. The Bible Class wing of the old building is being shifted and retained as a sports room and garage.

The Council is placing money contributed through "Friends of Trinity"

for this year to the Chapel Fund.

Maintenance:

Further repairs have been necessary to the buildings, some of which were required to bring the buildings into line with the new fire regulations Improvements to the hot water service have been fairly extensive, but a much more satisfactory supply is the result. Much of the general maintenance work has been done by the students, under the supervision of Dr Williams, as in other years.

Domestic:

Through the generosity of Mr E. A. Crothall a most satisfactory contract has been made with Commercial Cleaners Ltd. to take full responsibility for the employment of staff. Hostel fees were raised during the year to £3/10/- for a shared room and £3/15/- for a single room, in view of increased costs; but our fees are still probably the lowest in Auckland for the facilities available. Thanks are due to all our tutorial staff for their oversight of domestic arrangements.

Teaching Staff:

Tribute is paid again to the work done by the Principal and tutors and the personal interest shown by them in the students individually. The Rev J. J. Lewis has completed his part-time service with the S.C.M. and is now in the full employ of the College. Mr Lewis leaves New Zealand

at the end of July for two years' special study in London with the warm regard and best wishes of the College and the whole Connexion.

Gifts to Library:

These continue to come in steadily and are much appreciated. The Council would here record thanks to all donors.

B. PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The roll of theological students is larger by one than it was last year, and the prospects for 1957 are good. We have 23 men in residence, plus one woman student and one married man living out, and one student pastor. In July Mr Nicholls sailed to England (with permission of Conference) to complete his training by taking a short course at Selly Oak, Birmingham. He will be available for appointment in 1957. Of the two students already resident at Richmond, London, Mr Ziesler now has the permission of the Church to serve as Assistant Tutor at Didsbury for two years, while Mr Walker has completed one year of his course. These men are making full use of their opportunities and doing us credit.

The internal and routine life of the College has been cheerful and co-operative. Mr Philip Taylor has proved a loyal and efficient Senior Student, and both College and Hostel have maintained a good tone. The students have preached in and about the city and filled certain vacation supplies. Some have been active in S.C.M. life or have made themselves felt in local youth activities. Under the supervision of Dr Williams the senior year conducted a teaching mission at Sandringham, with profit to

themselves and to the hearers.

Teaching in the College has been slightly rearranged to facilitate the departure of Mr Lewis at the end of July; but the work in all departments will be covered by the end of the year. The Principal has taught Systematic Theology (Person and Work of Christ), Church History, Worship and Junior N.T. Greek; also a class in English and one in Elementary Hebrew, (He continues to teach Hebrew at the University College). Dr Williams taught N.T. Introduction (Synoptics) and Intermediate N.T. Greek, in addition to Pastoral Theology I and II, with the sermon criticism class and instruction in voice production and radio technique. Mr Lewis has taught O.T. Introduction, O.T. Teaching, N.T. Teaching and Senior N.T. Greek, together with a special excepsis class for seniors. During his absence his work will be divided between the Principal and Dr Williams, with assistance from one or two visiting Tutors.

During the Long Vacation an approach was made by the Principal of the Congregational College with a view to establishing some degree of co-operation in teaching between the Colleges. As the Congregationalists were anxious for action in 1956, the Board of Studies anticipated the consent of Conference and agreed to a tentative arrangement by which the Congregationalist ssudents were taken into our classes in N.T. Greek, Church History and Pastoral Theology, while their Principal (the Rev H. G. Nicholas) taught combined classes in Exegesis, and also took a course of lectures supplementary to our Theology syllabus for the year. All these combined classes were held on our premises. The arrangement has worked smoothly and if continued it will help materially in filling Mr Lewis's place during his absence overseas. On this matter a further report and recommendations will be brought direct to the Conference through the Examination Committee.

C. TREASURER'S REPORT

We are pleased to be able to report a satisfactory financial position at the close of this year. In our Budget we estimated a debit balance of £215. The books actually closed with a small credit of only £89 13s 8d. There is need for explanation of the variation from our Budget figures.

Receipts:

On the Receipt side there are a number of amounts received in excess of our Budget estimates which have contributed to the satisfactory position. We still have only a small number of Theological Students in residence (23) which means that we are able to take more paying students. There has also been additional room available for a paying student for the full year. In the previous Financial Year we increased the Hostel fees, and this is the first full year we have had the increased fee.

Hostel Fees:

Budget, £4,000; Actual £4,190; Additional, £190.

Foreign Mission Board:

Budget, £75; Actual, £150; Additional, £75.

The reason for this additional payment is that we received a cheque in September, 1955, for £75, and received a payment at the end of June, 1956, for £75. This means that the 1956-57 amount is shown in this year's figures.

Rehabilitation Fund:

Additional to Budget, £185. The Council has decided to close this account and has paid this £185 into our General Fund.

Students' Washing Machine:

Additional to Budget, £23.

S.C.M. Chaplaincy Fund:

Budget, £150; Actual, £200; Additional, £50.

Therefore, on the Receipts side we received an additional £500. This, however, does not reflect in our figures, as we still have £550 which was budgeted for and has not been received in the last Financial Year.

We must express our thanks for the loyal support of the Central Finance Committee, and of the Trusts and Boards who contribute to our income.

Friends of Trinity:

We wish to express our appreciation of the good work and continuous support of Mr Keith Laurie and the loyal support of the Friends of Trinity.

We have received £200 and this money has been paid into the New Chapel Fund.

Payments:

House and Service A/c. This figure reflects very careful administration. Budget, £4,400; Actual, £4,236; Savings of £164.

We wish to expresse our thanks to Rev. J. J. Lewis for his very thorough supervision. Also we wish to thank Dr D. O. Williams and the students for their substantial contribution in repairs and maintenance of the College. Particularly for the assistance with an unexpected and big job in bringing the College into line with Fire Regulations. This has been a very real contribution to College funds.

University Fees:

There was a considerable saving amounting to £98.

Furnishing:

Although the figure appearing in the Accounts shows a considerable saving, this is off-set when other items are set against it, which were not included in the Budget.

We are pleased to advise that through savings that have been made, we have been able to reduce the mortgage on 134 Grafton Road (principal and interest) by more than the budgeted amount. Budget, £175; Actual, £376.

Stipends and Allowances:

These were increased during the past year, and next year will be our first full year with the increases. Also, we will have no contribution to

Rev. J. Lewis' salary from the S.C.M. Chaplaincy Fund in the coming year.

I have mentioned the fact we had to face an unexpected amount in bringing the College into line with Fire Regulations: There is quite a substantial payment still due for this work and there is also substantial maintenance required at 134 Grafton Road, where it will be necessary to replace the roof.

This probably will be the last year we will have a considerable benefit from the small number of Theological students. I would like to thank the Principal Rev. E. W. Hames, for his assistance during the year. It is not easy for those not closely associated with the College to appreciate to the full his administration and financial ability in the control of College affairs and our appreciation and thanks I feel we should record.

(1) Wesley Training College

REPORT FOR 1956

With gratitude the Board reports another successful year. The overall surplus of income for the year ended 31st December, 1955 was £3494 and that with net capital accretions amounting to £753 during the year the Board's Capital Account stood at £183,153 at that date.

This result was achieved despite the record deficit on the College operations of £4451. The total cost of running the College was £25,563 and with increases still being granted to the State School teachers this figure will be exceeded in the years to come. To obtain teachers with the necessary qualifications and ability the Board has no option but to offer a similar salary scale as the State Schools. For the past year the salaries and wages paid to the College staff amounted to £14,294 and for the present year it is expected that these payments will be in excess of £15,000. From these figures it will be readily seen how difficult it is to keep the fees charged to a low level. During the year a comprehensive repainting programme was commenced and as a result the buildings now show a much improved appearance.

On the 13th August, 1955 the Foundation Stone of the Assembly Hall was laid by the Hon Mr Justice Stanton after the service of dedication and prayer had been conducted by Rev E. W. Hames. Despite somewhat inclement weather this function was most successful and those attending the ceremony included Sir William Jordan, Mr E. L. F. Buxton, Vice-President of Conference, Rev Rangi Rogers, Members of the Board and approximately 200 parents and friends.

At the time of the making of this report the Assembly Hall is in the final stages of completion and preliminary arrangements have been made for the official opening to be performed by His Excellency the Governor

General in March, 1957.

Under the enthusiastic management of the new Farm Manager, Mr J. L. Browning, the farm operations recovered despite adverse weather conditions to show a profit of £1278. Continued improvements of returns have been made in the present year to date and prospects in this department of the Board's activities are good.

Because of the falling off of the sale of scoria the Maurice Harding Park did not show as good a result as previously but this property continues to make a most valuable contribution to the operations of the

Board as a whole.

The construction of the roads in the new subdivision at Waikowhai which will provide a further 50 sections for leasing has been handicapped throughout by the problems of the supply of materials and very wet weather. However the subdivision is now almost completed and it is

intended to submit the sections for lease at a public auction to be held

in the Spring of this year.

The cutting of timber contained in one of the plantations at Waikowhai has commenced and the first royalty payments have been received. The wet weather has interrupted the programme here also and it is not now expected to complete this project until the Spring.

The Principal of the College, Rev E. M. Marshall, was granted leave of absence for a period of three months to enable him as District Governor of the 38th District of Rotary to attend Rotary Conferences overseas. During his absence he availed himself of the opportunity of visiting a number of colleges and schools both in England and the United States of America and this experience should prove most valuable in the future operations of our College.

After serving in an acting capacity for seven and a half months Mr G. C. B. Minogue was appointed General Secretary to the Board in

February last.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL WESLEY COLLEGE

Roll:

This has reached the highest ever recorded at the College, with 154 in residence, consisting of 121 Europeans, 19 Maoris, 14 Islanders (Tonga, Raratonga, Samoa). The Roll for the next few years is filling up rapidly. In the Senior classes, 27 are specialising in Agricultural subjects; and 34 are taking the Academic Course.

Staff:

There have been difficulties in providing adequate staff, especially with increased numbers in all classes. The first Assistant is Mr J. L. Ballantine, M.A., the Bursar, Mr H. C. Squier, the Senior Matron, Miss I. Leslie, the Farm Manager, Mr J. L. Browning. Under their direction the College has maintained a high standard in all departments, and to them we are very grateful.

During the absence of the Principal, Mr Ballantine as Acting-Principal and Mr Squier as Bursar were in charge and carried out their duties with great diligence and good judgement.

The Principal's Tour Overseas:

With the approval of the Board, he accepted nomination as District Governor of District 38 in Rotary International, and left New Zealand on April 2nd to attend the International Assembly at Lake Placid, New York State, and the International Convention at Philadelphia. He spent some six weeks in England, during which he visited 14 Schools and Colleges, most of them under the jurisdiction of the Methodist Church in England. It was a very valuable experience, supplemented as it was with the many contacts made through Rotary in all parts of the world. He returned to the College on June 20th and took office as Governor on July 1st, 1956.

The College and the Future:

It is felt that with the completion of the Assembly Hall the College has taken a major step forward in its development. It is the declared policy of the Board that the Roll should be brought up to 250 as soon as it is financially practicable to do so. This view is fully endorsed by the Principal in the light of his visit overseas. To do it however will mean the erection of buildings for kitchen, dining room, class-room, hostel and staff purposes—a very big programme.

It is believed however that the College is fulfilling a big need in the community, that its contribution to the Church is valuable, and that through it the Church is able to bring important and necessary influences

to bear on the youth of this Dominion.

The Old Boys' Association is continuing to make generous contributions to the College. Reference has been made in previous years to the gift of Library furniture. This year the Old Boys have erected handsome Memorial Gates and have undertaken even more ambitious projects for the future. To them and to all those who have in the past made valuable gifts in cash and kind we are very grateful.

We trust that it will not be long before we find at Paerata a larger fully equipped School which will, on an ever-increasing scale, be a credit

to the Church and a force for good in the nation.

(2) Rangiatea Maori Hostel Trust Board

No Annual Conference of the Board has taken place during the past year, because it was felt that the Plans for the New Hostel to be erected on the Spotswood property were nearing completion and the matter of receiving Tenders would demand the attention of the Board at an early date.

The Plans, however, have taken much longer to complete than the Board was led to believe they would and only this month (August) the Architect has forwarded them on to Wellington for the approval of the Ministry of Works.

The formalities in connection with the sale of 26 acres of the Spotswood property to the Education Department are now just about completed, and it will not be long before action is taken to erect a co-educational High School on the land. A commencement has already been made with the erection of a new Primary School on a site adjoining our Spotswood property.

Sister Marriott has indicated in her report that the Board, in conjunction with the Grey Institute Trust, has very much improved the living conditions at the existing Hostel during the past year. The Board is greatly indebted to the "House Committee" for the good work they are doing for the welfare of the Maori girls and the running of the Hostel generally, while to Sister Marriott and her small, but very efficient staff, the Board's appreciation is extended.

B.—MATRON'S REPORT

The Hostel is being served by a faithful and efficient House Committee, without whose understanding and support it would be difficult to carry on.

The Committee lost a loyal member in the death of Rev P. Rakena. Mrs W. Wellington, a foundation member of the Committee tendered her resignation because of ill-health.

Boarders:

The Hostel has been more than full all the year with twelve boarders with ages ranging from twelve to seventeen years. They are all extremely happy in their schools. We are indebted to the Principal of the New Plymouth Girls' High School for her sympathetic interest in our girls.

Staff:

There have been no staff changes in the Hostel. Mrs S. Halliday as part-time supervisor continues to serve us well, and Miss J. Kurth makes a very valuable contribution as housekeeper. The girls make their contribution serving, quite happily, on their weekly housecraft duty.

Renewals and Replacements:

The Hostel is the most convenient and comfortable that it ever has been. The Grey Institute and the House Committee have worked together for the general improvement and efficiency of the place. Changes have come to the young Maori adolescent since 1940 when Rangiatea Hostel was first opened. In 1905 only 5% of the Maori young people attended Post Primary School; in 1925 about 35%; and to-day it is fairly safe to say that two-thirds of the young people attend. The Maori parents are anxious to give their young people the opportunity of a good education. The Maori Affairs Department encourages them with grants for fees and school books. Boarding allowance for pupils from remote areas is helpful. This year, the Education Department has made it possible for any Maori child to sit for one of its eighty scholarships—not just those distant from Secondary Schools. This is to give the bright child the opportunity of living in a boarding school and co-ordinating school instruction with home environment.

The schools are doing a grand piece of educational work with the young Maori people. There is still a great gap between their homes and the school. The average citizen can do a great amount to span this gulf. The Maori Adults' horizon is very limited and with many their comprehension of the finer meaning of the English language is also limited. The community; those in shops, offices and with businesses can help a good deal to improve the understanding of the adult Maori and thus improve the home background for the young people. Only as we help the adults will we be making it easier for the young people. Gradually the gulf between home and school is being spanned but it takes time.

With a young race in our midst which promises to double itself in seventeen years, we must put all we have into Christian education, in its broadest sense, if the promise of a bright future is to be fulfilled in this country.

Supernumerary Fund Board

ANNUAL REPORT, 1956

The audited financial statements for the year ending 30th June, 1956, are presented to Conference with this report.

Annuitants and Contributors:

The number of annuitants at date is 60 (54) supernumeraries and 49 (48) widows of ministers. The numbers for the preceding year are shown in brackets. The number of contributors is 192 (190).

Annuities:

The sum of £8,290/8/10 was paid in annuities during the year, together with £960 for furniture grants, total, £9,250/8/10.

Commutation:

Eight annuitants exercised this option receiving in the aggregate the sum of £6,654/5/0.

Accumulated Funds (Supernumerary):

The balance herein last year was £134,544/7/7. Donations for capital amounted to £709/1/6. The sum of £5,235/9/2 was transferred from the Revenue account, representing excess in income over expenditure. Refunds and transfers amounted to £166/0/0. The and transfers amounted to £166/0/0. The sum of £6,654/5/0 was commuted, leaving a balance of £133,668/13/3, which is a decrease of funds for the year of £875/14/4. The large amount commuted accounts for this decrease.

Income:

The revenue account indicates that income received was £1,047/14/5 more than last year. Income from mortgage and debenture investments amounted to £4,023/0/3.

The nett income from Epworth Chambers was £3,898/1/1.

Income derived from personal subscriptions and circuit subsidies totalled £7,592/0/0.

Income from Commission (£283/12/10) and interest on arrears (£23/15/10) amounted to £307/8/8.

The usual provision for reserves has been made as follows:-

Epworth Chambers depreciation (£500) and Investment Contingency Reserve (£200).

Investments are held as follows:

(a) Mortgages £71,362/3/8. (b) Debentures and Government Stock £66,820/0/0. (c) Freehold property £42,124/8/5 after depreciation reserve has been allowed at £11,250/0/0.

The sum of £56,439/10/11 is deposited in account of Allied and Connexional Funds, such as the Home Acquirement Fund and others.

Interest Earnings:

From all investments show a return of 5.55% on the actuarial formula.

Allied Funds:

- (a) Ministers Home Acquirement Fund. To this Fund there are 190 contributors with personal accounts aggregating £20,563/12/9. Payments made this year to eight ministers amounted to £2,192/19/9. (b) Home Missionaries Retiring Fund. This Fund has 19 contributors with personal accounts totalling £3,552/1/10. The sum of £1,135/14/11 was paid to 4 contributors on retirement.
- (c) Deaconess Retiring Fund. The amount held herein is £13,076/9/0 on behalf of 50 contributors. The sum of £623/6/11 was paid during the year to 5 beneficiaries who retired from the work.

Personal Subscriptions in Arrear:

The position herein is satisfactory there being only four contributors whose accounts have called for the attention of the Board.

Policy:

Several matters affecting the general policy and administration of the Fund are reported on separately in a supplementary report to Conference.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT, 1956

New Scale of Annuities

It is with pleasure that the Board reports that it will submit to the Conference of 1957 a new schedule of allowances for Supernumeraries and for the widows of supernumeraries. The increased capital derived from higher subscriptions and circuit subsidies together with larger interest earnings will now make this possible. The matter is the subject of consultation as between the Board and its actuary who will submit his recommendations in due course.

Several aspects of the matter need careful consideration before a decision is reached as to the scale of increases and the form which they will take. The relationship of these allowances to social security benefits has to be kept in mind and action taken to ensure that our annuitants derive the maximum of assistance from both sources.

Rec. of Auckland Synod

On account of ill-health a minister submitted through the Auckland Synod of September 1955 an application to retire as at 31st January, 1956. He intended also to exercise the option of Commutation in respect to his relationship to the Supernumerary Fund. To do so, according to the rules of the Fund, he had to submit a satisfactory medical certificate. This he was unable to do. Under such circumstances, according to the rules of the Fund, he would have in due course received his allowance in the form of an annuity according to scale. He died subsequently in December. In terms of the regulations his widow became an annuitant on the widow's scale whether she elected to receive all her allowance in the form of annuity or whether she chose to exercise the option of commutation. The latter course was taken and she received a portion of her allowance in cash and an annuity of £52 p.a.

The Board also voted her a substantial grant from the Benevolent Fund. Representations were made by various people to the Chairman of the Auckland District that the Board had treated his widow unfairly and unjustly. These representations were forwarded by him to the Board and were followed by the recommendation from the Annual Synod as stated above.

The Board wishes to make clear the following facts:

(a) It, had no option but to act as it did under the circumstances, unfortunate and difficult though they were. A Board which administers several large funds providing allowances for supernumeraries, retired Home Missionaries and Deaconesses must carry out its task in a responsible manner, and with due regard to all claimants on such funds.

- (b) These funds are the subject of definite rules and regulations adopted by the Conference and printed in the Law Book. While the regulations remain in the Law Book they must be observed. To ignore these rules, or to tamper with them arbitrarily under any given set of circumstances, would be to break faith with the Conference and those for whom the funds are administered. Such action would surely undermine confidence, in such an administration and would inevitably lead to discrimination among its annuitants, injustice and confusion generally. No Board which acted in such a way would be worthy of the confidence of the Church. Last year there were other new annuitants whose cases also were unfortunate in that early retirement on account of ill-health was necessary. To vary the rules for one, would in all fairpess have made necessary the varying of the regulations for them also (and yet others). To such variations there would be no end. Administration of the Fund on such lines is just impossible.
- (c) Many of the rules of the Fund are adopted by the Conference on the recommendation of the Board's actuary. The sole aim of all such provisions is to protect the best interests of all annuitants, present and future.
- (d) It may appear at first sight that the strict application of the regulations must result in hardship and might appear harsh and unsympathetic. In practice it does not work out that way. There are alternative sources that are available and indeed are used in such a case as the one being considered, fortunately, rare in our experience. These sources are, for example, the Supernumerary Benevolent Fund, a similar benevolent fund administered in Auckland and also the generosity of any given circuit

and district. From these combined sources there is not the least doubt but that provision can be made equal to that which would have been accorded to the minister if he had lived and retired in the normal way. Hardship therefore can be ameliorated and in the experience of the Board has in fact been ameliorated in many cases in this way.

Experience proves that every pension fund meets these problems from time to time. The number of difficulties in respect to our own fund fortunately has been small and as emphasized earlier, the Church has the means of meeting such exceptional cases from other resources.

If in respect to the particular case under review it is demonstrated that there is need for further consideration the way is open and the Board is only too willing to render from its Benevolent Fund the maximum of assistance according to the facts placed before it.

Medical Certificate (as for Commutation)

The basic reason why a medical certificate has been required from those who wish to exercise the option of commutation is to provide for a reasonable degree of equity among annuitants. It is not to do something for the Fund as such, for example conserving its resources; but rather to maintain as far as possible a certain equitable relationship between all claimants on the Fund.

Since commutation was introduced eight years ago 37 ministers have exercised this option. 14 of them, on account of indifferent health, retired before they had completed the normal term of 40 years service or before reaching the retiring age of 65. They had accordingly to submit a medical certificate, and were able to do so. With 2 exceptions they are still annuitants of the Fund. This would indicate that the medical test required in such cases is, as described by our actuary, "reasonably lentent".

Ministers' subscriptions and circuit subsidies have always been on a flat rate and not on a graduated scale according to stipend received or paid, and allowances are according to years of service. Further, the basic purpose of the Fund is not merely to pay out a lump sum at the time of retirement on the receipt of which the relationship with the Fund is severed, but to maintain a life-long relationship of beneficial service.

In order to do that, allowances are determined actuarily, that is according to the resources of the Fund and also the longevity tables that apply to our members. It is obvious that some members live longer than others and the basic theory is to provide for a maximum scale of allowances for the longest life period for the greatest number of members.

The option of commutation has been in operation only for eight years. A given period is necessary to test out its effect on the Fund. When the next actuarial valuation takes place (in 1957) the position should be clearly seen.

Any variation in policy will be determined by the nature of that report. As mentioned in the opening section of this supplementary report, it is definite that commencing on February 1st, 1958, a new scale will come into operation, providing for increased allowances. The relationship of the two scales, that is as for supernumeraries and as for the widows of supernumeraries respectively, will be reviewed at that time.

Whether provision can be made for the abolishing of the medical certificate in respect to the option of Commutation the Board is not at present able to say. This matter has been reported on by the Board's actuary who has stressed the basic reasons for this requirement (as summarised above) and at this stage he is not in a position to recommend any alteration. There is a definite relationship between this matter and the scale allowances to be adopted in the future and both aspects of the whole question must be dealt with together.

Allowances under the Option of Commutation

Some aspects of this matter have been dealt with in foregoing paragraphs.

It is pointed out that the number of cases in which a minister dies in the active work is fortunately very small according to the records of the Fund, approximately 5%. That means that on the law of average 95% of the ministers will in due course become members of the Fund and the maximum scale of allowances will come into operation.

It is then with a small minority of 5% that our enquiry is concerned. It is to be noticed that the operation of two scales is a basic feature of most pension funds. In respect to Social Security, a person will expect to receive the age benefit both for himself and for his wife. On the death of one of them, the benefit is automatically reduced by half. Reductions are also made (but not in a similar scale) in regard to the War Veterans pension. The same principle applies in various superannuation schemes.

The possibility of ministers being offered "a selection" has been raised. That is, giving a contributor the right to scale down his own prospective allowance and scaling up the prospective allowance of his wife if he predeceases her. There are so many undesirable features attached to such a policy, particularly for our members, that our Actuary has recommended the Board not to consider it. In this connection it is emphasized that neither the Supernumerary Fund, nor its beneficiaries exist in isolation in the life of the Church. There are other resources available as stressed in another section of this report. These combined resources are entirely adequate to meet the needs of the few exceptional cases that do occur from time to time. In the assurance that these alternative aids will be available the Board feels that any given situation can be adequately met. There has been a suggestion made already by our Actuary that when the revision of scale allowances takes place the gap be narrowed as between the schedule for ministers and that for widows.

It is felt, therefore, that these facts satisfactorily answer the questions raised in the Synod recommendations under consideration.

In conclusion the Board refers the Conference to its report in 1948 (Mins., page 103) when introducing legislation affecting the Fund in respect to the option of Commutation. It feels that what was said then also applies now:

"The amendments proposed herein represent the initial and experimental stage in the entirely new task of relating the operation of our Fund to Social Security legislation. Whether finality has been reached remains to been seen. The first decisive step, however, has been taken. The Board feels that it is moving on right lines, but wishes to be certain of each step taken, so that all its decision may be in the best interests of our Supernumeraries and ministers' widows.

Supernumeraries and War Veterans' Pensions

The Board reported to last Conference on the position of certain supernumeraries who are eligible to receive a War Veteran's Pension (1955 Mins., page 115).

The Board has had further consultations with the War Veterans' Pension Board concerning this matter. The latter Board will offer no objection to such ministers commuting their Supernumerary Fund annuity in full, and any such sum paid to a veteran will not, in itself, affect the awards of war veteran's allowance and age supplement, but income therefrom would have to be taken into account as income in the normal way.

It is clear that some slight advantage will accrue to such a minister if he does this, even although by so doing he severs his own financial relationship with our Fund. It is equally clear that the same favourable position would not obtain in the case of his widow should she survive him for any number of years. Financially it would be better for her to retain her financial relationship with our Fund.

For these reasons the Board will recommend to Conference that a supernumerary who is in receipt of a War Veterans' Pension may, if he so

desires, commute in full his own interest in the Supernumerary Fund; provided that the wife of such a supernumerary may commute only such portion of her interest as will entitle her to a remaining annuity of £52 p.a.

A Minister who Previously Served as a Home Missionary

The Board has given consideration to the position of a minister who previously served as a Home Missionary in his relationship to the Supernumerary Fund.

While he served as a Home Missionary he contributed to the Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund, which contributions were subsidised by the Home Mission Department and the Home Mission Stations (or Circuits) in which he laboured. On retirement he received a cash payment which severed his relationship with that Fund. Previously payment amounted to the totla of his personal contributions only. Latterly, the payment consisted of such personal contributions plus the subsidies, in other words all that was paid into the Fund on his behalf.

When such a Home Missionary was accepted as a Candidate for the Ministry his financial status in the Supernumerary Fund dated from the time he was received as a Probationer.

The question raised is whether such a Home Missionary should be allowed to buy into the Supernumerary Fund according to the number of years for which he served as a Home Missionary, so that he does not forfeit such years in respect to benefits to be received by him in due course as a member of the Supernumerary Fund.

The enquiry raises one question as to the nature and purpose of the Supernumerary Fund. According to par. (1) Sec. 511 of the Law Book, its object is "to make provision for the financial needs of aged and infirm ministers, for widows of ministers and for orphaned children of ministers." The term "minister" is used of a person who has been ordained and set apart by the Church for a life time of service in that sphere. The status of a Home Missionary differs in this respect that he is not ordained to a lifetime of service, but his contract of service may be terminated by one month's notice given on either side.

The purpose of this enquiry is to determine whether or not a man who has served the Church as a Home Missionary should have those years of service recognised as years spent "in the ministry."

If so—should he be given the opportunity of buying into the super-numerary Fund by paying the personal contribution and the Circuit sub-sidy plus the compound interest that such payments would have been earning if he had command his work as a Probationer and not as a Home Missionary?

There are some anomalies that will need careful consideration. For example one minister may serve for three years as a Home Missionary prior to being received on probation and without entering College. Another man enters the Theological College at the same time as the person men-tioned above commences service as a Home Missionary. Both men commence Probation together but under the proposals envisaged in this enquiry one would be able to buy into the Fund for three years service as a Home Misionary while the other would not be able to do so.

There would also be the situation of a man who has bought into the Fund in this way (assuming the way were open) having financial status in the Fund in excess of the status granted to him as an ordained minister.

For these and other reasons the Board reports that it has given preliminary consideration to the matter with a view to bringing down a fuller report next year.

QUESTION XLV.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the Methodist General Purposes Trust Board (Inc.)?

ANNUAL REPORT, 1956

During the year the following new Trusts have been accepted: M. B. Gilmour; Winchmore Church (United). The amount held on behalf of various Trusts and deposit accounts is £70,119/13/9.

In the Winstone Memorial Trust Fund grants amounting to £540/15/10 were paid to Ministers or Home Missionaries who had not received from their circuits the standard minimum stipend.

The Board records the great loss sustained by the Church in the passing of Mrs Edith M. Blackwell who contributed substantially to the establishment of the Winstone Memorial Trust Fund, inaugurated to ensure that every Minister of Home Missionary would receive each year the minimum stipend. Since the inception of this fund in 1942 the sum of £7,604/10/10 has been paid out in grants in this way.

Removal Expenses Fund Committee

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

During the year 60 removals were carried out compared with 42 in 1954-55 and 66 in 1953-54. There has been a further rise in costs—the average cost per removal being £59/6/4 as compared with £51/15/1 last year.

The large number of removals and the higher cost has involved the Fund in a large expense as is reflected in the Financial Statement which shows an excess of Expenditure over Income of £753/0/10. The Capital of the Fund has been reduced to £963/8/11 and it will be seen that caution will have to be exercised to keep the cost of removal expenses within the amount set by Conference.

From the following particulars it will be seen that the large number of inter-island removals were responsible for the unfavourable financial position and the committee begs Conference to keep these moves to a minimum.

The following comparative figures are given:

The Committee wishes to cite several removals which involved the Fund in large expense. It is hoped that such removals will not occur very frequently.

They are:

- 1. Port Albert, Auckland, to Invercargill.
- 2. Geraldine to Opotiki.
- 3. Christchurch to Auckland.
- 4. Kawerau to Dunedin following a removal the previous year from Waimate to Kawerau.

The Committee is concerned regarding the length of these removals and again requests Conference to study the necessity of all inter island moves.

It view of the continuing increase in costs the Committee is agreed that as well as a monetary limit of £125 (Inter Island) and £75 (within an Island), there should be a weight of space limit on removals. The monetary limits should well cover the Minister's furniture as he is provided with a furnished Parsonage.

However, several examples of excessively large removals have been noted by the Committee and unless Ministers keep within the limits there will be no other option than to ask Conference to increase the levy.

The Treasurers will investigate the question of a weight or space limit and will report to Synods and Conference next year.

The Committee has considered the matters requested by Conference as follows:

(a) Quotations:

The question obtaining quotations has been discussed by the Committee for several years. It is submitted that the present system is the best. The Committee reiterates paras. 3 and 4 in its report to Conference 1955 which it feels is an adequate answer to this question.

(b) & (c) Excess Removal Charges:

These matters will be dealt with as expeditionusly as possible should the need arise.

At the time of writing this report the Committee anticipates that the levy of £2800 will be sufficient to cover the cost of next year's removals.

QUESTION XLIX.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Foreign Missions?

Foreign Mission Department

REPORT FOR 1956

As in former years, there will be a further report, direct to Conference, after reports and recommendations have come from the Solomon Islands and the Papua New Guinea Highlands Mission.

Staff:

At the end of June, we have 32 European workers engaged in the Solomon Islands and 3 in the Highlands. In both cases, the wives of married workers, not counted above, also contribute much to the work of the mission.

Early in the year when Sister Edna White completed her year of honorary service in the Solomons, the Board placed on record its appreciation of this latest evidence of her abiding interest in the work of our mission field. Sister Davinia Clark's resignation, in view of her approaching marriage, has now taken effect.

The ministerial vacancy in Roviana Circuit was filled by the arrival of the Rev A. C. Watson. Sisters Mary Addison (nurse) and Audrey Grice (teacher) have also taken up their duties on the field. Mr and Mrs Watson and Sister Audrey Grice first completed the Summer Linguistics Course at Melbourne, the first of our Solomon Islands workers to take this particular course. In view of the vacancies on the field, the Board has not yet found it practicable to carry out its new policy of sending first to the George Brown College, Sydney, workers appointed to the Solomon Islands District. So far two of our Highlands workers have taken that training.

Messrs C. V. Wills, D. G. Peterson and N. G. Ball have gone to the Solomon Islands as builders, the last two named serving under the order of St Stephen.

Two further Solomon Island workers, Daniel Keskes, of Buka, with his wife, Tehoi, and Simione Tavaeke, of Roviana, a widower, have been added to the team of three earlier Solomon Islands teachers now serving in the Highlands of New Guinea and supported by the Methodists of the Solomon Islands.

Vacancies:

Synods and Conference are asked to take particular note of the troublesome vacancies that still confront us. The most urgent is for a qualified woman teacher of some years of experience to assist Sister Ada Lee in the District Girls' School venture which she has returned to inaugurate in Bougainville. At least one further teaching sister will be required for 1957; there are two nursing vacancies besides one recently

filled by a new appointment, which however cannot be taken up till the new year.

In the Highlands the Board is considering the best kind of person to appoint as the fourth worker of our team, and hopes to have more to report direct to Conference on that subject.

Home Base:

The outstanding event of the year has been the visit to New Zealand of the Rev Gordon H. Young, pioneer missionary and Superintendent of the New Guinea Highlands Mission. Mr Young was able to consult with the members of our Board, and to visit a number of Circuits on deputation. His South Island contacts were mainly with the Amberley and Leigh Camps. In the North Island, he traversed the Hawkes-Manawatu and parts of the South Auckland and Auckland synodal districts. Others on deputation since last Conference have been the Revs G. G. Carter (Otago-Southland), G. A. R. Cornwell (South Auckland and Wanganui). Otago-Southland and North Canterbury are also to be visited with the film "Men of the Mountains" before Conference. The Rev J. R. Metcalfe, Chairman of the Solomon Islands District, will visit certain Northland Circuits after Conference. The Board is indebted to certain other ministers (Revs C. T. J. Luxton and B. H. Riseley and Pastor G. H. J. Yearbury) and to their circuits who released them for helpful deputation work in areas which departmental deputations could not reach.

Literature:

"Isles of Solomon" by C. T. J. Luxton continues to sell well. About 2300 copies have so far been sold, mainly through circuit agents, for whose efforts the Department is very grateful. On the first printing we did not aim to do more than recoup costs. Costs of production being lower for the second impression, provided all copies are sold, a slight profit will result.

Again the annual report has been incorporated in the March issue of "The Open Door". Other numbers feature "Other Religions" (December), "Unity and Co-operation" (June) and "Bougainville" (September), marking the fortieth anniversary of the beginning of Methodist work in that island.

Rising costs of production meant a subsidy last year of £334 from our General Fund. The Board aims to counter the rising cost of production by internal economies where "The Lotu" is concerned and by an increase in subscription to "The Open Door". The increase has been well received by the Church public. As the new publication year does not coincide with Board's financial year, it is expected that a smaller subsidy will be necessary this year, but hereafter the publication should be self-supporting.

The Board has considered a suggestion for an amalgamation of "The Lotu" with the Presbyterian children's missionary magazine. While not averse on principle to such a step, the Board considers that it should not be taken until it is clear that the two churches are going to unite.

Methodist Women's Missionary Union:

The Board welcomes into office the new Dominion Executive at New Plymouth, who continue, like their predecessors, to organize warm support for our women's and girls' work overseas.

Youth Department:

Sister Pamela Beaumont and the Rev G. G. Carter continue as the missionaries supported by Methodist youth, through the contributions of Sunday Schools and Bible Classes to our work. During his furlough, Mr Carter was able to meet the Youth Board and attend the Youth Conference. Steps are being considered for linking more closely the youth life of our Church in the Solomon Islands with the Youth Department in New Zealand.

Conversations are in progress which may result in a visit to the Ecumenical Youth Conference next year of two representatives of the Solomon Islands Methodists. In that event, the men concerned would

probably remain for a time in New Zealand, to gain experience in typical circuits and youth groups.

Islanders in New Zealand:

During the year, the Board has again considered the welfare and pastoral oversight of Methodist Islanders visiting and resident in New Zealand. A consultation took place with a representative of the Congregational Church re relations with their work, particularly among Samoans. An attempt is being made to secure and pass on to circuits proper transfer notices for Samoan and other Islands Methodists removing to work or study in New Zealand. The Board is grateful to know that several city circuits are particularly active in the work among these people. Here is another opportunity for Christian fellowship and missionary interest right at our doors.

Missionaries' Stipends and Allowances:

In deciding on an 11% increase in stipends for workers in New Zealand, last Conference directed that the matter of the stipends and allowances of the missionaries be referred to the Foreign Mission Board for decision in the light of the cost of living on the Mission field and the

new minimum stipends adopted in New Zealand.

This resolution gave the Board an opportunity to review the whole This resolution gave the Board an opportunity to review the whole scale of stipends and allowances for overseas missionaries. A special committee was appointed, and a questionnaire designed to elicit information as to living costs was sent to all workers overseas. The replies received were of distinct help to the Committee and the Board. The points at which missionaries reported financial embarrassment did not indicate so much a need for increase in stipend as for increases and variations in the allowances that have always supplemented the stipends of overseast missionaries. These concerned particularly the education of overseas missionaries. These concerned particularly the education of children, initial and furlough outfits and retirement provisions for lay missionaries and sisters.

The Board therefore resolved not to increase the basic stipends of our workers, but to make the following increases in allowances. Children's allowances (from £25 to £36 per annum); Education allowance (for children away from home for educational purposes, £40 to £60); and to recommend Conference to increase the Board's contribution to lay missionaries' and sisters' retiring funds by £5 annually, most workers to increase their personal contributions similarly. The old furlough lodging allowance is replaced by a larger comprehensive furlough allowance of 30/- weekly per adult and 15/- weekly per child (the lodging rates were £1 and 5/-). An initial outfit allowance of £50 per married couple is instituted, whilst the former linen grant of £25 paid to sisters becomes an initial outfit grant instead. Furlough outfit grants are instituted at the rate of £5 per adult and £3 per child per year of service in the term just ended. Special allowances have also been provided for sisters living alone and for all workers serving in the more expensive British Solomon Islands.

The Board wishes the Church to understand quite clearly what has been done. We have departed from our former practice of passing on to workers overseas the increases granted to those in New Zealand, Instead we are this time following the practice of the Australian Mission Board in establishing a scale of stipends independent of those applying in the home Conference, and in liberalizing allowances. Our scale, when rendered in Australian currency is considerably above that operating in the Australian mission districts adjacent to our own.

The cost of the new allowances will be about £1100 annually; to have made an 11% increase in basic stipends, as allowed in New Zealand, would have cost about the same amount.

Last year, the income from New Zealand circuits for overseas missions rose by 10%. Forty-two circuits fully realized the requested 20% increase or more. Two major circuits increased their giving for the current year, but as opportunities have expanded overseas whilst costs continue to mount, it is to be hoped that circuits likewise will continue to respond

increasingly to our appeals.

It was a great day when we were able to announce to Conference the attainment of the £10,000 target for the establishment fund of the Papua-New Guinea Highlands Missions. Some initial expenses have been met from that fund, but over £9000 remains to meet the establishment costs of the next new station.

Once again the M.W.M.U. added a special "gift" to their annual

estimate of £3100.

1956 has brought several major contributions to our leprosy work overseas. The Lepers' Trust Board gave us £3500 for leprosy treatment and our general medical programme. That raises to £26,250 the sum received from them since 1942. Their further contribution towards the leper relief vessel now in building has brought their total gift for that purpose to £19,500.

Out of their eightieth anniversary grants, the Mission to Lepers has voted us £2000. This sum is "earmarked" for pioneer leprosy work in the Highlands of New Guinea.

Amendment to Church Law:

In 1954, the Board voted to increase the annual payment to the Medical Missionary's Repatriation Fund from £50 to £100. This however requires an amendment to the law. The necessary recommendation appears below.

General Secretary:

The present General Secretary being now in his fifth year of office, the Board recommends to Synods and Conference that he be designated this year for re-appointment at the 1957 Conference for a further six-year term.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT, 1956

This Supplementary Report presents a brief resumé of the workers' annual reports and overseas District Synod business as presented to the annual meeting of the Foreign Mission Board.

SOLOMON ISLANDS: "We give thanks that through the movement of the Holy Spirit, the people are taking a more active part in the work of building the Church in the hearts of the native people, and witnessing to those who are weak and without the fellowship."

Thus does the annual Synod reply to the question on the spiritual state of the Islands Circuits. There are disappointments, we are told, and dissatisfaction in some circuits, but there are definite reports of spiritual progress, and consolidation and growing confidence in the work of the Church.

A small but significant minority of our people now frequent or live in the urban centres. A church site is recommended for Kieta; this year new sections have been acquired and a church built at Gizo. The report of the Fijian minister at Honiara speaks of a successful bazaar effort for the church building fund there. Again a new section is sought. In such centres these days a ministry is being provided and a response won.

In missionary thinking the world over, emphasis is being laid on those missionary services that history has proved to build up the young church. For example, there has again been steady progress in our literature and translation work. The Gospels and Acts in the Bambatana tongue have been published by the British and Foreign Bible Society for the Choiseul people. Many workers have shared in this production, but Sister Lucy Money has actually prepared the work for the press.

Leadership Training engages our workers at various levels. The Synod favours separating pastor training from teacher training, for which needs

differ as between the British Solomons and Bougainville. In girls' work four of the M.W.M.U. special objective dormitories are now complete, and another in building. When Sister Ada Lee returned from furlough she commenced at Kihili the District Girls' School for Bougainville.

Dr G. E. Hoult gained further experience in New Zealand and by arrangement with the Lepers' Trust Board, who generously met the travel costs, visited the Makogai Leprosarium, Fiji. Our Sisters and their helpers have continued the medical mission throughout the year. The Board is seeking new workers to replace Sister Davinia Clark and Sister Jessie Grant, who are leaving our staff. There will be a further nursing vacancy a year hence.

"Her name means more to those who know her than words can ever express," runs the Synod record of Sister Effie Harkness, as her retirement draws near. Sister Effie is one of the few workers who served both before 1942 and in the rehabilitation period since the war. Her withdrawal adds another to the list of teaching vacancies. Including the urgent plea of the Synod for work among Chinese and Solomon Islanders at Gizo, there are at least three teachers wanted, two of them immediately.

Whilst the Treasurers will report separately on the financial returns, we may take note here of the record figure of £12,129 in the thanksgiving of the people, together with a missionary offering of £409 to maintain their own workers in the Highlands of New Guinea. While the effect of this giving has been offset by steep rises in costs and by the decline in returns from our mission plantations, we should be encouraged by the evident will of our people to support the work of their church.

NEW GUINEA HIGHLANDS

The Rev. G. H. Young, whose deputation visits delighted so many New Zealand circuits, returned in July to the Highlands field. About that time further areas adjacent to Mendi were "derestricted" by the Administration. Our workers have been able to enter another valley, where the Rev. David Mone will be placed in charge. Earlier other "Teachers' Stations" were opened out from both Mendi and Tari. At Tari, the land for the leprosarium has now been made available. The £2,000 from the Mission to Lepers will be called on in the capital expenditure involved.

Mr Gordon Dey, has recently finished building at Mendi the first permanent Mission house, for which the timber was pit sawn and seasoned locally. Mr Dey is shortly due on furlough. The Rev. C. J. Keightley is due for furlough late next year. At present Mr Keightley is in charge at Tari station during the furlough in Queensland of the Rev. R. L. Barnes. Sister Edith James has now been almost twelve months at Tari, where medical activities are increasing, and where Sister Edith has also commenced definite training work among the girls.

Before Conference, the annual meeting of the Board will be reviewing our staffing commitments in relation to the Highlands Field. Four New Zealand workers were promised as our share, and the Highlands Field committee has submitted a list of priorities as to the nature of the fourth worker whom we are still to appoint.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 31st AUGUST, 1956

In the absence from this country of the lay Treasurer, Mr G. S. Gapper, it falls to my lot to present the financial report of the Foreign Mission Department.

Statement on Income and Expenditure:

The statement for the financial year ended 31st August, 1956, reveals a considerable increase in the contributions from circuits in New Zealand

and also from the Solomon Islands District. The increase of £4654 in the Solomon Islands Thanksgiving is indeed a notable advance, being £2989 more than estimated. As a set off against this the Solomon Islands Synod reports a considerable reduction in returns for sale of produce. £2251 was estimated, but only £690 was received, being £1790 less than last year. The contributions from New Zealand circuits amounted to £19,274, being £1830 more than the amount shown in last year's financial statement. The estimate based on a three-year average was for £16,609.

Government Grants:

Grants for medical and educational purposes totalled £3909 being approximately the amount estimated to be received (£3835). Details of income for special purposes are shown in the special financial statement.

During the year the LEPERS' TRUST BOARD contributed £3500 to the Fund of the Society, and the MISSION TO LEPERS paid £2000 for leper work in the Papua New Guinea Highlands.

The BOAT INSURANCE FUND now totals £15,320, £874 having been added during the year by appropriation and interest.

LEGACIES have added £1,989 to the Building and Equipment Fund during the year, which after expenditure and deduction now stands at £1661.

The M.W.M.U. have transferred to the Board the sum of £1800 for dormitories at Buka and £100 for translation work. £3350 has been received from the M.W.M.U. towards payment of Sisters' Salaries.

VANE'S BEQUEST. Through the General Purposes Trust Board the sum of £400 was received to be applied to the relief of distressed Missionary Sisters. This money has been invested and the interest will be reserved for the purpose indicated.

Gift for Papua New Guinea Highlands:

A gift of £100 to be devoted to agricultural work in the Highlands has been sent in. Our thanks are due to the donor.

As will be seen from the Statement of Income and Expenditure the financial year ended with a credit balance of £144. Unfortunately, the financial statements for the Papua New Guinea Highlands field were not to hand when the accounts were finalised and it may well be that when they come to hand we shall find that instead of a surplus there will be a deficiency in the accounts.

It is obvious that the increasing costs of our missionary enterprise make it necessary that the utmost economy should be exercised in our expenditure and that our people in New Zealand and on the overseas fields be moved to "give and give and give again."

Missionary Periodicals:

The deficiency on the publications over the last few years caused the Board last year to increase the price of the "Open Door." The result has proved financially satisfactory. The loss this year was only £30, and it is anticipated that next year the paper will pay its way.

By decision of the last Annual Meeting, it was decided to reduce "The Lotu" in size in order to effect economies. The financial returns make it plain that at the present price we shall have to provide for an annual loss of approximately £140.

During the absence of Mr Gapper on an extended holiday, Mr W. A. Smith has served as Accountant to the Board, and our thanks are due to him for his efficient services.

In concluding this, my last report as Treasurer after eleven years in office, may I express my appreciation of the cordial relations that have always existed between the Board and its executive officers and myself.

My work as Treasurer has brought me into contact with Circuit Ministers and Circuit Stewards and Foreign Mission Secretaries, and I

am glad that we have worked so happily together in the interests of the Kingdom overseas.

May God continue to bless the great enterprise.

Methodist Women's Missionary Union FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING

In presenting this report of the M.W.M.U. for the year ending 31st August, 1956, it is with a deep sense of gratitude to God for His Goodness, in that our membership and our financial returns show a considerable increase, knowing as we do that the membership figures for four new Auxiliaries formed in the closing stages of the District Council year, are not included.

Tribute:

On 2nd June, 1956, one of our Life Members, Mrs E. M. Hodder of Palmerston North, passed to higher service. We do thank God for a long life of devoted service. To all who have suffered bereavement throughout the past year, we convey our love and sincere sympathy.

Executive:

Fourteen meetings have been held, some special meetings having to be fitted in because of force of circumstances, and all commencing with a devotional period led by various members. One special meeting was arranged to meet the Rev. and Mrs G. H. Young, of the New Guinea Highlands, and we appreciate their consideration in agreeing to meet us during their holiday period in New Zealand. Another special meeting was arranged to meet the Rev. S. G. Andrews, to discuss Foreign Mission Board matters, and at this meeting we were pleased to welcome Sister Edna White, and thereby gain a closer contact with her and the matters she cares for in the Union. Yet another special meeting was arranged to study the plans, specifications and tenders received for the alterations and extensions to "Kurahuna", and we are glad to report that at last we are at the stage of waiting for the builder to commence.

Membership:

This figure of 5,925 is an increase of 42 on the previous year, and includes Gleaners whose boxes have been opened. Concern is felt that nine Districts report decreases (totalling 192), and as the increase figure is more than offset by the increased number of gleaners, which has its repercussions in printing and distributing, it is perhaps timely for us to look into our active membership. Auxiliaries from which financial returns have come, remain the same, 215, but the total number of Auxiliaries now meeting is 219. Mt. Eden Evening Auxiliary has withdrawn, but we gladly welcome Auxiliaries at Okato and Manaia (Taranaki), Opotiki and Rotorua Evening (Bay of Plenty) and Penrose (Auckland). Many new Gleaners' Groups are also reported.

District Councils:

Nineteen District Councils still continue to function, all devoting one meeting early in the year to a District Convention, each of these receiving a personal message from the Dominion President. These Conventions, giving as they do, a greater coverage in those attending, are a great inspiration and help to individual Auxiliaries. Evening Auxiliaries were catered for by extra evening meetings. Several Districts held special Christmas and Easter meetings.

President's Monthly Letter:

Many messages have been received expressing appreciation to the Dominion President for her inspirational leadership in this way. Again there has been an increased demand, and the 2,300 printed monthly leaves a very meagre margin. An increase in Gleaners' Membership makes an increased demand inevitable.

Stamps:

Mrs Macalister says:—"In presenting the stamp report for 1955-56, I wish to thank first of all those throughout the Dominion who have been so consistent and spent so much time in the preparation of the stamps for sale, the amount from the same being an increase of £63/5/11, a considerable increase on last year's figure, for which I am grateful. The special issue on sale this year was the Southland Centennial, by which we should profit, and we hope for a more successful year in 1956-57.

Gleanings:

Miss Hanham reports:—This year 1892 Gleaners' letters have been sent out—that is 117 more than last year. Although there is quite an increase in the number of Gleaners, the boxes opened (1613), which is the figure used in our membership figures, is well short of the total letters sent. This figure is an increase of 188 on last year. The total amount subscribed by Gleaners is £1572/15/9, an increase of £212/3/5, which is a very encouraging result.

Literature:

Miss Palmer has sent out the President's letter for all Auxiliaries and to all women Mission workers. Easter offering envelopes were sent to Districts who needed them.

Home Sisters' Parcels:

Mrs R. Ashworth says:—"Greetings and grateful thanks to all who have contributed to this branch of the work, particularly Manawatu District, they having forwarded 63 parcels from thein 14 Auxiliaries—a grand effort and worthy of special mention. May I remind all Districts not to overlook the importance of keeping up a steady flow, and keeping our Sisters well supplied with parcels, for all contributions are so genuinely appreciated by them. The total for the year of 570 parcels (including sacks), shows a decrease of 8. Could we not make up this deficiency during the coming year? How about it?—and thank you in anticipation."

Overseas Sisters:

Sister June Hilder did itinerary work in the Thames Valley District immediately after Conference, giving a longer period than originally planned, to cover the uncompleted itinerary of Sister Helen Whitlow. Sister June also spoke at three meetings in Hawke's Bay, besides speaking to groups in her own home area. Sister Effie Harkness spoke at a few local groups near her own home and her holiday home, while Sister Ada Lee offered her services around the Christchurch area and also spoke at Ashburton and Timaru.

Home Sisters:

It has not been possible to arrange for any Home Sisters to do deputation work during the year. It will be noted from reports that their time in the early part of this year was very broken, and it is a big thing to ask a Sister to arrange her routine work to fit in a fortnight or so visiting Auxiliary groups, however much these visits are appreciated.

New Workers:

On 15th December, 1955, at Motueka, Sister Mary Addison was dedicated a Nursing Sister, and after a slight delay, left Christchurch on the 24th February, 1956, for the Solomons. Sister Audrey Grice was dedicated at Ngaio, Wellington, on 20th December, 1955, and left on the 7th January, 1956, for the Summer School of Linguistics at Melbourne. After an intensive course there, she arrived on the Field late in March, to take up her Teaching appointment.

Smethurst Home:

"More Sisters than usual—ten in all—have availed themselves of the use of the Home for their holiday period. The summer months proved the most popular period, as the flat was occupied continuously during January and February. In addition, use of the flat was made by Sisters for several week-ends, and many odd days have been spent there by the Auckland Hostel Sisters. As in previous years the Sisters have found the peace and quietness of the Home most beneficial and all are very appreciative of the facilities provided for them".

Home Mission Department

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

The Board:

The Home Mission Board has seen several changes in membership this year. Rev H. J. Odell removed to Wellington, Rev G. E. Brown became a Supernumerary, and Rev W. M. Garner removed to Thames. After a long and outstanding term of service Miss E. M. Rishworth retired from the Board and a special resolution of thanks was recorded in the minutes.

New Members this year are Revs R. H. Allen, G. R. Harris and D. G. Sherson, Messrs F. M. Souster, J. G. Rennie, Dr M. Winiata and Miss M. Waddingham.

Lay Treasurer:

After a term of twenty years of distinguished and faithful service as Lay Treasurer, Mr Frank Penn felt compelled on the ground of advancing years to retire from that office. The Board very reluctantly accepted this resignation and recorded the debt which the Church feels to Mr Penn for his generous and able service over such a long period. It is a remarkable fact that the Home Mission Department has had only three Lay Treasurers in the course of its history.

The Board has pleasure in reporting that Mr H. M. Patrick, M.V.O., has agreed to accept the task as Lay Treasurer and his appointment for 1957 is recommended.

Home Mission Staff:

The following changes are reported:

Mr J. F. Walls and Mr F. A. Fitzsimons resigned from the work. Reference was made at last Conference to the retirement of Rev W. J. Bryant after a very helpful ministry.

Mr F. E. Trim who has served as a Home Missionary Supply for eleven years, felt able to accept further appointment and the Board granted him status as a Home Missionary.

Messrs G. K. Greening and G. H. J. Yearbury were accepted as Home Missionary Probationers,

Mr Maurice Gilbert was accepted for service, but owing to business ties, has not yet been able to take up his appointment.

Visit of Rev Dr and Mrs Colin A. Roberts:

We have been honoured by a visit from Rev Dr and Mrs Colin A. Roberts, ex-President of the British Conference and retired General Secretary of the British Home Mission Department. Owing to ill health in Australia, Dr Roberts was forced to curtail his planned itinerary in New Zealand, but the group of meetings and services conducted by these two visitors were much appreciated.

Deputation Work:

Again this year a full programme of Deputation work has been taken by the Department Officers. The film "John Wesley", has continued to bring much encouragement, and the two fine films being shown by Rev B. M. Chrystall have earned high praise and thanks.

Designation:

Of General Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent.

Once more the time has come to reconsider the above appointments and the Board recommends the redesignation of both officers for a further term of appointment. Women as Home Missionaries:

The need has arisen for the Church to define regulations for the employment of women as Home Missionaries, and after full and careful consideration, the Board has drafted and adopted suitable clauses which are attached as recommendations for Conference approval.

Methodist Literature and Colporteur Society (Incorporated):

The Epworth Bookroom, Auckland, reports another successful year of trading. The new shop continues to win the response of our people and the general public. The Manager and his two assistants give very faithful service, and the thanks of the Church are due to them for their good work. We were glad to be able to appoint a second assistant during the year.

Position of Home Missionaries in Relation to the Ordained Ministry:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, p.129, Res. 12)
The Board summarises the policy re the above as expressed in earlier
Conference Reports and resolutions as under.

The Church will always need a certain number of men to fulfil a supply ministry. Some men who can fulfil such a function in the Church do not desire to offer for the full Ministry.

Every suitable man is encouraged to offer as a candidate for the Ministry and the Church welcomes such candidature.

No Home Missionary is received into the Ministry on the grounds of seniority only.

The Conference has power to accept suitable men and to set for them suitable courses of study according to their capacity and experience.

To reduce the economic hurdle for experienced Senior Home Missionaries, men who have fulfilled an effective term of ten years service may be granted status as "Senior Home Missionaries", with a stipend approximating more closely to that of an Ordained Minister. Such men are assured of greater continuity of appointment.

Policy for New Housing Areas:

Our Department was represented at the official Conference on Religious Education. It was felt that the findings on this particular aspect of the work should be presented to the Conference through the Annual Report of our Department,

Concern:

We are concerned that much of the Church's extension work in the past has not developed as expected: we feel that such projects have often begun as Sunday Schools, and have not developed into Churches. The Sunday School is not an end in itself: rather it is the handmaid of the Church.

We consider the following conditions to be relevant to the building of the Church in a new area:

- 1. A group of Christian people, however small, meeting in a fellowship of worship, is an almost essential prerequisite to the establishment of the cause. New Churches which are going well are almost always built around a loyal nucleus of worshipping families.
- 2. People who are to be attracted from outside need to find a fellowship of a reasonable number already gathered and united.
- 3. Timing is important: the Church should come into the Community as early as possible, and grow with it rather than attempting to superimpose itself later.
- 4. The congregation should very early develop a pastoral responsibility both for reaching and shepherding others: it should urge others to bring their children into the family life of the Church rather than merely to send them to a Sunday School.
- 5. The local Church should conceive its own programme, carrying out as much of it itself as it possibly can, e.g., on the Sunday using its

own members to lead worship, rather than being completely dependent on casual preachers. As much flexibility as possible should be left to the local Church, leaving room for initiative.

- 6. There should be a continuity of Pastoral oversight as soon as possible whether given by a supernumerary minister, a deaconess, a worker in the Order of St Stephen, or a local preacher.
- 7. As soon as possible there should be an appointment of a resident married minister with reasonable continuity.
- 8. There is a real value in the holding of a mission, early in the Church's life, in order to build up a group of committed people.
- 9. Training in reverence and worship should be given right from the commencement of the work—provision of a sanctuary in any building used for church activities is essential.
- 10. When a community sees groups working to build a Church, many will offer themselves and by working with others, will find their way into the fellowship.
- 11. There is a real value both in the local cause taking responsibility for its own work, and also for the new cause feeling itself undergirded by the care and concern of the wider Church especially the other Churches in the circuit.
- 12. The newly established church should seek as many ways as possible of serving not only the youth but the whole community.

Conclusion:

We again commend the work of the Department to the prayerful support of our people.

Maori Mission Report

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

This brief report of the Home Mission Board on the Maori Mission work for the year is accompanied by a report of a Special Committee appointed by the Board in terms of Conference Resolution, 1955, page 132, Rs. 3.

We report on the general work of the year with its sorrows and perplexities and its joys, believing that our Divine Master has used our work in the blessing of many.

Obituary:

Early in the year a great sorrow came to our Mission in the passing of Rev R. P. Rakena who had an honoured place in our work as a faithful and beloved Minister of the Gospel. We can ill afford to lose such experienced workers at this time.

Another sadness was the passing of Mrs Te Hira Ratete, wife of our Senior Maori Home Missionary and mother of Rev Rangi Rogers. To all the relatives of these good folk, we express the deep sympathy of the whole Church.

Maori Workers Conference:

Our Maori workers Conference was held this year at Central Mission Health Camp, Campbell's Bay, Auckland, under the Chairmanship of Rev E. Te Tuhi. This proved to be one of the most worthwhile Conferences we have yet held, and every aspect of the work was carefully and prayerfully scrutinized. In particular, the matters raised by the Special Committee were discussed with their representatives and much clearer understanding of the problems and the responsibilities of the work emerged.

One special request that we wish the Synods in Maori Mission Districts to observe is that when this Annual Report of the Board on the Maori work is considered, opportunity should also be given for the Maori Mission Representatives at the Synod to present an Annual Review of the work in the District, such report with any relevant resolutions to be sent to the Board after the Synod. To facilitate this, all Maori Mission workers attending the Synod should meet at a suitable time before or early in the Synod, to prepare such District Report. Chairmen are asked to facilitate this please in the over-all planning of the Synod.

STAFF

Maori Home Missionaries:

During the year, Revs Wiremu Tonga, Rangi Katipa and Enoka Marumaru retired from part-time or full-time service, and they retain their status to assist where possible in the Mission activities, with re-muneration as Honorary Maori Home Missionaries.

Three part-time workers have come on to full-time service. Rev Te Akonga Pihama is stationed at Ngaruawahia, and Rev A. G. Kahua and Te Urunga Wetere are visiting throughout the Waikato and Maniapoto Maori Circuits with occasional visits to the Wanganui area, conducting Evangelistic Meetings and film services, and exerting a pastoral and preaching ministry. We commend their visits to the Pakeha Churches and to the whole of the Maori Mission Staff.

Deaconesses:

After Conference, Sister Ruth Hilder moved to Auckland as Assistant Matron at Seamer House. Probationer June Peters from Deaconess House took up duties at Hamilton, and has settled in well. Miss Mary Sealey, after two valuable years in Supply status in Waikato, has been accepted as a Deaconess Probationer and appointed to Dargaville to follow Sister Rona Keightley who resigned to be married. Miss Hana Hauraki after several years in Hostel and District work in the Waikato as a part-time Supply, has gone as a Supply in full-time service to Hokianga.

Senior Maori Superintendent: Rev E. Te Tuhi who is semi-retired, and living at Aratapu in the Northern Wairoa, has continued to give very valuable assistance as acting Senior Maori Superintendent. His visits from time to time to the different Maori Circuits and his attendances at special gatherings have all been much appreciated and he stands very high in the regard of the people. The Board members are very grateful for his wise and able leadership.

Financial Support:

We again record our sincere thanks to the members of the M.W.M.U. and the Youth of the Church for their special help to our work. The regular and substantial assistance sent for the support of the Sisters on the field by the M.W.M.U. in particular is a very helpful factor as we face each year's programme of work.

Another year of service in the Hostels conducted by our Church for Maori Youth, has again given us the satisfaction of knowing that in this development we have been Divinely led.

With recent retirements and deaths, our Staff of full-time Maori Ministers has been seriously depleted. We urgently need several consecrated and well trained additional workers. We ask for the prayers of our people. both Pakeha and Maori, that suitable young candidates may offer and that the Church will be enabled to offer such men the facilities for training.

We are conscious that many of our people are upholding this great work in their prayers and we commend it again to the loyal and patient support of the whole Church.

Special Report on the Maori Mission

Terms of Reference:

(Minutes of Conference, 1955, p.132, Res. 3) That the Home Mission Board set up a Committee to review the Maori Mission work of the Church and to examine its relationship, financial and otherwise to the other activities of the Department, to consult with the Staff of the Mission at the Maori Workers' Conference 1956, and to prepare a factual statement of the whole position for presentation to Synods and Conference.

Immediately after Conference, the Board appointed a Special Representative Committee which met and considered the order of reference and prepared a basis of a survey of the work. This was discussed in detail with the members of the Maori Workers' Conference, and as a result the following report was prepared and discussed in the later meeting of the Special Committee and presented to the Home Mission Board. It is now submitted to the Synods and Conference for their consideration.

In presenting this report, the Committee and the Home Mission Board members would at the outset, state that the present condition of the Maori work and the many serious difficulties confronting the Church and its workers, continue to give us all very great concern. The problems that exist are not new, nor are they peculiar in every instance to the Maori Mission, rather are many of them characteristic of Mission work anywhere in the world. We are more aware of many of the problems owing to the close proximity of the two races in this country.

From our investigations, and from long observation it is evident that the chief difficulties are arising from two main factors.

- 1. The clash of cultures, with the aftermath of the series of Maori Wars over land questions, has left us a legacy of historical prejudices which are very little understood by most people.
- 2. The Mission has been, and today is more than ever so, hopelessly understaffed.

In assessing the work from the standpoint of the Pakeha Church, it is evident that another factor is that the Maori people have a greater sense of tribal and community life than have Europeans, and until the inroads of certain sects which have divided the people along the lines of Sectarian rivalry, the Maori people were little conscious of "Denomination". The broad policy of the Maori Staff has been to minister to the people as a whole rather than to selected families within the community. This has naturally weakened emphasis on membership as such, and on the distinctive Methodist emphases.

The Maori people have therefore a different attitude to membership from that of our Pakeha Church. To them, baptism means identity with the church and therefore membership in it. The Pakeha conception of responsible membership based on personal commitment, is only beginning to take hold of them. It is for this reason, together with our limited staff, that has made it difficult to establish the type of Church Government and organisation common to the Pakeha Church.

Thus the Maori people have not had a vehicle for the expression of Maori feeling. Largely the pattern of church life has been taken to them, and interpreted by the Staff of Maori workers.

Further, we have not sufficient focus for Church loyalty in suitable Church buildings. Owing to Maori custom, we have been dependent on private homes or Maori Meeting Houses on Maraes, as the location of our services. Our workers have gone to the whole people on the Marae which is the centre of their life. Moreover the Maori people have a different conception of worship from that of the Pakeha and they do not distinguish so closely between the Secular and the Sacred. Worship is naturally integrated with their whole life.

Some of these difficulties will be elaborated further in the body of the report.

Our Field of Work:

Our Maori Mission Circuits cover:

1. AUCKLAND.

- (a) North Auckland. The area first substantially disrupted by European contacts. Traders seeking timber and flax, and bartering trade goods and European weapons. Maori life swept off its feet. Land was early alienated in large blocks, and the Maori people largely impoverished. Economic problems have been very acute. The people dropped many aspects of Maori culture: now beginning to regain confidence. This area has been for many years, a happy hunting ground of the Sects. The Ratana Movement made a big appeal with its conception of a Maori Religious Movement. Large groups of people went over in whole tribal communities. Our work has been made exceedingly difficult by the divisions that have thus come right down into every aspect of community and family life. Many very fine Methodist loyal families remain, and they desire to see our work stabilised and strengthened.
- (b) Auckland City and Lower Waikato River Area. This area has a big population of Maori people from many tribes who have moved into the District for employment. The Lower Waikato (Tuakau to Waiuku and Pukekohe) has a growing community also.

A new urban community is developing here, and as yet it is very loosely grouped.

2. THE REST OF THE WESTERN HALF OF THE NORTH ISLAND. This covers:

(a) Waikato-Maniapoto, with marginal work reaching out to groups of families of Methodist connection in the Bay of Plenty, Rotorua, Waikato River-Taupo Districts, and the Hydro electricity construction towns, and timber towns.

In this area, our work has made great progress in recent years after long years of patient effort to regain the confidence of the people who had been so seriously alienated by the Maori Wars and the land troubles that followed.

This whole area is still largely marked by this pattern and there will need to be very careful and patient work for many years before it will be a fully stable community. We are greatly enheartened by the response of many of the people to the challenge of the Christian Faith.

(b) Taranaki-Wanganii. This Circuit also carries many similar marks to the previous district, but there are other local problems that go back earlier than the Waikato problems. It was in this area that the earliest of the major Maori Wars took place, and they have left their mark on the whole community. Earlier Maori Cults, Hau Hau, Te Whiti, Tohu Movements, and later the Ratana and Maramatanga Movements, have claimed the interest of many. It is in this area that the Roman Catholic Church has made a big bid to swing the people into their membership.

3. SOUTH ISLAND.

Methodism pioneered Maori work in the South Island, but many years ago our Church withdrew full-time workers and attached the Maori work to adjacent European Circuits, sending Maori workers as occasional visitors from the North Island.

Present Staff:

In this work we have the following staff:

1. In the Department. Part of the time of the General Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent is given to Maori contacts and planning, the main effort being to encourage the Maori Staff themselves to develop a fully Maori Church life and pattern of work.

The Rev H. A. Darvill is a full-time Maori Missionary, working in close fellowship with the Maori workers.

The Rev E. Te Tuhi is Senior Maori Minister, now semi-retired. He is resident minister in the Dargaville area, and he makes distant trips as required to various Maori Circuits. His leadership is invaluable.

2. Auckland Circuit. Rev Rangi Rogers in Auckland City is resident minister and Circuit Superintendent. He has a constant round of preaching (at least 3 services every Sunday around the city and suburbs) and wide pastotal responsibilities.

Rev Rua Rakena at Waima in the Hokianga District, North Auckland, is the only other full-time Maori Minister in the Circuit.

Rev M. Tauroa in the Whangaroa and Rev N. K. Kukutai in the Tuakau area are now retired, and they are each paid a small honorarium in lieu of Superannuation, and a moderate travelling allowance to enable them to conduct local services and to travel when needed further afield.

A regular travelling allowance is paid to Rev Piripi Livingstone in the Bay of Islands to assist the work there.

In addition the following men hold status as Honorary Home Missionaries and when necessary a small allowance is sent for actual travelling costs incurred in Mission work. Most of them receive no remuneration at all. They are: Rameka Eru in Victoria Valley, Te Hira Ratete in Hokianga, Hotai M. Hohepa at Kaikohe, H. Hemara at Hikurangi, Tawai Kawiti at Waiomio, Nehana Pu at Whananaki, Henare Kapa at Pouto, John Harris at Pakiri, H. Wiperi, M. Winiata, Paikea Toka, W. P. Ihaka and H. Wilcox in Auckland, Ngaweke Tuhimata at Tuakau, and Waaka Kukutai at Te Kohanga.

Deaconesses. Working down from the North we have Miss Hana Hauraki, a full-time Supply in the Hokianga; Sister Olive Bott in the Bay of Islands and Whangaroa. Probationer Mary Sealey in Dargaville and mid North Auckland.

In Auckland City and the area from Port Albert to Waikato Heads, we have Sister Nicholls and Sister Jean Miller in Auckland City, and Sister Kathleen Rogers at Papatoetoe.

The Maori Mission Centre is in Airedale Street, Auckland.

Kurahuna Hostel (M.W.M.U.) led by Sister Madeline Holland is at Onehunga. Capacity is 20 girls.

Seamer House for Maori Girls under the leadership of Mr and Mrs Stan Moore and Sister Ruth Hilder is at Remuera. Capacity is 37 girls.

James Buller Memorial Mission Centre is in Dargaville.

The plan of services conducted regularly by Rev R. Rogers covers 21 preaching places and pastoral visits to the Hostels in the area. He also visits the Maori homes throughout the area. The Auckland Deaconesses report 690 homes visited in the area and Northwards, and 260 homes in the outer Southern area. They have 330 children in Maori Sunday Schools, meeting regularly in 20 Sunday Schools. They have also linked up some 70 Maori children with Pakeha Sunday Schools. There are 5 Bible Lessons conducted in Schools. This is in the area from Waikato Heads to Port Albert.

Rev Rua D. Rakena has a plan covering some 22 preaching places with many homes visited for occasional cottage meetings—a regular feature of the Maori work.

In the Dargaville area, Mr Te Tuhi visits the Settlements as far as Kaipara Heads.

Sister Mary Sealey has 7 Sunday Schools with 120 children linked up, and two Maori Youth Clubs.

Sister Olive Bott reports 9 monthly Sunday Schools with 211 scholars, 1 monthly Bible Class with 10 members, and 3 Women's Meetings with 25

members; together with cottage services wherever possible, and Bible Lessons in 5 Day School classes fortnightly with 170 children.

Miss Hannah Hauraki at Rawene reports 15 monthly Sunday Schools with an attendance of 140, one weekly Bible Class and two fortnightly and four monthly Bible classes with 76 members. Also 3 youth clubs and 5 monthly women's meetings.

Statistics from other workers in this Circuit were not available for inclusion in this report, but they cover similar work in each area.

3. WAIKATO AND MANIAPOTO CIRCUITS.

Rev A. J. Seamer is Acting Circuit Superintendent for these two Circuits, living in Hamilton at Te Rahui (T) the Maori Boys' Hostel. Rev H. A. Darvill lives in Hamilton and travels from there throughout the Mission. He assists in editing "Maataapuna", Maori family magazine, and is also Secretary of the Maori Section of the National Council of Churches. Mr Darvill's work is planned to give him regular trips of several weeks to the Taranaki-Wanganui area, and the Auckland and North Auckland area alternately, and while in Hamilton he works out to preaching and pastoral contacts through the Waikato and Maniapoto Circuits. It is also necessary for him to take a small section of Deputation work from time to time.

We have no trained Ordained Maori Minister in these Circuits. Rev Lane Tauroa is stationed at Kawhia, serving the Pakeha Home Mission Station and the Maori work in that part of the Circuit.

At Ngaruawahia, Rev Te Akonga Pihama is full-time Home Missionary, Revs Heemi Rihimona (Retired) and A. G. Kahui and Tutu Keepa live in Ngaruawahia, Mr Kahui is on full-time duty with Rev Te Urunga Wetere, working through Waikato and King Country on film evangelism and general pastoral and preaching duties.

At Te Kuiti, Rev Paahi Moke maintains a contact with a group of Maori Settlements while semi-retired. Other honorary or retired Home Missionaries in Waikato Circuit are: Mu Maihi at Waikaretu, Wiremu Tonga in Hamilton, Tuteao Manihera at Raglan, Te Iwikau Waaka at Otaramarae (Rotorua), Pukerau Rangitutia at Arohena, Matene H. de Thierry at Rangiriri, J. Hatoitoi Pihama at Frankton, Tame Pihama at Whatawhata. In the Maniapoto Circuit are the following Honorary Home Missionaries: Tame Ponui at Kopaki, Roi Moke at Aotea, Paki Manga at Otorohanga, Rangi Katipa at Ngutunui, Waiwera Rangawhenua at Maketu Pa, Tumu Te Huia at Makomako, Nguru Winikerei at Marokopa and Hohepa Hona at Pureora.

Deaconesses: Sister Hobbs is stationed at Ngaruawahia, Sister Heeni Wharemaru is at Te Rahui (T) as Matron and working a district area as well. These two Deaconesses report three weekly Sunday Schools, 6 fortnightly, and 6 monthly, with approximately 300 children enrolled. They have three Bible Classes with some twenty members, two Youth Clubs, and many women's cottage meetings held as opportunity offers. Altogether they are in touch with 200 homes and some 800 young people.

Sister June Peters, with one regular weekly Sunday School and 10 fortnightly with 113 children enrolled and five places where services are held.

Sister Frances Smith has 16 Sunday Schools during the month with 200 children, and she visits some 230 homes, conducting services in 7 preaching places.

Sister Winifred Bennett has 15 Sunday Schools to organise each week, and 7 additional monthly Sunday Schools—a total of 200 children. She has one Bible Class of 30 members, and she visits 195 homes.

All the above Deaconesses make their centre in Hamilton where we have Te Rahui (T) Maori Boys' Hostel, and Te Rahua (W) Maori Girls' Hostel each with capacity of 34.

In the Maniapoto Circuit: Sister Mavis Dickie is stationed at Otorohanga where the new Maori Centre is being organised. She covers the areas at the Northern King Country—Waikato boundary out to Kawhia. Sister Mavis reports one fortnightly Sunday School, 16 monthly and 3 quarterly gatherings, with 344 scholars; with associated Bible Class work and women's meetings. Altogether 150 families are visited.

Sister Grace Clement is at Te Kuiti where we have another Maori Centre, "Te Huinga". Sister Grace covers central and Southern King Country, and Wanganui River area to Ratana Pa. She reports 13 monthly Sunday Schools and 6 Quarterly Sunday Schools which are really family services. She meets in these Sunday Schools 200 young people. She conducts one youth club, and co-operates with the Maori Women's Organisations throughout the district.

TARANAKI - WANGANUI CIRCUIT

Since the greatly lamented death of the late Rev R. P. Rakena this year, the only full-time Maori Minister in this Circuit is Rev A. W. Tahere in New Plymouth. In addition, Rev W. I. W. Wharehoka at Pungarehu is on call when needed as an Honorary Home Missionary. Mr Tahere now spends alternate week-ends at the Hawera and New Plymouth ends of his Circuit, and is on call to every part of the district for special ministerial calls. In North Taranaki he conducts services in 13 centres, ministering to 340 people from 85 homes.

Sister Evelyn Marriott leads the work of Rangiatea Maori Girls' Hostel with some 12 girls in residence.

Sister Betty Yearbury, stationed at Opunake, with the small Centre "Puna Ke" as her base, reports 9 fortnightly Sunday Schools, and two others with 151 children on the rolls, and five fortnightly Bible Classes with 76 members. She holds two regular Women's Meetings with 14 mem-She also visits 33 familities at Centres other than those where Sunday Schools are conducted.

Sister Anne Wilson, stationed at Hawera with the "R. T. Haddon Memorial Centre" as her base, reports one weekly Sunday School, seven fortnightly and two monthly, with 210 children enrolled. She has also three Bible Classes with 34 members, and one regular Youth Club of 18 members. She leads two Women's Fellowships with 24 members. She reports at least 144 families regularly visited.

SOUTH ISLAND

Mr Wera Couch has recently accepted appointment as a Maori Honorary Home Missionary and we hope to plan for his visits to Maori South Island Centres in the new future.

Sister Eleanor Dobby, in Christchurch, maintains contact personally with about 130 homes in the Canterbury area, and in addition maintains a mailing list of 366 families to whom Christian literature and letters of Christian greeting are sent regularly.

Rehua Hostel for Maori Boys is conducted by the Christchurch Central Mission. Capacity 18 boys.

Youth Activities:

Each year, Youth Camps are organized by the workers in each Maori Circuit, and now the Maori young folk are developing a Maori Section of the Youth Movement, with their own leadership school held annually.

Staffing Needs:

With the growth of the Maori population and its spread throughout the community, there is need for further workers both men and women. to make anything like adequate and effective contact with them. The Maori Staff are earnestly looking into this and hoping to encourage suitable young folk to offer for training. In addition to the present staff, we need trained Ordained Maori Ministers for Waikato, and Hawera, and several Deaconesses for reducing the huge areas at present covered by each of our workers. If staff were available, we should have one in the Tuakau-Franklin area, another in the Mangakino area, another in North Taranaki, and another in the Wanganui-Ratana area, as a minimum.

All such appointments would involve additional finance.

Finance of the Mission and relationship to total Department finance:

It should be remembered that the Maori Mission Circuit finances are carried in the Home Mission Fund, while subsidies only to the European work from the Home Mission Fund are shown. In every area covered by a full-time Maori Minister, there are at least 14 European Ministers or Home Missionaries working over reasonably confined areas, and the home Mission subsidy for such work by way of Grant is shown in the detailed Departmental Estimates for each year.

Last year £25,220 was spent by the Home Mission Fund. Of this £15,220 was spent as the Circuit Expenditure on Maori work. £10,000 was also spent in Department expenditure and Circuit and Connexional Grants on the General Work.

Of the Income received, £3,545 was received from M.W.M.U. specifically for Deaconess Salaries, etc., and towards the support of a Maori Minister in Auckland. £240 actual cash collections were received from Maori Circuits. £2,500 was received from Mission Properties and interest on Department investments.

Many years ago, when Maori Mission Properties and Maori Mission Investments were all linked into the common funds of the Department, it was on the understanding that the first claim on the Fund should be the adequate meeting of the requirements of the Maori work.

The question of the Finances was fully and carefully discussed at the Maori Workers' Conference. General concern was expressed at the inadequate net cash return from Maori giving and steps were taken to bring this earnestly before the people generally.

It was felt, however, that once more the following difficulties should be explained to the Conference:

- 1. Many Maori people who are on the fringe of the Church, constantly remind our workers of the early gifts and sale of Maori lands for Church purposes, and they try to evade their present responsibilities by sheltering behind these earlier matters. Such an attitude of course, is not peculiar to Maori folk.
- Owing to the limited number of our workers and the huge areas covered, regular planned services are constantly interrupted by special calls on the minister.
- 3. Frequently the people gather for some tribal occasion, such as a tangi of an important leader, and all the services conducted are tribal and not denominational, and normal offerings cannot be taken.
- 4. In the communal setting of Maori life, many calls are made on the finances of the people in the way of hospitality for large gatherings, which never show on the balance sheets of the church.
- 5. In addition to the cash sent into the Home Mission Fund, there are other amounts involved in the support of Maori Camps, donations towards deaconess travelling, and efforts towards the maintenance of the newer buildings of the Mission, such as our Maori Centres. Many of the Honorary workers are involved in constant outlay as they travel to Maori gatherings to represent the Church in some ministerial duties.

Having said that, the workers pledged themselves to do all in their power to encourage the people to a greater sense of stewardship and responsibility for some more adequate support of the work.

Preachers:

In this connection, the need was recognised for developing a group of better equipped local preachers who could assist in an emergency to hold a service if the minister was called away. This matter is being examined, and pakeha ministers are asked to assist in the holding of classes for local preachers, and to co-operate with the Maori Ministers in this work generally.

Mission Organisation:

There has been a drift in the matter of holding Leaders and Quarterly Meetings. Owing to the huge Circuits, and the few workers, such gatherings have been mostly meetings of workers and the general membership of the church has not been drawn into the life of the church at all adequately.

At this point most careful thought was given, and already steps are being taken to form regional sectional Leaders Meetings which will conduct the type of business normally necessary in such gatherings. From these there will be drawn representatives to more representative Quarterly Meetings where more of the Connexional and representative duties will be fulfilled, such as reviewing over-all finance, appointment of local preachers, representatives to Synods and Conference, etc. A new recognition of the need for this, and a greater desire for it, has been showing itself recently and if it is faithfully followed up, it should bring greatly enriched life to our Mission work.

Relationships with the European Work:

It is evident that the Maori people still need a ministry among them that is Maori in its spirit and form. At the same time, it is impossible for the Maori Mission alone to provide adequate regular ministry to the spreading Maori community that will give them full spiritual development. Therefore the pattern recommended is—

- 1. That the Maori Mission Staff be maintained and increased to sufficient strength to enable some regular occasional Maori pulpit and pastoral ministry to every possible Maori family and group of families.
- 2. That except in predominantly Maori areas, the Maori people be urged to link their family life with the nearest Pakeha Church for all their regular Church worship and Sunday School and Youth activities, in between these Maori visits.

In suggesting this, it is recognised that there will be many difficulties to be overcome. There will be need for great patience and Christian grace on all sides. Groups of Maori folk, young or old, are more likely to feel reasonably at ease with pakehas, rather than one lonely individual. Hence it will be necessary to try to arrange gatherings where the Maori workers may bring and introduce the Maori folk to the combined gatherings.

The aim is not making a Pakeha Church with Maoris in it, but a Christian Church with both races sharing and both races contributing to the content of the worship.

In the Maori work, the great need is for Maori workers, trained in their own language and taking the main brunt of the close-up Maori Mission task.

European ministers may need to be used to a limited extent in such work, but the greatest contribution European ministers can make is by acting as older brothers, building bridges between the two races.

We have been conscious of the need for a knowledge of Maori language on the part of our workers, and we endorse the growing request from within Maori life that the teaching of Maori be given great prominence and academic status in our Educational System.

The Committee wishes to assure the Maori Workers and our Methodist Maori families, that we deeply sympathise with them in the great difficulties that they face, and we honour them for their faithful service under such circumstances. We also call on the whole Church to assist the Maori Staff by every possible co-operation, especially in extending a Christian welcome to all Maori folk who are introduced to our Services and other gatherings. The Christian Church by a truly Christian attitude can be a factor in healing the wounds of past years and leading the Maori people to a new sense of dignity and worth as fellow citizens and fellow members of the Church.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD TO CONFERENCE ON THE MAORI MISSION WORK

1. The Board members are grateful for the careful consideration that has been given to the Special Report, as evidenced by the Resolutions of the Synod.

The wide range of divergent recommendations from some of the Synods, reveals the complexity of the position and the great need for care in formulating changes of policy. Several recommendations re staffing of the Maori Mission are in harmony with the desires of the Department Leadership, but are mainly dependent upon availability of Funds and workers. The main report indicated that the work is terribly understaffed. The nature of additional staff to be appointed is one associated with policy. It is our conviction that some strengthening of the European Staff in the Maori work could be helpful providing it was done as assistance to the Maori workers, and not taking the place of an increase in the number of trained Maori staff. One Synod requests a development of more Maori Autonomy in the Mission, others ask for definition of a policy of closer integration with the whole life of the church.

The Special Committee endeavoured to indicate that the policy envisaged must keep a balance in these matters without over-emphasising Maori separateness or ultimate assimilation into the Pakeha Church.

2. We draw the attention of the Church once more to the policy endorsed by the Conference of 1954 for the pattern of work recommended to be followed by our Church in areas outside the historical areas of our Maori Mission.

Minutes of Conference, 1954, page 129, Resolution 5:-

"That in those areas that are traditionally the field of other Protestant Church Missions, except where our own members have moved in in any considerable numbers we do not favour the extension of our official Maori Mission activities. We prefer (1) that our people should encourage and co-operate with the youth activities especially of the other missions, and (2) that where Maori people are not receiving any ministration from their own Church we should seek to gather them into the general life of our pakeha Churches."

Our policy as a church is not to add to the confusion already existing in Maori life because of the multiplicity of sects. We desire rather to strengthen the attachment of the people to their historic Mission loyalties.

3. Relationships with the Pakeha Organisation

Most Maori Mission workers cover areas worked by several European Circuits. To develop a greater Maori sense of responsibility for the work, Maori Circuit organisation and membership must be continued.

We would appreciate and greatly welcome any steps taken by the Pakeha Circuits to increase the fraternal relationship between the two sides of the work and especially between the workers. We feel that the following steps would assist in this.

(a) Whenever possible, Maori Mission workers who are planning a visit to Maori families in an area covered by a Pakeha Circuit, should send

word beforehand to the Minister of the Pakeha Circuit, so that information could be exchanged for the mutual benefit of the staff. (b) Names and addresses of known Methodist Maori families should be given to the pakeha Ministers for inclusion in the visiting lists, so that pakeha Ministers could pay supplementary visits of a pastoral nature to those made occasionally by the Maori worker.

- (c) When Maori young folk are taken through a course of Church Membership training by a pakeha Minister, and received into responsible Church Membership, wherever possible a Maori Minister should be invited to share in the reception service. The names of such folk should be placed on the Church Membership Roll of either the pakeha or Maori Circuit, but they should also be listed for reference separately by the other Minister for supplementary pastoral oversight. The decision would need to be made after mutual consideration.
- (d) Maori Ministers and Deaconesses should be invited to attend pakeha Circuit Quarterly Meetings, and associated with such meetings, and an opportunity be given to give information on the Maori work and to consult on matters where assistance could be helpfully given by the pakeha Church.
- (c) When the Report of the Board on the Maori work is considered at the Synods, a separate question should be asked:—"What is the Report on the Maori Mission within the District?"

4. Increase of Number of Maori Trained Workers

In these days when young folk are able to earn fabulous wages in unskilled employment, there is needed a very high sense of call on the part of any young person who is prepared to accept the limitations and disciplines of a sustained course of training for the Ministry. Moreover, few young Maori folk can be expected to have such a sense of call under present social conditions, as to be able to face unaided such a course of preparation, nor are many Maori parents in the position to carry a young person through the costly years of training. It will be necessary for the church to be prepared to substantially subsidise suitable young men through our Hostels or Wesley College Paerata as part of our stewardship to the Maori Race. An assurance of such support, would do much to encourage parents and suitable young men to commit themselves to the long and necessary course of preparation.

5. Inter-racial Relationships

Problems of relationships in the Mission work are a reflection of the whole broader question of race relationships in New Zealand. Superficial contacts in sport and general community interests do not touch the depths of life as do Religious matters where an intimacy of contact is reached, and a much greater awareness developed of the existence of little-known and less-understood tensions between the two races in this country. We are firmly persuaded that the Christian fellowship in the work of the Mission is one of the points of healing and reconciliation. While much remains to be done we are persuaded that with patience restraint and care in the consideration of matters affecting the Mission work, our people, pakeha and Maori, will grow to a stage of much greater understanding and a mutual effectiveness in meeting our common problems. We urge very great care in the making of public pronouncements or publicising of hasty comments or criticisms which only add to the problems. These can be solved only by solid, steady, faithful and patient work. There are no short cuts or magical formulas. We still remember however, that "the best of all is God with us."

6. Long-Term Policy re Appointments of Superintendents:

It is not possible at this stage to give a firm, long-term policy re the appointments of General Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent.

Mr Laurenson has normally some ten years of service before Superannuation. Designation for a further term of six years from 1957 will leave three years for consideration as to policy after the conclusion of this proposed term.

Mr Chrystall would normally have some six years of active service beyond Mr Laurenson's term. The experience he has gained through eleven years of service as Assistant Superintendent, in the mind of the Board, brings him now to the peak of his usefulness to the Church through the work of the Department. To remove him now would be a serious loss to the Department.

The Board unanimously supports the present recommendation of designation of these two officers for re-appointment for a further term of six years and three years respectively.

It is recognised that the work has made heavy demands upon both officers for routine Deputation work, the effectiveness of which is seen in the steady increase in the support of the work with the Circuits.

The Board would suggest to the Church that for the next two years, Mr Chrystall should mainly work from Headquarters, developing and overseeing the financial activities of the Department which have grown immensely especially through the Loans Fund of the Investment Funds Board, and preparing material for a continuance of the annual appeal and generally feeding such material and guidance to the Districts for the local carrying through of the routine appeal.

Also that in that time Mr Laurenson should concentrate on travelling through the Maori Mission areas, conducting Missions, and Conference with the Maori Church families and endeavouring to strengthen the broad policy of the Church among the Maori families and settlements. Mr Chrystall would share a certain amount of this work, and both Leaders would maintain general contacts and special contacts from time to time with weaker causes, and give a lead in District and Dominion policy regarding Church Extension.

It recommends that if the receiving of weekly offertories is not practicable, the people should be encouraged to make worthy offerings by means of quarterly or annual thanks giving gifts.
- (b) That in view of the scattered nature of Maori Circuits and the policy of ministering to the whole Maori community producing
 - i. A weakened emphasis on membership.
- ii. A drift in the matter of holding Leaders and Quarterly meetings, which in turn must result in the non-production of Maori leadership, consideration be given to the appointment of an additional European Minister to be set aside for service in the Maori Mission.
- 4. That a full-time Maori agent be appointed for the South Island section of the Maori Mission as soon as possible.

QUESTION LII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting City Missions?

A-N.Z. Methodist Social Services Association

REPORT FOR 1956

The National Executive met at Christchurch on 1st May, when the President of Conference led a representative committee in review and consideration of the social services of our Church. Much then reported will be recounted in reports to Conference of the constituent Boards and Central Missions. Note will be made of the forward work and particularly of the following:

The completion of the Auckland Childrens' Home: the steady upbuilding of the Auckland Central Mission Central site fund: the further extension of Hostel work by Wesley Church, Wellington, establishing a second Church-house for Samoan young men: the establishment of the Central Mission Centre, and the contract to build a Hospice at Christchurch.

In considering work to be enterprised in the immediate future, the Association resolved to advise the Church Council that it regards the establishment of hostels as a first priority, and to indicate willingness to undertake to organise an appeal for the establishment of hostels at strategic points. Also, North Canterbury is to be encouraged to procure a suitable and adequate site for a Methodist Hostel adjacent to the proposed University campus, Dunedin is requested to investigate the possibility of instituting a forward hostel policy. Recommendation is made that in the acquiring of hostel sites greatest care be exercised to ensure the purchase of land adequate to build establishments of up to 100 persons, and wherever possible to provide for Chapel, sports and parking amenities.

The Association approved in principle of establishing Methodist Homes for the Aged at Tauranga and Hamilton, and of an interdenominational venture of a similar nature at Timaru. Authority was given for the erection of a second block of Serviced Flats and a geriatric hospital at "Wesleyhaven", Wellington: and for a Hospice at Christchurch.

When reporting to Conference last year, we indicated how, upon reviewing the total Social Service establishment of our Church, this Association had become conscious of the magnitude of its present entrustment. The ever-pressing calls for further extensions which ofttimes involve considerable commitments, the offers of the State to subsidise capital development, and the long-term nature of most contracts made in the name of the Church, led the Association to reaffirm the principle, that no new Social Service enterprise may be undertaken before examination and authorization by the New Zealand Methodist Social Services Association. Further, it was deemed necessary to initiate consideration of certain long-established relationships in the light of the changed nature and extent of our Social Service work today. Plainly, the direction and organisation adequate to administer the local charities which centred in the Missions of yesterday, could not be assumed to be adequate to carry through the major long-termed projects necessary today. The Association therefore encouraged those Quarterly Meetings and Boards of Trust directly concerned in Social Services, to make study and recommendation concerning:

- (1) The relationship of Social Services to Central Causes:
- (2) The relationship of the ministry to Social Service Trusts and/or Circuit Courts:
 - (3) The tenure of Ministers engaged in Social Service enterprise.

The recommendations returned by the several Boards were remarkably alike, and it is in the knowledge that best thought has been given to these matters both at local and connexional levels, that we now make the recommendations found hereunder. With regard to No. 1, the Commission

will be informed that it is the deep conviction of this Association that where there is no existing worshipping centre the effectiveness of Social Service enterprise depends on a very close link with the Central Church and congregation, and that, while we recognise that the burden of administration of such work should not fall too heavily upon the Minister-leader personally, we believe it is most desirable that he should be the key-leader of such work, representing it to the wider community.'

The Association will return to consideration of the pattern of the management of Central Missions and Social Service Boards after the

Commission has reported.

- 6. That the Rev W. H. Greenslade be thanked for his services as Official Representative and Convener of the New Zealand M.S.S.A. since its inauguration.
- That Rev. A. Everil Orr be appointed official representative and convener of the N.Z.M.S.S.A.
- 8. That the N.Z. M.S.S.A. be requested to examine and report on the possibility of Statements of Accounts from Central Missions administering institutions, etc., being reported to Conference and included in the Minutes of Conference.
- 9. That Committees of Childrens' Homes, Central Missions, Social Services Trusts, and the Christian Community Centre each be directed to present Annual Reports to Synods and Conference in a condensed form, except for any important matters of Policy which require sanction by Conference.
- 10. That Conference request the M.S.S.A. to investigate the adequacy of present Social Security benefits and if in their judgment such provision is inadequate they make representations to the appropriate authorities.

B-Auckland Methodist Central Mission

REPORT FOR 1956

During the past 24 years we have maintained a policy of cultured evangelism and developed institutional work according to our resources. The foundation of an enlarging effective spiritual and social enterprise have been laid at the centre of New Zealand's largest population, comprising many nationalities.

Devotional Life:

Attendances at Sunday services are well maintained. Three Bible Classes, two Sunday Schools, Clubs and the Baden Powell Movement cater for youth. Bible study meetings are held in the homes of young married couples in particular. The adolescent youth grow in spiritual

experience through retreats at the Health Camp. It is gratifying to find a large number of our Sunday School Scholars sitting Scripture examinations. The Sacramental services are particularly well attended. A Dutch Convert and a Samoan Brother were recently appointed Society Stewards. There are over 200 adult members.

INSTITUTIONAL WORK (An extension of the Preaching Ministry)

Wesley Hospital maintains its valued nursing services to elderly sick folk. The purchase and alterations of 'Tyler House', for elderly men, together with a new wing which is now being erected at 'Astley House' will cost £70,000.

The plans for erection of cottages each containing three or four flats for both elderly couples and elderly single women or widows will be ready in the near future. Meals, when necessary, for those occupying the flats will be provided from 'Tyler House'. There will also be a nurse superintendent appointed.

Campbell's Bay Health Camp and the Waiheke Holiday House:

These cater for children, youth groups and pensioners who would not otherwise have a holiday, as well as families who care to provide for their own needs.

Winstone Lodge:

'Winstone Lodge' for students and business girls in this first year of service, has provided a home for 30 young people. Several applications have been received for next year. Among the residents, we are pleased to welcome a Fijian and a Maori girl. The Hostel is ideally situated and has ample land on which to extend and accommodate 100 young women. Should the Hobson Bay project eventuate, the Hostel will be within a few minutes walking distance of the University.

'Not charity but a chance' is the principle behind the Goodwill work which continues a needed ministry.

To the Rev L. R. M. Gilmore we record our grateful thanks for his co-operation in conducting worship and visiting our men and women at Mount Eden prison.

Property Matters:

Enquiries from the City Council regarding our exact boundary on the Civic Square are in progress, but no definite reply has yet been received. Several Committees are at work gathering information so that preliminary steps may be taken. The various Connexional Boards requiring space have been communicated with. The Building Fund is steadily growing, but needs further reinforcement in order to launch the scheme.

All other buildings are in good order. Legacies from the Estates of the late Miss R. E. Moor (£389/12/6) and Miss J. Thompson (£100) for Astley House and £100 from Miss J. Thompson for Wesley Hospital, and £20 from the Estate of the late James Coe (Health Camp) have been received. Total Assets are £330,000.

Liabilities on all properties amount to £3200. An interest free loan of £5000 from Mrs I. Sweetapple enabled us to finance the Parsonage, and we are gradually reducing the debt.

Staffing:

The Rev L. B. Neale came to the Mission in fullness of time. We are grateful to God that Sister Gwenda Kennedy was appointed, and that Mrs A. Davis continues her voluntary Ministry with us. Mrs I. Palmer, Matron of Astley House is deserving of every praise. Sister Arline Preece, Matron of Wesley Hospital discharges her duties with care and zeal. Miss Dorothy Horwood (Matron) and Miss J. Laurenson at 'Winstone Lodge' have served us well in this foundation year.

C—Christchurch Methodist Central Mission

ANNUAL REPORT, 1956

The Christchurch Central Mission has now been functioning under the auspices of the Methodist Church for the past six years.

With grateful thanks to Almighty God we record in this annual report the ever widening spheres of service in which we are engaged.

Hospice for the Aged Sick:

Toward the end of June this year the construction of a Hospice for the aged sick was commenced. £28,467 was the lowest tender and the contract was let to Messrs Husband Bros., who submitted this tender. The Hospice is being built as a wing to Wesley Lodge Eventide Home, and will be established as a registered hospital. It is expected that the building will be completed by June 30th, 1957. Sir Ernest Andrews will lay the foundation stone.

The total cost of this project is estimated to be £35,000. The Government has approved a subsidy of £20,250. A further £5000 is required to open the Hospice free of debt. A grant of £2000 has been approved by the Aged People's Welfare Council from funds raised by Rotary for the Aged. £1800 was also received from Kerridge-Odeon Theatres Ltd., from proceeds of the Royal Cinema Performance.

EVENTIDE HOMES

Wesley Lodge:

Accommodation is always fully taxed at Wesley Lodge Eventide Home. where thirty-one men and women are accommodated. This year we have had more applications for admission than in previous years. To the Matron (Miss E. Borrows) and Sister L. White (Sub Matron) and staff. we express appreciation for the fine spirit in which the work has been undertaken. We recognize that the care of the aged is one of the most difficult duties of those who serve the church in her Social Service enterprises.

To Dr S. C. Peddie (Hon Physician), Lady Andrews and Mrs S. W. Ayers (Admissions Committee), the Avon Group of Toc H, and Mrs F. M. Mantell for voluntary work in the Home, the Board expresses its grateful thanks. £106/15/- was received from the McKenzie Trust Fund to assist with running expenses at Wesley Lodge.

Wesley House, Picton:

This home is ably managed by a local Committee, under the Chairmanship of the Rev H. E. Harkness. The burden of administrative work is efficiently carried by the Hon Secretary-Treasurer, Mr A. E. Greig, to whom the Board is indebted.

The Matron (Miss C. F. Hight) and Miss M. Potter are serving the church admirably. Together with a little part time assistance, they care for thirteen old folk in the Home.

Accommodation and Service for the Aged:

We are very concerned over the plight of many of the old folk who apply for admission to our Eventide Homes, but whom we cannot admit because the Homes are full. In some cases we are able to send voluntary Home Helps to assist them. In a few instances we are able to secure private board. If we knew of more private homes willing to take old people, even on a temporary basis, until their admission into a Home for the Aged could be arranged, it would be a great blessing to the old folk concerned.

Hot Meals' Service:

We have now transferred this service to the Mission Headquarters, 209 Cambridge Terrace, where alterations have been carried out to provide modern kitchen facilities and a dining room.

Hot dinners are provided three days per week for old folk with inadequate cooking facilities. The service is entirely staffed by voluntary workers, with Miss O. G. Searle as convener. The Board recognises its indebtedness to the cooks and all voluntary workers who cheerfully serve in this capacity. Approximately sixty hot dinners are served weekly.

Goodwill Department:

During the year 2500 families receiving small incomes have been assisted by this department. In cases of distress, clothing, furniture, etc., is provided free of cost. However, in the vast majority of cases, the goods are made available at a nominal cost. 6400 garments have been distributed. This department is staffed by the following voluntary workers: Mrs W. E. Falkingham (Convener), Mesdames H. G. Stewart, J. Poultney, G. Lucas, L. Flesher, E. Dann, D. Baird, M. Wyatt, C. H. Ward and the Misses E. Hulbert and E. A. Searle.

We now rent the premises used for this department and it seems likely that in the not too distant future other premises will have to be acquired, as the property has been sold for building purposes.

Social Service Work:

The varying needs of men and women constitute a challenge and opportunity of Christian service. Prison visitation, relief of distress, accommodation, seeking help in the homes for the sick and aged frail, court work, personal counselling, are but a few of the calls on the time and service of the staff. The Superintendent serves as Methodist Chaplain to Paparua Prison and represents the church on the Aged People's Welfare Executive.

Rehua Maori Hostel:

Eighteen boys are in residence, under the leadership of the Master and Matron, Mr and Mrs H. Rennie,

Employers have reported most favourably on the work of the boys. Most of them are now in their third year of apprenticeship. During the year we lost the services of Miss Hazel McCone (Assistant Matron). Her outstanding work and influence was appreciated by the residents and the Board. It is gratifying to see the regular attendance of all Hostel residents at the monthly church parade. Family prayers are an established feature of the Hostel.

We desire to purchase or build a hostel to accommodate at least fifty boys, and preliminary discussions with the Maori Affairs Department have indicated the willingness of the Government to grant a subsidy of at least 50% for a new hostel. Sixty-five Maori apprentices could be employed by Christchurch firms at the present time, if accommodation were available. During the year Maori concerts have been staged and £358 raised for Hostel funds. We gratefully acknowledge grants as follows: Home Mission Department £100, McKenzie Trust £100, Maori Affairs Department £100.

University Hostel:

In consultation with the Synod Standing Committee, the question of the establishment of a University Hostel has been considered. At the present time various alternatives are being investigated.

Amalgamation Proposals:

The working arrangement with the Cambridge Terrace Church has been mutually satisfactory. Conference approved of this arrangement for a period of two years, ending June 30th, 1957.

The Co-ordinating Committee constituted with equal representation from the Mission and Cambridge Terrace Circuit has recommended to the Board of Management and the Cambridge Terrace Quarterly Meeting that the present arrangement be continued for a further year, during which a definite basis of amalgamation be finalized.

We record appreciation of the spirit of co-operation engendered by the Rev H. G. Brown, the officials and members of the Cambridge Terrace Church.

Staff:

The Mission employs twenty full time workers in its various institutions and departments. All serve in the spirit of Christian service. This year two new appointments have been made. Mr S. W. Ayers is fulfilling the duties of public relations officer and Mrs P. Millar, a trained nurse, has been appointed a Social Service worker. Miss O. G. Searle is serving as a sister to the people in a part time capacity. We were sorry to lose the services of Mr M. D. Stewart, who served as Stores Manager for the last three years.

Mr W. K. G. Lill, our Field Officer, has represented the work through out the Social Service area and has received contributions amounting to £3137/10/4, for Social Service work.

Miss M. E. & Griffin ably serves in charge of the office and as Social Service Secretary.

Finance:

The total income for the year was £19,539 and the expenditure £18,439. It has not been possible to substantially reduce mortgages this year on account of the necessity to build up the fund for the erection of the Hospice.

The members of the North Canterbury Methodist Guilds staffed the stalls at our annual Community Fair, and we are grateful for their support. The sum of £300 was raised.

It is gratifying to know that every department is operating on the most economic basis possible.

The following legacies have been received: Estate late Mrs E. Allington £100, Estate late Rosina Chamberlain £250.

Thanks:

The work represented in this report would not be possible without the loyalty and co-operation of the Mission officials and members, the Mission Women's Guild, the generous support of the public, and the co-operation of the Government. We acknowledge the value of the publicity given to our work by the press and radio.

We look to the future, confident that as we seek to do the will of God, our enterprises will receive His blessing.

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

The following is the Sixty-sixth Report of Methodist Mission activities in Dunedin, and the Third Annual Report of the Central Methodist Church and Mission.

CHURCH DEPARTMENT

Church Life

The C.M.C.M. in its Church life has much for which to be mankful. Its central spiritual witness, expressed through the proclamation of the Word, and Church activities, as well as its social welfare work, offers abundant opportunities to present Christ to men and women. The C.M.C.M. situated as it is in the heart of one city, and with such notable traditions, occupies a strategic place in Dunedin's religious life. Opportunities for the exercise of a full-orbed Christian evangelism are stupendous, but continually developmental work is being hindered, not necessarily by lack of finance, as is so often the case, but by inadequate staff. Given skilled and efficient workers, consecrated to their Christian task, a mighty work for Christ and His Kingdom could be accomplished. Our potential, particularly amoung our Youth, is tremendous, while there is a large and growing field among increasingly interested adult personnel for the practise of a live and sanctified Christian ministry.

The local situation here, however, gives added significance to the words of Jesus, "The harvest truly is plenteous but the labourers are few."

Only by a new and revitalised Christian experience can the Larger Day for Christ's Kingdom dawn.

2. Church Staff

We wish to draw the attention of the Church to the desperate Church staffing situation existing at the C.M.C.M. Since the present administration began in February 1952, there have been added to its responsibilities Wesley Manor, the Home for elderly men and aged married couples, the Dunedin Citizens' Day Nürsery, the Goodwill Store, a Youth Hostel scheme, new extension work at Waverley and in addition another Church and congregation resulting from the amalgamation of the Methodist Central Mission with Trinity Church. And yet the Church staffing position is actually less than that which operated prior to the commencement of the administration. The situation is one calling for the attention of the whole Connexion, as the work and witness of the Methodist Church of New Zealand are involved. A central Cause, such as that of the C.M.C.M., with its ramifications and wide opportunities of service, demands, in view of the specialised nature of its task, a Christian strategy of the utmost wisdom and statesmanship. The officials therefore bring before the Church the present serious position with a view to some constructive action at the forthcoming Conference.

3. Church Appeal

Recently, after the most careful deliberations, it was decided to request the Wells Organisations Ltd. to organise a Fund-Raising Canvass for £30,000 over a three-year period among members and adherents, and specifically for Church purposes. The officials were impressed with the necessity of instituting a more efficient budget system, and a better standard of giving by their people towards local and Connexional objectives. The Contract has been signed, and it is hoped that as the Canvass proceeds, the experience of the C.M.C.M. will be similar to many other Churches who report a quickening in their spiritual life, as a result of such Canvass.

4. Church Extension

Discussions between the C.M.C.M. and the St Kilda Circuit have resulted in a Methodist Cause being established at Waverley. A small Sunday School, as well as a splendid monthly Women's Meeting, have been commenced. Plans by the C.M.C.M. for a new building, and also wider development of the work, are envisaged when staffing and other considerations permit.

II. SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

1. Care of the Aged

(a) The Methodist Eventide Home and Hospital for Aged Women at Company Bay continues its Christian ministry, though the work some months ago was seriously handicapped by staffing problems. The position is much more satisfatcory now, and the institution is a credit to the Matron and her staff.

- (b) Wesley Manor, Anderson's Bay, The accommodation in this Home for Elderly Men and Married Couples is being taxed severely, and we can barely meet the demand. The policy of the Board is that admissions should be so restricted as to maintain a home atmosphere. Building additions are not at present contemplated.
- (c) Occupational Therapist. Negotiations are at present under way toward the employment of a registered occupational therapist for the geriatric institutions of the C.M.C.M., and all being well the appointment of a young lady with a sense of Christian vocation will be made within the course of the next two months.

2. Dunedin Citizens' Day Nursery and Playground

The Nursery, largely regarded as a Civic amenity, is becoming increasingly popular and is a medium of valuable service. The organizing committee is to be congratulated upon the management and quality of its

staff, the head of which is Miss G. Harding, whose zeal and ability are recognised.

3. Farm at Eventide Settlement, Company Bay

Latest financial returns from the farm reveal it to be an economic unit of considerable value to our institutions. The convener of the Farm 'Committee, Mr G. Hughes of our Mosgiel Church and a farmer himself, is to be congratulated on his constant supervision and enthusiasm.

4. Goodwill Store

Once again the report of the Goodwill Store reveals the value of such an agency in our social welfare work. Miss C. Uren and her faithful team of voluntary workers deserve special mention for their unremitting labours.

5. Recreations Room and Hobbies Centre

As a preliminary to the development of a Community Centre especially for youth, a clubroom for games and recreation has been opened and is proving popular. There are also splendid facilities in the building for woodwork, photography, etc., which provide welcome opportunity for the creative activities of young and old.

6. Handicapped Adolescents

Mentally handicapped young people under approved leadership enjoy the facilities of the C.M.C.M. at least twice weekly. Spiritually the work is most rewarding.

7. Radio Church of the Helping Hand

The C.M.C.M. still enjoys the facilities provided by Station 4XD, Dunedin, and exercises through its Session of the Radio Church of the Helping Hand each Sunday at 9.30 a.m. a ministry of Christian witness and service. Radio Church members continue to contribute toward the care of the aged and are most generous to the work in other ways, especially at the Christmas season.

III. GENERAL

1. Staffing

The Rev F. S. Rigg, in spite of university and probationary studies, has acquitted himself in his second year of ministry with commendable faithfulness. In his work he has been ably assisted by Mrs Rigg.

Sister Joyce Foster, in her probationary year, has made an excellent start and has brought a contagious enthusiasm and enterprise to her work.

The staff in the administration offices have worked well during the year and with their sense of vocation witness to the worth of a consecrated laity engaged in the sphere of Christian service.

The Management Board for some time has been desirous of securing a man of Christian character and suitable business ability to give some relief to the General Superintendent, who has been compelled to devote much of his energy to details involved in social service administration. In common with other important business organisations it has been difficult to find a person with the requisite qualifications, but enquiries are being continued.

Staffing in our Homes for the Aged has been less difficult, particularly during the last six months. Attention is being given to the provision of certain amenities for workers. The administration also is at present in correspondence with registered nurses overseas, with a view to securing their services for its geriatric division.

Finally, in this connection it may be said that the general staffing position in all the institutions of the C.M.C.M. gives cause for some degree of gratification. One of the aims of our officials is to secure efficient Christian workers with a sense of consecrated service. The desirability of employing, where possible, specialised personnel is also being recognised.

2: Finance

The finances of the C.M.C.M. continue to be satisfactory, but it is necessary to build up sufficient reserve to meet contingent liabilities and

anticipated costs of repairs and maintenance, as well as providing some assistance toward the re-building scheme when it is commenced.

3. Re-building Scheme

The buildings on its Octagon site are in such a state of disrepair that the C.M.C.M. must face the necessity of re-building as soon as posible. Certain expenditure on repairs has been found necessary in order to make the premises habitable, but nevertheless it is an unwise and uneconomic policy to continue as at present. It is hoped to give serious thought during the coming year to the question of what type of building should be erected and what community welfare and business facilities should be incorporated.

4. Proposed Home for Aged at Timaru

The option which the C.M.C.M. took on a Timaru property, regarded as eminently suitable for a Home for the Aged, had to be surrendered owing to a local desire for such work to be conducted, if possible, on a basis of co-operation between our Church and the Church of England. Conversations are still continuing and a zealous committee representative of the two denominations is seeking through their respective legal advisers a suitable basis for possible co-operative action.

5. Youth Hostel

A recent meeting of the Area Committee of the M.S.S.A. decided, in accordance with the recommendations of the last two Annual Meetings of the M.S.S.A., to bring the present Hostel scheme in Dunedin under the jurisdiction of the C.M.C.M., with a view to proceeding immediately with plans already envisaged by the latter for a suitable students' hostel in Dunedin. Negotiations are now proceeding toward the purchase of an additional property adjacent to the present site and the position is being carefully watched.

IV. CONCLUSION

The C.M.C.M. expresses its gratitude to God for Divine Grace, and blessings received during the year. To all officials, staff members, medical advisers, auditors, donors, and other loyal and devoted workers and friends who have laboured selflessly, the best thanks of the Church are due. The C.M.C.M., with renewed sense of dedication, would face the future conscious of illimitable oportunities, and of that Inspiration in Christ that inexorably comes to all who profess His Lordship and seek the extension of His Kingdom.

E—The Christian Community Centre, Ponsonby

St John's

St John's has been rightly named a COMMUNITY CHURCH; the Congregation is by far the largest since the beginning of the present ministry. There is practically a complete new congregation and the work in all departments shows spiritual promise. During the last six months many people of all ages have professed conversion and have joined, or are preparing to join the Church. Remarkable stories could be told of homes and people transformed through counselling and the challenge of the

fine atmosphere in the Church. There is a debt of £2500 on the £6300 renovation work on the Church and more repairs are to be carried out on the Hall, the original church. Next year will be the 80th Anniversary of the Church at St John's.

Radio:

The minister who is known as "Friend Harris" has conducted a Broadcast on the "Friendly Road Sessions" for nearly nine years and numerous reports continue to come in, giving evidence of the permanent spiritual results those broadcasts have made in the lives of people in every walk of life. Many have sought an interview for help on personal and domestic probems; some coming long distances to receive counsel and prayerful help.

YOUTH WORK

Sunday Schools:

Sunday Schools are large in attendance, all scholars assembling in the Morning Service for the first part of worship. A teacher has left New Zealand to take up a position in a hospital in Pakistan.

Clubs:

Clubs are varied in nature but are healthy and the good work goes on, among new New Zealanders as well as local residents in a congested populous district.

Overseas Club:

· Two young men who came to St John's from Samoa have been accepted into Wesley College for further training with the hope of becoming ministers. A Samoan young lady, one of the original members of the Club, also has accepted a missionary post in Hawaii to work among Samoan women and girls there. A fine work goes on in the Church and Clubs among the Island friends.

Old People:

Apart from the usual gathering of old people who meet for entertainment and tea each month, the Centre has arranged for sick and distressed people, regardless of any or no denomination, to be visited. This important work has grown immensely. We are indebted to Mrs I. Crawley who regularly contacts these aged and lonely people to give nursing and Christian help. Her personality and administrative gifts are an asset where there are grave financial problems. A friend generously assists by using her car. Comforts have been distributed, i.e., wood, coal, parcels of groceries. The happy smile and appreciation of the old people is a reward.

The Christian Pageant:

The 1955 Pageant was most successful. 12,000 were present in the Domain. His Worship the Mayor and Councillors assisted where possible It is planned to introduce still more new scenes in the presentation. This public gathering and performance has no doubt come to stay. The Christmas Day Carol Service organised by the same Committee was a most friendly and fruitful time. The City Council has asked that it be held again this year. Valuable and comprehensive equipment has been built up for this festival.

YOUTH OPPORTUNITY HOSTEL AND HORTICULTURAL FARM

The income from the farm has increased by means of large sales from produce, fruit and vegetables. Mr E. Short, who has had experience in England and India, has been appointed as Horticulturist. He embraces the opportunity to share in the whole scheme. Our assets are £30,000 and a loan and overdraft stand at £4400.

Hostel:

The anticipated number of applicants did not eventuate but reports have come from some parents and guardians stating that young men who were resident in the Hostel have settled down in their new life with no recurrence of earlier fears and troubles. The Board offers this well-

equipped home to young men who have been thrown into a wrong environ-

ment. Here is practical evangelism of a most exacting nature.

Early in the New Year serious difficulty was experienced in maintaining suitable staff in the Hostel. The Board decided that the Chairman should approach the Minister of Justice and have a frank discussion with him concerning the future of the Hostel and the possibility of boys being directed to the Hostel instead of to other institutions. The Hostel was temporarily closed for a short period while these discussions were taking place.

The Justice Department has stated its keen willingness to co-operate in the new approach and use the Hostel for the purpose for which it was built.

Mrs A. M. Weir, B.A., a chartered accountant, and local preacher, has been appointed as assistant for 1956 but there is an urgent need for ministerial help. Rev E. E. Sage superintended the work during the minister's absence overseas for five months.

F-Wesley Church (Wellington Central) Social Services Trust, Incorporated

REPORT FOR 1956

"Wesleyhaven" Homes Settlement:

Twenty aged persons have been in residence throughout the year. Sister Jane Bond resigned in April in order to resume her nursing training. Sister M. L. Grant (R.N.) is now Matron in charge. The large and evergrowing list of applicants for residence, along with the fact that the existing establishment of twenty persons is not an economic unit, has moved the Trust to press on with preparations to build a second block of Serviced Flats and a small private hospital.

Providing promised donations are received on due dates, the capital development account should show a credit of Nine thousand pounds (£9000), which with the State subsidy available would justify the letting of contracts for the further development in the early summer. The Trust has made careful review of its policy and workings, and has reaffirmed its intention of moving steadily toward the completion of the originally planned all-coverage of needs of age Settlement. There has been satisfactory progress in negotiations with another Religious Body interested in establishing at "Wesleyhaven" a sizeable unit for their own members. It is likely that this matter will be finalised by the time the hospital block is to be built.

A Womens' District Auxiliary has been formed and is maintaining a personal interest in residents and is assisting staff and Trust.

Hostels:

"Church House", Taranaki Street, has been made more comfortable for the 12 young men who live there on a community basis.

"Wesley House", Willis Street, has become the home of 16 Samoan young men, who maintain the establishment on a similar basis to "Church

House". This band of Samoans recently inaugurated quarterly services of worship in the Samoan language at Wesley Church. Some 60 Islanders attended and plans were made "to win the Samoans in Wellington for Jesus and the Church".

An "Epworth House" for young women is contemplated, and endeavours are being made to acquire suitable property.

Our experience suggests that providing dedicated youth leadership is available, this "Christian Community House" form of hostel enterprise is the most satisfactory for local Churches.

Administration:

Consideration is being given both by Circuit and Trust to the form of future administration. Should Social Service enterprise be administered by a Social Service Area Committee of Management, or a Synodal District Board, or should it be brought more intimately within the ministries and administration of the local Circuit? The Trust is persuaded that the latter is most desirable, and is now conferring with the Wellington Central Quarterly Meeting with desire to make recommendations to this Conference. Recently some relief has been provided for Superintendent and executive laymen, by the appointment of a professional accountant and a secretary. The Trust is gratified that its direction will be in the hands of the Rev G. H. Goodman during the Rev W. H. Greenslade's sojourn overseas.

Conclusion:

The Trust would express its gratitude to God for the way it has been led into widening fields of service and of support. To the Rev W. H. Greenslade, of whose vision and enterprise we will always be reminded by "Wesleyhaven" in particular, and by Social Service development in Wellington generally, we pay a tribute of grateful appreciation of his leadership and service over the past ten years and record our thanks.

Supplementary Report

Following consultations between representatives of the Trust and Circuit it was unanimously agreed to request Conference to increase the basis of membership of the Trust and to make provision for a greater proportion of members of other Circuits to serve on the Trust.

This slightly enlarged and changed basis of membership will enable the Trust to secure the services of willing and capable members from other Circuits and widen the area of interest and support for this important work, both in its present form and in future developments.

At the same time it is intended to co-ordinate the work of the Circuit and Trust in terms of the authority already granted by Conference in 1949. These proposals have been endorsed by the Wellington Central Circuit, the Social Services Trust and the Wellington Synod.

Methodist Deaconess Board

REPORT FOR 1956

The Deaconess Board has met on eight occasions during the year with an average attendance of twelve members.

We have two students in training, and one will be available for an appointment at this Conference. Their work is of a high standard and they have applied themselves to their theoretical and practical training with credit.

The House under the guidance of Mrs G. E. Gauntlett is continuing its work in good heart. The hostel provides a good home for girls during their Training College and University career. For most of the year we have been short-staffed on the domestic side, and this has given the Board some concern.

There is still a growing interest in the maintenance of the House by Ladies' Guilds and other interested friends. The original portion of the House is now very old and requires constant attention. The question of the future of the present property is now under review by the Board.

The Golden Jubilee of the establishment of the Order will take place during the first week of the May School Holidays in 1957, at Deaconess House, in Christchurch. We are planning the publication of a suitable brochure for the occasion.

We would pay tribute to the high sense of vocation and the devotion to duty by all our Deaconesses on the field. They serve in many capacities. A number have rendered splendid service in a supply capacity in Circuits, and three who are in this work will not be available for a similar appointment at this Conference. As a Board, we have always looked upon this supply work as a temporary measure.

Conference Resolution 1953, 1954, 1955:

The Board has given long consideration to the issues involved in the Resolutions of recent Conferences on the training and preparation of women for this work. The following statement is therefore included in this report.

The Nature and Function of the Deaconess Order, and the Training of of Deaconesses:

From its earliest years the Church has availed itself of the services of women.

It is equally clear that throughout that long period no attempt was made to equate the particular service of men and women. Until very recent years a woman could not become a "Priest or a Presbyter," the service rendered by them being that of general ministration, particularly of a social kind.

With a changing emphasis in society in regard to the place of women therein, there is a movement towards admitting women to the "Ministry of the Word and Sacraments," which ministry for centuries was reserved for men to fulfil.

Conclusions reached by the Committee in its study of this subject are that while there is this tendency referred to in the preceding paragraph, modern life and conditions do not make it necessary that women be preachers or Ministers of the Word and Sacraments. The Committee wish to highlight, however, the particular contribution that women have made, and can make, in the sphere of personal work and visitation, the importance of which, we, as a Church, are in grave danger of overlooking.

The Committee emphasises its conviction that there is a vocation within this sphere for qualified and devoted women. It points out that there is no clamant call on the part of our Church for women preachers, but there is a desire for Deaconesses.

The ministry which they are asked to fulfil is different in nature from that which ordained Ministers are called to exercise. The preparation must therefore be different also. While the training must have a Theological and Biblical basis, it should not aim to be primarily academic. Further, the fields of service open to Deaconesses in our Church are various, which indicates that to a core curriculum there should be added certain specialized studies. Our Deaconesses can enter the following spheres of service—Maori Work, City Missions, Social Service Institutions, Circuit Work or Overseas Missions.

The core curriculum at present consists of Theology, Bible Knowledge, Pastoral Theology, Church History, Homiletics, English and Psychology.

It is in the realm of additional specialized subjects that the Board feels that development is called for, not in respect to the basic theological training referred to above.

It has been stated in certain discussions that the standard required is not high enough both in respect to the entrance examination and of the training course, and also that certain limits are imposed because the lecturers are not specialists but circuit ministers.

It is pointed out that the training needs to be practical rather than academic. The ministers who are asked to do this work are always sufficiently qualified to carry through a general theological training to as high a standard as is necessary. What that standard will be must be determined largely by the qualifications of the candidates who offer and also by the nature of the work they will be expected to do.

Specialised training should be along three lines:

- (a) For Maori Mission Work.
- (b) For Circuit or other specialised work, where certain selected trainees could do a special one year course at Trinity College, when considered desirable.
- (c) For Institutional work—such as Children's Homes and Eventide Homes, to be attached to such an institution for a given period.

Stationing of Deaconesses:

The procedure at the present time is in accord with the Law Book, page 123, paragraph 31, which means that the list of appointments is made by the Board after consultation with the Departments and Circuits concerned, and is presented to the Conference after the Stationing sheet for Ministers and Probationers is completed. We believe there is no good reason to depart from this procedure. We would agree, however, that there is virtue in the suggestion that the list of appointments be made known to the Stationing Committee for information purposes only. From time to time there are Deaconesses who are able to serve the Church in a "supply" capacity, for either a Ministerial or Home Missionary appointment.

The question of stationing and control is under consideration by the Law Revision Committee.

QUESTION LIV.—What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting Children's Homes?

A—Auckland Children's Home and Orphanage

With the passing of another year, the time has come for the Board to review the work for the children committed to the care of our Church. Throughout the year we have been deeply conscious of God's guiding hand

and His continued goodness to us in all our undertakings.

Obituary:

Another of our valued Life members has been called "Home". Mr and Mrs W. H. Faulkner have been wonderful friends to Staff and children and to the last Mr Faulkner kept a keen interest in the work and rejoiced with us in the erection of the new Home. In his passing we have lost a valued supporter.

New Home:

For over a year we had anxiously looked forward to occupying the new building. In October 1955 the family moved in. Transferring sixty-children and Staff with all their belongings was a difficult task. In addition there were cows, poultry and pets to move to their new quarters. Our grateful thanks go especially to the staff who packed all the goods and clothing and to those friends who supplied trucks and cars and helped in the move. The Ladies' Committee had performed the tremendous task of furnishing, purchasing and making the curtains and counterpanes.

The Official opening took place Saturday, 29th October. A Monster Fair, organised by the ladies, was held in conjunction with the Opening and it was estimated that over 200 people were present. Several members of Parliament honoured us with their presence and Dame Hilda Ross opened "Wesleydale", "To the Glory of God and for the welfare of children."

The Family:

The Home has a full complement. There are twenty one girls and forty one boys, making a total of sixty two. Six are of pre-school age. At the end of the school year our senior boy moved to the Trinity College Hostel where he could attend the University and study to become a secondary school teacher. The present senior boy is preparing for his University Entrance examination and has hopes of studying medicine. Eleven children attend High School and the majority are making good progress despite the change of schools. After seven and a half years of service Miss Archer tendered her resignation. In May 1948 she took the position of Matron at our "Epsom" Home and later became the "Mother" to the girls and small boys in our new Home. Her resignation was accepted with regret and we are grateful for the years of faithful service she rendered to the children who loved her. The efficient running of the Home and the happiness and health of the children depend on the staff. Mrs Butterworth, who has supervision of "Wesleydale" has given many years of devoted service for the children. The other members of the staff, ten women and one man are giving splendid service. Miss G. Robinson mothers the girls and small boys as well as having care of their clothing. Miss J. Southern is "Mother" to the boys eight years and over and also cares for their clothing. These "mothers" live in the children's quarters and have a most responsible position. We attribute the excellent spirit and happiness of the children to the co-operation of the staff.

The health of the children has been good and we are grateful in this connection for the service rendered by Drs D. R. Barker and P. C. Calvert.

Holiday Homes:

At Christmas time it is our aim to give every child a holiday. This has served the dual purpose of giving our children a holiday in a private home and of relieving the staff. The children have discovered "Aunts" and "Uncles" and as the time draws near they anxiously await the invitation they are quite sure will be for them. Our thanks go to those who open their homes to these children.

Collector:

The job of contacting business houses and others, soliciting their interest and support, has been ably carried on by Miss I. Taylor. A keen Methodist and a lover of children she carries on despite the competition met. During the year she has collected over £145 in goods and cash.

Committee Work:

The Trustees who control all our property have given serious consideration to the best use of the two properties once occupied by the old Homes. The buildings have been demolished by tender. The seventeen sections at Epsom have been leased under Glasgow lease. The Mt Albert property will be cut up and similarly leased when finance is available. The Trustees at present have this under consideration and a considerable sum has to be borrowed. It will be at least ten years before the Board receives any income from this source.

The Ladies' Committee:

The President, Mrs C. J. Burton, after eight years as President is resigning this position at the end of this year. Miss Wagstaff, who has been Secretary since 1937 still gives faithful service. The Board is greatly indebted to the ladies of this Committee who not only provide money and clothing but keep the need of the Home before the Ladies' Guilds. The House Committee, chaired by Mrs C. K. Wigglesworth, keeps in monthly contact with the Matron, helping her in supplying and replenishing equipment. The quiet service rendered by the groups who patch and mend is gratefully acknowledged.

The Selection Committee:

The Selection Committee has the important work of receiving all applications for admittance. During the year fourteen children have been admitted and nine have left the Home. It is impossible to accept all children applied for but every effort is made to receive the most needy cases.

The United Orphanage Council:

We again record our indebtedness to this Council, who by their enthusiasm and interest have kept this work before the public. The Board thanks all those who helped in the Street Day Appeal and we are grateful to Mr Wigglesworth who represents us on this Council.

We realise that our task would be impossible but for the generous support of our people. We thank those who have given produce and clothing and especially do we acknowledge the gift of Harvest Festival produce from the churches.

So many people have given of their time and labour that it is impossible to record them here. Some were acknowledged last year but we take this opportunity of thanking others. We express our gratitude to Mr and Mrs A. L. Caughey for their generosity in furnishing so beautifully the combined Assembly and Dining room.

The Mt Roskill Rotary Club for the complete set of tools for the boys and the provision of equipment for the girl's playing area. Also the gift of two floor polishers. To Mr and Mrs B. R. Burton for the gift of a drinking fountain and swings.

To Mr and Mrs W. H. Faulkner for furnishing the Matron's room

also to Mr K. Orams and Mr J. G. Rennie who have given oversight to the grounds and buildings.

To our Architect, Mr A. C. Marshall, who gave his wholehearted interest to the Plans and watched expense and as well gave gifts in

equipment and donations.

We desire to pay tribute to the work and interest of the Chairman, Rev Allon Carr, and to Mr Russel Garlick, Chairman and members of the Building Committee. To Mr P. Dellow, Lay-Treasurer, who has guided the Board and kept it fully aware of our financial position. To Mrs R. G. Hemings, the Minute Secretary, who has recorded the business of the Board meetings.

This Report is written before the close of our year so that it is impossible to give our financial position. We are facing a difficult period as we have realised on all our investments and shares with the exception of one small parcel of shares, and our endowment legacies which amount to £3200. The interest from these, plus the Maintenance paid by the parents and the Family Benefit comprise our only certain Income. After this next year the Board will feel the benefit of the leasing of the Epsom property.

We commend this work to our people and ask that they do their utmost to help feed and clothe these young people committed to our care. It costs the Board over £2/15/- per week per child and we invite our membership to join with us in giving these children their opportunity in

life.

B-Masterton Methodist Children's Home

REPORT FOR 1956

During the year four children were admitted to the Home and one child left to live with relatives. There are now 26 children in our care including one girl who has commenced work in the P. & T. Department as a typist, but who is still living in the Home. There are also five children of staff members.

Mr and Mrs N. W. Lloyd were appointed as Manager and Matron in August 1955 and soon fitted in to their new sphere of work. However, after some months it became necessary for Mr Lloyd to give up outdoor work for health reasons and he has taken other employment, carrying on duties in the Home part time. There have been several changes in staffing but we are fortunate to have the continuing services of Miss Fell and Mrs McMurtrie. Miss Rita Stuart has recently joined the full time staff and other part-time assistance has been engaged in the house and in the grounds. The Committee is most thankful for the good work done by the staff and for the love and care they have shown to the children.

Mrs A. K. Hodder resigned from the Committee during the year but retains her interest in the Home and assists when opportunity offers, We

lost the services of Mr T. F. Mannell through his removal from the district and wish him well at Palmerston North. Dr O. F. Prior has been granted leave of absence from the Committee while furthering his studies in England and we are pleased to learn of his success thus far.

The maintenance of the Home has received close attention. The work done included floor covering for the boys' balcony, furnishing for an additional staff sitting room, heaters for staff rooms, auxiliary hot water service for the laundry, improvements to kitchen and store room and a new sealed unit for the refrigerator. Extensive fencing repairs were necessary to keep our paddocks stock proof. The question of replacing the old playshed is now being considered and it is hoped that a suitable scheme for carrying out this work will be adopted in the near future.

It has been necessary to make some new arrangement for local transport of children. In the past this has been provided by previous Managers' own cars for which they received an allowance. The Committee purchased an old model car to experiment with the changed situation without involving a heavy capital outlay. The needs of the Home have been met satisfactorily but, as may be expected, the vehicle is rather costly to run.

The Masterton Police Charity Day benefited the Home to the extent of £149/10/- this year. The funds will be utilised to provide additional recreational facilities including netting for the new court, the court itself having been provided from earlier assistance from the same source. The Police Committee has done a wonderful work for the children of the three Homes in Masterton.

The Management Committee was pleased to make the Home available for the Annual Deaconess Convocation held in the May School holidays. This was made possible through hospitality given to children in private homes enabling them all to be away from the Home during this period. There is a great opportunity here for our Church people, particularly those within reasonable travelling distance, to befriend the children. We find that it is of real benefit to the children to spend their holidays in the private homes of Christian people.

We thank all who have supported our work in many ways. In particular we would mention gifts of fruit, vegetables and preserves which have been a special feature this year. Large quantities of fruit donated gave our staff a very busy time and we are grateful to see the larder so well stocked with jams and preserves. We commend this avenue of practical assistance to Ladies' Groups within the Circuits.

The financial support from the Circuits was maintained at the same level as the previous year at £990, just short of our target of £1000. However, our costs rose quite considerably and we look forward to strong support for our next appeal to enable this work to be continued at a standard that is worthy of the Church. Maintenance fees payable by parents are kept under review and there has been an improvement in the income under this heading. However, in some cases little or nothing above the Family Benefit is available.

Notification of a legacy of £200 in the Estate of Miss S. E. Carver has been received with gratitude during the year. It is well for the Home that a fund has accumulated from similar bequests in past years as we are forced to lean heavily upon it from time to time.

We know that there is a worthwhile Christian work to be done for children in need who come under our care and we seek to express to them the love of the people of our Church.

C-South Island Children's Home

REPORT FOR 1956

In presenting the 42nd Annual Report of the work of our Home, we would acknowledge the guidance and blessing of God in our labours. The work of the Home has proceeded with its usual thoroughness throughout the year, thanks to the capable and devoted supervision of the Master, Matron and Staff.

The number at present in the Home is 53, made up by 31 boys and 22 girls. This is almost the same number as last year, there being 13 admissions and 12 discharges. It is interesting to note that the family now includes five Maori children. The health of all has been good, there being no serious illness or accident. Dr S. C. Peddie continues to act as Honorary Physician and Mr L. J. Dale, Chemist, renders us good service.

School Reports:

The Reports from the Schools this year have given us cause for thankfulness, both as far as the general behaviour of the children is concerned and also their success with their school work. Four of those attending High School were 1st in their classes, two boys and two girls. One boy was captain of the hockey team, in which he exercised a splendid influence. For the signs of developing character and a right attitude to life, we are grateful.

Athletics:

At the Annual Outing, arranged by the Canterbury Automobile Association for the various Children's Homes of the City, our children acquitted themselves well, winning 3 out of 4 of the silver cups and the Peter Harvey Memorial Shield for the highest aggregate points.

Hobbies:

A Stamp Club is conducted regularly by Mr and Mrs Young and some of the children have splendid collections. One boy is an enthusiastic collector of matchbox labels and has correspondents in many parts of the world. Games evenings continue on Saturdays, arranged by Uncle Ern Smith.

Film:

The Film, "Room for One More", continues to bring the work of the Home to the notice of congregations. It is a moving, true to life, story.

Staffing:

While the key positions have been unchanged for some years, staffing generally is very difficult. We urgently appeal to those whose 'hearts God has touched' with a sense of vocation for such work, to assist us.

Marriages:

Several former inmates of the Home have married during the year and Mr and Mrs Howells, also Sister Rona have been present to convey to the happy couples the greetings of the Board.

Apprenticeships:

A number of our young men have completed and some almost completed their apprenticeships in such trades as Carpentering, Fitting and Turning, Motor Mechanics, etc. In seven years not one has caused the slightest anxiety or wished to break his contract.

Frequently on Sundays, we welcome former members of the Home, fine strapping young fellows and attractive young ladies, who show evident pleasure in coming back to us.

Street Day Appeal:

The Combined Orphanages Appeal this year realised approximately £1900.

The death of Mr W. C. Worner, of Southbridge, removes one who was a loyal member of the Board for many years and a generous donor towards the work of the Home. We record our appreciation of his service.

A—Methodist Times Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

Finance:

The financial statement for the year ending 31st May, 1956 reveals an excess of income over expenditure of £207 19s 7d. That is gratifying in that for the two previous years we operated at a substantial loss as a result of which our reserve fund was completely used up. Without the grant however of £200 from the Fire Insurance Fund the position would still be precarious.

Income from subscriptions shows an increase of £662 6s. 8d. accounted for largely by the higher subscription rate of 12s 6d instead of 10s. Advertising income also shows an increase of £48 18s 10d. On the other hand costs for printing, distribution and general charges also show an increase of £364 9s 11d.

Circulation:

Subscribers over deletions of 25 only for the current year. It represents in increase of 77% on the figure of 1936. In May 1955 each circuit agent was supplied with 10 copies of the first issue for free distribution—just over 2000 copies being thus distributed. How many new readers resulted directly from this approach it is not possible to state. The actual number of new readers enrolled for the year is 418 but on the other hand 393 names were deleted through death, lack of interest and other reasons.

Editorial:

The Committee records another year of valued service rendered by the Editor, the Rev W. T. Blight, B.A., B.D., the Associate Editor, the Rev C. P. Lucas, those who contribute regularly and those who assist as circuit agents.

From time to time, through Synods or directly, suggestions have been received in regard to material that might be included and procedure adopted. All helpful suggestions are gratefully received. It is not possible to implement many of them, while on the other hand, some such recommendations have been tried from time to time. For example it has been urged again this year that District news should be featured more, and the Circuit news columns reduced. The Editor has tried on many occasions to get Districts to appoint agents and to send regular contributions. With very rare exceptions it is just not done. Hence if news from within Districts is to be featured (as it ought to be) it has to be done through

the Circuit news columns. It has also been urged that more original contributions be encouraged from New Zealand sources. Here again it has to be said that the response to overtures in this connection has been most disappointing.

Future Policy:

The Committee has had some consultations with the Board of Publications concerning future policy. It had before it also the matter referred to the Boards concerned of possible action with respect to a joint publication with the papers of the Presbyterian and Congregational Churches. After preliminary consideration it was decided that no further investigations were warranted until the vote on the principle of Church Union is taken in 1957.

B—Board of Publications

ANNUAL REPORT 1955

A steady demand from Circuits for the various publications reveals the eagerness of the Church to extend the Kingdom through the printed word.

Crusade Publications:

At the request of the Spiritual Advance Committee, a Crusade Visitation leaflet entitled "The Hardest Thing in the World" was printed, but relatively few Circuits have used it extensively. Advent and Lenten Leaflets and the Prayer Calendar once more had a wide sale, though fewer copies of the latter were sold than last year. For 1957, we shall be including the International Bible Reading Association series of Bible Readings in the Prayer Calendar.

Also, at the request of the Spiritual Advance Committee, it was decided not to print a Crusade Poster this year, but to publish a series of four posters for use as Wayside Pulpits.

Other Material Issued:

Two "Wesleydale Booklets" in the Community Challenge Series have already appeared—"Pathway to Advanture" by Donald Soper, and "Reality in the Home" by Dorothy Thornley. "You and the Sects" by W. Selwyn Dawson is a very useful leaflet to arm our people against the infiltration of the sects.

Policy re "Methodist Times":

In consultation with the "Methodist Times" Committee, it was decided to delay investigation of moving the printing of the "Methodist Times" to Auckland until the proposal of amalgamation with the Presbyterian "Outlook" has been fully dealt with.

Audio-Visual Aids:

Experience has taught us that the publishing of printed material occupies all our time and energy, and it has been decided to drop the production of audio-visual aids for the present.

That Circuits be recommended to appoint agents to publicise the Board's Literature and to establish a Literature Fund.

5. That the Board of Publications be asked to give consideration to the possibility of publishing annually a series of posters for Wayside Pulpits.

6. That the Rev. L. R. M. Gilmore be thanked for his services as Convener of the Board of Publications.

7. That the Board for 1957 be as printed on page 12 herein.

QUESTION LVI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference concerning Chaplaincy Matters?

Armed Services Chaplaincy Committee REPORT FOR 1956

We have no chaplain to the Navy and it appears that the most we can expect for some time is the appointment of Honorary Naval Chaplains. However with four permanent chaplains in the Navy even these opportunities appear remote.

Army:

Korea. The Rev G. T. Gilbert has rendered an acceptable service with K-Force under, at times, most disheartening and trying conditions. He completed 12 months duty in July and it is expected that he will be home before the end of the year. He will be available for appointment to a Circuit in 1957.

C.M.T. Camps. The Rev H. I. Shaw did a tour of duty at Papakura early in the year and the Rev. L. P. Schroeder at Burnham later in the year.

T.F. Camps. Chaplains have attended the annual Territorial Camps when called upon. With the modifications of the T.F. Scheme and the reduction of the Territorial Force there will not be the same demands for chaplains.

Air Force:

The Rev P. D. Ramsay continues to render efficient service. More and more his work compares with that of a Circuit minister. The Committee is of the opinion that Mr Ramsay has special aptitudes for the work in the Air Force.

SPECIAL REPORT RE REMUNERATION OF CHAPLAINS

The Conference instructed the Chaplaincy Committee to 'investigate the matter of the appointment of Chaplains under the pay of the Army in relation to stipend received from the Circuit while serving as Chaplains in C.M.T. Camps, and bring down a report.' Mins. Conf. 1955. Res. 6, 7: p.156. The following report is respectfully submitted:

A minister is appointed to a circuit for a period of one year. This appointment carries with it, in the case of a married minister, the right to live in the parsonage and to receive the stipend until the ensuing Conference. Conference sanctions the commissioning of ministers as chaplains to the Armed Services. This commissioning carries the responsibility of willingness to render service as required. Under certain circumstances chaplains receive remuneration for services rendered in the Armed Services. There are different categories of service, e.g. (a) Active service—Rev G. T.

Gilbert; (b) Short Term Commission-Rev P. D. Ramsay; (c) C.M.T. Camps—Revs H. I. Shaw and L. P. Schroeder; (d) T. F. Chaplains—Revs W. S. Dawson, B. Gordon, R. F. Clement; (e) Officiating Chaplains; (f) Honorary Chaplains.

(a) Overseas Service:

(A) If the period of service is limited to 12 months and the chaplain is married, we recommend:

(1) The Chaplain to receive Army pay.

(2) The Chaplaincy Fund shall pay the Chaplain's personal subscriptions and the Circuit's contribution to the Superannuation and Home Acquirement Funds.

(3) The chaplain's wife be allowed the use of the Parsonage.

(4) The Conference to arrange 'Supply'.

(5). The cost of 'Supply' to be a charge on the Stipend.

- (6) The balance of the Stipend to be at the disposal of the Circuit.
- (B) If the period of service is to be for a longer period than 12 months, we recommend:
- (1) That clauses 1-6 Sect. A operate until the end of the Connexional Year; after which if Conference has made another appointment to the Circuit

(2) The Chaplain's wife shall vacate the Parsonage.

(3) The Chaplaincy Fund shall make a grant for furnishings to the chaplain's wife-the amount to be decided by Conference.

(b) Short Service Commission:

Normally this would be for service in New Zealand and for a term of from two to five years. We recommend:

(1) The chaplain to receive Service pay.

(2) The chaplain to pay his personal subscription to the Supernumary and Home Acquirement Funds. The Circuit contribution to be paid by the Chaplaincy Fund.

(3) The chaplain to provide his own home.

(4) The Chaplaincy Fund to make a grant towards furnishings—the amount to be decided by Conference.

(c) C.M.T. Chaplains:

C.M.T. Chaplains go into camp for a period of 10 weeks once during their active ministry. Only in exceptional circumstances is a chaplain posted to a second C.M.T. Camp for duty. If there is any monetary advantage in C.M.T. service it seems to be insufficient to upset the balance of the standard of ministerial remuneration.

During his period in a C.M.T. Camp the chaplain's wife continues to occupy the parsonage with its usual attendant expenses, which will not be appreciably reduced by the absence of her husband.

The chaplain receives pay according to Army rates, out of which he pays certain fees and incidental expenses which are equivalent to the payment of Board and Lodging. He also provides extras of equipment which he may consider necessary for more efficient service.

Whatever expenses may be incurred for the provision of 'Supply' during the chaplain's absence from his Circuit is a charge upon his Stipend.

A chaplain who does a tour of duty in a C.M.T. Camp has then to maintain the usual expenses of his home and his Stipend is reduced by the amount of the cost of 'Supply'. On the other hand he receives Army pay from which he pays certain personal expenses—these would vary according to the proximity of his home. Generally speaking the chaplain who does a tour of duty in a C.M.T. Camp receives in our opinion little if any financial advantage.

Those who are posted to C.M.T. Camps are in the early years of their ministry and can well do with some financial assistance. The committee is of the opinion that the church should not be parsimonious in respect to any financial advantage which may accrue to them.

We recommend that where a chaplain enters a C.M.T. Camp for a tour of duty, the Circuit continue to pay the regular stipend after deducting

the cost of adequate 'Supply'.

(d) Territorial Force Chaplains:

T.F. chaplains are expected to attend an annual camp of 14 days duration during the period of their posting which is normally for three years. While in camp they receive Army rates of pay. If a T.F. chaplain makes the annual camp coincide with his annual vacation this should not necessarily involve his Circuit any more than if he sought temporary casual employment. When he attends the annual camp when he is not on vacation the question of remuneration should be subject to negotiation with his Circuit officials.

We recommend that T.F. chaplains make arrangements with their circuit officials in respect to adequate 'supply' when camps do not coincide with annual vacations and that the regular stipend be paid after deducting cost of 'supply'.

(e) Officiating Chaplains:

Travelling expenses and nominal payments only are involved in these appointments.

We recommend that officiating chaplains make arrangements for their duties in consultation with their Circuit officials.

(f) Honorary Chaplains:

No remuneration or expenses are paid in the case of honorary appointments.

- (2) After the end of the said Connexional Year, if Conference has made another appointment to the Circuit the chaplain's wife shall vacate the parsonage and the Chaplaincy fund shall make a grant for furnishings to the chaplain's wife, the amount to be decided by Conference.

(b) Short Service Commission:

(1) The chaplain shall receive Service pay.

- (2) The Chaplain shall pay his personal subscriptions to the Supernumary and Home Acquirement Funds and the Chaplaincy Fund shall pay the amount of the Circuit contribution.
 - (3) The chaplain shall provide his own home.
- (4) The Chaplaincy Fund shall make a grant towards furnishing to the chaplain, the amount to be decided by Conference.

(c) C.M.T. Camps:

Where a chaplain enters a C.M.T. Camp for a tour of duty his Circuit shall continue to pay the regular stipend after deducting the cost of adequate supply.

(d) Territorial Force Chaplains:

Territorial Force chaplains required to attend Annual Camps shall make adequate arrangements with their Circuit officials for the provision of supply except in the case of a camp coinciding with the chaplain's annual vacation. The regular stipend shall be paid to the chaplain after deducting the cost of supply.

(e) Officiating Chaplains:

Officiating chaplains shall make arrangements for their duties in consultation with their Circuit officials.

1—Church Union Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

The Church Union Committee met in Wesley Church Lounge, Taranaki Street, Wellington, on 10th May, 1956, with an attendance of 27 members presided over by the President. The meeting dealt mainly with matters referred to it from the Joint Standing Committee and which are included in the Report of that committee. One meeting of the Executive was held on 28th June, 1956, in Wellington, at which approval was given to the Committee's Report to Synods and Conference and to the report of the Joint Standing Committee.

Study Booklet "Shall We Unite":

The sudy booklet, "Shall We Unite?" which provides the basis for the study programme on the issues affecting Church Union was for the study programme on the issues affecting Church Union was distributed early in the year to all ministers, home missionaries and supernumerary ministers. No minister or congregation can afford to neglect these studies in view of the vote on the principle of union to be taken next year. If study groups are not practicable in every place then it is hoped that the issues raised in the study will be brought before our people from the pulpit, in Leaders' and Quarterly Meetings, in Bible Classes, Women's Guids, Fireside Clubs and Men's Fellowships. The use of the studies is not limited to this year and the Committee reminds our ministers and people that, where it has been difficult or impossible to use them effectively this year, there is still time in the first half of next year, prior to the taking of the vote, for the issues involved to be carefully studied.

Reciprocal Membership:

The principle of Reciprocal Membership and the importance of implementing it in the appropriate districts and areas was again brought before the church this year in a statement in the "Methodist Times."

Joint Meeting of Church Union Committees in 1957:

The Committee has forwarded a request to the Joint Standing Committee to call a joint meeting of the Union Committees of the four negotiating churches in 1957, following the vote on the principle of union.

Union Churches:

Encouraging reports of the congregational life and work of the Union Churches have been received, but the future of Corstorphine Union Church for reasons cited in the Report of the Joint Standing Committee, is under consideration.

Corstorphine: The Committee was deeply concerned to learn of the critical situation which has developed in regard to the future of the Corstorphine Union Church. (See Report of Joint Standing Committee.) Concerning the proposal that the Union Church should join with Columba Presbyterian Parish to form a new Presbyterian Parish the Committee—

- (1) Endorsed the decision of the Otago Synod Standing Committee that the status quo at the Union Church be maintained.
- (2) Wrote to the Committee of Oversight pointing out that the suggested amalgamation would mean, virtually, the disappearance of Methodist witness in the area; that the Methodist Church had deferred unilateral action in commencing a new cause at Corstorphine and had sunk its equity in the Union Church; and suggesting that consideration be given to the possibility of Columba Presbyterian Parish being amalgamated with the Union Church thus strengthening the united witness.
- (3) Furnished a report to the Joint Standing Committee expressing the Methodist viewpoint.

Taupo: The Committee reports, with regret, that the proposal for a Union Church at Taupo, for which Conference approval was given last year, has now lapsed. An alternative proposal asking for the creation of a Presbyterian Parish into which the Methodists were invited to share on a basis of reciprocal membership was unacceptable under the circumstances.

Burwood: Methodist and Presbyterian Church members living in Burwood, Christchurch, have taken initial steps towards the possible formation of a Union cause. The matter has been referred to the District Courts of the churches concerned for investigation and approval.

Visit to Great Britain of the Revs. J. J. Lewis and W. J. Morrison:

The Committee, in conveying best wishes to the Revs. J. J. Lewis and W. J. Morrison on their visit to Great Britain, has asked these brethren to keep the committee informed of any conversations and developments in regard to Church Union there.

REPORT OF THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE ON CHURCH UNION, 1956

Convenership:

At the end of 1955 the Joint Standing Committee suffered a severe loss in the departure of the Rev. L. G. Geering, M.A., B.D., to take up an appointment as Professor of Old Testament Studies at Emmanuel College, Brisbane. Mr Geering had served as Convener of the Committee since its inception in 1951 and brought to every aspect of the committee's work those qualities of mind and spirit which made him an acknowledged and trusted leader. The committee wishes to record its grateful appreciation of his outstanding leadership and unflagging zeal in the cause of Church Union during the past five years and to pray for him satisfaction and success in his new appointment. The present convener is the Rev. A. K. Petch, Convener of the Methodist Church Union Committee.

Simultaneous Assemblies and Conference:

The Joint Standing Committee is much indebted to the Joint Arrangements Committee in Auckland for the excellent arrangements made for the three United Acts to be observed in connection with the simultaneous Assemblies and Conference of this year. A representative of the Associated Church of Christ was invited to join the Arrangements Committee. The following detailed arrangements have the approval of the Arrangements Committees of the three churches, the Joint Standing Committee on Church Union and the appropriate officials and/or

committees normally responsible for the Agenda of their respective Assembly or Conference.

United and simultaneous Communion Services to be held in St. David's Presbyterian Church, Pitt Street Methodist Church and Beresford Congregational Church, on Friday, 2nd November, 1956, from 9 a.m. to 10.15 a.m. with representatives of each Court present at each service.

The United Act of Worship to be held in the Auckland Town Hall on Sunday, 4th November, at 2.45 p.m., and, if possible, to be broadcast; the Heads of the four churches represented on the Joint Standing Committee to conduct the service; the President of the Methodist Conference to lead the prayers, the Moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly to preach the sermon and the President of the Associated Churches of Christ to read the Old Testament Lesson and the Chairman of the Congregational Union the New Testament Lesson.

The United Act of Witness to be held in the Auckland Town Hall on Tuesday, 6th November, at 7.45 p.m., and to be presided over by the Chairman of the Congregational Union; the speaker to be the Rev. S. G. Andrews, M.A., General Secretary for Foreign Missions, Methodist Church of New Zealand and, by means of pageantry, the story of what the participating churches are doing in all fields of missionary endeavour and service, both at home and overseas, to be presented in dramatic form.

Collections at United Acts. The collection at the United Act of Worship to be for Missions; that of the United Act of Witness to be for the general expenses of the Assemblies and Conference, the amounts to be divided on a basis approved by the Arrangements Committees of the three churches.

Vote on the Principle of Union in 1957:

As directed by the Assemblies and Conference of 1955 the Joint Standing Committee has prepared "plans for the taking in 1957 of the first of two votes, viz. the vote on the 'principle of union'." After a full and frank discussion it was decided to recommend:

- 1. That the vote on the principle of union be held during the month of June in 1957.
- 2. That the vote be taken of all who are members in full communion of each of the four participating churches.
- 3. That a simple and brief explanation of what is meant by "a vote on the principle of union" be attached to the Ballot Paper.

The Ballot Paper will be presented to Conference for approval.

Joint Regional Committees:

The Joint Standing Committee has communicated with all District Courts of the participating churches asking that Joint Regional Committees be established and representatives appointed and offering practical suggestions for the implementing in all districts and parishes of the study programme on Church Union based on the study booklet, "Shall We Unite?" Reports have been received of action taken or contemplated in several districts and centres, but the committee is concerned that church members, in every district and parish, be made aware of the important issues involved especially in view of the proposed vote, next year, on the principle of union. In a number of places study groups representative of at least two or more of the negotiating churches have proved most profitable.

Churches of Christ Supplement:

The Associated Churches of Christ have prepared for their own members a supplement to "Shall We Unite?" seeing that the studies

contained in the latter were written before the Churches of Christ had entered into the Church Union negotiations. The supplement will also be of interest to members and study groups of other churches in that it contains besides brief introductions to each of the studies in "Shall We Unite?" two appendices, one historical setting forth the traditional attitude of the Churches of Christ to Christian Unity, and the other doctrinal, being a preliminary statement of the teaching of the Churches of Christ in relation to that of the other negotiating churches.

Common Declaration of Faith:

The first draft of the Common Declaration of Faith has been before the doctrinal committees of the four churches and suggested amendments have been received. The Joint Standing Committee is now re-drafting the Declaration in the light of these amendments.

Possible Amalgamation of Church Periodicals:

In view of the decision of the appropriate committee of the Presbyterian Church that no action be taken on the question of the possible amalgamation of church periodicals until after the vote on the principle of union next year, the matter has been deferred.

Union Parishes:

Reports from the five Union Parishes indicate that relationships within each congregation are most harmonious. All, with the exception of Corstorphine, are facing the future of their parish with confidence.

Raglan: The Raglan Church is well established and in good heart. Since the termination of the ministry of the Rev. Ian Gordon, a returned missionary of the Congregational Church has been acting as supply. The appointment of a Presbyterian minister is now awaited. Membership stands at 143 (including Congregational 38, Presbyterian 42, and Methodist 55) and there are three Sunday Schools with a combined roll of 109. The Church records a credit balance of £347. An annual Beach Mission is conducted under the auspices of the Union Church.

Taita: There are 70 on the membership roll. During the nine years of its existence finances have risen steadily. Increases in stipend and other obligations such as the Budget have been met; a car allowance provided for; the buildings have been maintained and the substantial grants reduced. It is the Church's aim to be self-supporting within the next year.

The most pressing difficulty is the inadequacy of the buildings for the 400 young people on the youth rolls, making necessary the use of two state schools. There is a Presbyterian ministerial appointment.

Wainui-O-Mata: This is the most recently formed of the Union Parishes and is benefitting greatly from a full-time ministerial appointment (Methodist). A small church hall is being erected by voluntary labour in the Wellington Road area, the present church is being redecorated, and plans are under way for the erection, during the coming year, of a new Parish Church on a central site. Preliminary steps have been taken towards the provision of a manse.

Senior members number 66 and 300 families are under pastoral care. Over 100 children attend the Sunday School and 18 young people belong to the Bible Class. The affairs of the Parish are administered by a Boad of Managers under the direction of the Committee of Oversight and there is a strong Women's Fellowship.

Marchwiel: Since the opening of the new Church Hall on 23rd July, 1955, communicant membership has increased by 60 and now stands at 124 while finances have also increased 50 per cent. There are 300 on the Sunday School Roll, 140 of whom are in the Beginners' Department, with a total of 28 teachers. The Girls' Life Brigade numbers 39, the cadets 33 and the Boys' Brigade 14, and there are 70 on the Cradle Roll. There were 19 Baptisms during the year, five of whom were adults. The session is comprised of 9 elders and meets monthly and the Board of Managers numbers 17. The new hall is being used extensively during the week and, with the exception of the Beginners' Room, is adequate for all requirements. There is a Presbyterian ministerial appointment,

Corstorphine: The report of the minister states that, notwithstanding the faithful efforts made by the minister and people and the harmonious relationships which exist within the congregation, the parish has not made the progress hoped for. Communicant membership numbers 68 (Presbyterians 56, Methodists 12) and there are 215 homes under pastoral care. The Sunday School Roll stands at 140, with 14 teachers, and the Bible Class numbers 36. The fact that the present part time ministry, which was appointed for three years, is drawing to a close has raised the question of the future of the Union Church. Apart from the difficulties which seem to be common to Union Churches, the chief problem has been a physical one. The extensive building programme which, originally, it was anticipated would reach to Blackhead Hill has not eventuated. The Annual Meeting agreed to a proposal, which has the support of the Committee of Oversight, that the Union Parish join with Columba Presbyterian Parish to form a new Presbyterian Parish, provided that the name "Union Church" is included in the name of the new parish. However, there is a division of opinion concerning this proposal between the District Courts of the churches represented in the Union Church and joint discussions concerning the future of the Union Parish are now taking place at the district level. close has raised the question of the future of the Union Church. Apart

Union Parish Visitation:

The committee has approved the principle of periodic visitation of Union Churches by official representatives of the District Courts of the churches concerned. To this end a list of questions to be asked on the occasion of such visits has been prepared.

Ministerial Appointments to Churches and the Furnishing of Manses:

The different policies pursued by the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches concerning the furnishing of parsonages and manses has created a real problem in regard to the appointment of ministers to Union Parishes especially as such appointments affect the furnishing of the manses. This matter, together with the question of a continuing ministry in Union Churches has been referred to the Presbyterian Director of Missions and the General Superintendent of the Methodist Home Mission Department, for consideration and report.

Finance:

The committee has given consideration to the expenses involved in its work and estimates that these now amount to about £40 per annum. Hitherto the expenses have been roughly shared by the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches. The committee now seeks approval for apportioning the expenses as follows: Presbyterian Church £20, Methodist Church £12, Congregational Church and the Associated Churches of Christ £4 each.

General Appeal 1955:

The result of the appeal was most satisfactory, a sum of £2631/8/9 was raised. Wellington and Hawkes Bay did well but in Otago-Southland District the result was not so good.

The Committee at the 30th June had £1022/15/6 in hand. Recipients from the Fund will now not have to wait until sufficient moneys from a

current appeal are available. It will be possible to make an advance payment of say one-half earlier in the year and the balance will then be paid as moneys come to hand.

Spiritual Advance Committee:

This Committee has asked that it be allocated a sum of £100 in the General Appeal. Consideration of this application has been deferred pending the receipt of further information. It is hoped to report our decision to Conference.

Budget for 1957 Appeal:

The Committee has obtained the requirements of the various Committees and institutions affected by the Appeal. Conference directed the Committee to increase the allocation for the New Zaland Alliance as soon as it considered the position of the fund justified such action, and therefore the Committee recommends that the allocation of the New Zealand Alliance be increased to £150.

3—Stipend Committee

RESOLUTIONS

4—Transport Trust Board, Inc.

ANNUAL REPORT 1956

The work of the Board continues to serve a useful purpose in assisting Ministers and circuits to finance the purchase of vehicles for use in essential Church work. At the present time 32 Ministers, Home Missionaries and Circuits are being assisted to a total amount of £7,132/5/5. All loans are being repaid in a satisfactory manner.

Hire-purchase Restrictions:

The general position with regard to hire-purchase restrictions remains unchanged and it was not possible to secure any relaxation of the Regulations in respect of the purchase of cars for Church workers. In the present circumstances there are two categories in which the Board may assist in financing the purchase of cars.

- 1. When the security is the vehicle itself, the Board is required to operate within the Regulation which allows only one half of the purchase price to be advanced by way of loan to be repaid in full within 18 months.
- 2. When separate security is available the Board may, within the Regulations, vary the amount of deposit and the time of repayment in accordance with its own constitution.

During the current year some ministers and circuits in co-operation have been able to use this latter method of financing the purchase of cars for circuit purposes and the Board commends this procedure to all concerned.

Travelling Allowances:

The present scale of travelling allowance is recommended for readoption for the coming year. This is the scale at present being used

by the Public Service and other organisations, and such scale fully covers present normal costs in running motor cars. For convenience of reference the present scale is again set out as under:

The Financial Position of Ministers:

The Board has continued to collaborate with the Standing Committee on Stipends concerning the serious inroads which are made into the stipends of many ministers both for the purchase and maintenance of cars for circuit work.

At the present time the Board is awaiting the Report and Recommendations of the Special Committee appointed by last Conference to deal with the question of budget systems and related matters. The Board believes that the primary solution of such inequalities and hardships as result from inroads made on stipends for transport purposes, is to be found in a widespread understanding and practice of sound Christian Stewardship. For this reason it is hoped that the special Committee will give a lead to the whole Church in such a way that further action by the Board will not be necessary.

Conclusion:

During part of the year, the Secretary, Mr T. M. Pacey, has been overseas and Mr D. Taylor has undertaken the work of Secretary in addition to his duties as Treasurer. The Board places on record appreciation of the services so rendered.

6—Church Finance and Budget Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

Last Conference appointed a Committee to investigate within New Zealand and overseas and to report upon methods of local church finance and budgeting, together with certain related matters. (See Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 129.)

The same Conference directed the Committee to consider a suggested amendment to the Law Book to bring appeals made for Home Missions and Foreign Missions, Children's Homes and the Youth Department under the supervision of the Central Finance Committee. (See Minutes of Conference, 1955, page 165.)

Both of the above assignments have received the Committee's attention and a preliminary report concerning them is given below. It is hoped to furnish a fuller report to Conference.

Budgeting by Local Churches:

The Committee sent to the Superintendent of each circuit a questionnaire seeking information as to the extent of budget systems.

Practically all circuits replied, revealing the following position:

Budget system not in operation 85

Budget system not in operation 85
Budget system under consideration 10
Complete or partial budget system in operation 24

Several of those in the first group expressed themselves as in favour of or interested in budgeting. Only four Circuits indicated any doubts as to the desirability of a budgeting scheme in their case.

The Committee was impressed by the extent to which Circuits are already operating budget systems. It noted that they are without exception stated to be most satisfactory. Nevertheless, it is clear from information furnished that many of them are partial systems only and that generally results obtained do not measure up to those being secured by Churches which have adopted the most modern systems of fund-raising.

The Committee was also impressed by the evidence of the increasing desire of Circuits to put their giving on to a sounder and more Christian basis. Several mentioned that the Wells system of fund-raising was being adopted or considered. Clearly changes in methods of local Church finance are rapidly taking place. Equally clearly, there is an urgent need for guidance to our Circuits in this matter.

Relationship of Local Schemes to Central Appeals:

It is obvious from replies received that some Circuits have found difficulties in introducing comprehensive budget schemes because of the need to comply with existing Church Law relating to Home and Foreign Mission and other authorised appeals. Other Circuits, it would seem, are not complying with the strict letter of the Law.

The above problem is being accentuated by the interest which Circuits are beginning to take in the Wells system of fund-raising, this being an all-inclusive system. From correspondence with Church Departments and similar Church organisations it is clear that they are fully alive to the problem. The Committee intends to have further discussions with them concerning the matter.

Comparisons with Other Churches:

The Committee is seeking information as to methods of local Church Finance operating overseas and has already obtained details of the Presbyterian and Baptist systems current in New Zealand. It is evident that the Presbyterians have a very comprehensive scheme of budgeting and that the Baptists go considerably further in that direction than does our New Zealand Church.

The Committee is studying "The Every Member Canvass" method of giving which is, it appears, making considerable headway amongst Methodist Churches in Victoria. This is a comprehensive budgetary system and it seems to have considerable merit. It is described as "A method of giving based on the Principles of Christian Stewardship and Service."

Education in Christian Stewardship:

Whilst not wishing to detract from the work which is being done in a general way by various Boards and Departments in educating our Methodist people in the principles of Christian Stewardship, the Committee is of the opinion that there is need for more specific teaching concerning this very important aspect of our Faith. The Committee is giving attention to the matter and is studying literature issued by "The Every Member Canvass" Committee, the Wells Organisations and

the Stewardship Committee of the N.Z. Presbyterian Church.

Conclusion:

Although its investigations are still in the preliminary stages, the Committee has already learnt sufficient to be able to say that it is moving towards the concept of a comprehensive budget scheme of local Church finance. As intimated earlier, a further report will be submitted to Conference. It is hoped that it will be possible to include in this an outline of some scheme which would be suitable for general application. Meanwhile the Committee suggests that Circuits should not make radical changes in their systems of finance, without seeking competent advice.

The Committee realises that the establishment of a comprehensive scheme of local Church finance would almost inevitably make necessary the introduction of an all-embracing budgetary scheme at the connexional level. The Committee is, therefore, giving immediate atten-

tion to this matter also.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT, 1956

As intimated in its report to Synods, the Committee has given consideration to the following two matters referred to it by last Conference:

(a) A suggested amendment to the Law Book to include appeals for the Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Children's Homes and Youth Department in the General Connexional Appeal (see Minutes of Conference 1955, page 165);

(b) The investigation of methods of Church finance and budgetting (see Minutes of Conference 1955, page 129).

General Connexional and Other Appeals:

The Committee does not consider that the amendment suggested in (a) above would be desirable. Each of the four separate appeals mentioned is a major one and to launch them all at one time of the year, along with a number of minor appeals, would not be satisfactory to the Departments involved nor to the local Church. The Committee's view is that any changes in the method of launching these appeals should be along the lines mentioned later in this report.

Current Methods of Church Finance:

The Committee's report to Synods indicated the extent to which Circuits are already operating budget schemes and also referred to the wide-spread interest which they were evidencing in the question of reform of their local system of finance. Mention was made, too, of the unsatisfactory nature of many of the budget systems and the difficulties being met in operating any comprehensive scheme of local Church finance, because of the existing Church Law relating to Home and Foreign Mission and other authorised appeals.

Reference was made to methods of local Church finance operating in the Presbyterian and Baptist Churches in New Zealand, it being pointed out that both have gone further in the direction of comprehensive budget schemes than we have. Attention was drawn to the "Wells" system of fund raising and the "Every Methodist Canvass" method of finance at present operating in Victoria. Since then, information received from the Methodist Church and the National Council of Churches of Christ in U.S.A. and the United Church of Canada reveals that all-embracing budget schemes are the general rule in those countries.

Need for a Change:

In the light of the information set out in the two previous paragraphs, the Committee is unanimously of the opinion that the time has arrived for

a major change in our own methods of Church finance. It is clear that Circuits generally are ready for it.

We are strongly of the opinion that the success of the "Every Methodist Canvass" in Victoria and of the "Wells" method of Church finance in New Zealand and elsewhere clearly demonstrates that a change to budgetary control of income and expenditure would offer the most effective means of regulating finance in our Church. Along with this would, of course, have to go positive teaching of our people in the principles of Christian stewardship.

Proposed Change:

In order that Conference may express its mind on the general principles involved in the proposed change, we submit hereunder a broad outline of the procedure which we envisage would be followed, if a comprehensive budget scheme were adopted:

A. CONNEXIONAL BUDGETTING

- (1) The Departments of the Church should prepare their budgets at least two years ahead. This is imperative in order that details may reach circuits in ample time to permit inclusion in the local budgets.
- (2) Representatives of the Mission Departments, Youth Department and other sections of the Church with National Executives should meet prior to Conference to review the Departmental Budgets in order to coordinate and regulate details for submission to Conference in a composite form.
- (3) When approved by Conference, committee Estimates should be broken down into District assessments but with sufficient detail to indicate the District assessment under each fund.
- (4) The function of Districts would be to break down the total figure into circuit assessments and ensure that details reach Circuits without delay. The Synod Standing Committee might find it necessary to make a small levy on Circuits for Committee expenses. This would be added to the assessments before they were issued to Circuits.

B. LOCAL BUDGETTING

- (5) In the Circuits the same process should be carried out. Each section of the churches should prepare and advise a central officer of its estimate of requirements for the year. The estimate should be based on the previous year's experience, but allowance should be made for any special factors relating to the year under review. In Circuits of more than one Church, each Church would prepare an estimate of its own requirements for inclusion in the Circuit budget.
- (6) A central committee should then review the requisitions from the sections and amalgamate them with the circuit assessment which had been received from the District under (4). The approved figure should give the total sum which would require to be raised during the year.
- (7) It is at this point that the whole manpower resources of the church would be marshalled to organise the canvass necessary to yield the total revenue required. The committee feels that the first organisation in this respect will be the most difficult. Once the congregation has been educated to the point of a proper acknowledgement of stewardship, succeeding years should be much easier to arrange. There is, in our opinion, no alternative to a regular system of direct giving on the basis of pledges or promises given at the commencement of each financial year.
- (8) It has been clearly demonstrated both overseas and in N.Z. that adoption of the system of planned giving by means of pledges obtained in a properly organised canvass usually results in the target aimed at being exceeded. Circuits must realise that this surplus is not their own, but must be shared equitably with the Church Departments outside the Circuit.

(9) In the opinion of the committee, it is imperative that the Budgets include all appeals likely to arise in the Church. Dispensation should not be given for any special appeal except where funds are to be raised completely outside the regular activities of the Church and without appeal to the Church membership. Rather by inclusion of a reasonable "contingency" item in the Estimate of Expenditure provision should be made for proper appeals which could not be foreseen at the time of preparing the estimates.

(10) The Budget should provide for the circuit's contribution to the

following: -

Home and Maori Missions Overseas Missions Youth Department Orphanages Church Extension General Connexional Appeal All other Connexional Levies

(The amounts for the above would be supplied to Circuits by the

Synod Standing Committee.)

Circuit Fund (including stipends, travelling expenses and general Circuit administration)

Trust Fund or Funds (including new buildings and debt reduction as well as operating expenses)

Circuit Responsibility for:

Local Youth Work (i.e. Sunday School, Bible Classes, Brigades, etc.)

Ladies' Guilds Fireside Clubs Men's Fellowships

Contingencies

Organisation and Direction of Scheme:

The Committee desires to point out that, while it has found a growing desire for reform in local church finance and a widespread interest in the system of planned giving outlined herein, the acceptance of the new system proposed cannot be left to chance or take place merely by direction of Conference. The fullest results will not be obtained by a haphazard nad partial acceptance of the new system. To be effective, it should be accepted completely and universally.

Assuming therefore, that Conference will accept in principle the plan outlined above, the Committee strongly urges the need for the immediate appointment by Conference of a full-time agent to give leadership and driving power to the arrangements for implementing the new system of giving. In support of this suggestion the Committee desires to stress the following points:—

- (a) The obvious desire of many Circuits to cultivate amongst their Church members and adherents a deeper sense of Christian stewardship;
- (b) While this attitude of mind exists, it is felt that the time is opportune to press the value of systematic and adequate giving amongst all our people;
- (c) Several Circuits or Churches have already entered in arrangements with the Wells Organisation;
- (d) It is apparent, because of the increasing demands which are being made on the Wells Organisation and also because not all circuits prefer this Organisation, that the Church must devise and work through some such scheme as the Every Member Canvass of Victoria.
- (e) To introduce effectively such a scheme there must be guidance and leadership which could only be given by a competent person giving his full-time efforts to that end. This has been the experience of the Methodist Church in Victoria.

The Committee therefore considers that the appointment of the best man available, be he minister or layman, with the necessary organising ability and enthusiasm for the work would be of immense benefit to the whole life of the Church. Time alone will tell whether the need is for a permanent or a temporary appointment but at least three years' work is involved.

The financial outlay in such an appointment should not present any real difficiulty. The anticipated benefit from a Dominion-wide effort, properly supervised, should be sufficient inducement to all departments of the Church to agree to bear a proportionate part of the total cost. The major task would be the finding of money to cover the first year's expenses. We consider that it should be possible to obtain this by way of loan from one of the departments of the Church, by subscription from interested laymen, or, to some extent at least, by grants from certain connexional funds.

Merits of the Proposed Scheme:

Finally, the committee wishes to point out that the benefits to be obtained from the adoption and implementation of this report are not merely financial ones. Without explaining why it should be so, the Committee records the fact that there is ample evidence that where a canvass by the Well Organisation or by the "Every Methodist Canvass" is undertaken, it is usually followed by a marked increase in Church attendance, a greater enthusiasm in the leadership and a deepening of the whole spiritual life of the Church. There appears to be no reason why similar results should not follow in the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

The acceptance of the needs of the major Departments of the Church by the local Churches as an equal responsibility with their own domestic requirements should free those Departments from a good deal of worry and work. Nothing in the Committee's proposals should be deemed to exclude opportunities for expression of special interest in objectives beyond the Budget commitment. It is considered that a missionary educational programme, whether by deputations or otherwise, should continue.

QUESTION LXI.—1 (a) What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Laws and Regulations of the Church, including the Rulings of the President during the year?

Law Revision Committee

The following matters received by the Conference 1955 are referred to Conference 1956:-

(1) Reports of Committees and Standing Orders (1954 Minutes page 176): The Committee has been directed to report on the matter of procedure in the reception and adoption of reports in reference to the Standing Orders of Conference.

Conference receives reports of Departmental Committees, Councils and Boards, and also from special Committees, and Commissions appointed by it from time to time.

The Committees of Details report to Conference on matters remitted

by Conference to them for their consideration.

When a matter is remitted to a Committee of Detail the Convener of such Committee submits the report and recommendations of that Commitee, such report and recommendations taking precedence over other proposals on the same subject (Law Book para, 373).

There is one exception to this as provided in para. 374 which states that the reports of the Departmental Committees, Councils and Boards and any special reports required by the Conference shall be submitted to the Conference by the departmental appointee or by any person duly authorised

It is provided in the Standing Orders that the time allowed for speakers moving and seconding a motion for the adoption of a report which has been previously circulated shall be three minutes. Unless determined by the President there shall be no detailed exposition of such report. (See Standing Orders 10 as amended).

All other speakers are allowed three minutes each.

In the case of a report which has not been previously circulated the time allowed to speakers shall be as set out in Standing Order (10).

(2) Corrections:

There are several corrections to be made in the Law Book as follows:

1. Section VII....The Preachers' Meeting and Local Preachers

It has been pointed out that an error occurs in para, 254 (d). Line three should read:

"person so nominated shall be recommended to (not by) the Quarterly Meeting.'

2. Constitution of District Ministerial Committees
Probationers have never been members of the District Ministerial Committees and have been wrongly included in para, 321 page 60:

Paras. 321 and 323 should be amended as follows:-

Para 321, delete the word "Probationer."
Para 323, after the word Committee in (a) insert the words "and Probationers whose names appear on the Station sheet for the District"

3. Part III-The Vice-President of the Conference

The Vice-president has always had some part in the conduct of the ordination service. Somehow the authority to this wrongly appears in paragraph 219.

Therefore para, 218 and 219 should be amended as follows:-

Para, 218, add the following sentence: "He shall have some part in the conduct of the Ordination Service at the Conference at which he is

Para. 219, delete the last sentence.

(3) Native Ministers, Maori Representation in Synods and Conference, Maori Mission Circuits:

The Committee still has these matters under consideration and expects to be able to finalise its report thereon during the coming year. (10) Several matters have come to the notice of the Committee which the Committee is of the opinion should receive consideration by it. Therefore the Committee asks permission to study and report on the following:-

- (1) Regulations re choirmaster and organist.
- (2) The giving of names to Churches.
- (3) Chairman of local Courts having a deliberative as well as a casting vote.

RESOLUTIONS

That the Report be received and adopted.

Law Revision Committee EPORT FOR 1956

Sections 7, 8, 9-of the Committee's report 1955 (as above) were received and referred to 1956 Conference.

The Committee has met regularly over the last four months and has considered the following matters:-

1. WORLD PEACE COMMITTEE

The Committee has considered the constitution of the World Peace Committee (1954 Minutes page 86 Resolution 6B) and recommends as follows:-

Xb. World Peace Committee

A World Peace Committee shall be appointed at each Conference. It shall give leadership to the Church in all matters relating to World Peace and shall report thereon to Synods and to the Conference.

2. MINISTERS "RESTING" AND SERVING UNDER OTHER ORGANISATIONS (1955 Minutes page 177 Resolution 6)

There are separate provisions in the Law Book relating to Ministers permitted to serve with other organisations and to Ministers "Resting" (see Law Book page 19 paragraphs 121 and 122).

The usual practice has been to name Ministers who have been permitted to serve with organisations under question 18 of the Conference Agenda. This does not seem quite appropriate and therefore it is recommended that question 18 be subdivided into two parts as follows:—

18(a) What Ministers or Probationers have permission to serve with other organisations during the year?

18(b) What Ministers or Probationers have permission "to Rest" during the year?

QUESTION 28 OF THE CONFERENCE AGENDA AND TERM "MARRIED MINISTER" (1955 Minutes page 177 Resolution 4)

The Committee is of the opinion that this question should be reworded.

It is the duty of each Circuit to provide a suitable parsonage adequately furnished for each ordained Minister (paragraph 228(c) Law Book page 41). Further a Circuit to which an additional unmarried Minister or a Pro-bationer is appointed at its request is required to provide for a Married Minister at the end of four years from the date of such appointment (paragraph 138 Law Book page 22). Conference can of course as has been done on numerous occasions extend the period.

All ordained Ministers are entitled to furnished parsonages whether they are married or not. It is the duty of the Circuit to provide a parsonage for each ordained Minister stationed therein.

Therefore the Committee recommends that Question 28 of Paragraph 379 Law Book page 75 be repealed and the following substituted therefor:-28. What Circuits are due to provide a parsonage for an Ordained Minister?

POWERS OF CONFERENCE AND RIGHTS OF QUARTERLY MEETINGS (Resolution 5 1956 Minutes page 177)

The Committee has been directed to report on the provisions of paragraph 36 Section (11) Law Book page 72 with respect to the rights of Quarterly Meetings.

This paragraph gives power to the Conference to adopt any legislation required in the interests of the Church provided that no change shall be made affecting constitutional questions or the rights and privileges of the Ministery or Laity unless such changes shall have been previously submitted at the District Synods and confirmed by a Stated majority at the next succeeding Conference.

This provision first appeared in our Church Law after the 1913 Union with the Primitive Methodist Church and has been continued unaltered ever since. The same paragraph is in the 1928 Edition of the Law Book, see

page 76 paragraph 246 (10).

Quarterly Meetings have never had the right to be consulted by the Conference in regard to constitutional changes.

5. HANDING OVER ROLLS AT INDUCTION SERVICE

The Committee in conjunction with the Faith and Order Committee has considered the question of handing over rolls during the induction service. (Resolution 1a 1955 Minutes page 62).

It is suggested that this be provided for where the Presiding Minister addresses the new Minister as is set out on page 8 of the Order of Service.

The Committee recommends the following wording:

"In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ I welcome you to the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments of this Circuit and in token of your induction I extend to you the right hand of fellowship.

I now hand to you your Rolls of Church Members and Adherents and charge you to be faithful and diligent in the pastoral care of this people."

Propies

Definition of Adherent

(Resolution 16 1955 Minutes page 63)

The Committee recommends that a Methodist Adherent be defined as "a person who is consistent in his attendance at Divine Worship and in his support of the Church by service and means and is so recognised by the Leaders' Meeting."

6. EXAMINATION OF ROLLS AND RECORDS

(Resolution 7a 1955 Minutes page 177)

The Committee suggests that the most suitable time for an examination of Church rolls and records would be at the March Meeting of the District Ministerial Committee. One of the questions to be considered at that meeting relates to Pastoral Efficiency.

The Committee therefore recommends that there be added to para-

graph 7 Law Book page 2 the following:

"All membership Rolls and Circuit Schedules shall be submitted by the Superintendent Minister to the March Meeting of the Ministerial Committee which shall make suitable arrangements for the examination of the same."

7. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OF DEACONESSES

(Resolution 4 1955 Minutes page 177)

Appointments of Deaconesses are made by the Conference on the recommendation of the Deaconess House Board. The practice has been for the Board to submit its recommended appointments to the Conference but often the Stationing Committee requires information relating to Deaconesses. Therefore the Committee recommends that the last sentence of paragraph 506 (3) Law Book page 123 be repealed and the following be substituted therefore:—

"The appointment shall be made by the Conference on the recommendation of the Board. The Board shall present to the Stationing Committee for information only its list of recommended appointments."

8. ENGAGEMENT OF AGENTS BETWEEN CONFERENCE

Where Conference has designated a certain station as "one wanted" it is the duty of the Home Mission Department and the local officials to endeavour to provide a supply. Sometimes the Department has a person available yet the position has been filled by the local officials. Of course the actual apointment has to be made by the President. (See paragraph 128 Law Book page 21).

In order to obviate any future difficulty it is recommended that the following be added to paragraph 128:—

"acting in consultation with the Home Mission Board."

9. PARSONAGE ALLOWANCES

In 1952 Conference decided that the allowance for linen, etc., be increased and that Ministers provide their own kitchen utensils. (1952 Minutes page 58).

The Committee therefore recommends that the last sentence of paragraph 228(c) be repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

"Such furniture shall include curtains but shall exclude linen, blankets, cutlery, crockery and kitchen utensils."

10. MAORI WORK AND AGENDA FOR QUARTERLY MEETINGS

The 1950 Conference referred to the Committee certain proposed questions to be considered at Quarterly Meetings. (1950 Minutes page 127). It was suggested that different questions should be provided for North and South Island circuits. This does not seem practicable to the Committee. Further there are many circuits where there would be no Maoris in them. The Committee considers that the question to be considered should be more of a general nature and therefore recommends that an additional question be added as follows:—

Paragraph 290 (15a) "What is being done in the Circuit for work amongst the Maori people?"

A further question was suggested to be asked at meetings of the various Youth Councils but the Committee submits that the position is now adequately met in the existing law.

11. DUTIES OF CIRCUIT STEWARDS

The Committee has been asked to consider (see 1953 Minutes page 133 Resolution 7) a resolution relating to stipends passed in 1947 with a view to its being included in the law.

The resolution is as follows:

"That this Conference directs that Circuits and Home Mission Stations must show in their statements of income and expenditure, quarterly and annually, the stipend at least at the minimum standard rate, and then any amount outstanding at that figure should be clearly stated as arrears in stipend due to the Minister or Home Missionary."

The Committee is of the opinion that this is not a proper provision for inclusion in the Law Book. Strictly speaking there is no contract between the Minister and the Circuit. He receives an allowance, Conference states what the minimum allowance should be.

It is understood that it is proposed to prepare a set of model accounts for the Circuit Fund. In which case perhaps a provision could be made whereby the position in regard to the Minister's Stipend and arrears (if any) could be shown.

12. AREA — SUB-COMMITTEE AND ITS CHAIRMAN — RELATION-SHIP TO SYNOD STANDING COMMITTEE AND DISTRICT CHAIRMAN

(1955 Minutes page 177 Resolution 7b)

In recent years in some Districts Sub-area Committees have been set up, under the Chairmanship of a Minister, nominated by the Chairman of the District, to deal with the work of the Church in a limited area. It is in order for this to be done as a Synod Standing Committee can apportion any part of its duties to sub-Committees. (Law Book page 68 paragraph 354). Further a District Chairman may appoint a deputy to act for him on any specific occasion but he has no power to give a general authority to any one to act continuously on his behalf. (Law Book page 29 para. 161). The Chairman is the chief executive officer of the Church in his District and is responsible to Conference. There is no provision in the Church Law for the appointment of a deputy District Chairman. An Acting-Chairman can be appointed on the death of or during the absence of the Chairman. (Law Book page 29 paragraph 164).

To regularise the position the Committee is of the opinion that provision should be made for the setting up of area sub-committees and the appointment of a Minister to act as an assistant to the Chairman within such area. Care must be taken not to interfere with the rights and duties of the District Chairman and of the Synod Standing Committee.

The Committee therefore recommends the following:-

(a) add to paragraph 318 the following: -

"Conference may for the purposes of administration subdivide a district into areas."

(b) add the following additional paragraphs:

354A. Where a District is subdivided into one or more areas pursuant to paragraph 318 Conference may on the nomination of the Synod Standing Committee appoint in respect of each such area an area sub-committee consisting of not fewer than three and not more than fifteen (15) Ministers and a similar number of Laymen.

354B. The area sub-committee shall within its area carry out such duties of the Synod Standing Committee as are allocated to it by such Committee to which it shall report and make recommendations.

354C. The Chairman of the District shall be ex officio Chairman of the area sub-committee. Conference may, on the nomination of the Chairman, appoint a Minister to act as his Assistant and when required act as his deputy within the area.

The Committee still has under consideration matters relating to the Native Ministry, and Native representation in Synods and Conference, Standard questions for Synod Standing Committee, Constitution of Methodist Social Service Association and deposit of moneys held for special purposes.

- (2) That the Vice-President-Elect have the opportunity of attending all important Church Committees such as the Church Council, Home Mission and Foreign Mission Committees, and that during his actual year of office he be appointed an ex-officio member of these important committees of the Church.
- 13. That the Law Revision Committee report on the procedure to be followed by Conference in respect to the handling of reports from boards and committees, with particular reference to any suggested alterations to the substance of a report.

RULINGS OF THE PRESIDENT A Deaconess and the Vice-Presidency

OUESTION:

Can a member of the Deaconess Order be elected to the office of Vice-President of the Conference?

ANSWER:

Para. 356 of th Law Book in setting out the constitution of the Conference provides that there shall be an equal number of "Ministerial" and "Lay" representatives or non-ministerial representatives.

A Ministerial representative is a Minister in full connexion with the Conference. All other Church members who are representatives to Conference are lay representatives.

The word "Layman" or any other word of that connotation is to be understood as applying equally to men and to women.

A Deaconess has the right to be elected to represent the Deaconess Order. In addition she may be elected to represent a circuit, or any board, or Committee, in or of which she is a member. Para. 357 must of course be complied with.

Any lay representative who has been a member of at least three previous Conferences may be elected Vice-President of the Conference (Para. 213.)

Therefore a member of the Deaconess Order who is a lay representative at a Conference may be elected to the office of Vice-President of such Conference provided she has been a member of Conference on at least three previous occasions.

And I do so rule.

Representation of Women's Missionary Auxiliaries in Quarterly Meetings

OUESTION:

Paragraph 277 (1) Law Book page 51 makes provision for the representation of Women's Missionary Auxiliaries in Quarterly meetings.

What is the representation where there are two auxiliaries within one society in a Circuit?

ANSWER:

The Constitution of the Methodist Women's Missionary Union defines a Missionary Auxiliary as a group of Church Women affiliated to the Methodist Women's Missionary Union etc. (See Law Book page 191 section 5). Each Women's Auxiliary in the Circuit affiliated to the Methodist Women's Missionary Union has the right to appoint a representative to the Quarterly Meeting. If there are two auxiliaries within one Society in a Circuit and both are affiliated to Methodist Women's Missionary Union each is entitled to appoint a representative to the Quarterly Meeting.

And I do so rule.

Representation of Women's Groups in the Quarterly Meeting QUESTION:

In cases where a Church has an evening as well as a day Guild, or another group having similar functions, has each such Guild or Group the right to appoint a representative to the Quarterly Meeting? ANSWER:

Paragraph 277 (k) Law Book page 50 makes provision for representation of Ladies Guilds in quarterly meetings-one representative from each Ladies' Guild.

Paragraph 519 (1) Law Book page 156 provides that a Women's Guild shall be formed where practicable in each Church. This paragraph provides only for one Women's Guild in a Church and therefore only one such group can have representation in the quarterly meeting. Other groups having similar functions are not entitled to representation in quarterly meetings.

And I do so rule.

Ecumenical Committee

ANNUAL REPORT, 1956

The year just closed has been one of fairly important activity and your committee has to report the following matters:

Visit of W.C.C. Leaders

Because of the meeting in February last of the W.C.C. Executive in Australia, leaders of the Council visited New Zealand. The following members visited New Zealand and addressed meetings and met Church leaders here: Rev Dr W. A. Visser 't Hooft, Rev. Leslie E. Cooke, Rev. Dr Frederick Nolde, Rev. Philip Potter, Bishop and Mrs Bromley Oxnam, Bishop Umberto Barbieri and Bishop L. de Mel. 75 Public engagements

were arranged throughout the country and over 50,000 attended meetings.

Rev. A. K. Petch attended these meetings on behalf of the National Council of Churches.

Closer Relations with South East Asian Christians

One of the significant events of the year was the invitation of the N.C.C. to send an observer to various metings of Asian Church leaders in Bangkok in March. The invitation was accepted, and on behalf of all New Zealand members churches, the N.C.C. shared in Asian discussions at the invitation of those churches. It is proposed that an Asian Ecumenical Council will be constituted at an official conference in Sumatra in March 1957 and the N.C.C. has been invited to send two observers. The matter of New Zealand being invited into full membership of the Council will be discussed at an early stage of the conference. The N.C.C. submits to member churches the names of Right Rev. E. J. Rich and Rev. Alan A. Brash as observers, and also invites the New Zealand churches to delegate to the N.C.C. authority to act on our behalf in this particular relationship, on the understanding that all policy matters will be submitted to member churches before action is taken. The Committee submits resolutions on this matter.

World Methodist Conference

The following representatives attended the World Methodist Conference at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina:

(a) Council members, President of the Conference (Rev. M. A. Mc-Dowell), Rev W. E. A. Carr, Rev W. H. Greenslade, Mrs G. S. Gapper, and Miss P. Yearbury.

, (b) Conference Members. All members of the council, plus Mrs M. A. McDowell, Mrs W. H. Greenslade, Rev H. Whitfield, Mr M. Hancock and Mr Frank Grocott.

(c) Accredited visitors, Mr and Mrs E. A. Crothall, Mrs G. S. Gapper, Mrs H. Whitfield and Mrs Frank Grocott.

Some representatives will be returning in time for Conference, and all Districts are urged to make the fullest use of our representatives on their return.

Representation on inter Church Committees (Minutes of Conference, 1955,

page 181, Res. 13).

The Committee believes that the best way of approaching this matter is to make nominations for a period of years, and at the end of that period, the representative would not normally be eligible for further nomination.

Financial Assistance to Overseas Conference

The Committee has given some thought to the matter of granting financial assistance to ministerial and lay representatives to overseas conferences, and is of opinion that the only satisfactory way is through a grant from the Contingent Fund. The Committee is aware that no such grant could be made without increasing the income of the Fund. In view of the fact that Conference has appointed a Committee to investigate Church finance generally, it is suggested that the matter be referred to that Committee, (Minutes of Conference 1955, page 129, Rsolution 15).

Conference on Life and Work (Minutes 1955 page 180 No. 8)

As instructed by Conference, the Committee referred to the N.C.C, the possibility of holding a further Conference on Life and Work. The Annual Meeting of the N.C.C. has referred our request to the Executive.

Change of the Venue of the Committee

The Committee considered during the year the possibility of a change in venue of the committee. While there are advantages in having the committee in Christchurch where the N.C.C. executive is located, the Committee was unable to come to any final decision on the matter.

Convener

Owing to the illness of Rev E. S. Hoddinott, the President appointed Rev A. H. Ivory as acting-convener.

Report of Women's Committee N.C.C.

The Women's Committee of the N.C.C. continued as the study department of the W.C.C. and during the year published the booklet "Knowing One Another," a study of the various Churches connected with the N.C.C. It is felt that the encouraging of study groups, particularly of an interchurch nature, is the major task of the Committee.

The Committee is also responsible for organising throughout New Zealand the World Day of Prayer on the first Friday in Lent. Mr Brash has described the basic task of the N.C.C., as bringing an increasing number of people into an ecumenical experience, and instanced the World Day of Prayer as the ideal way of achieving this at the deepest spiritual level.

During the year, the visits of the many leaders of the W.C.C. and of Dr Pradervand of the Presbyterian World Alliance, have greatly stimulated the Committee, and challenged them to do something about their near neighbours in the Pacific. As a result, a letter was written to Indonesia trying to get in touch with women's organisations there, but so far, no success has been achieved.

Mrs E. J. Ward, the President of our Section, was privileged to go to the W.C.C. Executive meetings in Australia as an observer, and has brought back to the Committee something of this great experience.

The Committee is anxiously looking for new ways of bringing the women of the churches into new experiences of the ecumenical movement in New Zealand.

Maori Section N.C.C.

The work of the Maori section has continued along the usual lines during the past year. Amongst other things, the section has given itself to the study of some of the proselytising sects with a view to providing helpful literature for our own Maori people and families.

The Rotorua Hostel is full and reports from there are satisfactory. The visits to Invercargill and Burwood have been maintained. It has been found impossible to implement the decision made last year to conduct Section Evangelistic meetings because of certain domestic difficulties within one of the communions concerned.

The new Chairman is Very Rev J. G. Laughton of the Presbyterian Church and the Rev E. Te Tuhi is vice-chairman. The annual meeting of the Section was held this year at Ruatoki in the Bay of Plenty.

Youth Committee of the N.C.C.

The chief business of the committee during the year has been the preparations for the Ecumenical Conference to be held in Palmerston North from December 27th to January 3rd. The Committee expects up to 2000, mostly between the ages of 17 and 30. Those over 30 may attend only with the special recommendation of the National Youth organisations of which they are members. The visiting speakers are Rev George MacLeod of Iona, and Rev Rex Matthias of Melbourne, and probably another from Asia. Representative speakers have been approached in New Zealand to address the conference on aspects of the main theme which is "Christ Unites," considered as concerns Nations, Races, Churches and Communities. The Conference calls for careful and skilled organisation and the coperation of the Youth Departments of all the member churches. The Committee has had the fullest co-operation from the Methodist Youth Board and its Senior Director. The Presbyterian Church is releasing some of her staff for full time service after Assembly. Other churches are giving enthusiastic assistance. Our Church is well represented in Leadership,

official speakers and organising, and it is hoped, will also be well repre-

sented in membership of the Conference.

The Annual Meeting of the Committee held an enquiry into what was called "The Concern of the Committee"—that the gap between the church and people is wider than is usually realised; that a divided church cannot bridge the gap; that a great loving concern is a pre-requisite for any advance; that this concern might lead the Church into new ways of bringing the Gospel to the people. This "concern" is now being examined by all member churches.

The Rev O. M. Olds was appointed by the Committee to represent New Zealand at a Work Camp in Indonesia, and made it possible for him to

attend. It is hoped that he will report directly to the church.

The Recreation Leadership Committee under the direction of Mr Don Riesterer continues outstanding work in carrying out the courses of instruction which have been well attended.

Mr H. Beaumont is Vice-Chairman of the Committee and Mr Southey

is Treasurer.

QUESTION LXIII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on Other Questions?

1—Faith and Order Committee

The Faith and Order Committee has concentrated its work this year upon the preparation of the Order of Service for the Holy Communion and of the Joint Statement of Faith to be used by the Church Union Committee. Attention has been directed also to the question of membership and to other matters as indicated in the Minutes of Conference, 1955, pp.62, 133, 181, 184.

Joint Statement of Faith:

The committee has completed its work on the Joint Statement of Faith and has sent its proposed amendments to the Church Union Committee. For three meetings of the Committee, the Rev H. G. Nicholas, Principal of the Congregational College, was invited to share in the discussions.

Church Architecture and Furnishings:

General approval has been given to the introductory statement on the theological principles governing Church architecture as proposed by the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee for inclusion in the new booklet on Church architecture. The Committee seeks permission to continue its work on a larger, additional statement on the same theme.

Presidential Stole:

For the Presidential stole the Committee has recommended the use of the letters I.H.S. and the symbols of the Cross and of the World. The stole is to be purple in colour and is to carry also a representation of the Maori taniko design.

Investigation is continuing concerning a seal for New Zealand Methodism.

Membership:

Several discussions have taken place on the subject of membership and on the particular question of the place of the child in the life of the Church. It is necessary for the Committee to continue its research here for a further year.

Order of Service for the Holy Communion:

On the basis of the March Ministerial Synod reports the Committee has prepared an amended order of service for the Holy Communion.

The Order for the ADMINISTRATION OF THE LORD'S SUPPER OR

THE HOLY COMMUNION

The Table at the Communion time, having a fair white linen cloth upon it, shall stand in some convenient place. And the Minister, having come to the Table, shall say the Lord's Prayer, with the Collect following, (all kneeling).

Where the full Order of Service is not followed, the place of the Pre-Communion shall be taken by a Service specially designed as a

The Minister, in conducting the Service according to the following form, shall have liberty to give out Hymns, and to use extemporary Prayer, and may abbreviate the Service, if necessary, provided always that he include the Words of Institution with Prayer.

Suitable Laymen may assist in the distribution of the Elements, the choice of such Laymen being at the discretion of the officiating Minister.

Where possible the pure, unfermented juice of the grape shall be used. It is preferable to receive the Elements kneeling at the Communion Rail, but, if persons so desire, they may receive them while seated or kneeling in their place.

The Pre-Communion:

The Lord's Prayer.

The Collect for Purity.

The Recital of the Beatitudes or of the Commandments.

Then shall the Minister rise, and turning to the People, rehearse distinctly the BEATITUDES; and the People still kneeling shall after each Beatitude ask of God this grace, as follows:

Or THE COMMANDMENTS OF THE LORD JESUS may be said: Or THE TEN COMMANDMENTS may be said: (Using here the abbreviated form as printed in the British Book of Offices).

The Collect or another short Prayer and Lessons for the Day.

The Creeds.

The Apostles' Creed ('Hell' replacing 'Hades' in the present order).

The Nicene Creed.

The Sermon. The Offering.

Then shall the Minister read one or more of these Sentences, during which an Offering shall be made (for the Benevolent Fund, for some Special Offering, or for the Main Offering as desired). This being brought to the Minister, he shall place it on the Lord's Table: and shall dedicate it with an offertory Prayer.

"So let your light shine . . . heaven." "He that soweth sparingly . . . giver."
"Pure religion and undefiled . . . world."
"He that showed the, O man, what is good . . . thy God?"

The Prayer for the Whole Estate of Christ's Church.

After which done, the Minister shall say, the People responding:-Let us pray for the whole estate of Christ's Church militant here on earth.

(And here all shall kneel).

"Almighty and ever-living God, why by Thy holy Apostle has taught us to make prayers and supplications, and to give thanks, for all men; We humbly beseech Thee most mercifully (to accept our alms and oblations, and) to receive these our prayers . . . live in unity and godly love."

Hear us, we beseech Thee.

"We beseech Thee also to save and defend all Christian rulers; and especially Thy servant ELIZABETH our Queen . . . to the maintenance of Thy true religion and virtue."

Hear us, we beseech Thee.

"Give grace, O heavenly Father, to all the Ministers of Thy Gospel in holiness and righteousness all the days of their life."

Hear us, we beseech Thee.

"And we most humbly beseech Thee of Thy goodness, O Lord, to comfort and succour all them who in this transitory life are in trouble, sorrow, need, sickness, or any other adversity (especially . . .) Grant this, O Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only Mediator and Advocate." Amen.

Then the Minister shall say:

Almighty God, the fountain of all wisdom, Who knowest our necessities before we ask, and our ignorance in asking; We beseech Thee to have compassion upon our infirmities; and those things, which for our unworthiness we dare not, and for our blindness we cannot ask, vouch-safe to give us, for the worthiness of Thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Communion Service Proper:

The Exhortation and Invitation.

(The words of invitation to conclude with, "[meekly kneeling upon your knees and] saying with me:").

Then shall the Minister and People say together the words following: Confession.

Then, the People (still kneeling) the Minister shall rise and say:

This is the message which we have heard from Him, and declare unto you, that God is light, and in Him is no darkness at all. If we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus His Son cleanseth us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." Amen.

(Here shall the People Stand.)

Comfortable Words.

Sursum Corda, Prefaces, Sanctus.

Then shall the Minister, kneeling at the Table, unite with the People in this Prayer:

Prayer of Humble Access.

Prayer of Consecration.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of Thy tender mercy didst give Thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption; who made there (by His one oblation of Himself once offered) a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, (oblation, and propitiation) for the sins of the whole world; . . . may be partakers of His most blessed Body and Blood; (As an alternative order, the Prayer may be ended at this point and the Words of Institution set forth as a Declaration followed by the Manual Acts). Who in the same right that He was betrayed, took bread . . . in remembrance of Me. Amen.

The Reception of the Elements.

The Minister may dismiss each table of communicants with a suitable Scripture sentence or suitable prayer. When all have communicated, the Minister shall return to the Lord's Table, and place upon it what remaineth of the Elements, covering the same with a fair linen cloth.

The Post-Communion:

Then, after silent Prayer, there shall follow the Lord's Prayer or other short Prayer.

Lord's Prayer or other Short Prayer.

The Prayer of Oblation.

The Gloria in Excelsis.

Blessings.

Then shall the Minister dismiss the People with these Blessings:

Now the God of peace, Who brought again from the dead the great Shepherd of the sheep, with the blood of the eternal covenant, even our Lord Jesus, make you perfect in every good thing to do His will, working in us that which is well-pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to Whom be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

The peace of God, which passeth all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of His Son Jesus Christ our Lord: and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, be amongst you and remain with you always. Amen.

- That the Faith and Order Committee prepare a statement on the theological principles governing Church architecture and furnishings.

2-Radio Committee

REPORT FOR 1956

The Central Radio Advisory Committee:

The proposed appointment of an officer responsible for guiding and developing religious broadcasting in New Zealand, is still under consideration by certain Churches. Meantime, to obtain some relief from the everincreasing burden of detailed concerns, the Director has found it necessary to appoint an officer of his Department to assist him in the direction of religious broadcasting and to act as liaison with the Churches. The worth of even this limited type of superintendence was shown by the production, within a month of appointment, of a weeknight series of Panels, "Questions and Answers about Religion". It is to be hoped that unanimity can be reached speedily concerning the authority and direction of the proposed full-time Supervisor so that an early appointment can be made.

The Methodist Central Committee:

Childrens' Sunday Sessions. All Synod Standing Committees have been requested to make recommendation concerning ways of improving these sessions. The proposals have been many and varied. The use of an agreed syllabus, of dramatic productions, and the shortening of the session to half an hour were suggestions which the C.R.A.C. readily adopted. There is a strong body of opinion that our Church should seek the opportunity to broadcast from one Centre, all the childrens' sessions for which it is responsible, and that these should be organised and produced by the Central Committee in consultation with our Youth Department.

Non-Church-Listener Broadcasts. The Committee also communicated with Synod Standing Committees concerning broadcasting sessions more particularly designed for non-church listeners. Following the study on Radio Evangelism prepared by the Convener for Ministerial Synods, several very helpful suggestions were received. The mind of the Church as reflected in these many communications may be summarised thus:

- (a) "Non-Church-Listener Sessions" do provide an effective means of arresting the attention and gaining the interest of the non-Church-going public, but they are regarded by Church members as poor substitutes for the normal services of worship.
- (b) To have permanent worth, these sessions would need to have
 (1) Continuity: week by week the same approach, and possibly the same personnel. This is not possible under the present denominational rota system.
 (2) A high standard of radio production which would need to be maintained. This is beyond the capacity of most local Churches and it is doubtful if a District even, could maintain the standard required for a prolonged period.

(c) Because of these needs for continuity in one type of specialised approach, yet an overall variety of approaches, wise direction on a Con-

nexional-or better, National-basis is needed.

The Committee is persuaded that while this type of religious broad-casting is an effective means of contacting the non-Church goer, the fully effective answer will be found only when the C.R.A.C. reconsiders the aim and purpose of religious broadcasting in New Zealand in the light of the experience of the B.B.C., and at the same time makes appointment of a full-time Supervisor of religious broadcasting for New Zealand. It is our belief that the C.R.A.C. should resolve to use a proportion of the time granted to religious broadcasting (say the Sunday evening hours) for evangelism among non-Church going listeners, and that a supervising officer should be allocated a proportion of broadcasting time for the production of these sessions.

The Committee has again given attention to the routine matters relating to denominational and local allocations, National and local schedules, wiring of Churches, publicity, etc. Arrangements have been made for the publication of the proposed "Folder for Ministers Broadcasting", to be issued by the Convener on completion of the surveys of Religious T.V. and Radio Broadcasting which he is making in Great Britain and the U.S.A.

W. H. GREENSLADE, Convener.

The Committee would lay on record its appreciation of the services of the Rev. W. H. Greenslade who, has represented our Church on the New Zealand C.R.A.C. and been Convener of this Committee for almost ten years. Mr Greenslade has made a splendid contribution to Church Broadcasting at production and administrative levels.

7. That appreciation be expressed to the Minister of Broadcasting

for the Religion Discussion Panels recently broadcast.

8. That the C.R.A.C. investigate the possibility of a daily session of a few minutes similar to that broadcast by the B.B.C. after the 6 a.m. news bulletin.

9. That the Committee be as printed on page 12 herein.

3—Business of Conference Committee

Conference 1955 appointed a special committee to consider steps to facilitate the Business of Conference. The following are the Resolutions of last Conference:—

- 1. That a committee be appointed to report on what steps might be taken to facilitate the business of Conference and its relationship to the work of the Examination Committee, the Stationing Committee and the Synod Standing Committees.
- 2. That the Committee be the President of the Conference, Revs. W. T. Blight, H. L. Fiebig, G. R. H. Peterson and G. H. Goodman and Messrs. H. de R. Flesher, N. P. Alcorn, T. M. Pacey, L. A. Davis, A. L. Stanton with Revs. E. W. Hames and H. C. Matthews as corresponding members. Convener: Secretary of the Conference.
- 3. That the Committee also enquire into the length of reports presented to Synods and Conference.
- 4. That the Committee consider the establishment of a further Conference Committee of Details to deal with some of the business of Committee "F".

The Church Council also referred certain matters to the Committee, viz.

1. The advisability of bringing forward the Sessions of Conference by one day.

2. The Time of Determining Ministerial Appointments:

(Minutes of Conference, 1954, page 70, Res. 6.)
(A) Consideration was given to various suggestions about the First Reading of Stations being drafted some time before the Opening of Conference. The whole question has been occasioned by the increasing pressure of Conference business.

Stationing is of vital interest to ministers and laymen and to a large

extent dominates the thought of both during sessions.

The time necessary for careful consideration of the Stationing Sheet is not always available. The sessions are long and involve too much strain for members of the Committee. Also, the extra sessions necessary interfere with the other business of Conference.

The Council considers that it is not desirable nor practicable for appointments to be made during the Connexional Year.

It submits the following scheme:

- (a) That the Examination Committee meet on Wednesday (prior to Conference) all day as at present.
- (b) That the Stationing Committee meet on Tuesday afternoon and evening. (This would mean that certain members from a distance would need to travel part of the way by Air).
- (c) That second meeting of the Stationing Committee be held on the Tuesday evening following the Opening of Conference.
- (d) That the Reading of Stations be: First Reading be taken on the Friday morning as early as possible after the opening of the Conference

Session; Second Reading be taken on the Wednesday morning and the Sheet lie on the Table for 24 hours and be finally adopted on Thursday.

Advantages:

- 1. More time would be available for a full consideration of the First Draft of Stations, without interruptions by Conference Sessions.
- 2. The First Reading of the Stationing Sheet would be taken earlier in Conference than at present and this would give more time to get information to Circuits.
- 3. It leaves Friday evening free for a full session of Conference and gives more time for business on the Saturday morning.
- 4. It should enable Conference to close on the Thursday evening, thus reducing the total Conference days.
- N.B.: (a) This Scheme is presented on the assumption that the scheme regarding the size of the Stationing Committee as presented by the Council last Conference and being sent to Quarterly Meetings, Synods and Conference 1955, is adopted. However, this could be worked with the Stationing Committee as at present constituted.
- (b) Lay Representatives to the Stationing Committee would have to be elected by Synods.
- (c) Certain matters affecting Stationing at present dealt with by the General Purposes Committee on Thursday would have to be dealt with by this Committee. Final details would have to be arranged if the scheme is adopted.

Also the following Resolution of Conference 1955 has been referred to the Committee by the Church Council:

(B) That the whole matter be referred back to the Church Council for further consideration and report.

That the following be referred to the Church Council:-

That for the purpose of preparing the first draft of stations for the Tuesday afternoon and evening, a Sub-Committee of the Stationing Committee be appointed in terms of the recommendation of the Church Council, but that the full Stationing Committee be appointed as at present.

Report of Committee

The Committee has met in several sessions, once in Wellington and during a whole day in Christchurch. It has given careful consideration to the matters referred to it.

It reports as below on the various items on its agenda.

A. Business of the Examination Committee

It was felt that the business of the Committee could be greatly expedited by the elimination of certain items which tradition has carried through to the present day. After a sub-committee consisting of the Secretary of the Board of Examiners and certain previous/Secretaries of the Board had reported the committee was able to recommend some important changes. They are listed in the Recommendations following this report.

B. Conference Business Transferred to Synod Standing Committees

Time of Conference could be saved and one Committee of Details could be eliminated if Questions 25 to 28 in Conference Agenda (dealing with Circuits) were dealt with on the District level. These district matters could then be reported to Conference through the Home Mission Committee.

C. Length of Reports to Synods and Conference

A great deal of time and space would be saved if certain reports were abridged and if a summarised report of certain similar activities, such as those coming under the survey of the N.Z.M.S.S.A. were prepared and presented in that way to Conference.

The committee believes it is not really necessary to print the detailed statistical returns each year. The Dominion summary could be printed annually. The Committee of Details dealing with Property and Funds is asked to consider how the volume of printing of financial statements may be reduced.

Reports previously circulated should be voted on without exposition and so save further time in Conference.

D. Further Committee of Details

The Committee looked at the work of various committees and notes that one or two committees have overloaded agendas. It suggests that certain items be removed from the present Agenda of Committees 'F' (Welfare of the Church) and 'J' (Institutions) to create an agenda for a new Committee 'D' to be known as the Ecumenical Committee. This, of course, presumes that the present Committee 'D' (Circuits) is eliminated, otherwise the new committee would have a different letter designation.

E. (a) Opening Day of Conference; (b) Time of Determining Ministerial Appointments

The Committee had before it the suggestion that the sessions of Conference should begin a day earlier than at present. It felt that this question was connected with the question as to when the Stationing Committee should have its first session; that is, the time of determining ministerial appointments. The following scheme was considered: That the Examination Committee meet on Tuesday evening, Wednesday morning and the early part of Wednesday afternoon; that the General Purposes Committee meet late Wednesday afternoon; that the Opening of Conference be held on Wednesday evening; that Committees of Districts meet on Thursday morning, followed by Committees of Details; that the Stationing Committee meet at 4 p.m. on Thursday and during the evening of Thursday.

This scheme has in view the elimination of Trial Services for Candidates on the Tuesday evening. The Committee has studied the matter and sees advantages in the suggested scheme but realises there are practical difficulties. Some Members of the Examination Committee would have difficulty in reaching the Conference city by the Tuesday evening if Conference were at the other end of the Dominion. Also the time saved would be lost by some Conference members who would spend the Wednesday waiting for the opening of Conference. At present that day is spent in Committees of Details by all Conference members. The scheme considered would facilitate Conference business but it presents certain obvious difficulties. It is recommended by the Committee that the matter as outlined be referred to Synod Standing Committees for consideration and report to the Church Council to be held in May 1957.

F. Other Matters

(a) In order to lessen the time spent in Committees of Details the Committee is of the opinion that the same procedure should be followed in the Committees as in Conference Sessions, viz., that there be no exposition of the report before a committee and that discussion should be concerned with the recommendations on their report (See Minutes of Conference 1955 page 193 re Standing Orders).

(b) The Committee considered the Resolution of Conference 1954, page 70 (That the Church Council report through Synods to Conference). After discussion the committee became aware that the Council should report direct to Conference because of its constitution and the nature of its

business. (See Law Book page 92 para, 490a).

PASTORAL ADDRESS

THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE TO THE CHURCH, 1956

The election and induction of the President, in whom racially the East and culturally the West cohered so significantly, invested the Conference with a certain impressive uniqueness which, as he himself declared, redounded to the glory of Him who is the Head of the Church. Without precedent also was the election to the office of Vice-President of a woman, Sister Rita Snowden, a deaconess of our Church and well-known author. The historic nature of the Conference was further seen in the fact that, as planned by the Joint Church Union Committee, both the Presbyterian Assembly and the Congregational Union met simultaneously with our own Conference. The Church of Christ also was represented on official occasions by its President, Mr Murray J. Savage, and observers. The subsequent united gatherings were occasions of great inspiration. The respective Communion Services were attended by representatives of the three other denominations. This, as well as the United Service in the Town Hall on Sunday afternoon, and also the subsequent United Meeting of Witness were a striking demonstration of the essential unity of the participating Communions with which conversations toward a corporate union are continuing.

The Conference, as befitted its particular importance, was gratifyingly representative, there being 327 ministerial and lay members present. The Sessions were faithfully attended, interest well maintained and a due dignity as well as a spirit of fellowship prevailed.

The opening days of Conference coincided with the international crisis resulting from the armed intervention of Anglo-French forces in Egypt. At its first Session Conference accepted a resolution calling the Church to prayer for a just settlement and re-affirming its faith in the United Nations Organisation as an established instrument for Peace. Then some days later, after a debate that was characterised by commendable restraint and Christian tolerance, Conference further resolved to request the Inter-Church Council on Public Affairs to make relevant representations to our Government regarding its concern in the continuing crisis and the necessity of upholding the United Nations Organisation in its efforts to maintain international law and create conditions of enduring peace. Both resolutions were prepared in consultation with a select Committee consisting of representatives of the Presbyterian Assembly, our own Conference and the Churches of Christ.

The Ex-President, the Rev. Dr M. A. McDowell, spoke enthusiastically of the World Methodist Conference held in Junaluska earlier in the year, and brought greetings from the Methodist Church of the U.S.A.

The reception of fourteen ministers into Full Connexion, the acceptance of twelve candidates for the ministry, and the dedication of three deaconesses seemed welcome auguries for the future work of our Church whose sacred witness has been rendered so difficult of late by ministerial shortage. There is still crucial need in this respect as also for other dedicated lay workers at home and abroad if we are to accept the challenge which our rapidly developing society presents to us.

The Spiritual Advance Committee reported upon the progress of the Crusade for Christ and His Kingdom. The Conference gratefully learned of the lead in Christian Evangelism which had been given the Church over past years and, in a short Devotional Act expressing gratitude to God, brought the campaign officially to a close. The specific task involving the previously declared intentions of the Committee, however, continues. This year the special emphasis is to be upon Prayer.

The Advance Methodism Appeal, which extended over the last two years, realised in all a total of approximately £40,000. This will result in a great stimulus to Church extension and development, as well as augment the Capital of the Church Building and Loan Fund, thus

enabling the latter to assist further the finances of needy and progressive circuits. This year the Youth Hostel Appeal (third Sunday in June) will be the special objective of our New Zealand Church which is being asked to give serious consideration to this most important Branch of Christian concern.

Annual Membership statistics are of some interest. Senior membership figures, showing an improvement over those of last year, revealed a net increase of 512, bringing the total adult membership to 28,215. The communicant membership is 24,504, showing a rise of 1,199. Sunday School statistics indicated an increase of ten in baptisms and of 231 on the Cradle Roll. The Beginners and Primary Departments registered an unfortunate decrease of 1,038, but Junior membership was up by 582 and the Intermediates by 696. Bible Class figures showed a heartening increase of 86 in the Juniors, 329 among Intermediates and 158 in the Senior sections. The foregoing statistics nevertheless should allow us no room for complacency, and the Church needs to be recalled to new endeavours in all these important spheres of activity.

The Rev. J. R. Metcalfe, who with Mrs Metcalfe has served for so long with such distinctive Christian faithfulness in our Missionary outpost in the Solomon Islands, latterly as Chairman, in view of his desire to return to the Victorian Conference at the end of next year, was suitably farewelled at a luncheon during Conference. The felicitations and gratitude of the Church on this important occasion were also sent to Mrs Metcalfe. The Rev. E. W. Hames, M.A., Principal of the Trinity Theological College, was re-appointed for a further term, and the Rev. W. F. Ford, B.A., was appointed Senior Youth Director. The Rev. G. I. Laurenson, General Superintendent of the Home Mission Department, was designated for re-appointment for a further term, and the Rev. B. M. Chrystall, B.A., for another year's appointment as Assistant H.M. Superintendent. The Rev. Dr D. O. Williams, Residential Tutor of Trinity College, was also designated for re-appointment in 1957, as was the Rev. S. G. Andrews, M.A., Dip. Ed., the General Secretary of our Overseas Missions Department.

Official overseas visitors during 1957 will be the Rev. Dr R. B. Lew, B.A., President-General of the Australasian Conference, who is expected in March, and the Rev. Dr Maldwyn Edwards, M.A., Cato Lecturer, who will visit New Zealand for three weeks in May-June. An American team of visiting evangelists are expected to arrive for a special campaign during July-August. Our Church will eagerly await the arrival of these visitors whose presence will undoubtedly bring inspiration to its life and work.

It could be truly said that one of the main emphases of the Conference was ecumenical. This was to be seen not only in the inter-change of visits paid by the heads of the denominations during the Sessions of the respective Church courts, and the united acts of witness, but also in the Presidential Address which sought to challenge the Church to a global approach in the proclamation and practice of the Christian evangel.

The apprehension of a full-orbed Gospel is our Church's supreme need today. This surely involves a realisation of greater Christian unity than that possessed by Christendom today. A divided Church cannot adequately face a divided world. Further, the world cannot be won for Christ unless there be redeemed souls who, in the spirit of utter dedication, can witness to the glory and wonder of their redemption. The pre-requisite to any Christian mission of salvation, social or individual, is not organisation, learning or human ingenuity, but holiness of living. There is no alternative to Christian devotion and saintliness. Herein can our Church, set as it is in a modern world of bitter hostility, greed and lawlessness, find the secret of an invincible strategy.

Therefore, as with unabated enthusiasm and unsullied vision we strive to win the world for Christ, let us seek Him in the inner sanctuaries of our heart, until, through a personal experience of His Love and showing forth in our lives the fruits of His Spirit, we challenge by the intensity of our Christ-like witness the careless and indifferent to a saving knowledge of Him who loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God and His Father: to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.
