Climate Change and the stewardship of creation Freddy De Alwis

As this is the season of creation, I would like to focus on "the stewardship of creation" that's a theme found in Mt 21 – <u>the renters of the vineyard</u>. If we take the second creation story in Genesis 2 as about living in a garden, Mt 21 is a good parable about caring for it. And also, Psalm 19, and Ps 104, Isa 5:1-6 This parable was a <u>reminder about ownership</u>. We do not own the vineyard; we are trustees or stewards of it.

The earth, air, water and food we receive as a gift from God, for every human being to use it <u>wisely and sustainably</u>, and pass it on to the <u>next generation</u>.

Background: Just in order to get to the subject - the word, "The Environment" what does it mean? It means whatever surrounds us or is <u>outside us</u>. Is it a correct understanding of the world??

<u>But the truth is contrary to this understanding</u>. The world/creation around us is also <u>within</u>. We are an <u>expression of the creation</u>; creation is an expression of us. We are <u>made of it</u>; we eat, drink, and breathe it. Read Gen 3:19, And someday, when the day comes, we will each return to the earth. Earth is the bone of our bone and flesh of our flesh.

We have to admit that no one can ever understand the "holy mystery of creation", the point I want to make is that the word "environment" does not carry the real meaning of God's creation.

1. Anthropocentrism = A human-centred perspective

It is a fact that so much anthropocentrism has emerged through the influence of the Bible, and so many arguments are there to justify the human-centred perspective, Gen 1 and Ps 8, just to mention few. With this (wrong) understanding of the <u>will to dominate the earth</u>, Gen1: 26b - 28, Ps 8:6, begins with an <u>understanding that humans are radically different from everything else in creation</u>. It assumes that there is <u>an unbridgeable gap between humans and the rest of creation</u>.

Is it possible to think that this kind of understanding of theology has led the Church over the years to interpret scripture to undergird such theological positions and even to interpret biblical words such as "dominion" and "subdue" to abuse God's creation.

2. Creation is the place of God's presence

Many religious traditions mainly Judaism and Christianity believe and understand the <u>indwelling</u> of God within the whole creation. Creation is the place of God's presence. God is "home" here, as we are. The Greek word earth and home is Oikos! The first and basic meaning of oikos is simply "Habitat Earth." Oikos – earth as a vast but single household of life - means the capacity for survival, that is, sustainable habitat. It means space and the means for the living of all living things. Without adequate hospitable habitat, nothing lives. Not only humans, but all life-forms need carefully fitted habitats.

The same creation story says that God saw the other creatures were good quite apart from <u>human beings</u>, indeed, before there were any human beings. In Psalm 50:9-12, *For every wild animal of the forest is mine, the world and that is in it is mine...* Actually human beings are closely related to, and even dependent on non-human creatures. The truth is non-human creatures and the whole of creation (forest) can survive without humans, but humans cannot survive without them. This point is presented beautifully in Psalm 104, especially in verses 27-30, which is a liturgical parallel to the Genesis creation story.

Jesus in the NT says that God cares for even the ravens "they neither sow nor reap" (Luke 12:24 and clothes the lilies (Luke 12:28) which invites us to see in creation the <u>sacrament of</u> <u>God's hidden presence</u> and experience all things as part of God's creation.

So, God creates and protects the whole of God's creation and indwells, accompanies, participates and delights in them. I am convinced that similar insights can be drawn from Buddhist, Hindu, Jewish and Islamic scriptures.

In fact, the delicate design behind whole of God's creation convinces that nothing is accidental! This foundational fact - that we all need a fitted space for us to live – right to live, right to migrate is the great element of "democracy" in life. And even seasonal movement of animals/birds from one region to another. _More than two thirds of the world is crying for this space and democracy. That is an echo of the crisis we are faced with. There is a group of people call "Rohinjiya in Myanmar" just over 700,000 women and children...... No country...

Whatever we choose to call it, the point is that all living beings, including animal need a space, a productive land, forest, a hospitable atmosphere, safe water and clean air.

3. When we talk about creation is the place of God, I am not talking about "Pantheism" God and creation equal in scope -Pantheism

In the Christian tradition there is a fear that this kind of theology will lead people to venerate matter and that is condemned by the Church as a heresy, and that heresy is named Pantheism. Pantheism is described in terms of making God and creation equal in scope. that the universe is God and God is the universe.

To overcome the issue of Pantheism Christian tradition has insisted on God's transcendence, recognizing that God may be present within creation but cannot be reduced to creation. On the other hand, Christian tradition also talks about the immanence of God, meaning that God can be found within all creation. There are several biblical texts to justify these positions. <u>Conclusion:</u> Look at the beauty and the scientific balance behind the whole of God's creation that tells us that nothing is accidental.

In spite of this knowledge and awareness, the planet earth is under threat and according to Romans 8: 18-25, the whole creation is groaning.

What a mess we humans have made of God's beautiful world! Pollution, forests wiped out, species of animals vanishing due to human actions, green-house gas CO2 damaging thin ozone layer, climate change, imbalance of weather pattern and hundreds of years of tribal warfare which still continues to destroy our world even today. What a mess we've made of God's beautiful creation.

I would like to conclude with <u>Psalm 19</u> it begins with how clearly the sky reveals God's glory! How plainly it shows what he has done! and how we can understand and see God through the creation. Each day announces the following day, yet it is speechless, no voice, no words used, yet their messages go out to the whole world. I see this as a wonderful metaphor. The voice of God then is speechless, yet the words go to the end of the world.

There is a voice in the creation, which the wise will listen to. Amen, thanks be to God.

We all have big feelings, but for toddlers especially, it can all get a bit too much sometimes. But can you stop a tantrum in its tracks?

According to some parents, a game that teaches breathing through these big feelings is helping their kids to not throw their toys.

The Engage programme - a series of games and activities designed to help kids self-regulate - is rolling out across the nation's early learning services, with the goal of being in more than 2000 centres by June 2027.

While parents and teachers say the techniques are working wonders, education experts warn no approach is a silver bullet.

Barnardos in central Wellington has been running the <u>Engage (Enhancing Neurobehavioural</u> <u>Gains with the Aid of Games and Exercises) programme</u> since May.

Delivery manager Dianne Kabigting said the superhero breathing exercise is a favourite.

The exercise involves mimicking a hero's classic gesture - such as hands on hips for Wonder Woman and shooting webs for Spider-Man - while taking deep breaths.

She said it helps the kids work through periods of heightened emotion.

"We explain to them that we use this breathing exercise when we have really big emotions, when you're feeling angry, frustrated this is a really good time to do this breathing... and then when it happens in real life we can coach them to do these breathing exercises."

It was a helpful technique, kaiako/teacher Tiara Iafeta said - especially before nap and kai time - because it was not uncommon for a room full of children to get "pretty hectic".

The exercises also got a good run in the playground.

"When we notice that they're getting into a bit of a scuffle we ask them, 'What can you do to calm down a little bit?'

"The fact that they can talk back to us and say, 'We can do our superhero breathing'... [it] just helps them regulate their emotions."

It is not just kids taking deep breaths.

Lizzy Prunster - whose two-and-a-half-year-old Leo attends the Barnardos - finds the deep breathing beneficial for her too.

She said when it comes to the exercises, Leo had a favourite hero.

"Leo is obsessed with Spider-Man. We do that every time he needs to calm down or he's having a bit of a tantrum - which he does a lot of these days - and we find it really useful." Psychologist and University of Otago professor Dione Healey created the programme and said it was an approach that had kids learning life skills through play.

"If you want them to learn to calm down or slow down if they're getting overly excited, or learn to persist a little bit more, for example getting them to complete a puzzle without having to leave halfway through.



"So you pick your skill and then you think about games that would involve that skill."

She said decades of research also showed self-regulation played a critical role throughout life.

"The [longitudinal] <u>Dunedin Study</u> published a famous paper that's often referred to around the importance of self-regulation development where they showed that poor self-regulation at age three was predictive of a wide array of adverse outcomes in adulthood.

"So if you had poorer self-regulation, you had higher rates of unemployment, relationship difficulties, physical health difficulties, mental health difficulties, substance use problems, criminal involvement ... so it was a strong predictor of life course outcome."

Healey said self-regulation was a core life skill, and one that related specifically to the transition from early childhood education to school.

"Being able to sit still focus, concentrate, manage your emotions and behaviours in the classroom for example are really really important skills."

University of Canterbury psychology professor Lianne Woodward agreed, and maintained the strength of the Engage programme came from its real-world application, which signalled a move away from computer-based teaching methods.

"It's play-based and it's fun for children, and so they're learning but they're playing. "Children learn in interactions with other humans."

University of Otago education professor Alex Gunn cautions that no technique was a silver bullet, and warned against being too prescriptive about what was and was not 'correct' child behaviour.

In her view, the merit of the Engage programme was its ability to foster

shared understanding about behavioural expectations and "getting adults to talk to each other".

"It really schools the adults more than the children in some ways ... and that's a little bit of magic in the approach."

<u>Government funding in April last year</u>, means Engage is now rolling out across early learning centres and according to programme lead, Jimmy McLauchlan, is on track to be in more than 2000 by mid-2027.

Walk like a giraffe

Healey said for parents wanting to encourage certain behaviours, the key was to explain the skill and the why first.

"Sometimes when you walk down to the park with mum, if you run ahead that could be dangerous, so you might need to slow down when she asks you."

The next step was to introduce the game that used those skills.





Healey said the most important part was to link it all back to real-life scenarios. She said in the Engage game, 'animal speeds' could be a useful one for indicating a gear change.

"A cheetah could be really fast, a giraffe could be moderate, and a sloth could be slow. "So if you're a parent with a child and they're running around and you want them to slow down you could say, 'Go into sloth mode'.

"Or if you want to speed up you could say, 'You're bit of a sloth at the moment, go into giraffe mode, we need to hurry up to get somewhere on time'."
