It is with sadness that I would like to inform the Connexion of the passing of Rev Mataika Mikaele Kolinio Yasa (Mike Yasa) who passed away peacefully at his residence in Tuakau, Pukekohe surrounded by his wife Sereana, his kids and grandkids on Saturday 4th May. Rev Mike Yasa devoted himselfto ordained ministry with the Methodist Church, profoundly impacting the Fijian Advisory since 1990 and its community through his pastoral guidance in its early stages of leadership. His steadfast commitment to his faith journey at Motueka, Christchurch, and Pahiatua has left an enduring legacy within the community he served.

Following training at Trinity – St. Johns Colleges in 1990 Mike was appointed in 1991 to St. Andrews Uniting Parish, Motueka, where he served 5 years, then to Hornby/Riccarton (St Stephens and Clarence Street) for a further 5 years. In 2001 he was appointed to Pahiatua and Woodville Union Parishes. He was the first ethnic Fijian to be trained and ordained by the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

Alongside of his Parish ministry Mike has exercised a significant and dedicated ministry to fellow Fijian residents in New Zealand. From 1999 – 2003 he was Superintendent of Bose ko Viti kei Rotuma e Niusiladi (formerly the Fijian Advisory Committee). Other Connexional involvements have been as a member of the Council for Mission, the Council of Elders, the CCANZ National Forum, the Bicultural Workgroup and the Church Welfare Committee. Mike's community involvement has had a particular emphasis on the welfare of the Pacific Island community.



He was also involved in the Evangelical Network of the Church.

Rev Mike Yasa 's funeral service will be held on Friday 10th of May at 10.30am at the Pukekohe Methodist Church corner of Wesley Street & Queens Street and then laid to rest at the Heights Park Cemetery Pukekohe.

About: The Canterbury Tertiary Education Chaplaincy Committee (CTECC) is an ecumenical Christian entity responsible for providing chaplaincy services at Lincoln University and University of Canterbury.

We are looking for applicants for appointment as Senior Ecumenical Chaplain based at Lincoln University. Lincoln University is located in the Lincoln township on the outskirts of Christchurch and is a specialist land-based university. It has around 3,400 students and provides degrees in Agriculture, Business, Environment, Landscape Architecture, Property Valuation, Science, Sport and Recreation and Tourism.

This rewarding and varied role is a half time stipendiary position which may be held in conjunction with other commitments. The role is to promote and nurture the well-being of students in cooperation with Lincoln University and encompasses pastoral care and spiritual support.

You may also be asked to officiate at events, help with education and resourcing of others on campus and will be expected to actively promote understanding and dialogue in a diverse and multi-faith community. This role may involve irregular hours including some evening and weekend work.

Our Young Mums' House and Youth Transition Houses are not just houses, but a home where the rakatahi residents are empowered to rewrite their life course, break generational cycles, and embrace start on the journey of self-determination.

The support offered within our Young Mums' House and Youth Transition Houses is more than just practical assistance; it's a testament to our staff,

funders, and donors/supporters of the power of uplifting rakatahi through generosity, kindness, and thoughtfulness, which permeates every interaction, creating an environment where growth and healing flourish.

Amidst the hustle and bustle of daily life—juggling work, education, and wellbeing goals—residents find moments of triumph in the normal. Cooking meals for the household can be an experience of nurturing, while completing laundry requires responsibility and independence. For one recent resident, buying their own car unlocked a newfound sense of freedom and of the choices that are the rewards for longer-term efforts in life, like saving.

Recognizing the profound benefit of simple collective experiences; for mutual support and growth, for normalisation, for the nourishment of laughter and shared experiences; life in the houses includes Lego challenges and movie days, and well-being activities including trips to the gym. These are not only distractions as the season changes, daylight wanes, and the weather turns colder, but opportunities for connection and solidarity. Through shared experiences and conversations, residents are able to practice building mutual support.

The poem by the Saint Lucian poet and playwright Derek Walcott resonates with a canvas of hope that we wish our rakatahi residents to have.

LOVE AFTER LOVE

The time will come when, with elation, you will greet yourself arriving at your own door, in your own mirror, and each will smile at the other's welcome, and say, sit here. Eat.

You will love again the stranger who was your self. Give wine. Give bread. Give back your heart to itself, to the stranger who has loved you

all your life, whom you ignored for another, who knows you by heart. Take down the love letters from the bookshelf,

the photographs, the desperate notes, peel your own image from the mirror. Sit. Feast on your life.

Our rakatahi continue to thrive and are paving the way for a brighter, more hopeful future—for themselves, our Young Mums' and their children, and generations to come.

What a word change can make! This hymn is No. 15 in Alleluia Aotearoa, the first publication by the NZ Hymnbook Trust. Colin Gibson writes in his Companion to the Trust hymns,

Knowing the Song: 'Jillian Bray, the composer of the tune HEARTBEAT, explains the circumstances of the writing of the hymn text: 'I sent this tune to Shirley on 11 July 1988. By 21 July she had responded with her text, titled 'Easter Song'. This wonderful text, given an equally wonderful tune, need not be confined to the Easter season. With one word in line two of verse one, it becomes a hymn for the Pentecost season. Gillian and John Thornley came up with the word change. They say, 'This gives the hymn 15 more Sundays on which it can be sung!'

The original opening lines:

Christ is alive, and the universe must celebrate, and the stars and the suns shout on this Easter Day!

Here's the full text of this hymn for the Pentecost season:


Christ is alive and the universe must celebrate, and the stars and the suns shout ev'ry Easter Day! Christ is alive, and his family must celebrate in a great alleluia, a great alleluia to praise the power that made the stone roll away. Here is our hope: in the mystery of suffering is the heartbeat of Love, Love that will not let go, here is our hope, that in God we are not separate, and we sing alleluia, we sing alleluia to praise the power that made the stone roll away. Christ Spirit, dance through the dullness of humanity to the music of God, God who has set us free! You are the pulse of the new creation's energy; with a great alleluia, a great alleluia we praise the power that made the stone roll away.

A Story of Hope

"We vehemently thank you for this wonderful water tank gift," says Mbabazi.

For the people of Isingiro in southwest Uganda, the climate crisis is a water crisis. When there is no water, families spend many hours of the day collecting dirty water for their daily needs. The daily drudgery

under hot sun carries huge risks to the children who must collect the water. Without it they will not be able to grow the food they need to survive or the bananas which are their cash crop.

In Uganda, Mbabazi and Doreen worked hard to complete school last year. They had to make up for time lost because they had to collect water for their families. With you help their families got their own rainwater tanks early last year, giving them water and enough time to go to school and study. They topped their classes and won scholarships to High School and University respectively. Hope begins with Water tells their story.
